



# REPORT.

GENERAL HEAD-QUARTERS, STATE OF NEW YORK, ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, ALBANY, Jan. 14, 1860.

His Excellency, E. D. Morgan,

Commander-in-Chief of the military forces of the State:

Sir—Pursuant to the provisions of the law of Congress "establishing an uniform militia throughout the United States," I have the honor to submit the following

#### REPORT:

By the annual report, from this department, for the year 1858, submitted in January of the year 1859, the organized portion of the militia comprised

8 divisions,

26 brigades,

62 regiments,

and in the aggregate, 18,107 officers and men, who were classified in the various arms as follows:

By a comparison of the above statements, it will be observed that the force has increased 739 men.

It will be remarked also, that there is an apparent decrease in the artillery arm, which arises from the fact that artillery organizations, serving as infantry or light infantry, have been classified in accordance with the arm with which they serve, inasmuch as such a classification shows more positively the actual fighting condition of the force.

On the recommendation of Major General Charles W. Sandford, commanding the first division, and Brigadier General John Ewen, commanding the fourth brigade, one of the brigades of such division, it pleased you to direct the consolidation of the companies of the 12th regiment into four full companies, and their transfer to the 10th regiment, and to disband the 12th regimental organization.

The recommendation upon which your order in the premises issued, carrying out the same, was urged before you by General

Sandford in person, upon, among other considerations, the one of military propriety, in effecting thereby the organization of one strong regiment from the material of two weak ones.

Your order, however, met with determined opposition on the part of the 12th regiment. Its officers deeming themselves aggrieved thereby, brought the question of the legality of the order before a civil tribunal, which sustained your authority. Deeming it to be no less just than desirable to conform, as far as was consistent with military propriety, to the wishes of a body of citizens who had voluntarily assumed the duties of a defensive force, and this consolidation being so manifestly repugnant to them, efforts were made to harmonize the differences by requiring as a condition precedent to any further steps on your behalf, obedience to the order already issued, which, if it were complied with, arrangements would be made to transfer the four consolidated companies of the late 12th regiment, from the 10th regiment, where the order had placed them, to the vacant 22d regimental district of the 2d brigade, and to appoint for the regiment thus constituted, a colonel, lieutenant colonel, and major; and further, that after such second transfer, if it were desired, the Inspector General would be directed to inspect the four companies, and if it were found that there were of non-commissioned officers and privates a sufficient number to warrant the organization of two additional companies, such additional companies would then be organized.

These suggestions for an arrangement whereby the matters of difference could be properly adjusted, were communicated by the undersigned, in your presence, to a committee of the officers of the late 12th regiment, of which its late Lieut. Colonel was one, and were thoroughly understood by them; but before a few days had elapsed, and while it was supposed that these suggestions were receiving the consideration which your leniency at least merited for them, a meeting of the rank and file of the regiment was held, at which, after harangues from the officers, a preamble and resolutions were passed, and ordered published, grossly scandalous towards yourself, Major General Sandford, Brigadier General Ewen, and the undersigned. Upon the publication of these unsoldierly

resolutions, I recommended to you the immediate disbandment of the consolidated and transferred companies of the late 12th regiment, which, under your direction, was accomplished.

Three companies of the 55th regiment, during the past year, were transferred to the vacant 23d regimental district of the 3d brigade, as the nucleus of a regiment for that district, to the command of which, Colonel Michael M. Van Buren was appointed; since which, two additional companies have been organized, and the number of the district has been changed. This district and regiment is now designated by the numeral 9, and the regiment gives every promise of achieving for itself a distinguished reputation.

In the vacant 22d regimental district of the 2d brigade, have been organized six companies, recruited, for the most part, from the material of the disbanded 12th regiment, and a regiment organized therein under an able and experienced officer, Colonel Daniel Butterfield, late Lieut. Colonel of the 71st regiment. Since its organization two additional companies have been added to the regiment. The spirit evinced by this regiment, now designated by the numeral 12, suggests the belief that it must become, under its present skillful commander, a thoroughly reliable military body.

In the regimental district of the 4th brigade, rendered vacant by the disbandment of the old 12th regiment, there has been organized a regiment of six companies, bearing the numerical designation 79, under the command of Colonel Thomas W. McLeay.

If the character of the enthusiasm, zeal and devotion displayed by this body of men at the time of their organization into a regiment, be a harbinger of their military career, I am satisfied your Excellency will have no cause to regret their organization.

There have been organized during the past year, twenty-six companies, as follows:

- 15 of the infantry arm,
- 2 of the rifle arm, and
- 9 of the artillery arm,

as will more fully appear from the statement annexed marked "E."

For a knowledge of the arms and accourrements in the hands

of the troops, and such as are in the arsenals of the State, reference is made to the schedule annexed marked "A."

The tables marked "B" and "C," respectively show the amount of commutation collected throughout the State, and the mode and extent of its disbursement by the military auditing boards.

The sum of \$1,499.90 has been expended during the past year for books of tactics, as follows:

which have been distributed to the troops.

This sum, for the purchase of tactics, is far too small. A sum twice as large would barely suffice, and I would recommend its increase, were it not that I am satisfied, from the effort already needed to procure even that sum, that it is all that can be obtained for the purpose.

The quota of arms due the State for the year 1859, amounted, in the valuation of muskets, to  $1601\frac{8}{13}$  muskets, and in money value to \$20,821, and was drawn as follows:

400 long range rifles (calibre 58) with sword bayonets.

400 sets of accoutrements for the same.

30 artillery musketoons, with bayonets.

30 artillery musketoon slings for same.

830 rifle muskets, (calibre 58,) model 1855.

The brigades from which no inspection returns have been received, are the

17th brigade, whereof Brigadier Gen. Amos H. Prescott is commandant, and Major John Satterly is brigade inspector.

24th brigade, whereof Brigadier Gen. Robert M. Richardson is commandant, and Major Clinton F. Page is brigade inspector.

We have, sir, in this State, an admirable militia system operating over a force of some 19,000 of our citizens. These men have assumed the duties of soldiers, in relief of a very much larger body of citizens upon whom the law of Congress has equally imposed the burthen of perfecting and retaining themselves in condition for the defence of the common weal. This law of Congress requires that every able bodied citizen between the ages of 18 and 45, shall be enrolled in each company district, and shall be at all times prepared with the proper arms, accoutrements and ammunition, to respond to the orders of their officers, who at various specific periods, annually, are to call out their commands for instruction, drill and inspection. Besides the extreme inconvenience and harrassment attending a faithful execution of this law, it has been found to be utterly unavailing in achieving the purposes for which it was intended. It has neither furnished a power for the suppression of disturbances, in time of peace, nor has it ever produced the material of defence in time of war. Whenever, within the experience of the undersigned, armed men have been needed to enforce the laws or suppress riots, the militia, as proposed by Congress, has not been the force employed. For such purposes, until the passage, by the Legislature of this State, of the act of 1846, making effective the Congressional statute, a quasi militia, made up of what was known as "independent companies," or else an armed posse of special deputy sheriffs performed this service. So, also, with regard to a time of war. Whatever body of men may have been termed militia, in the last war, so far as the rank and file were concerned, may be said to have been, at best, but a collection of citizens hastily assembled in the various regimental districts of the States, as ignorant of the practical duties of soldiers as their officers, for the most part, were innocent of a knowledge of command. To whatever extent these bodies of militia may have been of service upon the battle fields of the country, such service was not due to any provision of law, but to native intelligence and the experience gained from the privations and hardships of actual campaign in the presence of the foe.

It cannot be gainsayed, were the war one of sufficient duration,

that such a force would become in time formidable even against disciplined troops; but from the great progress which has been made in the art of war since the days of the Revolution, and the last war, and by reason of the vastly increased facilities of intercommunication which the railroads and the steamships afford, it is safe to say that the wars of the future will be of short duration. Witness the Crimean war, wherein the railroads and the steamships played so conspicuous a role. Seven long years were not required here to stay imperial Russia, with her huge and thoroughly disciplined armies, in her march towards the long coveted and destined prize of Constantinople. So, too, with the recent brief Italian campaign, which has so singularly disrupted the treaties of 1815, and metamorphosed the diplomacy of Europe. Indeed it is morally certain that if we remain as poorly prepared as we now are, and shall ever be so unfortunate as to be again involved in war, that war will be one of gigantic proportions and of great disaster, and the blows falling about and among us thick and fast, even to the very paralyzing of our energies, will leave but little time to organize even the show of resistance, for such at present is our thorough weakness as a nation. Dispatch is the order of the day; dispatch in assembling detached troops; dispatch in gathering the material of war; dispatch in transporting the same to the scene of operations: dispatch in developing the combinations of strategy, and dispatch in the tactical management of troops upon the battle field. Celerity in all warlike movements on the part of a government possessed of a large and thoroughly disciplined army and navy, rich in all the material of war, is at once its greatest element of strength and the best harbinger of its success; but of what avail would be dispatch to us for such purposes, crippled as we are through the most culpable inertness of our law makers, but to produce confusion and ruin. Where are our troops to be assembled? where the 25,000 to 30,-000 officers to command 600,000 rank and file against European troops? where the vast material of war to be gathered? where the thousands of military equipage for transportation? where the pontoons and the men to use them, the heavy mortars, the siege train, and the countless paraphernalia of war? To be sure, for

a nation covering a continent, we have a scattered army of from 15,000 to 17,000 men, which, thanks to West Point, is well officered: a few arsenals here and there, so well protected that seventeen men not long since absolutely took and held one of them, but not containing sufficient arms of recent invention to equip a sixth of the force, were the war one of European dimensions; a few forts, many of them not adequate in location, nor, from the character of their armament, to the defence of the sea approaches of some of our maritime towns; and a navy comprising a few old-fashioned sailing ships, with now and then a steam vessel notable as a political failure; and yet this nation blusters about taking Cuba. and occupying Mexico, as if the allied monarchs of Europe were willing tamely to submit to the despoiling of Spain and to the ruin of their merchants; still, the possession of Cuba and Mexico is as much our destiny as is the possession of Constantinople that of Russia.

Truly our country is in a shameful condition for its defence, and the Legislature of 1846 deserves the thanks of all patriotic citizens in so arranging a system of militia. under the impracticable and absurd law of congress, that, while it came within its Constitutional provisions, it was untrammelled by none of its antiquated features. If this system be now sustained, and expanded by Congress, after a perfect demonstration of its success with ourselves, over each of the States of the Union, the State of New York will have gained for itself the honor of having inaugurated the means for the perfect defence of the land, without jeopardizing, in the least, the liberties of the people.

