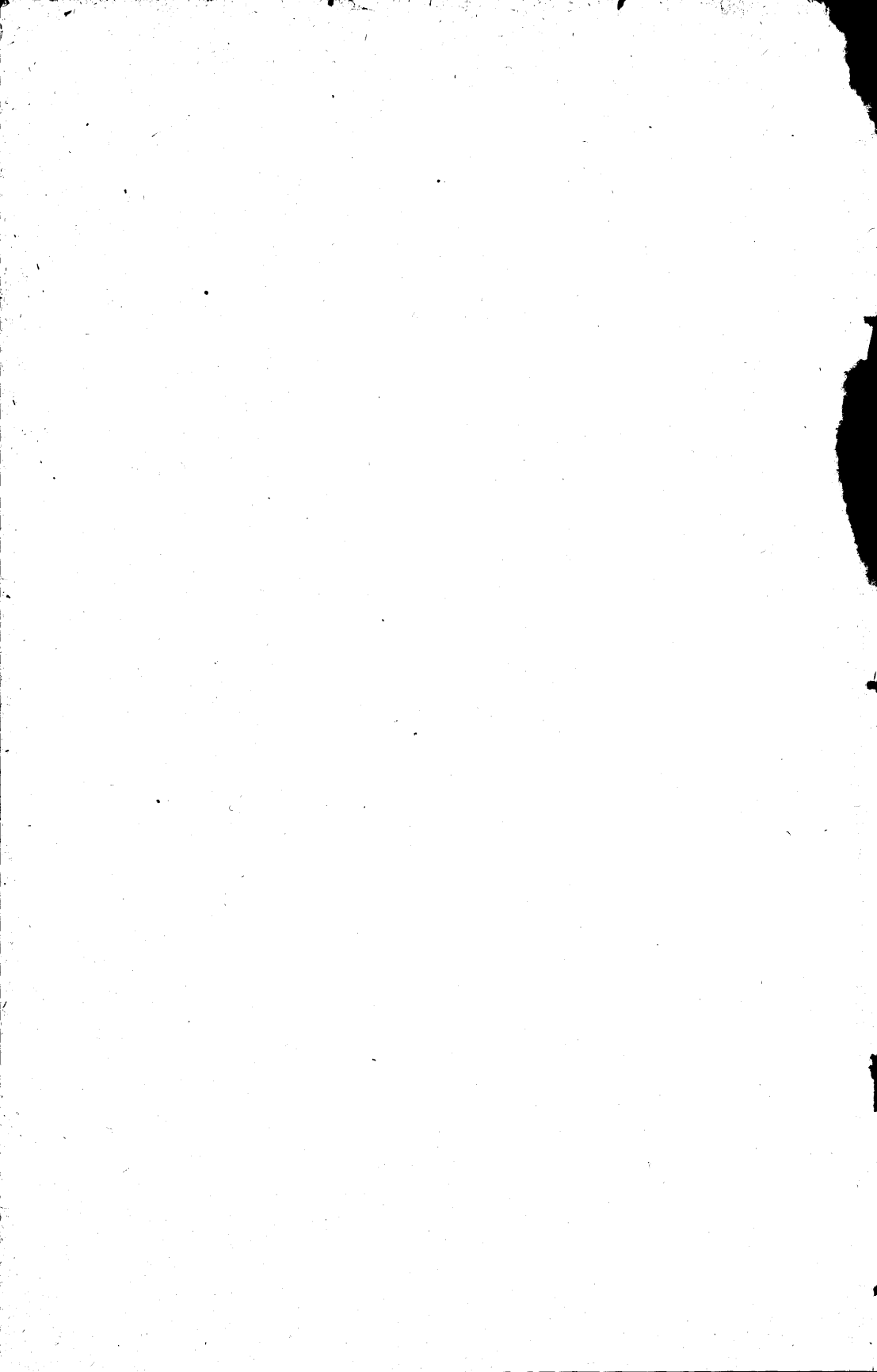

SIR: I have the honor to submit the report of this department for the year 1886, as follows:

## THE MILITIA.

It is estimated that there are in the state at least 650,000 men subject to military duty, not including those capable of such service, but specially exempted by law. These constitute the militia, which the laws of the United States still require to be enrolled, organized, disciplined and kept ready for service.

If the law of the land is to be respected, it is incumbent upon the state to provide for the enrollment and organization of its militia, and it is the duty of every good citizen between the ages of eighteen and forty-five, unless within the exemptions provided for by the statutes of the state or the United States, to provide himself with a good musket or firelock of a bore sufficient for balls of the eighteenth part of a pound, two spare flints, a knapsack, and a pouch to contain twenty-four cartridges, or with a good rifle, knapsack, shot pouch and powder horn, twenty balls and a quarter of a pound of powder, and to appear so armed, accoutred, and provided, whenever called out to exercise or into service. Commissioned officers should provide themselves with a sword or hanger, and a spontoon, or if in the artillery with a fusee instead of a spontoon. Field officers are still required to furnish colors for their regiments at their own expense, and company officers must provide their companies with drums and fifes, or bugle-horns. See Statutes of the United States 1792, chapter 33, and the United States Revised Statutes, sections 1625-1661.

Such is the law as enacted by congress in 1792, and with the exception that in 1808 an act was passed providing for an annual appropriation of \$200,000, for the purpose of providing arms and equipments for the whole body of the militia, such it remains, essentially unchanged upon the statute books, at the present time. Practically it has been ignored for at least half a century, and it was doubtless from the beginning more honored in the breach than in the observance.

The system contemplated by the constitution, and provided for by the act of 1792, is impracticable. The forces which have been at times organized and called into service under it, have been conspicuously inefficient and unreliable. The militia of the constitution is a theory of the last century, and although the question of a national force has been frequently and earnestly discussed by our wisest statesmen, congress has found no better expression of the formation of such a force than the impracticable provisions of the statute above cited.

But without any aid from the general government, the volunteer military organizations which have grown up in the several States, variously known as State Troops and National Guards, by the rapid progress they have made in matters of organization, discipline and the use of arms, as well as by the proofs they have given that under proper auspices they may be depended on for service, have solved the problem which puzzled the national legislature, and given us a force sufficiently national in its character, but at the same time not obnoxious to the prejudices which obtain against a centralized force or standing army.

In the solution of this question, the evolution of a volunteer force capable of the highest military qualities, and the development of a satisfactory system, the state of New York has played a conspicuous part. But it should be remembered that these volunteers are fulfilling the part allotted by the constitution to the militia, and it would appear to be the duty of congress to make suitable provision for their instruction and support. The subject is mentioned here for the reason that several militia bills have recently been introduced into congress. One which originally provided for an annual appropriation of \$1,000,000 for arms and equipments for the militia, has passed the senate with the sum reduced to \$600,000. In the

house of representatives the amount has been further reduced to \$400,000, and the bill now awaits the action of a conference committee. It is to be hoped that the bill may become a law with the original amount restored. The subject of national legislation in aid and recognition of the National Guard system, is a matter in which the state has a material interest.

#### THE NATIONAL GUARD.

The National Guard, at the date of the last quarterly returns, September 30, 1886, since which time no important numerical changes have occurred, consisted of 12,480 officers and men, organized as follows:

The first brigade with head-quarters at the city of New York, consisting of the first and second batteries, the seventh, eighth, ninth, eleventh, twelfth, twenty-second, sixty-ninth, and seventy-first regiments of infantry.

The second brigade, with head-quarters at Brooklyn, consisting of the third battery, the thirteenth, fourteenth, twenty-third, thirty second and forty-seventh regiments, and the seventeenth separate company of infantry.

The third brigade, with head-quarters at Albany, consisting of the fourth and sixth batteries, the tenth battalion, and the third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, ninth, tenth, eleventh, twelfth, fourteenth, fifteenth, sixteenth, eighteenth, nineteenth, twentieth, twenty-first, twenty-second, twenty-third, twenty-fourth, twenty-seventh, twenty-eighth, thirty-first, thirty-second, thirty-third, thirty-fifth, thirty-sixth, thirty-seventh, and thirty-ninth separate companies of infantry.

The fourth brigade, with head-quarters at Buffalo, consisting of the fifth battery, the sixty-fifth and seventy-fourth regiments, and the first, second, eighth, thirteenth, twenty-fifth, twenty-sixth, twenty-ninth, thirtieth, thirty-fourth, thirty-eighth, fortieth, forty-first and forty-second separate companies of infantry.

Of the number stated as the total strength of the guard, there were present at the annual inspection and muster 10,163 officers and men.

At the beginning of the year the strength of the force was 12,662 officers and men, divided into four divisions and eight brigades, with twelve general and 134 staff officers. The necessity for reformation

in the organization of a force thus constituted was apparent, and had been fully recognized, a difference of opinion existing only as to the nature of the changes which should be made, some officers of established reputation urging more radical measures than those finally adopted August 5, 1886, when the reorganization, as set forth above, was effected. The report has been industriously circulated, that it was intended to supplement this reorganization by the appointment of a Major-General to command the whole National Guard. No such appointment has been contemplated, nor is it recommended by this department.

One battery, the seventh, stationed at Buffalo, having become inefficient, has been, on the recommendation of the Inspector-General, disbanded and mustered out of service. Two signal corps were also disbanded by the general order reorganizing the National Guard, such action being a necessary corollary, under the circumstances, of abolishing the head-quarters to which they were attached.

One company has been organized during the year and attached to the seventy-fourth regiment stationed at Buffalo, making that a regiment of seven companies.

Many applications for permission to form new separate companies have been received, but the general military appropriations hardly warrant the increased expenditure of money which an additional number of organizations would involve, and more than that, it is believed that the force is already large enough for practical purposes, and that it is advisable to keep it well within the limits prescribed by law.

The material of which the Guard is composed is admirable, and as a general rule well represents the industry, prosperity and integrity of the State. Its condition in matters of discipline and military instruction, can best be ascertained by reference to the report of the Inspector-General, submitted herewith, which gives a full, plain and unvarnished, statement of the standing of each and every organization. There is an evident improvement this year as heretofore, but to fully understand what progress has been made, and how surely and steadily it has been accomplished, one must compare the force of to-day, with the force as it existed several years ago, especially as it was prior to the establishment of the State Camp of Instruction, which has already done more to promote the efficiency

of the National Guard than could have been hoped for under other circumstances. It is principally due to the opportunities for practical instruction presented at the Peekskill camp, that it can be said, without any exaggeration, that the state now has a force, which, as a whole, is well drilled, well disciplined, and can be safely relied on for prompt and efficient service whenever called upon. It is true, as shown by the Inspector-General's report, that there are some marked exceptions to be made to this statement, but at the same time it must be remembered that there are many notable instances of organizations that have attained a very high standard of military qualifications.

#### ARMS AND EQUIPMENTS.

The only serious objection to the Remington rifle, with which the troops are armed, is that it does not correspond in calibre with the arms issued by the general government, otherwise it is probably sufficient for all practical purposes, at least for the present, and may be safely relied on until it is ascertained what the coming weapon is to be. There is no doubt that a magazine gun will eventually be adopted for the army, but when and of what pattern or calibre, it would be hazardous to conjecture.

The United States Chief of Ordnance, submitting a statement of the results reached in a trial of the Lee, Chaffee-Reece and Hotchkiss magazine rifles, says that he is "satisfied that neither of these guns should be adopted," and that he is an "advocate for the magazine gun, but it would seem the part of wisdom to postpone for the present any further efforts toward the adoption of a suitable magazine arm for the service." On the other hand, it may be suggested that it is doubtful when and where the rifle of the future will be discovered, and in the meantime the magazine rifles mentioned are reported to be doing satisfactory work both at home and abroad. But it is doubtless the part of wisdom for state troops to await the action of the army, at least for a time.

It has already been suggested by this department that the state rifles might be furnished with new barrels of the desired calibre, and it is said that this change can be made at a moderate cost.

The General Inspector of Rifle Practice, referring to these most important questions, writes as follows :

"I have the honor to express my opinion that in the present condition of uncertainty, as to what may be the best arm for infantry, it would be unwise for the State to expend a large sum for new rifles.

"But I also believe by a comparatively small expenditure our present arm may be made available, and equal to any now in the market, for ten or fifteen years to come, by a process of

"In lieu of the present fifty calibre, thirty-six inch barrel, weight three pounds ten and three-quarter ounces, put a forty-five calibre thirty-four inch barrel, weight three pounds twelve and three-quarter ounces of the same outside dimensions as the present, except in length, of such quality of metal as may be determined upon. Barrel, bayonet, rod, bands and butt plate, to be bronze, block framed, case hardened, upper band to have a stacking as well as swing swivel, barrel to be rifled precisely as is now used for the Lee rifle and chambered for two and four-tenths or a two and six-tenths shell, as may be decided best, but to take United States Government ammunition. New front and rear sights of such pattern as may be deemed best. All the stocks, fore and butt, to be scraped smooth, and oiled and replaced where needed. All locks to be overhauled, replaced by new parts when necessary, and set to an eight-pound trigger pull by honing, not filing. Comb of hammer to be cut off or slightly bent to rear, to enable the front and rear sights (when flat) to be seen with the piece at the shoulder when in aiming position. To this might be added an elastic heel plate. Of course all this under proper inspection, and by taking 1,000 or 2,000 rifles at once, at no time would an organization be without arms. I think contracts could probably be made for a very reasonable sum. When finished the State would have a stand of arms better than any existing single loader, using ammunition same as the government, and in good shape with proper care for ten or fifteen years, by which time the United States ordnance department may have an arm we would be willing to take. There are various experiments which might be made, with this end in view, at comparatively slight cost."

It appears by the reports of the Inspector-General's Department that the equipments issued to the troops are generally unserviceable, and measures have been taken to procure new equipments of



the pattern recommended by the board appointed for that purpose in 1885. Several organizations have already been supplied, and new equipments will be issued to the whole Guard as rapidly as they are received. These equipments consist of a grained leather belt with brass plate, bronzed steel bayonet scabbard, and the Frazier cartridge box. McKeever cartridge boxes have been given to one regiment for trial. The knapsacks and haversacks issued by the state are in fair condition, and will serve at least for the present. New canteens are required, and should be obtained as soon as possible.

#### UNIFORMS.

The troops are now all supplied with the state uniform, excepting only the seventh and twenty-second regiments, which have furnished their own uniforms as allowed by law, and have, therefore, in the matter of clothing, been of no expense to the state. The system of issuing uniforms has been matured by experience, and the cost of keeping up the supply has been kept strictly within proper bounds, to the material advantage of the military fund. The excellent results shown in this matter are especially due to the faithful and intelligent services of Col. Thomas H. McGrath of the Inspector-General's Department. The overcoats in use were purchased nine years ago, and are unserviceable and for the most part shabby and discreditable. New ones of the cloth and pattern prescribed by regulations should be procured without delay. A blouse also is a part of the regulation uniform, and is a thing which the troops actually require. It is suggested that the purchase of overcoats and blouses be made the subject of a special appropriation.

#### STATE CAMP OF INSTRUCTION.

The following regiments and companies performed a tour of duty at the State camp this season :

The fourteenth regiment, Col. H. W. Michell, from June nineteenth to June twenty-sixth.

The eleventh regiment, Col. Albert P. Stewart, and the thirty-second regiment, Col. Louis Finkelmeier, from June twenty-sixth to July third.

The eighth regiment, Col. George D. Scott, and seventy-fourth regiment, Col. William M. Bloomer, from July third to July tenth.

The sixty-ninth regiment, Col. James Cavanaugh, from July tenth to July seventeenth.

The sixty-fifth regiment, Col. Thomas S. Wand, and the seventh provisional battalion, consisting of the thirteenth, twenty-fourth, twenty-sixth and thirty-second separate companies, Major J. Fred. Ackerman, thirteenth regiment, commanding, from July seventeenth to July twenty-fourth.

The first provisional battalion, consisting of the first, eighth, twenty-fifth and thirty-fourth separate companies, Lieut.-Col. John B. Frothingham, A. A. G. third brigade, commanding. The second provisional battalion, consisting of the second, twenty-ninth, thirty-first and thirty-ninth separate companies, Lieut.-Col. Selden C. Clobridge, fourteenth regiment, commanding. The third provisional battalion, consisting of the tenth, twelfth, thirteenth and thirtieth separate companies, Lieut.-Col. William J. Harding, twenty-second regiment, commanding from July twenty-fourth to July thirty-first.

The fourth provisional battalion, consisting of the third, seventh, twenty-first and thirty-third separate companies, Lieut.-Col. Samuel M. Welch, Jr., sixty-fifth regiment, commanding. The fifth provisional battalion, consisting of the fourth, fourteenth, fifteenth and twenty-third separate companies, Lieut.-Col. Heman Dowd, twelfth regiment, commanding. The sixth provisional battalion, consisting of the sixteenth, twenty-seventh, thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh separate companies, Major John J. Riker, twelfth regiment, commanding, from July thirty-first to August seventh.

It was thought that separate companies, which, as companies, excel in many respects, but are without opportunities for practice in skirmish and battalion drill and guard duty, could be more thoroughly and carefully instructed if formed in battalions of four companies each, rather than in regiments of ten or twelve companies, under commanding officers specially selected for the purpose. The experiment was tried, with eminently satisfactory results, for which due credit should be given to the officers detailed as battalion commanders.

The aggregate number of officers and men in camp this year was 4,600, and the average daily number present was 657. The following table shows the highest and lowest attendance, the aggregate or

present and absent, and the average percentage of attendance, of each organization in camp :

The behavior of the troops, as well as the condition in which the camp was kept, deserves the highest commendation. As to the work done, and the discipline maintained, attention is respectfully invited to the accompanying report of Major R. H. Jackson, fifth artillery, Brevet Brig-Gen. United States army, who remained at the camp throughout the season, in pursuance of orders from the War Department.

In the Inspector-General's report for 1882, it is said that "the experience of the camp at Peekskill has confirmed the opinion expressed in previous reports, that a camp of instruction cannot produce results adequate to the trouble and expense without a permanent commanding officer and corps of instructors."

This year the camp was constituted a military post, under a commanding officer assigned to duty for the season. Two officers of this department, without extra expense to the State, and one regimental officer with the pay of a first lieutenant, were detailed as

instructors. The number of instructors was found to be insufficient, and it was not possible this year to carry out the system to the full extent which is to be desired. But enough was done to justify the opinion of the accomplished officer above quoted, and to set at rest any question as to whether the plan should be followed in the future.

The camp was primarily established, not for the purpose of affording the troops opportunities for holiday celebrations or theatrical display, but as a camp of instruction, a school where soldiers may be taught and practiced in their art, and as such it should be strictly maintained. There should be a permanent commanding officer, and at least five or six competent instructors. The difficulty is to find officers properly prepared for the duties of an instructor, who are willing to devote six or seven weeks' time to service at the encampment. There is only one way of meeting this difficulty, and that is by the appointment of a staff of instructors who shall be placed permanently on duty and receive a suitable compensation for their services.

It is urged in various quarters, among others by the Adjutant-General of the Army, that men should be sent to camp for at least ten days, but it is doubtful whether seven days is not all that can practically be exacted of men who are engaged in the pursuits of civil life. If the time of the encampment is not consumed in elementary matters, which should be attended to in the armories, much can be accomplished in seven days. But every organization should have a tour of camp duty at least once in two years.

Referring to the orders relating to this year's encampment, copies of which are forwarded herewith, it is gratifying to notice that all the innovations made upon the practice of former years are in accord with opinions expressed by the Adjutant-General of the Army in his annual report for 1886, recently published.

He says, speaking of the encampments of State troops, among other things, that "camps should be divested of every appearance of a holiday character;" that "the programme of military exercises should exclude elementary company drills, and the time of the encampment devoted to practice in skirmish and battalion drill, and guard duty;" that "officers should be required to recite upon the duties of guard and sentinels, and instruction in guard duty be

given to the men in the armories ;" that "exhibition drills are undesirable features of military camps ;" and that "the great want is a thorough, systematic course of instruction, prescribed from State head-quarters, and rigidly insisted on, and the establishment in each State of an examining board, before which ignorant and incompetent officers could be brought with a view to their elimination from the military service."

By chapter 484 of the Laws of 1886, \$20,000 was appropriated for making certain improvements at the camp grounds, namely : the completion of the system of water-works and sewerage, drainage of company streets, construction of water-closets, laying of water-proof floor under mess hall, blasting of rocks, building of retaining wall adjacent to the main entrance road, and filling up chasms in the surface of the camp, to be expended by the Adjutant-General, the Inspector-General and the Chief of Ordnance, appointed commissioners for that purpose.

