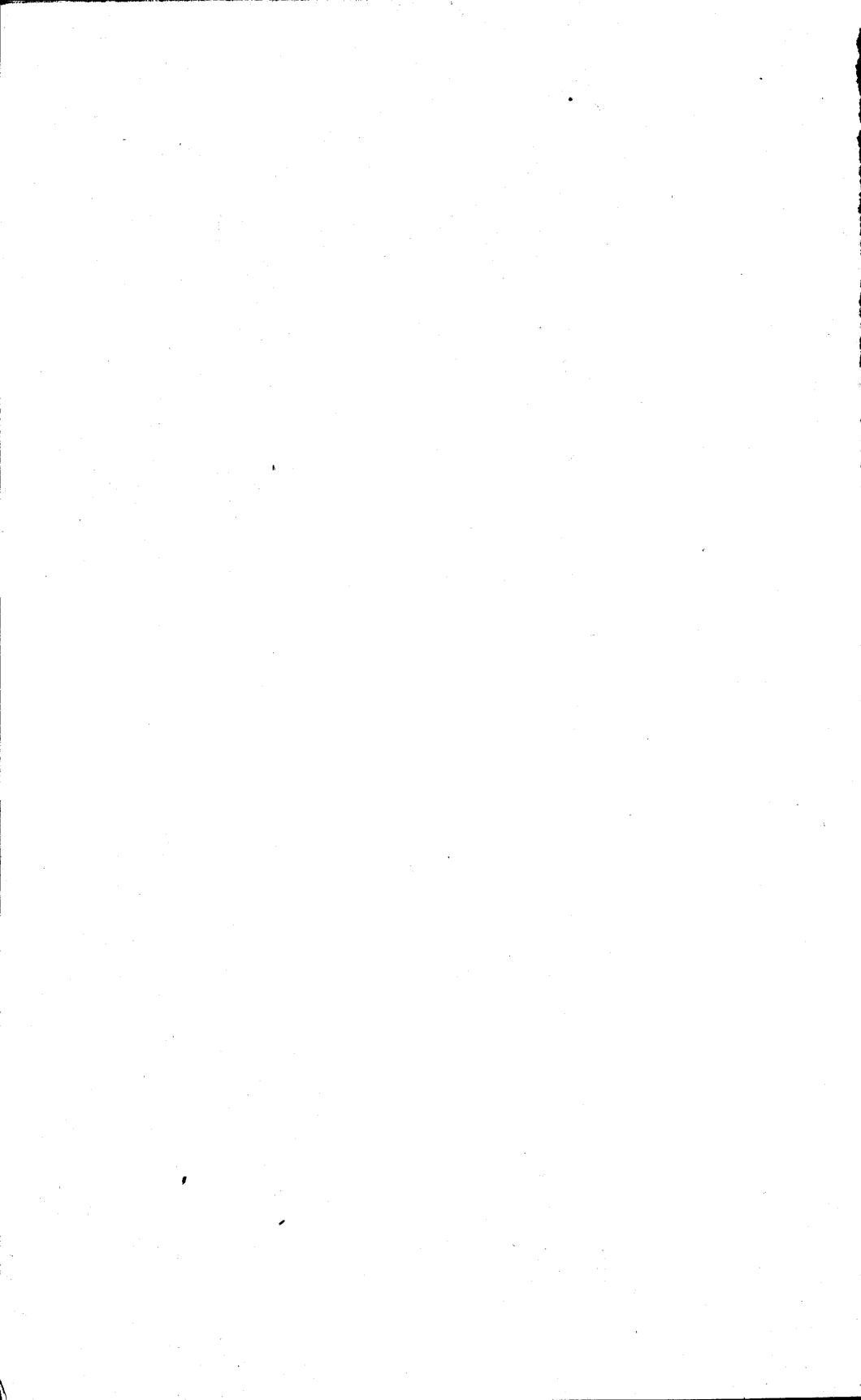

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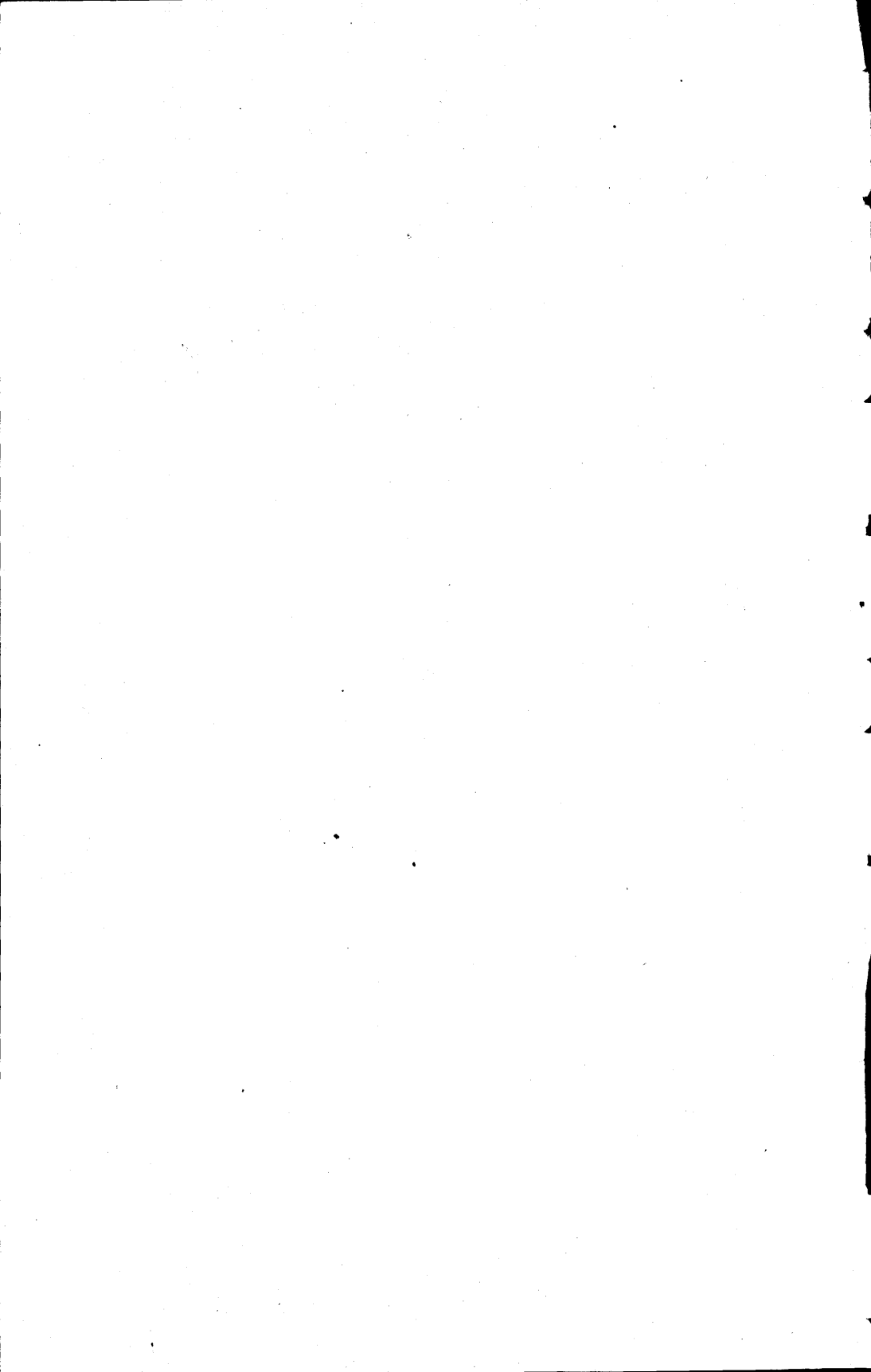

HON. DAVID B. HILL, *Governor and Commander-in-Chief:*

SIR.—I have the honor to submit the following report for the year 1887 :

MILITIA.

The estimate made in my last report of the number of men subject to military duty was based upon the last United States census, and although it is probably understated, nothing can be definitely ascertained until another enumeration or census is published.

The efforts made to induce Congress to amend the obsolete militia laws of the United States and to assist the States in arming and improving the militia forces, have resulted only in a comparatively small increase of the amount to be distributed in kind among all the States and Territories. In order to bring this matter of the amendment of the militia laws to the attention of the national legislature, and to secure, if possible, adequate allowances of military property, the "National Guard Association of the United States" was organized in New York in 1878. After correspondence with the leading military officers of the various States, a convention was called which met at the city of New York in January, 1879, at which eighteen States were represented, when a regular organization was formed, General George W. Wingate of New York being elected president, and an executive committee elected consisting of one officer from New England, the Middle, Southern, Western and Pacific States.

