



REPORT.

GENERAL HEAD QUARTERS, STATE OF NEW YORK,

Adjutant General's Office, Albany, January 14th, 1862.

His Excellency E. D. Morgan,

Commander-in-Chief of the Military Forces of the State:

Sir:—Pursuant to the provisions of the law of Congress "establishing an uniform militia throughout the United States," I have the honor to submit the following

REPORT:

For the first time in our history, it has become necessary to use the military power and resources of the government, to suppress an insurrection designed to subvert the Constitution and destroy the Union.

A movement so formidable in its character and objects, could not be resisted with the ordinary means at the disposal of the Government, and it at once proceeded to organize a force commensurate with the magnitude of the work.

In the short space that has elapsed since the fall of Sumter, this has been accomplished. An army of six hundred thousand volunteers, raised and equipped since that event, are now in service, and attest the vigor of the

administration, and no less the power and resources of the loyal states.

In these efforts New York has borne a part worthy of her position, and I have the honor to submit to your Excellency, as Commander-in-chief, the following report relating to the organization of the volunteer forces from this State, called into service, and to the condition and strength of the militia, as required by law.

On the 15th of April last the President of the United States issued his proclamation, calling for seventy-five thousand of the militia of the several States of the Union, to suppress unlawful combinations and to cause the laws to be duly executed.

In the circular of the Secretary of War of the same date, this force was apportioned according to population, the quota of New York being fixed at seventeen regiments, or in the aggregate, thirteen thousand two hundred and eighty officers and men.

On the 16th of April the Legislature passed the act entitled "an act to authorize the embodying and equipment of a volunteer militia, and to provide for the public defence," and on the same day the Board of State Officers, constituted by that act, of which your Excellency was a member and the presiding officer, held its first meeting.

A despatch from the Secretary of War having been read, announcing that a requisition had been made on this State, the following resolution was unanimously adopted, in anticipation of the reception of the official notice:

"Resolved, That seventeen regiments of seven hundred and eighty men each be enrolled and mustered into the service under the act entitled 'An act to authorize the

embodying and equipment of a volunteer militia, and to provide for the public defence."

Provision was also made for the transportation to Washington of such portion of the organized militia of the State as your Excellency should think proper to send forward.

On the 17th the formal requisition was submitted to the Board, and on the same day the Seventh regiment of militia (National Guards) was ordered to march, and on the 19th left for Washington, followed on the 21st by the Sixth, Twelfth and Seventy-First. The Fifth, Eighth, Sixty-Ninth, Thirteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-Fifth and Twenty-Eighth were also ordered forward, and proceeded to Baltimore and Washington soon afterwards.

To these regiments, together with those sent forward at the same time from Massachusetts and Pennsylvania, belongs the honor of having been the first to march. great benefit which they rendered to the country at this time, in the tender of their services, can hardly be esti-The city of Baltimore was in a state of insurrecmated. tion; all communication with the Capital had been cut off, and the state of public feeling in Maryland and Virginia was such as to justify the apprehension that it would be at The foresight which led once occupied by a rebel force. your Excellency to anticipate the danger, and the promptness and alacrity with which your commands were obeyed, saved the country from a terrible disaster. Conduct so honorable to our citizen soldiery should have some appropriate recognition, and I respectfully recommend that these regiments be allowed to place on their regimental colors, the simple but significant inscription,

"Washington, April, 1861."

The plan of organization for the first quota of seventeen regiments of volunteers from this State, was in accordance with the act of April 16th, promulgated by general orders No. 13 from this department, on the 18th of the same month. To meet a constitutional requirement, the elective principle was recognized in the choice of officers, and the force was to be mustered into the State service for two years, subject at any time to be turned over to the government.

The enlistments under general orders No. 13 proceeded with great rapidity. On the 22d of April (only a week subsequent to the proclamation of the President) a report from this department showed that eighty-two companies had been accepted; and at a meeting of the State Board on that day, a resolution was offered by your Excellency, and adopted, "to organize the balance of the force, provided for in the act of April 16th."

Under this resolution, and the proclamation subsequently issued, the remainder of the force authorized by the act of April 16th, and not called for by general orders No. 13, was ordered to be enrolled and organized as provided in general orders No. 17, promulgated on the 25th. increased the force to an aggregate of thirty-eight regiments, irrespective of the militia regiments then in service. The War Department having expressed some reluctance to receive the additional regiments, a member of the board proceeded to Washington and succeeded, with some difficulty, in obtaining their acceptance. The first of these regiments left the State on the 29th of April, the last on the 12th of July. In addition to these, the 39th, 40th, 41st and 42d regiments, organized under the auspices of the Union defence committee of the city of New York, and the 2d, 9th, 14th and 79th militia, which volunteered for the war, and are now known as the 79th, 82d, 83d and 84th New York volunteers, were sent forward in July. Thus in less than three months forty-six regiments, containing in the aggregate thirty-seven thousand six hundred and eighty-eight men were enrolled, organized, equipped, and turned over to the government.

To prepare this large force to take the field was no ordinary task, and the promptness with which it was executed reflects the highest credit on the State authorities, and on the officers composing the staff of your Excellency as Commander-in-chief. The duties appertaining to these positions on a peace establishment had never been such as to require either continuous application or an intimate acquaintance with the details of military affairs. There

was, therefore, at the outset, a want of that practical knowledge which is acquired only from a wide experince, and without which complete success in any undertaking is rendered uncertain. That the difficulties arising from this cause should have been overcome, and thirty-thousand of our citizens placed in the field in so short a time, is evidence of the zeal and ability which was displayed in all the departments connected with the military service.

Another and a greater difficulty grew out of the scarcity of improved arms, equipments of every kind, and clothing All these had to be supplied before our volunteers could take the field with any prospect of rendering effective service. In regard to arms, those obtained from government and those belonging to the State, though in the main of inferior quality, were at first the only sources of supply. Subsequently, arms of an improved pattern, received from Europe on contracts authorized by the State Board, were issued to a few of the regiments. Uniforms, other necessary clothing, and the accoutrements to make up the complete equipment of the soldier, were supplied on contracts entered into and executed in the short period within which the first levy was completed.

The power of the State officers, under the act of April 16th, to raise and organize troops, ceased with the departure of the last of the thirty-eight regiments for the field. Since that period, the requisitions of the General Government, made either directly on your Excellency, or in the form of authorizations to individuals to raise regiments or companies, have furnished the only authority. These inde-

pendent organizations were afterwards turned over to your Excellency by general order No. 71 from the War Department, to be organized and prepared for service in the manner judged most advantageous for the interest of the General Government. In this way, all organizations in the State were finally brought under the provisions of orders issued from this department, so far as these were not in conflict with Government orders.

The commencement of the organization of the large force which has been placed in service from this State, since the departure of the thirty-eight regiments, dates from the combat at Bull Run, on the 21st July. The result of that unfortunate affair at once convinced the Government of the necessity of a large increase of our army; and the act of Congress, approved July 22d, authorizing the President to accept the services of five hundred thousand volunteers, invested him with the most ample powers for that object.

From the 22d of July to the 30th of August, authorizations were granted to individuals to raise more than seventy-five regiments, including infantry, cavalry and artillery; and, without reference to these, authority was granted to your Excellency, by the Secretary of War, on the 30th of July, to raise twenty-five additional regiments, which was subsequently increased to an aggregate of one hundred and twenty-five thousand men. As has been before stated, however, all the independent organizations were placed under the control of your Excellency, and they will therefore be treated as a portion of the regular levy.

The enlistments under the permission granted on the 30th day of July were at first extremely slow. On the

30th of August, a month after the promulgation of general orders 78, there was not, at either of the principal depots, the material for a single regiment. This came from no reluctance on the part of our citizens to volunteer at the call of the Government, but from causes which, it was evident, could be removed. Perhaps the most potent of these was the desire to organize complete regiments in counties and districts—an arrangement likely to fail, should the recruits go by companies or squads to a principal depot, to be there assigned arbitrarily to regiments, as the good of the service might seem to require. Then a large proportion of the volunteers comprising the regiments organized under general orders No. 78, having families dependent on them, they were desirous of remaining near them as long as possible, to arrange and provide for their support. To meet this and other objections against the plan of organization, your Excellency decided to authorize regimental camps in localities where there appeared to be a reasonable prospect of success. this way the plan was rendered more acceptable in the interior of the State; and the active aid and efforts of prominent individuals and of the local authorities were enlisted to fill up the regiments in their respective counties and districts. Nor did this measure, on the whole, involve any additional expense—the price for subsistence being the same as that paid at the regular depots. At first, tents were used. Subsequently, permission was given to occupy the Government forts and barracks, and in other cases quarters were furnished without charge. In only a few instances have the Government officers been called on to pay for the erection of quarters.

By thus modifying the plan of organization so as to meet the views and feelings of our rural population, enlistments were greatly stimulated; and during the months of September, October and November, no less than thirty-five regiments of infantry, three regiments of artillery and seven of cavalry, including such of the independent organizations as had been completed, were sent into the field.

In addition to the regiments which have been raised in this State under the several requisitions from Government, a large number of recruits have been drawn from our population for regiments in service. Of the number of these this Department has no positive knowledge, because officers recruiting have proceeded directly on orders issued from the headquarters of the army, and have not reported here.

In addition to volunteers furnished for the recruiting service, a number of company organizations have, at different periods, proceeded to Washington without orders and without filing with this Department their muster-rolls, or any other evidence which would show their strength.

In the progress of the levy made under the first call of the Government, the State authorities derived essential aid from the efforts of the Union Defence Committee of the city of New York.

Created and called into active exertion at the great meeting of the 20th of April, its action at once inspired the confidence of the community, and greatly expedited the organization of the large force which was contributed by our commercial capital.

To organize a force of over one hundred thousand men, called into service on a sudden emergency, under a peculiar form of government, and from a community but little skilled in the science of war, has been a work involving much labor and responsibility. Nor is it strange that embarrassing questions should have arisen, or that the functions of the State and General Government should have sometimes appeared in conflict.

But with the growth of a wider experience should come a clearer perception of what is required, to turn our resources in the proper direction, and to use them with the greatest possible benefit to the Government, and with the least expenditure of life and treasure.

New York stands prepared in the future as in the past, to support the Government to the full extent of her resour-But if her efforts are to be rendered effective in the greatest possible degree, it will be necessary that the details of the service be governed by such rules as are best adapted to encourage and promote enlistments for an army composed almost exclusively of volunteers. There is a wide difference between such a force and one organized on a system of compulsory service. In the one case the plan of organization must be such as to inspire the confidence, and meet the objections of intelligent and reflecting men. In the other, it may be arbitrary in proportion to the means at hand to enforce compliance and obedience. the first it must be a contract to which both parties give their assent. In the last it may be an exercise of power, which, however distasteful, there is no means of resisting. At the outset, the plan of voluntary enlistment was adopted, and on the assumption that it is to be continued during the war, I respectfully submit for consideration the following suggestions relating to future levies from this State.

In the organization of the regiments raised under the requisition of July 30th, the officers of the several Departments connected with the military service of the State, have acted simply as agents of the General Government. The authority derived from the act of April 16th, having ceased with the completion of the thirty-eight regiments, it became necessary to proceed on orders from the War Department, and on the general powers granted to your Excellency, for the purpose of filling up our quota of the The frequent changes and modifications force required. which these orders have undergone to meet difficulties as they have arisen, have in many instances brought orders issued from this Department in conflict with them, and rendered it a perplexing question to know how to act. the progress of the war difficulties of this nature should be avoided by a more clear understanding and determination of the functions of the State and General Government. Acting for one common purpose, and mutually dependent on each other, there should be no clashing of authority, and no attempt on either side to go beyond the appropriate sphere of its action.