Under this law a contract has been awarded to Mr. William E. Warren, for cutting away the "Point of Rocks," so called, and filling up a ravine on the easterly side of the ground, and the work is now in progress. Other improvements will be undertaken as early as may be possible.

#### RIFLE PRACTICE.

Rifle practice has been conducted as heretofore. Under the supervision of the General Inspector of Rifle practice, who is untiring in the performance of his duties, and whose knowledge of everything that pertains to the art of shooting is thorough and complete, the troops have attained more than a fair degree of proficiency, and are thus made so much the more servicable. It is proposed to make some desirable changes in the system, the coming year, and if the appropriation warrants it, larger allowances of ammunition and transportation will be made.

#### ARMORIES.

As a general rule, all the organizations are quartered in suitable armories, except in the city of New York. The recent action, however, of the Armory Board, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of that city, in providing for armories for the eighth and twenty-second regiments, indicates a desire on their part to make

such suitable provision for all the organizations there stationed as may be necessary and proper.

By chapter 330 of the Laws of 1886, an appropriation of \$7,000 was made for completing and improving the armory at Troy, and one of \$5,000 for completing and improving the armory at Newburgh. Chapter 299 of the Laws of 1886 appropriates \$3,500 for making repairs and improvements in and about the armory at Oneonta. Chapter 482 of the Laws of 1886 gives \$2,500 for fitting and furnishing for occupancy, the armory in the village of Walton. In each of these instances the Adjutant-General, Inspector-General and Chief of Ordnance are made commissioners to carry out the purposes of the acts, and for the expenditure of the money. By this practice of making these officers commissioners in all cases of appropriations for the construction or improvement of armories, a great amount of extra labor and responsibility is imposed upon them.

During the present year the work authorized by the acts cited has been undertaken and is now in progress. The same commissioners under acts of the Legislature of previous years, are also engaged in erecting an armory at Elmira, and had for a time the completion of the armory of the Forty-Seventh Regiment at Brooklyn and the armory at Troy, on their hands. The work going on at the State Camp under the same commissioners has been already mentioned. In all cases the work is done under contracts which are duly advertised and awarded to the lowest bidders.

The following organizations are quartered in state armories: the forty-seventh regiment, Brooklyn; the seventeenth separate company, Flushing; the fifth and tenth separate companies, Newburgh; the fourteenth separate company, Kingston; the sixth, twelfth and twenty-first separate companies and the fourth battery, Troy; the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh separate companies, Schenectady; the third separate company, Oneonta; the twentieth separate company and sixth battery, Binghamton; the thirty-third separate company, Walton; the twenty-fourth and twenty-eighth separate companies, Utica; the thirty-ninth separate company, Watertown; the fortieth and forty-first separate companies and fifth battery, Syracuse; the second separate company, Auburn; the twenty-ninth and thirty-eighth separate companies, Oswego; the eighth separate company, Rochester; and the sixty-fifth regiment, Buffalo.

All the rest of the organizations (including an those of the first and second brigades, with the exception only of the seventh regiment, whose armory stands on land belonging to the county, and one other regiment and one company), are quartered in armories erected or leased by the counties in which they are stationed.

#### WAR CLAIMS.

The prosecution of claims against the general government for moneys expended in raising, arming, equipping, rationing and transporting troops, during the war of the rebellion, is in the charge of Major-General John G. Farnsworth, whose experience for several years as the head of this department, makes his services especially valuable. By his report, which is submitted herewith, it will be seen that there has been collected this year the sum of \$18,837.85. The total amount collected up to the present time is \$4,023,298.44. The outstanding claims amount to \$1,078,575.35.

#### VOLUNTEER DIVISION.

The records of the volunteers of the war of the rebellion are here collected, and from them information is afforded freely to the veteran, his widow or children. Over five thousand requests for information have been received this year by mail, and a large number has been made in person by those interested.

It has always been a source of great regret that these records are so very incomplete. Final records are on file of only about half of the men furnished by the State during the rebellion.

Under date of July thirty-first, last, the Adjutant-General of the Army with the consent of the Secretary of War, made this proposition:

To send a few expert clerks in each division of his department to prepare, under proper supervision, such records and reports as the State may call for, accomplishing it by extra or night work at a compensation of sixty cents per hour. The chief of division to report daily the number of men on duty, and the actual number of hours to be credited to each clerk. The State to pay this compensation and also the estimated cost of the gas consumed.

There being at the time no funds disposable for the purpose, the proposition could not be accepted. The measure proposed seems to [Assembly, No. 18.]

be the only way now to enable the State to obtain copies of missing muster-rolls to complete its record of the volunteers, militia and National Guard. The appropriation of \$10,000, made by the legislature in 1884, having lapsed, it is earnestly recommended, and strongly urged, that the sum of \$10,000 be reappropriated in such manner as to enable the department to assist in carrying out the proposal of the Adjutant-General of the Army, and complete the records of volunteers.

Col. Fred. Phisterer, Acting Assistant Adjutant-General, is in charge of this division, and has been its chief for the past seven years.

THE BUREAU OF MILITARY STATISTICS,

Which has charge of the battle-flags of our volunteer regiments and batteries, and a large and valuable collection of relics and mementos of the late war, has a strong claim on the public regard. It is, in fact, a military museum, and has been visited during the year by a constantly increasing number of people from all parts of the country. The quarters provided for its occupancy in the Capitol are insufficient, wholly unsuitable for the display of the collection, and in fact entirely unfitted for its proper preservation. Were it not for this, many valuable contributions would be made to the collection, which under existing circumstances will probably be disposed of in other directions.

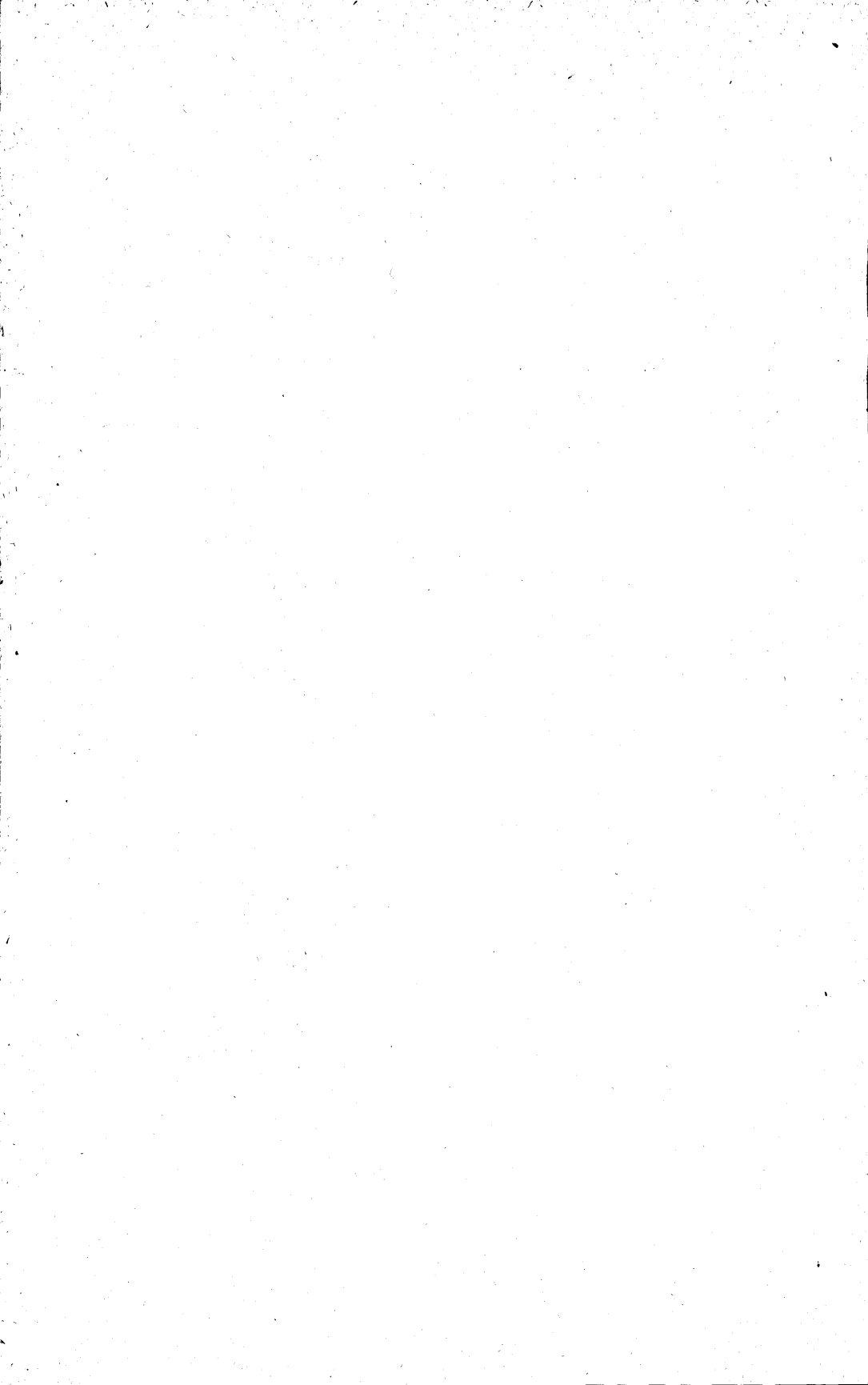

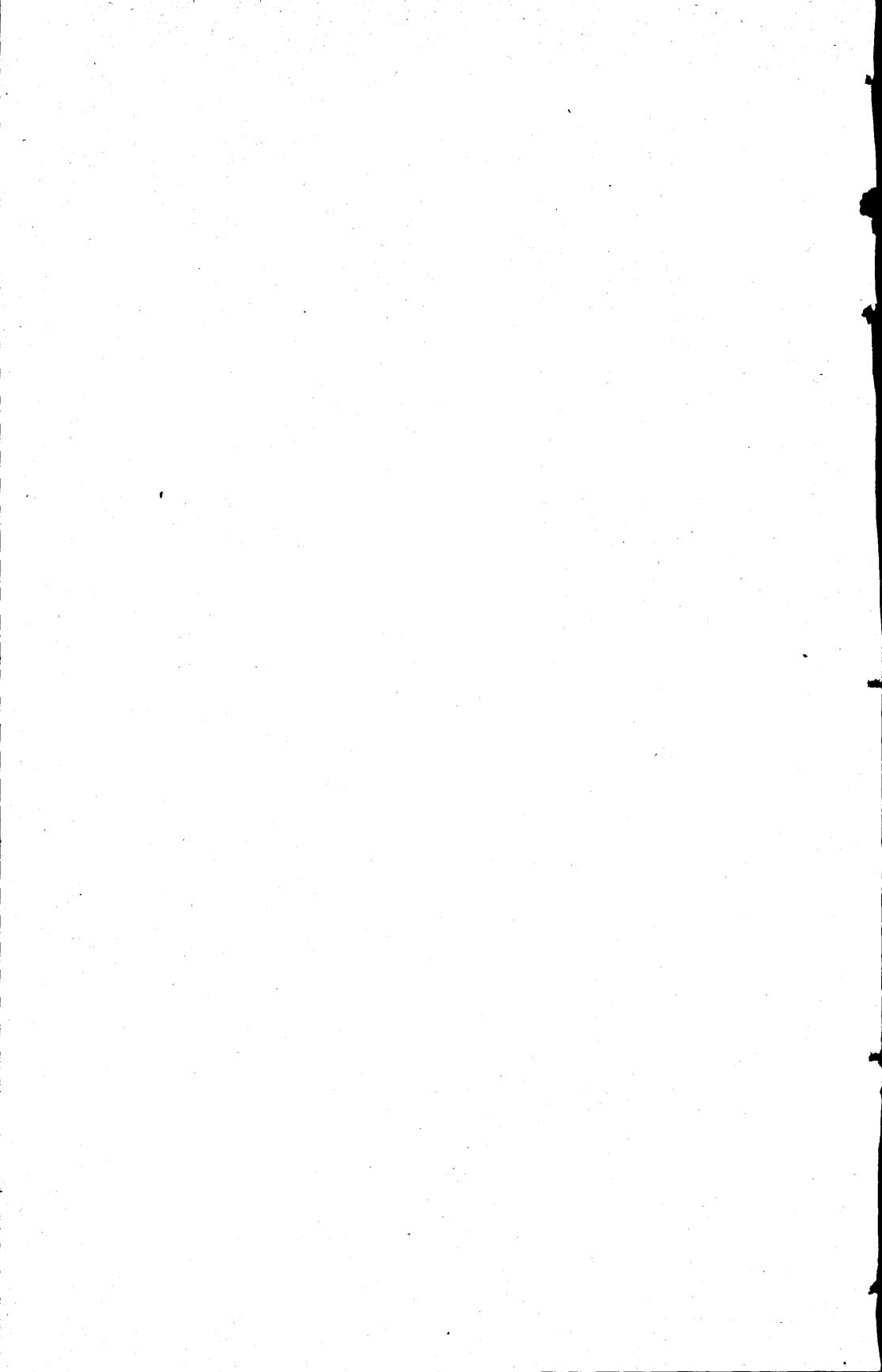

## REPORT ON STATE CAMP.

BY

TO THE ADJUTANT-GENERAL, U. S. ARMY,  
*Washington, D. C.:*

SIR.—In obedience to Special Orders, No. 131, current series, from the headquarters of the army, and letter of instructions from your office of June 8, 1886, I have the honor to submit the following report of my inspection and observation of the several organizations of the National Guard, State of New York, on duty at the State camp of instruction at Peekskill, N. Y., during the period extending from June 19 to August 7, 1886.

By general orders, No. 14, dated June 2, 1886, from general headquarters State of New York, the camp was constituted a military post, with a post commander (Major-General Josiah Porter) and staff.

The camp was opened on the nineteenth of June by the prompt arrival of the commanding officer and staff, and the Fourteenth Regiment, from Brooklyn, N. Y., everything having been prepared for their reception, *i. e.*, the tents pitched, an abundant supply of camp and garrison equipage on hand, and the immense kitchen and mess house in good working order. The routine of duties as prescribed by orders, No. 1, from post headquarters, was begun at once, and from that day until the close of the camp, on the seventh instant, there was no departure from it.

### THE TROOPS.

*June 19th to 26.*—Fourteenth Regiment, present and absent, 36 officers and 564 men; in camp June twentieth, 35 officers and 427 men.

*June 26th to July 3d.*—Eleventh Regiment, present and absent, 29 officers and 453 men; in camp June twenty-seventh, 29 officers and 352 men. Thirty-second Regiment, present and absent, 28 officers and 453 men; in camp June twenty-seventh, 26 officers and 334 men.

*July 3d to 10th.*—Eighth Regiment, present and absent, 25 officers and 437 men; in camp July fourth, 19 officers and 344 men. Seventy-fourth Regiment, present and absent, 26 officers and 375 men; in camp July fourth, 22 officers and 271 men.

*July 10 to 17th.*—Sixty-ninth Regiment, present and absent, 39 officers and 819 men; in camp July eleventh, 38 officers and 586 men.

*July 17th to 24th.*—Sixty-fifth Regiment, present and absent, 33 officers and 501 men; in camp July eighteenth, 29 officers and 417 men. Seventh Provisional Battalion (13th, 24th, 26th and 32d Separate Companies), present and absent, 12 officers and 275 men; in camp July eighteenth, 11 officers and 212 men.

*July 24th to 31st.*—First Provisional Battalion (1st, 8th, 25th and 34th Separate Companies), present and absent, 13 officers and 225 men; in camp July twenty-fifth, 12 officers and 205 men. Second Provisional Battalion (29th, 31st, 2d and 39th Separate Companies), present and absent, 15 officers and 280 men; in camp July twenty-fifth, 10 officers and 222 men. Third Provisional Battalion (10th, 12th, 18th and 30th Separate Companies), present and absent, 11 officers and 255 men; in camp July twenty-fifth, 10 officers and 214 men.

*July 31 to August 7th.*—Fourth Provisional Battalion (3d, 7th, 21st and 33d Separate Companies), present and absent, 12 officers and 249 men; in camp August first, 11 officers and 222 men. Fifth Provisional Battalion (4th, 14th, 15th and 23d Separate Companies), present and absent, 14 officers and 250 men; in camp August first, 13 officers and 192 men. Sixth Provisional Battalion (16th, 27th, 36th and 37th Separate Companies), present and absent, 14 officers and 228 men; in camp August first, 13 officers and 186 men.

It will be observed from the foregoing that the percentage of attendance in camp of the separate companies was in excess of that of the regiments. The regiments were from the large cities, New York, Brooklyn and Buffalo.

The attendance for the regiments averaged 78.33 per cent., and for the separate companies 82.28 per cent.

#### CLOTHING.

The clothing for all of the troops was of the State uniform pattern, consisting of a black helmet, forage cap, overcoat of blue or gray,

double-breasted dark blue coat and light blue trousers. It seems a pity that blouses are not supplied by the State. Most of the organizations, however, are furnished with them at their own expense, and some of the regiments and separate companies have white helmets and trousers. If the blouse were made an article of issue and each man supplied with one, the uniform would be well enough adapted for field service. A heavy double-breasted uniform coat is not a comfortable garment to wear at drill when the mercury stands at eighty-five or ninety degrees in the shade.

#### ARMS AND EQUIPMENTS.

The arms are the Remington rifle, caliber fifty hundredths, with ordinary bayonet. The Frazier patent cartridge box, carried on a black leather waist-belt, with a capacity for twenty rounds of ammunition, is in use. When not filled with ammunition, a wooden block pierced with holes is carried. I was informed that this block of wood was necessary to keep the box in shape. Nearly all of the officers with whom I conversed on the subject preferred this rifle and accoutrements to the Springfield, caliber forty-five hundredths, and the McKeaver cartridge box.

The troops were supplied with knapsacks, canteens and haversacks. The knapsack was of the old glazed pattern, with a wooden frame inside to keep it in shape. It looks well, but would be utterly useless in campaign. It always was an instrument of torture. The canteens and haversacks were very good. The arms, accoutrements and equipments were always kept in a clean and serviceable condition.

There was ample tentage of first rate quality and pattern for a thousand men. The large sized wall tent and medium sized hospital tent were in use. Although these tents had been in use for five years, they were in excellent condition, and such was the care taken of them by the chief of ordinance that hardly a stain was noticed upon them. Each tent was supplied with light portable cots and mattresses, two light camp stools, and enough blankets of a very superior quality to make the men comfortable at night. Water pails, tin cups, and candlesticks were also supplied. Altogether it was the best arranged and most comfortable camp I have ever seen.

The troops were rationed by contract. Three times a day, as the drums beat the breakfast, dinner and supper calls, the whole command marched to the immense mess-hall and were certain to find the most substantial meals carefully prepared for them. The cleanliness of the kitchen, mess-hall, mess furniture and surroundings reflected

great credit upon the contractors and the commissary officers. I now think that this system of feeding troops in camps of instruction is the best I know of, as the companies have nothing but their drills, recitations, etc., to think of, and there is only one kitchen and mess-tent in camp, instead of ten or fifteen under the old system. The food is also better, and better prepared.

#### THE STAFF DEPARTMENTS.

General Varian, the chief of ordnance, and his assistant, Colonel Brownell, had charge of the quartermaster's and subsistence departments. The camp was laid out, the tents pitched, the kitchen and mess-house put in thorough working order, and the sinks and latrines prepared before the arrival of the Fourteenth Regiment on June nineteenth. The camp equipage was transferred to the regimental quartermaster upon his arrival, and by him delivered to the companies, receipts being duly signed for the property. Upon the departure of this regiment from camp on the following Saturday the property was turned over again to the post quartermaster and duly accounted for, and by him again transferred to the incoming troops, and so on from week to week during the encampment. The system was a complete and thorough one.

The regiments and separate companies were transported from their homes to the camp and from thence back again under contracts made by the chief of ordnance (acting quartermaster-general) with steam-boat and railroad companies. They arrived and departed at the hours named in the schedule. The whole machinery of transportation worked smoothly and pleasantly.

