



GENERAL HEAD-QUARTERS, STATE OF NEW YORK, ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, ALBANY, Dec. 31, 1860. SHIS Excellency E. D. Morgan,

Sir—Pursuant to the provisions of the law of Congress "establishing an uniform militia throughout the United States," I have the honor to submit the following

REPORT:

By the annual report, from this department, for the year 1859, submitted in January of the year 1860, the organized portion of the militia comprised

There have been organized during the present year, twentyfive companies, as follows:

3 of the rifle arm, and

8 of the artillery arm,

as will more fully appear from the statement annexed, marked "E."

For a knowledge of the arms and accountrements in the hands of the troops, and such as are in the arsenals of the State, reference is made to the schedule annexed, marked "A."

The tables marked "B and C" show the amount of commutation collected throughout the State, and the mode and extent of its disbursement by the military auditing boards.

The quota of arms due the State from the general government for the year 1860, amounted, in the valuation of muskets, to

For three successive years I have earnestly urged upon the attention of the Legislature the importance of the development of a reliable militia within the State, and comparatively with but little effect; whatever of assistance has been derived from the State, has been wrung from it like agony, and when yielded, it has come almost with derision. Last year there was a serious effort made to repeal the commutation system, without substituting anything in its stead, and it would have met with success but for the efforts of the committee "on militia and public defence," of the Assembly. While I believe that a tax upon property which should realize at least \$1,500 per regiment would prove more desirable for the service than the present commutation system, I claim that the latter is better than nothing, and hope to see it retained until some other more available resource can be secured.

Last year also the appropriation of \$15,000, to be disbursed as usual by the Commissary General's Department, in the protection and repair of arsenals, the transportation and the repair of arms, accourrements and camp equipage, and in the purchase of ammunition, was reduced to the pittance of \$10,000, and the usual sum for the purchase of tactics, and for court-martial expenses was absolutely denied, while the appropriation for the printing of militia blanks, expressage, postage, stationery, &c., of the Adjutant General's Department was reduced \$500. Certainly, n view of the present questionable status of the Union, parsimony

like this appears to have been singularly mal-opportune. But notwithstanding these discouragements, the militia still exists, and thanks to its military zeal and patriotism continues to hold a high position both at home and abroad.

The present, however, is not the moment for complaint when it is probable that, with the development of our national crisis the State will be called upon to furnish troops to assist in the enforcement of federal laws, but on the contrary it is the time to urge that the State be immediately placed in condition to meet any and every contingency with the promptitude due to the patriotism and bravery of her people.

Towards the accomplishment of this purpose, I beg to present the following suggestions:

The present organization contemplates ten companies per regiment, four regiments per brigade, and four brigades per division, but in fact many of the divisions comprise not more than three brigades, and many of the brigades not more than three regiments, and the regiments for the most part are composed of less than eight companies; I would suggest the immediate completion of the organization by the creation of the requisite brigades and regiments, and in the following manner: Let the incomplete division districts be sub-divided and new brigade and regimental districts erected; to these brigade districts let there be appointed suitable persons as Brigade Generals, and then let your Excellency issue a proclamation calling upon the citizens of the new districts to volunteer for the organization of the requisite regiments therein, and upon citizens generally to join the regiments already in commission in order that they may be filled up to the war complement.

In this manner it is believed that the requisite material can be obtained without a resort to the unpopular method of drafting. Should, however, this belief prove fallacious, recourse might then be had to that alternative.

I do not deem it to be essential that these new regiments be immediately armed, but they certainly should be at once enrolled

and organized as troops of the third class, and in that condition await the issue of events. With regard to the present regiments however, which are to be considered troops of the second class, no time should be lost in furnishing them with effective weapons. Were the militia organization thus completed, it would comprise 8 divisions, 32 brigades, 128 regiments, and 128,000 of the rank and file. But inasmuch as a militia force is strictly a defensive one, and intended to operate not far from the habitations and business of the persons composing it, I would suggest that, in order to meet the call for troops, an amendment be made to the militia law, authorizing the organization of another division out of volunteers from the State at large, who shall agree to serve for at least two years, and be in readiness at all times to respond to the call of competent authority for service either within or without the State.

This mobile division, considered as the troops of the first class, should comprise 4 brigades and 16 regiments, 12 of the regiments should be of infantry and rifles, 3 of cavalry, and 1 of artillery, composed of 12 batteries of 4 rifled six-pounder guns and 2 howitzers each.

Four of these regiments might be assigned to be raised in the 1st division district, three in the 2d, three in the 3d, two in the 4th, and one in each of the remaining four districts.

By means of a division of this character, an opportunity would be afforded to all the young men of the present force, not restrained by social or business ties, to join a corps, that sooner or later might be required to maintain upon the battle fields for the Union, the honor and dignity of the State, and this too, without materially interfering with the status of the present organization, which recruited to the war complement would become the militia of the reserve.

Including the quota of the present year, there are about 8,000 serviceable weapons (muskets and rifles) in the hands of the troops, and this comprises all that the State possesses. The balance of the troops are armed with the altered flint lock musket.


In view of the present imperiled condition of the Union, and of the contingencies which may demand even of our State an independent and vigorous policy, I beg to urge upon your Excellency the importance of securing without loss of time, at least 50,000 rifled muskets, or weapons of similar range and precision, for the service of the State. I am aware of the difficulty of procuring these arms at present, owing to the recent heavy orders for the South, which have perhaps completely drained the market of fire arms of every pattern, still, these arms are a necessity, and if they cannot be obtained short of England or France, I suggest whether it be not wise to dispatch an agent to these countries for their purchase.

For this purpose and the purchase of the proper accountrements, at least one million of dollars is necessary, and I trust your Excellency will not hesitate to recommend the Legislature to make the appropriation.

Sir.—I hereby report, that on the 2d and 3d days of July last, at my quarters, I caused to be held the meeting of general officers, field officers, division staff and brigade inspectors of this division, as required by the regulations, for theoretical instruction in evolutions of the line, and that at such meeting I caused to be pursued the examination of the annual course of instruction as applied to the evolutions of the line. The above officers, with but few exceptions, attended with commendable promptness and executed the different evolutions with precision, affording the best evidence that they had carefully studied the books upon that subject.

Also that no division parade has been held in this division; but that the undersigned, with his staff, reviewed the 27th regiment of 12th Brigade at Delhi, on the 6th of September last. Also the 17th Brigade, at Herkimer, on the 14th of September.

Drills were held in the 27th regiment and 17th Brigade of the officers, for two consecutive days by my order.

The improvement made in this Division in the past year exceeds any of the previous years. New companies have been organized, and great improvement has been made in drill and discipline.

If the Legislature would make some provision which would pay the actual expenses of the officers and soldiers, this State would soon exhibit the best disciplined militia in the Union.

Sir.—In compliance with paragraph 527 of the General Regulations, I hereby transmit the reports of the commandants of the several regiments of this Brigade,

I beg leave also to report, that I have exercised this Brigade in the practice of evolutions of the line, on the 4th of June last, and on the 19th of November inst., on Hamilton Square, the four regiments of the Brigade on both days being formed into four infantry battalions. That on the first of the above mentioned days the following evolutions were made, viz.:

Breaking from line of battle to the right and front, by company. Forming forward into line on headmost company 2d battalion. Breaking to the rear by the right of companies, into column. Forming line faced to the rear on headmost company 2d bat-

talion.

Changing front on 3d battalion, right wing forward.

Changing front on 3d battalion, left wing forward.

Echellons by battalions at 25 paces, in advance and retreat.

Ploying into close column by division, on first division first battalion right in front.

Deploying column by battalion in mass on 1st battalion.

Ploying into column by battalion in mass on 4th battalion, left in front.

Deploying column by battalion in mass on 4th battalion.

Ploying into column by battalion in mass on 2d battalion, right in front.

Line of battle on 2d battalion and deploying column on 2d battalion by battalion in mass.

Ploying into column by battalion in mass on 3d battalion, right in front.

Line of battle on 3d battalion, and deploying column by battalion in mass on the 2d battalion.

Ploying into column by battalion in mass on first battalion, right in front.

To deploy faced to the left, and taking distance by battalion in mass on 2d battalion; and by battalion in mass changing direction by the right flank.

March in line of battalions in mass, in advance and retreat, left battalion passing obstacle.

Deploying masses on 1st division 2d battalion.

