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

To His Excellency JOHN T. HOFFMAN,
Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

GOVERNOR.—I have the honor of making the following report from this Department, for the year ending December 31st, 1871.

Another year's experience in the administration, under your direction, of the military affairs of the State, has confirmed the correctness of the views I entertained on assuming the duties of Adjutant-General, and in conformity with which I have acted. The point which I laid most stress on was, that the aggregate force of the National Guard should be reduced to twenty thousand (20,000) non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates (at one time it had been nearly fifty thousand), by lessening the number of organizations, thus getting rid of the most inefficient ones, and giving more pecuniary aid to each of the remainder from the regular annual appropriation, which was established at two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000).

Although the cost of supporting the National Guard is probably double that amount, the balance being contributed by localities, and by the members themselves, I deemed this sum sufficient to stimulate the local authorities to give further aid in money, and to cause more interest to be taken in the organizations by the citizens of the localities in which they exist. In all these respects, the result has met my expectations, and I think I may safely assert that never before has the National Guard been so popular and so fully appreciated. Moreover, the amendments made to the Military Code, in its re-enactment in 1870, relating to the mode of uniforming the troops, and granting them further privileges and exemptions, and providing means for securing competent officers as vacancies occur, have all worked

exceedingly well, and the fruits are shown in the greatly improved condition of the organizations in appearance, drill and discipline. Indeed, I think it may be fairly claimed that the National Guard, as a whole, was never so highly esteemed by the public as now, and never before was it so deserving of such confidence. The demonstrations of its usefulness and efficiency, which have frequently occurred, secure to this body of citizen soldiery the good will and partiality of the people of the whole State; and their friendly disposition can be fully relied on so long as its members do their whole duty, and show by all their acts that they have the proper appreciation of what is becoming to a soldier.

ORGANIZATION.

At present the National Guard is composed of eight divisions, twenty-five brigades, two regiments, one battalion, and seven separate troops of cavalry; two battalions and ten separate batteries of artillery; forty regiments and six battalions of infantry; and the grand aggregate of the force is twenty-four thousand two hundred and sixty-six (24,266) officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates. Some few of the organizations are still so weak and inefficient that further disbandments and consolidations will have to be made; and when such reduction has been accomplished the aggregate of the force will be within the limitation of the Military Code.

BREECH-LOADERS.

The Legislature at its last session made an appropriation of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) or so much thereof as might be necessary "for altering the small arms of the National Guard to, or exchanging them for breech-loaders, under the direction of the Governor." In May last a board was appointed "to examine into the merits of various kinds of breech-loading rifle-muskets, and to report the result of such examination to the Governor." This board, which was composed of the Adjutant-General, the Inspector-General and the Chief of Ordnance, was occupied during several months in examining and testing a number of breech-loading rifle-muskets which had been submitted to it for such purpose, and on the 28th of October last they made their report giving the result of their examination and tests, and unanimously recommending the adoption of the Remington rifle-musket, of the improved

model, which had been manufactured for and submitted to the board, as the best arm, in all respects, for the use of the National Guard. It should be stated in this connection, that owing to the failure of my health, I was obliged to take a leave of absence for several months, which I spent in Europe, and therefore was not present at the last meetings of the board, when Colonel J. B. Stonehouse, the Assistant Adjutant-General, filled my place. But having examined this whole matter very thoroughly, and agreeing with the board in the conclusion at which they arrived, I fully concur in their recommendation.

The Governor having approved the report, a contract was entered into with E. Remington and Sons for furnishing the State with fifteen thousand (15,000) of their breech-loading rifle muskets, of the improved model, in exchange for the same number of muzzle-loading Springfield rifle muskets now in the hands of the National Guard, on terms very advantageous to the State; indeed, so much so, that probably not more than three-quarters of the amount of the appropriation will be required to meet the payment of money which the contract provides for. Should it not be deemed necessary to obtain any more of these rifle muskets at present, I would recommend that the Legislature be asked to allow the balance of that appropriation to be used for the purchase of equipments and of Gatling guns—the superior of the mitrailleuse—for the artillery.

For further information with respect to the subject of breech-loaders, reference is made to the report of the Board, which will be found in the appendix.

TARGET PRACTICE.

In my last annual report, I took the ground that field days for target practice would be of much more benefit to the troops than encampments. Now that the infantry is in a short time to be armed with breech-loaders, it becomes more important that the men should be thoroughly instructed and practiced in the use of the rifle, not only that they may become perfectly familiar with its manipulation and expert in the manual, but also accurate marksmen. All this can only be acquired by target practice, and therefore such practice should be made a part of the course of drill in every year.

Recently an association has been organized, called the National Rifle Association, through which, it seems to me, that much of that which is so desirable for the National Guard in this direction can be attained, and therefore the Military Department of the State should be disposed to view it with favor and encouragement.

STATE MILITARY AGENCIES.

With respect to the business formerly conducted by the State Military Agencies, and which devolved upon this Department on the abolishment of those agencies, I have to report as follows:

The amount of the United States paymaster's checks and treasurer's certificates, on hand, January 1, 1871, was seventeen hundred and sixteen dollars and fourteen cents (\$1,716.14). Amount of claims settled during the year, two hundred and six dollars (\$206). There has been delivered to claimants the sum of three hundred and eighty-seven dollars and eighty cents (\$387.80), and the amount remaining to be delivered is fifteen hundred and thirty-four dollars and thirty-four cents (\$1,534.34).

WAR CLAIMS AGAINST THE UNITED STATES.

The vigorous prosecution of these claims has been continued during the past year, and a new installment, amounting to several hundred thousand dollars, has been presented to the Department at Washington. For detailed information with respect to this matter, reference is made to the report of Colonel J. B. Stonehouse, Assistant Adjutant-General, contained in the appendix.

CONCLUSION.

In closing this report I avail myself of the opportunity to commend Colonel John B. Stonehouse, Assistant Adjutant-General, and Major Alfred H. Taylor, chief clerk, and other employes in this office, for the zeal, fidelity, and diligence with which they have discharged their duties.

For further information in detail, reference is made to the accompanying appendix.


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

REPORTS OF DIVISION AND BRIGADE COMMANDANTS.

HEAD-QUARTERS FIRST DIVISION N. G., S. N. Y., }
NEW YORK, *December 1, 1871.* }

GENERAL.—In accordance with paragraph 528, General Regulations, I have the honor to report that, during the year ending with this date, the following parades and meeting for instruction were made and held, pursuant to orders from these head-quarters:

July 4, 1871—Division parade and review.

Oct. 17, “ —Meeting for instruction.

Nov. 21, “ —Parade of all the infantry and one troop of cavalry.

In addition to the above parades, etc., the services of the division have been called for, in support of the civil authorities, on two occasions, viz.: The whole division was under arms from early in the morning of the 12th of July until the morning of the 13th, during which time part of the troops were in active service, in quelling the riots in the upper part of the city, a detailed report of which was made to general head-quarters on the 19th of July. On November 7th, four regiments were under arms at their armories, ready to support the police authorities, from 6 A. M. until 10½ P. M., but their active services were not called for.

I feel impelled to take advantage of this opportunity to call the attention of the Commander-in-Chief again to the propriety of arming one of the foot-batteries of this division with the Mitrailleuse. I made this suggestion in my last annual report, and repeated it in a communication of 16th November. This very desirable improvement could be accomplished at no great expense, and would be an advance in keeping with the same spirit that prompted the arming of the infantry with breech-loading weapons.

During the past year, great dissatisfaction has been expressed by some organizations of the Division at the condition of their armories, which in some cases are so miserable as to be entirely unfit to drill the smallest bodies of men. To call this demoralizing, is but feeble

description. Despite the great exertion of the officers, it is scarcely possible to maintain proper *esprit de corps*. The effect is ruinous to the organizations. Two or three regiments could have, during last winter, only such drills as the accommodation of the State Arsenal afforded, their armories being worthless for drill purposes, and but ordinary storing places for arms.

The armories now occupied by the Fifth, Eighth, Eleventh, Sixty-ninth and Eighty-fourth Regiments are in very bad condition. The City Arsenal, corner of White and Elm streets, is used as quarters for all the batteries. It is entirely unfit for the storage of the guns, carriages and harness. In cold or stormy weather, no drills can be held there.

The long-deserved encouragement which the National Guard met with from the last Legislature, in the direction of new and improved arms, and a parade ground, gives me reason to hope that the suggestions now made to his Excellency, the Commander-in-Chief, will meet with just consideration.

SIR.—I have the honor to report that, on the morning of the 10th inst., I was personally waited upon by his Honor, the Mayor, who informed me that, on the evening of that day, a police order would be issued to prevent any parades or processions upon Wednesday, the 12th inst., but that, owing to the excited state of much of the populace, there might nevertheless arise disturbances which might render the aid of the military necessary. Accordingly we examined section 242, of chapter 80, of the Laws of 1870, and I received the following written communication under that law :

NEW YORK, July 10th, 1871.

In order that the police authorities of this city may be well sustained in suppressing a disturbance of the peace, of which, on Wednesday, the 12th inst., there is anticipation and imminent danger, I

desire you to order out, and hold in readiness at their armories, for active service, three regiments of infantry and one troop of cavalry.

During the day of the 11th inst. I also received a verbal request from the President of the Police Department to furnish an increased force. On the 11th, at about midnight, I was further requested by his Excellency the Governor of the State to furnish all the military aid required in assistance of the civil authorities. In answer to these requisitions, the following order was issued from these headquarters:

II. In obedience to a requisition from the civil authorities, the following organizations are hereby ordered to assemble at their respective armories, in fatigue dress, fully armed and equipped for active service, on Wednesday next, the 12th inst., at 7 o'clock A. M.:

First Regiment Infantry, Sixth Regiment Infantry, Seventh Regiment Infantry, Eighth Regiment Infantry, Ninth Regiment Infantry, Eleventh Regiment Infantry, Twelfth Regiment Infantry, Twenty-second Regiment Infantry, Sixty-ninth Regiment Infantry, Seventy-first Regiment Infantry, Eighty-fourth Regiment Infantry, Washington Grey Troop Cavalry, Battery "G," Battery "C."