The Legislature of 1846, recognizing the futility of making soldiers out of every able bodied citizen between the ages of 18 and 45 years, in a population of 3,000,000 of people, by turning them out for drill, under heavy penalties, once or twice a year, reduced these penalties to the fine of fifty cents in each individual instance, for the non-performance of the military duty required by the laws of Congress, which it calls a commutation for such duty. This was done upon the presumption that the great bulk of those liable to perform this duty would be glad to rid themselves of it at so small a cost, while there would remain a sufficient number of citi-

zens who, from military zeal alone, would go to the expense of uniforming and perfecting themselves in a knowledge of the duties requisite to their becoming effective soldiers, provided that their other necessary military expenses were paid by the State. Consequently, the Legislature arranged to collect this fine, or commutation, and to pay it over to such persons as were willing to go to this trouble and expense, and whom it organized into the companies, regiments, brigades, and divisions which form our militia of to day. But it has been discovered, after thirteen years of trial, that the commutation system has utterly failed to yield the amount expected and necessary to meet the actual military expenses of the force, which have so largely increased by reason of the efforts now being made everywhere throughout the State to to secure a thoroughly disciplined body of citizen soldiers.

It were, doubtless, far better for the troops to substitute, for this system, one based upon such a taxation of property as should, annually, realize the sum of fifteen hundred dollars for each regiment. In the cities of the State, where the presence of a military force is frequently necessary, this taxation would probably be submitted to without much hesitation; but, from the opportunities I have had of forming a knowledge of the opinion of the State at large, I am inclined to regard the change to a system of property taxation as one of doubtful expediency.

It is believed, however, that if provision were made for a more stringent collection of the commutation, by increasing the powers and responsibilities of the collectors, and requiring the sheriffs to collect, in the usual way, from those who refuse or neglect to pay over to the collectors, a sum of at least \$1,500 annually might be raised in each regimental district of the State, and the Legislature is earnestly recommended to enact such amendments of the militia law as may attain this end. By this arrangement, the odium which now attaches, in the public mind, to the militia, from an unequal collection of the tax, will, it is confidently believed, wholly subside, and the commutation system become no longer an objectionable feature of the law.

If we can realize this sum for two years, and sustain our militia

in its present state of efficiency, I am satisfied that the general government, within that time, can be prevailed upon to adopt our system for the whole Union, requiring each State to have one regiment of 500 men for each 70,000 of its population, and paying from the treasury of the United States, annually, to each of such regiments throughout the Union, in lieu of the present eommutation, the sum of \$1,500. By this means the militia of the Union would become what it is in our own State, not only a cadet force for the instruction of men for the posts of officers to the huge army which the general government may, at some future day, be called upon to create, but a reliable force for the suppression of insurrections or riots in times of peace. All this might be obtained at an annual expenditure, by the general government, of less than \$700,000.

In connection with this subject I beg to submit the following letter of Captain Mansfield Lovell, late of the army and now a captain in the 9th regiment, trusting that the Legislature will, without hesitancy, appropriate the sum necessary to provide for the payment of the expenses which Captain Lovell has incurred in procuring the wooden casemate gun of which he speaks:

New York, 17th November, 1859.

Brigadier General Frederick Townsend,

Adjutant General New York State Militia:

SIR—I beg leave most respectfully to call your attention to a deficiency which exists in the organization and instruction of the militia force in this city, and to ask your co-operation in supplying that deficiency as far as may be practicable.

It cannot have escaped your notice, that the enormous increase in the caliber of heavy guns, and the propulsion of vessels of war, by steam, have inaugurated and developed a new system of attack upon sea port towns, as evidenced in the late European wars. The slow and precarious method of landing troops for the purposes of such attack has been abandoned; and, as a natural consequence, infantry, cavalry and light artillery, for the defence of sea board towns, have become of secondary importance; and

the heavy sea coast gun, in masonry forts, must hereafter be looked to as the proper and legitimate means of defence.

You are also aware that while much attention has been devoted by our militia force to instruction in the three first mentioned arms of service, the drill of the heavy gun has been utterly neglected; and this great metropolis, at this moment, lies as completely unprotected and defenceless as if she had not a gun mounted in her harbor, nor an able bodied man to serve in her ranks; and it is with the view of setting on foot a remedy for this startling state of things that I now address you.

The entrance to our harbor is strong by nature; and the general government has turned these natural advantages to account by building first class casemated masonry forts, armed with heavy guns, and provided with hot shot furnaces, at an aggregate expense of more than four millions of dollars; a large bill of expense, it is true, but one which sinks in importance when it is remembered that the estimated value of the property which they are intended to protect, is more than five hundred and fifty millions of dollars. Other and larger works are now in process of erection, or in contemplation. The federal government has done its duty towards us fully and generously; and there can be no ground of complaint on the score of neglect or parsimony. Meanwhile we have done literally nothing in the way of providing garrisons for these forts; not a single company of heavy artillery has been organized; not a man been instructed in the service of the sea coast gun; and our casemated works, so far from being elements of strength, are, in reality, points of weakness, as they would, undoubtedly, be seized and held by an enterprising enemy, who could not be dislodged without a fearful sacrifice of blood and treasure.

Having had some practical experience with the volunteer service, together with the advantage of several years' service in the artillery of the United States army, I feel well assured that there exists no good reason why this evil should not be in a great measure remedied. Everything that relates to the manual of the sea coast gun, can be readily taught, in time of peace, to the militia force, by a slight adaptation of the gun and carriage, to

the necessities of the case. The general government could always furnish a sufficient number of scientific officers and well instructed men to give proper directions in the event of a war. What is now imperatively demanded of us, is to prepare and instruct enough men to supply a working force for every gun in the harbor. For this purpose, about 5,000 men will be required.

I therefore propose to commence by giving lessons to Company "C.," 9th regiment, in the drill of the sea coast gun; and in order to do this we shall require a modified casemate carriage and gun, which, with the requisite implements, I can procure for about four hundred dollars. It does not seem right to put this expense upon the company, which has expressed a willingness to devote its time to this species of instruction, in addition to the usual infantry drill; and I have, therefore, the honor to ask your intercession with the Legislature, during the ensuing winter, to induce them to make an appropriation of \$400 for this specific purpose. When we consider the trifling amount of the expense, in connection with the vast interests involved, I cannot doubt that this application will meet with success.

The attention of this department has been called to the inadequate arrangements for the defence of New York city from the approach of an enemy by sea. Having had, by a personal inspection of the forts in and about New York harbor, the opportunity of discovering how inadequately that city is at present defended, and having had explained to me the plan projected for its complete defence, I beg to insist, with the engineer officers of the army having charge of these defences, upon the urgent necessity of the immediate execution of this plan, and to suggest the propriety of the passage by the present Legislature of resolutions instructing our Senators and requesting our Representatives in Congress to spare no efforts to secure the appropriations recommended for this purpose by the engineers in charge. It may not be inopportune to call the attention of the Legislature to the following communication, recently published in one of the daily papers of the city of New York:

SIR—Some few months since, through the politeness and by invitation of Major J. G. Barnard, of the engineers, the officer in charge of the fortifications in process of erection for the defence of New York, several officers of the militia in command of troops in and about that city had the opportunity of making a personal inspection of these forts, and I had the pleasure of being one of the party.

Major Barnard was accompanied on the occasion by Capt. George W. Cullum, Lieut. M. D. McAlister, and Lieut. Quincy A. Gillmore, all of the engineers.

These gentlemen neglected no opportunity of explaining to us the specific object of each fortification, and by maps and the examination of some of the sites of the proposed forts, succeeded, it is believed, in imparting to us a comprehensive idea of the projected plan for the complete defence of the city.

They estimated carefully the power of the forts at present erected, and explained how inadequate they were now for the accomplishment of the purpose for which they had been originally designed, and showed conclusively that, as at present defended, the beautiful city of New York, the great heart of the nation, might at any moment be at the mercy of a belligerent maritime power, which, in two hours time, could, besides paralyzing the country by the blow, destroy in property more than ten times the number of millions which these sentinels upon the watch towers of the land have for years been so unsuccessfully invoking from Congress.

Astounded by this state of things, and comprehending, through the patient and clear explanations of Major Barnard, Capt Cullum, and the other officers of the engineers, how complete was the projected system of defence, and at how little cost it could be carried out, when compared with the immense interests at stake, I have determined now, on the eve of the assembling of Congress, to make some effort myself to awaken at least our citizen soldiery, (for they will be called upon to defend the city,) to the disgrace which awaits them should we be precipitated into a war with a maritime power, while our New York defences remain as at pre-

sent, and to urge upon them to induce their Representatives in Congress to bring that body to a serious consideration of the question.

It will doubtless be conceded that the first desideratum in arranging the defence of a sea-coast town, is so to stud the sea approach with proper works, that an attack by that approach will be impracticable; and that the second is, to prevent debarkation and a land attack, by batteries suitably disposed for the purpose.

To accomplish the first, years and the expenditure of large sums are required; whereas, the second, with the proper amount of men and materials, may be achieved in a night-time.

If it be practicable on the part of an enemy to attempt the sea approach, he will not hazard the more dangerous expedient of debarking troops under fire for the land attack.

If the contrary be the case, as at Sebastopol, his efforts will be directed to the land attack.

Now the defences of New York at present invite both kinds of attack; but as the attack by the sea approach could be accomplished with but little loss, the land attack of the city would not be entertained.

For surely, if in a few hours time, by the sea approach, an enemy with a steam fleet, and the new guns of great range and caliber, could destroy the navy yard, burn the shipping, and lay the greater part of the city in ruins, he would not trouble himself much about the land attack.

New York is approachable by sea from two directions; the one by the Narrows, the other by the East river.

That these approaches are inadequately defended, considering the modification which steel-plated steamships, and guns of great calibre, range and precision, have made upon the condition of war, it is only necessary to show what the present defences of those approaches are, and what further works our able engineers immediately require, in order to put the successful defence of the city beyond a question.

On the Narrows approach there are now the following works namely:

On the East river approach, there is but Fort Schuyler, having of channel bearing guns 186, and there is required for the complete defence of this approach, a work at Willet's Point, opposite to Fort Schuyler, mounting 150 guns. Thus we perceive, that though the Narrows approach is defended by ten distinct works, having in all 654 channel bearing guns, eight new works are needed, mounting 846 more guns; and, though the East river approach is defended by one work mounting 186 guns, another work is needed mounting 150 guns. Therefore, while there are now existing on both approaches eleven works, mounting of effective guns 840, nine new works are needed, mounting 996 guns—nearly as many more works as now exist, and 156 more guns.

From this display of deficiency, is it to be doubted which of the two attacks the naval commander of the present day would select were he to contemplate a descent upon New York? what avail would be the telegraph, and the railroad, in the rapid assembling of any number of militia at New York, if within five hours from the time a hostile fleet appeared off the harbor, New York had been laid in ruins and its militia under them? But, it has been said, follow the course pursued with such signal succes at Sebastopol. Sink ships at the Narrows. Well then, we are to give up New York, with all its great mechanical appliances, as a refitting station for our men-of-war. If so, where are they to go when disabled by storm or otherwise? Where with their prizes? If they seek the other ports of the land, these ports too will have been destroyed or closed. What will have become of our com-Are we then supinely to surrender our prestige upon the sea, and to permit the enemy to pursue, unmolested, his own commerce, and to accumulate thereby the means to fight us, land-locked. for years?

Indeed, if such an obstruction were placed at the Narrows, it would be liable to be washed away by any great storm that should arise, or upon some dark and foggy night to be destroyed by men from the enemy's ships in the outer harbor, by a process similar to that by which Mailfert removed the rocks at Hellgate.