Forming squares on the 1st division, 1st and 3d battalion, right in front.

Reducing squares.

Columns closed in mass, on the 1st division, 1st and 3d battalions.

Columns deployed on same divisions.

Forming oblique squares by battalion from line.

Forming columns and aligning battalions.

Forming oblique squares by battalion, changing direction by the right flank.

Reducing squares, alignment of battalions, and deployment of columns on the 1st division of each battalion.

That on the second of the above mentioned days, the following evolutions were made, viz.:

Breaking from line of battle to the right and front by company. Forming forward into line on the headmost company 2d battalion.

Breaking to the rear and right by companies into column.

Forming lines faced to the rear on headmost company 2d battalion.

Echellons by battalion in advance and retreat.

Ploying into close column by division on 4th division 2d battalion, right in front.

Deploying column on 4th division 2d battalion.

Ploying into close column by division on 1st division 2d battalion, right in front. Line of battle on 2d battalion, and deploying column on same battalion by battalion in mass.

Ploying into column by battalion in mass on 1st battalion, right in front.

To deploy faced to the left, by battalion in mass, taking distance on 2d battalion, and by battalion in mass changing direction by the right flank.

March in advance in line of battalion closed in mass, 2d battalion of direction.

March in retreat in line of battalion in mass, 3d battalion of direction, battalion halted, faced by the front rank and aligned.

Deployment of masses on 1st division 2d battalion.

Breaking to the front and right by companies.

Marching in column, crossing the line of battle in front and on the left, and prolonging the line.

Forming forward into line of battle.

Breaking to the rear by the right of companies into column.

Forming into line of battle faced to the rear.

The fourth regiment (artillery) on both occasions was dismounted and acted as an infantry battalion. The evolutions were made with great promptness and regularity by all the battalions. The field and brigade staff officers, in addition to a regular course of theoretic instruction in the two volumes of Hardee and the third volume of Scott, have explained by diagrams and recitations, various evolutions of the line, at meetings on two consecutive days as required by the General Regulations.

General Fred. Townsend, Adj. Gen. of the State of New York:

General,—I have the honor to report, that in pursuance of paragraph 535 of the General Regulations for the military forces of the State of New York, the field officers and brigade staff officers of the Seventh Brigade N. Y. S. M., were called together for theoretic instruction, at Peekskill, in the county of Westchester, on the 26th and 27th days of September last. At the meeting the several evolutions prescribed in the annual course of instruction for the years 1859 and 1860, were carefully and successfully studied and illustrated by diagrams. The undersigned acted as instructor on the occasion.

With a view to obtain an accurate military knowledge of the fortified places, "and positions which may be advantageously fortified or strengthened" in this Brigade district, the steamer Edward I. Gale was chartered, and in August last, the undersigned, with a large number of the brigade and regimental officers, and several of the officers and privates of the companies of the brigade, accompanied by Gen. George F. Sherman, Inspector General of the State of New York, made two excursions along the banks of Hudson river. Stony Point, Iona Islands, West Point, and Forts Putnam, Montgomery, Clinton, and Independence were visited and examined, and much valuable information obtained.

On the second, third, and fourth days of October last, the nineteenth regiment, under the command of Col. Wm. R. Brown, paraded at Newburgh, and practiced in my presence and under my directions, the manual of arms and all the evolutions prescribed in the annual course of instructions for the years 1858, 1859, and 1860. The weather during the three days was pleaant, with the exception of the afternoon of the third day when it rained, preventing a review of the regiment by Major General Duryea and staff. The regiment was reviewed by myself and staff, and was inspected by the Brigade Inspector on the second day. At the close of the parade on the third day, several of the companies of the regiment were visited at their respective armories by Major General Duryea and staff, and myself and staff.

On the eighth and ninth days of October last, the seventeenth regiment, under the command of Col. Edward Pye, paraded at Haverstraw, Rockland county, and practiced the manual of arms, opening and closing ranks, breaking by the right of companies to the rear into column, and the twenty-one evolutions prescribed in the course of instruction for the years 1859 and 1860. The manual of arms, opening and closing ranks, breaking by the right of companies to the rear into column, and the first twelve evolutions of the annual course of instruction, were practiced in my presence and under my directions. The regiment was reviewed by Major General Duryea and staff, and myself and staff, and was inspected by the Brigade Inspector on the last day of its parade.

The eighteenth regiment, under the command of Col. James Ryder, paraded at Cold Spring on the ninth, and at Peekskill on the tenth of October last, and practiced in my presence and under my directions, the manual of arms, opening and closing ranks, breaking by the right of companies to the rear into column, and all the evolutions prescribed in the annual course of instruction for the years 1859 and 1860. The regiment was reviewed by Major General Duryea and staff, and myself and staff, and was inspected by the Brigade Inspector on the last day of its parade.

At the above mentioned parades, the officers and privates of the respective regiments displayed superior military proficiency, and it is with feelings of pride and gratification that I express the opinion, that for soldierly deportment and military discipline, the seventh brigade will bear favorable comparison with any like number of troops of any of the rural military districts of this State. All which is respectfully submitted.

Sir—In obedience to the General Regulations, I have to transmit the returns of Col. Pratt, commanding 20th regiment light infantry, and Col. Wright, commanding 21st regiment artillery—the corps composing this Brigade.

The brigade was formed for one day at the camp of the 20th regiment, near Athens, Greene county, and was reviewed by His Excellency, the commander-in-chief, and Brig. Gen. Allen, commanding the third division. The presence of His Excellency

will therefore dispense with the necessity of my remarking upon the events of that day. I witnessed the routine of camp duty performed by Col. Pratt's regiment, which, notwithstanding the severe weather at the beginning, was carried on according to law. By a strict economy for two years, and waiving all claims for the services of 1859, the Board of Auditors of this regiment were enabled to disburse four days' full pay to the men, the officers not receiving anything. I think the success of this measure entitles all who have aided in bringing it about to great credit.

The discipline of the regiment has not fallen off, but it still keeps up under great trials, which, I fear, are not yet ended, the location of the arsenal at Kingston, being a fruitful source of difficulty, out of which it will be no easy matter to extricate the regiment. The fact is affecting the numerical strength to a great degree.

Col. Wright's regiment has increased in numbers and discipline, showing much greater progress than it has been my duty to notice in former years. No encampment was held this year, the funds not admitting of it. It needs new equipments, and I must be allowed to submit to the department the absolute necessity of new belts, in some cases muskets. The regiment deserves it and should have it.

For details, I refer to the reports of the two Colonels, simply remarking, that the supply of ammunition was, as usual, quite insufficient. It is rather too much to require of a commandant, that he shall pay out of his own pocket, the cost of powder for salutes to his military superiors.

Some amendment is wanted to the militia law. Our unredressed grievance will press with accumulated weight upon the next Legislature. We need help now, if ever.

Also have to report that leave of absence, from his command, was granted to the undersigned, for one month, from 25th day of August, and that the command of the brigade was assigned to Colonel Amos M. Cushman, commanding the 34th regiment, consequently no evolutions were practiced under the immediate direction of the undersigned during the military year last past.

But the undersigned did, in special order No. 7, issued July 15, 1860, require the field officers and the brigade staff officers to rendezvous at Brasher Falls on the 29th and 30th days of August, for theoretic instruction. Colonel Cushman, commanding, was not present, but the most of the officers were present, and two days were profitably spent in illustrations by diagrams, &c., and manœuvres in the school of the company and battalion, reference being had to the annual course of instruction promulgated from general head quarters for 1860, and the good effects of the meeting were visible at the annual parade for review and inspection of the brigade.

Colonel Cushman called his field and line officers, commissioned and non-commissioned officers together, two days, for improvement and instruction at Westville. I have no report from him.

July 14. General order No. 1, required the regiments comprising the 15th brigade to rendezvous at Potsdam Junction, for inspection, review and improvement in the annual course, on which occasion I was not present in consequence of sickness. Nor was the Inspector General.

The brigade met pursuant to order. The brigade staff officers were present, Colonel Cushman in command, and I understand from the Brigade Inspector that the review and manœuvres were well executed and a fine feeling and spirit prevailed among the rank and file as well as officers.

Colonel Cushman having resigned no report from him has reached my quarters.

