

[June 2<sup>nd</sup> week, 1863]<sup>1</sup>

Dear Father

I am entirely out of Postage stams (*sic*) so will enclose a few words in Farley's letter. Yours of the 2<sup>nd</sup> was not received until last evening: You speak of obtaining a diploma for me. I think that it could be done as Dr. Anderson<sup>2</sup> told me that if I got back before commencement he would graduate me with the rest and I now hear from R.C. Cook that others of our class who are absent in the army are to receive their full honors as A.B.<sup>3</sup> Cook also writes me that he has procured for me a set of class pictures. These will cost considerable and I hope that you will not fail to pay him for them, even if he doesn't ask for it (which is not very probable). I have written a great many times with regard to our present marching orders, but nothing seems to be done and I am almost ashamed to keep saying that we are going to move. The whole plan [is] this time at least kept perfectly concealed and we none of us have the faintest idea what we are about to attempt. I have not received the money I sent for as yet but expect it daily

<sup>4</sup> Farley Porter and Mary Porter were his younger brother and older sister respectively .