As the troops were fed by contract, there were very few papers to be prepared by either the company commanders or the acting commissary of subsistence. Provision returns were submitted in the usual form, were consolidated by the regimental and battalion commanders, and forwarded to post head-quarters for approval and orders. The post-adjutant examined these returns carefully, approved them when correctly made out, and directed the acting commissary of subsistence to furnish the number of meals called for. The system was a good one.

The ordnance department *proper* had very little to do in camp. With the exception of the issue of blank cartridges (twenty rounds per man), ammunition for the morning and evening gun, and for two or three salutes by the platoon of light twelve-pounders, there were no issues of ordnance and ordnance stores.

## MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

Surgeon General Joseph D. Bryant, who made weekly visits of a day or two to camp, had charge of the medical department. It was very thoroughly organized. The regimental and other surgeons and assistant surgeons were exceedingly careful and pains-taking in the discharge of their duties. There was very little sickness of any kind in camp. The cess-pools, sinks, etc., were frequently visited by these officers, and the senior surgeon was required to make a report in writing to the commanding officer three times a day as to the sanitary condition of the camp and its surroundings.

## PAYMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

Paymaster General Lloyd S. Bryce paid the troops weekly just before their departure from camp. Lieutenant-Colonel Joseph P. Eustace, his assistant, and Captain Horatio P. Stacpole, Tenth Battalion, prepared the checks for General Bryce's signature. Individual checks were made out for each officer and enlisted man. The pay-rolls were certified by the captains of companies, and verified by the post-adjutants. Great care was observed in the payments, which were very rapidly conducted.

## INSPECTOR GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT.

There was no inspection by any officer of this department while the troops were in camp.

## TARGET PRACTICE.

There was no target price at the camp this year. The Adjutant-General of the State, who was also the commanding officer, informed me that it had been determined at Albany that the regiments and separate companies should practice at the home ranges so as not to interfere with the practical instruction in drills and recitations at the camp. The New York and Brooklyn regiments have their range at Creedmore, and the other regiments and companies have target ranges of their own.

## INSTRUCTION.

The drills, dress parades, and guard mountings were had at the hours prescribed in orders. When two regiments were present there was a dress parade just before guard mounting as well as at retreat. The dress parades and guard mountings were from first to last very creditably executed, some regiments and provisional battalions being a little better than others. The drills were in the school of the company and battalion, with some practice in skirmishing. I do not

think that sufficient time was given to that most important part of the tactics entitled "instructions for skirmishers." The marching in "columns of fours," company fronts, etc., can all be taught in the armories, but the practical part of the skirmish drill can only be learned in the camp. The breech-loader has given such an "impetus to the employment of skirmishers" that a neglect to teach the subject practically to officers and men, by battalion as well as by company, should not be tolerated. The drills were as a rule admirably conducted. There were some crudities, which were always quickly noticed and corrected by the commanding officer and his assistants. The officers and men were enthusiastic and teachable. It seemed to me, however, that a good many of the company officers were inapt and wanting in their knowledge of their duties, and that they required drilling and setting up. I think that probably a good deal of instruction might be imparted to the officers and sergeants at their armories. Some well instructed officers might be detailed to drill and instruct them, and require them to recite in tactics, etc. The instruction should be theoretical as well as practical, as this camp has very fully demonstrated the great value and need of theoretical instruction.

Captain Horatio P. Stacpole, who supervised the company drills, is an excellent tactical officer. He was present at all of these drills, and made daily reports in writing to the post-adjutant, setting forth the mistakes and inaccuracies he had observed. These reports were sent by the post-adjutant to the commanding officers of regiments and battalions, with orders from the post commander to have the mistakes corrected and the inaccuracies rectified. Nothing escaped the vigilant eye of Captain Stacpole. I observed that some of the adjutants at dress parade, when taking their places after dressing the ranks and commanding "front," did not march "to a point midway between the line of field officers and the commanding officer;" that the officers on approaching the commanding officer at the conclusion of the ceremony were not always halted by the adjutant "at six yards from the commanding officer," and that the ceremony was not always concluded when the officers saluted and the commanding officer had acknowledged the salute and given his instructions. In quite a number of the organizations the officers in line, with the commanding officer, who had faced about in front of them, marched fifty or seventy-five yards further to the front, when they halted; they then separated, one-half of them moving in semi-circular fashion to the right, the other half to the left of the commanding officer, until they met again in front of him, when they all faced toward the battalion, the commanding officer with his back

to the line of officers, who remained standing at attention. The first sergeants, who had meanwhile been observing these maneuvers by the officers, then brought their companies to a carry, closed the ranks and moved them off by *echelon* from the center to the front, and after marching them about one hundred yards away from "their parade grounds," countermarched in columns of fours and returned to their streets. The band followed up this *echelon* movement, and the officers in two ranks and marching by the flank, followed the music to the camp ground, where they were dismissed. Now, this waiting by the men at attention, and all the extra marching, semi-circular wheeling, etc., by the colonel and his officers, seemed very pretty to the multitude, but to the military on-looker it appeared a little ridiculous. It marred the beautiful ceremony, and was fatiguing to the men, besides being a departure from the instructions for dress parade laid down so clearly on page 351, Infantry Tactics (Upton's).

#### DISCIPLINE.

Under this head very little has to be said, as the discipline was, indeed, admirable. The men were obedient and respectful. The quiet that prevailed in camp, particularly between taps and reveille, was remarkable. Military courtesies, as a rule, was strictly observed. The police of the camp and its surroundings was carefully attended to; in fact I think it was the cleanest camp I have ever seen.

Guard duty in the camp was very creditably performed, particularly so by the Sixty-ninth Regiment and separate companies. The officers and non-commissioned officers of the guards made frequent visits to the sentinels, who were generally alert and well instructed. Guard duty, however, cannot be taught in a single tour, and this was about as much as each officer and enlisted man had to do with it while in camp. Lieutenant N. B. Thurston, Twenty-second Regiment, who is a most competent and painstaking officer, delivered lectures to the guard details the day before they were required to march on guard. These lectures covered the duties of officers, sergeants, corporals and sentinels; they were graphic and instructive. He also made frequent observations of the guards and sentinels, and caused all inattention and irregularities to be corrected.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

The facilities for placing the National Guard of the State in a condition for active service are very good, if I am to take this camp as an example. The staff departments have competent officers at their

heads, and indeed the officers generally, of the line, as well as of the staff, have a good knowledge of their duties, and are zealous in performing them.

As a rule, I do not like to select particular organizations for special remark, but I cannot refrain from saying a word or two about the Sixty-ninth Regiment and separate companies. The splendid military appearance of the Sixty-ninth would have attracted the notice of any professional observer. The men were stalwart and manly, soldierly and teachable. The stature of the rank and file, few of whom I think were under five feet eight inches, was so even that the companies required very little sizing; this was a subject of remark during their week in camp. The Twenty-third Separate Company from Hoosac Falls, was a superb body of men, well drilled and disciplined; they are a credit to the National Guard of the State. The Eighth Separate Company, from Rochester, presented a fine military appearance; it was well instructed in drill, particularly so in marching. The Twenty-sixth Separate Company, from Elmira, was the largest one in camp, having three officers and ninety-eight men present; it was a pleasure to look at it. But, indeed, all the separate companies were in good military shape, and the provisional battalions formed from them were easily handled and made rapid progress in drill during their respective tours of duty. The officers selected to command these battalions were of a high order. Lieutenant-Colonel Harding, Twenty-second Regiment, and Lieutenant-Colonel Dowd, Twelfth Regiment, brought their battalions to a high state of efficiency; indeed, all the battalion commanders were indefatigable in their exertions to improve their commands. I think I ought to state here that the improvement made by all the regiments and separate companies during their short time in camp was very apparent and most gratifying, and I have no doubt that they all returned to their homes with every officer and man physically, as well as professionally, better than when they left them.

The Governor of the State made one visit to the camp. The Eighth and Seventy-fourth Regiments were present, and were reviewed by him. Colonel Scott, Eighth Regiment, commanded the troops, and conducted the ceremony in a strictly military manner. All of the ceremonies incident to this visit were well performed.

General Orders, No. 14, issued by direction of the Governor of the State, constituting the camp a military post and placing a competent officer in command, was, in my opinion, a step in the right direction; it assured uniformity in discipline and instruction. Major-General



Josiah Porter, the Adjutant-General of the State, an officer of long service and large experience, was placed in command. The selection was in every respect an admirable one, as General Porter has a thorough knowledge of his duties and responsibilities as a post commander, and is a determined, dignified and courteous officer. He was constantly in camp attending to the duties of his position, and made his presence felt everywhere for the good of the command.

Col. Fred. Phisterer, an officer of long and distinguished service in the army, was post adjutant. He was present during the whole encampment. The morning reports, surgeon's reports, pay-rolls, ration returns, etc., all came to his office and were thoroughly scrutinized by him. He instructed the first sergeants in the manner of preparing these papers and keeping their books. He instructed all the sergeants in their duties as guides, as well as in other matters. As he was thoroughly able to give information upon all military subjects to all inquiries, he was constantly appealed to by officers as well as sergeants. Verily, his office was no sinecure. He made daily inspections of the camp and its surroundings, when every street, tent, cot, blanket, etc., underwent a most rigid scrutiny. I accompanied him on several of these inspections and was much impressed by them. Nothing escaped his notice, from a half-burned match in the company street to a dirty candlestick in a tent. Blankets and bedding had to be carefully folded after having been aired. The tent floors had to be raised daily so as to admit the sun and air below them. As there was a place provided for everything, he insisted that everything should be in its place. I have no doubt that a good many of the men looked upon all this as trivial, but Col. Phisterer was always careful to explain that in small matters as well as in large, the soldier should be a model of neatness, and that if he were permitted to neglect a small amount of duty to-day he would in all likelihood neglect more to-morrow.

In conclusion, I desire to thank General Porter and the officers of his staff for the courtesy and kindness extended to me during my official visit to the camp at Peekskill.

I. Paragraph 875 of the regulations is amended as follows :

875. *General officers of staff departments* will, in lieu of epauletts, wear shoulder knots of gold cord, Russian pattern, on cloth of gold, and on the pad the insignia of their respective grades and departments. *General officers of the line*, when authorized by the Commander-in-Chief, may substitute this shoulder knot for the epaulette. The insignia of grade, the star or stars, to be three-fourths of one inch in diameter, and all according to pattern in the office of the Chief of Ordnance.

II. The issue of the new books and blanks is delayed by the failure of the printer to deliver them as agreed upon. Commanding officers of divisions, brigades, regiments, battalions, batteries and separate companies, will make close estimates of blanks required by them for one year, and make requisition accordingly.

III. General orders from this office will hereafter be issued at the rate of one for each officer, and one for each organization, and forwarded in accordance with paragraph 555 of the regulations.

I. Rifle practice will be required the current season of every officer and enlisted man, excepting officers and men of batteries and musicians, at times and places to be designated in orders by Division Commanders.

II. When a command has had an opportunity for a first general practice the Division Commander may, upon the application of its immediate commanding officer appoint a subsequent day or days, for voluntary practice. Commanding officers may excuse members of their respective commands from the first general practice, provided they attend a regularly ordered voluntary practice.

III. The actual cost of transportation, but in no case to exceed fifty cents, will be allowed for every officer and enlisted man attending the first general practice of his organization, provided that the



distance to its nearest available range is more than three miles. Additional practice must be free of expense to the State.

IV. The allowance of ammunition for practice is limited to forty rounds for each officer, non-commissioned officer and private, carried on the returns for the quarter ending March 31, 1886.

V. Requisitions for transportation and ammunition will be made direct on the Chief of Ordnance, State Arsenal, corner Seventh avenue and Thirty-fifth street, New York city.

VI. Scores made, in any class, at a regular rifle association match, in which the full military conditions, including uniform, are observed, and which is approved by the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, will be recognized as official. Such practice will not, however, excuse absence from first general practice as ordered.

VII. Record books of field practice must be kept written up, and will be written in ink. *Alterations in score cards* must be certified to by an Inspector of Rifle Practice. After each practice the score cards will be compared under the supervision of the senior Inspector of Rifle Practice present; the left half will be forwarded by such officer to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice within five days after the practice, the other half will be retained by the commanding officer of the organization practicing.

VIII. The State prize will be competed for at Creedmoor as usual. The Division prizes will be competed for under such conditions as shall be ordered by the Commanding Officers of the Divisions. A prize of a value not to exceed fifty dollars will be awarded to the company in each Division having the highest general figure of merit. Attention is called to R. 372, the last clause of which applies to the successful teams of 1885.

IX. The first general practice should be completed before August first, but *must* be completed before September fifteenth next. Practice for the season will close November sixth next, and no scores made after that date will be recognized. Field practice books, fully written up, must be sent to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, No. 8 Coenties slip, New York city, on or before November 20, 1886.

X. The classification, order of duty and general instructions, prepared by the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, are herewith published for the guidance and observance of all concerned.

#### CLASSIFICATION.

The third class shall consist of all who do not appear on a range for practice.

The second class consists of all present for practice, without refer-

ence to qualifications in previous years, and the practice in this class will be at 100 yards standing, on a third class or No. 3 target, and at 200 yards kneeling, or sitting, on a third class or No. 3 target.

The first class consists of those who score twenty-five and upwards in the second class, and the practice in this class will be at 200 yards standing, No. 3 target, and at 500 yards lying prone, No. 2 target.

A score of twenty-five and upwards in the first class constitutes a marksman, and entitles the maker to receive the State decoration.

A score of forty-two and upwards in the first class constitutes a sharpshooter, and entitles the maker to receive a silver bar.

All officers and enlisted men, who practice, must shoot through the regular classes, and are prohibited from shooting for a second or higher score in a class in which they have already qualified. The record must stand upon the first qualifying score made.

No score by officer or enlisted man will be recognized, unless made at a target to which he has been regularly assigned, and where his name has been previously entered on a score blank.

#### FIRST GENERAL PRACTICE.

(a.) The practice will commence with *class firing* in squads, under a competent non-commissioned officer or other duly designated instructor at each firing point, and the whole under the supervision of an Inspector of Rifle Practice, subject to the orders of the commanding officer present.

Five consecutive shots will be fired at each distance.

This practice will be continued to the end by all present without reference to the scores recorded, except that those who fail to qualify in the second class may be restricted to two shots for practice at each of the higher ranges.

The practice at five hundred yards may be postponed until after the course of firing in ranks.

In regular class practice no officer or enlisted man will be permitted to fire more than five consecutive shots at any one distance, on the same day, except the necessary sighting shots to ascertain elevation, windage and the condition of pieces, which may be fired by officers or well instructed men, under the inspection or approval of an Inspector of Rifle Practice. Trial practice between classes will not be permitted.

At the first distance of either class (*i. e.*, at 100 or 200 yards), a score of *twelve* or upwards is considered as qualifying, and *Second* practice may be allowed to such men as fail to qualify at either dis-

tance (as above), provided time will permit ; but *Third* practice shall not be allowed in any case. If, however, the entire tour of duty, including volley and skirmish, has been performed, and time still permits, such practice may be had as the Inspector of Rifle Practice deems proper.

Those who may have qualified at 200 and 500 yards, but not at 100 and 200, may make their scores valid by practicing through the second class without shooting in the first again.

In regular practice each enlisted man will shoot with the piece issued by the Ordnance Department of the State, and brought by him on the ground, unless the same is declared imperfect by an Inspector of Rifle Practice. In that case the man may shoot with the nearest approved piece in the ranks.

(b.) *Volley Firing, Five rounds.*—Firing in ranks at 100 yards shall then be taken up in the following order, the squad or company being formed in single rank.

Fire by squad [or company], three rounds.

Fire by squad [or company], kneeling, two rounds.

(c.) *Firing as Skirmishers.*—The troops shall be exercised as skirmishers from 325 to 100 yards and return ; firing, on the advance, one round at 300 yards, one at 200 yards, and one at 100 yards ; and on the retreat, one round at 150 yards, and one at 250 yards ; great care being taken by each commanding officer that the men are deliberate and cautious, that no accident may happen. Officers should use discretion and tact, varying the drill according to their ground and targets, deploying men and taking such distances as targets and range will allow ; each body of troops to be so divided that no more may be exercised at one time than can be readily handled on the range, a second class target being used.

As soon as the last (fifth) shot is fired, assemble on the right (or left), thus leaving the front uncovered, so that the second squad or company may deploy ; during this time the marking can be done.

*Commanding Officers are particularly cautioned to use great care in handling their men, having the element of safety in view at all times.*

#### SECOND OR VOLUNTARY GENERAL PRACTICE.

Those present will practice in the classes to which they respectively belong. In other respects the tour of duty will be identical with that prescribed for first general practice, including volley firing and firing as skirmishers.

## GENERAL INSTRUCTION.

**OFFICERS.**— A sufficient number of commissioned officers must accompany all parties for rifle practice to command and instruct the men. At least one company officer will be present with any part of his company on duty, and a field officer will take command of all detachments of two or more companies.

In practice, officers shall shoot first, then the non-commissioned officers, then privates, on such targets as may be assigned to their companies.

The responsibility of officers on the range is great. Good officers will be theoretically proficient in the use of the rifle and able to apply armory instruction in the field. The men will be instructed as much as possible while waiting their turns to shoot, and will have their sights blackened and the correct elevation and windage given them before going to the firing points.

**SURGEONS.**— Commanding officers shall in all cases detail a surgeon to accompany any party ordered out for Rifle Practice, and the duty should not proceed without the presence of a competent medical officer, provided the organization has one attached to it.

**INSPECTION OF PRACTICE.**— Division or Brigade Inspectors of Rifle Practice will inspect the practice for the marksman's decoration (except in authorized matches), and Brigade or Regimental Inspectors the class shooting in their respective organizations, and certify to the score cards.

Organizations having no Inspector of Rifle Practice will be inspected by the Brigade or division Inspector, or an assistant in the Department of Rifle Practice.

*An Inspector who is not able to be personally present on any occasion of duty will so report to his commanding officer, who will then detail a competent officer to act in his stead.*

The powers and authority of Rifle Inspectors in the field will be duly respected by all concerned, and enforced by the commanding officer on duty.

Wooden targets for volley and [where needed] for skirmish firing should be erected without expense to the State on each range. A simple fence painted to represent the necessary lines or divisions, or a frame covered with paper or muslin printed, if backed by a mound sufficient for safety, will suffice. Iron targets, second class, may be used for skirmish drill, but *must* not be used for volley firing.

*Particular* attention is called to the fact that the 300 yard range has been eliminated from class practice, and that five shots kneeling

or sitting at 200 yards have been substituted for it ; also that the volley firing will be performed in single rank.

I. Paragraphs 86, 134, 600, 772, 907 and 908 of the Regulations are amended as follows :

86. All Inspectors of Rifle Practice are required to annually qualify for the Marksman's Badge, which they will habitually wear when on duty.

134. Page 106, fourteenth line from top.

The badges of the society of the Cincinnati; the Military Order of the Loyal Legion ; the Grand Army of the Republic and of armies or army corps, indicating actual service in the field ; State Marksman Badges ; badges authorized by the Commander-in-Chief, indicating long and faithful service in the National Guard ; and medals or badges worn in military target matches, or in matches for excellence in drill, authorized by the Commander-in-Chief ; may be worn, by those entitled to them, upon the left breast of the dress or uniform coat, the top of the ribbons on a line above the armpit. The State Marksman's Badge may, however, be worn on the undress or fatigue coat. No other medal, badge, ribbon or decoration will be worn. Watch-guards, chains and seals will not be exposed on the dress.

600. For the transaction of their official business, officers will use the appropriate blanks. Requisitions for blank books and forms will be in the shape of a letter, direct to the Adjutant-General. For a regiment or battalion the respective regimental or battalion commanders will make the necessary requisitions and supply their company commanders. In designating the kind of blanks desired, the number found opposite the name of the blank will be given. Forms 10, 11, 14 and 15, will not be furnished by the State.

772. The Judge Advocate of a Military Court, where there is one, and the recorder or secretary of a board or commission makes out the necessary vouchers and abstract of account; the president certifies thereto, and forwards them direct to the officer who ordered the board, commission or court, who will certify to the correctness of the number of days charged for (M. C. 94), and forward the abstracts to the Adjutant-General direct.

907. The grade of non-commissioned officers will be marked by chevrons of cloth; those on the uniform coat to be of raised cloth. The chevrons will be worn points down; those upon the uniform coat and fatigue coat will be above the elbow, those on the overcoat will be below the elbow, with the point one-half inch above the cuff.