Under section eight of the Constitution, Congress has power "to provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively the appointment of the officers, and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;" also "to provide for calling forth the militia, to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrection and repel invasion."

That it does not require a loose construction of these provisions to make them apply to a force of volunteers, is evident, since such a force must of necessity be drawn from the organized or unorganized militia of the country. The act of Congress for calling out five hundred thousand volunteers, approved July 22d, 1861, is in accordance with this view, and invests the States with important duties.

To the Government clearly belongs the right of determining the number of volunteers to be organized, the plan of their organization, the discipline and drill to which they are to be subjected, and all matters connected with their subsistence, clothing and equipment. Beyond constitutional provisions, this is necessary to insure uniformity when troops are massed in large bodies and acting under a single commander. But the duty of organizing such forces as may be called for by requisition on the Governors, of drilling and disciplining them according to the prescribed rules, of appointing their officers, and of turning them over to the Government service for the specified period, properly rests with the authorities of the several States.

A more strict and uniform recognition of these functions, on the part of the Government would prevent much perplexity and promote the public service. This, however, has not in all cases been done; and the numerous acceptances granted to individuals in this State after the affair at Bull Run, greatly embarrassed the action of the authorities, transferred the appointment of officers to a power outside the State, and created numerous regimental organizations over which no control whatever could be exercised by it The consequence was that no reports were made to this

Department of their progress, nor were they in any sense subject to the rules governing the regular levy. list of acceptances were the names of officers claiming to have served in foreign countries, and whilst it undoubtedly embraced men of real merit, there were others whose claims could be viewed in no other light than those of adventurers. Recruiting parties for these organizations penetrated every part of the State, interfered with the enlistments for the regiments organizing under the regular levy, and seriously retarded its completion. In several instances their actual strength, as shown by inspection, was much less than the footings of their muster rolls-men having been transferred from one company to another in order to swell its numbers. In short the abuses connected with the system, and the embarrassment under which it placed the authorities of the State, led to representations at Washington, that induced the War Department to abandon it, which was done by general orders 71.

In future it should be insisted upon, that for all levies of volunteers from this State, formal requisition be made on the Governor. If this rule be not observed, it will, in the progress of the war, tend to create a suspicion and jealousy of the Federal power. Such a result should be carefully guarded against, for it would impair and perhaps destroy that feeling of mutual confidence, which has enabled the Government to draw from the loyal States an army of more than six hundred thousand volunteers.

A plan which has proved so successful should not be changed on light grounds; and a disposition to ignore the State authorities, of which there have been some indications in recent orders, should be met by a respectful protest, and, if necessary, by positive legislation.

The rule that requisition be made directly on the Governors of States, for such quota of volunteers as may be from time to time required, is no less properly applicable to the recruiting service. It will require a large yearly addition to the regiments now in service, to keep up their present strength, and much more to increase it to the maximum standard. As recruits are drawn from the same source as newly organized regiments, that is, from the militia of the State, requisition should be made for them, or the recruiting officers required to have their authority indorsed by the Governor. Hitherto this branch of the service has been regulated without any reference to the State authorities, and general orders No. 105, from the War Department, formally places it under the exclusive control of Government officers.

There is reason to apprehend that this arrangement will be prejudicial to the service, unless essentially modified. The floating population of our cities and villages, composed of a class inclined to act on impulse and without reflection, has become well nigh exhausted by previous levies, and for the future the army must be recruited in the main from our rural population. With an almost universal determination to sustain the Government existing amongst this portion of our citizens, it may be questioned whether they can be reached by any system such as that laid down in the order referred to. Government must be prepared to meet the scruples and objections of these men—intelligent and reflecting—ready to serve their country, but at the same

time indisposed to surrender the vantage ground, on which the plan of a voluntary service places them. To suppose that they can be induced to enlist voluntarily, without knowing who their officers are to be, and with the understanding that they may be assigned to companies or regiments at pleasure, is inconsistent with the experience of the past, no less than with the views which are known to operate on the mass of our citizens.

For the reason then that general orders 105 ignores the State authorities in matters where their functions are as clearly defined as those of the Government, and because it will be prejudicial to the service by retarding instead of stimulating enlistments, I respectfully recommend that your Excellency request its repeal or modification.

In the organization of the second levy under general orders No. 78, it became necessary in many cases to consolidate companies and regiments, whereby a large number of officers were rendered supernumerary. This arose from a provision of that order allowing a captain and lieutenant to be elected by a company of only 32 men. As it required two or three such companies to complete one of the requisite strength, persons who had spent their time and means in enlisting men were thrown out. This not only caused much hardship, but created an uncertainty as to the position of individuals, which was calculated to dis-To avoid this difficulty in future, courage their efforts. the appointment of officers should be made to conform to the provision of general orders No. 61, War Department, which would make it unnecessary to deprive any officer of his place, except for incompetency.

The subject of an increase of the supply of arms, ordnance and ordnance stores, is one of the highest impor-The danger of a collision with one or more of the governments of Europe, growing out of a derangement of trade and commerce, is becoming manifest. Nor is it less probable that in case of a foreign war, the State will have to fall back on its own resources and apply them in no stinted measure to the defence of coast and frontier. That this may be required of us, has already been announced in official quarters, as it is evident from the slightest consideration of the task which the General Government has in The commencement of the rebellion found our hand. arsenals bare of arms, many of which had been transferred to the South. To replace the inferior weapons with which a large proportion of our forces are armed, will exhaust all the source of supply open to government for an indefinite The same may be said in regard to ordnance and ordnance stores for our forts. It is evident then, that with all the aid Government can render, there will be a wide margin to be filled by the prompt action of the State.

As all the present sources of supply are beyond our reach, and as the foreign market will be uncertain, if not inaccessible to us in the future, the State should encourage the establishment of one or more manufactories of arms and founderies of cannon to be under its exclusive control, and from which we could increase our stock of war material, to a point somewhat commensurate with what may be our necessities in the future.

The following is a concise statement of the ordnance and

Closely connected with the subject of arms, is that of the condition and strength of the fortifications situated within our territorial limits. Although jurisdiction over these belongs exclusively to the Government of the United States, it is none the less a matter of interest that they should be rendered as complete and effective as possible. That such is not their present condition, is admitted; nor, with the immense responsibility resting on the Government, is it possible that they can be made so without a determined and persevering effort on the part of the State. For such a purpose there should be no hesitation in supplying from our own resources all that may be needed in addition to what Government may do; nor would any other course be consistent with a proper regard to the vast interests at stake, and the ease with which a powerful enemy might assail them.

One of the most important duties imposed on the Governors of states by the act of Congress, approved July 22d, is that of filling all vacancies in the ranks of commissioned This duty, responsible under any circumstances, is rendered doubly so from the nature of a volunteer force; the difficulty, and often the impossibility, of applying to it the well defined rules governing the regular service; and the embarrassment which arises from having frequently to act on conflicting recommendations. If promotions could in all cases be made in regular order, without reference to comparative merit or competency, the task would be less difficult. But when men, without any previous military experience, are commissioned and sent into the field, it is not at all uncommon that the subaltern officer in actual service shows a proficiency and an aptitude in the performance of his duties, of which his superiors are wholly deficient. In such cases the good of the service would seem to require that the ordinary rules should be suspended, and

that merit, wherever found, should have its proper recognition and reward.

Whilst, then, it may be best that, as a general regulation, promotions should be made in accordance with the practice in the regular army, this should not prevent such a departure from it in particular cases as strict justice and the interests of the service may require. No officer should be allowed to rest his claims to promotion wholly on his right by seniority; and it should be understood that meritorious conduct may overbalance the accidental advantage of position. This would tend to encourage a spirit of emulation, and a desire for improvement and proficiency which could not fail to elevate the character of the volunteer officer.

In connection with the subject of promotion, I especially recommend that hereafter they be made to field officers regimentally, and to line officers by companies. Nothing so tends to dampen the ardor and discourage the ambition of the soldier as to see the prize, for the possession of which he has put forth his best efforts, snatched from his grasp by some outside competitor. Nor is it a matter of much consequence whether he is supplanted by an aspirant from some other corps, or from civil life. In either case, a stranger steps in and supersedes him; and to the disappointment of failure is added a sense of injury and a feeling of discontent. But if, on the other hand, each company or regiment were considered, with reference to promotion, a distinct body, and all vacancies were filled, as far as practicable, from within the organization, it would remove the apprehension with which outside appointments are regarded, and create a spirit of emulation throughout the rank

and file, by holding out to them such preferment as the chances of war might offer as a reward for soldierly conduct.

To open the door of promotion to the soldier, cannot fail to have a salutary effect on the morale of an army. No longer a mere machine, doomed to an endless routine of duties from which there is no relief, and to a position from which there is no escape, his ambition is stimulated by the hope of preferment, and his resolution strengthened to deserve it, by patience and fortitude under privations, and by bravery and determination in battle. This principle was recognized in the French armies of the time of the republic, and, perfected by Napoleon, it made them irresistible during the consulate and the earlier periods of the The German armies, which had been trained in empire. the school of Frederick the Great, where the utmost rigor of discipline was connected with the most exclusive ideas in regard to promotions, could never contend against such That of Prussia, especially, was almost annihilated at Auerstadt and Jena; nor, until the genius of Blucher and Scharnhorst had been directed to its reorganization on a more liberal basis, did it recover the prestige lost in those great disasters.

In the progress of a war which has called more than one hundred thousand of our citizens from their peaceful pursuits, the organized militia has rendered effective service. Independently of the eleven regiments which proceeded to Washington in April and the early part of May, several have enlisted for the war as distinct organizations, and have become merged in the volunteer force from this State.

The following list gives the militia numbers of these regiments, the names of their commanding officers, as shown by the roster, and the numbers by which they are now designated:

Several important and interesting questions have arisen relating to the *status* of regiments of militia which have volunteered for the war, the rank of officers and the extent to which the militia laws of the State apply to them whilst in service.

These questions were examined by the Judge Advocate General, in an able opinion in the case of a disputed election in company A, 14th regiment N. Y. S. M.; and the following conclusions were arrived at, which will govern the decisions of this Department in parallel cases, unless overruled:

1st. That a militia regiment, entering the service for the

war under a proclamation of the President for volunteers, and not in accordance with the act of 1795, loses for the time its militia character, and is subject to such rules and regulations as may be adopted for the government of a volunteer force. The State can exercise no control over it, beyond that of filling vacancies among its officers.

- 2d. That the resignation of an officer of a militia regiment in the volunteer service vacates his position as a volunteer officer, but not his militia commission, which, on the expiration of the term of service and return of the regiment to the State, would entitle him to his place and rank.
- 3d. It is important that commissions as volunteers should be at once issued to the officers of all militia regiments now in service; and, until they receive them, they retain their position by virtue of their right to claim such commission, rather than on the strength of those they hold in the militia; and, furthermore, as questions of rank are settled by the date of commissions, if a militia commission were recognized in the volunteer service, the person holding it would take precedence over all the volunteer officers of the same grade, which is absurd.

4th. The remains of a militia regiment, where most of the officers and men have volunteered for the war, and left the State, occupies an anomalous position. Its numbers may be so reduced that there can be no compliance with the rules and regulations governing the militia service, nor, in case of insurrection or invasion, would it be possible for such an organization to render effective service. In a case of this kind, the district might be declared vacant, the officers holding commissions rendered supernumerary, and a

new regiment organized. Unless, however, the safety of the State should require such action, the places of these patriotic citizens, absent temporarily and in the service of the government, should be retained for them until their return.