The Infantry will be supplied with forty rounds of ammunition, and the Artillery with twenty rounds per gun.

At two o'clock A. M., on the 12th inst., I personally informed the Superintendent of Police of my action, and at six o'clock A. M. reported to the Commander-in-Chief in person, with a portion of my staff, at police headquarters.

The accompanying map, prepared as a part of this report, an examination of which is invited, will show the location of the forces under arms at seven A. M. The blue spots mark the quarters of the infantry regiments ordered on duty, the red those of the artillery, and the orange those of the cavalry. The blue crosses, the quarters of the infantry regiments, and the orange cross, that of the cavalry regiments, over which guards were placed.

It being apprehended at police head-quarters that the necessary withdrawal of most of the police force from the thirty-first precinct would invite disorder along the line of the Boulevard, it was deemed prudent to establish an armed force in the vicinity of Elm Park; and, to secure the greatest amount of protection with the least number of men, a regiment armed with breech-loaders, and a squadron of cavalry were dispatched, by the service of the following orders, at 7.30 A. M.:

Commanding Seventy-first Regiment:

COLONEL.—Upon the receipt of this you will march your command up the Boulevard to the thirty-first precinct police station, in One Hundredth street, between Ninth and Tenth avenues, and put yourself in communication with Captain Helme, or other police officer in charge. You will regulate your movements so as to support the police force in the discharge of their duties, and for this

purpose you will confer with the officer in command, and keep yourself informed as to his movements.

The service which is required of you is, as you will appreciate, one of a delicate nature, and one in which you must be guided by circumstances and your own judgment. The police will enforce the law so far as they can, and if not able to do so, will call upon you for assistance, which you will render so as to uphold them in the discharge of their duties. You will keep your command in the ranks, and see that the men behave quietly and orderly, and not allow any straggling, so that they can be used at a moment's notice.

If compelled to send detachments to any point, you will see that they are sufficiently large to enforce order, if possible, without resorting to compulsory measures.

You will not use force unless it becomes absolutely necessary to put down a riot or disturbance, and then you are expected to act with coolness and firmness. No *positive* orders can be given to guide you in your actions, but you must be governed by the exigencies of the case, and your authority is, therefore, necessarily discretionary. The Washington Grey Troop of Cavalry has been directed to report to you. It will co-operate with your command, under your orders.

At the same hour, Col. Scott, of the Eighth Regiment was ordered to occupy the City Arsenal, corner of White and Elm streets, with about three-fourths of his command, for the purpose of protecting the building and its contents, and of supporting the two batteries assembled there, should their services be required. The balance of the Eighth Regiment were left for the protection of their own armory.

Col. Ward, of the Twelfth Regiment, was ordered to occupy the State Arsenal, corner of Seventh avenue and Thirty-fifth street, with his command, leaving about forty men for the protection of his armory, and detailing an equal number for the care of the Seventy-first Regiment armory.

The commanding officer of the Fifth Regiment stationed fifty men in the armory of his regiment in Hester street, near Bowery, and an equal number in the armory of the First and Third Cavalry, at 37 and 39 Bowery.

The commanding officer of the Seventy-ninth Battalion stationed one company in the armory corner of Green and Houston streets.

The commanding officer of the Ninety-sixth Regiment stationed one company in the armory at Germania Assembly Rooms, 291 and 293 Bowery.

At 8 o'clock, A. M., Brig.-Generals Varian and Ward, commanding the Third and First Brigades, respectively, of the First Division, reported to me in person and were directed to establish their headquarters as follows: General Varian at the armory of the Seventh Regiment, and General Ward at the armory of the Twenty-second Regiment. They were requested to visit the armories of the regiments of their commands and see that the instructions issued were observed, and hold themselves and their staffs in readiness for any service.

In order that the excited condition of the public mind might not be aggravated by the presence of uniformed soldiers in the public streets, and that the troops should be well in hand for prompt action, the following circular was issued to all the commanding officers:

“The Major-General commanding directs that the ammunition be not distributed until orders to do so are received from these headquarters.

“You will please form your companies as soon as the men arrive, and keep them within the armory. Loitering about the doors, and visiting neighboring saloons, will under no circumstances be permitted. If necessary to prevent it, appoint a Provost Guard, not otherwise. Men arrested by a Provost Guard will be returned for disobedience.

By 9 o'clock, A. M., reports received at head-quarters of small bodies of armed men moving in various parts of the city became frequent. The first one of any magnitude or of positive seriousness was received about 8 A. M., to the effect that a large crowd of evil disposed persons had made a demonstration at One Hundred and

Forty-third street and Seventh avenue, and obliged all the workmen in that neighborhood to quit work and join their party. There being no available police force in that vicinity, I dispatched, at the request of the police authorities, Major Jussen, of my staff, with orders to the Commanding Officer of the Seventy-first Regiment, stationed at Elm Park, to at once move one wing of his regiment and the Washington Grey Cavalry in the direction of the point indicated. This movement was rapidly executed, but upon reaching One Hundred and Tenth street, information was received that the rioters had moved down through the Park. The infantry remained for a short time at One Hundred and Tenth street and Eighth avenue, and the cavalry at One Hundred and Tenth street and Sixth avenue, and at 12.15 P. M. were returned to Elm Park by a telegraphic order.

About 10 A. M. information was received that a considerable body of rioters was moving down Third avenue at Eighty-sixth street, and that the workmen engaged in laying croton pipes had quit work and joined them. To support a detachment of police sent off in omnibuses to intercept them, the First Regiment Infantry, Col. Perley commanding, was ordered to move across to and up the Third avenue. At 12 M., Col. Perley telegraphed from the nineteenth precinct station house "everything quiet," and he was, after consultation with the police authority, telegraphed to return to the armory and keep a sharp lookout.

At 10.30 A. M. an effort was made by an excited crowd to seize the arms stored in a reported Fenian head-quarters in avenue A, near Fourth street, and Col. Clark, of the Seventh Regiment, was ordered to detail two companies to co-operate with Capt. Mount, of the eleven precinct, in protecting them. These companies shortly afterward reported back to their armory; the arms having been secured and removed to police head-quarters by the men under Capt. Mount.

About the same hour an exciting report, to the effect that an armed mob had attacked Second avenue cars, was received, and a detachment of police was dispatched, by Superintendent Kelso, to the eighteenth precinct, to support and co-operate with this detachment. Col. Sherry, of the Sixth Regiment, was ordered to send four companies of his command to the Second avenue. The report proved unfounded, or at least was greatly exaggerated. The numerous details of policemen had reduced the force at head-quarters so much that it was deemed necessary to reinforce it by a portion of the military. Col. Clark, of the Seventh Regiment, was therefore ordered to send two

companies, and occupy the upper floor of the head-quarters building. These companies were commanded, respectively, by Capts. Kipp and Ely.

The reports from different parts of the city had now become most exciting in their character. One from the immediate vicinity of head-quarters, brought in by detectives considered most reliable, was to the effect that an organized force, formed in companies, with officers commanding, having a leader at their head with a drawn sword, was moving down Prince street toward Hibernia Hall. Instantly a plan of capture was determined upon. A body of policemen was to move down Mulberry street to Prince, to meet the column; another body was to go down the Bowery to strike their rear, while a strong squad of detectives were to operate in making captures, as circumstances would permit. To give moral effect and render aid if required, the Eighty-fourth Regiment was moved from their armory at Fourth street, down Broadway to Prince street, and the Eleventh Regiment was moved from Delancey and Christie streets, up the Bowery to Prince street. The rioters, having received some information or entertained suspicions of an aggressive movement on the part of the authorities, had marched off to another section of the city before the dispositions made for their dispersion were consummated. Subsequently, however, a goodly number of captures were made by the police in the same neighborhood. While the regiments last named were on the march, they were directed to police head-quarters. As soon as the Eighty-fourth Regiment vacated their armory their surplus arms were removed for safety to police head-quarters.

A report was received about the same time, and since confirmed by the official report of the commanding officer of the regiment, that a body of about five hundred men were threatening the armory of the Fifth Regiment, in Hester street, near the Bowery. The building was occupied by a company placed there for its protection, and its presence deterred the mob from making an attack.

Information having been received about noon that the Orangemen had determined to parade and that a considerable force would probably be required to aid the police in their protection, the Fifty-fifth Regiment and the balance of the 79th Battalion were ordered to assemble at their armories. A detachment of the latter was ordered to police head-quarters, and after conducting a body of prisoners to the fifteenth precinct station-house, was returned to its armory to protect the United States army building in which it is located.

Colonel Budke of the 3d cavalry was authorized to assemble a part of his command to relieve a company of the Fifth Infantry in the protection of the cavalry armory. Major-General Woodward, commanding Second Division N. G., very kindly offered the services of one of his regiments, armed with breech-loaders, already assembled at their armory. Their services were accepted, and they were marched to the armory of the Ninety-sixth Regiment, 291 and 293 Bowery, as a place most convenient of location and a "*point d'appui*" to the movements about to be commenced.

At 1.30 P. M., arrangements having been made by the police authorities to protect the procession that was to form at two o'clock, at the corner of Eighth avenue and Twenty-ninth street, and desiring the support of the military, orders were issued to the Sixth, Colonel Sterry; Seventh, Colonel Clark; Ninth, Colonel Fisk; Twenty-second, Colonel Porter; and Eighty-fourth, Lieutenant-Colonel Mitchell commanding, to report at once on the ground above designated to Brigadier-General Varian, who had been assigned to the command of the escort, and previously informed as to the number of regiments ordered to report to him, and the character of the service required of the escort. The instructions to General Varian were necessarily general in their character, and consisted chiefly of my opinion as to the proportion of troops to be placed in front, on the flanks, and in rear of the procession, with the usual caution about preserving steadiness among the men, and keeping the ranks well closed up. All the details of formation, which would be varied according to the number of men in the procession, and which could be determined only upon the ground, together with the orders and instructions to the different regimental commanders according to their respective positions in the column, and the attitude assumed by the crowds at different points, were necessarily left to the exercise of his own best judgment and discretion, after he should have arrived upon the ground. When the Seventh Regiment moved from the armory, the two companies on duty at police head-quarters joined the regiment, and the Eleventh Regiment occupied the rooms vacated on the upper floors. The regiments were reported promptly as ordered. For the disposition made of them, and other information concerning the procession, your attention is invited to the following report of General Varian, submitted immediately after the procession had been dismissed:

“ GENERAL.—In compliance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report :

“ According to verbal instructions received from you this morning, I proceeded to visit the several regiments of my brigade and had completed the tour, with the exception of the Eighth Regiment, when orders were received from your head-quarters desiring my presence immediately.