Granting even that such obstruction would answer the purpose sought to be achieved by it, it would unquestionably prove to us an enemy far more to be feared than the belligerent power itself. We are a great commercial people. Our vitality consists as much in our activity upon the seas, as in our industry upon the land, and every consideration of policy demands that our commerce and our ports during war, should be protected at all hazards, and especially that port which is the great entrepot of the continent.

The foreign commerce of Russia, on the other hand, is comparatively nothing. It was of little consequence, therefore, to her during the Crimean war whether or not her ports and her men-of-war were blockaded. There was nothing for these vessels to do upon the seas. They could not hope to contend successfully against the combined fleets of England and France; and, as there

was but a trifling commerce to protect, the policy which she pursued in that war was the wisest that could have been adopted.

For us it is manifestly the part of wisdom immediately to set about erecting works in and around New York harbor, of such a character that an attack upon the city by land or sea, shall be rendered wholly impracticable.

The engineers in charge say that their projected plan will secure this result. They desire to arrange works upon the Narrows approach, so that there shall be there batteries sufficient "to concentrate a fire of 300 guns upon every point of a vessel's path within range of fire." To accomplish this, they require on Staten Island side, besides Fort Richmond, the completion of Fort Tompkins, just commenced, the construction of the Jaw Bone battery, south of Fort Richmond, and the extension of the earth works—batteries Hudson and Morton.

Upon the Long Island side they require in order to sweep the approach, and partially to prevent a debarkation in Gravesend bay, additional batteries near Fort Hamilton, and the modification of Fort Lafayette. To fill the gap between the Narows and the interior line of works on Bedlow's and Governor's Island, they require a work on Robbins' Reef-a site midway between the Narrows and Governor's Island-which rakes the approach through the Narrows and commands the outlets of the "Kills." But, more effectively to prevent a debarkation in Gravesend Bay, they deem to be indispensable, a work upon Coney Island which in conjunction with one upon the "West Bank" and one upon the "Romer's Shoal," along with the work already authorized by Congress upon Sandy Hook, they believe will make a sufficiently formidable outer line of defence to the Narrows approach. For the East River approach, already defended by Fort Schuyler-a work of great strength-they require a similar work on Willett's Point, on the opposite shore, and consider that with these two works, together with "such auxiliary means as can be easily provided in time of war," this approach would be effectually sealed, and the complete defences of the sea approaches to New York, be secured.

With regard to the land attack upon the city, Major J, G. Bar-

nard, in a recent pamphlet addressed to the Secretary of War, in which he discusses most ably the "Dangers and Defences of New York," says:

"The great danger to New York and its dependencies, from this kind of attack, is from the safe and convenient landing at Gravesend, and the short line of march thence to Brooklyn. \* \*

"With the work I propose on Coney Island, however, this landing becomes unavailable, and the danger of land attack on New York or Brooklyn becomes comparatively insignificant. A landing in the face of the dense and warlike population of New York, augmented as the numerical force of its defenders may be, in a day or two, by overwhelming numbers from other quarters, is one of the most dangerous operations of war.

"It will not be undertaken on the open sea shore of Long Island, where, at any moment, the disembarked force would be liable to have its communication with its fleet cut off. It would only be made from Long Island Sound, whence a march of fifteen or twenty miles, at the shortest, would be necessary to reach Brooklyn. At whatever rate such a danger may be estimated, it is sufficient to say that in twenty-four hours after a declaration of war, if thought necessary, a considerable army may be entrenched on the line of approach to Brooklyn. The work on Willet's Point will, by no means, have an insignificant bearing on such defence. To 'leave it behind' is not simply to leave a 'fortification' in the enemy's rear, it is to have in his rear an entrenched tete-de-pont, whence in twenty-four hours an overwhelming force may be thrown from the New York side upon his rear, cutting him off from his fleet.

"In conclusion, I would say in this connection, that the policy of the Government and of the Engineer Department has always been (and I conceive always should be,) first, to close all the great approaches by water leading to our dock yards, commercial cities, &c., and to locate their defences in such a manner as to force any landing that may be attempted to as great a distance as possible.

"The defence against approaches by an army landing must be by our own troops, \* \* \* \* with the assistance of temporary works, and all the expedients of engineering talents and skill on such route as an enemy may have selected. \* \* \* Whether these propositions are admitted or not, it is most certain that at present the great dangers of New York are through the inadequately defended water approaches. It is to these dangers I must call your attention and the attention of Congress, and of the people of the United States; for it is not a question of local but of national concern."

Major Barnard estimates the necessary expense (to secure to New York this complete system of defence,) at eight or ten millions of dollars; and I ask if it is not small, indeed, in comparison with the magnitude of the interests involved.

In consideration of these interests, is it not your duty, sir, and the duty of every good citizen, to press upon Congress the importance of its immediate appropriation.

Dear Sir—In accordance with General Regulations, paragraph 528, I have the honor to transmit herewith, the return required. Pursuant to General Division Order No. 4, and in conformity to General Regulations, paragraph 534, said officers came together at the State armory in Ogdensburgh, on the seventeenth and eighteenth days of August, ult.

The Fifteenth and Sixteenth Brigades were well represented, but there were but three officers present from the Fourteenth Brigade.

The course of instruction laid down for 1858 and 1859, were nearly all taken up, explained and exemplified by the officers present. The meeting was a success, and proves that the course adopted by the General Regulations, will be useful to the service. I substituted General Gray, of the Fourteenth Brigade, as instructor under my general superintendence. I found him very well versed in tactics, and capable of imparting his knowledge to others in a plain comprehensive manner.

Col. Samuel T. Richards, commanding the 31st regiment, and Lieut. Col. William C. Brown, of the 35th regiment, I found understood and were ready at all times to do their duty.

Brig. Gen. FREDERICK TOWNSEND, Adjt. Gen. N. Y. S.-M., Albany, N. Y. General—The undersigned, commandant of the Second Brigade, begs leave to transmit the annexed reports from the commandants of regiments in said Brigade.

Also to report that there have been two drills of the officers and two consecutive lessons for theoretic instruction of the field, and Brigade staff officers, in addition to a regular course of lessons in Scott's Tactics.

There have been likewise two field days of the entire brigade, on the 20th of June, and the 24th of October last, the Fourth regiment being dismounted and doing duty as an infantry battalion, on both days. On the first field day, very little was accomplished in consequence of the inchemency of the weather. On the second field day, the following evolutions of the line were executed, viz:

Line of battle.

Breaking to the front to the right by company into column.

Column at full distance forward into line of battle.

Breaking to the rear by the right of companies into column.

Into line faced to the rear.

Change of front forward on the Third battalion.

Change of front to the rear on the 3d battalion.

Echellons by battalion, at 25 paces, forming forward by the right.

The like, forming in retreat by the left.

Breaking to the rear by the right of companies.

Forward into line on the headmost company 2d battalion.

Breaking to the front and right by company.

Into line faced to the rear on the headmost company 2d battalion.

Change of front on 2d battalion, left wing forward.

Change of front on same battalion, right wing forward.

Close column by division on 1st division 1st battalion, right in front.

Deployment on same division and battalion.

Close column by division on 1st division 2d battalion, right in front. Countermarch.

Deployment, (left being in front,) on 1st division 2d battalion.

Close column by division, on 4th division 3d battalion, left in front. Countermarch.

Deploying by battalion in mass on 1st battalion.

Ploying by battalion in mass on 2d battalion, right in front.

Line of battle on 3d battalion, and deploying by battalion in mass on 2d battalion.

Ploying by battalion in mass on 1st battalion, right in front.

Taking distances, and deploying faced to the left, by battalions in mass.

Forming column of battalions in mass, right in front.

Also have to report, that at a meeting of the officers of the 15th Brigade, called Oct. 25 and 26, for theoretic instruction, the course for 1858 and the first twelve manœuvres of the course prescribed for 1859, were studied, practiced and illustrated by diagrams.

That the officers then and there assembled, made a good degree of proficiency in said course of instruction.

To Brig Gen'l F. TOWNSEND, Adjutant General:

The undersigned, commanding the 20th Brigade N. Y. S. M., pursuant to paragraph 527 of the General Regulations, makes the following report:

By an order duly issued by me on the 14th day of December, 1858, the field officers and commandants of companies in this Brigade, the Brigade staff officers, and the staff officers of the 60th regiment were directed to meet at Elmira, in Chemung county, on the 22d day of February last past, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, for two days' "theoretic instruction," pursuant to General Regulations. On the day designated most of the above mentioned officers were present, and the two days were spent in instruction, profitably, I believe, to the service. Lt. Col. H. P. Martin, late of the 71st regiment, by invitation, was present as instructor, and under his directions the officers went through with the "school of the soldier." "the school of the company," and partially through "the school of the battalion." I had previously caused to be prepared a large number of painted and lettered blocks, representing six battalion companies, with all the commissioned and non-commissioned officers pertaining to a regiment, and the music and pioneers. In the afternoon of the second day, with these blocks, the officers went through the course of annual instruction presented for the year 1859. They were all very attentive to the duties imposed upon them, and the instruction was appreciated, and its effect is visible in a marked improvement.

In the course of the instruction papers were read to us upon the nature and importance of the service, and the laws and regulations controlling the same, by Major G. L. Smith, Capt. T. K. Beecher, chaplain of the 60th regiment, and myself.

Col. L. C. Whiting, commanding the 60th regiment, by an order duly issued, assembled the officers and non-commissioned officers of his regiment at Hornellsville, in Steuben county, on the 20th and 21st days of September, 1859, "for improvement and instruction," pursuant to paragraph 536 of the General Regulations. I also issued an order for the Brigade staff to be present at same time. Lt. Col. H. P. Martin was also present as the instructor, and the same course was pursued as at the Elmira Brigade meeting. The improvement was marked.

I desire to express my thanks to Lt. Col. Martin, for his able assistance on the occasions above referred to. As an instructor, and officer, and a gentleman, we think he has no superior.

On the 22d day of September, the annual parade and inspection of the 60th regiment took place at Hornellsville. I was present with a portion of the Brigade staff. The regiment went through with the twelve first evolutions in the course of instruction, as directed for 1859, and a portion of the course prescribed for the year 1858. They were all admirably executed, showing the benefit of the previous instruction, imparted to the officers and non-commissioned officers at the Brigade and regimental meetings. All of the companies, I am happy to say, did well, and the officers seemed to vie with each other in the rapid and correct performance of every command issued. The regiment was reviewed by myself, and also by Major G. L. Smith, Brig. Inspector, who was present, and went through with the inspection. My thanks are due to the officers of the 60th regiment, and of the Brigade staff, who were present, on the general occasions above referred to, for their promptness, and for the zeal and ability they generally manifested in discharging their duties.

In conclusion, I must again call attention to the fact, that we have not in this Brigade a musket that is serviceable, and request that others may be issued to us at your earliest convenience.

In compliance with paragraph 527, general regulations, the undersigned has the honor to report:

That he has not received from the commandants of regiments the reports contemplated in said paragraph. He himself witnessed several of the evolutions prescribed in the school for this year, by the 54th regiment, all of which were creditably executed; and so far as the companies were concerned, all was well done. There is, however, a want of comprehension on the part of guides, without more frequent practice, which will, in all cases, embarrass not only the commanding officer, but also gives uncertainty to all the movements of a batalion.