The undersigned commanding 20th brigade N. Y. S. M., pursu-

ant to paragraph 527 of the General Regulations, makes the following report:

Pursuant to an order duly issued by me, the commissioned officers of the 60th regiment, and the brigade staff officers of this brigade, assembled at Corning, in this county, on the first day of March last, for two days' "theoretic instruction." The time was profitably spent, I believe, in instruction by company, and with blocks prepared for the occasion.

Colonel L. C. Whiting, commanding the 60th regiment, by order duly issued, assembled the officers and non-commissioned officers of his regiment, at Hornellsville, in Steuben county, on the 5th and 6th days of September, for "improvement and instruction," pursuant to paragraph 536 of General Regulations. The regiment also went into camp at the same place on the 7th day of September, and so continued in camp until Tuesday the 10th. I was present during the continuance of that encampment, with a portion of the brigade staff. The companies were all present with the exception of company "L," which for some reason did not obey the order issued by the colonel. Lieutenant Colonel H. P. Martin, of New York, was also present, and acted as instructor, for which service he would receive no remuneration. I desire again to express to him, not only for myself but on behalf of all the officers and men of this brigade, our hearty thanks for his able and efficient efforts in our behalf.

The regiment went through with the course of instruction prescribed for 1860, also for 1859 and 1858. The evolutions were well executed throughout. Our Brigade Inspector was not present, but the regiment was inspected by Lieutenant Colonel H. P. Martin, by my directions.

Sir.—In compliance with paragraph 527 General Regulations, the undersigned respectfully reports:

That he regrets being obliged again to state, that the commandants of regiments in this brigade have neglected to furnish the reports contemplated by said paragraph.

In September last, I reviewed the 54th and 66th regiments, the latter while in camp at Medina. I was also present at the review, by the Brigade Inspector, of three companies of the 59th regiment; a report of these reviews and inspections will be given in detail by the proper officer: it however gives me pleasure to state that the reviews were well conducted, the inspections carefully made, and that most of the battalion companies of the 54th and 59th regiments have conformed to the bill of dress prescribed for them.

The 66th regiment recently placed under my command, at their encampment, demonstrated what may be accomplished by efficient field officers with companies located in the "rural districts."

Ill health prevented me from holding the annual meeting of field officers and officers of the brigade staff for theoretic instruction.

The increasing neglect of assessors to enroll, and the disposition of supervisors and collectors and the people to practically nullify the militia act, throughout the bounds of this brigade has been witnessed by me with mortification and humiliation, and is discouraging and disheartening our best officers. When any law of our State is thus treated by the civil officers especially charged with its execution, and by the people, what guarantee have we that any other law will be enforced?

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Gen. Frederick Townsend, Adjutant General:

The undersigned begs leave to submit the following report, supplementary to the return already forwarded to head-quarters, of the uniform, arms, equipments and numbers of the 1st Brigade, consisting of the 1st, 2d, 3d, 71st and 73d regiments.

First Regiment, Cavalry. Owing to the litigation in regard to the Colonelcy of this regiment, which has been in progress for some time, it was fair to suppose that it would have shown, at the annual inspection for this year, a marked decline, both in numbers and discipline; but this legitimate expectation proved erroneous. All militia cavalry organizations, however well conditioned their arms, uniforms and equipments, must necessarily leave much to be desired in the matter of efficiency in drill and

discipline, and the larger the organization the greater the imperfection in these attributes: This regiment, since the adoption of a regimental uniform, has materially improved in soldierlike appearance, and too much praise cannot be awarded to Lieutenant Colonel Devin, who has been in command for upwards of a year, for the care and painstaking which he has displayed in the drill of his regiment. Although no cavalry movements have been laid down in the course of instruction for this year, Lieutenant Colonel Devin expressed confidence in the ability of his regiment to perform any manœuvres which might be required of it, and upon inspection day the following were performed with accuracy, and with the exception of the last, in which some little hesitancy was observed, with promptness, some of them at a trot.

Break from the right to march to the left.

On right into line.

Break from the left to march to the right.

On left into line.

Break by the right to the rear to march to the left.

Front into line.

: Change front by inversion on right wing.

Platoons left about wheel.

Change front forward obliquely on right wing. Change front forward obliquely on left wing.

By squadron right dress.

Change front to rear on right wing.

The above movements were performed in 30 minutes. The arms and equipments were found to be, with few exceptions, in good condition.

Second Regiment, Infantry. Up to within a short period, this regiment has been retarded in its growth and efficiency by troubles among its officers, but having recently elected new field officers, Col. G. W. B. Tompkins, the new commandant, promises shortly to bring it up to the proper standard of drill and discipline. Having made application to the Commander-in-chief for permission to drill as light infantry, which was accorded, the regiment will proceed immediately to the adoption of the new tactics. Owing to the circumstance of his having so recently assumed the command, Col. Tompkins asked to be excused from the performance of the manœuvres laid down in the course of instruction for this year. The uniforms and equipments of the men were found to be in good condition, but the attention of the Depart-

ment is earnestly called to the worthless condition of the greater part of the muskets in the hands of the men. They would be utterly useless and even dangerous to their possessors in service, and there is not a full supply even of these arms, for the captain of one company reported upon inspection day, that he had been forced to "hire" muskets for the use of his company on that day. Col. Tompkins, therefore, urges strenuously and with great reason, the necessity for the issue of the new musket to the regiment, before he can hope to interest the men in a desire for improvement in drill and tactics.

Third Regiment, Hussars. The remarks applied above to cavalry regiments, are of course equally applicable to this one, and when the limited time which the men are enabled to spare for mounted drills during the year, is taken into consideration, (for of course these must take place by daylight, and they thus lose the advantages of the repeated evening drills which are of such benefit to the infantry regiments,) coupled with the fact that the horses are often totally unmanageable and unfit for the service to be performed, it is not surprising that the drill of a mounted militia regiment is often inefficient, and its manœuvres unsteady. That much may be done however by the exhibition of the proper care, spirit and determination by the field officers, the marked improvement in the First Regiment fully exemplifies. provement was noticeable on the occasion of the inspection of the third regiment over those of the two preceding years. arms and equipments of the men, were almost without exception. clean and in good condition, and more steadiness was noticeable in the movements performed. Occasion was taken in a former report (that of 1858) to notice that there appeared to be a want of harmony among the officers of this regiment, and upon its last inspection but one field officer was present, Col. Postley, in command of the regiment. In the absence of the other officers and the Adjutant, it was deemed useless to attempt to perform any extended series of movements. A few, however, were performed under the direction of Col. Postley, with considerable steadiness and precision.

Seventy-First Regiment, Light Infantry. This regiment has suffered somewhat during the past year from internal troubles, and appeared upon the ground for inspection, under the command of its senior captain; the Colonel, although present, being unfitted from injuries received at a previous parade, to take com-

mand, and the positions of Lt. Col. and Major being vacant. The review which took place previous to the inspection, was clumsily performed, and some of the minutiæ of equipment were not quite up to the standard of excellence which this regiment has laid down for itself on former inspections. The arms were found to be in perfect condition. The movements laid down in the annual course of instruction for this year, were not attempted, as it was soon apparent that, however well the men might have done their part in the absence of the proper field officers, they could not have been satisfactorily performed. And in this connection it would be well to remark on the expediency of allowing not only all the field officers, but also the company officers, or at least two of the senior captains, the opportunity of taking command in turn of their regiment at drills, &c., in order to accustom themselves to the position, for emergencies may arise, as in this case of the Seventy-First, where a senior captain may be called upon to command his regiment, and however well he may understand the duties of the position in theory, if he has never been allowed to practice them, he will still find himself in a new and perhaps awkward situation. As, however, the vacant posts in the regiment have lately been filled, it is hoped that it will in future continue to justify its well-earned reputation; for, what might be considered trivial faults in another regiment, should not be allowed to exist in one which, like the Seventy-First, has shown so thorough an appreciation of drill and discipline.

Seventy-Third Regiment, Infantry. This regiment organized in Richmond county, Staten Island, and attached to this brigade, is in a deplorable condition as regards arms, uniforms, equipments, drill, and all the attributes which go towards making up a thorough military organization. It is at best, but the skeleton of a regiment, and the companies composing it seem to evince a fixed determination not to drill in the same arm or equip in the same uniform. No attempt was made upon the occasion of their inspection to perform the manœuvres laid down in the course of instruction for this year.