Subsequent conventions, in which the number of States represented continued to increase, were held at St. Louis in 1879, Philadelphia in 1881, Cincinnati in 1884, and Washington in 1885, when twenty-two States and Territories were represented, viz.:

Maine, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, North Carolina, Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Louisiana, Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, Minnesota, California and the District of Columbia.

A carefully drawn bill for the improvement of the militia was prepared by the association at its first convention in 1879, and was presented to Congress at its next session. This was reported favorably, but no action was taken upon it. At the next session the bill was remodeled to avoid criticisms that had been made in regard to it, and has been reintroduced at every succeeding Congress. Although favorably reported and commended by every Secretary of War and President since 1880, it never came to a vote in the House of Representatives until 1884, when it failed to receive sufficient votes to be taken up.

In 1884 the bill was divided into the "Sewell" bill, introduced in the Senate, simply providing for an increase in the appropriation, and the "Slocum" bill, introduced in the House of Representatives, which was intended to modernize the obsolete provisions of the United States Revised Statutes in regard to the militia. The "Sewell" bill, after having passed the Senate at several previous sessions, was finally passed by the House in December, 1886, with the appropriation reduced from \$600,000 to \$400,000, which change was concurred in by the Senate and the bill became a law. The "Slocum" bill has never come to a vote in either chamber.

NATIONAL GUARD.

The Military Code provides that the "aggregate force" of the National Guard, "in time of peace, fully armed, uniformed and equipped, shall not be less than 10,000 and not over 15,000 enlisted men." At the date of the latest quarterly returns, September thirtieth ultimo, the force consisted of 726 officers and 11,909 enlisted men, aggregating 12,635 officers and enlisted men, as against 12,480 at the same date the preceding year. There has been some increase by recruiting since the returns of the last quarter were made, and the aggregate now approximates 13,000 officers and enlisted men. The Inspector-General reports that there were present at the annual inspection and muster, 10,444 officers and enlisted men.

There are fifteen regiments, one battalion and forty-four separate companies of infantry, and five batteries of artillery, organized as four brigades.

The First Brigade, Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald, with headquarters at the city of New York, consists of the First and Second batteries and the Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Eleventh, Twelfth, Twenty-second, Sixty-ninth and Seventy-first regiments of infantry, aggregating 5,514 officers and men, of which number there were present at the annual inspection and muster 4,578.

The Second Brigade, Brigadier-General Jas. McLeer, with headquarters at Brooklyn, consists of the Third battery, the Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Twenty-third, Thirty-second and Forty-seventh regiments, and the Seventeenth separate company of infantry, aggregating 2,747 officers and men, of which 2,358 were present at the annual inspection and muster.

The Third Brigade, Brigadier-General Amasa J. Parker, Jr., with headquarters at Albany, consists of the Sixth battery, the Tenth battalion, and the Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh, Twelfth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first, Twenty-second, Twenty-third, Twenty-fourth, Twenty-seventh, Twenty-eighth, Thirty-first, Thirty-second, Thirty-third, Thirty-fifth, Thirty-sixth, Thirty-seventh, thirty-ninth and Forty-fourth separate companies of infantry, aggregating 2,401 officers and men, having 1,974 present at the annual inspection and muster.

The Fourth Brigade, Brigadier-General Peter C. Doyle, with headquarters at Buffalo, consists of the Fifth battery, the Sixty-fifth and Seventy-fourth regiments, and the First, Second, Eighth, Thirteenth, Twenty-fifth, Twenty-sixth, Twenty-ninth, Thirtieth, Thirty-fourth, Thirty-eighth, Fortieth, Forty-first, Forty-second and Forty-third separate companies of infantry, aggregating 1,939 officers and men, having present at the annual inspection and muster 1,534.

Since the last annual report of this department, the Fourth battery, stationed at Troy, and the Twenty-fourth separate company of infantry, at Utica, have been disbanded, on the application and representations of the commanding officer of the brigade, and the recommendation of the Inspector-General. The Fourth battery was mustered out of service February 25th, and the Twenty-fourth separate company March 11th, of this year.