The undersigned ordered the parades of the 59th regiment, by companies, and they were only visited by the brigade inspector. This course was decided upon on account of the regiment being largely in debt. The inspector reports favorably of three of the companies; two will probably have to be disbanded. There will be always found serious difficulties attending the organization of regiments in small villages, widely separated. They can only come together once a year, and, of course, but little can be accomplished in that way.

The undersigned is pleased to observe an increasing "esprit de corps" in most of the companies of this brigade, as well as excellence in drill and discipline.

Dear Sir—In compliance with paragraph 532 of general regulations, and of general orders No. 3, I would respectfully submit the following report of the inspection of the third brigade, consisting of the 7th, 8th, 9th, and 55th regiments.

Brigadier General Hall and staff were inspected with the eighth regiment, and were fully uniformed, armed and equipped, according to the regulations. The several regiments-comprising his brigade were inspected as follows, viz:

The seventh, commanded by Col. Marshall Lefferts, on 20th October.

The eighth, commanded by Col. George Lyons, on 18th October.

The ninth, commanded by Col. M. M. Van Buren, on 14th October.

The fifty-fifth, commanded by Col. E. Le Gal, on 14th October.

The seventh regiment consists of eight companies of artillery, doing duty as light infantry, and one of cavalry. They were inspected on Hamilton Square, and numbered eight hundred and ninety-seven, rank and file, being the largest number ever inspected in this regiment. The reviews and

batallion movements, as laid down in general orders, were executed with promptness and steadiness, showing an excellent state of discipline of both officers and privates. The muskets, which are the only property belonging to the State in this regiment, are in excellent condition.

The eighth regiment was ordered to parade for inspection on the 10th October, but the weather being inclement, the order was countermanded, and a new order issued for the 18th. The weather of the morning of the 18th being stormy, undoubtedly had an unfavorable effect on the numerical returns. This regiment consists of eight companies of infantry and one of cavalry. They numbered, rank and file, three hundred and seventy-nine. The movements prescribed were promptly and correctly executed, showing an excellent state of discipline, and a marked improvement in efficiency since last year. The company of cavalry, under the command of Capt. J. M. Varian, deserves especial notice. It is one of the most efficient and reliable corps attached to the service, and is under excellent drill and discipline, both as cavalry and light artillery. The muskets of this regiment belong to the State, and are in good condition.

The ninth regiment is composed of four battalion companies, and a full field and staff. They were inspected on Hamilton Square, and numbered two hundred and one, rank and file. This was the first inspection of this regiment, and on account of its recent organization the evolutions prescribed in general orders were dispensed with. The appearance of this regiment is most promising; their uniform is blue, similar to that of the State regulation, and the esprit de corps existing in both officers and privates promise for it a brilliant future. Company D. being unable to procure their uniforms in time for the inspection, were inspected at their armory. The muskets of this regiment are the property of the State, and are in good order.

The fifty-fifth regiment is composed of six companies of infantry. They were inspected on Hamilton Square, and numbered two hundred and forty-seven, rank and file. The commandant, Col. E. Le Gal, is an efficient and capable officer, but the line officers, excepting the commandants of companies F and H, are very deficient in military knowledge. If properly supported by his line officers, I am satisfied that this regiment, under its able commandant, would soon be noted for its excellent drill and discipline. I would suggest that the officers be required to give their commands in English, and not in French, as is now generally the case. The numerical strength of this regiment is less than last year, there having been three of its companies transferred to the ninth regiment. The muskets are in very bad order, and I would recommend that new ones be supplied to them.

I inspected, with this regiment, a section of artillery doing duty as eavalry, composed of sixteen rank and file, all well mounted and equipped. They are a fine body of men, and quite an acquisition to the regiment.

HEAD-QUARTERS FOURTH BRIGADE, N. Y. S. M.

To the Adjutant General:

Sir.—The inspection of the several regiments comprising this Brigade, for the present year, commenced with the 69th regiment, at Hamilton Square, on the 5th instant, the front of which, when formed, exhibited about eighty files. The formation was quite well made, and the regiment was delivered to the command of the Colonel By the Adjutant very correctly.

I felt some apprehension as to the ability of the recently elected colonel to go through with the movements, he having drilled his regiment but once, and then in the evening, since his election. All doubts were soon removed, for Col. Corcoran went through with the programme of movements, or nearly so, with all the familiarity experience only gives.

The Colonel was ably assisted by Lieut. Col. Nugent, late the Major of the regiment. In execution of the movements a number of the line officers gave evidence of inexperience, indeed, were sadly deficient in knowledge of even minor matters pertaining to the positions they were elected to fill.

There were exceptions, however. Capt's Flood, Company "A," and McGuire, Company "D," appeared to comprehend and act as if they understood the mechanism of the movements. All the officers and men, as well, exhibited a willingness to be instructed, and really did all they could to relieve the Colonel in his arduous task, who, by his promptness and ubiquitous presence, enables me to report that the movements were quite well performed. It is the Colonel's intention to be thorough in his evening drills, hoping by the spring to remedy the deficiencies that manifested themselves at inspection. The arms and accountrements of the 69th were in fair condition, particularly those of Company "A." There is not, however, that attention paid to brightness, or cleanliness, that arms furnished by the State, are entitled to.

The uniform of this regiment is all new, and according to the regulations as adopted. The change in the uniform of the regiment is highly creditable to them, as the one they have discarded was good, and they could have retained it, but, desirous of conforming to the "regulation" color, they sacrificed their prejudice for a color that was cherished by them, and adopted blue. I respectfully suggest that several of the companies of the 69th be consolidated, and the most efficient officers placed in command, regardless of rank.

The next regiment in order of inspection was the 11th, which took place on the 18th inst., under the command of Col. Bostwick, ably assisted by Lieut. Col. Bendix, and Major Ferrers. The staff was quite full and effective, particularly in the office of engineer. Much enthusiasm pervades the entire regiment, and if it continues, as I believe it will, I shall soon be able to report it as the strongest regiment in the service. Its numerical strength present on this occasion was 462.

The arms and accoutrements were in good condition, and their discipline so far as obedience is concerned, was excellent. It is true that in some of the motions in the manual they are not as perfect as desirable. This is the fault of the company officers, who in many cases are elected to the command of companies on other accounts than military qualifications. The first twelve movements of the programme, as directed in orders No.

from General Head-Quarters, dated the 7th inst., were performed without any difficulty, as were a number more, and without error.

The 79th regiment was dieected to assemble at the division armory, Elm street, for inspection, on the evening of the 18th inst., presenting an aggregate of 223 officers and men present. The regiment not being uniformed or equipped, no movements were executed. Col. McLeay informed me that the several companies were being regularly drilled, and that their stuff for trousers was expected to arrive from Scotland daily, when they would immediately put their uniforms under contract for manufacture. Owing to a misunderstanding between two of the commandants of companies, on a very small matter, one of them has withdrawn, temporarily it is hoped, taking quite a number of a large company with him. But for this circumstance it is possible 50 more would have been present. Much enthusiasm appears to prevail in the 79th regiment, and I think there is no doubt of its becoming a strong and well disciplined body of men.

On the 19th, I inspected the 10th regiment, commanded by Col. Halsey. The movements of the "course" were executed correctly, as well as some twelve other movements. After the formation of the regiment, the Adjutant, (Highet,) assisted the Colonel in the movements, and acquitted himself with eclat. The 10th has not improved either in discipline or num-The total present, including field, staff and band, was 191. The regiment being small, the Colonel was able to command it so perfectly by his presence at every point that the movements were made without any mistakes. It is an undeniable fact, however, that with the exception of Captain Raynor, and perhaps Fauth, there is scarcely a captain that understands his duties in the school of the soldier. I might with safety say, the first principles in this school; and as the companies are reduced to quite a small number in each, I respectfully suggest and recommend that they be consolidated, "B" with "C," and "G" with "H," and transferred to the 11th regiment. Company "E" having arrived near dissolution, I recommend that it be disbanded.

The accoutrements of the 10th are in good condition, while the arms, being mostly private property, except those of Raynor's corps, which belong to the State, are in the most unsafe and dirty condition.

The 11th regiment is the only one this year having made return of its parades which have been all that the law requires. I believe this is the case with the 10th and 69th. Capt. Reilly, of the Lancers, complains that his request for pistols for his command has not been complied with, although his bonds, properly executed, have been lying in the department for them for two years. I respectfully call your attention to Capt. Reilly, as a faithful officer, and his request as reasonable.

I respectfully beg leave to call your attention to the custom of returning

the bands employed on the occasion of the annual inspection. Should not the band belong regularly to the regiment, to entitle it to the benefit of being added to its numerical strength? At the inspection just ended, the same band was counted twice and is returned as the regimental band. To which of the three regiments does it belong?

Adjutant General F. Townsend:

With this I beg leave to hand you inspection returns of the Fifth Brigade, and in accordance with paragraph 532 of the General Regulations, and orders from General Head Quarters, calling attention thereto, I submit the following report of the operations and condition of this Brigade, consisting of the 13th, 14th, 70th, and 72d regiments. 13th regiment artillery (doing infantry duty,) Col. Abel Smith was inspected Oct. 3d.

The manœuvres prescribed in General Orders No. 3, were gone through with from numbers one to sixteen, inclusive. (The orders countermanding so much of orders No. 3 as related to the performance of but twelve of the movements, not having been received until after our inspections had taken place.) The officers and non-commissioned officers seemed familiar with the movements, and with the exception of Nos. 15 and 16, the evolutions were executed in a manner that would reflect credit upon any regiment in the State.

These two movements, "advancing in line of battle, and marching in retreat in line of battle," were poorly done, the field officers seeming ignorant of the proper position of the guides, markers, &c. I think for celerity in execution and in the general knowledge of their duties by the non-commissioned officers (on whom so much depends,) this regiment cannot be surpassed. The regiment has not recruited as fast as I had hoped it would, parading but four battalion and one flank rifle company. I understand, however, there are two companies now about organizing, to be attached to this regiment, which will materially strengthen it. The officers in this regiment are men of experience, and on this occasion corroborated the opinion heretofore expressed, of efficiency and a knowledge of their duties. I would renew the recommendation made in my last report, that an order be issued making this an infantry or light infantry regiment.

14th regiment infantry, Col. Alfred M. Wood, inspected Oct. 4, 1859.

It affords me much pleasure to be able to report the very decided improvement that has taken place in this regiment during the past year. The differences of opinion which had previously existed and which at one time threatened to entirely break up the regiment, seem now to have been settled and the right feeling to be established. In February last, a new uniform was adopted, and they now have six companies fully equipped. Companies "F," Capt. McCarty, (which did not appear at all,) and "C," Lieut. Becker, not having equipped, will be either disbanded or transferred.

The manœuvres prescribed were gone through with without an omission and in a manner which showed plainly that careful attention had been paid to that most important duty, the non-commissioned officers' drills. The field officers were ably assisted by the Adjutant, Lieutenant Jourdan.