“ In accordance with your directions to take command of the escort to the Orange procession, I at once proceeded with my staff to the place designated, viz., Eighth avenue, corner Twenty-ninth street. On my arrival there, I found the procession under the protection of the police and ready to move.

“ The regiments of infantry ordered for escort service, viz., Sixth, Seventh, Ninth, Twenty-second and Eighty-fourth arrived promptly and reported for duty.

“ I at once disposed the troops in the following order : Seventh Regiment on the right in column of companies, Twenty-second and Eighty-fourth on the right and left flanks respectively in column of fours, Sixth and Ninth in the rear (Sixth leading) in column of companies. Before ordering the column to move, I was informed by Inspector Walling, of the police force, that the roofs of the houses on the avenue between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-sixth streets, east side, were covered with men who had been seen loading fire-arms, and at once directed Colonel Clark to detail the right wing of his regiment and take position on the opposite side of said block, facing those buildings, instructing him to return any fire which should commence, with sufficient vigor to stop it, and to rejoin his regiment after the column had passed that locality. These preparations being made, I gave command for the column to move and at once took position on the right with my staff. Having arrived on the corner of Twenty-third street, I halted the column to give the right wing of the Seventh Regiment opportunity to rejoin the command.

“ The order to halt had scarcely been obeyed, when I heard firing, proceeding apparently from the rear, and immediately returned to ascertain the nature of the difficulty. On arriving I ordered the

firing to cease; made inquiry as to the cause; and learned that the column had been fired into both from the sidewalk and houses, and the fire had been promptly returned by some of the regiments, killing and wounding a number of persons.

“Comparative order being restored, I again put the column in motion, proceeding through Twenty-third street to Fifth avenue, down the avenue to Fourteenth street, thence around Washington monument, down Fourth avenue to the junction of Third avenue, without further disturbance than the occasional arrest of individuals on the sidewalk by the police. At the said junction the procession dismissed, and, in accordance with your further instructions, I disposed of the troops so as to enclose the space between Fourth and Eighth streets, and then cleared the space of the crowd assembled.

“After remaining in the position described about an hour and a half, I gave directions to the several commands to return to their armories, and to hold themselves in readiness for further orders from your head-quarters.

“I cannot close without expressing my satisfaction at the alacrity and cheerfulness displayed by officers and men in obeying orders, and giving me every assistance in their power; to the police for their hearty co-operation, and, lastly, to the men composing the procession, for it must be said, to their credit, that not a word was spoken, or fire-arm displayed, or anything done by them which could be construed as a menace to any one, carrying out the instructions given them to the letter.

The firing referred to in General Varian's report was telegraphed to head-quarters, with the additional information that large bodies of rioters were confronting the head of the column, impeding its advance. Upon this, the First Regiment Infantry, Col. Perley commanding, was ordered to move promptly down to and occupy Madison square, so as to flank the rioters should they continue in force in front of the procession when it reached that point, or render such assistance as General Varian might require. For a similar purpose, two companies of the Eleventh Regiment, afterward re-enforced by two other companies, were ordered to occupy Fourteenth street,

near Irving Place, and the Thirteenth Regiment was moved up the Bowery as far as Fourth street. These movements were made on the left flank of the column, under the supposition, which was afterward found correct, that the bulk of the rioters would approach the procession from the north and east. The Thirteenth Regiment subsequently reported to General Varian, and was used in the dispositions made to insure order and quietude in the dispersion of the Orangemen. Those dispositions were simply the occupation by the troops of the streets running into and across the Bowery and Fourth avenue, and clearing Fourth avenue from Astor place and Eighth street down to Fourth street. After the Orangemen had left for their homes, the troops were gradually withdrawn and sent to their armories. The procession formed and marched from Eighth avenue shortly after 2 o'clock, and arrived at its destination a little past 4 o'clock. While it was moving, the troops not in the column or disposed of on the flanks as above recited, were stationed ready for immediate service, as follows, viz.: The Fifth, Sixty-ninth, Fifty-fifth and Seventy-ninth, in their respective armories; the Eighth at the city arsenal with batteries C and G. Capt. Shilling and Lieut. Wright commanding, and the Twelfth at the State arsenals.

Having been requested by the president of the police department to furnish a guard for the protection of the United States post-office, a detachment of two companies of the Sixty-ninth Regiment was ordered, at 5.20 P. M., to occupy the post-office, and remain there until 7 o'clock the next morning. At the same time two companies of the Seventy-first Regiment were ordered to occupy Kappf's Garden, at Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street, until 8 A. M., to prevent an anticipated attack upon a pic-nic party. At 6 P. M., apparent quietude having been restored in the vicinity of head-quarters, the Thirteenth Regiment were relieved, with the thanks of the division commander, and ordered to return to its armory. At the same time the First Regiment, at Madison square, was ordered to return to its armory, and the four companies of the Eleventh at Fourteenth street to rejoin the regiment at police head-quarters. These dispositions brought all the troops, except the Eleventh Regiment, to the positions occupied early in the day, where they remained undisturbed by orders or alarms the whole night. No indication of a necessity for the use of large bodies of troops being apparent, General Ward and staff were relieved, at 8 P. M., and General Varian and staff at 1 A. M. of the 13th instant, by the issue of the following notice:

The regiments will all remain at their armories until further orders.

The night passed without any unusual excitement, and at 8 o'clock A. M., with the consent of the police authorities, a gradual dismissal of all the troops, except the Twenty-second Regiment, was begun. To the Twenty-second, the following order was issued :

CASUALTIES.

Sixth Regiment. Wounded: Captain Adler, slightly grazed at the wrist, and one private (name not reported) badly bruised in the leg.

Seventh Regiment. Wounded: Sergeant Behringer, Co. G, leg wound by a stone; private Townsend, Co. G, in neck, by musket ball; private Morgan, Co. H, slight scalp wound.

Ninth Regiment. Killed: Sergeant Samuel Wyatt, Co. F; private H. C. Page, Co. K. Wounded: Colonel James Fisk, Jr., ankle sprained; Captain Spencer, slightly hurt by a brick; private Pryor, Co. There are two points in connection with the operations of this command on the 12th inst., to which the attention of the Commander-in-Chief is specially invited. First: The promptitude with which the troops assembled, and which the Commander-in-Chief, by his presence, had an opportunity of witnessing. Second: The increased numbers which each organization turned out. In many regiments this increase amounted to fifty per cent more than usually parades; and when is considered the peculiar circumstances under which the orders were issued, the divided and excited state of the

public mind, the extraordinary and unusual conditions which made it necessary to call upon the National Guard and the extremely delicate character of the service to be performed, the devotion of officers and men to principles of law and order, and of complete subordination to the constituted authorities, is strikingly apparent.

RIFLE PRACTICE.

The proposed issue to the infantry commands of the National Guard of the long-range Remington breech-loaders, of uniform pattern and calibre, throughout the State, renders it practicable to introduce a proper system of instruction for the infantry in the use of the piece which is being placed in their hands. I respectfully suggest that a text book be prepared for the use of instructors, and that such orders be issued from general head-quarters as will render the making of "aiming drill" a part of the ordinary instruction of infantry.

The commanding officers of the Fifth and Eleventh Brigades continue to devote much time and attention to their commands, and are entitled to receive credit for the marked improvement noticeable in the condition of their troops.

MY DEAR COLONEL.—I regret not having seen you, as you passed through New York, on your return from Washington.

You will remember speaking to me in relation to suggestions on rifle practice, which might be submitted to the Adjutant-General, for incorporation in his annual report. I promised you to see Capt. Wingate, and ascertain from him what action was best to be recommended. He has sent me the inclosure, which, if you deem proper, you can show to the Adjutant-General, and if he approves of any part or the whole, we should be gratified to have him make the recommendations to the Governor.

The "*National Rifle Association*" will, I think, grow into a very important body, as we are filling our rolls with names of those who appreciate the necessity for, and are determined to urge the adoption by the National Guard of *rifle practice*. It is not only *common*, but almost *universally* the case, that the members of our First and Second Division Regiments serve their full enlistment, without having been, for a single hour, instructed in the *aiming* of their pieces, or given an opportunity to discharge them at a target.

The arming of the National Guard with breech-loaders has made it indispensable that provision should be made by the State for systematic instruction in rifle practice. While the Remington rifle is effective up to 1,000 yards, it is only so in the hands of those who understand how to use it. Moreover, the rapidity with which they can be fired makes the supplying of ammunition in the field a grave question, unless it be expended with discretion and skill. When properly used, this arm renders the troops using it almost irresistible, but if not so used, it becomes an element of weakness rather than strength, as the men waste more ammunition than they can carry. It is not, however, difficult to properly instruct the National Guard in this particular.