908. The chevrons will be of the same color as the facing of the uniform coat, except those worn by infantry, which will be white. The bars of the chevrons will be one-half inch wide, separated by black silk stitching. The arms of the chevrons-bars to be six to seven inches long, to be the arcs of a circle of about twenty-five inches radius, and to meet at an angle of about ninety degrees; distance between extreme outer ends about nine inches; according to patterns in the office of the chief of ordnance. Organizations will be allowed to substitute, at their own expense, gold chevrons on their uniform coats.

II. With knapsacks the cartridge boxes will be worn in front; preparatory to the execution of the firings and the skirmish drill, the commanding officer may order them to be placed in front; at all other times they will be worn behind the right hip.

The following methods for opening and closing the boxes are prescribed:

#### WHEN WORN IN FRONT.

*To open the box.*— (One), the right hands quits the piece and seizes the strap of the box, the right forearm holding the piece in position; the left hand seizes the box below the right; the box is then opened with both hands, and the position of order arms resumed.

*To Close the box.*— The box being inspected, it is closed with both hands the hands moving as prescribed above.

#### WHEN WORN BEHIND THE RIGHT HIP.

*To open the box.*— (One), steady the piece with the left hand, opening the box with the right. Drop the right hand to the side (without regrasping the piece, but still steadying it with the left hand).

*To close the box.*— (One), close the box with the right hand.

Regrasp the piece with the right hand, dropping the left hand by the side.

In both of these methods the hands, in assuming the prescribed positions in seizing, opening, closing and quitting the box, and in resuming the position of order arms, must move simultaneously.

I. General Orders No. 9, c. s., from these head-quarters is modified as follows:

The Ninth Separate Company is relieved, and the Twelfth Separate Company is detailed in its place, and will proceed to the State Camp of Instruction at Peekskill on the twenty-fourth day of July next.

The Tenth Separate Company will proceed to the State Camp of Instruction on the twenty-fourth instead of the thirty-first of July and the Thirty-third Separate Company on the thirty-first instead of the twenty-fourth of July next.

The First, Eight, Twenty-fifth and Thirty-fourth Separate Companies will form the First Provisional Battalion.

The Second, Twenty-ninth, Thirty-first and Thirty-ninth Separate Companies will form the Second Provisional Battalion.

The Tenth, Twelfth, Eighteenth and Thirtieth Separate Companies will form the Third Provisional Battalion.

The Third, Seventh, Twenty-first and Thirty-third Separate Companies will form the Fourth Provisional Battalion.

The Fourth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth and Twenty-third Separate Companies will form the Fifth Provisional Battalion.

The Sixteenth, Twenty-seventh, Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh, Separate Companies will form the Sixth Provisional Battalion.

The Thirteenth, Twenty-fourth, Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth Separate Companies will form the Seventh Provisional Battalion.

II. To carry out the purpose of the establishment of the State Camp at Peekskill as a Camp of Instruction, it is constituted a military post, and the following officers are detailed for duty thereat:

Major-General Josiah Porter, as Post-Commander.

Colonel Frederick Phisterer, as Post-Adjutant.

First Lieutenant N. B. Thurston, Twenty-second Regiment, as Instructor of Guards.

Lieutenant-Colonel John B. Frothingham, Assistant Adjutant-General, Third Brigade, Brooklyn, as commanding officer of the First Provisional Battalion.

Lieutenant-Colonel Selden C. Clobridge, Fourteenth Regiment, Brooklyn, as commanding officer of the Second Provisional Battalion.

Lieutenant-Colonel William J. Harding, Twenty-second Regiment, Brooklyn, as commanding officer of the Third Provisional Battalion.

Lieutenant-Colonel Samuel M. Welsh, Sixty-fifth Regiment, Buffalo, as commanding officer of the Fourth Provisional Battalion.

Lieutenant-Colonel Heman Dowd, Twelfth Regiment, New York city, as commanding officer of the Fifth Provisional Battalion.

Major John J. Riker, Twelfth Regiment, Brooklyn, as commanding officer of the Sixth Provisional Battalion.

Major J. Fred. Ackerman, Thirteenth Regiment, Brooklyn, as commanding officer of Seventh Provisional Battalion.

Major W. F. Duncan, Surgeon Twenty-second Regiment, and First Lieutenants John Gerin, Assistant Surgeon Second Separate Company, and Benjamin L. Holt, Assistant Surgeon First Separate Company; as medical officers of the post from July 24 to July 31, 1886.

Major Lewis Balch, Surgeon Tenth Battalion, First Lieutenants Charles W. Crispell, Assistant Surgeon Fourteenth Separate

Company, and William F. Clute, Assistant Surgeon Thirty-sixth Separate Company, as medical officers of the post from July 31 to August 7, 1886.

Lieutenant Myron S. Watkins, Assistant Surgeon Twenty-sixth Separate Company, as medical officer of the post from July 17 to July 24, 1886.

The Chief of Ordnance will detail one officer of his department for duty at the State Camp as Post-Quartermaster and Commissary.

The officers detailed above will report on arrival in camp to the Post-Commander for further instructions.

III. The officers detailed as commanding officers of battalions are authorized, each, to select two competent officers of suitable rank, and five non-commissioned officers, to serve with them at the State Camp of Instruction, respectively, as Adjutant, and as Quartermaster and Commissary of Subsistence, and as Sergeant Major (1); Quartermaster-Sergeant (1); Color bearer (1); Provost Sergeant (1), and clerk (1).

The names of the officers and non-commissioned officers thus selected will as soon as possible be reported to the Adjutant-General.

IV. The commanding officers of the separate companies ordered in camp will report at once by mail to the officers assigned to the command of the battalion they are to form, furnishing them with the names and dates of rank of their officers and non-commissioned officers.

V. Commanding officers of regiments and of separate companies and the officers detailed above, if not traveling with troops, will at once make requisition for proper transportation of men and baggage from their station to the State camp, on the acting Quartermaster-General, the Chief of Ordnance, State Arsenal, corner Thirty-fifth street and Seventh avenue, New York city, direct.

No other Assistant Surgeons of separate companies than those detailed above are authorized to accompany their respective companies.

On arrival in camp or as soon thereafter as practicable, commanding officers of troops who arrive by railway transportation will settle their transportation accounts with the Post Quartermaster. Transportation will be allowed only for such men as will be entitled to pay for services in camp in accordance with section 11 of this order. Horses for field officers will be furnished by the Post Quartermaster, and no transportation or forage for other horses will be allowed.

VI. On the journey to, and march into camp, the *senior* officer present will command all the troops. On arrival in camp such officer will report to the Post Commander for further orders.

VII. Regimental and Battalion Commanders, on arrival in camp, will direct their commissaries of subsistence to report for duty while in camp, to the Post Commissary, without being, however, relieved from duty with their regiments or battalions.

A ration will consist of early bread and coffee, breakfast, dinner and supper. Ration returns will be prepared each day immediately after *retreat or dress parade*, covering all the rations received by a command during the day, by the company commanders who will take as a basis for the return of the day the number of officers and men present at breakfast, allowing one day's ration for each; to this will be added the number of meals received by men joined subsequent to breakfast. Adjutants will perform the duties of a company commander for the field, staff and non-commissioned staff.

Company returns will be consolidated the same evening by regimental and battalion commanders, who will deliver the consolidation to the Post Commissary; at the close of the tour these officers will deliver a consolidated return, in duplicate, of all the rations received, to the Post Commissary, which will be the voucher upon which the Chief of Ordnance will pay the contractors.

Copies of all the returns made by them will be retained by the respective commanding officers of companies, battalions and regiments.

Commanding officers of troops, coming from distant stations, should see that their commands are properly provisioned for the journey.

VIII. The routine of duty in camp will be announced from time to time in post orders. Brigade evolutions will not be practiced; reviews will not be tendered except by orders from these head-quarters; no rifle practice will take place in camp; and as little time as possible will be devoted to movements which can be as well practiced in armories.

The State service uniform will be worn as prescribed in the regulations; on drill, fatigue and when not on actual duty the fatigue coat, R. 835, may be worn. White helmets may be worn by regiments fully supplied with them. In the case of separate companies, black helmets will be worn at guard mountings and at dress parade, but white helmets may be worn at other times, when approved by the Battalion Commander.

Blank ammunition at the rate of twenty rounds per man will be allowed.

Commanding officers of regiments and of separate companies will telegraph to the Post-Commander before their departure, the exact number of officers and enlisted men of their respective commands who leave for camp.

IX. Band Leader Dodsworth, of the Thirteenth Regiment, in charge of the Post Band, will report to the commanding officer of the Fourteenth Regiment and proceed with his band to camp with that regiment. Regimental bands and band leaders will not be required in camp, and will not be taken there; nor *any* musicians except those regularly enlisted.

X. The Surgeon-General is charged with the general supervision and direction of the medical department at the camp, and is authorized to select two competent persons to perform the duties of Post Hospital Stewards under his direction, who will receive for their services transportation, rations and the pay allowed by law to hospital stewards.

Commanding officers of regiments, will direct their respective surgeons to report, and the medical officers detailed above, will report on arrival in camp, for orders and instructions to the Surgeon-General.

The Surgeons of the regiments, and the assistant surgeons of the separate companies detailed for camp service, will each make requisition for a hospital knapsack, with medical stores and instruments, upon the acting Quartermaster-General, the Chief of Ordnance, to whom such knapsack will be returned by them *immediately* upon the arrival of their regiments or companies at their regular stations.

Within ten days after his return from camp, each Regimental and Post Surgeon will prepare, on form seventy-two, and forward a report of his tour of service, the former through his Regimental Commander, the latter direct to the Surgeon-General.

XI. The pay rolls, in triplicate, will be prepared *before* going into camp by entering on them the name of each officer and enlisted man of the organization. In camp credit will be given for the day after *retreat* of such day, excepting the last two days in camp, and the rolls fully completed, signed and amounts carried out, will be handed to the Paymaster-General as early before the close of the tour as possible, to enable him to pay the troops before their departure from camp. If practicable, the pay rolls should be signed, even, by the



officers and enlisted men before coming in camp, but must be signed on the first Sunday in camp.

Pay will be allowed to officers and enlisted men present for the days on which the regiment or company arrives at, and departs from, the camp ; and for such other days of the tour during which they are present, at least from guard mounting in the morning until after retreat or dress parade in the evening, provided their whole stay in camp does not consist simply in coming to camp on Saturday, spending Sunday and Monday there, and returning on Friday to depart again on Saturday.

The Paymaster-General will take the necessary measures to enable him to pay the troops in camp, in checks drawn to their order, and as indicated above.

XII. Transportation and rations will be allowed for one servant for the officers of each company and battalion, and for three servants for the field and staff of a regiment.

XIII. The following books and blanks furnished by the State are required in camp :

By regimental and battalion commanders, forms 8, 12, 56, 69, 70 and the book of forms.

By Surgeons, forms 13, 71, 72.

By Company Commanders, forms 9, 56, 69 and the book of forms.

And the attention of all officers is especially called to R. 170, 179, 180, 376, 387, 412, 473, 475, 477, 478, 479, 773.

XIV. Commanding officers of regiments, battalions and companies will be held strictly responsible for the correctness of returns and reports rendered by them. Regimental and battalion commanders will render daily a consolidated report of their command to the Post Commander.

There should be a well instructed clerk to relieve the First Sergeants of, or to assist them in, the clerical duty. In each company the First Sergeant or the clerk should keep a list for each day on which to place the name of every man, and the hours of his arrival or departure during the day ; this list will be found of great value to them in making the ration return, and crediting the pay after retreat, and preparing the report book next morning.

The report book must show the condition of the company *at the time the report is made* and the remarks are to explain all the alterations which occurred since making the last report.

XV. Within ten days after the close of the camp tour, commanding officers of regiments and battalions will make reports to the Adjutant-General of the general management of their command and the results obtained.

XVI. The sale of all spirituous liquors, wine ale or beer, and all huckster or auction sales within one mile of the camp are prohibited, and no ale, beer, wines or spirituous liquors shall be used in camp, except upon the prescription of the Post Surgeon. Illuminations and the display of fireworks in camp will not be permitted.

I. The amendments to the Military Code, passed by the Legislature of the State of New York and contained in chapters 412 and 487 of the Laws of 1886, are hereby promulgated for the information and government of all concerned.

II. Sections 12, 24, 26, 29, 36, 43, 49, 61, 62, 64, 69, 70, 71, 72, 78, 87, 97, 98, 102, 103, 104, 121, 124 and 144 have been amended so as to read as follows :

§ 12. To each company there shall be one captain, one first lieutenant and one second lieutenant, one first sergeant, one quartermaster-sergeant (one guidon sergeant, if a troop of cavalry), four sergeants, eight corporals, two musicians and thirty-one privates, as a minimum, and eighty-four privates as a maximum. To each battery of four guns there shall be one captain, two first lieutenants, two second lieutenants, one first sergeant, one quartermaster-sergeant, one veterinary surgeon, one guidon sergeant, four sergeants, eight corporals, four artificers, two trumpeters, and forty-eight privates as a minimum, and ninety-three privates as a maximum. To a Gatling battery there shall be one captain, one first lieutenant, two second lieutenants, one first sergeant, one quartermaster-sergeant, one veterinary sergeant, one guidon sergeant, four sergeants, eight corporals, four artificers,

two trumpeters and thirty-two privates as a minimum, and eighty-four privates as a maximum. To any troop, battery or separate company the commander-in-chief may appoint and commission an assistant surgeon with the rank of first lieutenant, upon the recommendation of the commander of the division or brigade to which such troop, battery or company is attached.

§ 24. All officers shall be commissioned by the commander-in-chief, and no person shall be commissioned in the militia or national guard of this State, unless he is a citizen of the United State, of eighteen years of age or upward. No commission shall hereafter be issued to any officer in the national guard, save to general officers, the staff of the commander-in-chief and their assistants, until the officer elected or appointed shall have passed a satisfactory examination before a board as to his moral character, his general knowledge of military affairs, proportionate to the office to be held, and his fitness for the service. If such person shall be adjudged unqualified for such office, another person shall, after due notice of such adverse decision, be elected or appointed. The commander-in-chief shall appoint or cause to be appointed all such examining boards, to consist of not less than three members, who shall have power to call witnesses, etc. No person shall be eligible for election or appointment to office in the National Guard for the period of one year after he shall have been reported adversely upon by an examining board.

§ 26. All major-generals, except the Adjutant-General, shall be appointed by the governor; with the consent of the Senate; but no person shall be so appointed or commissioned who has not served at least five years either in the National Guard or in the regular or volunteer forces of the United States, or collectively. Brigadier-Generals shall be appointed by the Governor, or may whenever the governor shall so determine and direct, be chosen by the field officers of the brigade, and the commandants of troops, batteries and of companies not a part of a regiment or battalion, but in such brigade, and no person shall be eligible for appointment or election who has not served at least five years either in the National Guard or in the regular or volunteer forces of the United States, or collectively. Major-generals, brigadier-generals and commanding officers of regiments or battalions shall appoint the staffs of their respective divisions, brigades, regiments or battalions.

§ 29. Whenever the office of brigadier-general is vacant in any organized brigade, the commander-in-chief shall fill the vacancy by appointment, or he may, in his discretion, issue an order for an election

to fill the vacancy, and shall designate a major, or some other proper officer, to preside at such election ; and the officer so designated shall cause a written or printed notice to be served on each of the field officers and the commandants of the troops, batteries or of the companies not a part of a regiment or battalion, of the brigade in which the vacancy exists, at least ten days previous to the election, specifying the time and place of holding such election.

§ 36. Every person thinking himself aggrieved by the proceedings at any election for a commissioned officer may appeal to the commander-in-chief, who shall determine such appeal, and in case it shall be necessary, order a new election. The commander-in-chief may make such rules and regulations relative to appeals as he shall deem necessary and proper to give full effect to the provisions of the Constitution and of this act.

§ 43. Commissioned officers of the National Guard who shall have served as such therein for five years, or for the full term of their original enlistment, if promoted, shall, upon the acceptance of their resignations, be granted a full and honorable discharge from service in the State forces, except in case of insurrection or invasion. They may also be discharged upon tender of their resignation prior to the expiration of their term of service, or for physical disability, but they shall not thereafter be exempt from jury duty. They may also be discharged on sentence of court-martial or upon recommendation of a State examining board, or for failure to appear before the same when ordered, or for absence without leave for a period of six months or more. Staff officers may be rendered supernumerary upon the recommendation of their commanding officer, approved by the respective chief of the department. All officers discharged from service of the State shall receive a certificate of discharge in such form as the commander-in-chief shall direct. Whenever the commandant of any brigade, regiment, battalion, battery, troop or company shall have been honorably discharged, and no person shall have been chosen and commissioned in his place, or in case a person shall have been chosen and failed to qualify, the commander-in-chief may appoint, whenever he deems such an emergency has arisen as requires it, and recommission such honorably discharged officer in the same rank he formerly held for the purpose of taking command of such brigade, regiment, battalion, battery, troop or company, during such emergency temporarily or for a term not to exceed one year.

§ 49. Whenever any enlisted man of the National Guard shall have performed service therein for the term of enlistment, or for the term

for which he may have re-enlisted, properly uniformed, armed and equipped, according to the provisions of this act, and shall have attended an average of sixty per centum of the drills and parades of his organization in each year, or in case of non-commissioned staff officers, company quartermaster, and veterinary sergeants and musicians, shall have performed his proper duties regularly, unless excused by proper authority, the commander of the division, brigade, regiment or battalion to which he belongs, or in case of a troop, battery or company not a part of a regiment or battalion, the commander of the brigade or division to which it is attached shall, upon the certificate of his troop, battery or company commander to that effect, and that he has turned in to the proper officer all State, regimental and company property then in his possession, grant him a full and honorable discharge from further service in the State forces, except in time of insurrection or invasion. Discharges for physical disability shall be granted upon the certificate of the regimental or battalion surgeon, and in case of a troop, battery or of a company not a part of a regiment or battalion, of the assistant surgeon of such troop, battery or company, or of the surgeon of the division or brigade to which such troop, battery or company is attached. The commander-in-chief or the commander of a division may, for sufficient reason, and in his discretion, discharge enlisted men under his command, with or without their consent, at any time, upon the recommendation of the commander of the troop, battery or company, with the approval of the commander of the regiment or battalion and of the brigade to which they belong; but no enlisted man shall be honorably discharged from service unless he produces the certificate of his immediate commanding officer that he has turned over, or satisfactorily accounted for all property issued to him. Provided, however, that no such discharge shall be granted by the commander-in-chief or any commander of a division before the expiration of the term of the enlisted man, without his consent, until after he has had ten days' notice of the grounds for the recommendation of his discharge, and ten days' opportunity to be heard and for explanation and defense before the commander-in-chief or the division commander. And if, after such notice and such opportunity and such hearing, explanation and defense, if any, the commander-in-chief or the division commander shall decide to discharge the enlisted man, then the order so discharging him shall state the grounds upon which the commander-in-chief or the division commander has decided that such discharge should be had.

§ 61. Whenever the Adjutant-General or the division commander and the Inspector-General shall deem it expedient that an armory be provided for the use of two or more companies of a regiment or battalion, or jointly for the use of any of such companies and a battery or troop, or both, the supervisors of the county in which such regiment, battalion, battery or troop is located shall, upon the demand of the commandant of such regiment, battalion, battery or troop, erect or rent within such county a suitable and convenient armory, approved by the adjutant-general or the division commander and the inspector-general, except in places where such accommodation is provided in a State arsenal, unless companies in a regiment or battalion are already quartered in a building or buildings which have been fitted up for them by the county authorities ; and whenever, in the opinion of the commandant in charge of any armory, the same shall be unfit for use as an armory, he may make complaint to the Inspector-General, who shall forthwith examine into the condition of such armory, and if found to be unfit for use, shall immediately report the fact to the board of supervisors, who shall thereupon direct the alteration, repair, enlargement or abandonment of the same, and in case of abandonment, provide another suitable armory.