This regiment is indebted to Col. Wood for much of its improvement during the past year. By his careful and judicious course, he has succeeded in establishing a confidence between officers and men, the results of which can best be seen by a comparison of the regiment as it now is and as it was one year since.

Major Fowler, recently elected to his present position, is a most promising officer, and I was surprised at his perfect familiarity with the minute details of the different movements. I find it impossible to particularize in the conduct of the line officers and their commands, as each was attentive and performed his duty with promptness. I cannot however permit the occasion to pass, without expressing my gratification at seeing that thorough disciplinarian, Capt. Horace A. Sprague, again in command of company "A," which seems rapidly regaining its former position, as one of the best drilled companies in the State.

72d regiment infantry, Col. Michael Bennett, inspected October 5th. This regiment has remained in about the same numerical condition as at the last inspection. Seventeen of the twenty-one movements prescribed, were gone through with in a very creditable manner.

Still, the different companies show a great want of company drill. The great difficulty in this regiment, in the prompt and correct execution of movements, is the ignorance of their duties by the non-commissioned officers, many of whom are Germans, not sufficiently familiar with our language to execute quickly the orders when issued. Nothing would be more beneficial to this regiment than a thorough course of instruction for the non-commissioned officers.

Companies "R," Capt. Chas. Keihl, and "G," Capt. L. G. Bruer, are deserving of mention for the full ranks with which they appeared, these two commands showing nearly one-half of the entire number of men in the battalion companies.

I think, from the material of which this regiment is made up, that it would be much more successful as a rifle than an infantry regiment. A large majority of the regiment are favorable to such a change, which, if made, would be most beneficial. The flank rifle companies, now attached to the 13th and 14th regiments, could be at once transferred, which, with the 13th regiment changed into infantry, or light infantry, would leave each regiment in the brigade doing duty in its own particular arm. If this change is made, and I would strongly urge the necessity of it, this regiment would soon become the largest and as efficient as any in the brigade. The field officers are all men of experience, who have labored assiduously to bring up their regiment, and they are entitled to much credit for their exertions.

The arms of these three regiments are in a very bad condition; in fact

utterly unserviceable for military purposes. There has been none of the new pattern muskets issued to any of the regiments in this brigade, and I would recommend (and I must say I think we are entitled to) an immediate issue of at least two hundred and fifty to each regiment.

Seventieth regiment, artillery, Col. Samuel Graham, inspected October 19th, 1859.

This regiment made, as it always does, a very fine appearance, and executed the evolutions required them in a manner deserving of much praise. This regiment retains its position as one of the largest and most effective in this arm of the service, and for particulars I would beg leave to refer to my report of Nov. 6, 1858: Adjutant General's report, page 42.

This regiment needs a thorough and systematic course of instruction and drill, both by company and battalion; and, now that we have the large room in the arsenal for use, I presume it will be attended to.

Entire new harness is needed for the use of this regiment. There are but few sets fit to be used at all, and these far from perfect. Entire new harness should be procured that is more in accordance with the improvements in military equipments generally; that we now have is heavy and cumbrous. In my opinion omnibus harness would prove much the most serviceable, and not more than one-half as expensive as that now in use. It is actually necessary that new harness should be issued to company "B" at once, as that they now have is not in fit condition to be used again.

HEAD-QUARTERS SEVENTH BRIGADE, 2D DIVISION N. Y. S. M. YONKERS, December 30, 1859.

General FREDERICK TOWNSEND, Adjutant General:

SIR—I have the honor herewith to enclose inspection returns of the Seventh Brigade, 2d Division N. Y. S. M., composed of the 17th, 18th and 19th regiments. The 17th and 18th regiments were inspected at Yonkers, Westchester county, on the 18th October.

The day was unpropitious, the rain pouring down in torrents till noon-day. This, perhaps, may account in some measure for the small number present at inspection, as the companies composing these regiments are miles apart, and it is, even under the most favorable circumstances, expensive and difficult to get them together as regiments at a central location. From this cause these regiments are not improving in drill and appearance as could be wished. The practice of the manœuvres as prescribed for infantry regiments in General Orders, was attempted in the afternoon, but as a whole was a failure.

The 17th regiment showed either a great lack of zeal, or knowledge of the tactics. The 18th regiment were better instructed in what was required, but the small number of men in the regiment prevented a fair showing of their familiarity with the tactics. Attached to the 17th regiment is a company of cavalry, under command of Capt. Charles O. Blennis, which failed to be present at inspection, nor have I received any official report of the condition of this company. These regiments are reported as uniformed irregular. Although the color selected by each company happens to be blue, there is enough diversity in the pompons to give each regiment a motley appearance. The arms (muskets) belonging to the State are in as good condition as may be, but are really almost worthless.

The 19th regiment was inspected at Newburgh on the 26th of October. This regiment is especially worthy of commendation for their marked improvement during the last year. The practice of the manœuvres, as ordered in General Orders, was performed in the presence and to the satisfaction of the Division Inspector.

The several commands were evidently well drilled in company movements, and the promptness with which the various movements were executed showed that the regimental drill had not been neglected, nor without profit. It is to be noted that the whole order, from 1 to 21, inclusive of manœuvres for infantry regiments, as prescribed in General Orders, was performed.

To all in this regiment, from colonel to privates, praise is due for what has already been done in the improvement of the regiment in dress and appearance, and for that zeal which promises in a short time to make this a model regiment.

To Gen. FREDERICK TOWNSEND,

Adjutant General of the State of New York:

SIR—In compliance with the duties of my office, I have the honor to render the inspection returns of the Eighth Brigade, N. Y. S. M., Brigadier General Henry A. Samson, for 1859.

This brigade is composed of two regiments, viz: The 20th Light Infantry, in Ulster and Greene counties, and the 21st Artillery in Dutchess and Columbia.

During the season just past, the 20th regiment was exercised three days by battalion, and practiced all of the infantry course of 1858, and numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 12, 13, 20 and 21 of the course of 1859. The result is a most decided improvement in tactics marking both officers and men. Their drill, however, is most striking in company exercise, in consequence of their frequent company meetings and drills throughout the year. The uniform equipments of the whole of the 20th regiment, whilst it gives it a most admirable soldier-like appearance, no doubt exercises a strong influence in fostering a fraternal feeling in the several companies, and nurturing that particular esprit de corps which is so valuable an element in military organizations.

The 20th regiment was also reviewed by Gen. Samson and Staff, on the 22d of February last.

The 21st regiment was ordered into camp in September by the Brigadier General, for a four days tour of duty. The camp, styled "Camp Worth," was formed at Rhinebeck, Dutchess county, on the 27th of September last, and broke up on the 30th. The force afield was composed of companies A, C, D and E, of Col. Wright's command. On the 29th of September, the 20th regiment, Col. Pratt, crossed the Hudson to Camp Worth. The two regiments formed in brigade line, and were reviewed by His Excellency, the Commander-in-Chief; by Brigadier Gen. Allen, commanding the Third Division, and by Inspector General Sherman. ing the review, the inspection of the Brigade was made by the undersigned. As many of the courses above mentioned were gone through as time would permit, and the drill and evolutions showed a marked improvement over those of last year. The firing by platoons, companies and battalion, was most admirable in both regiments; and though some of the companies recently formed did not come up to the standard of the older ones, I was assured that by assiduous attention to their exercise during the coming winter, they would make good the whole line on another field day. The drill of the whole brigade in the manual exercise is most praiseworthy, and the harmony and hearty co-operation of officers and men is commendable and encouraging.

The cavalry (dragoon) company, L, of the 20th regiment, are in want of carbines, and a full equipment of pistols.

I will also repeat my recommendation of last year, that the carriages, &c., of the six pounders in the brigade, generally need repairs, and that it should be done at once.

Company C, of the 20th, is short four belts and plates, four cartridge boxes and plates, and four bayonet scabbards, reported by the captain to have been lost at Camp Clinton, in 1858.

Captain Flynn, of company F, 20th regiment, is desirous of receiving the balance of the muskets and equipments, for which he has given bonds, and which are needed to equip his command.

The belts of companies A, D and C, of the 21st regiment, are very poor, and should be replaced by new. Company E, of the same regiment, has the distinction of wearing white belts, whilst all the rest are black, sadly impairing the uniformity of the line.

My anticipations of the increase of both the regiments of the brigade during the current year, as expressed in my last report, have been partially realized. The 20th regiment has now the additional company looked for, making a total of ten; whilst the 21st has increased from five to seven, and two more companies are organizing. The persistent exertions of Cols. Pratt and Wright have met the response their patriotic endeavors deserve; and it is no disparagement to the most lauded officers in the State, to say that the commandants of the regiments of the 8th brigade are second to

none in their qualifications, and their earnest discharge of most onerous duties, and in some of them encountering singular discouragements.

It will, perhaps, be well to show the peculiarly scattered positions of most of the companies in the two regiments of this command, as well as to indicate the centre of the heaviest portion of its force. In the event that anything further is done by the State, in locating arsenals or armories in its bounds, it may aid in a proper discharge of the duty of selection of site, with a due regard to the advantage of the service.

The 20th regiment is distributed as follows, by companies:

Four companies, C, F, H and L, in the village of Rondout; one company, E, at Port Ewen, three-fourths of a mile south of Rondout; one company, B, in the village of Kingston, two and a half miles north of Rondout; one company, G, at Ellenville, thirty-two miles west of Rondout; and one company, D, at Shokan, seventeen miles northwest of Rondout—all in Ulster county.

One company, K, at Lexington; and one company, A, at Cairo—both in Greene county.

The precise location and relative position of the companies of the 21st regiment, comprising Dutchess and Columbia counties, I will state in a supplemental report as soon as full and accurate information can be obtained.

It gives me pleasure to report that the arms and other property of the State is cared for properly, and kept in the most serviceable condition. The artillery is well housed and protected.

Inspector General Sherman has closely examined the company armories of the brigade, and I understand has expressed his satisfaction with their condition and the care bestowed on the arms and equipments, which you will, doubtless, receive in detail in his annual report.

The numerical increase of the brigade for a twelvemonth—not including the companies of the 21st, in course of organization—is 66; its roll for 1858, summing up at 659, is now 735, its progress being unquestionably impaired by the general dissatisfaction at the late armory location.

I would do injustice to my own feelings, and those of every individual of this brigade, if I failed to bear testimony to the efficiency and activity of its general, Henry A. Samson. His earnest spirit and manly exertions have stimulated all under his command to constant endeavor and lofty aim in making the right arm of our national defence equal to its work in the hour of need; and his liberal spirit has encouraged a proper pride in the soldier's portion of an American citizen's duty, and laid the foundation of a potent force in the bounds of this brigade.

To the Adjutant General:

Sir,—In compliance with general regulations and in obedience to General Orders calling attention to the same, I hereby submit the following report of operations in this Brigade for the year ending Dec. 1, 1859.

The 25th and 76th regiments have made the usual parades during the past year. In addition thereto, the Brigade General, in General Orders No. 22, issued under date of September 9th, ordered, that the 19th and 20th inst., be spent in theoretic instructions, the 21st and 22d days for officer drills. On the 26th inst., the two regiments had a day for field drill, and on the 17th of October, annual inspection, review and improvement. I am sorry to say that 'on each of the above days, the numbers present were small, very small, when compared with the members on the rolls of the different companies. The fact is that several of the companies should be disbanded at once in order that their places may be filled by those that would be an honor to the service.