A system of "aiming drill" has been developed and thoroughly

tested by experience, by which a respectable degree of efficiency in the use of the rifle can be attained by such instruction and drill as may be had within the drill rooms of the National Guard, and which, when combined with a moderate degree of field practice, will render those drilled in it good marksmen, and no delay should be made in making it part of the military instruction of the National Guard. In furtherance of this purpose, the Quartermaster-General's Department should be authorized to purchase and issue iron targets, of the regulation size, and such mantlets (for the protection of markers), flags and other articles as are required to fit up a rifle range, in such places as a sufficient body of the National Guard are located as to warrant the expense, and where proper ground can be procured. An appropriation should also be made to hire or purchase proper grounds, it being recollected that modern rifle practice, being essentially a long-range system, all ranges must, to be valuable, be of a sufficient extent to afford a range of over 300 yards, and, to be most effective, should run up to 1,000. The appropriation is particularly needed to fit up a first-class range in the vicinity of the cities of New York and Brooklyn. The First and Second Divisions comprise a large majority of the best troops in the State, and, from their efficiency and central location, are usually called upon by the State in time of need, and who should, therefore, be instructed in the use of their weapons. It is therefore important that they should be provided with a rifle range, the more so as their mode of life prevents them from obtaining that skill in marksmanship which is so common in the rural districts, and the high price of land in accessible locations renders State aid necessary. From the neglect that has hitherto attended this important question, it has been no uncommon occurrence for a man to serve seven years in a first-class regiment and never fire a shot. Of course such a man, no matter how perfect his drill may be in other respects, is comparatively valueless as a soldier.

A number of the most prominent officers in these divisions, desiring to remedy this defect, have recently organized "THE NATIONAL RIFLE ASSOCIATION," for the purpose of promoting the introduction of a system of aiming drill and rifle practice in the National Guard, and are now procuring the compilation of a manual upon that subject, to serve as a drill book. In this movement, these officers have had the hearty co-operation of the State authorities, and when that manual is completed, it is desirable that it be adopted as the official text book of the National Guard, and these gentlemen deserve and

should receive the commendation of the public in thus supplying a much needed work.

As the system is necessarily novel, to carry it thoroughly into effect, special provisions should be made. An officer should be added to the staff of the Governor, known as "INSPECTOR OF MUSKETRY," with general authority over the subject throughout the State, and a like officer to the staff of each Division Commander, with assistants throughout the Division Districts. Not only should suitable provision be made for the acquisition of rifle ranges, by lease, purchase or condemnation, and for the issuing of such articles as are required to fit them up, but authority should be given for the enforcement of such regulations as the public safety or the preservation of the targets, butts, etc. may require.

An annual allowance of sixty rounds of ball and forty rounds of blank cartridge should be made to each regiment, for each effective member, and a detailed return should be required of the manner in which it has been expended, so as to insure a proper improvement, and prevent a waste of public property, and a certain course of annual instruction should be prescribed. Ammunition should also be issued at cost, for private practice. It is believed that the introduction of a system of rifle practice will have a beneficial effect upon the National Guard, and particularly upon the organizations in the country. These, from the scattered residences of the men and the want of proper armories, cannot be expected to compete with the city organizations, in excellence of drill. In rifle practice, however, the advantage will be with them, and afford them a stimulus for exertion. To excite a healthful competition among the different regiments, the State should also make provision for a certain number of prizes, to be annually competed for. The results to be obtained by this course, are strikingly illustrated by the success that has attended its practice in England, and particularly in Canada. The matter was introduced into the latter country in 1861, and seventy iron targets, with the appurtenances, distributed among its militia, and suitable prizes offered. The number of targets being found inadequate, they have been added to yearly, and, in 1867, no less than 10,200 men were reported as having been regularly drilled in ball practice, using 100,000 rounds, while a like number of rounds, in excess of the government allowance, had been purchased for private practice, and the efficiency of the men had wonderfully increased; and this progress has since continued.

Their conduct during the twenty-four hours of successive service was in the highest degree commendable. But one case of misconduct of an officer is reported, and that is being attended to. A very small portion of the public press, and a few persons with biased and prejudiced minds, have endeavored to create an impression that some of the regiments acted hastily in firing on Eighth avenue, but by a careful perusal of the official reports of all the principal commanding officers, and a minute personal inquiry of the officers engaged, and of the citizens residing in the neighborhood, into the circumstances attending the *melee*, I have failed to discover sufficient cause for the statements made. An official report of operations of a military body is not the place to discuss the merits of any proposition touching the conduct of the troops that does not emanate from the recognized source of military authority. But as so much has been said by certain classes, and so much has been written calculated to bring into disrepute at least a portion of that organization, which alone can protect and defend law-abiding citizens in their rights of person and property in times of riot and anarchy, that I will be pardoned for assuming the guardianship of the honor and reputation of that part which I have the honor to command, so far as to declare my belief that what is said or written about the misconduct of the troops on the 12th inst. has a partisan origin and an unmanly aim. Letters of thanks from citizens in the neighborhood of the riot, for the services rendered by the troops, confirm the official reports of the officers. The testimony is abundant to show that long before the troops retaliated, fire-arms were discharged, and missiles of all kinds thrown at them from the sidewalks, windows and house-tops; and it was not until an officer of the Eighty-fourth had been struck down by a missile thrown from a house-top, one of the men shot in the head and another received a flesh wound, two men of the Ninth killed outright, a number wounded, and three of the Sixth wounded, that fire was opened on the mob. It is the opinion of the most experienced officers of the police force and military present, that the troops did not fire any too soon; that, in a very few minutes more, it would have been difficult, if not impossible, to overpower the mob, and that the lives lost at Eighth avenue and Twenty-fourth street saved the sacrifice of a much greater number at some other point. None can sympathize more deeply with the families that suffered by the unfortunate occurrences of the 12th inst. than do the men whose duty required them to use their weapons in sustaining the civil

authorities and in defense of themselves; and it is not unreasonable to hope that, while all are deploring the circumstances which made a resort to the use of arms necessary, the public will not be unmindful of the bereaved families of the dead and suffering members of the National Guard.

The extremely delicate service of General Varian, in commanding the escort to the procession, was performed in a highly creditable manner, and to my satisfaction, and it would be unjust to inmeritorious officers not to record herein my conviction, that the regimental commanders of the escort acted with coolness and discretion; that the officers, and men under them, discharged their duty, under circumstances calculated to excite and aggravate the most experienced troops, and are entitled, therefore, to the commendation of their superior officers. The orders issued from time to time were obeyed by all the commands on duty with an alacrity rarely witnessed, giving abundant evidence that the National Guard stand, at all times, ready to sustain the civil authorities in maintaining law and order against all aggressors.

To the members of my staff, who, from early morning of the 12th until noon of the 13th were actively engaged, without rest, I am indebted for the prompt delivery of orders and dispatches, and other valuable assistance.

I desire, also, to record my acknowledgments for the professional services of Surgeon Cheseman, formerly of the 7th regiment, which were kindly volunteered and accepted early on the morning of the 12th.

Permit me, in conclusion, while alluding to the meritorious services of those under my command, to confirm what the public press have already said of the gallant conduct of the police force engaged on that day. It was my duty to keep in constant communication with the Commander-in-Chief and the police authorities from early morning until the excitement in the public mind had subsided. At headquarters but one sentiment actuated the officers on duty, from the President of the Department, Mr. Henry Smith and his colleagues of the Board of Commissioners, and Superintendent Kelso and his subordinate officers, and that was to do their whole duty, in the most prompt and energetic manner. The movements of the detachments were made with the greatest celerity, and the officers of the National Guard who witnessed their operations, in attacking the mob at different points, unite in giving the highest praise for the courage

and dash displayed in making attacks, as well as the patient coolness manifested while exposed to the abusive epithets and dangerous assaults of the mob. Their valor was conspicuous, and entitles them not only to the respect of their superiors, but to the confidence of the public at large. While New York possesses so brave and self-sacrificing a body of protectors, she has little to fear from internal dissensions.

GENERAL.—I have the honor to report that, in obedience to a demand made by the Police Department of the city of New York, dated November 4, 1871, I ordered the Seventh, Twelfth, Twenty-second and Seventy-first Regiments to assemble at their armories at 6 o'clock, A. M., on the 7th instant, the same being the day of the State election, and hold themselves in readiness for active service. One company of the Twelfth Regiment being sent to the State Arsenal, corner of Seventh avenue and Thirty-fifth street, for the protection of the property, and detachments, in civilians' clothes, being sent to the armories of the 9th and 11th regiments, where new breech-loading rifles and ammunition had been deposited the day before. Brigadier-Generals W. G. Ward, 1st Brigade, and Augustus Funk, 2d Brigade, were on duty from the assembly until the dismissal of the troops. Two companies from each regiment were relieved alternately, for two hours at a time, to allow them to vote, until all the men had the opportunity, if they so desired. At 10½ o'clock, P. M., no call having been made for the active services of the troops, all were dismissed.

To His Excellency JOHN T. HOFFMAN,
Commander-in-Chief:

Pursuant to section 242 of the Military Code, I have the honor to report that on the 4th day of May, instant, at about three o'clock, P. M., I received from the sheriff of Monroe county, J. B. Campbell, Esq., a call for two companies of the military under my command in aid of the civil authorities. A copy of such requisition is hereto annexed, and marked schedule A.

Upon receipt of the same, I immediately issued an order to Col. J. G. Baetzel, commanding Fifty-fourth Regiment, requiring him to detail the two senior companies of his command for the purposes required. A copy of that order is annexed, and marked schedule B.

The two companies soon after assembled, and at seven o'clock, with tents and ammunition, proceeded via New York Central and Hudson River railroad to Fairport, some eleven miles from Rochester, where they disembarked, and marched some two miles to the place indicated, and, shortly before ten o'clock in the evening, reported themselves ready for duty. Tents were pitched, guards established, rations served, and duties then commenced.

The occasion for the call is stated generally in the order of the sheriff. The circumstances in particular are, that an extensive break in the Erie canal had occurred at the place called Oxbow, and the contractor of repairs upon that section had assembled a very large number of men to make the repairs. To the laborers he was paying two dollars and fifty cents per day, and for teams, six dollars per day. These had been at work for a day or two, satisfied with the price

paid, but, on the 4th day of May, quite a number demanded three dollars per day, and for teams, eight dollars per day. The contractor not complying, they stopped work, and by throwing stones and pushing teams and wagons down the embankments, compelled the whole to stop, and then conducted themselves so riotously that the civil and military authorities were called to quell the disturbance and preserve the peace.