Sir—I have the honor to enclose inspection returns of the Second Brigade N. Y. S. M., consisting of the 4th, 5th, 6th, and 12th regiments; and also, in compliance with paragraph 532 of General Regulations, report upon the proficiency exhibited by the several regiments in the exercises and manœuvres prescribed by general orders No. 52, establishing the course of instruction for the year 1860.

The Fourth Regiment was inspected at the city armory, Oct. 11, previous to the parade in honor of the Prince of Wales. The order for inspection of this regiment at Hamilton square upon that date, had been issued previous to the order for the division parade, and as there had been no evolutions prescribed for the artillery, it was thought best to countermand only so much of the order as related to Hamilton square, rather than subject the regiment to the expense of another parade.

The Fourth Regiment consists of five companies of light artillery, one company cavalry, and the veteran corps—total, 293. The veterans, company G, are uniformed in blue coats, yellow buttons, blue pants, plate and plume on citizen's hat. Company H, cavalry, cavalry coat, yellow trimmings, regulation cap. The other companies are uniformed according to regulations. All public property in possession of the regiment, is in good order. The total absent and present of this regiment, shows a loss since the inspection of 1859, of forty-two, while the total present shows an increase of ten. The loss is more than accounted for by the transfer of company A, cavalry, to the 3d regiment, and a decrease of 25 in company G, veterans.

In consequence of the long illness of Lt. Col. Teller, and resignation of Major Coles, all the field duties for the year past have devolved upon Col. Hincken, and his performance of them, has proved him one of the most efficient officers in the first division. At the several Brigade drills, this regiment has done duty dismounted as infantry, and have showed marked improvement in drill and discipline. While all the companies are deserving of praise, I think that company F, under command of Lieut. O'Grady, deserves particular mention.

The Fifth Regiment consists of eight companies, organized as artillery, and doing duty as light infantry—total, 551. This

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regiment was inspected at Fort Wood, (Bedlow's Island) October 3d. Previous to inspection, the regiment was reviewed by Brigadier-General Yates and staff, and Major-General Sandford and staff. After the review, General Sandford and staff were inspected, and were found completely uniformed according to regulations. In consequence of the time taken for the reviews and the nature of the ground, it was impossible to execute all the manœuvres prescribed by the annual course of instruction for light infantry, but those executed were done so well as to make it evident that they could execute them all in a creditable The Fifth shows an increase of 112 since the inspection of 1859, and also shows great improvement in drill and discipline. For the purpose of giving each company proper credit for recruiting, I give the increase in each; company A, increase 22; company B, 8; company C, 11; company D, 14; company E, 14; company F, decrease 6; company G, increase 5; company H, decrease 14. The property belonging to the State in possession of the regiment, is in good order.

I cannot let this occasion pass without referring to the spirit exhibited by Col. Schwarzwaelder and the officers of the regiment, in procuring from the General Government the use of Fort Wood (Bedlow's Island) for one week, for the purpose of instructing the officers and men in the use of sea-coast artillery. The Secretary of War not only granted the use of the fort and battery, but detailed Major Anderson, of the U. S. Army, to superintend the instruction, assisted by Lt. Sinclair, also of the army. There being but four guns, (32 pounders) mounted, it was impossible to have all the regiment under instruction at the same time; but when not on duty at the guns, they were under instruction in infantry, commencing at the school of the soldier and passing regularly through to the school of the battalion.

This tour of duty has been extremely beneficial to the regiment, not only in improving them in drill and discipline, but in inspiring a military spirit and ardour in the officers and men. The regiment will now compare favorably with any regiment in the division, and is fast improving.

Having been present during the whole time they were garrisoned at Fort Wood, I can bear evidence to the cheerful performance of their duties, attention to drill and perfect subordination exhibited by every officer and man attached to the regiment.

The 6th regiment was inspected Oct. 16th, at Madison Square. Brigadier General Yates and staff were inspected with, and after-

wards reviewed this regiment. The 6th regiment consists of eight companies, organized as artillery, but doing duty as infantry. Total 378, showing an increase, since last inspection, of 30.

I give the number of each company, present and absent, for the purpose of calling attention to the large percentage absent from some of the companies, in some cases almost one-half of the company.

Company A. Present 34, absent 11, total 45. This company is improving and recruiting. The officers as well as the men require instruction, particularly the commandant.

Company B. Present 22, absent 0, total 22. Retarded in its progress by the insubordination and disorganizing efforts of one of its lieutenants, who has since resigned, is now improving.

Company C. Present 37, absent 14, total 51. Recently organized, is doing well in all respects, improving rapidly in drill and discipline.

Company D. One of the best companies in the regiment, improving steadily in discipline and efficiency, for which much credit is due to Captain Miller's efforts and qualifications.

Company E. Present 32, absent 11, total 43. Nearly all recruits; but possesses the spirit and determination to make a good company.

Company F. Present 31, absent 7, total 38. Has been retarded by the protracted illness of its captain. Manual good.

Company G. Present 21, absent 17, total 38. Transferred from the old 11th regiment. Has not recruited or improved in the 6th. The material is good, but at present shows a want of military spirit.

Company H. Present 39, absent 10, total 49. Continues to hold its own in point of numbers and drill and discipline, which is satisfactory, as it has long been one of the best companies, and Captain Schwartz one of the best officers in the regiment.

At the inspection, but a part of the manœuvres prescribed by the course of instruction for 1860 were performed, it being impossible, from the nature of the parade ground, as well as want of time, to do so. The regiment not appearing promptly at the time ordered, I regret to report that the evolutions which were performed, were not done in as perfect a manner as they should have been, notwithstanding the intelligent exertions of the field officers, showing, in my judgment, a great want of instruction with the line officers, with but few exceptions. The inspection

this year was far inferior to that of 1859. The arms and equipments belonging to the State were in good order.

The Colonel and other field officers, are now using very creditable exertions, and the regiment is improving.

The 12th regiment was inspected Oct. 17th, at Hamilton Square. It consists of eight companies, organized as infantry and doing duty as light infantry. Total 378. This was their first inspection since its organization in the 2d Brigade as the 22d Regiment (afterwards changed to the 12th), and is deserving of great praise for the increase in numbers (having almost doubled in less than one year), and for proficiency in discipline.

The field officers are very efficient and ambitious, and are generally well supported by the line officers. The regiment is well uniformed, but not well armed, it having but ninety-two (92) muskets fit for use. The rest not belonging either to the State or regiment, being borrowed for temporary use by the different companies. I give the number, present and absent, of each company at inspection.

Company A. Present 33, absent 6, total 39. Discipline excellent, well set up, uniforms neat; an improving command.

Company B. Present 32, absent 8, total 40. Not quite up to the standard of the regiment, need more attention to the Manual, to neatness in uniform and precision of drill to equal some of the other commands.

Company C. Present 24, absent 7, total 31. A small company and not as well drilled as some of the other companies, sometimes do not pay proper attention, improving.

Company D. Present 35, absent 6, total 41. Good company, need drill, improving; color company.

Company E. Present 24, absent 10, total 34. Small, but improving in numbers and drill, men generally well set up.

Company F. Present 46, absent 12, total 58. New command, and not up to average of the regiment, men need setting up, improving and will make a good company.

Company G. Present 41, absent 10, total 51. This company deserve great credit for their excellent drill and discipline, an honor to the 12th, and would be to any regiment in the 1st Division.

Company H. Present 27, absent 12, total 39. New command, and require drill and discipline, improving, and with attention from its officers, will make a good company.

At the inspection, this regiment performed all the evolutions laid down in the course of instruction of 1860 for light infantry, and performed them well in one hour and forty-five minutes (1.45). No errors of importance were committed. The whole regiment are entitled to commendation for energy and attention to their duties. All public property in good order.

The 2d Brigade as a whole was never in as good condition as at present, and it is constantly improving.

To the Adjutant General:

Sir-In compliance with General Regulations, I here enclose you the returns of the third brigade. The inspections took place in Hamilton Park, on the 11th, 16th, 18th and 19th days of October. The course of instruction for the year was executed by all the regiments, with the exception of the 7th, which omitted several such as passing obstacle, covering front of three right companies, marching battalion in retreat and pass defile in column by platoon, &c., which was omitted on account of the ground being too small for so large a regiment to manœuvre in. I hope that some step will soon be taken to provide a parade ground of suitable dimensions for the execution of battalion movements. The evolutions were well executed, showing an improvement over that of last year, particularly the guides, who gave evidence of a more thorough knowledge of their duties than at the last annual inspection. The arms and equipments are in good order with the exception of the muskets of the 55th regiment, which comprise a great variety and are of a very inferior quality. I would again renew my suggestion of last year that they be supplied with new ones. Captain Atterbury, of E company, 9th regiment, informs me that he is compelled to borrow muskets, as he has been unable to procure them for his company in consequence of there being none in the arsenals of the State fit for service.