§ 62. The expenses of erecting, altering, repairing, enlarging or renting armories, purchasing lands for the location of armories, and for providing the necessary apparatus, fixtures, and means for heating, lighting and ventilating the same, and water and wash-closets in such armories, and for properly preserving the arms, equipments, uniforms and records kept therein, by the construction of suitable lockers, closets, gun racks and cases, shall be a portion of the county charge of such county, and shall be levied, collected and paid in the same manner as other county charges are levied, collected and paid ; but no money shall be appropriated for decorating any armory erected or rented under the provisions of this act, nor for any other purpose, to be paid out of moneys thus levied and collected, except for the said purchase, erection, renting, alteration, enlargement, repair and furnishing of such armories, unless the necessity for such expenditure shall have been examined into, and certified to as necessary by the auditing boards of the respective organizations. In the city and county of New York the demands of commandants of regiments, battalions, batteries or troops for suitable armories, or for alterations or enlargements and furnishing of armories, as hereinbefore provided, shall be made to a board hereby created, consisting of the mayor, the two senior ranking officers in command of troops of the

National Guard in said city and county, the president of the department of taxes and assessment, and the commissioner of public works, who shall consider such applications, and if they approve shall make their recommendations to the commissioners of the sinking fund, who, if they concur in such recommendations, shall specify the sums to be appropriated for such purchase, rental, erection, enlargement, alteration or furnishing of armories, including suitable accommodations for division and brigade head-quarters, which sum shall be inserted by the Comptroller in his departmental estimate; and the board of estimate and apportionment is hereby authorized and directed to include such sums in the final estimate for the tax levy for the next ensuing year; or said commissioners of the sinking fund may from time to time, in their discretion, direct the comptroller of said city to issue bonds or stocks of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, redeemable in not less than ten or more than twenty years from the date of issue, in such amounts as shall be necessary to provide such sums or any part thereof, and the mayor and comptroller of said city are hereby authorized to sign said bonds, which shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three per cent per annum, and shall not be disposed of at less than the par value thereof; and it shall be the duty of the clerk of the common council of said city to countersign the same and to affix the seal of the city thereto, and the proper authorities of the city and county of New York are hereby authorized and directed to be caused to be raised upon the estate, real and personal, subject to taxation in the city and county of New York, such sums of money as may be required to pay the interest on the said bonds and redeem them at maturity. The title to any property acquired under this act through the approval of the commissioners of the sinking fund shall be vested in the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York. All armory buildings in said city shall be erected, and all alterations, enlargements and furnishing thereof shall be made and done under the direction and supervision of the board created by this section, but all work which it is necessary to do, and all materials which it is necessary to purchase in and for such erection, alterations, enlargements and furnishing, shall be done and procured under contracts made at public letting pursuant to the general provisions of law as to public contracts in the city of New York, contained in sections fifty-nine, sixty-four and sixty-five of chapter four hundred and ten of the Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in

the city of New York." The Comptroller is hereby authorized and required to pay, on the requisition of the said board, the amounts certified from time to time to be due, in such manner as he shall direct, and the amount appropriated shall not be exceeded in incurring expenditures under this provision. The said commissioners of the sinking fund may also, in their discretion, appropriate any plot or plots of land belonging to the said city and not already appropriated to some other public use, as locations on which armory buildings may be erected. All repairs to armories in the city of New York certified to be necessary by the auditing boards of the organizations occupying the same, shall be made under the provisions of law now existing for repairs of public buildings in said city.

§ 64. The commanding officer of each regiment, battalion, troop, battery or company shall appoint an armorer who shall, under his direction, take charge of the armory or places of deposit of his regiment, battalion, battery or company, and of all uniforms, arms, equipments and other property which shall have been issued under the provisions of this act therein deposited, and to discharge all duties connected therewith as shall be, from time to time, prescribed by such commanding officer. Where two or more companies, with or without a battery or batteries, are quartered in the same armory or arsenal, there shall be but one armorer for all such organizations, who shall be appointed by the senior line officer therein quartered. In the several cities of the State, the senior line officer occupying any armory or arsenal may also appoint a janitor whose special duty shall be to care for said armory, the repair and cleanliness of the same, and the furniture and fixtures; and in armories or arsenals heated by steam he may appoint an engineer to have charge of the heating apparatus. If less than eight companies, or companies and batteries, are quartered in the same armory or arsenal but one janitor shall be so appointed who shall also have charge of the heating apparatus. Such persons so appointed shall receive a compensation not to exceed four dollars per day for the time actually and necessarily employed in their duties in armories located in the various cities, unless the city has a population of less than two hundred thousand in which case such compensation shall be three dollars per day, and two dollars per day in the armories not located in cities; which compensation, as certified to by the commanding officer appointing such persons under the provisions of this section, shall be paid monthly, and shall be a county charge upon the county in which said armory is situated, and shall be audited, levied, collected and paid in the same manner as other county charges are audited, levied, collected and paid.



§ 69. The commanding officer at any parade or drill may cause those under his command to perform any military duty he shall require, and may place in arrest for the time of such parade, any officer or enlisted man who shall disobey the orders of his superior officer, or in any way interrupt the exercises ; and also any other person or persons who shall trespass on the parade ground or armory, or in any way or manner interrupt or molest the orderly discharge of duty of those under arms, or who shall disturb or prevent the passage of troops going to or returning from any regularly ordered parade, drill or encampment ; and also may prohibit and prevent the sale or use of all spirituous liquors, wine, ale or beer within the limits of such parade or encampment, such limits to be prescribed in orders by the officer ordering the parade or encampment ; and also in his discretion all huckster or auction sales, or gambling may be abated as nuisances. No parade or drill of the National Guard shall be ordered on any day during which an election shall be held except in case of riot, invasion or insurrection, or of imminent danger thereof ; and if any officer shall order any such parade or drill, he shall forfeit and pay to the people of this State the sum of five hundred dollars.

§ 70. The commander-in-chief may cause the National Guard, or such portion of it as he may direct, to perform at least five consecutive days of camp duty in each year, but no organization shall be required to perform camp duty two years in succession. All encampments shall be held at the State camping grounds, unless otherwise ordered by the commander-in-chief ; such grounds, including necessary improvements and proper provisions for rifle practice, to be selected and leased or purchased by the Adjutant-General, Inspector-General and Chief of Ordnance, subject to the approval of the commander-in-chief, and rented or paid for by the State. The Comptroller is hereby authorized and empowered to draw his warrant upon the State Treasurer, on the certificate of the Adjutant-General, approved by the commander-in-chief, for such sums as shall be required in purchasing or renting and in laying out and preparing the grounds designated for such purpose, and in furnishing quarters for troops ordered into camp, also for all necessary disbursements and for the pay, transportation and subsistence of said troops, including the necessary expenses of music ; such disbursements to be audited by the Adjutant-General and approved by the commander-in-chief. Where lands shall be required for the purpose of a State camping ground or for rifle practice or other military purpose in connection with any State armory or arsenal, which is deemed necessary by the Adjutant-General, and an

agreement with the owner or owners of any grounds or real estate so required cannot be made; it shall be the duty of the Attorney-General on the written application of the Adjutant-General to institute and carry on proceedings to acquire title thereto, in the name of the people of the State of New York against such owner or owners, and such proceedings shall be according to and in pursuance of the provisions of chapter one hundred and forty of the Laws of eighteen hundred and fifty, entitled "An act to authorize the formation of rail-road corporation and to regulate the same," and the several acts amendatory thereof, and the cost of all grounds or real estate so taken shall be paid for by the State. Upon the certificate of the Adjutant-General the Treasurer upon warrant of the Comptroller is hereby authorized and empowered to pay the costs and damages and expenses incurred by and awarded in such proceedings and which costs, damages and expenses shall be paid out of the unexpended balances remaining to the credit of the general military fund remaining in his hands.

§ 71. The commander-in-chief is hereby authorized and empowered, in his discretion to order such organizations as he shall deem proper and without regard to arm of the service, not, however, exceeding one thousand men in any one year, to be stationed at such forts or other places as may be furnished by the United States government, or as may be convenient for that purpose, within the State of New York, for a period not exceeding five days in any one year, for instruction in the management of artillery for sea and lake coast defense, under such instructors as he shall assign for that purpose. And he may also in his discretion, order such organizations as he shall deem proper to parade for purposes of drill, review or escort duty, prescribing all regulations and requirements therefor.

§ 72. For the purpose of warning the non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates for any parade, encampment or place of rendezvous, the commander of each troop, battery, company or signal corps shall issue his orders, under his hand, to his non-commissioned officers, or to such of them as he may deem proper, requiring them respectively to warn all the non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates of his troop, battery, company or signal corps, to appear at such parade, encampment or place of rendezvous uniformed, armed and equipped according to law and regulation. Each non-commissioned officer to whom such order shall be directed shall warn every person whom he shall be therein required to warn, by reading the orders, or stating the substance thereof, in the hearing of such

person, or by leaving a notice thereof at his usual place of abode or business as appears by the roster, with some person of suitable age and discretion, or with the approval of his commanding officer, by sending the same to him by mail, directed to him at his residence or the post-office nearest thereto.

§ 78. In case of insurrection and invasion, or imminent danger thereof, within the limits of any command, it shall be the duty of the senior commanding officer of such command to order out, for the defense of the State, the National Guard or any part thereof, under his command, and immediately report what he has done, and the circumstances of the case to the commander-in-chief.

§ 87. The senior commandants of the troops of the National Guard in the city of New York and the city of Brooklyn respectively are authorized to direct and require the use of the range of the National Rifle Association by any of the organizations in their commands for target practice, field drill or any military purpose, whenever, and for such time as they shall deem proper and necessary. And the senior commanding officer in any district in which any other rifle range which has received aid from the State is located shall have like authority to direct and require the use thereof by any of the organizations in his command, provided that not less than one-quarter of the targets of such rifle range, when held by an association, and of the National Rifle Association, shall at all times be reserved for the members thereof.

§ 97. On the certificate of the Adjutant-General, the Comptroller shall annually draw his warrant upon the Treasurer for the following sums, namely : Seven hundred and fifty dollars for each division and for each brigade head-quarters, two hundred and fifty dollars for each regimental head-quarters, and one hundred dollars for each battalion head-quarters, and two hundred and fifty dollars for each head-quarters of provisional regiments or battalions. The funds thus allowed shall only be expended by the respective commanding officers on the approval of the Adjutant-General.

§ 98. On the certificate of the Adjutant-General, the Comptroller shall likewise annually draw his warrant upon the Treasurer in favor of each county treasurer specified in such certificate, for the organization of the National Guard mentioned therein, as follows : Seven hundred and fifty dollars for each troop and battery ; two hundred and fifty dollars for each separate company ; and for each regiment, battalion, troop, battery, separate company and signal corps, for the purpose of defraying other necessary military expenses, a sum equal to eight

dollars for each of its enlisted men present for duty, based upon the "percentage present for duty" for the year at the five compulsory parades required in section sixty-eight of this act, and which percentage shall be certified to by the inspector-general, which sums, together with the fines and penalties collected from delinquent officers and enlisted men shall constitute the military fund of each regiment, battalion, troop, battery, separate company or signal corps.

§ 102. General courts-martial shall be ordered by the commander-in-chief, and shall consist of five officers, any three of whom shall constitute a quorum; but at all times a majority of the court must be of grade at least equal to that of the accused.

§ 103. The commander-in-chief shall order or cause to be ordered, delinquency courts for the trial of commissioned officers below the rank of brigadier-general, for delinquencies reported, as required by section one hundred and twenty-one of this act. Such court shall consist of three officers of at least equal grade with the accused.

§ 104. The commander of each regiment or battalion may at any time appoint a delinquency court for the trial of enlisted men, to consist of one officer in his command, and such court shall be ordered by the brigade or division commander for such troops, batteries or separate companies as are under their direct command.

§ 121. The commander of each division, brigade, regiment, battalion, troop, battery and separate company shall on or before the fifteenth day of May and the fifteenth day of November in each year, return to the Adjutant-General the names of all commissioned officers absent without excuse, and not on leave of absence, from any parade, encampment, drill or meeting for instruction, during the preceding six months. It shall not be necessary to cause the arrest of such absentee, nor to serve any charges; but the delinquent may be fined pursuant to the provisions of this act, provided he shall have appeared before the court without objection, or notice of the return and of the time appointed for holding the court shall have been delivered to him, or left at his dwelling-house, store, counting-house or usual place of business, or in a city or town in which there is a postal delivery, mailed to him at the address appearing on the roster, at least ten days before the day fixed upon for his trial by the delinquency court.

§ 124. The officer ordering a parade, drill or encampment shall have the power to excuse any officer or enlisted man for absence therefrom, upon good and sufficient grounds. Commanders of troops, batteries and companies shall make a return within five days after any parade,

drill or encampment, of all enlisted men absent without excuse from the same to their next superiors in command.

§ 144. Each county treasurer shall report on the first day of March and September in every year, to the Adjutant-General, the amount of all moneys received and paid out by him on account of each regimental, battalion, troop, battery, company or signal corps fund, and the balance then remaining in his hands, and the number or designation of the regiment, battalion, troop, battery, company or signal corps for which the same is held in trust. The bond now required by law to be given by county treasurers for the faithful discharge of their duties shall be held to apply to any moneys that may come into their hands under the provisions of this act, but no fees or commissions on any such moneys shall be charged, received or retained by any county treasurer. The Adjutant-General is hereby authorized and empowered to draw, use and apply to the benefit of the National Guard any and all moneys and balances remaining in the hands of the several county treasurers of this State, to the credit of any organizations of the National Guard which have been disbanded, or to pay audited bills of disbanded National Guard organizations from such funds or from unexpended National Guard appropriations where balances remain. The several county treasurers of the State are authorized and directed to pay to the Adjutant-General, upon his order, all moneys remaining in their hands to the credit of any disbanded organization of the National Guard. The certificate of the Adjutant-General shall be sufficient evidence of the disbandment of any such organization. The unexpended balances remaining in the hands of county treasurers to the credit of the uniform and equipment fund of the several regiments, battalions, batteries and separate companies of the National Guard shall, after the audit, approval and payment of all proper charges against said uniform and equipment fund on the order of the Adjutant-General be transferred, credited to and form part of the regimental, battalion, battery and company funds of such organizations, respectively.

I. General Orders Nos. 9 and 14 c. s., are modified as follows :

The Thirty-second Separate Company is detailed for duty at the State Camp of Instruction, as part of the Seventh Provisional Battalion, from July seventeenth to twenty-fourth next. The commanding officer of the company will at once comply with paragraphs IV. and V. of General Orders No. 14, and will proceed with his command to the camp on the seventeenth of July next.

The Twenty-eighth Separate Company is relieved from its tour of duty at the State Camp of Instruction.

Assistant Surgeon Myron S. Watkins, Twenty-sixth Separate Company, is relieved from duty, and First Lieutenant Mason L. Smith, Assistant Surgeon Thirty-ninth Separate Company, is detailed for duty at the State Camp of Instruction from July seventeenth to July twenty-fourth next.

II. The Chief of Ordnance, in his capacity as such, and as acting Quartermaster-General and acting Commissary-General of Subsistence, will exercise in camp a general supervision of all public property, not by law and regulations in the care of others, the mess arrangements and the public buildings and grounds.

He will provide the necessary transportation for the officers and enlisted men ordered to camp in General Orders Nos. 9 and 14 c. s., and Par. I of this order, in such manner that regiments and separate companies, as far as practicable, will arrive at the camp not later than three o'clock p. m. of the day ordered.

He will cause the State camp to be prepared for occupancy by troops on the nineteenth inst., and see that the necessary supply of camp and garrison equipage, mess furniture and ordnance, is procured and on hand.

He will make arrangements to provide in camp the necessary horses and horse equipments, and will procure the services of a post band during the season of the encampment.

He will provide by contract for the furnishing of cooked meals to the troops in camp ; the contractors will be under his exclusive orders ; and he will see that the meals are properly and promptly furnished, well cooked, of wholesome quality and sufficient quantity.

He will also provide for the instruction of the regimental and bat-

talion quartermasters and commissaries of subsistence in camp in the proper performance of their duties.

The following decision of the Lieutenant-General of the United States Army, relating to the detail of an officer as instructor of his senior in rank, is published for the information of the officers, and for the guidance of commanding officers of the National Guard of this State:

“ An officer so detailed, becomes the assistant and in effect the staff officer of the post commander, and whether he be the junior or the senior of the officer receiving instruction is a matter that the post commander need not consider beyond exercising his best judgment “ in the interest of the service.”

While this decision speaks only of a post commander, the rule prescribed applies as well to any other commanding officer.

The following opinion of Brigadier-General William M. Ivins, Judge Advocate-General, given in answer to a question as to what class of jury duty members of the National Guard are exempted from by the Military Code, is published for the information of all concerned:

Section 145 M. C., is drawn in very broad language. It contains a general statement that commissioned officers and enlisted men "shall be exempt from jury duty," and that such officers and men who have served their full term and been honorably discharged "shall forever after be exempt from jury duty." There is no limitation as to the nature or class of jury duty from which this

exemption is given. On the contrary, it is expressed in the most general terms, and can only receive the full force and effect of the language used by holding it to be an exemption from all jury service.

By the provisions of section 150 M. C., certain laws in existence at the time when the present M. C. took effect are enumerated and expressly repealed. In addition, it is provided that "all other acts or parts of acts conflicting with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed." The effect of these repealing clauses is to make the present M. C. speak as law upon the subject now under consideration from the date of its passage, to wit.: April 23, 1883, to date, unless it has been modified or amended by subsequent statutes, which, upon examination, I find is not the case, so far as the question of exemption from jury duty is concerned.

Although the inquiry presented is only as to the construction of the M. C., 145, a more satisfactory disposition of the questions presented can be made by examining the enactments contained in other statutes relating to exemption from jury duty of persons in military service.

The general provisions of law relating to the summoning of trial jurors in the civil courts of this State are to be found in titles 3 and 4 of chapter 10 of the Code of Civil Procedure. Title 3 defines the qualifications and modes of selecting and procuring the trial jurors, except in New York and Kings counties; and title 4 regulates and defines the some matters for the counties named. Both of these titles recognize and provide for the exemption of persons in military service. By section 3343 of the same code, it is provided that the terms "trial juror" and "trial jury" are respectively equivalent to the terms "petit jurors" and "petit jury" as used in the Constitution of the Laws of the State. These two titles clearly include and regulate jury service in civil suits in courts of record. the law regulating juries in Justices' courts which are not courts of record, is to be found in section 2991 of the same code, which provides for the summoning of persons "qualified to serve and not exempt from serving as trial jurors in courts of record."

Passing to the consideration of juries in criminal courts, it is provided by section 358 of the Code of Criminal Procedure now in force, that the trial jury shall be formed as prescribed by the Code of Civil Procedure, the reference, of course, being to the provisions regulating the forming of such juries in courts of record, as already given.

This would include the summoning of juries in courts presided over by the recorders of the various cities in cases where a jury is authorized by law to be summoned for such courts.

The provisions relating to the summoning of coroner's juries, as contained in the Revised Statutes, vol. 2, part 4, title 7, art. 1, section 1, authorized the summoning of persons "qualified by law as jurors and not exempt from such service." This language stood on the statute books from the time of the first revision of the statutes until the enactment of the present Code of Criminal Procedure, which took effect on the 1st day of September, 1881, and repealed the provision in the Revised Statutes just cited. In the 773d section of this code, the words "not exempt from such service" are omitted, and the persons to be summoned are required to be "qualified by law to serve as jurors." It is true that a person may be qualified to serve and yet be entitled to insist on exemption from service. I am of the opinion however, that this change in the language of the law was not intended by the Legislature to compel service of exempt persons. At all events, it was passed prior to the taking effect of the present M. C., and, under the broad language of section 145 and of the repealing section of that code, to which I have directed attention, it must give way to the provisions of this latter enactment of the Legislature.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that members of the National Guard are entitled to claim exemption from service on juries in civil courts of record, and in criminal courts, by virtue of the provisions of the Code of Civil Procedure and of the Code of Criminal Procedure to which I have directed attention, as well as by virtue of the general exemption contained in section 145 of the M. C. ; and further, that such persons are also entitled to exemption from serving as jurors before coroners and justices of the peace by virtue of the provisions of the same codes, as well as by virtue of the same general provision of the M. C.

SIR.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication of Captain M. W. Marvin, commanding the Thirty-third Separate Company Infantry, bearing date the twenty-ninth of March last, relating to enlistments in his command.