This brief analysis of the opinion of the Judge Advocate General covers most of the questions which have occurred in connection with that portion of the volunteer force from this State, composed of organized militia. That of rank was settled by general order No. 66 from the War Department, which fixes it from the date of muster into the service. This, if adhered to, will render a militia commission valueless for the object for which it has been most prized, and will, it is hoped, induce the officers of these regiments to apply for commissions as volunteers. Since this opinion was given, there have been no militia commissions issued in appointments and promotions for these regiments, and whenever application is made, commissions as volunteers will be issued to the officers, as your Excellency has directed.

The necessity for a re-organization of the militia on a basis essentially different from that provided in the law of 1792, has become apparent. In fact, if we reflect that the date of the act was only a few years subsequent to the war of the Revolution, when the experience gained during a contest of seven years must have been still fresh in the minds of the leading military men of the time, it appears strange that such a law should have been passed. It is a matter of history that General Washington was opposed to it, as a perpetuation of a system which he had frequently denounced whilst in command of the army; nor is it easy

to discover from what causes or under what influences it was adopted. Nearly seventy years have elapsed, and it is still the rule by which the militia forces of the several States are to be governed; its incongruous provisions forming the guide in training them to meet the dangers of insurrection and invasion. If the States could have assumed control over the subject, without interfering with the power of Congress, "to provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia," a radical change would have been made long ago. But with a necessity of confining their action within certain prescribed limits, all attempts at improvement have failed of establishing a system on which we could rest the safety of our institutions with some degree of confidence.

On almost any other subject of importance within the authority of Congress, an expression in favor of a change of existing laws, would have resulted in legislation in accordance with popular opinion. But whilst, on this question, the desire has been for reform and improvement, the expense necessarily connected with any effective plan, the supposed security arising from our isolated position, and the conflicting views as to what should be attempted, have thus far effectually prevented the passage of any complete and comprehensive law on the subject. from these, and other causes, neither the State nor the national government has been able to act, and we are still proceeding under a system which has been found wholly unreliable in every contest in which we have been engaged hitherto, and in the progress of the present rebellion the insufficiency of the militia, as at present organized, for any

exigency requiring a large and properly disciplined army, for a long period of service, has been again and more clearly demonstrated.

At the outset, Government, instead of having at its command an adequate force completely organized, armed and equipped, somewhat disciplined, and lacking only the experience of actual service to make them in every respect efficient and veteran troops, had to create such a force from volunteers drawn from the unorganized mass of our citizen soldiery. The danger and the loss of time consequent on having to organize an army out of raw material, and prepare it for service in the presence of a sudden and pressing danger, is manifest.

If, instead of this, a force adequate to the emergency and equal in all respects to the best of our militia regiments, could have been called out at once, the occasion for its employment might not have arisen. That such might have been the result, is another and a strong reason in favor of such a thorough and radical change in our military system, as shall in the future enable Government not only to act with promptness when necessary, but by the moral effect of an array of citizen soldiers imposing in numbers and complete in every respect for service, render the probability of having to employ them more remote.

On the assumption, then, that the present militia system is inadequate to meet the wants of the Government, we must free it from its present defects, increase our standing army, or employ volunteers. In regard to the first alternative it is only necessary to observe, that whilst the idea of a large standing army is repugnant to the feelings of the

people and in conflict with the character of our institutions, the cost of maintaining it would alone render it impossible to impose such a burden on the country, except by an obliteration of all State lines and the establishment of a consolidated government.

The employment of volunteers, though far less objectionable, is attended with many and serious disadvantages. place in service a force previously organized, completely armed and equipped, and with the various staff appointments properly filled, is of itself a great labor. But, when to this is superadded the task of creating the force itself from the mass of our population, brave, intelligent and patriotic, yet with no previous knowledge of the duties of the soldier, and with few persons of experience to take the position of officers and instructors, the whole becomes a work to accomplish which requires time, large expenditures, and a popular feeling favorable to the service. tory affords no parallel to the unexampled rapidity with which the six hundred thousand volunteers now in service were recruited, armed, equipped and placed at the disposal of the Government; but they were without discipline, and uninstructed in the duties of camp life. These deficiencies have only been overcome at the sacrifice of months of valuable time, which, with a force as well disciplined as the Prussian Landwehr, the French National Guards, or several of our own regiments of militia, might have been employed in active operations. That our army is fast approaching this condition, there is no doubt; but a consideration of what might have been accomplished, had they gone to the field with that knowledge of their duties which it has taken six

months to impart, is perhaps the best reason that can be urged against the policy of substituting a volunteer for an organized force.

In the case of invasion, to rely solely on a newly organized levy, notwithstanding the bravery and patriotism of our citizens, would be attended with much hazard. Should a contest occur with any great maritime power, the blow would follow the declaration too closely in the order of time to allow us to raise and equip armies, to build forts, and to fill our arsenals with the material of war. Enlightened wisdom dictates that all this should be accomplished in a time of peace; and it is no light argument in favor of such a course, that it is the one best calculated to ward off the perils of war. A superiority on the ocean enabled England and France, in 1854, to place a powerful army in the Crimea in a short space of time, and to maintain it there against the immense resources of the Russian govern-The suppression of the rebellion in India is another illustration of the ability of a great naval power to overcome all the obstacles interposed by distance, and, through the means of powerful steamships, to deal sudden and effective blows, against which there would be no adequate protection.

The authority of the State over this important subject, is limited by the Constitution "to training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress." Whilst this is far short of that full and complete jurisdiction which would enable the Legislature to proceed without restraint, it should not prevent such improvements in the law of 1854 as can be adopted without conflicting with the para-

mount authority of the General Government. There can be no doubt of the power of the Legislature to pass an act changing the existing militia law in many essential particulars, and as the action of Congress is uncertain, no time should be lost in making it as complete as circumstances will permit. I respectfully submit the following suggestions for your Excellency's consideration:

1st. The study of tactics and instruction in military drills in our higher schools and academies, by diffusing a knowledge of one important branch of the duties of the soldier, and under circumstances where it could be acquired with but little loss of time, would be of great advantage. The labor required to obtain anything like proficiency in these matters is too great to allow of thorough instruction at the company and regimental drills which take place throughout the State. In a few of our large cities, where a certain degree of esprit du corps is maintained, we find companies and even regiments in every respect well drilled and disciplined, but this is only accomplished at a sacrifice of time which renders it a burden, and which might in a great degree be avoided by making it a part of our school Physically it would be conducive to health, education. and so far from being considered an onerous task, it would be preferred to light and frivolous amusements.

2d. There should be more encouragement given to the formation of new companies in the several arms of service. Out of a total population between the ages of eighteen and forty-five liable to bear arms, of seven hundred and sixty-six thousand, less than twenty thousand compose the whole number of the organized militia of the State. Of sixty-

three regiments, into which this force is divided, more than one-half have nothing beyond a bare organization to distinguish them from the great mass of the unorganized Deficient in arms and accoutrements, no less than militia. in drill and discipline, they are neither prepared to render efficient service in the field, nor to make a creditable appearance at the stated inspections and parades. condition of things arises from no indisposition on the part of our citizens to connect themselves with the militia service, but it is owing to the want of proper encouragement from the State. The cost of maintaining such a military establishment as our safety requires should be a public charge, and yet in consequence of the indifference both of the State and General Government no adequate provision has ever been made for its support. The negligence of the State has been closely imitated by civil officers, and the commutation tax, which should amount to \$300,000 yearly, does not yield \$50,000. The collection of this tax should be enforced by more stringent rules; and, beyond this, there should be a reasonable appropriation annually, to be disbursed under proper checks and restrictions in the payment of such charges as the State is justly and honorably bound to assume. The necessary means for this purpose should be provided by a general tax, on the principle that a military organization of this character is to be considered as a safeguard to life and property whenever a coercion of laws is insufficient. The whole policy, in short, should be changed, and instead of being regarded with indifference, the militia system should be recognized as at once an important and necessary institution, and entitled to as much care as those of a civil character.

3d. How much soever we may admire the elective principle when applied to civil offices, it is questionable whether it can be successfully carried out in a military organization, and one obstacle to the improvement of our militia are the provisions of section two, article eleven of the Constitution of 1846. The perfection of any military system depends on the absolute nature of the authority by which it is controlled-a proposition with which the provision making military officers elective is in direct conflict. No officer who owes his position to the votes of those whom he is to command can act with that paramount regard to the interest of the service, which is necessary to promote its high-Nor is the elective principle any less prejuest success. dicial to the welfare of the soldier. It has been fully demonstrated, that the choice of officers is governed more by personal preferences, than by any regard to real merit or proficiency; and when experience in the field has brought out the real character of the person they have chosen, they find, too often, in place of the experienced officer, thoroughly acquainted with his duties, or at least capable of learning them, a total incapacity, joined to as total a disregard of, and care for his command. Perhaps nothing has been so prejudicial to the volunteer service as the manner of choosing line officers, and it would be equally so with respect to any organization. The convention of 1846 seems to have been in great doubt as to the propriety of extending the principle to military officers, and with commendable caution left open a way of escape, in section six of the same article, which provides "that in case the mode of election and appointment of militia officers hereby directed,

shall not be found conducive to the improvement of the militia, the Legislature may abolish the same and provide by law for their appointment and removal, if two-thirds of the members present in each House shall concur therein."

A modification of the present law, so far as to give the Commander-in-chief the appointment of all officers above the rank of captain, and requiring the choice of line officers to be confirmed by him, would, in my opinion, be a most advantageous change from the present rule.

4th. A change in the manner of appointing officers should be connected with some provision to test their qualifications through an examining board. Although a test of this kind cannot be considered as equally satisfactory with meritorious conduct in actual service, it is far better than no test at all. The officer who can explain and illustrate, theoretically, the movements and evolutions of the company and battalion, will not be likely to fail in carrying them into practice. His theoretical knowledge will at least afford a fair presumption in his favor; and, if he should prove incompetent in the field, it will probably be owing to other causes. But the examination of an officer should not be confined to this one branch of his duties; an acquaintance with those which relate more particularly to the sanitary condition of troops in service, is almost as important as to know how to drill and manœuvre them, and no officer can be considered fully competent for command who does not exhibit some degree of intelligence and information in regard to these.

5th. As proficiency in field exercises, and in the manual of arms, can only be acquired by practice, provision should

be made for the more frequent assembling of companies for drill, and also for the massing of larger bodies for instruction in the movements of battalion and brigades. In the latter case it will be necessary that the camp should be located at some central point in the regimental or brigade district, and as this will remove the troops from their homes and business vocations, both officers and men should be paid whilst on this duty.

6th. Nothing would tend more to promote the formation of new companies and regiments than a liberal distribution of arms. The frequent applications made to this department show that there is a strong inclination amongst a class of our citizens whose business pursuits will not admit of their entering the volunteer service to connect themselves with military associations for home duty. If this inclination were encouraged it would lead to a large increase of the organized militia force. It will be noticed that the aggregate number of rifles and muskets of all descriptions actually distributed to the militia is less than fourteen thousand, an amount so manifestly below what it should be for a State with more than five hundred thousand men capable of bearing arms, that the most prompt means should be taken to increase our supply for the purpose of issuing them to newly formed organizations, and to complete the arming of those already formed.