At your request, I noted the time taken by each regiment to perform the movements, it was as follows:

The 7th regiment, one hour and two minutes.

The 8th regiment, one hour and fifty-five minutes.

The 9th regiment, one hour and five minutes.

The 55th regiment, one hour and twenty-six minutes.

To the Adjutant General:

Sir—Pursuant to law and Brigade Orders No. 4, dated September the 1st, the 11th regiment, under command of Colonel Homer Bostwick, was inspected on the 1st instant. The line was promptly formed, and at my request, without equalizing, which, at the review, exhibited in marked contrast, the weak companies and the strong, a circumstance I did not fail to mention to the officers, who were called to the center for the purpose.

The review was well executed, the only error being made by myself in not saluting the colors as they were dropped in passing.

Inspection was being proceeded with, when the rain, which had threatened interruption of the review, now began to descend quite copiously, putting an end to all further progress on the field, and the regiment was marched under "Landmans" sheds, where the inspection was accomplished.

In the afternoon, during a cessation of rain, the line was reformed equalized, when the several movements of the series mentioned in numbers 12, 13 and 14, were quite correctly executed; and on attempting an advance in line of battle, the rain again interrupted and put an end to all battalion movements.

This regiment has increased in numbers, and I think, in discipline, since the previous inspection, a disposition, however, not to comply with the requirements of law, and their own bill of dress, has manifested itself in two of the companies; both of which are large and quite well drilled.

These companies have neglected getting that very essential part of a soldier's equipment, a knapsack; they have given me to understand, however, that they will get them by the 4th of July next.

During the examination of the arms of the sappers and miners, the sergeant informed me they were obliged to pay five dollars for the use of musquetoons for each parade. In addition to the cost of their uniforms, which were new, they should not be subjected to this additional disbursement. I respectfully suggest that the State furnish this corps with appropriate arms and reimburse them the amount they have paid for the hire of the arms they have used.

The staff of the 11th, desirous of promoting increase of members to companies, inaugurated the plan of giving a medal of the value of one hundred dollars to the company that shall turn out, uniformed, at the next annual inspection, the greatest number of recruits; also a medal of the value of thirty dollars, to be given to that member who shall have induced the greatest number to join.

The inspection of the 79th regiment took place on the 5th instant. It did not turn out as strong as I anticipated it would on the occasion of its first inspection in uniform; their appearance, however, was soldierly. The first twelve movements as directed for infantry, were only tolerably performed—a fault to be attributed to the colonel, who, evidently has not paid that attention he ought, to acquiring a knowledge of tactics necessary for the commander of a militia regiment under our present system. This is to be regretted, for the Colonel of the 79th possesses, in an eminent degree, other necessary qualities for success, viz.: military spirit, martial bearing and indefatigable energy—to which qualities only, is the State indebted for the organization and uniforming of the six companies that at present constitutes the regiment.

The Major and Adjutant, particularly the former, gave every evidence of familiarity with the duties of their positions.

The staff of this regiment, made the same offer, to promote recruiting, as did that of the 11th.

The 69th regiment passed a satisfactory inspection on the 10th instant. It has steadily increased under its present able commandant and will become a strong regiment. The returns exhibit an increase of about 100 since the previous inspection. All the movements were well executed, except that of passing obstacle in front of three right companies; which, on repetition and being being comprehended by the captains of those companies, was well performed.

The 23d regiment was inspected on the 16th instant. The two companies comprising it turned out quite strong—stronger than the average of companies in the brigade. They were enthusiastic in the belief that they would soon augment in numbers—a

belief in which I participated, but, as at present organized, I am somewhat doubtful of its speedy realization.

Adj. Gen. F. Townsend:

In compliance with paragraph 532 of the General Regulations, I begleave to submit the following report of the inspections of this Brigade, comprising the 13th, 14th, 28th, and 70th regiments.

Thirteenth Regiment artillery, doing duty as light infantry, Col. Abel Smith, was inspected Oct. 16th. This was the first inspection of this regiment as light infantry. The battalion movements laid down in general orders, were executed with promptness, showing an excellent state of discipline in both officers and privates.

My anticipations of the increase in this regiment, as expressed in my last report, have been partially realized, and the inactivity which has seemed to pervade our whole Brigade for several years past, has been by this regiment, at last overcome. Much enthusiasm pervades the entire regiment, the different companies are recruiting rapidly, and they bid fair, judging from the activity and interest now manifested by both officers and privates, to double their numbers the coming year. Strict attention is paid to both company and battalion drills, and if the present increase and interest continues, but little time will elapse before this regiment will equal if not surpass any other in the State. muskets, which are the only property in the regiment belonging to the State, are (as reported for several years past) in very bad condition, in fact, utterly useless for military purposes. Company D, captain Harry Balsdon, has been organized during the past year, and bids fair to become a prosperous and flourishing corps. Much credit is due to captain B., for the energy he has shown in getting his company into working order in so short a time.

Fourteenth Regiment, light infantry, Col. A. M. Wood, inspected Oct. 17th. Col. Wood being obliged to leave the ground at an early hour, the command devolved upon Major Fowler, who on this occasion confirmed the opinion expressed of him in

my last report—that of perfect familiarity with the details of the different movements, and ability to execute them. This regiment has decreased very much in numbers during the past year; the total present, including field, staff, and band, being but 157. The movements prescribed, were executed in a very creditable manner, nearly all of them being performed while marching. The regiment being small, the commanding officer was able to command it so perfectly by his presence at every point, that it was difficult for mistakes to occur.

The regiment has been particularly unfortunate for several years past, in having internal dissensions that have materially retarded its progress.

The muskets in this regiment are in equally bad condition with those in the 13th.

Twenty-Eighth Regiment, rifles, Col. Michael Bennett, inspected Oct. 17th. This was formerly the 72d regiment of infantry, but has been changed during the past year to the 28th rifles, and the flank companies from the 13th and 14th regiments transferred to it. On account of its recent change, and the little time they have had for drilling in the "Hardee tactics," but few of the evolutions prescribed were gone through with. The field officers of this regiment, are very efficient and capable, but the line officers, except the commandants of companies A, E, H, and I, are very deficient in military knowledge. There is evidently in this regiment a great want of company drills; the non-commissioned officers and privates appear upon the parade ground as though they had not been in line since the previous regimental parade. This regiment has been furnished with the new rifle, but there is not that attention paid to brightness and cleanliness that arms so good as these are entitled to.

Seventieth Regiment, artillery and cavalry, Col. Samuel Graham, inspected October 11th. In regard to this regiment, I can add nothing to my previous reports of 1858 and 1859, to which I would refer. It still remains the largest and most effective regiment in the State in this arm of the service. Several of the companies in this regiment still retain their old parti-colored uniforms, which detracts much from its appearance on parade. So much time has elapsed since the issuing of general orders for a uniform equipment in each arm of the service, that there is no excuse for further delay, and I hope before another inspection, to see every company in the regiment in full regulation uniform.

It seems somewhat strange that there should be so many absentees at the inspection parades. Out of a total number of 1,259 returned to me as being attached to the Brigade, but 883 were present, showing an absence of nearly one-third. In the 13th and 14th regiments, the proportion of absentees is even greater, the 13th having 137 non-commissioned officers and privates present, and 96 returned as absent; and the 14th regiment 96 non-commissioned officers and privates present, and 71 absent. This shows either a want of energy on the part of the officers in procuring the attendance of their men, or that the penalties for nonattendance are not strictly enforced.

The State arsenal built here two years since, still remains in an untenable condition. It certainly reflects no credit upon the State, that so fine a building, the room in which is so much needed, should remain useless, when a few hundred dollars would make it perfectly safe.

Sir—I have the honor, in obedience to General Orders, to render my return of the 6th Brigade, commanded by Gen. Chas. A. Hamilton. This Brigade is composed of two regiments, viz.: The 15th Regiment (rifles), in Queens county, and the 16th Regiment in Suffolk county, L. I.