The facts appearing are that the company in question was mustered into service May 29, 1879, and on the fifth of July following formed a civil organization and adopted by-laws, a copy of which is submitted. By their terms all propositions for memberships must be made in writing signed by the applicant. The application must be submitted to a recruiting committee, and on its favorable report the applicant is to be balloted for by the members of the company. These by-laws have, however, been practically obsolete for the past four years. No civil meetings have been held during that time nor have the by-laws been recognized in any way.

The question asked is, whether on these facts the captain commanding can enlist men without regard to R. 146, 147.

The provisions relating to the formation of civil organizations are to be found in M. C. 139, 140 and R. 144–147. The scope and effect of these provisions is not to compel, but merely to authorize and permit the organization in military bodies of civil organizations or associations and to provide that, when such an organization has been formed, its by-laws shall contain certain essential rules, and shall provide, amongst other things, for the election of the recruits to membership in the civil organization before they can enter the military service. The provisions in the regulations do not in any way alter the permissive language of the M. C. They only take effect in cases where a civil organization has been formed. That such organizations are not essential nor obligatory clearly appears from the language of the M. C. 139, which is that the officers of any regiment and the members of any troop, battery

or company "may organize themselves into an association of which the commanding officer shall be president."

Were R. 146, 117 to be so construed as to preclude the possibility of enlistment except in the manner prescribed, they would have the effect, in order that recruiting might be carried on at all, of absolutely requiring the existence of a civil organization of companies. If such were the case, these regulations would be clearly illegal as being in direct conflict with M. C. 139, which makes the civil organizations permissive and not obligatory. The regulations should be so construed as to sustain their legality if possible. But waiving that question for the present, I am of the opinion that they do not and cannot prescribe the sole and only mode of recruiting, because, in such case, they would virtually render the merely permissive words in the M. C. nugatory. Nor is this the only objection to the opposite view. The Legislature, in the enactment of the M. C., plainly expressed its intention of recognizing the civil element in the militia service by authorizing the organization of civil associations, but it is just as clearly the intention of the Legislature not to so far recognize this element as to turn the militia service into a series of civil organizations or military clubs, and make the civil association the basis of the militia. The strict military principle and custom are departed from to the extent of a legal recognition of the civil association in certain cases, because of the fact that experience had shown that this element in the service had been of sufficient value to entitle it to such recognition. But it can never be assumed that the Legislature intended to so far recognize and sanctify the principle as to make it the virtual foundation of the entire service, which would be to build up a military system upon a number of civil associations, which in many instances are hardly distinguishable from clubs, and in such a way that the power of the State to recruit its militia would be limited and restrained by such a use of the "black ball" as might be prescribed in company by-laws. Such a contention is not worthy of a moment's serious discussion. If such were the fact, the State would be deprived of its most experienced and valuable men at the mere whim or prejudice of a few members of the company, and it is an open question as to whether as matter of law, even where a civil organization exists, a person cannot be recruited and become a member of the militia of the State in spite of the use of the "black ball," even though through such use he might not be permitted to become a member of the civil organization. But that question does not call for settlement in the present case.

The civil organization undoubtedly has its uses; but it is a mere adjunct — and a very secondary adjunct — to the great purpose of our militia system, and there can be no possible doubt, both from the general necessities of the case and from the express words of the statute, assuming the legality of regulations 146 and 147, that the civil organization is permissive merely and not obligatory, and that article 8 of the regulations has no application except where there is a civil organization in existence. It remains to be seen whether in the present case there is any civil organization.

It appears that the by-laws have become obsolete and the civil organization fallen into desuetude. It is also to be noted that no member of the company nor of the civil organization calls for or seeks the enforcement of these by-laws. On such facts the by-laws must be treated as repealed, and the company must be viewed as having no effective civil organization.

The question then occurs as to the right and authority of the commanding officer. The provisions of the M. C., as contained in Article 6, sections 40, 41 and 42, do not define who shall act as recruiting officers. The authority of the captain, according to military usage, and under the broad language of R. 105, is certainly sufficient to warrant his acting in that capacity. By the express terms of M. C. 42, the oath of allegiance is to be administered by him, and after this is done, if the enlistment paper be otherwise in proper form, it only remains to secure the approval of the commanding officer of the organization to which the company is attached, when the enlistment becomes final and effective.

I have the honor, therefore, to advise that upon the facts presented, Captain Marvin may legally enlist recruits irrespective of the requirements of R. 156-147.

SIR.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 18th instant, inclosing copy of charges and specifications against Private . . . . . and requesting my opinion as to whether the matter can be tried by a delinquency court

The charge in question is disobedience of orders, which is supported by the facts set out in the specification.

In the M. C. of 1870 which, with amendments continued in force down to the adoption of the present M. C., it was provided by section 196 that "for the trial of non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates, the commandant of each brigade may at any time appoint a regimental or battalion court-martial." By section 201 it was enacted that the court, when organized, should have "the trial of all offenses, delinquencies and deficiencies that occurred in the regiment or battalion for which it shall have been appointed;" and that it should have power "to impose and direct to be levied all the fines and penalties to which non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates" were declared to be subject, by the provisions of that act.

By the present M. C. (as originally enacted, chap. 299 of the Laws of 1883) regimental and battalion courts-martial are not recognized by name, and in their places, by sections 103 and 104, the appointment of a new court, called a delinquency court, is authorized. By section 123 of the M. C., as originally enacted in 1883, the jurisdiction of this court was defined to be the trial of enlisted men "for absence without excuse from any drill, parade or encampment ordered by competent authority," and the extent of the punishment which might be inflicted was a fine of not more than five, nor less than one dollar for each day's delinquency. It will be observed that the jurisdiction thus given was more limited than that originally invested in regimental or battalion courts-martial. This fact was apparently brought to the attention of the Legislature, and by chapter 310 of the Laws of 1885, M. C. section 123 was amended so as to extend the courts jurisdiction to the cases of enlisted men "who shall, without proper excuse be absent from,



*or in any other respect delinquent at any drill, parade, encampment, meeting for instruction or other duty ordered by competent authority."* The amount of fine remained the same, but its imposition was authorized for "each absence or other delinquency." This legislative action was plainly intended to extend the jurisdiction of the court, and the language chosen is very broad and far-reaching.

It is to be observed that M. C., 122, which defines the cases in which enlisted men may be tried by general court-martial, does not secure to such courts exclusive jurisdiction of the offenses specified. The language is permissive—that such offenses "may" be tried by courts-martial, not that they must be so tried. The word "delinquent" as commonly used and as defined by lexicographers, is of broad and general signification. It is defined as a "failing in duty," "offending by neglect of duty." It may be applied to any failure of duty, and has been extended so far as to cover cases where the failure was punishable by criminal law.

I do not find anything in section 123, nor in any of the provisions of the present M. C., defining the authority of the various military courts, which limits or restricts this general meaning, and I am of the opinion that where an enlisted man offends by neglect of duty at any drill, parade, encampment, meeting for instruction or other duty ordered by competent authority, he may be tried by a delinquency court, or, if the facts warrant one of the charges contained in section 122, he may be tried before a general court-martial. A sound discretion must be exercised by officers in determining the court before which the charge should be tried; the extent of the failure of duty, its gravity, and whether military discipline will be satisfied by the punishment which may be awarded by the delinquency court, or requires more extended powers and severer action, authorized only by court-martial, must all be considered. (R. S., 753.)

I have the honor, therefore, to advise that for the failure of duty set forth in the charges and specifications submitted to me, Private..... may be tried by a delinquency court.

## REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR-GENERAL FOR 1886.

SIR.—In accordance with the requirements of M. C. 20 and R. 589, I have the honor to submit the following report of this department for the year 1886 :

Accompanying this, I beg to transmit the reports of Col. Thomas H. McGrath, Assistant Inspector-General, of inspections made by him, pursuant to General Orders Nos. 8 and 23 c. s., General Head-quarters S. N. Y., and dated, respectively, April 15, 1886, and August 9, 1886.

The result of these inspections show the aggregate strength of the National Guard at that time to be 12,425, subdivided as follows :

The total strength at muster of 1885 was 12,276.

The inspection and muster of organizations of the 1st and 2d Brigades were held in the evening, and in their armories, with the exception of the 8th and 11th Regiments, which organizations occupied the armories of the 22d and 69th Regiments, respectively.

So much has been said and written for and against the method of evening inspections that I am constrained to say, that until the city

of New York provides a ground suitable for the purposes of battalion drills to organizations of the brigade, and where they shall be ordered to parade for inspection, the armory inspection is more suitable and comfortable than the usual localities selected, *i. e.*, some convenient street or avenue, where there is no room for ceremony or drill, and nothing more can be accomplished than in an ordinary armory, and much more discomfort and annoyance is always attendant.

This fact does not so well apply to the 2d Brigade, who have been provided by the county of Kings with an ample and fine parade ground.

The organizations of this Brigade should be directed on every occasion of inspection and muster, to use this ground, where the inspecting officer would be able to see the drill, and judge of the efficiency of the officers and guides.

No one is a stronger advocate of the day inspections than myself, but until proper provision can be made, and so long as the choice of locality is left with regimental commanders, I consider the evening, and in the army, as very much preferable to the afternoon, and in the streets

#### BOOKS AND PAPERS.

The most important book of all to the State is the Descriptive Book. As issued, it simply amounts to nothing; to call it a descriptive book is simply a misnomer. It should at once be withdrawn, and a book in proper form issued.

I do not believe it requisite or necessary for a company to be obliged to keep either a journal and indorsement, letter or company order book. All that is important is that a proper descriptive book and Record of Attendance or Report Book should be properly kept.

These books always in proper form, with a file of orders, is all that should be required of companies.

#### FIELD MUSIC.

It occurs very often at inspection of battalion and regimental organizations, that commanding officers of companies disclaim responsibility for any defects, deficiencies in uniform and equipments of musicians, asserting that they are under the supervision of the drum major of the regiment.

I think that in regiments and battalions field music should be no part of company organizations, but that they should be enlisted by the commanding officer of the regiment or battalion, and be entirely

and solely under his direction and control, and that they should be inspected and mustered as the field music of the organization.

#### SEPARATE COMPANIES.

The separate companies of the State, generally are in (very) excellent condition, composed as a rule of a superior class of material, presenting good appearance, with arms, uniforms and equipments, in excellent condition.

With few exceptions, however, they are deficient in drill, more particularly in the loading and firings. They are willing and ambitious, and desire to improve, but labor under the disadvantage of being alone, have no one to consult and drift along in ways and notions that are entirely wrong.

These defects can be remedied, and I am positive the State would be amply repaid for the necessary outlay.

I suggest that an energetic competent officer be detailed to make a tour of all the separate companies at least twice each year, give them the benefit of his knowledge and experience, point out errors, and be prepared to answer all questions appertaining to military training, drill and discipline.

The good result would be very soon apparent.

#### DISCIPLINE.

The reports of the Assistant Inspector-General on the last annual inspections show that, to a very large extent, such proper discipline and military courtesy as should exist does not exist throughout the National Guard.

It seems to me that this is the very foundation on which to build up a truly efficient and reliable body of State troops.

Webster defines discipline as "subjection to rule—submissiveness to order and control."

It must be appreciated by all, that military training means just what is defined above, this can only be interpreted in relation to all National Guard organizations as embodying prompt obedience to orders, neatness, precision and punctuality.

It has frequently been suggested that moral suasion is all sufficient to accomplish discipline in the National Guard; this is all very good as a part of the system which should be used, but I feel very certain that to make this the only rule, would result in a very lax condition of affairs in our military system.

Nothing, however, should be left undone that can tend to arouse pride and enthusiasm on the part of the men, but this is not all, I do

not believe that the same methods and customs of enforcing discipline as are used in the army can be made to apply to the National Guard, but I do believe that a proper discipline can and should be enforced.

With regard to what should be required, I suggest the following as not only reasonable but absolutely necessary for success :

) Prompt and regular attendance at drills, or a sufficient explanation in case of absence.

Attention and prompt obedience to all orders prescribed by the Code or Regulations, and such as emanate from other superior authority written or expressed.

Saluting of all officers whenever and wherever met, while on duty or within the enclosure of their armories.

Personal neatness as regards dress and cleanliness of equipments.

I know that all these requirements not only can but should be enforced, the most important, however, and the fundamental law or basis upon which all should rest is, "prompt and implicit respect and obedience to all orders."

With these rules properly enforced, such a condition of affairs as has of late brought into disgrace one of the regiments of the State, could not have been possible.

That a more perfect control does not exist is solely the absolute incompetency of commanding officers, more particularly of companies.

If a company commander has both the ability and the force, he will have very little trouble in exacting compliance to all his orders, and at the same time command that proper respect to which he is entitled from all his company.

A company in which good discipline prevails is almost sure to meet all the requirements that appertain to a well drilled and efficient organization ; on the contrary, want of discipline is sure to be an accompaniment of a slouchy, disorganized and inefficient body of men.

#### UNIFORMS.

The so called State service uniform with which all organizations except the Seventh and Twenty-second regiments are now supplied does not, in my opinion, meet the requirements of a service dress. I consider the coat as unsightly and cumbersome ; being a sort of nondescript, neither handsome, dress nor fatigue.

What I think experience has fully proven to be requisite, is a neat fitting, substantial, five-button cloth blouse, similar to that now worn by the Twenty-second Regiment as fatigue, instead of the present garment, and that together with this should be issued a fatigue cap,

and canvas helmet without ornament or spike. For mounted men, instead of the blouse, a close fitting jacket would be more preferable and serviceable. This uniform, with the blue overcoat, will, I think, be acceptable to all, and I am sure will be more sightly and serviceable.

If this change be deemed proper, I would make a further suggestion ; that while the color and style of uniforms for all organizations should be alike, some distinctive mark should be given to each.

I do not mean by this that organizations should be allowed to alter or add to the prescribed dress in any way ; rather that they should be forbidden to do so, but that the State should decide upon some mark by which each organization can be recognized at a glance.

#### EQUIPMENTS.

The commencement of an issue of new and improved equipments to the National Guard, which will undoubtedly be continued during the coming year, will supply a long existing want, and be most acceptable to all interested.

#### CONCLUSION.

While the reports of inspectors show many defects, and deficiencies have been noted, and in some few cases severe comments required, the National Guard is, as a body, in a healthy condition, well equipped and uniformed, and ready for any call.

Still, much improvement can be made. There are some organizations where disbandment would benefit the State, and I recommend for the good of the service that the Fourth Battery of Troy, the Ninth Separate Company of Whitehall, the Twenty-ninth Separate Company of Oswego, and the Thirty-first Separate Company of Mohawk, be disbanded. I believe that when possible the elimination of poor material tends to stimulate the good, and gives them encouragement in their work. This applies all through our military system. Not only should entire organizations that are of no value be got rid of, but poor companies of a regiment or battalion, and worthless men in companies that would be bettered by their riddance.

A great obstacle to advancement in proficiency, particularly in regiments, is the positive incompetency or inefficiency of company commanders. Some have appeared absolutely ignorant of their duties; others while possibly able to pass the required examination, are quite as unfitted as their ignorant brethren.

A man may be full of tactics, and yet lack power of imparting his knowledge. He may have no idea of discipline, or how to govern or

command, and is worthless and will be unsuccessful as a company commander.

Commanding officers of regiments know these men, feel that they are a hindrance, and impede the progress of the entire organization and yet do not know how to rid themselves of them.

Any plan that can be adopted by the State to solve this successfully will be of vast benefit to the service. Some method should be adopted by which poor officers could be got rid of.

SIR.—I have the honor to report that in compliance with G. O. No. 8, General Head-quarters S. N. Y., dated April 15, 1886, I have inspected and mustered the several organizations named therein, and as a result respectfully submit the following :

TENTH BATTALION, ALBANY.

This organization, composed of four companies to wit : A, B, C, and D, was inspected on the afternoon of April 28, at 3 P. M.

The result of this inspection was in the extreme unsatisfactory. The weather which was heavy and threatening during the entire ceremony necessitated so much haste as to be annoying, and at the conclusion of the muster it was deemed advisable that the command should immediately return to their quarters.

For this reason there was no drill by the battalion and consequently no opportunity to make any criticism.

The general appearance during the ceremony was good ; discipline, fair ; steadiness fair. Companies A and B being both entitled to higher rating. The annexed table shows the strength present and absent, to wit :

The regiment was presented for inspection fifty-five minutes late of the hour ordered. The inspection developed a condition of affairs, which to say the least, was deplorable.

With the exception of company "F" (which made a very creditable inspection), little or no care seemed to have been given to a proper preparation, or obedience to the order for the inspection.

The fact that company commanders had not overlooked their commands prior to coming on the grounds was evident.

In very many cases, knapsacks were packed with haversacks and canteens, and as a consequence the men were without fatigue caps.

The military appearance of the command was very poor. Dirty gloves and shoes seemed to predominate. Equipments were loosely and carelessly adjusted, and all conditions, gave strong evidence of sad neglect in discipline. Attention to military courtesy seems to have been entirely ignored.

Officers were met and passed by enlisted men as if beneath their notice.

This is a sad commentary on an organization so recently returned from a tour of camp duty, and from the effects of which much better results should have been presented.

The battalion drill after the muster was in strong contrast with the appearance and demeanor of the regiment during the ceremony of inspection. All movements were promptly and correctly performed. The instruction of guides particularly reflecting credit.

After the drill, the ceremony of dress parade was very well presented, being only marred by the colonel making an address to the regiment before dismissal, which is not prescribed as part of the ceremony.

My observation is that the commanding officer exceeds his proper limit in assuming to dictate to company commanders what they shall do in matters that particularly appertain to the internal affairs of the company. This tends to lessen respect for officers, by enlisted men, and were the prerogatives assumed proper, it would tend to a centralization of power in one man, not contemplated by the Code, regulations or common sense.

## REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF ORDNANCE FOR 1886.

## STATE OF NEW YORK.

OFFICE OF CHIEF OF ORDNANCE,  
NEW YORK, December 24, 1886. }*The Adjutant-General, State of New York:*

SIR.—I have the honor to report that in compliance with your verbal instructions, confirmed later on by General Order No. 16, c. s., General Head-quarters, the preparation of the State Camp Grounds, for occupancy by the troops of the National Guard, ordered thereto under General Orders No. 9, c. s., General Head-quarters, and the providing of the necessary camp equipage in connection therewith, was commenced early in May, and completed before the arrival of the first organization on June nineteenth.

During the fall of 1885 and the spring of 1886, considerable work was done under the direction of the commission appointed by the Legislature, in grading the grounds north of the camp site, resulting in a large area of level surface, which was, during the season, extensively used for drilling purposes. In addition to this I caused many important changes to be made, a new road was constructed leading from the entrance of the camp ground to the mess-hall.

The company streets were cut out, freed from grass and irregularities and rolled hard, thus materially lessening the labor of policing by the troops. Additional drain pipes and cess-pools were constructed to more quickly carry off the surface water from heavy rains. The buildings were painted, and the mess hall whitewashed inside, and all put in thorough order.

Improvements were made in the kitchen, thereby largely increasing the facilities of the caterer.

The mess hall tables were lengthened, thereby providing more room for each man, and obviating the crowding frequently experienced during former seasons.

The water pipes were relaid and water tanks put up.

The tents were pitched on the site previously occupied, and were placed so as to form three separate parts or sections, with a headquarters tent placed opposite the center of each section, thus providing separate quarters for each battalion of the provisional regiments, without disturbing the system of the regular organizations.

A new sprinkling truck was purchased which, with the one already in camp, furnished ample means for wetting down the streets, and increased an important service in securing comfort to the troops.

Arrangements were perfected to provide a bountiful supply of ice for the several companies.

The additional number of blankets purchased by your orders, were exceedingly useful in furnishing a supply that admitted an issue to each organization, upon its arrival in camp, of blankets that had been thoroughly fumigated during the preceding week.

A sufficient number of horses to mount the several battalion instructors were furnished and used during the entire season, without injury. In complying with your instructions to provide a post band, a contract was made with Bandmaster John L. Gartland, of Albany, and it is gratifying to state that the result of his efforts to please was an agreeable surprise to all who had the privilege of listening to the music, and witnessing their military maneuvers.

The catering contract was again awarded to Messrs. Windholz & Co., who in fulfilling all provisions of their agreement, added to the credit due them, in conscientiously providing rations which, through the entire season, afforded no ground for complaint. In connection with this important department of the camp, I would state that your directions to provide for the instruction of the regimental and battalion commissaries were fully complied with. Three large quartermasters' store tents were provided, which enabled each quartermaster to receive, distribute and turn over the property in his care without confusion.