7th. If, with such encouragement as can be offered by the State, the number of companies and regiments should not be largely increased, under the law of 1854, provision should be made to increase the number of regimental districts, and to organize therein one hundred regiments, including those now formed. This would constitute no

larger force than should be readily furnished from an aggregate population of four millions, nor would it be larger than may be required to protect our exposed frontiers from invasion.

Should the expense of collecting so large a force for instruction by regiments and brigades be considered an objection to the plan, the new regiments might be organized for the present on the basis of ten companies of thirty-two men each. This would give a skeleton formation which could be filled up by draft whenever necessary, having meanwhile its full staff, which is indispensable to the efficiency of any military organization.

In the consideration of any plan for the re-organization of the militia as a government measure, an examination of the best European systems will be not only useful, but indispensable. Much will be found that is inapplicable under a government like that of the United States, but out of the whole, a system could be devised much more effective than the law of 1792, free from its defects, and within such limits in regard to the cost of maintaining it, as would remove all objections on that score, except such as are based on a most unwise economy. If the idea of a military establishment, kept up at the public expense, in a time of profound peace, is opposed to our national prejudices, the spectacle of the capital of a great nation in imminent peril of being occupied by rebels, for want of a few thousand disciplined troops to defend it, is equally opposed to our national pride. We must accept either the one or the other of two alternatives; submit to the necessity of a military organization throughout the country, or to the

danger consequent on an entire want of preparation to meet exigencies as they arise.

The objections to a large standing army, on the one hand, or to a volunteer force on the other, if they have any weight, leave but one other alternative—an organized and disciplined militia. How effective a militia force can be made for offensive as well as defensive operations, was shown in the case of the Prussian Landwehr, which served in the allied a my, in 1813, with all the steadiness of veteran The interval between the peace of Tilsit and the coalition against France in 1813, had been employed in silently organizing the mass of the population into a military force, not only formidable in numbers, but effective in discipline. The result of the campaign of 1813 showed that such an organization could be made exceedingly formidable even for offensive operations; nor is there any reason to doubt that, had it existed in 1806, the prostration of the Prussian monarchy, after the battle of Jena, could not have been so easily and rapidly accomplished.

In the reports of the Crimean Commission is the following clear and concise statement of this admirable military organization:

"The organization is based on the principle that every able-bodied man is bound to serve in defence of his country, (fatherland) and that the army is the great school of military instruction for the whole nation. In conformity with this principle, the land forces of Prussia are composed of four classes, viz:

- 1. The standing army.
- 2. The Landwehr (militia) of the first ban.
- 3. The Landwehr of the second ban.
- 4. The Landsturm, or 'levy en masse.'

- "1. The standing army consists of all the able-bodied men of twenty years of age, who serve three years.
- "2. The Landwehr of the first ban comprises all the men from twenty to thirty-two years old, not belonging to the standing army. It constitutes an army of reserve to reinforce and co-operate with the standing army for all service in time of war. This force is completely organized and equipped, and is embodied twice a year for instruction, sometimes by battalions, sometimes to join the regular troops in the great maneuvers and exercises. Their arms, clothing and equipments are kept in storehouses provided for them, and a few officers and men of each battalion and squadron are retained permanently in service to take care of the depot.
- "3. The Landwehr of the second ban is composed of the men from thirty-two to forty years of age who do not belong to the standing army. This force forms the garrisons of fortresses in time of war, or it may be called to the support of the active army of operations. It is not called out in time of peace.
- "4. The Landsturm embraces all the men from seventeen to fifty years of age who are not included in the three other classes. The force is not regularly organized, and would only be called out in case of invasion, for the defence of the country in the last resort."

It will be seen that the effective character of the Prussian militia is due, in a great degree, to the three years' service in the regular army. From this rule there are few exemptions, and the Landwehr is thus rendered an effective and disciplined body, and a knowledge of military affairs is

diffused throughout the mass of the population. On the return of Napoleon from Elba, in 1815, there were one hundred and fifty thousand infantry and twenty thousand cavalry, of the Landwehr, under arms, and the reports before referred to give the total force of the first and second ban on the war establishment as follows:

This constitutes a larger body of thoroughly disciplined militia, in proportion to population, than exists under any other government in Europe; and when to this is added the Landsturm, embracing all persons from seventeen to fifty years of age, not enrolled in the regular army, or in the Landwehr of the first or second ban, the aggregate presents a force so formidable in numbers and discipline as to justify the observation, that whilst for offensive operations Prussia may be inferior to other first class powers, she is invulnerable within her own borders.

The efficiency of the Prussian Landwehr, owing as it is in a great degree to a preparatory training in the regular army, could not probably be imparted to our militia, nor would it be practicable to adopt and maintain such a military code, as a whole, under any other than a monarchical form of government. There are, however, a great many provisions about it, which should not be lost sight of in any comprehensive law on the subject of our militia. The principle that the safety of the State requires that every able bodied man between certain ages should be instructed in the duties of the soldier; the military schools; the division of the whole population into classes or bans according to age; the staff organization; thorough instruction in the use of arms; frequent drills, and the massing of battalions and brigades for instruction, are all features of great importance, and applicable to any system.

The Swiss militia resembles in many respects that of Prussia. It constitutes the only military force, there being no standing army, and with a total population of less than three millions, numbers over one hundred and seventy-five thousand men, classified as follows:

1st. The Elite, which takes the place of a regular force, and includes all persons liable to bear arms between twenty and thirty-five years of age.

2d. The Reserve, including all persons between the ages of thirty-five and forty.

3d. The Landwehr, including all persons between the ages of forty and forty-five.

4th. The Levy-in-masse, or Landsturm, which is not organized, and is only called out in great emergencies.

The discipline and proficiency of this force is maintained by a theoretical instruction in schools, and by frequent drills and exercises: The basis of the whole system is the supreme authority of the Federal Government, and the duty of all citizens between certain ages to perform military service. As a consequence there are few exemptions, so that notwithstanding the smallness of the population, an army formidable in numbers, no less than in discipline, is at all times in a state of preparation. This was shown in 1846, on the revolt of the seven cantons and the formation of the Sonderbund, when the Federal Government was able to march over one hundred thousand of the militia of the loyal cantons into the rebellious districts, and in a campaign of less than a month re-establish its authority and restore order. Again in 1856, on the prospect of a war with Prussia, an army of two hundred thousand men, completely armed and equipped, was called out to defend the country from invasion.

These references are made simply to draw attention to the fact that, should Congress take up the subject, there will be no necessity of adopting an untried scheme. A noble system of military training and discipline could be founded on the basis of those prevailing under European governments; nor would it be difficult to assimilate many of their more important features to the form of our institutions and the character of our population. A standing army equal to any emergency will never be tolerated under the existing state of things, whilst we have daily evidence that one no larger than the present is of but small account, so far as numbers are concerned, in a contest where a single State sends one hundred thousand men to the field. consider it in the future as a school of instruction, drawing its pupils from the several States by draft and according to population, for a service of two years, would be one of the best features in any plan for re-organizing the militia.

It is to be hoped that Congress will give to this subject that prompt and careful consideration which its importance demands. Whilst the Legislatures of the several States can do much to improve their military organizations under the law of 1792, they should not lose sight of the fact that Congress alone possesses that full jurisdiction over the subject which is necessary to give the country a complete and uniform system, and its action should be invoked by appropriate resolutions.

In closing this report, I desire to acknowledge my obligations to my predecessor, General J. Mer'edith Read, Jr., through whose unremitting exertions the great increase in the business of this Department had been arranged and systematised; to Col. Duncan Campbell, Assistant Adjutant General, who has been charged with the duties connected with the militia, and especially to Col. George Bliss, Jr., Acting Assistant Adjutant General, on duty in the city of New York, for the great assistance he has rendered in the organization of the large force placed in service from that part of the State. Nor should I omit to commend to the favorable notice of your Excellency the clerks employed in this Department, who have all manifested the utmost zeal and devotion to the service, in the arduous duties which have been necessarily thrown upon them.

It remains for me to submit, for the information of your Excellency, a list of the tables and statements accompanying this report.

Schedule A contains a detailed statement of the arms and accoutrements in the hands of the troops, and also such as are in the arsenals of the State.

B and C show the amount of commutation collected throughout the State, and the mode and extent of its disbursement by the military auditing boards.

D gives the returns of brigade inspectors so far as they have been received.

E contains a list of the companies which have been organized during the year, the date of organization, the arm of service, and the name of the commandant.

F gives the returns of boards of supervisors, or persons liable to military duty.

SCHEDULE G.

Head-Quarters, First Division, N. Y. S. M. NEW YORK, December 30th, 1861.

Brig. Gen. HILLHOUSE, Adj't General N. Y. S. M.:

General.—I have the honor to report that I have held two parades of this division only, during the present year, in the city of New York, one on the 22d of February last, at which the Commander-in-chief and the general staff of the State were present, and the other upon the 25th of November last. An officers' meeting, for military improvement, was held on the 22d of January last, and two other meetings ordered for the 24th and 30th instant, were necessarily countermanded in consequence of the occupation of the drill rooms by munitions of war, and the large amount of extra duty performed by the division.

During the present year, a number of regiments of this division have been engaged in actual service by the authority of the Commander-in-chief, under requisitions from the President of the United States, viz.: On the 17th of April, 1861, I issued orders for the Seventh regiment, N. Y. S. M., to embark for Washington; on the 19th of April, I issued orders for the 6th, 12th and 71st regiments, to embark for the same place; on the 20th of April, for the 8th and 69th regiments to embark for Annapolis; on the 24th, the 79th regiment was directed to hold themselves in readiness, and were subsequently embarked for Washington; on the 27th, the 5th regiment was ordered to embark for Annapolis, and the 2d and 55th to go into camp and prepare for embarkation. The 2d regiment went into camp upon the Battery, and subsequently embarked without orders.

All these regiments, except the 7th and 2d, were mustered into the service of the United States for three months, and served creditably for that period.

The 7th regiment served at Washington and in Virginia for one month, and was honorably discharged, and the 2d regiment was mustered into the United States' service for three years or during the war.

The 9th and 79th regiments, N. Y. S. M., have also been mustered into the United States' service for three years or during the war.

This division has, therefore, furnished ten full regiments for the service of the United States, six of which were embarked within three days after the receipt of the requisition from Washington.

On the 21st of May, I reported in person, with my staff, to the the President and Lt. General Scott at Washington, and was by General Orders of the 22d of May, placed in command of the militia and volunteer regiments from the State of New York.

On the 24th of May, under orders of Lieut. Gen. Scott, I took command of a detachment which crossed the Potomac, and took possession of Arlington Heights, Alexandria, and the adjacent country.

This detachment consisted of the 5th, 7th, 8th, 12th, 25th, 28th and 69th N. Y. S. M., the 11th New York Volunteers, the 1st Michigan and three New Jersey regiments, three companies of cavalry, one battery of light artillery, and one company of sappers and miners; and the movement was eminently successful. The whole force was immediately engaged in throwing up entrenchments on the Virginia side of the Potomac, which have ever since been in possession of our forces.

On the 25th, I issued a proclamation to the people of Virginia, which was first submitted to and approved by the President and his Cabinet.

On the 28th of May, General McDowell having been appointed, by the War Department, to the command of the Department of Virginia, I was relieved and returned to my command in the city of Washington.

This command was now from time to time increased by the arrival of the New York Volunteers, until, on the 4th of July, I paraded 23,000: n of the New York Volunteers and Militia, before the President and General Scott.