The 15th Regiment met at Glen Cove, for review and inspection on October 18, 1860. Present, companies A, B, C, D and R F company of artillery. After the dress parade, the Brigade Inspector's review followed; the regiment then executed the evolutions ordered for the year 1860 in a creditable manner, considering the time devoted, about three and ene-half hours; the district composing this regiment being so large, and the time required to assemble made it rather late in the day. Then followed the review by the Brigadier General and staff.

R F Company, artillery, Capt. T. L. Robinson, paraded with one piece and harnessed caisson; the difficulty of transporting their section of battery twenty miles made it impossible to parade with harnessed battery; company uniform regular.

Company A, rifles, Capt. F. N. Laurence, appeared with sixteen bayoneted rifles, the balance old rifles; uniform, regular. This

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company, formerly under the command of a highly efficient and well drilled officer, has been somewhat reduced in point of numbers, in consequence of the term of service of many of its members having recently expired, but is now fast recruiting under the very liberal inducements held out by its present newly elected and very highly esteemed commandant.

Company B, Capt. M. Willis. This company, though sometime in existence, is still armed with old rifles; uniform, regular.

Company C, Capt. Geo. C. McKee. This company, though at present rather weak in point of numbers, deserves much praise for their soldierlike appearance and movements, their high state of discipline generally, as well as their efficiency in the evolutions of the battalion in the field.

Company D. Capt. Burtiss. This is a new company, and in fatigue, not yet having had sufficient time previous to the inspection to get their uniforms. They are armed with sixteen bayoneted rifles, and the balance old rifles.

Company E, Capt. Craft. This also is a new company, in fatigue and armed with old rifles borrowed from other companies, not having been able to obtain arms after having given bonds for the same.

The 16th regiment, inspected by company, owing to the special request of its colonel, in consequence of the serious indisposition of his family; therefore, as no report from him has been received by me up to the time required by regulation (Dec. 1st), to make my report to you, I am, therefore, compelled to close this my report without hearing from him.

General—Enclosed please find inspection return of the Seventh Brigade, which I trust you will find correct.

I have pleasure in reporting an improvement in the Brigade during the past year, and have reason to believe that the Brigade was never in a more flourishing condition than at present. The manœuvres prescribed by the course of instruction for infantry for 1860, were performed by each regiment with a care, exactness and promptness, that was, on the whole, creditable to the regiments, situated as they were where companies are miles apart, and it is possible, under the most favorable circumstances, to drill them in battalion manœuvres once or twice only each year, and then at great expense and inconvenience.

Arms could not be poorer or more unfit for any service, than those in the possession of this Brigade, and it is a constant complaint of the captains of companies, that it is impossible to get new members for their companies when they see the sort of arms that the State has furnished them. Those furnished the 19th regiment, are the best, and I can give you an idea of the remainder by the following from a report of Col. Brown, of that regiment.

"The return here made of the arms and equipments, is for those furnished by the State. The commandants of companies report that the muskets are of an inferior quality and generally unserviceable and useless, as well as dangerous to those handling them when powder is used."

I have not a single national and regimental color to report as belonging to the State. It would only require that the State should furnish good arms and equipments to this Brigade to double its numbers in one year.

RONDOUT, Nov. 21, 1860.

To the Adjutant General for the State of New York:

General—As prescribed by section 670 of the General Regulations for the military forces, I herewith have the honor to render to you the inspection returns for 1860, of the Eighth Brigade of the New York State militia, commanded by Brig. General Henry A. Samson.

This Brigade consists of two regiments—the 20th, light infantry, commanded by Col. G. W. Pratt, and the 21st, artillery, commanded by Col. Joseph Wright. No brigade encampment was ordered this year, hence each regiment was inspected by itself. A regimental encampment, however, was ordered for the 20th regiment; it entered camp Sept. 27, say August 27th, and camped there four days; it was inspected by the undersigned on the 29th. The weather, as well as the soil upon which the tents

were pitched, made battalion drills impossible; it had to be dispensed with, and the exercise had to be performed by companies. The regiment was passed in review, however, by his Excellency, Gov. Morgan, Commander-in-chief, and his staff; also by Brig. Gen. Allen, acting as Major General, and finally by the commanding Brig. Gen. H. A. Samson and staff.

This review, as I was told, proved most satisfactory to the superiors above named; and I noticed by the soldier-like bearing of the troops, the precision of their march, the casiness with which they performed the several evolutions, as well as the manual of arms, I noticed, I say, a decided improvement over last year, and found them afterwards in company drills and firing, quite efficient. And yet this fine body of men, or nine-tenths of them, feel themselves aggrieved—a moral wrong, they think has, for the present, set at naught one of their claims as members of the militia of this great State, and whether they are right or wrong, it is beyond the power of any man to eradicate this feeling, unless its causes are removed.

My duty is to report to you such information as I may deem calculated to secure the benefit of the Brigade, permit me, therefore, to indulge in these remarks for a moment, which I think come under this head.

The unfortunate location at Kingston village, of the armory of the 20th regiment, in 1859, is the cause. Already has this regiment decreased 49 members in one year, and were it not for the well deserved popularity of Gen. Samson and Col. Pratt, the men could not be kept where they are. As matters stand now, the State armory accommodates only one company at Kingston village, of about 40 men, while the other five companies at Rondout and Port Ewen, about 200 men, are compelled either to travel three miles in order to reach the armory for drill, or hire a drill room at home and pay the expense, say \$50 to \$75 a year, out of their private means.

The men requested me to name these facts in my report. In doing so, I respectfully recommend them to your consideration.

The arms, equipments, and the uniforms of the 20th, are in every respect good, efficient and complete.

The Twenty-First regiment was ordered and had its annual parade at Poughkeepsie, 25th October last. On that day they were passed in review by the commanding Brig. Gen. H. A. Samson and staff, and after that inspected by the undersigned.

While the body of the regiment presents a most martial appearance, their arms and equipments are very deficient and irregular, caused no doubt by the sudden increase of the regiment. I give herewith, their situation in detail.

Company R lacks 12 patent leather belts, has no cartridge boxes at all; muskets are imperfect, have no fixture.

Company C has only 22 muskets; wants 20 more with 42 slings; wants also 40 cross-belts and 40 cartridge boxes of patent leather. The old ones are unfit to be worn along side of the new ones lately supplied for some of the other companies, by the State.

Company E muskets have no sights, have white cross-belts which ought to be exchanged with patent leather body belts and cartridge boxes, in order to correspond with those worn by the other companies.

Company H, Fishkill. They have forty old muskets which were furnished to them temporarily. They are unfit for the service, and no doubt will be exchanged in proper time; they need now 46. Have also 19 belts not fit for use. Have neither drum nor fife.

Company B, Hudson. Their 40 muskets are not in order and cannot be made good short of the State arsenal; ought to be exchanged. The belts and cartridge boxes date, no doubt, of the last century, and ought to be exchanged with others to correspond with the rest.

Company F have 40 very old muskets; are unfit for service—ought to be exchanged.

Company D was not in regular uniform, and I declined to inspect them.

This regiment has increased since 1859, from five to nine companies, or in numbers, from 258 to 401 men, and the prospect is fair for the completing of 10th company.

The arms and equipments to be furnished by the State, ought to be furnished as soon as possible, and I cannot too strongly recommend to you that the requisitions which Col. Wright may make for his regiment, may receive from your hand that encouragement which you are always ready to grant when the case demands it, and which the Colonel well deserves.

The manual of arms, bearing, evolution, marching and firing, are very good for a regiment almost new, and promise fair for

the next year. The three six-pounders are in good order. effective force of the Eighth Brigade, stands as follows:	The

To Adjutant General F. Townsend:

Dear Sir—In compliance with General Regulations, I herewith submit my annual report of inspections for 1860. In this brigade nothing has been accomplished as should have been.

The 25th regiment, under command of Colonel M. K. Bryan, made an effort to do duty in camp on the Washington Parade Ground, for three days in September, viz.: the 24th, 25th and 26th. The weather proving unfavorable, the encampment was an utter failure. The inspection being ordered for the latter day, acting Brigadier General C. T. Peek, with the brigade staff, reviewed the regiment. There being so few men present it was deemed advisable to postpone the inspection to some future day. The evening of October 17th, at the State armory, was designated in General Orders for the purpose, when the inspection was had and passed very satisfactory indeed, both as to numbers and soldierly bearing.