The need of shelter at Roa Hook for the temporary storage of commissary stores was supplied by the erection of a plain, cheap building.

The new system of water supply, from driven wells, proved successful, and the camp had at all times an abundant supply of good water. Contracts for the transportation of troops to the camp and their return to their respective stations were made as follows, and notwithstanding the numerous difficulties, it was performed promptly and without accident or unnecessary discomfort.

Since the close of the camp tour, a wire fence, at slight cost, has been put up, dividing the grounds from adjacent private property, to keep out roaming cattle, which had been the cause of considerable annoyance and damage to the grounds.

The commission appointed by the Legislature, in chapter 484, Laws of 1886, has caused a large portion of the hill, known as "Point of Rocks," to be removed, and the debris therefrom to be used in filling the ravine on the edge of the parade, thereby materially enlarging the ground.

In conclusion I would respectfully recommend the following, viz.:

The construction of a float of suitable size, provided with sheds and a fence on three sides, to be placed in the large basin opposite the foot of the military road, for the accommodation of the troops while bathing; this will remove a vexatious source of complaint, owing to the exposure of men along the approaches to the camp.

That a strong retaining wall be constructed on the military road leading to camp, so as to prevent the frequent washouts caused by sudden and heavy rains.

I would strongly urge the selection of a permanent location for the camp site, so that the water system may be made permanent, and thereby avoid the trouble and expense in taking up and relaying the pipes, and the adoption of a complete system of drainage and sewerage, which is recognized as of so much importance in securing a proper sanitary condition.

In closing I desire to place upon record the generous courtesy of Captains Wendel, Earle and Rasquin, commanding officers of the First, Second and Third Batteries, in volunteering the services of details from their respective commands to fire the necessary salutes in opening and closing the camp tour and the national salute on Independence day. The splendid manner in which the duties were performed gave evidence of proficiency in the highest degree.

## REPORT OF THE SURGEON-GENERAL FOR 1886.

## STATE OF NEW YORK.

OFFICE OF THE SURGEON-GENERAL, }  
NEW YORK, *December 31, 1886,* }*The Adjutant-General, State of New York, Albany, N. Y.*

SIR: I have the honor to submit to your attention and consideration my fifth annual report of the State Camp at Peekskill, New York, and also such other remarks on the condition of the National Guard of the State as may be deemed proper in connection with my official position.

The plan of requiring the medical officers to make requisitions for medical supplies for the use of the respective organizations which was practiced at the last encampment, was not carried into effect this year on account of the delay in issuing general orders relative to the annual encampment.

## HOSPITAL STEWARDS.

The selection of proper hospital stewards is a matter of vital importance. The "regulations" require that "he must be familiar with the physical properties and the general effects of medicines and capable of putting up prescriptions," etc.

The laws of the State require that a compounder of prescriptions in civil life shall be examined by a competent board, and if proficient, he shall then be given a license to that effect, which license is commonly framed, and is often to be seen hanging conspicuously in the place of business, for the instruction of the public.

Let us pause for a moment to inquire if the commandants of regiments exercise the care in this respect that both the law of the State and the military regulations of the State contemplate. Not infrequently a medical student, a student of pharmacy or a graduate in medicine even, who may be a friend of the commandant, or a person high in his favor, is selected to fulfill the requirements of this regulation. During the last encampment, the teacher of a high school, who had no knowledge of medicines or of compounding them,

was appointed *pro tem* to the position of hospital steward by his friend, the commandant of the organization. However, I am advised that this gentleman performed none of the duties incident to the position he assumed, except perhaps, those unavoidable duties on which one's personal comfort depends. Neither a student of medicine nor a graduate of medicine is competent to meet the requirements of this just, but much abused regulation, since neither is familiar with the physical properties of medicine. The recollection of an occurrence in the State camp illustrative of this fact, which, had it not been detected in time, would have resulted seriously if not fatally, is still impressed indelibly on my mind.

It must be stamped on the understandings of the commandants of regiments that the duties of a hospital steward are too important to be assumed by any except such as have been especially educated for the purpose. It has happened too frequently that commandants have acted seemingly with the belief that this position was a kind of a military "perquisite," which could be bestowed, temporarily at least, on some person who from physical or other reason found it agreeable to spend a week in camp at the expense of the State, if not at the expense of his personal dignity. (See report of Major Balch of this year.) I shall request of you to require in all respects in the future, the fulfillment on the part of the commandants of regiments of the regulations relating to hospital stewards.

#### CARE OF TROOPS.

On previous occasions of this kind, I have invariably emphasized the importance of the commandants asking for, and heeding the advice of the medical officers, on many occasions that are liable to affect the physical welfare of the members of the command. I am happy to be able to report that this course is practiced now by the commanding officers to a commendable degree. In the future it is to be hoped that the medical officers of commands will continue to display such a degree of wise medical discretion as will entitle them to the fullest confidence of their superior officers.

#### EMERGENCY TRAINING.

The medical and surgical care of the troops in cases of the emergencies attendant in civil strife, is the most important question that can engross the attention of the medical staff at the present time. It, too, is of great importance to the commandants of every military organization in the State, as well as to those who contribute their



sons and wealth to its maintenance. A preconceived and well studied line of preparation and action should be devised by the medical officers, which can be carried into effect quickly in time of need. With the view of bringing this matter before the officers of the Guard, and of inciting a uniform action on the part of the medical officers, I addressed the following communication to each of the brigade surgeons of the State:

*My Dear Doctor :*

I know of no better time than the present to bring to the notice of the medical officers of the State the great good that can come to the members of the guard, and to the citizens on special occasions, from the introduction of a thorough system of "emergency training" into the guard itself. It is not my intention now to insist on this measure, for to do so would be to cast a slur on the intelligence and *esprit de corps* of the members of the medical department of the State. A proposition of this kind should require no insistence, for it appeals alike to the professional manhood of the medical officer, to the thoughtful care of the commanding officers, to the sense of safety of the "rank and file," and to the gratitude of the peaceful citizens.

It therefore appears to me to be more fitting that I bring it to your attention in a professional and semi-official sense only.

A system of this kind will provide at once the necessary number of stretcher bearers and surgical aids in a time of civil strife, and at all times may afford prompt aid to an injured citizen.

A system of training of "details" properly made from the companies of an organization can be carried easily into effect ; a system which will in a few years cause the diffusion of a great amount of practical knowledge, the benefit of which will be appreciated by a grateful community. It is not my prerogative to submit a plan of action. It is, however, my prerogative to suggest, and it is one that I have used in a similar manner with some effect long before this. Please confer with your commanding officer on this subject.

I shall be willing at all times to aid, by advice and action, in carrying into general effect the system that contemplates the greatest good to the greatest number.

This matter had been considered already by many of the older surgeons of the guard, who had made arrangements to aid the injured and sick on ordinary occasions in a small but efficient manner. I am happy to be able to congratulate the Commandants of the military organizations of the First Brigade that its medical officers have taken both the initiative and a prompt action on this question, and I feel sure that within a few weeks from the present date, that a system of organized action will be established which will be creditable to the intelligence of the medical officers and to the National Guard as well.

It will be more difficult, of course, to organize these measures in connection with the separate companies. However, the change in the regulations permitting each of the separate companies to have an assistant surgeon will afford the members of the command the opportunity of acquiring the necessary instruction.

I am happy to be able to state that the uncanny display on the part of the medical officers of commands of the surgical and medical paraphernalia, in full view of the men at camp ceremonies, was not to be seen during the last encampment.

The pointed remarks bearing on this subject, taken from the report of Lieutenant-Colonel Clossen, U. S. A., who was stationed at the camp during the encampment of 1885, are too important to be permitted to pass unquoted, especially since this officer has served long and faithfully in the United States Army, and under circumstances that have fitted him to speak with judicial precision and candor.

He said, when speaking of the presence of medical officers in the field at battalion drills, with stretcher and hospital knapsack: "I am not quite clear whether \* \* \* the apparatus is not a little too suggestive. The path to glory sometimes leads by the hospital, it is true, but there is no need to carpet the road thither."

#### EXAMINATION OF RECRUITS.

I desire again to emphasize the importance of forestalling the physical harm that may occur to those who enlist while affected with organic diseases, and of the loss to the State thereby by requiring a physical examination of all who present themselves for enlistment.

Many regimental commandants do now enforce this plan with a wise discrimination, still there are commandants who give little, if any attention to this fact from a medical standpoint. I am credibly informed it has happened frequently during the past year that men who have been rejected by the medical officer of one regiment on account of physical disability have applied for admission

in other regiments, and have been accepted without the least attempt at a medical scrutiny. This is an evil that should certainly be remedied, since, while it adds nothing to the physical status of a command, it introduces an element of discord and weakness.

#### CHANGE IN THE LOCATION OF THE CAMP.

At the time of my last report, a change of the camp to the northerly portion of the plateau was contemplated. At the present time the matter of its permanent location is still under consideration. I will here respectfully offer a few suggestions as to the most feasible location for the camping ground, from a sanitary standpoint alone:

1. It should be placed where it will be ventilated the best, *i. e.*, subject to atmospheric variations; provided, however, that a steady wind current from any given direction does not expose the occupants of the camp unnecessarily to paludal or other deleterious influences.
2. Its location should be such as to be entirely compatible with a thorough system of drainage of all the possible sources of unsanitary conditions, *i. e.*, mess-hall, kitchen, cess-pool, and especially of privies and urinals. The present system of "tub collections" of night soil has outlived its time, and should be substituted by a system of drainage in consonance with the accepted plans of modern hygiene. A proposition to still continue this plan of collection of the night soil, and its necessarily attendant final disposal in a presumptively model, hygienic permanently established military camp, is too primitive to be entertained in these days of modern hygienic enlightenment; too unsanitary to be entitled to a respectful consideration; too expensive to entitle its defenders to the confidence of those who believe in a prudent and wise expenditure of State moneys.

#### KITCHEN, COOK-HOUSE, ETC.

The recommendation on my part last year, that the saturated earth beneath and around the cook-house and kitchen should be removed entirely and substituted by fresh earth to a given depth, etc., was complied with substantially. This measure, however, is simply an annual "make-shift" that is absolutely necessary for the safety of the occupants of these buildings. At a near date all surfaces beneath and about these buildings must be excavated, graded, cemented and connected with the main sewer of the camp in such a manner as to permit a daily flushing and cleansing of them. The recollection of the extremely offensive odors that were attendant on the removal of the soil last year, even after it had laid undisturbed for nearly ten

months, and been exposed meanwhile to the low temperature of a cold winter, and the diluting influences of repeated severe storms of rain, should be convincing proof of the importance of the proposition here made, to the most obtuse, unsanitary mind. The claim that a sufficient appropriation cannot be gotten at the hands of the proper authorities to meet these requirements is begging the question with them and assuming the responsibility therefor at the same time ; an obviously illogical, impractical and unsafe position in which to be placed.

#### BATHING.

It is to be hoped that the commission in charge of the improvements at the State Camp will not fail to provide the necessary arrangements for bathing purposes. The medical officers of the commands that have been in camp during the last two years have expressed themselves unanimously in favor of this measure. The expense necessary to perfect the plan will be trivial, and when taken in connection with the moral and physical benefits to be gained from bathing with suitable surroundings, the amount will be productive of greater personal comfort than can be attained in any other manner from the expenditure of a similar sum.

#### PLANTING SHRUBBERY AND TREES.

In one of my earlier reports it was earnestly advised that additional shade trees be planted on the margin and incline of the bluff bordering the plateau. The trees will not only protect the troops from the full influence of the sun, but will interpose a barrier to the force of the wind storm so characteristic of the region of the camp. The abundant foliage of both the shrubbery and trees will exert, also, an important effect in neutralizing any deleterious malarial influences that may be associated with the low lands adjacent to the plateau.

#### EFFICIENCY OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER.

On two occasions before the present one, I have emphasized the importance of the commanding officers seeking the best attainable medical gentlemen for the position of medical officers of their commands. At the same time, the unwise policy of appointing those whose chief recommendation is that they are "good fellows" or are influential with the appointing power itself, was given due consideration. The carrying into effect of a thorough system of "emergency training" will require that the medical officers of the guard be well qualified in order that the subject be properly taught. There are at

the present time a few medical officers, I regret to say, who from need of time or lack of inclination, find it difficult and sometimes impossible to comply with all the present duties of the positions they occupy. If such be the case now, the evil will continue and become more potent as the duties of the medical officers are increased. The Surgeon-General has not the means of judging of the ability of an applicant, nor even of his social standing. The fact that the applicant is a graduate of a legally incorporated medical school must be accepted as the measure of his medical and surgical skill; the fact that he is recommended by the commandant of a military organization for the position of medical officer of his organization must be accepted by the Surgeon-General as proof of his social and professional respectability.

Each of these recommendations have often proved to be fallacious. I am, therefore, constrained to believe that the best interests of the guard demand that each applicant for a position on the medical staff be obliged to submit himself to an examination bearing especially on his knowledge of the position he seeks. An advance step of this nature will reward the truly meritorious and at the same time throw an important practical safeguard around the welfare of the members of the National Guard of the State.

I desire to return my sincere thanks for the courtesy of Mr. W. E. Ford, of the firm of Caswell, Hazard & Co., of this city, for his kindness in again loaning to the State a complete outfit of surgical instruments, the proper use of which would have enabled the medical officers to meet the demands of any surgical emergency incident to military or civil life. The Post Hospital Steward, Mr. Frank Wanier, of this city, has again endeared himself to all unto whom he had official relations, by his unvarying courtesy, and his fidelity to the duties of his position. To the Commander-in-chief, I desire to express my appreciation of the implied confidence in me, as expressed by the act of my reappointment, and I hope to be able to render service that will be in a small degree, at least, commensurate with the honor conferred by him.

## REPORT OF THE POST SURGEON.

ALBANY, N. Y. *August 9, 1886.*

*To the Surgeon-General, State of New York:*

SIR.—I have the honor to submit the following report of a tour of duty at the State Camp of Instruction at Peekskill, N. Y., from July 31 to August 7, 1886, inclusive:

Under paragraph II, General Order No. 14, c. s., A. G. O., dated Albany, June 2, 1886, I proceeded to the State camp on Friday, July 30, and the next morning reported for duty as post surgeon, relieving Major W. F. Duncan, M. D., Twenty-second Regiment.

During the day, First Lieutenant C. W. Crispell, M. D., Assistant Surgeon, Fourteenth Separate Company, and First Lieutenant W. F. Clute, M. D. Assistant Surgeon, Thirty-sixth Separate Company, reported to me for assignment to duty.

As this was a camp of instruction, I advised the assistant surgeons to divide the duties, relieving each other at sick call, one taking the sick call and all care of any falling ill during the twenty-four hours following, while the other on that day made the sanitary inspections, having therefore most of his time to himself.

This suggestion was carried out and found to work well. Both of these officers are gentlemen and well posted in their profession, and when at times the medical officer on sick duty for the day was occupied and attention for a sudden case was needed, the one on sanitary duty was willing and ready to give his services. I am indebted to them equally for valuable and pleasant assistance, and respectfully recommend them to your favorable notice.

During the week's tour of duty, the command consisted of the fourth, fifth and sixth Provisional Battalions, in all twelve separate companies from different parts of the State. These companies, when stationed, as the majority of them are, at places where no medical officer of the guard resides, are allowed by law an assistant surgeon with rank of first lieutenant. They have no hospital stewards, and consequently when ordered into camp as provisional battalions, the post steward does all the work coming within the prescribed range of duties for a steward of a regiment. I would respectfully suggest that a steward belonging to some regiment be hereafter detailed for duty with provisional battalions, in order to assist the post steward. But such steward should be a regularly licensed apothecary. During the seven weeks' encampment just over, six hospital stewards in all have been

on duty, not including the post steward. Of these six, one was an apothecary, one a doctor, one a car conductor, one a sign painter, one a school teacher and one engaged in either making or selling scales. But one therefore is properly qualified for the position of steward, unless the one who is a doctor has had practical experience as a pharmacist and druggist. One of the others claims to have been a steward in the service during the war. As the camp is a camp of instruction not only for troops but also for all officers and men ordered there for duty, the steward of a regiment should be able, under the direction of the post steward, to prepare the medicines ordered, familiarize himself with the hospital knapsack and instrument cases as furnished to the medical officers, attend sick call, keep the meteorological record, and learn practically the duties of a hospital steward in addition to the work of an apothecary which he is supposed to know before being warranted.

With men of different avocations put in the position of hospital stewards, the medical department is crippled in case of service, and the medical officer has then to find some one in the command capable of doing steward's work, while the steward himself becomes merely an hospital attendant.

I would respectfully recommend that the attention of commanding officers be called to paragraph 115 of the regulations requiring hospital stewards to be familiar with medicines, and that those not qualified, now holding warrants as stewards, be dropped or transferred to some other department.

Owing to the well taken measures of the Ordnance Department in regard to drainage, the camp streets after a heavy rain presented many less wet places than I noted two years ago. When the permanent place is chosen for the camp-site, fuller precautions against surface water can be taken, avoiding entirely all danger from wet ground within a few hours after a rain-fall. Until such time, I have no suggestions to offer about the drainage of the camp. The sinks were kept in good condition, and the care exercised to keep the tubs emptied, the spreading of plenty of disinfectant, renders all chance of sickness from this source "nil." I had the honor of being consulted by the Chief of Ordnance upon the proposed plan of draining the sinks, mess house, kitchen, etc., when the permanent camping place is established. The plan contemplated, that of carrying a proper sized pipe to the river and enough out from the shore to discharge the sewage into the current, would be not only feasible, but owing to the great fall, a perfectly safe method of disposing of all the sewage of the post. The

only trouble that might be feared is injury to the pipe in the winter months. In case such drainage is not established, it would, in my opinion, be much better to construct the new sinks so that the present arrangement of tubs could be used, as being more cleanly and far safer than vaults or cess-pools.

The food and cooking are all that can be desired. There is nothing in this department which offers itself for criticism. No complaints against the rations were presented.

It is respectfully recommended that in the preparations of the permanent camp, some arrangements be considered for furnishing bathing facilities. The number that take the trouble to bathe in the river is comparatively few, owing to the distance necessary to be traveled, and the climb consequent on the return to camp. Could baths be had on the plateau, many would avail themselves of the privilege, which would be advantageous in the hot weather.

I would request attention to the consolidated medical report of service. It was found that four men were not fit subjects for service. Three of these reported sick on the first day, and were carried on the daily sick report until the command returned home. The captains commanding the companies to which they belonged were instructed to apply for their discharge on account of physical disability. If commanding officers would exercise proper care in recruiting men, the sick reports would show fewer unable for duty. No man should be enlisted who has suffered from sun stroke, or has any defect which an intelligent layman could discover.

In conclusion, sir, I wish to thank the commanding officer of the post, and the gentlemen of the post staff for many kindnesses and courtesies. My relations with them all were of the pleasantest kind, and such as to cause regrets that the tour of duty was of such short duration. I have the honor to remain, sir,

The disproportion shown by the number of prescriptions being so largely in excess of the number sick, is accounted for by the fact that exceedingly slight ailments were immediately relieved by single doses of remedies kept in the hospital. And by the fact that in the effort to prescribe only a very small quantity at a time, repetitions were thus often called for. The regiment passed through the hottest period the camp has ever known. On the seventh of July at 3 P. M., the maximum temperature of 104° was reached—the average for the twenty-four hours for that day being 96° as is shown in this report.

## REPORT OF THE FIRST, SECOND AND THIRD PROVISIONAL BATTALIONS.

*The Surgeon-General, S. N. Y.:*

SIR.—I herewith forward a detailed statistical report of my tour of duty as Post Surgeon of the State Camp of Instruction at Peekskill, N. Y., for the week July twenty-fourth to the thirty-first, ultimo, and respectfully submit the following: The organizations on duty were First, Second and Third Provisional Battalions, comprising 758 men, and composed of separate companies from various parts of the State. The men were of good physique, and, with the exception of some evidences of fatigue, appeared to be in excellent condition. They maintained uniformly good health during the week which was an unusually hot one, the average temperature being seventy-nine degrees Fahrenheit. It did not at any time become necessary on account of the heat to interfere with the daily routine of duty.

There were only seven cases of insolation, none of which were severe. Cool nights succeeded the hot days, refreshing the men and enabling them to perform their duties without danger.