On the 6th of July, at the request of Lieut. Gen. Scott and the Cabinet, who were impatient at the delays of Major General Paterson, I consented to waive rank to that officer, and take command of a division under him, on the Upper Potomac. I sent off that evening, the 19th and 28th regiments N. Y. V., and left the next day with the 5th and 12th N. Y. S. M., for Hagerstown, Maryland, via. Harrisburgh, crossed the Potomac at Williamsport at sundown on the 9th of July, and after marching all night, arrived at Martinsburgh, Virginia, at daylight on the 10th of July. I here reported to General Paterson, and took command of a division of 8,000 men, principally of New York regiments.

On the 15th of July, the army advanced from Martinsburg to Bunker's Hill, a village about ten miles from Winchester, where the rebels, about 20,000 men, under General Johnson, were there encamped; our whole force being about 22,000.

Preparations were here made for an advance on Winchester, and pickets were thrown forward, and a road opened by my orders, so as to flank the enemy's camp at Winchester, and interpose our army between the enemy and the Shenandoah river. But after midnight, on the morning of the 17th of July, I received orders from General Paterson to march at 3 A. M. upon Charlestown, 22 miles from Winchester, covering the march of the residue of his army to that point.

This movement was effected, and on the same day, at one o'clock P. M., General Johnson, with 8,000 men, left his camp at Winchester, forded the Shenandoah river, and arrived at Manassas on the 19th of July; and the residue of his army (except the sick and wounded) left the next day and arrived on Sunday during the battle of Bull Run.

From Charlestown, General Paterson retreated, on the 21st of July, to Harper's Ferry, and on the 25th of July (being honorably discharged) took leave of the army, and was succeeded in the command of the department by Major General Banks, who, on the 28th of July, retreated into Maryland.

On the 29th of July, I was relieved from duty in this department at my own request, and proceeded to my command at Washington, where I continued until my term of service expired on the 15th of August, when I returned to New York, and resumed the command of the First Division.

I have been since engaged in re-organizing my division which if supplied with arms and equipments could now parade 6,000 effective men exclusive of the regiments still in the field.

All which is respectfully submitted.

HEAD QUARTERS, 5TH DIVISION N. Y. S. M., ONEONTA, Nov. 9th, 1861.

To Brig. Gen. Thomas Hillhouse, Adju't. Gen. N. Y. S. M.:

Sir—I hereby report that on the 9th and 10th days of May last, at Cooperstown, I caused to be held the meeting of general officers, field officers, division, staff, and brigade inspectors of this division, as required by the regulations, and thereat examined the system of tactics directed to be pursued in this State, making illustrations of the movement, and explaining the application of such movements to the evolutions of the line.

At said meeting the officers caused a circular to be printed, directed to the assessors of the several towns in said division, reminding them of their duty in regard to the enrolment, and the result is, that a far better enrolment has been made by them than during any previous year.

And I also report that I ordered a brigade drill of the officers, and non-commissioned officers, and musicians under the command of Brig. Gen. Bassett, at Oneonta, on the 19th and 20th days of September last, and superintended the instruction of the same.

Capt. Atwood of the United States engineers generously consented to act as instructor, and rendered us very valuable service.

The brigade improved in the exercise in a decided manner, and I reviewed the said 12th brigade accompanied by my staff, armed, equipped and mounted.

Also, that I have attended the parades of the regiments in the 18th brigade, under the command of Brig. Gen. Danforth, at Middleburgh and Cherry Valley, superintended the instruction in the 39th and 40th regiments, and reviewed the same accompanied by my staff.

I also report that I have attended the annual parade of the 19th brigade, under the command of Gen. Petrie, with the division staff at Berwick, Chenango county, on the first days of October last past, and that I reviewed that brigade.

And, I also add, that at the close of the review in the 39th regiment, the regiment at the request of Col. Shaul unanimously agreed to volunteer their services during the present war, and are now in camp at Cherry Valley.

Also, the 19th brigade voted to enlist during the war, and petitioned the Commander-in-chief to establish a branch depot within the limits of said division, so that said brigade by regiments could be mustered into the service of the United States.

Although our ranks have been thinned by enlistment into the service of the Government, and it is not beyond dispute that the organization of the militia has furnished more and better recruits for the service than from any other source, still our organization in this division is complete, and all are ready and anxious to obey the order of the Government, and rally to the support of the Constitution and laws, and to crush out the most wicked and outrageous rebellion that ever existed in any country.

To Brigadier General Thomas Hillhouse,

Adjutant General, Albany:

SIR—I have the honor to send with this the report of Colonel Louis Burger of the 5th regiment, made this day. It is so full and explicit, that I deem it due to that meritorious and efficient officer to submit it to your inspection entire.

The 5th, like all the regiments of the 1st division that have left the city, is now re-organizing and promises to be one of the best in the State.

On the 21st April, the 6th and 12th regiments left for Washington, and performed duties similar to that of the 5th. I have directed Major Rathbun of the 6th, and Col. Ward of the 12th, who were with their regiments, while in the service of the United States to report, but have not yet received them.

The call of the President for volunteers, not including cavalry or artillery; the 4th regiment, containing both these arms, is the only regiment in the brigade that has not done duty in the service of the general Government; many of its members are, however, now in the service as officers, non-commissioned officers and privates. The guns and harness were in the latter part of April sent with the various stores of the State towards Washington; its gun-room appropriated as a kitchen leaving to the regiment neither arms to drill with, or rooms to drill in. The duties performed have necessarily been limited to such as could be done dismounted, and

the instructions to those movements laid down in the last "annual course of instruction for infantry." The practice thus forced upon them has been of great benefit, and the artillery companies would not hesitate to compete in the battalion movements with most of the infantry regiments in the 1st division.

The second brigade has furnished its full quota of officers and men for the service of the general Government. Brigadier General Yates was early detached, and the brigade deprived of its proper head, and its indefatigable and accomplished instructor, when his experience was most wanted by his command. Of its field officers, Colonel Butterfield of the 12th now commands a brigade on the Potomac; Colonel Pinckney of the 6th, and Lieutenant Colonel Zook of the same, each command regiments in the United States volunteers. Of the brigade staff, Brigade Major Alford, Engineer Hubbell, and Captain Allcock are likewise in the service as field officers. Surgeon Mott is engaged in the medical department of the United States. Thus leaving of the field and staff of the brigade, but two field, and two staff officers, who are not now doing, or have done duty in the service of the people in suppressing the present unnatural rebellion.

Gen. Thos. Hillhouse, Adj't Gen. of the State of New York:

Gen.—I have the honor to transmit to you, this, my annual report for the year 1861. In pursuance of orders issued by me in January last, the arms and equipments of the brigade were carefully inspected, and placed in the best possible condition for immediate service. During the winter, in addition to the weekly drills, extra meetings were had for military instruction by each company, and enlisting orders were extensively circulated throughout the district under my command. To the call of the General Government, for troops, in the early part of last spring, sixteen hundred and twenty-seven members of the Seventh brigade N. Y. S. M., patriotically responded. In April last, in compliance with orders to be in readiness to march to the seat of war at

twelve hours' notice, the several regiments comprising this brigade repaired with alacrity to their respective places of rendezyous, and awaited with impatience, and for weeks, the signal for their departure to the scene of action. Through the liberality of patriotic citizens, uniforms, blankets, knapsacks, and such equipments as could not be obtained from the arsenals of the State, were furnished to the troops. Provision was made for the support of the families of those who were expected to be called from home to the battle field, and a large number of those who were in the ranks of the brigade entirely discontinued their business avocations, and devoted themselves to preparations for a campaign in the service of their country. The alacrity and unanimity with which our military forces responded to the requisition of the President of the United States speedily furnished to the service a much larger number of troops than the quota required from this State, and unsuccessful efforts were made to have accepted the services of all the regiments then in readiness for the war. determination of the General Government to receive no more than the specified quota from this State caused general dissatisfaction. The non-acceptance of the regiments of my command seemed for a time to paralyze the whole brigade, and induced the formation of a committee to visit the Commander-in-chief, and solicit his personal influence on our behalf. The reply of the authorities at Washington to the telegraphic dispatch of his Excellency dispelled all expectations of an early acceptance by brigade or regiment, and resulted in the temporary transfer of companies and individual members of the brigade to organizations already in the field. Of the companies thus transferred I trust it will not be deemed improper for me to make particular mention of the Parmenter riflemen, Company L., of the 19th regiment, N. Y. S. M. This company to the number of sixty was transferred to the 71st regiment, N. Y. S. M., and assumed the position of Company I, in that corps, and was placed under the command of Capt. A. V. H. Ellis, an excellent and courageous officer, and most estimable citizen. At the battle of Bull Run, this company distinguished itself as an howitzer corps, and rendered efficient service as appears from the official reports of General Burnside and others. At this unfortunate battle, the Parmenter riflemen lost five in killed and wounded. There are now forty of this noble band at the seat of war. Other companies and individuals from my command have taken an active part in the present war, and it is with feelings of pride that I report that nine hundred and sixteen enrolled members of my command are now in the service of the United States at the seat of war, of which number thirty-three are commissioned officers, as will more fully appear by reference to the returns of the Brigade Inspector.

In pursuance of paragraph 535, of the General Regulations for the military forces of the State of New York, the field officers and brigade staff officers of the Seventh brigade, N. Y. S. M., were called together for theoretic instruction at Peekskill, in the county of Westchester, on the second and third days of October last. The result of the meeting was highly satisfactory.

On the first day of October last I issued the following General Orders, viz.:

STATE OF NEW YORK. Head Quarters, Seventh Brigade, N. Y, S. M., Newburgh, October 1, 1861.

General Orders, No. 27.

The several regiments comprising the Seventh brigade of the Second division of the Militia of the State of New York, are hereby ordered to parade uniformed, armed and equipped, as the law directs, for the purpose of discipline, and for inspection and review, and for the practice of such course of instruction as may be prescribed by the Commander-in-chief, for the year 1861, as follows, viz.:

The 17th regiment at Haverstraw, in the county of Rockland, on the 24th day of October, 1861.

The 18th regiment at Sing Sing, in the county of Westchester, on the 25th day of October, 1861.

The 19th regiment at Newburgh, in the county of Orange, on the 22d day of October, 1861.

The regimental line will form at nine o'clock, A. M.

The parade ground and place of rendezvous of each regiment will be selected by the respective commandants thereof.

Members of the brigade engaged in the active service of the United States, will be excused from attendance at the above prescribed parades. The number of such absentees, and those absent from other causes, will be reported to the Brigade Inspector by the commandant of each regiment respectively, at the close of each parade.

The alacrity with which the military forces of the Empire State responded in April last, to the call of the general Government for troops to suppress treason and rebellion is worthy of praise; and the non-acceptance, at that time, of the regiments composing this brigade, and the many other regiments which were then in readiness for service, in addition to the quota required from this State, is a source of general regret. patch of the Commander-in-chief to the President of the United States, "that one hundred regiments could be mustered into the service easier than one could be repressed," and the fact that every regiment in the State, whether accepted or not as a corps, has furnished volunteers to the war, should be remembered with The large number transferred temporarily from the regiments composing the seventh brigade to the regiments forming the quota accepted from this State, has necessarily reduced its numerical strength and should stimulate each officer and soldier of the brigade to renewed efforts to place it in a position to speedily respond with full ranks to the present demands of our afflicted country.

Commandants of regiments are charged with the due promulgation of these orders and will make returns thereof according to law.