The 29th regiment, under command of Major A. Welch, went into camp on the 8th, 9th and 10th days of October, at Saratoga Springs, the 10th was designated as the day for reviews and inspection, but one company (Captain Jones, of Ballston Spa,) appearing on the ground during the three days, as a matter of course the "thing" did not amount to "shucks," although the Brigadier and Major General were both on the ground with their staffs.

The 76th regiment under command of Colonel R. C. Bentley,

have done nothing this year, having made but one attempt to parade by regiment, and that was the annual inspection on the 24th of October. There has been so much said in the public prints about this parade, that I shall forbear commenting on it, lest I should make it worse if it were possible.

Since making my last report this brigade has lost, by resignation, its commandant, Brigadier General Edward Frisby, a gallant and fearless soldier, a true and earnest supporter of the militia, affable, courteous and generous, a gentleman in the broadest sense, always ready to sacrifice whatever was necessary to the promotion of the best interests of the service. His loss has been and will continue to be felt. His administration of the affairs of the Eleventh brigade will always be referred to with pleasure by those with whom he was associated.

In this connection let me not forget to say a word complimentary to Colonel Bryan of the 25th regiment, for his untiring zeal in the promotion of the best interests of his command. If he was seconded in his exertions by all his officers, as he is by some of them, I have no doubt but the 25th could vie with our New York city regiments. By the 22d of February they intend to parade in full regimental bill of dress, including overcoats as adopted under General Regulations; all of which is respectfully submitted.

Sir—In compliance with "General Regulations" I have the pleasure of transmitting to your office the annual inspection returns of the 15th brigade, 4th division, N. Y. S. M.

The brigade is composed of the 33d regiment, commanded by Colonel C. R. Brundage, and the 34th regiment, commanded by Colonel A. W. Cushman.

Pursuant to General Division Order No. 8, and Special Order No. 2, issued by Major General S. F. Judd, commanding 4th division, N. Y. S. M., the regiments composing the 15th brigade rendezvoused at Potsdam Junction, September 11th 1860, for inspection, review, and improvement in martial exercise.

It was deemed advisable to remain upon the ground but one day, consequently a large part of the "course of instruction" for 1860 was necessarily omitted.

The few movements that were executed were done in a manner highly creditable and satisfactory. Especially is this true of the 33d regiment, commanded by Colonel C. R. Brundage.

It is a lamentable fact that this Brigade (in point of numbers) is growing small and "beautifully less." More especially is this true of the 34th Regiment. It is the opinion of military men in this vicinity that the two regiments should be united into one by disbanding the 34th regiment. I am also inclined to that opinion.

Permit me, however, to add—and with pleasure—that there yet remains in the Brigade many efficient and accomplished officers, men who are possessed of the true military spirit, and have the ability to teach, and the energy to perform all the duties that may devolve upon them.

I will also say, as far as my knowledge extends, the soldiers remaining in the Brigade are good and true, and with proper instruction, and the encouragement from the State to which they are justly entitled, will some day be a credit to the organization and an honor to the service and State.

To Gen. Fred. Townsend, Adjutant General N. Y. S. M:

Sir—Herewith I transmit to you the annual inspection returns of 16th Brigade, which was ordered, by Brigadier General S. D. Hungerford, into encampment "on the Jefferson county fair grounds, at Watertown, on the 4th September, 1860, at 11 o'clock, A. M., for the purpose of drill, inspection and review, for not less than two consecutive days;" at which time and place Brigadier General Hungerford and staff, Col. W. C. Brown, of 35th Regiment, with field and staff were present.

Also the companies of the 36th Regiment, as follows:

Company R, Cavalry, Capt. W. N. Angle, from Copenhagen, Lewis county, appeared with usual promptness, drilled his company with commendable skill, deserves much credit for keeping his company in full vigor until his men have mostly served out their time. The arms and accourtements of this company are in excellent condition.

Artillery section, Capt. H. E. Turner, from Lowville, Lewis county, performed efficient duty with one bronze 6-pd'r, and one 24-pd'r howitzer, each drawn by four horses, all in excellent order, and every man punctual to duty. This company made good time in firing salutes. It was pleasing to see ex-district attorney, and now Judge of Lewis county, play captain with such facility. Capt. Turner is an efficient officer.

Company L, Capt. P. M. Brown, of Loraine, Jefferson county, flank artillery, lately organized, and although commanded by young and at first uninformed officers, has made great proficiency under the instruction of Capt. S. L. Potter. This company appeared in complete and appropriate uniform, but had reason to feel ashamed of the poor muskets furnished them. I learnt that neither men nor officers were to blame for the condition of such arms, as they came so to the company. I return them, however, as in fair condition for the kind.

Company B, Captain Weaver, of Henderson, Jefferson county. This company is small, many of the men having served out their time; it is pledged to be full in future. This company is made up of quiet and gentlemanly members, both officers and men, and is well informed in company drill, but is poorly supplied with "the old arm altered" arm. They deserve a better supply.

Company D, Capt. Edward S. Salisbury, of Adams, Jefferson county. Capt. Salisbury is at once inspired with military zeal whenever he comes into parade, is always prompt and ready at his post. His men partake of his zeal and perform duty with the readiness of regular soldiers. Capt. Salisbury is an "old line ex-colonel" and is a good drill officer, both in the school of the company and battalion, The Captain and his Lieutenants, Swan and Marsh, agree this company to number full, with new uniform, yet I report their present uniform regular. This company is furnished with the common flint lock muskets, which are in good order, but they say they "want the sword bayonet rifles," and I urgently ask that they be so supplied.

Company C, Capt. A. M. Nutting, of Carthage, Jefferson county. Captain Nutting was lately promoted from second lieutenant, is "an old school" military officer, and being well posted in duty it fortified him so as to surmount the many difficulties which surrounded his company, which is now well drilled and regularly uniformed.

35th Regiment. Company A, Capt. E. M. Camp, Sackett's

Harbor. In speaking of Captain Camp, I cheerfully quote an extract from a newspaper, whose editor witnessed a portion of the proceedings, which says that "his knowledge of his duty was only equalled by his zeal in performing it."

In his company could be seen, the very soldier. Some of the men have attended polytechnic schools, and some have been members of the Chicago Zouaves. Most of them have been nurtured at Sacketts Harbor where they have witnessed at the Marine barracks a regular school of the soldier from infancy. Although this company is small in numbers, and with nothing gaudy or fanciful, yet "the real soldier" was so fully developed as to approximate to quite a degree of perfection.

Their muskets glittered with brightness, and the ringing of rammers, when sprung, and distinct click of the locks, at inspection, made excellent music. The officers were completely equipped, and to give the finish of equipage, the men were furnished each with a nice knapsack. I am informed that Captain Camp has spent considerable extra time and money in keeping this company in its full vigor.

Company C, Captain R. B. Biddlecom (being county clerk now residing at Watertown, Jefferson county). The officers and men of this company, mostly residing in the vicinity of La Farge, and nearly twenty miles from the encampment, and some of them nearly thirty, showed great promptness in being "on the ground in time." This company has not been fully organized but about two years, yet their proficiency in the school of the company gives evidence of good theoretic drill and study, when taking into consideration that not a member of it was at all acquainted with tactics at the time of its organization. I return their uniform as regular, though their pantaloons are rather too dark, and their taste lead them to procure an unnecessarily fine and costly article for both coats and pantaloons. One thing peculiar to this company is seldom seen, which is, that the entire company is so nearly "sized," and all grading above the middle size, a thing, (I am informed,) which was designed by all the officers at the time of its organization.

Company D, Captain S. L. Potter, Watertown, Jefferson county. Captain Potter has been in regular commission for a number of years in the United States army, and has seen and experienced service. He is now suffering with the effects of wounds received in the regular army, so much so that he was excused after the

first day, leaving his company in command of his highly accomplished Lieutenants Winslow and Chittenden.

He is a good drill officer in the school of the company, manœuvres of the battalion, and "evolutions of the line." He is deliberate and plain in giving command. His drill of his company, with a company of citizen cadets of about 50, who were invited to join the encampment, attracted much attention and produced well deserved applause. The drill I now refer to was performed while others were drilling by company. His, however, was more in battalion style, by breaking the two companies into sections and designating sections for companies.