Three separate companies of infantry have been organized, viz.: one at Olean, designated as the Forty-third, and attached to the Fourth brigade; another at Middletown, designated as the Twenty-fourth, and attached to the Third brigade; and a third at Utica, designated as the Forty-fourth, and attached to the Third brigade.

Signal and telegraph corps, to be attached to the headquarters of the First and Second brigades, have been authorized. The men enlisted, or the majority of them, are required to be practical telegraph operators. It is proposed to instruct them in all matters pertaining to telegraphy which may be necessary in the field, as well as in all the approved modes of signaling.

By a recent order prepared by the Surgeon-General, and published as general orders No. 36, men are to be detailed in all the regiments and battalions, and in all the batteries and separate companies having medical officers, to serve as members of "ambulance corps," in their respective commands. They are to be instructed in the care of the sick and wounded, and especially in rendering first aid to the injured.

The condition of the several organizations, considered with reference to their composition, instruction and discipline, is, except in a few instances, satisfactory and encouraging. The observation of the officers of the Inspector-General's department is to the effect that "they have grown to realize that they are not independent organizations, but part of the military force of the State, amenable to its laws and subordinate to its regulations and discipline." This alone, without considering the improvement admitted to have been accomplished in matters of discipline and instruction, fully justifies the liberal appropriations made for the last two years. The reports show that there are still certain organizations which fall far short of the standard now reasonably required of the Guard; but, on the other hand, it will be seen that there are many notable examples of superior excellence; and there is a general disposition manifested to make the most of every opportunity to profit by military instruction, example and practice.

The Inspector-General reports that he does not consider the number present at the annual muster a fair indication of the effective and reliable strength of the organizations, for the reason that special efforts are made to bring men out on that occasion. This

is entirely true, and an organization should not be rated, either in strength or efficiency, according to its showing at the annual inspection and muster ; but the work done at other times, especially in camp and at its weekly drills, should also be taken into consideration. The real standing of all the organizations, however, is pretty well understood, and spasmodic exhibitions of numbers, in cases where there is a meager and irregular attendance at company drills and schools of instruction, seldom impose on anybody. Nevertheless, it has been thought well to send inspecting officers to ascertain and report what the companies, those of regiments as well as separate companies, are doing, and this practice will be continued during the year.

Applications are constantly received for permission to raise separate companies of infantry, with an occasional request for authority to raise a battery. It is evident from an examination of these applications and the representations of those interested in them, that there would be no difficulty in filling up the ranks of the Guard to the limit of the statute, with men in every way as desirable as those generally found in the separate companies. It would seem to be in the interests of the service, and to the advantage of the State, to dispense promptly with inefficient and laggard organizations, and replace them with companies at important stations where men are anxious to enter the service. It is to be remembered in this connection, that our railroad facilities are such that troops can be readily moved whenever and wherever they may be needed.

It should be understood, however, that companies will be organized only in those localities where there are good military reasons for establishing them, and care should be exercised not to approach the legal limit as to the strength of the force so closely that it might become necessary to put a stop to recruiting, a thing which would undoubtedly be disastrous in its effects.

In last year's report no organization was distinguished by special mention. But this year the Seventh regiment has so eminently distinguished itself, that it would be unfair to refrain from awarding it conspicuous and honorable mention. The Twelfth regiment deserves mention for the great advance it is making under its present field officers. The Twenty-second gave evidence of its

soldierly and progressive character by marching from its station to the camp at Peekskill, and by practical instruction in field fortifications under Captain J. G. D. Knight, of the United States Engineers. The Twenty-third made an admirable showing at the Camp of Instruction in everything except numbers, and it is to be regretted that in this respect it contrasted so unfavorably with its appearance at the annual inspection. There are other regiments, and there are many separate companies, which merit commendation, but it is unnecessary to enumerate them, the Inspector-General having most plainly, fully and impartially set forth in his report the merits and demerits of each and every organization. Attention, however, may well be called to the batteries, which are in better form than at any time heretofore, and certainly deserve this recognition. Although until the time comes when they shall have their own horses, it cannot be expected of them to greatly excel as batteries of manœuvre, it should be remembered that such service will rarely be required of them. In the event of riotous disturbances there will hardly be any occasion for battery movements; the service of the piece would be the essential thing, and it is safe to say that all our batteries may be depended on to work their guns, in case of need, skilfully and effectively.