In obedience to the foregoing orders, the 18th and 19th regiments paraded, and were reviewed by myself and staff, and were duly inspected. As the Commander-in-chief did not prescribe any course of instruction for the year 1861, the evolutions prescribed for the years 1858, 1859 and 1860, were practiced by both regiments with precision and accuracy, and to the satisfaction of the reviewing officers, and a large number of spectators. Colonels Ryder and Brown are experienced and accomplished officers, and to their active exertions is the present prosperity and military proficiency of their respective regiments in a great measure attributable.

On the 22d of October last, it was ascertained that the commandant of the 17th regiment had been absent from his regimenmental district several weeks, and that the orders for parade had been but partially served. I therefore countermanded the orders for the regimental parade of this regiment, and directed it to be inspected by company. The result of the inspection of this regiment was very creditable.

Gen. THOMAS HILLHOUSE, Adj. Gen. N. Y. S. M.:

Sir.—In compliance with paragraph 527 General Regulations, the undersigned respectfully reports:

That he regrets being obliged to state that the commandants of regiments in this brigade have neglected to furnish the report contemplated by said paragraph.

In April last, the 20th regiment, commanded by Col. George W. Pratt, was ordered to proceed to the seat of war. The ranks were filled up to eight hundred men, and they were mustered into the U. S. service for three months.

At the expiration of their time, they returned home and were honorably discharged.

In September, the regiment was ordered to reorganize for three years or during the war. In just six weeks the ranks were filled up to one thousand men. They left Kingston for the seat of war, on the 25th of October. They are now stationed in the front lines of the army of the Potomac, (on Upton's Hill) ready to aid in putting down this great and unjust rebellion at anytime the order is given to advance.

Col. Wright, commanding the 21st regiment, resigned in May last, and Lieut. Col. Cooper was elected Colonel.

Colonel Cooper has since gone to the war as surgeon of the Ira Harris' cavalry. The regiment is now without a colonel.

Gen. Thos. Hillhouse, Adjutant General:

Dear Sir—In obedience to paragraph 527, General Regulations, the undersigned has the honor to report:

That he has not received from the commandants of regiments the reports contemplated in said paragraph.

That he was present at the parade of the 24th regiment for officer drill, inspection and review.

That he witnessed several of the evolutions in the school of the battalion, all of which were creditably executed.

Col. Crandall has been recently elected to his present position, and is a most promising officer. I was surprised at his perfect familiarity with the minute details of the different movements. I find it impossible to particularize in the conduct of the line officers and their commandants, as each was attentive and performed his duty with promptness. The regiment turned out, in numbers, full as well as I could expect, for the reason that Col. Carr, the brigade major, and many other prominent officers, including almost three full companies and their company officers, had enlisted in a volunteer regiment for the war.

The undersigned ordered the parades of the 29th and 30th regiments to parade by companies instead of by regiments, for the reason that those two regiments have been cut to pieces very

much, in consequence of many of their officers and members of the several companies have enlisted for the war, of which reports will probably be made by the commanding officers to the Adjutant General.

The 29th regiment, as I have been informed, are entirely without arms and equipments.

The 30th regiment, commanded by Col. Crocker, have a few arms and equipments in their possession, but in very bad condition, and but very few, if any, fit for active service. Colonel Crocker is now re-organizing his regiment for the war.

The arms and equipments of the 24th regiment are all in a miserable condition, none of them fit for actual service. About one hundred of the arms have been used by the volunteer regiments quartered at this place; and used for guard duty, which have been rendered entirely useless.

Sir—Pursuant to General Regulations, paragraph 527, I have the honor to report:

That the commandants of the regiments under my command have neglected to report to me as required by law and regulations.

That the undersigned did in General Order No. 2, issued August 19, 1861, require the 33d regiment to rendezvous, October 1st, for the purpose of drill, review and inspection; and the 34th regiment to rendezvous on the 3d day of October, for like purpose.

That in Special Order No. 13, I required the field and brigade staff officers to meet on the 13th day of October for theoretic instruction.

That in consequence of the 33d regiment having volunteered for the war under the proclamation of the Commander-in-chief, and having been appointed to the command of a branch depot of volunteers at Ogdensburgh, I did in Special Order No. 16, countermand so much of General Order No. 2, and Special Order No 13, as related to the 33d regiment.

That the 34th regiment under command of Col. Charles Durkee, did in conformity with General Order No. 2, rendezvous at

Moira, and were inspected by the brigade inspector.

That the brigade staff officers were ordered to report at Camp Wheeler, the head-quarters at Ogdensburgh, and did so report, where they gained much valuable experience in camp duty and instruction in tactics, theoretically and practically.

That the 33d regiment is now merely a skeleton, mostly officers

and privates having gone to the seat of war.

That the 34th regiment is now being recruited for the war, also in camp at Malone, being a branch of Albany depot of volunteers, and under the command of your obedient servant,

To Brig. Gen. Thomas Hillhouse, Adj. Gen. State of New York:

General.—In obedience to orders from the Major General commanding the first division, pursuant to paragraph 774 of the Regulations, the undersigned made the annual inspection of the 1st and 2d brigades, the inspectors thereof being absent, and the following is his report of the same, as well as that of the 4th brigade, to which he is regularly attached.

The first regiment of cavalry under command of Major Robert Holt, had a total present at inspection, of 59, officers and privates; returned as absent, 178, officers and privates, 100 of which formed a detachment in U. S. service, under command of

Lt. Col. Devin; since returned.

Owing to the crippled condition of the regiment at inspection, but few movements were attempted. Enough were made, however, to show that Major Holt was more familiar with his duties than the line officers were with theirs; as a consequence, the men were indifferently drilled, There were three captains and six lieutenants present. No return was made of arms and accountrements; their pistols and sabres were in good condition and belong to the State.

The 2d regiment, Col. G. W. B. Tompkins commanding, was inspected at Poolesville, Maryland, on the 19th of October,

consisted of ten infantry companies, and composed of three field, five staff, 6 non-commissioned staff officers, eight captains, seventeen lieutenants, 810 sergeants, corporals and privates, making the total strength of the regiment 849.

The third regiment, cavalry, was inspected on the 16th of October. It was in command of the senior captain, Budke, an officer of experience and familiar with his duties, as were the officers generally. The whole number present was 167, and consisted of 4 staff officers, 6 captains, 14 lieutenants, 25 sergeants, 13 corporals, and 105 privates. The absentees were 2 captains, 7 lieutenants, 23 sergeants and corporals, and 135 privates, 100 of which formed a detachment in service of U. S. at Washington. The uniforms, arms and equipments of the regiment, were in excellent condition. One half of the sabres belong to the State. For three years this regiment has been without a major, at which the line officers present expressed much regret, and requested me to report it, and ask that orders directing the post to be filled be issued.

The 71st regiment, infantry, commanded by Col. Henry P. Martin, consists of eight companies, and had present, exclusive of a band of 24 pieces, a total of 417 officers, non-commissioned officers and privates, which was nearly in as great force as at the last annual inspection in 1860. This is undoubtedly one of the best drilled regiments in the militia service, if not the best, to which and its excellent discipline, was the Georgia regiment indebted at the battle of Manassas, for its decimation. An officer of the 79th regiment stated to the undersigned, that while waiting orders to make a forward movement, he climbed to the top of a tree on the edge of a piece of woods that overlooked that part of the battle-field occupied by the 71st. He said he "never felt such a glow of pride for the city of New York and his adopted country, as when he witnessed the terrible fire of this regiment, or the coolness with which it advanced in line of battle and halting to deliver its fire." "At each discharge," he said, he could see "numbers of the opposing regiment fall, never to rise again." The arms of this regiment were truly in splendid condition, forming a marked contrast to those of a regiment belonging to another brigade, and no less distinguished for the valor it displayed at Manassas.

The 73d regiment was inspected at Staten Island on the 19th of October. It consists of five companies only, four of which

were inspected. Three were infantry companies, and one a rifle company. The total present, exclusive of a band, was 70. The number of guns inspected was 59. They belong to the State, and were in a dirty, and generally in an unserviceable condition. This regiment has not improved in numbers or discipline since the last inspection. No battalion movements were attempted, the colonel, Ray Tompkins, giving as a reason, that he could not perform any. The infantry companies A, D and F, have one style of uniform, and the rifle company G another, which it declines to abandon.

The 1st, 2d, 3d, 71st and 73d regiments comprise the 1st brigade, and is commanded by Brigadier General C. B. Spicer, who with his staff, appropriately uniformed, were inspected with the 71st regiment.

The 2d brigade, Brigadier General Charles Yates, commanding; but under temporary command of Colonel Hincken, consists of the 4th, 5th, 6th and 12th regiments.

The 4th artillery, Colonel Hincken, had at inspection a total present of 169, this included the field and staff. Returned as absent two officers and 61 privates, making the total strength of the regiment 232. Its battery having been taken for service in the field, no return of arms or equipment was made.

The 5th regiment, under command of Lieutenant Colonel L. Burger, since elected colonel, was inspected on the 17th of October, and had present one field, five staff, and six non-commissioned staff officers, a detachmect of sappers and miners, 10; 22 captains and lieutenants, 49 sergeants and corporals, 14 drumers, and 238 privates. Total present 331. Absent one captain, seven lieutenants, 23 sergeants and corporals, 159 privates. Total 190. The united strength is 521. The arms belong to the State and were in fair condition only, of which they return possession of 372. The equipments are private property, and are considerably worn, particularly knapsacks, which will require renewal, as well as their uniforms, which were almost entirely worn out in the United States service at Washington.

The 6th regiment was not inspected.

The 12th regiment was duly inspected on the 24th of October, it having previously met for that purpose on the 18th, but owing to a misunderstanding, the inspector was not present. The 12th did not turn out as stroughly as it would, had there not been a regiment forming by several of the former officers at the time,

which prevented a number of its members from being present. As an evidence of this, I will mention that five of its nine companies had a total present of 45, while the whole number present was 160, consisting as follows: Field and staff 4, non-commissioned staff 3, captains 6, lieutenants 7, sergeants and corporals 35, drummers 4, privates 110. The whole number absent was 216. In the grade of privates the absentees were 60 per cent. in excess of the privates present. One company G, contributed 67 of its number to the volunteer regiments that have been formed since the return of the 12th, all acting in the capacity of line and non-commissioned officers, and proving that the militia training they had previously received, with three months experience in actual service, eminently qualified them for the new positions they have assumed. The arms of this regiment belong to the State, and were not in as good condition as desirable, except those of company I, Bvt. Col. Raynor commanding, which were in the same excellent condition as at the last annual inspection. This company does everything well. uniforms and equipments are in fair condition-except the knapsacks, which were worn out in the United States service at Washington. Three hundred and sixty-five are returned as the number of muskets in the hands of the regiment. Since the inspection, the Lieut. Col., Ward then commanding, has been elected colonel. This officer will bring the present 12th regiment to more efficiency and strength than the original 12th ever attained, and will make it one of the best regiments in the 1st division.

The regiments composing the 4th brigade are the 11th, Col. Maidhof; 22d, Col. Munroe; 69th, Col. Corconan; 79th, Col.