His company has made exceedingly rapid advances in both infantry and light infantry drill. The uniform varies from "regulation" in a very tasteful style, in being of finer and darker material both of coats and pantaloons, and gold lace instead of the "cord." I return the uniform as "regular," and ask for information as to such variances.

The encampment was conducted in accordance with army precedence "as far as circumstances would permit." "Sounds," "calls" and "signals," were given in regular order.

"Tours of duty," by establishing "officers' guards" and the "ordinary guards," were all performed. "Stated roll calls" were .. daily made. An "officer of the day" was appointed who also discharged the duties of "officer of police." "Guard mounting" and "relieving" were also strictly performed. The "grand rounds" were nightly made. The guards were "inspected" and "relieved," the "rolls of guards regularly called" by Captain Camp, thereby keeping the men on "guard duty" in the most perfect state of vigilance. He arrested rowdies "from town" who undertook to scale the enclosures of the encampment, and confined them in the "guard honse" till morning, when they received a reprimand from the General and were discharged. He also arrested one of the men who attempted to tear down a tent in the night. He made great resistance and aroused many of the camp, but was finally made secure by the personal direction of General Hungerford.

I mention this last fact as a good manifestation that the 16th Brigade now has a General commanding it who will enforce law and order, and will even in person, aid his subordinates in doing the same when circumstances require it.

The 16th Brigade now takes new courage on the accession of

its new commandant, and promises to come up to her entire duty another year; also claims to have done all she could do, under the circumstances, in the present military year.

Col. W. C. Brown, formerly a member of the U. S. army, merits much credit for the extra labor and supervision he bestowed on every duty of the encampment.

Col. A. R. Ralph took active command at dress parades, making a fine appearance, and performed his duty with well deserved credit. It is due Col. Ralph to state, that his equestrian bearing was also highly creditable. Similar commendation is due to Adjutant Dewey.

Generally, there is great deficiency in good horsemanship, and where there is so much pride in "fine and fast horses in harness" as in New York, it is surprising that there is so little attention paid to good riding. Excellent rules on riding, both by American and English authors, are obtainable and should be studied and practiced.

There is also great want of skill in the sword and sabre manual and exercise. Our military books of tactics are deficient, except that which is adapted to the dragoon organization; and this is not generally distributed, whereby mounted officers might be better informed.

The "infantry sword exercise," as established by the Adjutant General of the British army, is incumbered with so many almost unmeaning definitions, that the "Jonathans" are disgusted with such teaching by" John Bull," and throw the work aside; although the largest portion of this work, and the positions, points, cuts, guards and mouinets, if well understood by all officers on foot, would be a commendable qualification. A plain system should be compiled combining the infantry and the straight sword exercise, together with the artillery and cavalry sabre exercise.

Capt. S. L. Potter, of D company, 35, is acquainted with the infantry sword exercise. Captain W. N. Angle, of R company, 36, is acquainted with the cavalry sabre exercise.

The special order issued Sept. 19, 1860, requiring inspectors to report the time consumed in the execution of the manœuvres of the course for 1860, is hereby answered by saying, that at an encampment of so short duration, together with the circumstances then existing, it became impracticable to do any more than what has been intimated in this return.

The "pay system" is so basely trampled upon by sworn officers of the civil department, that "perjury" is entailed upon them, and something should be done to remedy the evil. The cry of "pinps and aristocrats" in times of danger is, "take care of my property," and then run. If their property be destroyed, they ask government to pay up.

No argument meets the difficulty so perfectly as to let PROPERTY pay the militia, which is our "standing army of citizen soldiery" and main defence of both persons and property.

The review took place in the presence of a number of thousand spectators, among whom I had the pleasure of seeing ex-inspector Gen. Bruce, whom I heard speak in high commendation of both officers and men, and also of their general appearance and bearing, as also of the regular and rich uniforms.

In behalf of officers and men of the Brigade, from what has been manifested since the encampment, I promise a completion of every duty the ensuing military year.

To the Adjutant General of the State of New York:

The Inspector of the 19th Brigade, in compliance with the duties of his office, has the honor to report that the regiments forming this brigade, have both held their annual parades, and inclosed find inspection returns thereof.

The inspection of the Forty-Second regiment, Col. James Whitford, took place at DeRuyter, Madison county, on the 27th of September, and was reviewed by Gen. Thomas F. Petric, who with his staff, were present in full uniform.

I have to report favorably of four of the companies of this regiment, while one (company D, captain Seneca Lake) the General has determined to disband. Among the companies showing the most efficiency in drill in this regiment, I may mention company L, captain James B. Coe, and company A, captain Perry Wolcott.

Most of the guns of this regiment I have to return as entirely unfit for service, and would I could have assured the commandants of companies that an exchange would soon be offered from your department.

The inspection of the Forty-First regiment, Col. Chester Card, came off at South New Berlin, Chenango county, on the 11th of October. In the absence of the Brigadier General, I became the reviewing officer. The time occupied in performing all the manœuvres in the course of instruction for the year 1860, was one hour and ten minutes.

I am requested to obtain from your department for the pioneers or sappers and miners of this regiment, 12 sergeant's swords and belts, 4 saws, 2 axes, 2 pick-axes, and 12 pistols.

The guns of this regiment I also return mostly unfit for service, and an exchange as soon as in your power, is carnestly recommended.

In numerical strength, this brigade stands twenty better than last year.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

I have not received any notice of inspection of the Fiftieth regiment, nor have I heard of any regimental parade for the present year.

Head-Quarters Twenty-Fifth Brigade, Rochester, Dec., 1860.

General—I have the honor to render inspection returns of the 25th Brigade, for the year 1860.

The Fifty-Fourth regiment, with the exception of that for review and injection, have had but one parade during the season,

which being merely ceremonial, none of the evolutions laid down in the course of instructions have been gone through with. It is due, however, to the several companies to say, that the weekly drills have been zealously kept up, and that the various public parades had, individually, been very creditable.

General Swan reviewed the regiment Sept. 3d. Less steadiness and precision was observable at this review than has usually characterized this command upon former occasions, while in uniformity and neatness of dress, there was a decided superiority.

Company D, with full ranks, solid in appearance, steady and precise in marching, prompt and accurate in executing all commands, won deserved credit for itself, and was a proud encomium upon and witness of the faithfulness and efficiency of its commanding officer, Captain Louis Ernst.

Company B, Captain Miller, which has always stood second to no command in the regiment, fully sustained its well earned reputation.

Company C, Captain Taylor, paraded with fewer men than heretofore, and after the review, executed a few light infantry movements.

Company A, Captain Welling, also paraded with smaller number than usual, but reports a roll larger than ever before, of reliable men, many of whom were detained by absolute necessity.

Company L, Captain Brackett, paraded with more sabres than ever before at inspection.

Company R, Captain Thompson. The pieces and implements of this company are well cared for, and the men are proficient in the use of them. It requires a complete set of harness.

The Fifty-Ninth regiment, Col. O. B. Maxwell, was inspected at Dansville. But two companies were present—co's A and L. Co. A, Captain Warford, since the last inspection, has procured an entire new uniform in accordance with the regulations, and in all its movements exhibited a decided gain over last year.

Company L, Lieutenant Carl Stephan, maintains its high standard of military excellence. The arms used by this regiment are entirely unfit for service.

The Sixty-Sixth regiment, Col. E. D. Shuler, encamped five days at Medina, Orleans county. Co. C, under charge of Captain Jas. O. McClure, acting engineer, the camp was well pitched, and in as strict accordance with the regulation as the nature of the ground and equipage furnished would admit.

The behavior of this regiment in camp was orderly, and with but few exceptions, all manifested a desire to employ the time in improvement. The Col. and Lt. Col., are well acquainted with their duties, and the various commandants manifest a zeal and ambition which, properly fostered, will render this regiment as efficient as any other of its strength in the State. The manœuvres practiced were part of those laid down in order No. 59.

The review by Gen. Swan, took place upon the fourth day. The General expressed his satisfaction at the appearance of the regiment and with the manner in which the review was conducted. The regimental staff were active and efficient in discharging their respective duties. Co. L. requires complete sets of lead harness. The arms used by this regiment, with the exception of those in possession of company C and R, are entirely unfit for service.

I beg leave, respectfully, to urge the necessity of furnishing this Brigade with arms of the improved patterns, believing that such encouragement from the government is required in order to raise and keep up its efficiency.