Not the least of the benefits which have now become apparent as resulting from the reorganization effected a little more than a year ago, as set forth in last year's report, were the opportunities and facilities it afforded to establish efficient examining boards for officers, and to prescribe a system of examination that should be uniform throughout the State. This was important, for the standard of "character, knowledge of military affairs and fitness for the service" of officers depends almost entirely upon the character and competency of the examining boards. Formerly there was a multiplicity of boards with a variety of systems, and whatever was done, it frequently happened as in many other matters, that it was so delayed and diluted by passing through various headquarters as to become of little value. There are now four boards of examination for officers, one in each brigade, the members of which have been carefully selected with reference to their qualifications for such service. They are working under and in accordance with established rules, and as the members are not

relieved from their regular duties, and as, moreover, the duty required of them is at best an irksome one, pay is allowed. They are doing excellent service and merit especial commendation.

ARMORIES.

I desire to ask your attention to the question of how to provide armories for the troops. The present system does not work satisfactorily, and it is believed that the subject demands serious consideration. The armory lies at the basis of our State system in military matters. In establishing a National Guard organization, almost the first thing to be considered is how to get a drill-room. The men, except on rare occasions, can only be assembled for drill and instruction in the evening, and necessarily, therefore, there must be a drill-room capable of being well lighted and heated, and there must also be a place where their arms, equipments, ammunition and uniforms can be safely kept while they are engaged in their occupations as citizens. In other words, there must be an armory or there will be no soldiers. More than this, the armory should be commodious and comfortable, as well as attractive in appearance and in its furnishings, in order to induce young men having military inclinations to enter the service.

Under the law, the counties are required to provide "suitable and convenient armories, drill-rooms and places of deposit for the safe keeping of arms, equipments, uniforms and other military property" furnished by the State. While some of the counties have been liberal enough in this respect, others have inclined to evade the duty. In the city and county of New York, the regiments and batteries, with only two exceptions, are huddled into contracted and uncomfortable barracks, which can in no sense be considered suitable and convenient drill-rooms, which afford plentiful facilities for the loss or destruction of public property, rather than its safe keeping, and which it is an absurdity to characterize as armories. The exceptions referred to are, the Seventh regiment, which built its own armory, and the Twelfth regiment, which has recently been put in possession of the only armory building erected by the county, and the only one fit for the occupation of troops that has been in any way provided by the county, at least for many years.

Notwithstanding the requirements of the law, special appropriations have been made from time to time, and armories have been erected with State moneys, in cases where the counties have provided suitable sites and conveyed the titles to them to the State. An effort made several years ago to procure similar legislation for New York regiments was opposed by those in authority in that city. It is recommended that as the troops are State troops, the State may well assume the whole burden of providing armories, or at least so amend the law that whenever there is an armory demanded, and the station is of sufficient military importance to warrant it, such measures may be taken that it cannot be left to the mercy of those who have no interest in the matter, save to delay or altogether avoid it.

Provision should be made, without unnecessary delay, for every organization that is not already properly quartered, having due consideration to its station and condition. The best armory in the State will not of itself make a good regiment, but the best officers in the State will find it difficult, under the conditions of National Guard service, to make a regiment in a barn. The situation of the New York city regiments and batteries particularly demands attention. Not only are they without suitable armory accommodations, but they are denied access to the parade ground laid out in Central Park for their use, on the ground that impossible injury would be done to the grass, and that shrubbery that does not exist in that vicinity would be destroyed. Some of these regiments are literally struggling to maintain an existence under the most discouraging circumstances. It is a question whether the expense incurred in maintaining them, is not, to a certain extent, an inexcusable waste of the military funds, and whatever military property is prudently allowed to remain in their so-called armories. There are among them those having histories of which they are justly proud, and which should be a source of strength to the State, but in the interests of economy it may well be suggested that if nothing is to be done to provide proper accommodations for them, the money and property could be more effectually applied in other quarters.

ARMS AND EQUIPMENTS.