The 11th regiment was inspected on the 14th of October, and consisted of 10 rifle companies. There were present at inspection 2 field, 3 staff and 3 non-commissioned staff officers; a detachment of sappers and miners, 8; 9 captains; 19 lieutenants; 68 sergeants and corporals; 12 drummers; 5 buglers, and 282 privates; total, 411. Returned as absent, 2 lieutenants; 7 sergeants and corporals; 3 drummers; 1 bugler, and 110 privates; total absent, 123. The aggregate strength of the regiment is 534. Quite a number of the absentees have joined the volunteer regiments in various capacities. Company A, Capt. Dimon, alone contributing 27. A number of movements were creditably performed, establishing the fact that its present colonel understands

how battalion movements should be made. The companies return 600 rifles, with bayonets, as in their possession, but belonging to the State. The 350 inspected were in good order. The accourrements, in good order, consisted of 312 cartridge boxes, 512 bayonet scabbards, 529 waist belts and plates, and 525 cap pouches. Three of the companies were without cartridge boxes, and six companies were without knapsacks, which they are waiting for the State to furnish them.

The 22d regiment is newly organized and made its first parade on the occasion of its first annual inspection on the 19th of October. It consists of six companies fully uniformed, armed and equipped. It had present 2 field, 2 staff and 4 non-commissioned staff officers, 5 captains, 10 lieutenants, 20 sergeants, 17 corporals, 11 drummers and 218 privates; total present, 289, exclusive of a band of 25 pieces. The arms, 500 Enfield rifles and sword bayonets, and 300 full equipments are all private property, Owing to a severe rain that commenced falling it was impossible for the colonel to perform the movements that would have been made. Sufficient was performed, however, to show that the confidence of the officers electing him was not misplaced.

From the exhibition that was made in their drill in the manual, and the few battalion movements that were made, it is perfectly safe to say that this regiment will soon rival the most celebrated militia regiments of the country.

The 69th regiment was inspected on the 18th of October at their drill room in Essex market.

It is composed of 1 cavalry and 9 infantry companies, and had 1 field, 3 staff, 3 non-commissioned staff officers, a detachment of 8 sappers and miners, 4 captains, 16 lieutenants, 52 sergeants and corporals, 2 drummers and 180 privates present, making a total of 296 present. The absentees were 1 colonel, (Corcoran,) 2 captains, 6 lieutenants, 23 sergeants and corporals, and 220 privates; total absent, 252; aggregate, 521. Bull Run and the newly organizing volunteer 69th account for the absentees. The arms of this regiment consist of 800 muskets and 35 sabres, all belonging to the State. The sabres and about 300 muskets were in good condition. The 300 muskets had been taken from the pile or heap where they had been thrown on the return of the regiment in July. Those remaining in the pile were in such rusted and rusting condition that when they are cleaned and the rust removed the bore will be 2-100 of an inch larger than origi-

nally made. The 69th has established a great reputation for courage on the field of battle, and justly so; also for devotion to the cause of human liberty, having made heroic sacrifices in behalf of that principle; it is with regret, however, that I am obliged to confess that the arms with which they fought so valiantly were left in the most neglected condition for three months.

The 79th regiment has not yet been inspected.

The entire strength of the 1st, 2d, and 4th brigades, absent and present, 5,285.

The ununiformed militia in the districts of the 1st, 2d, and 4th brigades enroled, is 69,582.

Having witnessed the complete destruction of the uniforms in those regiments that have returned from a three month's service at Washington, and of the inability of many to renew them, I most earnestly suggest that the State reuniform those whose term of militia service has not yet expired, and indemnify those whose time has expired, in their value at this time, to ascertain which, an inspecting officer could with propriety be detailed. Unless this shall be done, many of the members of regiments in the 1st division will be compelled to absent themselves from parades.

To the Adjutant General of the State of New York:

Sir—No orders for inspection and review have been issued for the military year 1861, and, therefore, no inspection and review have taken place for said year. The undersigned, therefore, states that he has been prevented from rendering the ordinary inspection returns, as required by the military statute, title 5, article 1.

For information of the general condition of the brigade I would refer you to my report for 1860, published in the Adjutant General's report for the said year.

Whatever changes have taken place since that report you are probably informed of, if commandants have acted up to duty.

The imperfections in the pay system continue to be cause for much complaint.

Mostly the poor perform military duty; and the poor mostly enlist and fight our battles. They should be better paid while attached to the militia, and taxation upon property should be the basis of the "pay system." Let this system be adopted and the law of taxation be rigidly and honestly enforced, there would be fair inducement for a performance of military and camp duty. Had such a system heretofore been adopted, in the event of the war which is now upon us, millions of dollars might have been saved from expenditures in feeding and drilling recruits; and still more, saved the lamentable demoralization resulting from such delay. Delays are worse than dangerous when a formidable enemy is at the very gate of our national capital.

To the Adjutant General of the State of New York:

In compliance with my duties I herewith transmit to you my annual inspection return for this brigade. The 41st regiment, commanded by Col. Chester Card, and the 42d, commanded by Col. James Whitford, were ordered to parade at Norwich, Chenango county, on the 2d, 3d, and 4th of October, for military drill, review and inspection. The weather was fine for the whole time, and considering the number absent in the war the parade was highly interesting and creditable. Two entire companies were absent, besides many from all the companies, and but for the volunteer services of some four companies of home guards, who were invited out on the occasion, the attendance would have been slim indeed. I am happy to say the prospect is, these "Home Guard" companies will attach themselves to regiments of this brigade as soon as circumstances will admit. The great impediment in the way seems to be the requirements of General Regulations as to dress. I regard the regulations in this respect decidedly unfortunate, and too extremely "old fogy" for Yankee enterprise and spirit. The cheap, yet in all respects neat and beautiful dress of some of the companies that have sprung up, as it were, in a moment, and from necessity, are in my view pre-eminently calculated to inspire military enthusiasm in the masses, and I am satisfied the sameness required by our State Regulations has resulted in great injury to our military system. I would therefore recommend that the Regulations in this respect be so modified as to allow all military companies to select such dress as shall best suit their tastes.

The review by Brig. Gen. Thos. F. Petrie and staff came off on the 3d inst., and that of Major Gen. Samuel S. Burnside on the afternoon of the 4th, after which the inspection was made. I have to report division, brigade and regimental officers all fully armed, uniformed and equipped, and the rank and file as per return slightly deficient.

I cannot refrain from here expressing my regret that the Government (in this its hour of great peril) has not called into its service our distinguished General, Thos. F. Petrie, as a colonel of some regiment.

It seems to me that the country needs his services, and I doubt

not that if the Commander-in-chief knew of his high military attainments, good morals and other qualities essential in a commanding officer, he would not be slow in calling him to some more responsible position

STATE OF NEW YORK: Judge Advocate General's Department, New York, October 3, 1861.

Facts and opinion in the matter of the appeal of John H. Styles from the election of First Lieutenant in Company A, Fourteenth Regiment N. Y. S. M., now enrolled and mustered as a regiment of volunteers in the service of the United States.

FACTS.

- 1. The Fourteenth Regiment of New York State Militia was duly organized as a militia regiment under the Statutes of the the State of New York.
- 2. A regiment bearing this name, and composed mainly of the officers and men of the Fourteenth Regiment N. Y. S. M., is now in the service of the United States, having volunteered for the war, and forms a portion of the brigade commanded by Brigadier General E. D. Keyes, now located at Arlington, in the State of Virginia.
- 3. John H. Styles, first lieutenant of company A, some time previous to August 3, 1861, resigned his position, transmitting his resignation to the United States authorities, and not to those of the State of New York, and his resignation was accepted by the War Department, August 3, 1861, and notice thereof was sent to His Excellency Governor Morgan.
- 4. On the 5th day of August, 1861, an election for first lieutenant of company A, was held under the orders of Lieutenant Colonel E. B. Fowler, commanding the regiment, which resulted in the election of J. Wortman Redding as first lieutenant, and of David S. Unchles as second lieutenant, vice Redding promoted.
- 5. A commission was issued by His Excellency Governor Morgan to J. Wortman Redding as first lieutenant of company A, fourteenth regiment, August 12, 1861.
- 6. John H. Styles has appealed from this election to Brig. Gen. Crooke, commanding Fifth Brigade N. Y. S. M., on the ground that there was no vacancy, he not having resigned to the New

York State authorities. General Crooke declared the election invalid, and directed him to report himself for duty.

7. General Keys thereupon refers the subject for the decision of His Excellency Governor Morgan, by the following endorsement upon the papers.

"A misunderstanding in regard to what constitutes a vacancy of a commission in a regiment of New York State Militia should, in my opinion, be referred to the decision of His Excellency the Governor of the State of New York.

" E. D. KEYES, Brigadier General."

ARLINGTON, Va., Sept. 6, 1861.

OPINION.

The resignation of Lieutenant Styles and the election and appointment of his successor were regular, if the Fourteenth Regiment is to be considered as a regiment of volunteers in the service of the United States.

These proceedings were irregular if the regiment is on the other hand to be deemed a militia regiment in the United States service as militia.

The question presented is therefore of great importance, and concerns several other regiments which are in the same position as the Fourteenth, making it necessary that a definite rule should be laid down by which the present and similar cases which are likely to occur may be governed.

The proclamation of the President of the United States bearing date April 16, 1861, issued in pursuance of the provisions of the act, entitled "an Act to provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrections and repel invasion, and to repeal the act now in force for that purpose," approved February 28, 1795, called for seventy-five thousand of the militia of the several States.

The militia furnished under this proclamation were mustered into the service of the United States for three months in accordance with the provisions of said act, and their term of service having expired, they have long since returned to their homes.

On the third day of May, 1861, a further proclamation was issued by the President, calling into the service of the United States forty-two thousand and thirty-four volunteers to serve for the period of three years unless sooner discharged, the call itself,

and the plan of organization to be submitted to Congress as soon as assembled.

Under this call, the military organization known as the Fourteenth Regiment N. Y. S. M., with certain changes in its officers, and a large augmentation of the number of the rank and file having volunteered its services through its own officers, was mustered into the service of the United States for three years, and proceeded to Washington under the orders of the federal military authorities.

It is evident, from the above statement, that the Fourteenth Regiment did not enter the service of the United States as a militia regiment, although it has been since known and designated as the Fourteenth New York State Militia, in contradistinction to the Fourteenth New York State Volunteers, that it was not called into the service in accordance with the terms of the act of 1795, or the proclamation of April 16, and that it was mustered for a longer period than the militia act of 1795 whill warrant.

So far as the State of New York is concerned, the case stands simply thus: That a large number of the officers and men of the Fourteenth regiment of militia have entered the service of the United States as three years volunteers, without any action whatsoever, either on the part of the National or State authorities to bring the regiment into the service as militia.

Under these circumstances, the regiment in accordance with the act of Congress, passed July 22, 1861, entitled "an act to authorize the employment of volunteers to, and in enforcing the laws and protecting public property," became subject to the rules and regulations governing the army of the United States; it never possessed so far as the United States are concerned the distinctive character of a militia regiment under the act of I795, and came into their service in precisely the same manner as all other volunteer regiments, the title Fourteenth New York State Militia being a descriptive or distinguishing designation like that of "Fire Zouaves."

I entertain no doubt whatever, therefore, that the organization known as the Fourteenth Regiment N. Y. S. M., now in the service of the United States as volunteers, is subject to the acts of Congress, and the rules and regulations for the government of the army of the United States, and to them alone, and that the authorities of the State of New York have no longer any contro

over it whatsoever, except the right which is given to the Governor to fill such vacancies as may occur among its officers.

The resignation of lieutenant Styles, of his position as lieutenant, in the volunteer service of the United States was, in all respects, regular, according to article 5, sections 24 to 29 inclusive of the regulations, and the appointment of Mr. Redding, who received the largest number of company votes as his successor, was in accordance with the act of Congress before referred to, and the orders of the War Department.