The 25th regiment numbers eight companies, viz., R, L, A, B, C, D, E, F. R company, cavalry, Capt. G. Swarzman, appeared in a new uniform, "regulation;" never looked better. Returns showed 21 present, 13 absent. I inspected 20 in all. This troop of horse is made up principally of Germans.

L company, artillery, Capt. P. H. Griffin; uniform, regulation, except the bearskin caps, which the regiment have adopted. Returns showed 40 present, 39 absent—inspected 27.

I have since learned that the gun squad was from this company on that day, and that after the firing of the salutes for the review, were excused from further duty for the day.

A company, Capt. J. Fredendall, artillery; uniforms irregular; inspected 22. The returns showed 22 present, 26 absent. B company, Capt. N. Hussey, artillery; uniform, regulation—inspected 21. Returns showed 21 present, 24 absent; this company are in want of belts.

E company, artillery, Capt. J. Crough; uniforms regular. Returns showed 15 present, 33 absent; inspected 17.

D company, artillery, Capt. F. Marshall; uniforms regular. Returns showed 35 present, 24 absent; inspected 34.

E company, artillery, Capt. J. R. Glen; uniform irregular. Returns showed 27 present, 23 absent; inspected 18, including the color and color guard. This company should be disbanded.

F company, artillery, Capt. Roger McGraw; uniforms regular. Returns showed 16 present, 20 absent; I inspected 11 at the general parade. This company was commanded by one of the sergeants, not one of the commissioned officers being present to take command.

The 76th regiment has seven companies, B, G and H being vacant, viz: R company, Capt. J. W. Ainsworth, light artillery; uniforms regular. Returns showed 29 present, 33 absent; I inspected 28.

L company, Capt. John Zimmerman, rifles; uniforms, regulation. Returns showed 32 present, 23 absent; inspected 32.

A company, Lieut. P. Devine, did not parade; was served with a notice. C company, Capt. J. W. Felthousen; uniforms irregular. Returns showed 2 present, 22 absent; inspected 2, the Captain and first Lieut. This company should be disbanded.

D company, Capt. J. R. Van Slyke, artillery, uniforms regular. Returns showed 3 present, 45 absent; inspected 3, Captain, Lieutenant and sergeant. This company should be disbanded.

E company, Capt. Gugerty, artillery; uniform regular except plumes. Returns showed 32 present, 17 absent; inspected 32, including color guards. The arms of this company are not fit for use.

F company, Capt. J. E. Gervaise, artillery; uniforms, regulation, except pants, which are red, French style. The Captain informed me that their intention was to procure blue pants for regimental parades; this was their first parade in uniform. Returns showed 32 present, 10 absent; inspected 32. The belts of this company are private property, the State not having furnished any. The officers and men of this company are of French extraction and deserve great credit for the manner in which they have improved since their organization, which was but one year since. The general parade for the 29th regiment, was ordered for the 31st day of Oct. In consequence of their parading by company in different parts of Saratoga county, I was unable to attend to inspect them, Col. C. G. Peek agreeing to do it himself and send me returns. I have not received any returns as yet.

The 17th day of October being the day for inspection, review and improvement, I will state in as few words as possible, what transpired on that day. The regiments being in line, were reviewed by the Brig. Gen. Edward Frisby, at 12 o'clock, M. At  $12\frac{1}{2}$ , acting Major General Darius Allen, was to review, but not appearing at the appointed time, the commandants detailed company R, of the 25th regiment, under command of Capt. Swarzman, as an escort to His Excellency, the Governor, commander-in-chief, who was to review at 1 P. M., at the termination of which Gen. Allen rode on the field and had a review of the troops. The reviews were creditably performed, when the commands were dismissed for half an hour for refreshments, after which the line was again formed. Gen. Frisby manœuvered the troops in the evolutions as laid down in General Orders for 1859, down to No. 13.

I must confess that I was disappointed in the performance by both regiments, but more particularly by the 25th. It seemed as though they had not a distinct knowledge of what they were doing. I tried to see if I could discover any one company that was better than the other, but could not do so. I am now speaking of the 25th. In the 76th regiment there were some of the evolutions performed very well, but not what I had reason to expect, knowing what practice they had had. Next came the inspection, at a very late hour. While the Major General and Staff were

on the ground I noticed a great many deviations from the regulations, both in uniforms and horse equipments. The Major General himself wore on the top edge of his cap a gold band, about one inch wide; in fact there was not an officer in his staff that was regular in his uniform and equipments.

The Brigadier General and Staff were inspected and found correct. The 25th regimental field officers were inspected and found regular, The Staff officers all wore red pompoons, and the old ornaments on the caps. The line officers all failed to wear the designations of rank on the epaulettes. C company had two dirty muskets. Companies A, D, E and F had each one dirty musket.

The 76th regiment came next for inspection. The Colonel and Lt. Colonel declined to be inspected by me, as I was their junior in rank, The same discrepancy among the line officers in reference to badges of distinction on the epaulettes. R company had two dirty muskets. E company's muskets are unfit for use, and unsafe to use.

There is a great lack of regulations among the staff officers in both regiments, in regard to saddle cloths. Some wore full housings and trimmings of yellow, which belong to staff officers, of general officers.

Since writing the above, I have received from Col. Peek, of the 29th regiment, inspection returns, held on Nov. 3d, six companies.

R company, Benjamin L. Weed, Lieut. commanding, was notified to appear, but failed to do so, he and his company.

L company, J. V. W. Vandenburgh, infantry, report 13 present, 19 absent.

B company, Capt. George L. Ames, infantry, 18 present, 22 absent.

D company, Capt. Benjamin Viele was notified, but failed to appear, he or his command.

E company, Capt. Theodore Partello, was duly notified, appeared in person, but no command.

F company, Capt. Charles E. Jones, infantry, report 37 present, 3 absent.

Making in all 69 present, 112 absent. I should judge from these returns that military was at a very low ebb in old Saratoga; still I have no doubt that if a Burgoyne should attempt to pass by without the proper passport, the spirits of their patriotic dead would rouse from the battle-field, and make the hills and valleys ring with the clarion note of war, and "to arms," "to arms," would be the cry of their lethargic sons.

In obedience to the requirements of the regulations for the military forces of the State of New York, (§ 670) I hereby make the following return:

The 27th regiment, in the 12th brigade and 5th division, commanded by Col. James Oliver, paraded at Delhi, Delaware county, on the 28th and 29th days of September, 1859, for review and inspection. The regiment was reviewed by the Brigadier General on the 29th September, and was inspected on the same day. The general and staff were in attendance during the entire parade, armed and equipped in conformity to regulation.

The 48d regiment, same brigade and division, commanded by Col. John B. Wheeler, paraded at Oxford, Chenango county, on the 5th and 6th days of October, 1859, and was reviewed by the Major General and staff in attendance on the 6th October. The inspection took place the same day. The Brigadier General was not present at this parade; the staff of the 12th brigade were in attendance, armed and equipped, &c.

Gen. FREDERICK TOWNSEND, Albany, N. Y.:

General—I have the honor to forward herewith inspection return of 14th brigade, and would beg leave to say in relation to it. that the arms of the 31st regiment, except — muskets of company F, of Glens Falls, are, almost without exception, unfit for service; but as they were in, probably, as good order as when received by the regiment, I return them as in order; so, also, the arms of 32d regiment, except — rifles. The muskets are all in poor order, many of them utterly uscless; and in the limited time allowed for the inspection, it was impossible to test them, to ascertain precisely the number actually fit for service, so I return them as in order. Hence the return shows, in reality, the number of arms belonging to the brigade, and not the actual condition of them, as this could only be arrived at by a separate test or trial, which it was impossible to obtain.

The 31st regiment executed all the manœuvres prescribed in the course of instruction for 1858 and '59, and nearly all with great precision and skill, showing a good discipline and proficiency, especially as only one day was consumed in practice by the regiment previous to the review. Company F distinguished itself particularly, both in its marchings and manual of arms, and showed itself a well drilled and proficient company. The remaining companies of the regiment having had by far less practice in the drill room and on company parade, went through the review with credit to themselves and their officers, under the circumstances.

Of the 32d regiment little can be said. The colonel commanding was, of necessity, absent from the review, and the lieutenant colonel did not execute the course of either 1858 or '59, hence I cannot report. There

was one company on the field I do not mention in my return, as they were neither uniformed or equipped, and were entirely ignorant of all their duties, being only a company in name. So far as in my power (with these explanations) the return is accurate; and if there is any impropriety in this letter, I sincerely ask pardon for my ignorance, as it is not an intentional impropriety. Hoping the return will be accepted by you as satisfactory,

To the Adjutant General of the State of New York:

The inspector of the 19th brigade, with the enclosed return, has the honor to report that the regiments forming this brigade (41st and 42d) assembled at Norwich, Chenango county, on the 5th, 6th and 7th days of October, for military drill, review and inspection.

The parade was attended by Maj. Gen. Sam'l S. Burnside and staff, and Brig. Gen. Thos. F. Petrie and staff, both in turn acting as instructors. The weather was very fine, and I believe all the exercises and manœuvres prescribed in general orders No. 3, of Jan., 1859, were executed, and, too, in such a manner as to entitle the colonels of both regiments to particular commendation, as well as most of the commandants of companies.

I inspected seven companies on the morning of the 7th, two companies being absent from the 42d regiment, viz: company B, Ira H. Fleming, commandant, and company C, Capt. Seneca Lake, commandant.

Among the best drilled companies, those claiming particular mention, are Capt. Wm. E. Lansing's, Capt. James B. Coe's and Capt. Perfy Wolcott's. Some two or three new companies, I understand, are about being organized, and in part from other companies breaking up, time expiring, &c.; and if sufficient encouragement be given by the State, in the way of furnishing arms, in place of many now unserviceable, (for particulars of which I refer you to returns of commandants of companies to Commissary General's department) I can see no reason why the brigade will not soon be in a prosperous condition.

That portion of the general regulations, requiring the adoption of cap and pompon, has not been fully complied with. The 42d regiment, field and staff, are wearing chapeau and plume; and, as I learn from the officers, per order of Commander-in-Chief,\* while 41st regiment wear regulation cap and plume. It would seem desirable that the field and staff officers of this brigade should assimilate nearer in dress.

It is, perhaps, my duty to say that what is termed Prince Albert cap, is decidedly out of favor with the officers of this brigade, their choice being

the chapeau and plume. They claim that the chapeau and plume makes a more marked distinction between officers and privates than any other article of dress, and for this reason would prefer to retain it. If proper, I would suggest that this brigade have an order from the Commander-in-Chief, allowing the adoption of chapeau and plume. Whether the importance of having the State troops in conformity with the United States army, outweighs the importance of giving satisfaction to our officers, is for the Commander-in-Chief to determine.

The wearing the chapeau and plume, however, or anything else not in strict conformity to regulations, must be regarded as insubordination; and I trust the officers of this brigade will have patriotism enough to submit to any sacrifice the service may seem to demand.