The special train which carried the detachment was furnished by the Hon. Lewis Selye, the contractor; the rations are furnished by the same person. The tents used are the property of the regiment.

The two companies of the National Guard are Co. B, Captain F. C. Schoen, commanding, with two lieutenants and fifty-six non-commissioned officers and privates; and Co. E, Captain H. B. Henderson, with one lieutenant and thirty-six non-commissioned officers and privates, in all, ninety-seven commissioned and non-commissioned officers and privates.

It is anticipated that their presence will be required until the repairs are completed and laborers paid up. I beg leave to commend the officers and men to your favorable consideration for the alacrity with which they responded to the call made upon them.

To His Excellency JOHN T. HOFFMAN,

Governor of the State of New York and Commander-in-Chief:

The undersigned, commanding the Twenty-fifth Brigade in the Seventh Division of the National Guard of the State of New York, begs leave respectfully to report:

That on the 2d day of January, 1872, he received from the Hon. Joseph B. Campbell, sheriff of the county of Monroe, a requisition for one company of the National Guard under my command, to aid him in anticipation of riot, tumult and breach of the peace. This was speedily followed by several requisitions for increased force, till my whole command was ordered out.

Upon the receipt of these requisitions, I caused the necessary orders to be issued to the Fifty-fourth Regiment, and to the battalion of artillery attached to this brigade, to assemble and proceed to the aid of the sheriff, armed and equipped, and provided with twenty rounds of ball cartridge to each member of the infantry; the artillery with twenty rounds of grape.

The circumstances under which the requisition was made are these: The negro, Howard, who had committed a rape upon a little girl of about the age of nine years, under circumstances of peculiar atrocity, had been then recently arrested, and was confined in the jail of Monroe county. In the early part of the day (January 2), a mob had assembled, and endeavored to force the doors of the jail. With the aid of the police and his own deputies, the sheriff succeeded in holding his position, but as the day advanced and the night approached, the crowd increased in force and turbulence. The police were also required for night duty in other parts of the city, and the sheriff made his requisition for military aid.

As the members of the National Guard began to assemble, I sent to the arsenal Captain Conolly, my aid, with instructions to have

those who first arrived consolidated into one company, and, under the charge of the senior officer present, to advance at once to the assistance of the sheriff. This was done, and the detachment, under the command of Captain Schwartz, and made up of parts of three companies, went to the jail, arriving there at about six o'clock in the evening.

The approaches to the jail are, upon the east, by Court-street bridge, over the Genesee river; from the west, by a bridge over a race-way. These bridges were taken possession of and held. From the latter, Court street extends some two hundred feet to Exchange street. This street—a portion of a street—was filled with men, who very soon commenced using abusive and irritating language; then stones and pieces of broken ice were thrown at the men on duty, and occasionally a pistol was fired. Some of those on duty were disabled by these missiles, and the remainder became nervous and uneasy, and the officer in command selected fifteen privates as skirmishers, and ordered to charge bayonets. In advancing upon a charge, the musket of one of the privates was discharged, and, thereupon, some six or eight other scattering shots were fired. The result of that fire was that two persons were killed and four wounded. The crowd of people, which numbered at least two thousand, at once fell back to the west side of Exchange street, and to the north and south of Court street.

Within three minutes after the discharge of the muskets, I arrived upon the ground, and, from that time till morning, took personal supervision of affairs. The mob remained upon the ground, and continued during the night the same course of violent conduct and abusive language; no collision, however, occurred.

In the morning, the Fifty-fourth Regiment was assembled, and the battalion of artillery attached to this brigade, and, thereupon, I assumed the command of all the troops, established new guards, and entered into all the details of camp and garrison duty.

Nothing of any serious importance occurred from and after that day, and on Friday, the 5th January, the militia were relieved from duty and discharged.

Some criticism has been made upon the fact that the firing was done without orders. While I am not prepared to admit that, in no instance, should a private discharge his musket without orders, I acquiesce in it as a general rule; and, having been present, and felt the temper of the mob, and learned enough of the circumstances

attending the act to feel that it might be justified, have, therefore, ordered a court of inquiry to examine into the entire case.

Pursuant to Section 242, Military Code of the State of New York, I have the honor to make the following report of services rendered by the One Hundred and Sixth Regiment, N. G., S. N. Y., in suppressing riot at Hornellsville, December 17th, 18th, 19th and 20th. December 17th, 1870, at 11.30 A. M., I received the following dispatch from Gen. J. H. Lansing, General commanding 20th Brigade, 7th Division:

Colonel H. BALDWIN:

The Sheriff has called on me for men to suppress riot at Hornellsville. You will send him the men.

At 12.30, I left this place with one hundred and ten men, armed and equipped, arriving at Hornellsville, with my command, at 2.30, P. M. I was there met by the sheriff of Steuben county, and by him was ordered to protect all property of the Erie Railway Company at that point, and to disperse all riotous assemblages of persons. I stationed guards along the railroad, to protect the property, and assisted in sending forward the live stock which had accumulated and been detained there for twenty-four hours. Several arrests were made by my men, of parties interfering. During the night of the 17th, I patrolled the grounds, preventing any outbreak or interference with the property. An oil train of upward of forty cars lay in the yard, over which I kept guard, to prevent it from being fired by the rioters.

On the morning of the 18th, the rioters increased in numbers and demonstrations. I also received additions to my force, numbering fifty men, belonging to companies A, B and C, which were then on duty. About ten o'clock, A. M., I was ordered by the sheriff to clear the depot, platform and grounds of all persons riotously assembled. I immediately proceeded to execute the order of the sheriff, and, meeting with resistance, I ordered a charge, and drove the crowd back at the point of the bayonet. In this charge two persons were injured—one by bayonet, and one by a pair of handcuffs (in the hands of Sergeant Wilson). The party thus injured was attempting to rescue a person whom I had arrested. The rioters having been driven from the grounds, guards were placed, so as to hold them back. Owing to the great number of strikers, and persons interfering with the railroad, it was with much difficulty trains could be moved, and it became necessary to place a guard on all trains moving either way, the railroad grade being heavy west, and the track having been greased and soaped by the rioters, about one mile west of the depot. The guards at that point were stoned and several hit; among the number was Lieutenant-Colonel Baxter. The rioters were protected from the range of our guns by an embankment. It being impossible to move the train started in that direction, it was backed down to the station, when two additional engines were put on, and then, under guard, it was successfully sent on to the next station. Soon after Lieutenant-Colonel Baxter and guards had returned to Hornellsville, a car was started from the station on the Summit, which came down past the Hornellsville depot at a fearful rate, but doing no further damage than injury to the car. Sunday night, the 18th, the grounds were patrolled and guarded, and no damage suffered to be done. During the day I was arrested, as was also Sergeant Wilson, by a warrant issued by Police Justice Howard, of Hornellsville, to which we answered by giving bail—myself \$200 and the Sergeant \$600. •On my being arrested the second time, I announced my intention to resist any further arrests, should the justice issue any more warrants, the sheriff also declaring that my command was his *posse comitatus*, and that I should disregard any further warrants. On the morning of December 19th, the sheriff ordered me to call out the balance of the regiment. Orders were accordingly issued to the several commandants of companies. During the day no open opposition was offered; guards were kept up, and one arrest made, but the party was soon after discharged by

the sheriff. About 8 o'clock in the evening, a compromise was effected between the railway company and the strikers, and the riotous proceedings ceased. Tuesday morning, December 20th, I received the following order from the sheriff:

Commanding the 106th Regiment N. G., S. N. Y.

Your services being no longer required by me to protect the property of the Erie railway, and assist me in preserving order and making arrests, you are hereby relieved.

GENERAL.—I have the honor to make the following report of the condition of the "War Claim" of the State of New York against the United States:

The amount stated in my last report as having been passed to the credit of the State, December 29, 1870, has been increased \$17,227.84, making in all, \$543,094.65 allowed since August 19th, 1870.

During the year 1871, the fourth installment has been prepared and presented to the Treasury Department, amounting to \$364,107.07; this has been examined and passed upon by the War Department, and is in the hands of the Third Auditor.

Another installment, amounting to about \$700,000, will be ready for presentation at an early day. I trust, by the end of the present year, to be able to report the allowance of a large amount in addition to the sum required to liquidate the balance due by the State on account of direct tax.

The addition to our library, during the year 1871, has been equal to that of the previous year. Contributions of from one to ten volumes of various works of interest have been acknowledged, consisting of histories of regiments, military biography, statistical reports, military reports, etc., giving us new pages for reference and research.

We have continued to receive general orders from the military departments of the United States; also, county papers from the different counties of New York.

New portraits have found a place among our large collection of photographs.

Upon our books for the registering of individual histories, we have recorded over one thousand additional names, giving brief facts of the soldier's civil and military career; while the research for information, and the gathering of statistics relating to deceased soldiers, cannot be estimated.

To our museum of relics we have received interesting and valuable mementoes of war times, their date reminding the visitor of the early days of revolutionary glory, or of the struggles and victories of a later day.

The number of visitors to the Bureau during the past year gives evidence of the interest that is still taken in the New York collection of war memorials. In the months of September and October, upon some days, our visitors numbered from five to six hundred a day; had this continued each day in the year our figures would have been large indeed for 1871, yet we can only estimate the whole number of visitors about 30,000 — number registered, 9,200. This, in comparing with the previous year, shows an increase in the number registered, yet a falling off in the total number, owing largely to the tedious excavation and impassable condition of State street during the summer months of travel, which, no doubt, denied many strangers a visit to the Bureau.