That resignation, election and appointment were not, however, in accordance with the statutes of the State of New York, and I am therefore, of opinion that lieutenant Styles has not resigned, nor has lieutenant Redding become entitled to a lieutenant's commission in the militia of the State of New York.

The officers of this regiment hold at present no commissions, except the ordinary militia commission which they had under the State laws; if they had received their commissions as officers of volunteers, as they should do at once, the distinction drawn above would be very apparent and it would be quite easy to see how lieutenant Styles could resign his commission in the United States service and yet hold this commission in the State militia, and how the commission granted to lieutenant Redding would confer upon him a command in the fourteenth regiment as volunteers, but no rank whatever in the New York State militia.

It is particularly important that new commissions as volunteer officers should speedily be issued in the fourteenth, and other similarly situated regiments, because, at present their officers hold their commands upon their recognized position and their right to claim a proper commission, rather than upon the commissions they actually hold, and moreover, as questions of precedence are settled by the date of the commission, it is my opinion that a militia commission would not entitle its holder to such precedence, otherwise, it is evident that some officers holding ancient militia commissions would rank the entire body of volunteer officers of the same grade, which is absurd.

It is, then, the position of first lieutenant of volunteers and the right to receive a commission as such, which lieutenant Styles has lawfully resigned, and which lieutenant Redding has lawfully obtained, and I am of opinion that Brigadier General Crooke has no authority or jurisdiction whatsoever over the officers and

men who are mustered into the service of the United States as volunteers under the name of the fourteenth regiment N. Y. S. M., and cannot lawfully receive resignations of officers from that service, nor order elections for officers in that service.

What remains of the fourteenth regiment of militia within the State of New York is in a somewhat anomalous condition, most of the officers and men are absent from the State in the service of the United States, which will prevent their attendance at drills, reduce their numbers below the minimum standard at inspection, and utterly prevent the performance of the duties assigned to the officers in relation to the ununiformed militia.

If urgent necessity, such as insurrection or invasion should occur, the regimental district might be declared vacant by the proper authority, the officers holding commissions be put upon the super-numerary list and a new regiment of militia formed; but it is deemed desirable that in the absence of these patriotic soldiers, who are now serving in the Federal armies, no action should be taken upon the subject, but that if consistent with the safety of the State, their positions should be retained until their return after the present wicked rebellion shall have been happily quelled.

For the reasons stated in the first part of this opinion I have entered more largely into the discussion of the questions than the present case requires. The practical conclusions arrived at in regard to this appeal are as follows:

- 1. That the election of J. Wortman Redding as first lieutenant of the fourteenth regiment New York State Militia, is valid and that he is entitled to receive a commission as first lieutenant of volunteers in that regiment, but has no claim, by virtue of his election, to a commission in the New York State Militia.
- 2. That the resignation of John H. Styles, as first lieutenant, vacates his position as first lieutenant of volunteers, in the four-teenth regiment New York State Militia, to which he was entitled to be commissioned, previous to such resignation, but does not affect his militia commission and that his name should therefore be retained upon the State register.
- 3. That Brigadier General Crooke has no authority nor jurisdiction over the regiment of volunteers in the United States service, known as the fourteenth regiment of New York State Militia.

4. That for the reasons above stated the appeal in this case should be dismissed.

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA:

A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas the laws of the United States have been for some time past, and now are opposed, and the execution thereof obstructed, in the States of South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Florida, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Texas, by combinations too powerful to be suppressed by the ordinary course of judicial proceedings, or by the powers vested in the marshals by law:

Now, therefore, I, ABRAHAM LINCOLN, President of the United States, in virtue of the power in me vested by the Constitution and the laws, have thought fit to call forth, and hereby do call forth, the militia of the several States of the Union, to the aggregate number of seventy-five thousand, in order to suppress said combinations, and to cause the laws to be duly executed.

The details for this object will be immediately communicated to the State authorities through the War Department.

I appeal to all loyal citizens to favor, facilitate, and aid this effort to maintain the honor, the integrity, and the existence of our National Union, and the perpetuity of popular government; and to redress wrongs already long enough endured.

I deem it proper to say that the first service assigned to the forces hereby called forth will probably be to repossess the forts, places, and property which have been seized from the Union; and in every event, the utmost care will be observed, consistently with the objects aforesaid, to avoid any devastation, any destruction of, or interference with property, or any disturbance of peaceful citizens in any part of the country.

And I hereby command the persons composing the combinations aforesaid to disperse, and retire peaceably to their respective abodes within twenty days from this date. Deeming that the present condition of public affairs presents an extraordinary occasion, I do hereby, in virtue of the power in me vested by the Constitution, convene both Houses of Congress. Senators and Representatives are therefore summoned to assemble at their respective chambers, at twelve o'clock, noon, on Thursday, the fourth day of July next, then and there to consider and determine such measures as, in their wisdom, the public safety and interest may seem to demand.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington, this fifteenth day of [L. s.] April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty one, and of the Independence of the United States the eighty-fifth.

WAR DEPARTMENT, WASHINGTON, April 15, 1861.

Sir—Under the act of Congress "for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrections, repel invasions," &c., approved February 28, 1795, I have the honor to request your Excellency to cause to be immediately detached from the militia of your State the quota designated in the table below, to serve as infantry or riflemen for the period of three months, unless sooner discharged.

Your Excellency will please communicate to me the time at or about which your quota will be expected at its rendezvous, as it will be met as soon as practicable by an officer or officers to muster it into the service and pay of the United States. At the same time the oath of fidelity to the United States will be administered to every officer and man.

The mustering officer will be instructed to receive no man under the rank of commissioned officer who is in years apparently over forty-five or under eighteen, or who is not in physical strength and vigor.

The rendezvous for your State will be at New York, Albany and Elmira.

AN ACT

To authorize the embodying and equipment of a Volunteer Militia, and to provide for the Public Defence.

Passed April 16, 1861.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

- Section 1. The governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, comptroller, attorney-general, state engineer and surveyor, and state treasurer, or a majority of them, are hereby authorized and empowered to accept the service and to cause to be enrolled and mustered into the service of the state, for two years, unless sooner discharged by the order of the said officers above named, volunteers, in their discretion as to the number, not to exceed thirty thousand men, to be officered, organized and equipped in such manner as the said officers or a majority of them may order and direct, and to be formed and organized without regard to existing military districts; the said force hereby authorized being in addition to the present military organization of the state, and a part of the militia thereof.
- § 2. The officers of such organization of volunteers shall be elected and appointed in the manner prescribed by section two of article eleven of the Constitution of the State, and commissioned by the governor, and he is hereby authorized and empowered to prescribe such rules and regulations as he may deem proper to carry out the provisions of such article of the Constitution relative to election and appointment; provided, however, that when any vacancy shall occur among such volunteers while they are absent from the State, the governor is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint and to commission the requisite officers to fill such vacancies.
- § 3. The officers and men of the said force shall receive the same pay and rations, while in service under the provisions of this act, as officers and men of the same rank and arm of service in the army of the United States, and shall be liable at all times

to be turned over to the service of the United States, on the order of the governor, as a part of the militia of this state, upon the requisition of the president of the United States.

- § 4. The officers and men of the said force, except when in actual service, shall be paid only for the time actually spent in their organization, drilling and instruction.
- & 5. The captains of the respective companies organized by virtue of this act, except when in the actual service of the general government, shall make monthly returns of the service performed by all the members thereof, to the colonel of the regiment. The said colonel shall make like returns of the service of the regiment, based upon the said company returns, and the service of the regimental officers, to the adjutant general; and the comptroller, on the certificate of the paymaster-general, shall draw his warrant upon the treasurer in favor of the respective regimental paymasters therefor; and the paymasters of the respective regiments, before entering upon the duties of their office, shall enter into a bond to the people of the state, in such sum as the governor shall direct, and with such sureties as he shall approve, to be evidenced by his indorsing his approval on such bond, conditioned for the faithful application, according to law, of all moneys he shall receive by virtue of his office; and which bond shall be filed in the office of the comptroller, and in case of breach prosecuted under his direction by the attorney-general.
- § 6. All expenditures for arms, supplies or equipments necessary for the said force shall be made under the direction of the governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, comptroller, attorney-general, state engineer and surveyor, and state treasurer, or a majority of them, and the moneys therefor shall, on the certificate of the governor, be drawn from the treasury on the warrant of the comptroller, in favor of such person or persons as shall from time to time be designated by the governor.
- § 7. The force hereby created, when called into actual service, shall be subject to all the rules and articles applicable to the troops in the service of the United States, but no volunteers under this act shall be discharged from service anywhere except in the county where they were organized, unless by his or their request.
- § 8. The sum of three millions of dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expendi-

tures authorized by this act, or any other expenses of mustering the militia of this state, or any part thereof, into the service of the United States.

- § 9. There shall be imposed for the fiscal year commencing on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixtyone, a state tax for such sum as the comptroller shall deem necessary to meet the expenses hereby authorized, not to exceed two mills on each dollar of the valuation of real and personal property in this state, to be assessed, raised, levied, collected and paid in the same manner as the other state taxes are levied, assessed, collected and paid into the treasury.
 - § 10. This act shall take effect immediately.

Article XI, Section 2 of the Constitution.

Militia officers shall be chosen or appointed as follows: Captains, subalterns and non-commissioned officers shall be chosen by the written votes of the members of their respective companies. Field officers of regiments and separate battalions by the written votes of the commissioned officers of the respective regiments and separate battalions; brigadier generals and brigade inspectors by the field officers of their respective brigades; major-generals, brigadier-generals and commanding officers of regiments or separate battalions, shall appoint staff officers to their respective divisions, brigades, regiments or separate battalions.

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA:

A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas existing exigencies demand immediate and adequate measures for the protection of the national Constitution and the preservation of the national Union by the suppression of the insurrectionary combinations now existing in several States for opposing the laws of the Union and obstructing the execution thereof, to which end a military force in addition to that called forth by my proclamation of the fifteenth day of April in the present year, appears to be indispensably necessary:

Now, therefore, I, ABRAHAM LINCOLN, President of the United States, and Commander-in-Chief of the Army and Navy thereof, and of the Militia of the several States when called into actual service, do hereby call into the service of the United States forty-two thousand and thirty-four volunteers, to serve for the period of three years unless sooner discharged, and to be mustered into service as infantry and cavalry. The proportions of each arm and the details of enrolment and organization will be made known through the Department of War.

And I also direct that the regular army of the United States be increased by the addition of eight regiments of infantry, one regiment of cavalry, and one regiment of artillery, making altogether a maximum aggregate increase of twenty-two thousand seven hundred and fourteen, officers and enlisted men, the details of which increase will also be made known through the Department of War.

And I further direct the enlistment for not less than one or more than three years, of eighteen thousand seamen, in addition to the present force, for the naval service of the United States. The details of the enlistment and organization will be made known through the Department of the Navy.

The call for volunteers, hereby made, and the direction for the increase of the regular army, and for the enlistment of seamen

hereby given, together with the plan of organization adopted for the volunteers and for the regular forces hereby authorized will be submitted to Congress as soon as assembled.

In the meantime I earnestly invoke the co-operation of all good citizens in the measures hereby adopted, for the effectual suppression of unlawful violence, for the impartial enforcement of constitutional laws, and for the speediest possible restoration of peace and order, and, with these, of happiness and prosperity throughout the country.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused

the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington, this third day of May, in
the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred
[L. s.] and sixty-one, and of the Independence of the United
States the eighty-fifth.