In my report of last year I mentioned the salubrity of the camp and described its sanitary conditions, I can now only emphasize my former statement that it is one of the healthiest locations in the State. In an experience extending over four years, no serious case of illness has come under my observation. The sanitary work relating to the dumps and disposal of refuse was conscientiously performed and the policing uniformly good. No criticism could be made on the water supply, and the food was abundant and of good quality. The quarters of the men, their bedding and clothing were kept in good condition.

I desire in closing my report to call attention to the fact that the uniforms of the troops are unnecessarily heavy and contributed greatly to their discomfort during the hot weeks of the encampment. Inasmuch as the State Camp has become a permanent feature, I respectfully suggest the adoption of a lighter kind of clothing for the summer months.

The Assistant Surgeons Drs. Gerrin and Holt were efficient and attentive to duty.

Besides the balance of \$1,628.05 thus reported to my credit in the Second National Bank of New York city there is in the same bank a further balance of \$154 covered by checks drawn by me and included in the disbursements stated above, but which have not yet been presented for payment at the bank.

## REPORT OF THE GENERAL INSPECTOR OF RIFLE PRACTICE FOR 1886.

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STATE OF NEW YORK:

*The Adjutant-General, State of New York:*

SIR.—I have the honor to forward you the following as a report of the rifle practice of the National Guard during the year 1886. The reorganization of the troops early in August caused several changes in the officers of the department but through the assistance of Col. P. P. Beals at Buffalo, I was enabled to give a very thorough supervision of the practice of nearly all troops in the western part of the State, and I have, owing to lack of brigade inspectors, given needed personal attention to Creedmoor and various separate companies including Newburg, Poughkeepsie, Saratoga, Glens Falls, Ogdensburg, etc.

I find close supervision of all practice by officers of the department acquainted with and able to explain the details, very helpful, and it would, in my opinion, be well if this supervision could be extended to cover the smaller but most important detail of company drill in position and aiming, loading and firing. This followed by armory practice under careful instruction, would be productive of much good.

For this last practice many good organizations are hampered by lack of facilities and means, but closer study on the part of company officers and more attention to the detail drill of recruits, would largely obviate the difficulty.

We seem to need some method of better preliminary instruction, perhaps it may be desired. As it now is, the average National Guardsman goes to the range for field practice with but little knowledge of how to handle his arm in an effective manner. And being ignorant of the first principles of position and aiming, makes but a sorry figure.

#### RANGES.

Of their general condition I can speak favorably, some instances of lack of care have been noted, and for a detailed exhibit I would respectfully refer you to letter accompanying this report (Marked A.). New butts and targets have been erected at Newburg and Glens Falls, at Poughkeepsie and Bay view, the butts have been thoroughly rebuilt at State expense and are now in first class condition.

Before practice can be had at Creedmoore some repairs will be necessary there.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

Under this head I feel that if it can be arranged, an allowance of some specified amount to furnish suitable ammunition for armory practice would be beneficial as also a portion of transportation and expenses of teams shooting at the various brigade matches. And if some method can be devised whereby more and better elementary instruction can be given the enlisted man and arouse the enthusiasm of the officer it will be a great gain — perhaps the schemes now in progress may accomplish this.

While I cannot conscientiously recommend the expenditure of a large sum for rearming the State with any new rifle in the present uncertainty as to which arm is best, I do believe that at a moderate expense the present arm may be made useful and sufficient for our necessities for ten years to come.

In closing I would say it is my belief that with all the deficiencies apparent, we have to-day in the National Guard of New York, a body of troops from whom may be picked a large majority whose knowledge of the use of the rifle would be very powerful in case of need, and the interest seems to be on the increase. We have but to foster this interest to make all our troops marksmen in the true sense of the word.

SIR.—I have the honor to forward herewith detail memorandum of ranges throughout the State.

## CREEDMOOR.

Troops of the First and Second Brigades with Fourth and Eleventh Separate Companies, about 7,960 men practice at Creedmoor. This range has thirty-six targets available up to and including 300 yards, of which twenty-one are available up to and including 700 yards, and eight are available up to and including 1,000 yards. Controlled by the National Rifle Association of America, who provides from five to fifteen markers, four days per week, from May to November, as called for by troops practicing.

Range itself in good order; line fences in bad order; fence on top of east butt weak; marker's pit needs new roof; good house on range; targets in fair condition, show wear; general appliances good; had from State in 1886, \$4,000; will require in 1887, \$4,000 to \$5,000.

## PENN YAN.

First Separate Company at Penn Yan have, this past season, built a new range at their own expense, at a cost of about \$450. (Too much.)

Two second and two third class canvas targets. The range is well located, safe and convenient. Rent, fifty-five dollars per annum.

The company show commendable interest but have not applied for any allowance in 1886. Should have allowance in 1887 of about seventy-five dollars and paper targets.

## AUBURN.

The Second Separate Company have a range on the county fair grounds about fifteen minutes walk from the armory at Auburn. It has two firing points, one for 200 yards and one for 500 yards range. The butt of the former is fast decaying and the latter is (in fact both are) dangerously situated, owing to increase of building in the near vicinity. Probably a change of location will be necessary ere long. Two third class iron and one second class stone targets, in fair repair. State allowance in 1886, \$100. Will depend upon possible change or necessity for rebuilding in 1887, probably will need \$250 to \$300.

## ONEONTA.

The Third Separate Company have a range about two miles from the armory at Oneonta. Rent from thirty dollars to fifty dollars per annum. Two sets new pattern canvas targets. Firing points only fair. Butt (pit) in fair shape, character of soil necessitating frequent repairs. General appliances in good condition; was allowed seventy-five dollars in 1886; will need for 1887, seventy-five dollars.

The Fourth Separate Company practices at Creedmoor.

## NEWBURG.

The Fifth and Tenth Separate Companies practice upon some ranges at Newburg. This range was laid out and pit built this last season; it is on the city poor farm about fifteen minutes walk from armory. Has two sets of new pattern canvas targets and range and all appliances in good shape except firing points which will be fixed as soon as season permits. State allowance in 1886, nothing, but Capt. Smith has forwarded bill for \$100 on account of range, which I trust will be approved. Should have about fifty dollars to seventy-five dollars for 1887.

## RENSELAERWYCK.

The Sixth Separate Company of Troy, the Seventh Separate Company of Cohoes, the Twelfth Separate Company of Troy, the Twenty-first Separate Company of Troy, the Twenty-third Separate Company of Hudson, the Thirty-second Separate Company of Hoosic Falls and the Tenth Battalion of Albany, about 750 men, all practice at Rensselaerwyck range, about half way between Troy and Albany; reached by railroad trains every hour, fare fifteen cents round trip. Range well cared for, well built, good firing points and safe.

Character of soil makes repairs to pits frequent from washing away of earth. Three second class and three third class iron targets with one third class canvas target, old style.

General appliances in good order and well kept up. Managed by Third Division Rifle Association, Gen. A. J. Parker, Jr., president. Is not used as much as it should be except by Sixth Separate Company.

On leased land, rent paid in 1886, \$150. Had from State in 1886, \$650; if used by all troops in 1887 should have at least as much.

## ROCHESTER.

The Eighth Separate Company have a range about six miles from Rochester on ground leased for fifty dollars per annum from Gen.



Henry Prinker, is in good order, good range, fair firing points, reached during the season by steam cars from city, fairly accessible.

Have two sets canvas targets, new style pit built in 1885, were allowed fifty dollars as rent in 1886, should have same in 1887.

#### WHITEHALL.

The Ninth Separate Company range is on the hill back of town about fifteen minutes walk from armory at Whitehall. Have two canvas targets, old style, but good, good range, and up to present year has been used largely; pay rent irregularly. Had in 1886, fifty dollars from State; as to allowance in 1887 depends largely upon amount of use.

The Tenth Separate company (see "Newburg"), the Eleventh Separate Company (see "Creedmoor"), the Twelfth Separate Company (see "Rensselaerwyck").

#### JAMESTOWN.

The Thirteenth Separate Company have a range at Jamestown. Only one target in poor shape, poor location, everything about it bad. Has had nothing from the State for years. If company is to be regenerated a fair amount, say \$200 to \$250 might be expended with economy.

#### KINGSTON.

The Fourteenth Separate Company has a range about two miles from armory at Kingston. Had in 1885 new pit and two sets new pattern canvas targets, is in good shape and well supplied with all necessaries. Pays fifty dollars rent. Had in 1886, fifty dollars, ought to have same amount in 1887.

#### POUGHKEEPSIE.

The Fifteenth Separate Company and the Nineteenth Separate Company use jointly the range about three miles from Poughkeepsie, fairly accessible by street cars and walking. This range has had built by the State in 1886 a first class stone pit and has two third and two second class iron targets. Everything about it first class and one of the best equipped ranges in State. In care of Capt. Haubennestel, is likely to be well looked after. Pays sixty dollars rent. Had \$100 in 1886, will need \$100 in 1887.

#### CATSKILL.

The Sixteenth Separate Company have *no* range at Catskill; practiced last year at Kingston. This causes too much expense of time and

transportation, it would be economy for Capt. Murphy to locate a range and the State to equip.

The Seventh Separate Company (see "Creedmoor").

#### GLENS FALLS.

The Eighteenth Separate Company have a new range at Glens Falls about one and one-half miles from the armory; fairly well located and as it was new in 1886, is in good, condition and well supplied. Rent thirty dollars to forty dollars. Had fifty dollars in 1886, will probably need same amount in 1887.

The Nineteenth Separate Company (see "Poughkeepsie").

#### BINGHAMTON.

The Twentieth Separate Company range located about one and one-half miles from the armory at end of horse car route at Binghamton, has one second class and one third class iron target. The company have done a good deal of practice and have kept the range well equipped, but the pits are not what they should be and ought to be relocated and supplied with two sets of new pattern canvas targets, the cost would be about \$175 to \$200. Had seventy-five dollars from State in 1886.

The Twenty-first Separate Company (see "Rensselaerwyck").

#### SARATOGA.

The Twenty-second Separate Company's range is badly located about three miles from armory at Saratoga, reached only by marching or hired conveyances on a sandy road. Pit in good shape. Has two iron six by six targets arranged on pivots and painted, one side for second and one for third class work, whole thing is bad, dangerous and should be relocated and new targets provided for. This is a good company and if well provided with facilities would do good work. Pay rent about fifty dollars. Had from State in 1886, fifty dollars; if not relocated will require same in 1887, if changed, will need about \$200 to \$250 to rebuild range.

The Twenty-third Separate Company, Hudson, have *no* company range; practiced last year at Rensselaerwyck; remarks about Sixteenth Separate Company apply with force to this.

The Twenty-fourth Separate Company at Utica, no range, but no effort has been made to obtain one or to use that at Illion twelve

miles east, where the Remington factory has a range which could be utilized. The Twenty-fourth Company have *not practiced in last five years*.

## CANANDAIGUA.

The Twenty-fifty Separate Company located at Canandaigua have a range on border of lake about one mile from the armory, pleasant spot, and except for direction of firing, in good shape. Two sets new pattern canvas targets put up in 1885. Had fifty dollars from State in 1886, will require about seventy-five dollars in 1887 to keep matters up and pay rent.

## ELMIRA.

The Twenty-sixth Separate Company who jointly with the Thirtieth Separate Company occupy range near Elmira. Both companies practice largely. Southern Tier Rifle Association have charge and its membership is largely same as the companies. Have two pits, two sets canvas targets in each; direction of fire is bad, being to the west, but range is safe and a good one but difficult for new men. Had \$100 in 1886, will need same amount in 1887.

## MALONE.

The Twenty-seventh Separate Company have a range on the hill near Malone, it is not in good repair nor is it safe; should be refitted; the marker comes out to note shots and it is only a question of time as to accident. They should have new butts at a cost of about \$250. Have had nothing from the State for some years.

To the Twenty-eighth Separate Company, Utica, I can apply remarks under head of Twenty-fourth Company, except that they practiced *once* in last five years — when in camp.

## OSWEGO.

The Twenty-ninth and Thirty-eighth Separate Companies are particularly fortunate in ease of access to their range situated on the Government reservation, within ten minutes walk of the armory at Oswego, they have one second and one third class iron targets with good pits and butts and generally are kept in fairly good order. Paying no rent and doing but little shooting. These companies do not expend much. Had in 1886, twenty-five dollars, will need in 1887 same amount.

The Thirtieth Separate Company (see "Elmira").

The Thirty-first Separate Company, Mohawk, have no range of account and make little or no effort to practice. Eleven men out of

sixty-two practiced in 1886 ; are but one mile from Illion ; very little encouragement to do anything here.

Thirty-second Separate Company of Hoosic Falls practice at Rensselaerwyck ; should have range located near home.

#### WALTON.

The Thirty-third Separate Company's range near Walton ; is well up in practice, always near the head ; have had nothing from the State for some years. As location of range has been changed since I saw it, do not know condition. The company is deserving of aid, I think they need new range equipments.

#### GENEVA.

The Thirty-fourth Separate Company have this year established a new range about four miles from the armory at Geneva, but as they asked no advice from any one they have made mistakes ; the range is too far away ; line of fire is wrong ; targets are wood ; marker protected by a section of old boiler — *very dangerous*. Rent is too high, seventy-five dollars for accommodations had. Have had nothing from State. Should be helped somewhat and encouraged to get better facilities.

#### OGDENSBURG.

The Thirty-fifth Separate Company used this year the range built by a rifle club, about one mile from armory at Ogdensburg. The targets are of canvas on wood frames, sliding out of a shelter, the butt is of stone fifty feet long, twenty-five feet high, a fair protection. There are some irregularities in the ground, making the range at times bad on account of water, and I should judge in summer accidents might occur, the river passing in its rear. If they stay on this range they should have new equipments, would cost about \$250. The present are bad and dangerous for the marker. A pit may be dug and walled up with stone at small expense. The company is willing, I think, to bear part of the cost, seems enthusiastic and deserves help.

#### SCHENECTADY.

The Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh Separate Companies use the range on leased grounds about two miles from the armory at Schenectady. Range is a fair one ; have only one target ; pit good. If either company show any effort to improve in rifle practice, would advise an extension of pit and placing one new target, cost about one hundred

dollars. Pay thirty dollars rent. Had nothing from State in 1886, ought to have about fifty dollars in 1887.

The Thirty-eight Separate Company (see "Oswego").

#### WATERTOWN.

The Thirty-ninth Separate Company range is well located about two miles from the armory at Watertown; good firing points; butts badly decayed; pits all caved in. Have thirteen iron target slabs, but whole will have to be renewed or replaced before they can be used. This company has always stood well up in practice. Officers and men take much interest and have spent good deal of money to keep range up and deserve encouragement. Capt. Miller has some idea of changing location, at any rate if they ask for help should have it. A new range can be fitted or old one rebuilt for about \$250 or \$300. Had in 1886, seventy-five dollars, most of which was paid for rent.

The Fortieth and Forty-first Separate Companies, both located at Syracuse have no convenient range. I have made great efforts to encourage them to get one but there is but little spirit in either company in this direction. By orders in 1886 they were sent to Auburn, about twenty-five miles; too distant and expensive; too much loss of time. A good range could be located here.

#### BAY VIEW.

The Forty-second Separate Company have used the range at Bay View as also a temporary affair at Niagara Falls. They are talking of locating a range on line of railroad and will probably need help in equipping.

The Sixty-fifth and Seventy-fourth Regiments use the range eight miles from Buffalo where they have ample accommodation for their practice. The pit has been rebuilt, butt repaired and the whole put in order during last summer, is reported to be in good condition; rent paid is \$500 per annum.

The range connected with State Camp at Peekskill has not been used since 1885.

## REPORT OF GEN. J. G. FARNSWORTH

ON THE

CONDITION OF THE WAR CLAIMS OF THE STATE AGAINST  
THE UNITED STATES, DECEMBER 31, 1886.ALBANY, N. Y., *December 31, 1886.**To the Adjutant-General, State of New York:*

SIR.—I have the honor to report that on the seventh of January last, I was placed in charge of the prosecution of the war claims of the State against the United States.

The claims for the costs, charges and expenses incurred by the State, for enrolling, subsisting, clothing, army, equipping, etc., troops organized for the United States service during the late civil war, with the vouchers upon which the State originally made its payments, are filed in the bureau of the third auditor of the United States treasury, and have all been once passed upon by that officer and the second comptroller, who are the designated "proper accounting officers of the treasury" to pass upon claims of that nature.

The vouchers that conformed in all respects to the rigid rules and regulations of the department were allowed, and the State reimbursed for the amount of such allowances. The vouchers that did not meet the requirements of the accounting officers, estimated at over twenty thousand in number, were suspended for further proofs and explanations, or totally disallowed. In order to obtain further allowances, it has been and is still necessary to perfect suspended items by producing additional proofs to those already filed, or to explain satisfactorily misunderstandings that exist as to their character.

The late General J. B. Stonehouse for several years prior to his death had been in charge of this work, selecting from the suspended claims those that he could substantiate. From time to time he presented them to the accounting officers of the treasury, and obtained such allowances as they would award. At the time of his sudden death he had selected and partially prepared a number of claims for re-examination.

It was my first duty to complete the unfinished work he had then in hand, and to present them, with such proofs and additional evi-

dence that could be obtained, together with suitable explanations, for reconsideration. This work resulted in obtaining an allowance of \$18,837.85, which was placed to the credit of the State, and upon the report of that fact by the Secretary of the Treasury to Congress, that amount was appropriated and was paid into the State treasury on the 18th of August, 1886.

It appears from a statement prepared in the office of the third auditor of the United States treasury, that unsettled balances yet remain on the several installments of the war claims of this State, as follows:

A considerable portion of the balance consists of interest on Comptroller's bonds, sanitary supplies, expenses of State agents, care of sick and wounded soldiers, expenditures for harbor defense and other items that have been totally disallowed, and are not likely to be recovered without the stringent regulations of the treasury are modified by action of Congress or otherwise. Nevertheless, every effort is being made to procure evidence and make explanations to conform as near as possible to the requirements, and to overcome the objections of the department. This proceeding involves, before the claims are again presented, the re-examination of all the suspended vouchers on file in Washington; for, in most instances, neither copies nor duplicates can be found elsewhere, and, in many cases, important vouchers appear never to have been filed with the claims they are necessary to support.

In the pursuance of this work, instead of selecting special vouchers for representation, the system has been adopted of taking up each installment by itself.

I have so far prepared explanations, and in many instances procured new evidence and in other respects put in condition and presented to the accounting officers of the treasury, all the suspended vouchers of the third, sixth, seventh and ninth installments, which are now being acted upon, and upon which I expect to obtain a

further allowance (part of it at least) in time to secure an appropriation for payment during the present session of Congress. Meantime the preparation of the suspended items of the remaining installments is progressing, and will as early as possible be submitted to the proper accounting officers.

A statement is hereto annexed showing the condition of the war claims of the State, the amount of the original installments and the allowances that have been made.

A bill was introduced in the last session of the House of Representatives (at my request) by the Hon. A. S. Hewitt, for refunding duties paid by the State in 1863, on arms imported for troops organized to aid the United States in the War of the Rebellion, amounting to \$42,796.87, and was referred to the Committee on War Claims, where it was favorably considered and its passage recommended. The bill was also introduced in the United States Senate by the Hon. Warner Miller. Although the pressure of legislation is very great upon Congress during the present short session, I have hopes that the measure will pass.

A similar bill was introduced in prior terms of Congress, but beyond reference to a committee, no action was taken.

A bill increasing the annual appropriation for arms and equipments for the militia of the several States from \$200,000 to \$600,000 has passed the United States Senate, and within the last few days passed the House of Representatives amended so as to make the amount \$400,000. It is expected that a conference will result in the bill becoming a law with the amount certainly not less than that named in the amended bill.

At my request a bill was introduced in the House of Representatives by Hon. E. L. Viele, for the payment of certificates issued by the State to the soldiers of 1812, and referred to the Committee on Claims. Efforts are being made to secure its early consideration.

Bills are also pending in Congress for the exchange of the arms in the hands of the militia of the several States for the improved Springfield rifle, calibre 45; also for the refunding to the several States the direct tax levied in 1861 by the general government, and for the re-settlement of interest due States on account of the war of 1812. Strong efforts are being made for the passage of the bill relating to the direct tax, the success of which is rendered doubtful by the brevity of the present session of Congress.