I. The Commander-in-Chief has had under consideration the appeal of First Lieutenant Charles C. Nichols from the decision of Brigadier-General D. M. Woodhall, confirming the election of Lieutenant-Colonel Daniel S. Benton as Colonel of the Tenth Regiment, Ninth Brigade, and Third Division National Guard of the State of New York, and has dismissed the same, for the reasons contained in the following opinion of the Judge-Advocate-General:

COLONEL.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt, on the 19th instant, of your reference, for my examination and report, of the letter to His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, of J. H. Wood, Esq., counsel for Lieutenant C. C. Nichols, "A" Company, Tenth Regiment, National Guard, S. N. Y., transmitting the appeal of that officer from the decision of Brigadier-General D. M. Woodhall, commanding the Ninth Brigade, approving of the election to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of Colonel J. G. Farnsworth, held August 5, 1871, and submitting statements of fact and argument in writing. I have also received the evidence and finding of Brigadier-General Woodhall in relation to the election appealed from.

I have examined the voluminous record and finding, as well as the argument of Mr. Wood, with care, and have the honor to submit the following report.

From the record of the proceedings of the election held on the 5th day of August, 1871, and the testimony thereafter taken by the officer who presided at the election, the following facts appear:

That, on August 1st, 1871, notice of election was issued by Lieutenant-Colonel Benton, commanding the Tenth Regiment of the National Guard, S. N. Y., to the commissioned officers of said regiment, for an election for colonel of that regiment, to be held on the 5th day of August. The notice also shows that Thomas Stewart was designated to serve the notices of this election on all the commissioned officers of the regiment *at least five days* before the day fixed for the election.

On the evening of the 5th of August a meeting of the officers of the regiment was held at the place designated in the notice, and was presided over by Brigadier-General D. M. Woodhall, commanding the Ninth Brigade, National Guard S. N. Y. At that meeting Lieutenant-Colonel Benton made an oral return on honor to the presiding officer, "That all the officers entitled to vote at an election to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of Colonel Farnsworth, Tenth Infantry, were duly notified," and thereupon the election was proceeded with.

From the return of the presiding officer it appears that the vote stood as follows: D. S. Benton, 15; G. H. Treadwell, 8; F. Townsend, 1; Protest, 1; making a total of twenty-five who were present and voted. Did not vote, Captain Schiedler; absent, Captain C. E. Davis and Lieutenant Nichols.

Total number of officers notified and entitled to vote, twenty-eight. And that, thereupon, D. S. Benton having received a majority of all the votes entitled to be cast at such election, was, by the presiding officer, declared to be duly elected Colonel of said regiment, and the meeting adjourned.

On the 10th of August Lieutenant Nichols appealed to the presiding officer against the election of Lieutenant-Colonel Benton as Colonel, on the ground "that the proper notice was not served upon me five days before the said election, as provided by the Military Code of the State of New York."

On August 17th Brigadier-General Woodhall ordered the appellant and Lieutenant-Colonel Benton to appear before him on August 19th, with their witnesses, to answer such questions as might be asked in relation to the appeal.

On August 19th, the hearing on the appeal was commenced, before Brigadier-General Woodhall, and a special judge-advocate sworn. Thereupon, Lieutenant Nichols demanded the right to appear by counsel, which demand was refused. The examination of Lieutenant Nichols was then partially proceeded with, and the further hearing adjourned to August 25th. On August 25th, Lieutenant Nichols was recalled; his examination proceeded with but not concluded. Captain Hamilton was also examined on that evening, as was also Adjutant Fitch, in behalf of the appellant. So, also, was Lieutenant-Colonel Benton examined in his own behalf, and the further hearing adjourned to August 31st, when the case was closed, and the decision of the Brigadier-General reserved. On September 8th, the Brigadier-General rendered his decision, confirming the election of Lieutenant-Colonel Benton as Colonel of the Tenth regiment, and assigned his reasons therefor.

On September 15th, the appeal of Lieutenant Nichols was presented to His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, by his counsel J. H. Wood, Esq., and was, by the Commander-in-Chief, referred to the Adjutant-General with directions to report his opinion, together with the opinion of the Judge-Advocate-General.

The facts disclosed by the record show that none of the requirements of the Code in relation to notifying the officers entitled to vote at this election were strictly complied with. The notice for the election bears date August 1st, and the time of the election is therein fixed for August 5th, only *four* days thereafter, while section 72 of the Code requires "That the notice shall specify the time and place of holding the election and be served at least five days *before* such election shall take place."

It does not appear, however, that any objection was taken at the election, by any one present at the election, on the ground of insufficiency of notice; and the presence of twenty-six out of twenty-eight officers elected to vote at such election was a waiver of any irregularity of notice on their part.

The question presented in the appeal is, therefore, was the failure to notify Lieutenant Nichols, five days before the election, sufficient ground to justify the Commander-in-Chief in refusing to approve of the election of Lieutenant-Colonel Benton?

In order to determine this, it will be useful to consider the facts in relation to the service of notice on Lieutenant Nichols.

I find from the testimony submitted to me, that Lieutenant Nichols was not notified until August 2d, and, therefore, not five days before the election. But it further appears, from the testimony taken in the case, that Lieutenant Nichols was absent from the city of Albany on the 1st day of August, returned on the 2d, and remained in Albany until the afternoon of the 4th, and that he duly received his notice of the election on the 2d day of August for the 5th of that month. Notwithstanding this insufficient notice, in conversation with Lieutenant-Colonel Benton, Lieutenant Nichols, on the 2d or 3d of August, promised him to attend the election, and gave his word of honor that he would vote for him. The testimony of Lieutenant Nichols on this point is evasive and unsatisfactory, but on the whole

I am satisfied that the above facts are true. He, Lieutenant N., notwithstanding this promise, left the city before the election, and was not present thereat.

Lieutenant Nichols now appeals from the decision of the Brigadier-General who presided at the election; and his reasons and conclusions on appeal, and through his counsel, urge eight several grounds of error.

While I cannot assent to all the conclusions arrived at by Brigadier-General Woodhall in his circular of September 8th, I am of opinion that his decision of the material point involved in the appeal is correct, and that the election of Lieutenant-Colonel Benton, as Colonel of the Tenth Regiment, was legal and should be approved. This conclusion renders it unnecessary for me to discuss either all the points made in Brigadier-General Woodhall's decision, or urged by the counsel for the appellant. I will, therefore, only notice what I consider the material points at issue.

The ground taken by the appellant is that the election in question is void because "the proper notice was not served upon him five days before said election, as provided by the Military Code of the State of New York."

The want of due service of notice on the appellant is admitted on both sides, but I am of opinion that this omission was not such a defect as would, *under the circumstances disclosed in the record*, render the election void. I think that the appellant, in order to defeat this election, must show that a number of votes sufficient to change the result of the election had not been properly notified. But I hold that the twenty-six officers present were properly notified to all intents and purposes, since by their presence they waived their right "to take exception to the want of legal notice." (See section 78, Military Code.)

All the irregularities as to defect of service and want of proper return were waived by those twenty-six officers. It appears by the papers in the case that of the officers present fifteen were for Lieutenant-Colonel Benton—a clear majority of all the officers, twenty-eight in number, entitled to vote. The appellant is therefore not warranted in considering himself aggrieved by the proceedings or by the want of five days' notice, especially as he admits he had notice amply sufficient to have enabled him to have attended the election if he so desired; and the whole testimony shows that his objection to the sufficiency of his notice was merely an afterthought. And besides, his presence and that of the other absentees could not possibly have changed the result.

In arriving at this conclusion, I have been guided by the very rule laid down and so strenuously urged by the appellant's counsel, which I believe to be the correct one, namely, that this election should be governed "by the same rule as obtains in the civil courts in the construction of statutes affecting the meetings of corporate bodies for the purpose of electing officers."

It will be seen, by reference to the decisions in such cases, that an election will not be set aside for every defect or irregularity or for every non-compliance with the directions of the statute.

In order to set aside the election it must appear that the defect or omission is such a one as would be fatal. The case of the *People v. Tuttle* (31 N. Y., 550) is in point, where the Court of Appeals held the election of officers of a religious body should not be set aside because illegal votes were received, unless it further appeared that the exclusion of such votes would have changed the result. In *ex parte* *Murphy* (7 Cowen, 153), at an annual election of St. Peter's Church in the city of New York, holden for the choice of four trustees, eight persons were voted for, four of whom

had 102 votes and four 100. The voting was by ballot. The inspectors having certified that the four having 102 were duly elected, a motion was made for leave to file an information in the nature of a *quo warranto* against them as unduly elected. One ground of the motion was, that two ballots were put into the box in the names of two persons who were formerly voters, but who had died some weeks before the day of election. The fact was not discovered until after the inspectors had given their certificate, nor did it, at the trial, appear to whom the two latter votes were given. The court held that "the motion must be denied; for aught that appears, the spurious ballots were for the ticket that was in the minority. To warrant setting aside the election it must appear affirmatively that the successful ticket received a number of improper votes, which, if rejected, would have brought it down to a minority. The mere circumstance that improper votes are received will not vitiate an election."

So it has been held that the mode of procedure prescribed by the statute is *directory* merely, and that an election will not be set aside for non-compliance therewith, unless it appears that a compliance with the requirements of the statute would have produced a different result. Thus, where the inspectors were not sworn in the form prescribed by the statute, but proceeded to act as inspectors, and where also no oath at all was administered to them, the court refused to set aside the election. (*Mohawk v. H. R. R. Co.*, 19 Wend., 135; *Chenango v. Mut. Ins. Co.*, 19 id., 635.) So, in the case of the *People v. Rankin*, (9 Johns., 147), the court held that an election of officers was good after the day provided in the statute, the provision being only *directory*. (See, also, *People v. Cook*, 8 N. Y. Rep., p. 67, and *People v. Allen*, 6 Wend., p. 486.)

This seems to be the well established doctrine both in England and in this country. (See *Prowese v. Foot*, 2 Brown Paul Cases, 289; *Pender v. Rex*, 2 id., 294; *Rex v. Jefferson*, 2 Nev. & M., 487; *Rex v. Winchester*, Mayor, Nev. & P., 274.)

So much for the main point involved.