To Gen'l Frederick Townsend, Adjutant General N. Y. S. M.:

SIR—Herewith please find inspection returns for 60th regiment and 20th Brigade.

The officers and non-commissioned officers of the Brigade and Brigade Staff, met at Hornellsville, on the 20th inst., and during the 20th and 21st were instructed in the school of the soldier, the school of the company, and the school of the battalion, by Lt. Col. H. P. Martin, of New York city, who is thoroughly qualified to give such instruction. Brigadier Gen. R. B. Van Valkenburgh, and Col. L. C. Whiting being present, and observing the drill and manœuvres. The commandants of companies, and the field and staff of the regiment and brigade had likewise met at Elmira on the 21st and 22d of February last, and were there instructed by the same officers.

At this month's drill the officers and non-commissioned officers exhibited an earnest desire to learn, and evidently profited much by the teachings of their accomplished instructor. On the 22d the 60th regiment was mustered for exercise, inspection and review, and five companies, together numbering, with the field and regimental Staff, 254 men, appeared upon the ground. The different companies went through their company drill in a manner highly creditable to both officers and men. If I were obliged to mention any company as excelling, where all showed a reasonable proficiency, I should be compelled to name company L, rifles, Capt. H. C. Hoffman; but as I am a member of that company, modesty forbids that I should award the praise. I therefore leave it for another year to decide, hoping I shall then be compelled to say that where all are best none can excel.

The regiment in my presence, and under the immediate command of Lt. Col. Martin, and observed by Gen'l Van Valkenburgh and Col. Whiting,

executed all the manœuvres prescribed in General Orders No. 3, for 1859, down to No. 17, and had time permitted, would, I doubt not, have gone entirely through with every requirement of the order. These manœuvres were well executed, and great praise is due to every officer for the untiring activity and energy displayed in conducting their men.

After these manœuvres the regiment was reviewed by Brig. Gen'l Van Valkenburgh and Staff, and also by myself as Brigade Inspector; after which, assisted by Maj. Church, of the 30th Brigade, who kindly volunteered his services, I inspected the arms and accoutrements of the regiment, excepting the Colonel, Lt. Colonel, and Major. The Major, (W. W. Hayt,) contended that ranking me, they were not required to present themselves or their equipments for inspection, but that if I reported upon them at all, it must be from such observation as I could make of them as they passed about the field; not feeling inclined to run them down (and perhaps fearing they had the heels of me) I do not report upon their arms or equipments, believing that if it is my duty to inspect them, it is theirs to afford an opportunity for inspection. I am sometimes inclined to think that the board of officers who prepared our admirable General Regulations, in their laudable anxiety to curb an unwarrantable assumption of power on the part of inspecting officers, almost lost sight of the proper rights to which those officers are entitled in order to properly discharge their duties.

The uniforms and equipments inspected were generally quite near regulation; so near that I have reported all as proper, this being my first inspection. The guns I cannot return as fit for service. In fact, they are a set of miserable, patched up old culls, and I fear would prove, in an actual fight, almost as dangerous to those holding them as to a foe. It is true some would answer for service, but my time for inspection was so limited, and the serviceable pieces so few, that I had not time to hunt them out, and so let them all go together, and report them, although I cannot return them as fit for service. May the time soon come when our government will furnish the militia with arms fit to rely on in case of need.

Hoping you will remember the 20th Brigade when you have on hand good muskets for distribution, I have the honor most respectfully to submit the foregoing, and to be,

Adj. Gen. FREDERICK TOWNSEND:

Sir,—Enclosed please find the returns of the 21st Brigade as taken at

the annual inspection for 1859.

The annual review and inspection of the 21st Brigade, was held pursuant to General Orders, on the 12th, 13th, and 14th of Sept. 1859. The 45th regiment, N. Y. S. M., was held on the 12th of September, in the city of Utica. The command devolved upon Lieut. Col. Johnson, in the absence

of Col. Palmer. The regiment passed a fine dress parade and review, but no part of the annual instructions for the year was touched, and from the total indifference of the field officers towards carrying out the orders for the said instructions for the last two years, deserves the highest censure from head quarters, although I have no doubt this remark will be all that will be said. But enough has already been said relating to the competency and willful negligence of the field officers of this regiment.

Had the consolidation so anxiously worked for and so unanimously petitioned for by the entire line officers been granted, I should have been enabled to have presented a much more favorable report. I still trust that that consolidation will soon be ordered.

Of the several companies on the ground I would return company R, Capt. F. X. Myers, of artillery, doing duty as infantry, as the best uniformed and drilled company in the regiment. The turn out was large, and they showed that attention was paid by the officers to the rule of tactics, and they can safely be depended upon as answering to all calls for services with alacrity and dispatch.

Company D, Capt. Anthony Brendle, was particularly noted for the smallness of his command and entire ignorance of tactics. This company should be consolidated into company L, Capt. F. Harrer, or else disbanded. They have been in existence long enough and know nothing yet, and it is folly to strive to keep them in existence longer.

The completing of the proposed armory for this regiment and the act of consolidation, or an entire change of field and staff, would place it on a rooting fully equal to any in the State. But I frankly say, that so long as it is left as it now is, nothing may be expected of it, except under its separate company commands.

Owing to the sickness of Gen. R. U. Sherman, Col. J. L. Addington was ordered to act as reviewing officer. Therefore the review was held before him.

The 46th regiment was reviewed and inspected at Rome, on the 13th of September. This regiment, although new, this being its second parade, presents a fine appearance, and the several commands show considerable attention to drilling and a good knowledge of tactics. Owing to an accident to Col. R. G. Savery in the forenoon, by being thrown from his horse, he was compelled to leave the ground, when the inspector took the command and gave an instruction review, and also executed almost all of the orders and evolutions for the annual instruction; but owing to their never having been any instructions in these manœuvres, they could not be perfectly done. But the ease with which they took hold showed that but little instruction would bring out and develop a splendid regiment.

In the absence of Gen. Sherman and Col. Addington, the Col. again appeared in the afternoon, and the review and inspection was held by the Brigade Major.

The arms in the hands of company R, Capt. D. Smith, are entirely unfit for service and should be recalled. Also those of company C, Capt. L.

Roth, are unfit for any company to have, and I would advise the recall of these also, and that something better be sent to them.

The best company of the regiment as parading that day, was company A, Capt. C. H. Skillin, of infantry. They are splendidly equipped and uniformed, and give the most perfect exhibition of drill of any company in the Brigade. There was no company particularly deficient in drilling, although plenty of room for improvement exists.

It is to be lamented that the field officers were so deficient in a knowledge of tactics, and this of course deters a regiment from becoming perfect. There should be a school for instructions in every Brigade, at which the officers should be required to attend; and although the law provides for such, none have ever been held here or in this division. A steady gain of numbers and improvement, may be looked for in this regiment.

The 53d regiment, Col. J. L. Addington, was held on the 14th of September, at New Hartford. This is composed of but one company of artillery, company R, Capt. Byron S. Catlin, and a poorly drilled company at that. In the absence of Gen. Sherman, and it being Col. Addington's command, the review and inspection was before the Brigade Major.

This regiment is the one proposed to be consolidated into the 45th, and it should by all means be done. This would make one fine regiment, and Col. Addington, the best and most accomplished of all the Colonels in the Brigade, would develop and produce a fine healthy regiment.

My returns have been delayed from the fact that the companies delay in making their returns, and often have to be returned to be corrected.

Gen. F. TOWNSEND, Adjutant General, &c.:

Sir,—I have the honor, in obedience to General Orders, to render my returns for the 25th Brigade, N. Y. S. M., commanded by Brigadier General Lansing B. Swan.

The armory of the 54th regiment was destroyed by fire in Aug., 1858, and the various companies comprising it were obliged to find accommodation for the State and their own property in disconnected quarters which were unprovided with rooms fitted for drilling purposes even for the accommodation of one company, consequently the entire winters of 1858 and '59, were lost, so far as practice, either by battalion or company was concerned.

This regiment made no parades during the season but those of ceremony. It went into camp at Lyons, August 22d, and remained until the morning of the 26th. I was present upon the 25th during the whole day, having been able to fulfill the duty prescribed by the regulations and the law.

Upon the morning of the 25th, I witnessed the movement of the regiment and saw them execute manœuvres Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 15 and 16, in the prescribed course. The movements were executed generally well, but I observed in nearly all a want of observance of details and

minutiæ, which by the casual observer would be overlooked, but by a military critic, would be evidence of neglect or want of close and thorough instructions.

The guard mounting was executed very poorly. There was a want of promptness in marching the details upon the ground, and but one detachment, (company A, Capt. Welling,) came on to the parade in due form. The whole turning off was accompanied with a succession of mistakes which abundantly proved, not that the men did not know their duty, but that the battalion officers neglect the best means of instruction, "their books," and depend, when called to specific duty, upon such information as they can gather verbally, while walking from their quarters to the parade ground.

Brigadier General Swan reviewed the regiment upon the afternoon of the 25th. Upon the afternoon of the 29th of September, the regiment was paraded for general review and inspection.

The review, from beginning to end, was admirable, and was admitted by the General, to have been the best he had had from this regiment. The regiment appeared in regulation uniform nearly complete, delay having been experienced in procuring cap, ornaments, &c.

The field and staff appeared in full regulation uniform.

It is unnecessary to particularize the movements of the several companies, saving to say that company A, Capt. Welling, redeemed the promise made at the inspection in 1858 when it made its first appearance.

A regimental officer drill was held by Gen. Swan upon the evenings of the 27th and 28th.

The 59th regiment was inspected by companies—Co. "A," Geneseo. This company was organized as an artillery company and furnished with a field piece, and were uniformed in accordance with regulations for that arm. They have adopted the brigade uniform and desire in future to do duty as infantry. The corps made a respectable appearance, executed infantry movements quite well, and manifested signs of being able during the coming year, to fill up their ranks and become a serviceable company in the regiment.

Companies "L" and "D," Dansville. Of company L, Capt. Grant, it is simply necessary to say that it abundantly sustained its hitherto well deserved reputation.

Company "D," Capt. Page, appeared in the uniform known as the continental, and neither in the appearance of the men or drill, exhibited any advance over the last year. The continuation of the company can hardly be considered as for the good of the service.

Company "B," Capt. Clark, Naples. This company executed some light infantry movements well. A family affliction interesting many members of the corps, prevented a full turn out for inspection. The company ranks are full.

Company "C," Capt. Comstock, Geneva. This company made no pa-

rade, has neglected drill during the last year, and has been reported to the Brigadier General for disbandment.

I would beg leave to suggest the necessity of supplying Company "A," of the 54th regiment, with muskets of the cadet pattern, that their arms may compare with those carried by the remaining companies of the regiment. The arms they now carry, though kept clean and in good order, are entirely unfit for service.

The 59th regiment, as soon as it has procured a new uniform and completed its organization by choosing its Colonel, will also require new arms. Major Bean, of the 59th, was with me at Dansville, and Lieut. Colonel Conley and Major Bean, at Naples and Geneva.