In regard to the point raised by the appellant, that he should have been allowed the privilege of counsel on the hearing of the appeal before Brigadier-General Woodhall, I am of the opinion that the decision of General Woodhall was entirely correct. The point was raised in a case which occurred in Brooklyn, last summer, and which has just been decided by the General Term—Justices Barnard, Gilbert and Tappan, the opinion in which case I had the honor to send you a few days since—and it was there held that, even in court-martial cases, the accused had no right to appear by counsel.

The above considerations lead irresistibly to the following conclusions:

First. That the notices served on the twenty-six officers present were rendered due and valid by their presence at the election.

Second. That the presence of the appellant and the other absentee could not have possibly changed the result of the election, since, even if they had intended to vote against Lieutenant-Colonel Benton, he would still have received a majority of all the legal votes, viz., fifteen out of twenty-eight.

Third. That the irregularities complained of have resulted in no injury to any person, and the appeal should, therefore, be denied, and the election of Lieutenant-Colonel D. S. Benton, as Colonel, confirmed.

I have not arrived at these conclusions without some difficulty; and the examination I have necessarily made of the proceedings in this case leads me to remark that the special attention of officers presiding at elections should be called to the

necessity for compliance literally with all the provisions of the Code; otherwise, confusion, such as has arisen in this case, must necessarily follow.

I return herewith the papers transmitted with your order of reference.

II. While the Commander-in-Chief dismisses this appeal, for reasons which appear to him unanswerable, he cannot allow the occasion to pass without impressing upon the officers of the National Guard the duty and the necessity of strict compliance with the direction of the statute in all elections, so that appeals upon technical and formal points may be avoided. Such appeals tend to confusion, excite bad feelings among the officers, are prejudicial to discipline, and take up, needlessly, the time and attention of the superior military authorities.

From the muster and inspection rolls for the year 1870, it is evident that many of the organizations of the National Guard are below the minimum required by law. The commandants of the weak organizations are enjoined to fill up their commands, if they wish to avoid reduction, consolidation or disbandment. To the end that this matter may be fully understood, extracts from the Military Code relating thereto are appended; and attention is particularly called to the point that the minimum of a company is forty-six non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates, and that at least eight such companies, none having less than said minimum, are required to constitute a regiment.

§ 11. Troops, batteries or companies shall be formed in separate districts when practicable, but the Commander-in-Chief may, in his discretion, organize more troops, batteries or companies than one in the same district, or parts of a troop, bat-

tery or company in different districts, and to every troop, battery or company of cavalry, artillery or infantry there shall be one captain, one first lieutenant, one second lieutenant, one first sergeant, one quartermaster's sergeant, four sergeants, eight corporals, two musicians; and to every troop or company of cavalry or infantry there shall be from thirty to eighty-four privates; and to every battery of artillery there shall be from sixty-four to one hundred and four privates, and one additional second lieutenant; and in the discretion of the Commander-in-Chief, there may be added to the battery organization one first lieutenant, two sergeants and four corporals, and to every troop of cavalry there shall be one additional second lieutenant, and also one veterinary surgeon, with the rank of sergeant-major.

§ 12. Forty-six non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates shall be the minimum, and one hundred the maximum of the troop and company organization of cavalry and infantry; and eighty and one hundred and twenty of the same, the minimum and maximum of the battery organization of artillery; and all troop, battery and company officers shall use their best efforts to obtain volunteers, and recruit their commands so that the minimum shall always be exceeded. Non-commissioned officers shall be chosen from the members of the troop, battery or company to which they belong.

§ 14. Each regiment of cavalry, artillery and infantry shall consist of not less than eight nor more than ten companies, one colonel, one lieutenant-colonel, one major, one adjutant, with rank of first lieutenant, one quartermaster, with rank of first lieutenant, one surgeon, with rank of major, one assistant surgeon, with rank of captain, one chaplain, with rank of captain, one sergeant-major, one quartermaster's sergeant, one commissary sergeant, one hospital steward, and two principal musicians; and, in addition to the foregoing, each regiment of cavalry and artillery shall have one major, and each regiment of cavalry shall have one veterinary surgeon, with rank of second lieutenant, and one saddler sergeant.

§ 15. The battalion organization shall consist of not more than six nor less than four companies, one lieutenant-colonel, one major, one adjutant, with rank of first lieutenant, one quartermaster, with rank of first lieutenant, one surgeon, with rank of major, one chaplain, with rank of captain, one sergeant-major, one quartermaster's sergeant, one commissary sergeant, one hospital steward, and two principal musicians; and each battalion of cavalry shall have an additional major, a veterinary surgeon, with the rank of second lieutenant, and one saddler sergeant; and whenever any regiment shall fall below the number of eight companies, it may be reorganized as a battalion.

§ 178. The Comptroller shall annually draw his warrant upon the Treasurer in favor of the county treasurer of each county for the sum of five hundred dollars for each regiment, and the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars for each battalion, and the sum of two hundred dollars for each separate battery, and the sum of one hundred dollars for each separate troop, certified by the Adjutant-General to be organized according to the provisions of this act, within the county; or in case any regiment, battalion or separate troop or battery is organized in two or more counties, then the Comptroller shall draw his warrant in favor of such county treasurer as the Adjutant-General may in his certificate direct; which sums, and also those paid in like manner by the State, in lieu of furnishing uniforms as provided in section one hundred and thirteen of this act, together with the fines collected from delinquent officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates, shall constitute the military fund of such regiment, battalion or separate troop or battery.

To comply with the provisions of Section 113 of the Military Code (chapter 80, Laws of 1870), a copy of which is appended, it is required that three abstracts of the accounts audited and allowed for payment from the uniform fund of the regiments, battalions or separate troops or batteries be prepared by the board of auditors, and transmitted to these head-quarters, together with duly received vouchers therefor in triplicate. After they have been approved by the Adjutant-General, one set of these abstracts and vouchers will be sent to the auditing board, one set to the county treasurer, and one set will be retained in this office.

§ 113. In lieu of uniforms being furnished by the State to non-commissioned officers and privates, as heretofore provided by law, there shall annually be paid by the State to the military fund of each regiment, battalion and separate troop or battery, for the purpose of aiding the non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates of said organizations in procuring their uniforms, a sum equal to five dollars for each of its non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates who paraded during the year preceding, fully uniformed, armed and equipped, according to the provisions of this act, at least seven different times, four of which shall have been on the occasion of regimental, battalion, separate troop or battery parades. And in order to determine the amount of money to which each regiment, battalion and separate troop or battery will be entitled under the provisions of this section, the commandant of each regiment, battalion and separate troop or battery shall transmit to the Adjutant-General, during the month of December, and prior to the fifteenth day thereof in every year, a roll, giving the name and description of each non-commissioned officer, musician and private in his command who paraded at least seven different times, as hereinabove specified, stating the occasions, during the year next preceding the said month of December; which roll the said commandant shall certify to on honor. And for the purpose of paying the said sums of money, the Comptroller shall draw his warrants upon the Treasurer in favor of the county treasurers, in the same manner as is provided in section one hundred and seventy-eight of this act, on the certificate of the Adjutant-General and Inspector-General, approved by the Commander-in-Chief, showing the amount that each regiment, battalion and separate troop or battery is entitled to. The said money thus appropriated for uniforms shall be held sacred and inviolate for such purpose, and shall not, in any event, be expended for any other; provided, however, that the uniforms required, prior to the first day of October, eighteen hundred and seventy, may be furnished under the provisions of the laws in force at the time of the passage of this act.

After careful examination and full explanation by the exhibitors of the various arms submitted, the Board selected from among them those which, in their opinion, were best adapted to the use of the National Guard, and caused circulars to be sent to the owners asking proposals to furnish the State with fifteen thousand (15,000) new arms of their respective models, and to receive an equal number of the Springfield rifle muskets, caliber fifty-eight, now in the hands of the National Guard, at such price as might be deemed favorable, in part payment therefor.

Proposals were received from the owners or representatives of the following guns: The Remington, Springfield, Ward-Burton, Conroy, Brown, Whitney, Joslyn-Tomes, Peabody.

The proposal of the agent of the Peabody gun was defective, in failing to fix a price for the Springfield muskets owned by the State.

It will be seen that the Remington gun was offered at the lowest net price.

The Board resolved to regard the bids as confidential until the rendition of this report.

Circulars soliciting proposals were forwarded on the 16th of June. The proposals were received on or before the 23d day of June, and were forwarded sealed to Albany, where they were opened by the Adjutant-General in the presence of the other members of the Board, at a meeting held for that purpose on the 23d of June. The Board then adjourned for the purpose of affording the representatives of the various arms an opportunity to perfect the improvements which they desired to make, and to remedy some defects which had been pointed out in certain arms by members of the Board.

The Board reassembled at the State arsenal in New York city on the 1st day of September. General Townsend being absent

in Europe, Colonel J. B. Stonehouse, Assistant Adjutant-General appeared in his stead. They examined such improved arms as had been presented during the recess. It was resolved to institute a series of tests, substantially in accordance with the formula of the St. Louis Board, at the Springfield National Armory (the consent of the proper authorities having been obtained for that purpose), and on the 2d of September notice was served on the representatives of the arms selected to forward the arms they desired to have tested to the Springfield armory, so that the time of trial might be fixed. Advices of the shipment of the following arms, viz.: Remington, Peabody and Ward-Burton, having been received, the Board fixed upon September 22d as the day for the initiation of the tests, and (having given proper notice to the representatives of these arms) assembled at Springfield for that purpose.

The Springfield arm was entered for competition, and fired by an employè of the United States National Armory, at the request of the Board. The Conroy gun was not received until after the commencement of the experiments.

The result of the various tests to which the arms were subjected will be found in the record hereto appended. The salt water test was made at the State arsenal in New York city.

The representatives of the arms tested were afforded every opportunity to display the merits of their respective systems, to point out the alleged defects of competing guns, and to demonstrate, by actual test, the superiority claimed for each in any particular.

The experiments resulted satisfactorily, and demonstrated that all the arms possess great merit in point of accuracy, durability and facility of manipulation. In fact, were the choice of an arm to be determined by the actual result of the experiments upon the arms themselves, the Board would have great difficulty in arriving at a decision, all the arms having undergone the various tests without injury, and, unexceptionally, to the satisfaction of the Board.