Sir,—I have the honor to enclose inspection returns of 66th regiment 29th Brigade. The regiment turned out very slim, owing, as the Colonel informed me, to the fact of there being no funds in the treasury to pay the men. The regiment were not drilled in the manœuvres ordered in General Orders No. 3, but made a very good appearance in passing in review, both in marching and carrying their arms, and if encouraged with good arms, musical instruments, and an assurance of their pay when earned, would, I have no doubt, become a credit to themselves and the State.

The village of Tonawanda lies partly in Niagara county, 29th Brigade, and partly in Erie, 31st Brigade. If that portion of the village lying in Erie county could be attached to the 66th regimental district, there could be a company of from 30 to 40 members added to the regiment, as there is that number in the village anxious to form a company, but not enough in either district for the purpose. The 62d regiment have not paraded this season.

HEAD-QUARTERS 30TH BRIGADE, N. Y. S. M. BELVIDERE, November 28, 1859.

General Frederick Townsend, Adjt. Gen. N. Y. S. M., Albany, N. Y. Sir,—Herewith I transmit to you annual inspection returns of the 64th regiment comprising the 30th Brigade. This regiment was ordered in camp for instruction for six days, from August 22d to 27th, inclusive, at Camp Jackson, near Angelica, at which time and place Brigadier General Chamberlain and staff, Col. Parker, with field and staff, and seven battalion companies and one flank company, were present.

Company K, artillery, Capt. S. W. Johnson, from Ellicottville, appeared with two brass field pieces, six pounders, in excellent drill and dis-

cipline performing the various manœuvres belonging to this arm of service, in a prompt and creditable manner.

Company C, infantry, from Waverley, gave evidence of superior drill,

but their pantaloons were all out of regulation.

Company B, infantry, from Randolph, looked well and performed generally accurate.

Company D, infantry, from Burns, deserve credit for efficiency in drill, but their uniform is very much out of regulation, so much so that they mar the general harmony of uniforms when drawn up in regimental line. This is the second time I have reported this command concerning its uniform.

Company F, infantry, from Scio, came in full numbers and gave evidence

of good discipline and drill.

Company G, infantry, from Wellsville, performed exceedingly well.

Company H, infantry, from Angelica, the youngest company of the regiment, gave evidence of having been under the command of an efficient drill officer.

Company E, infantry, from Olean, was exceedingly well drilled.

Company H. infantry, from Gowanda, made no appearance.

Company I, rifle, from Cuba, have never reported to the regiment, and I recommend it be disbanded.

This regiment is comparatively new, and as its several companies are scattered over a district of two counties, it is difficult to order a parade oftener than once a year.

The exercises and discipline and good order maintained while in camp at Camp Jackson, reflect credit upon the commandant of the regiment. The prescribed manœuvres for the current year were all performed in my presence, and with tolerable precision.

The Brigadier General and staff were present and reviewed the regiment on four days of the encampment, and were all present at my inspection on the 24th of August. On the 25th and 26th of August, Inspector General, George F. Sherman, was present at review, and witnessed the duties and discipline in camp, and likewise the marching and evolutions in field, at which time he directed the commandant to communicate in orders, his unqualified approval to the officers and privates of his regiment.

Dear Sir—In compliance with the State Regulations, I respectfully submit the following report:

Pursuant to General Order No. 21, of the Major General of the 5th Division, a Division court-martial, consisting of Col. J. N. Northrup, as president; Col. Denton Salisbury and Lieut. Col. Wm. Burch, as members; and Col. Wm. H. Chase, as Judge-Advocate, all of the 5th Division staff, convened at the village of Bainbridge, Chenango county, on the 30th day of November, 1858, remaining in session four days, for the trial of Lieut. Col. Seymour L. Judd, of the 43d regiment, on the following charges, preferred by Col. John B. Wheeler, commandant of said regiment:

- 1. Disobedience of orders.
- 2. Neglect of duty.
- 3. Unofficer-like conduct.

The court found the charges fully sustained, and imposed upon the said Lieut. Col. Judd, a fine of twenty-five dollars, and that he be publicly reprimanded by the Major General.

The finding of the court was approved by the Major General.

Pursuant to General Order No. 22, of the Major General of said 5th Division, a Division court-martial, consisting of Col. John D. Shaul, commandant of 39th regiment, as president; Lieut. Col. Wm. Burch, and Maj. James Steward, of 5th Division staff, as members; and Col. Wm. H. Chase, Division Judge-Advocate, convened at the village of Cherry Valley, Otsego county, on the 27th day of December, 1858, for the trial of Lieut. Col. James E. Dewey, of said 39th regiment, on a charge of disobedience of orders; which charge the court found not sustained.

The finding of the court was approved by the Major General.

Pursuant to General Order, No. 23, of Major General of said 5th Division, a Division court-martial, consisting of Col. J. N. Northrup, of 5th Division staff, as president, Major Ira E. Sherman, of said staff, and Major Myron J. Hubbard, of 39th regiment, as members, and Col. W. H. Chase, Division Judge-Advocate, convened at the village of Morrisville, Madison county, on the 23d day of February, 1859, for the trial of Major Samuel P. Russell, Brigade Inspector of the 19th Brigade, on the following charges, viz.:

1st. Disobedience of orders.

2d. Neglect of duty.

And for the trial of Major David J. Mitchell, Brigade Judge Advocate of said 19th Brigade, on a charge of disobedience of orders.

The court found the charges sustained against Majors Russell and Mitchell, and imposed upon Major Russell a fine of \$50, and upon Major Mitchell a fine of \$25.

The finding of the court in the case of Major Russell was approved by the Major General, that in the case of Major Mitchell was disapproved.

Pursuant to General Order, No. 1, for the year 1859, of the said Major General, a Division court-martial, consisting of Colonel J. N. Northrup, as president; Lieutenant-Colonel Wm. Burch and Major Ira E. Sherman, as members; and Colonel Wm. H. Chase Division Judge-Advocate, all of said 5th Division staff, convened at the village of Cherry Valley, Otsego county, on the 2d day of March, 1859, for the trial of such delinquents as might be brought before it.

Major Anson H. Holmes, Brigade Inspector of the 17th Brigade, was tried by said court on the following charges, viz.:

1st. Disobedience of orders.

2d. Neglect of duty.

The court found charge first not sustained, and charge second fully sustained, and determined that the said Major Holmes should be publicly reprimanded by Major General Burnside.

Lieutenant-Colonel James A. Suiter, of said 17th Brigade, was arraigned before said court on a charge of disobedience of orders, which the court found not sustained.

The findings of the court, in both cases, were approved by the Major General.

In obedience to a special order of the Major General, detailing the Division Judge-Advocate to do brigade duty in the 19th Brigade, the office of Brigade Judge-Advocate of said brigade being vacant, I officiated as Judge-Advocate at a Brigade court-martial of said 19th Brigade, consisting of Major Israel Hubbell, Lieutenant Alfred L. White and Captain Avery T. Gates of said brigade, which convened at the village of Columbus, Chenango county, on the 31st day of May, 1859, for the trial of Captain Bushington Button, Lieutenant Oliver B. York and Lieutenant Morris C. Mead, all of the 41st regiment, on charges of disobedience of orders.

The court found the charge against Captain Bushington sustained, and imposed upon him a fine of \$40, and that he be cashiered.

The court also found the charge against Lieutenant Morris C. Mead sustained, and he was discharged and fined in the sum of twenty dollars.

The charge against Lieutenant Oliver B. York was found sustained, and he was ordered privately reprimanded by Colonel Card, the commandant of said regiment.

The findings of the court were sustained by Brigadier General Bentley.

- 1. Embezzlement.

The court found the accused guilty on both charges, and sentenced him to pay a fine of \$200.

## REPORT OF SURGEON GENERAL.

To his Excellency E. D. Morgan,

Commander-in-Chief of the Military Forces

of the State of New York:

Sir-In accordance with the provisions of section 845 of the General Regulations, I hereby beg leave to report:

That although not called upon during the past year to perform any other than pacific duties, I have had some opportunity of studying the present organization of the medical department of the militia, and of observing As it is at present constituted, there is no adequate guard against the introduction of ignorant men into the corps, or any satisfactory system for the discipline of those already in. Although the Surgeon General is the nominal head of the department, I am at a loss to know the extent of his power or responsibility. The allusions to his functions contained in the General Regulations, are vague and meagre. I desire, with respectful earnestness, to call your attention to some of the more radical defects in the department, taking it for granted that it is the wish of the people of the State, as I know it to be yours, to place it in the condition for any service, to which the military forces may be called. It is a popular error to regard the militia as a non-combatant force, and mainly addicted to dress parades, and, therefore, never exposed to danger. The facts, however, present another phase. In the performance of the duties of drill and the parade, accidents from the use of firearms may occur. Mounted officers or men may be injured by any of those occurrences that are incident to the management of restive horses upon smooth or irregular ground. such accidents not only may, but do happen, would justify the State in permitting none but well qualified medical men to hold medical office.

But further, the records of the Adjutant General's office, and the suggestions of your own experience, will demonstrate that the military forces do perform belligerent service, and therefore the medical department should be in working order. During the recent Staten Island campaign, had it not been for the proximity of the scene of action to a large city, and the voluntary performance of medical duty by brigade and regimental surgeons, not officially called into service, very serious consequences would have ensued. The forces, exposed by contiguity to yellow fever, were in expectation of assault, and by no means exempt from the diseases incident to camp life. Under such circumstances, when specific rules were looked for to guide the

surgeons in the discharge of duty, and to enable them to obtain supplies, none could be found; and the State depended for surgical appliances, including splints and instruments, upon the private resources of its medical officers. Nor was this all. I have it from good authority, that at least one regiment was allowed to put itself in a position to inflict, or suffer any of the consequences of the use of munitions of war, with a surgeon whose resemblance to a genuine professional man did not extend below the depth of his uniform, and whose absolute want of the most rudimentary medical qualifications, was not ascertained until several men were sick, one had dislocated his shoulder, and another received a severe injury of the face.

Moreover, the want of system in obtaining supplies was then demonstrated, by the fact that the only medicine chest obtained for use did not find its way into any inventory of State property. As we have then no adequate guard against the introduction of ignorant men into the service, or any proper discipline for those in, I respectfully urge upon your Excellency the necessities of the case.

- 1. If an order were issued to the effect that no medical position in the military forces should be occupied by any other than an alumnus of a medical college of acknowledged standing, and that certificates of qualification must accompany nominations for such posts, the department would soon be looked up to as one in which a doctor might acquire honor, and reflect it upon the State.
- 2. Power should be given to the Surgeon General, or in his absence, to the surgeon of Division, to transfer for temporary service, a surgeon, or surgeon's mate, from one command to another.
- 3. Blank forms for obtaining supplies, with the method for drawing the same, should be given in that portion of the Regulations which refers to the medical department.

The above occur to me as some of the features in the organization, requiring modification or renewal.

I take this occasion to affirm that there are many brigade, division and regimental officers now in the service of the State, who would do honor to any army, and who are fully alive to the necessity for the reform of present abuses.

I would say, in closing, that I have corresponded with nearly all the Colonels throughout the State, and ascertained that there are many vacancies to be filled, particularly in the subordinate medical positions.