In arriving at the recommendation embodied in this report, the Board considered, primarily, the relative merits of the various systems presented, as regards strength, durability, accuracy, and simplicity of mechanism, and liability to accident in the hands of troops who might be comparatively inexpert in the use of arms; secondarily, economy, rendered necessary by the limitation of the appropriation for their purchase, and, in view of the urgent necessity for the immediate procurement of breech-loaders for the National Guard, the ability to furnish the requisite number within a short time.

The Board recommend, unanimously, the adoption of the Remington Rifle Musket, of the improved model manufactured for, and submitted to, this Board (loading at assimilated half-cock, locking the breech-piece in the act of loading, withdrawing the firing-pin by a positive motion, and ejecting the shell on opening the breech), as the best arm, in all respects, for the use of the National Guard of the State of New York.

In order to make it conform to the caliber used by the United States government, the Board recommend the adoption of the 50-100 caliber, although, but for this consideration, and as an independent proposition, they would prefer the 433-1000 caliber.

The Board consider the Springfield, Peabody and Ward-Burton guns especially worthy of attention and consideration. They all possess great merit, and are of undoubted excellence.

The representative of the Conroy gun was not prepared to submit that arm to the regular series of tests at Springfield, and the partial test incorporated in the record herewith submitted, was made at the New York arsenal, when the salt water and sand test was made.

The Roberts gun was also tested partially at the same time. The result is included in the record.

The Conroy gun has many commendable features, is simple in construction, and susceptible of easy and rapid manipulation.

The Board regret that the cost of the arms and the inability of their owners to furnish them within the period fixed for ultimate delivery, prevented the selection of several meritorious guns for the test, to which those preferred were subjected. The Whitney gun, particularly, which is similar in construction to the Remington, was among the best submitted; but these considerations precluded its selection for experiment with the others.

Among those which commended themselves to the Board, as presenting several excellent points, were the Barnekoy-Green, the Joslyn-Tomes and the Brown guns.

The Duval gun, exhibited at Springfield by Mr. Prentice of Montreal, possesses many good qualities. It is simple in construction and easy of manipulation, but was not fired because of the inability of the exhibitor to procure suitable ammunition.

The Winchester repeating rifle was tested and exhibited at Springfield, but was not entered for competition. The tests, however, are incorporated in the accompanying record. The Board take occasion to say that, under the skillful manipulation of Mr. Addis, this celebrated arm maintained its well established reputation.

The Board desire to express their obligation to Lieutenant Henry Metcalfe, U. S. A., commanding the Springfield national armory during the illness of Colonel Benton, for the extension of complete facilities for conducting their experiments, and take great pleasure in acknowledging his uniformly considerate courtesies.

The Board appointed by General Orders No. 11, current series, "to examine into the merits of various kinds of breech-loading rifle muskets," having reported to the Governor the result of such examination, and recommended the adoption of the Remington rifle musket, improved model, for the use of the National Guard, the same is hereby approved and confirmed.

TESTS.

It was determined by the Board that the arms presented should be subject to the following tests, viz. :

1st. *Rapidity of Fire*.—Test: The gun to be fired from the shoulder, and the number of shots in a minute noted.

2d. *Accuracy of Fire*.—Test: Twenty shots to be fired from the shoulder at a target 100 yards distant, twenty shots from rest at distance of 300 yards, and twenty shots from rest at 700 yards.

3d. *Effect of sand and dust on breech mechanism and working of the arm*.—Test: Eight shots to be fired; then fine, dry sand to be sifted over the breech mechanism when closed, and eight shots fired; then fine, dry sand to be sifted over the same parts when open, and nine shots fired; the sand to be removed in each case by shaking the piece, or using only the hand; the piece then to be examined and cleaned.

4th. *Effect of defective ammunition*.—Test: The arm to be fired with six cartridges, rendered defective in the following manner: 1st. One cut longitudinally from the end of the case to the rim, and placed in the chamber with the cut upward. 2d. One cut longitudinally from the end of the case to the rim, and placed in the chamber with the cut downward. 3d. One to be cut helically from the end of the rim. 4th. One to be cut at the base, so that the firing-pin in firing will pierce it. 5th. One to be pierced through the base at four points. 6th. One to be filed through the rim.

5th. *Effects of salt water*.—Test: The arm to be placed for three hours in brine covering the breech mechanism and chamber; then to be exposed in the open air until the next day, and fifty shots to be fired.

6th. *Simplicity of construction*.—Test: The arm to be dismounted and assembled, and time occupied in each operation noted, and the arms to be examined with regard to the effect of the several tests on the mechanism of the gun.

RESULT OF TESTS.

REMINGTON. CALIBER .50, WITH EXTRACTOR AND LOCKING DEVICE.

Rapidity of fire.

First trial, fourteen shots in one minute; second trial, sixteen shots in one minute; third trial, sixteen shots in one minute. Berdan cartridge.

Accuracy of fire.

One hundred yards, see target No. 1. Three hundred yards, see target No. 2. Seven hundred yards, see target No. 3.

Effects of sand and dust.

After the last sanding, the arm worked stiff for one or two shots, otherwise the gun worked well, no perceptible injury to breech mechanism.

Effects of defective ammunition.

No discharge of gas until the sixth cartridge was fired, when there was sufficient to slightly cloud a piece of white paper placed over the breech block during the firing, no perceptible injury to mechanism.

Effects of salt water.

On attempting to fire the first cartridge it was discovered that the firing pin was broken. A new pin was put in place and the gun again placed in salt water, and exposed in the open air the prescribed time,* the piece was then fired, working rather stiff, and the extractor failed to throw out five or six shells.

Simplicity of construction.

The piece was dismounted and found to be uninjured by the several tests. It was dismounted in fifteen seconds and assembled in fifty-nine seconds.

SPRINGFIELD. CALIBER, .50.

Rapidity of fire.

First trial, broke firing pin; second trial, eighteen shots in one minute; third trial, seventeen shots in one minute. (Berdan cartridge.)

Accuracy of fire.

One hundred yards, see target No. 4. Three hundred yards, see target No. 5. Seven hundred yards, see target No. 6.

Effect of sand and dust.

The piece worked stiffly for two or three shots after second sanding, with this exception it worked well.

Effect of defective ammunition.

No escape of gas until No. 6, when a few small particles of powder were visible on the white paper placed over breech block.

* This gun was not cleaned before placing in salt water and exposing it to the atmosphere a second time.

Effect of salt water.

Not very much rusted. Gun worked well.

Simplicity of construction.

The gun was dismantled, examined and found uninjured. It was dismantled in forty-five seconds and assembled in sixty-one seconds.

WARD-BURTON. CALIBER, .50.

Rapidity of fire.

First trial, eighteen times in a minute; second trial, twenty times in a minute; third trial, twenty-one and one miss fire (Berdan cartridges).

Accuracy of fire.

One hundred yards, see target No. 7. Three hundred yards, see target No. 8. Seven hundred yards, see target No. 9.

Effects of sand and dust.

After last sanding the two first cartridges placed in gun, could not be discharged. With this exception of being a little stiff, the gun worked well.

Effects of defective ammunition.

After No. 6 there was sufficient escape of gas to cloud very slightly a portion of the white paper placed over the breech.

Effects of salt water.

The bolt was considerably rusted, causing it to work rather tight for one or two firings. Afterward worked well.

Simplicity of construction.

The piece was dismantled in five and a half seconds and assembled in sixteen seconds. It was examined when dismantled, and found to have sustained no injury from the several tests.

PEABODY. CALIBER, .43.

Rapidity of fire.

First trial, eighteen shots in one minute; second trial, twenty-five shots in one minute; third trial, was not fired.

Accuracy of fire.

One hundred yards, see target No. 10. Three hundred yards, see target No. 11. Seven hundred yards, see target No. 12.

Effects of sand and dust.

No perceptible difference in the working of the gun, excepting perhaps a very little stiffness.

Effects of defective ammunition.

After No. 3 the extractor did not withdraw cartridges. No escape of gas perceptible on the paper.

Simplicity of construction.

The piece was dismantled and found uninjured by the several tests. It was dismantled in twenty-five seconds and assembled in forty-five seconds.

WINCHESTER MAGAZINE GUN. CALIBER, .43.

This gun was tested only for rapidity of fire, making twenty-three shots in a minute, and from magazine, thirty-seven shots and three miss-fires in a minute; and for accuracy of fire, at 100 yards, see target No. 13.

CONROY. CALIBER, .43.

Rapidity of fire.

First trial, sixteen shots in a minute; second trial, not fired; third trial, not fired

Accuracy of fire.

Not tested.

Effects of sand and dust.

After second sanding the piece was worked with great difficulty; the insertion, discharge and extracting of shells of the few first cartridges occupied considerable time.

Effects of salt water.

Not much rusted and gun worked well.

Simplicity of construction.

Not tested.

ROBERTS. CALIBER, .50.

Rapidity of fire.

First trial, seventeen shots in a minute; second trial, not fired; third trial, not fired.

Accuracy of fire.

Not tested.

Effects of sand and dust.

Gun was operated with great difficulty, lever was bent in closing breech, and cartridge could not be extracted without using the ramrod.

Effects of salt water.

The gun being nickle-plated, was rusted but little and worked without difficulty.

Simplicity of construction.

Not tested.


Two other Remington guns were presented to the Board; one without locking device or extractor, calibre, 43 (Spanish gun); the other with locking device differing from the one first mentioned in the report. These arms were not subjected to all the tests, but such trial as was made of them proved that they withstood the tests equally well with the arm reported upon herein. Targets Nos. 14 and 15 are those of the Remington arm, caliber, '43, at 300 and 700 yards respectively.

In the Peabody gun a piece of wood was inserted in rear of firing pin so as to render it immovable; in this condition the gun could not be fired.




No. 2.—TARGET RECORD, "REMINGTON LOCKING RIFLE." CAL. .50.