The Remington rifle, with which the troops are armed, has been in constant use for more than fifteen years, and, considering the amount of work that has been done at the targets, it speaks well for its good qualities that it is still reported serviceable, or rather not unserviceable. It must, nevertheless, be regarded an obsolete arm, principally for the reason that its calibre is in excess of the present standard of the United States, and very much larger than that now used by military nations. It is to be regretted that it is still impossible to make any recommendation looking to the adoption of a new arm. There is no doubt that the United States

will sooner or later adopt the smaller calibre, and there can be little question that a magazine gun will also be adopted, but meantime the ordnance department of the army says, in substance, that it is waiting for the inventive genius of our people to discover something which will suit the purpose. As it is beyond dispute that it is important that the State troops should be armed with rifles of the same calibre as those used by the army, and if possible of the same pattern, there seems to be nothing for the State to do but to emulate the example of the United States ordnance department, and patiently wait the coming of the gun of the future.

The Gatling guns with which two of the batteries are armed are in good condition. The three-inch rifles and light twelve-pounders, which constitute the armament of the other batteries, have outlived their time, especially the light twelves, and the carriages and limbers are old and rotten. As soon as the United States Government will consent to issue the new three two-inch breech-loading rifle, with which it is about to arm all its mounted batteries, it is recommended that an earnest effort be made to procure a reasonable number of them.

The infantry has been supplied with new equipments which are believed to be entirely satisfactory. Having in view possible service in the field, there ought always to be on hand a large reserve supply of equipments with at least a double allowance of cartridge boxes, or cartridge belts. There should also be a reserve supply of haversacks and canteens, as well as blankets enough to furnish at least all the enlisted men now in service. This cannot be accomplished, however, unless special appropriations are made for the purpose. The knapsacks now issued are unsatisfactory, but until it is more definitely determined what equipment of this kind is better adapted to our service, it is not recommended that any change be made.

UNIFORMS.

Little can be added to what was said, or to the recommendations made, in the last report from this office on the subject of uniforms. By chapter 460 of the Laws of 1887, the Adjutant-General, Inspector-General and Chief of Ordnance, were constituted a commission to procure suitable overcoats, and the sum of \$100,000 was appro-

priated for that purpose, \$30,000 of which is immediately available and the balance at the expiration of one year from the execution of a contract to be made after due advertisement. A board of officers, convened to recommend such an overcoat as they should deem suitable for National Guard service, has reported. Advertisements have been published for bids for cloth, and although it is still doubtful whether the sum appropriated is sufficient to procure such overcoats as may reasonably be desired, there will be no unnecessary delay on the part of the commission, and it is hoped the issue of new overcoats may at least begin in the course of the coming summer.

CAMP OF INSTRUCTION.

Seven regiments, one battalion, nine separate companies and two batteries, performed tours of duty at the camp at Peekskill this season, as follows:

The Seventh regiment, Colonel Emmons Clark, from June eighteenth to June twenty-fifth.

The Twelfth regiment, Colonel James H. Jones, to whose command was attached the Seventeenth and Thirty-fifth separate companies, from June twenty-fifth to July second.

The Ninth regiment, Colonel William Seward, Jr., and a provisional battalion composed of the Sixth, Eleventh, Thirty-eighth and Forty-first separate companies, Major Frank A. Jones, of the Eleventh regiment, commanding, from July second to July ninth.

The Forty-seventh regiment, Colonel Edward F. Gaylor, and a provisional battalion composed of the Fifth, Nineteenth and Twentieth separate companies, and the Sixth battery serving as infantry, Major George A. Miller, of the Twenty-second regiment, commanding, from July ninth to July sixteenth.

The Twenty-third regiment, Lieutenant-Colonel Alexander S. Bacon, from July sixteenth to July twenty-third.

The Seventy-first regiment, Colonel Frederick Kopper, and the Tenth battalion, Lieutenant-Colonel William E. Fitch, from July twenty-third to July thirtieth.

The Twenty-second regiment, Colonel John T. Camp, and the Second battery, Captain Ferdinand P. Earle, from July thirtieth to August sixth.

A detachment of men from the First battery was sent to the

camp each week during the season, so that at the close of the encampment nearly all the enlisted men of the battery had performed the usual tour of duty.

The average attendance in camp this year was 74.27 per cent, not as much as heretofore, but still satisfactory; especially as the loss in attendance is easily explained by reference to the table annexed. The few changes that took place in the organizations, while in camp, deserve special notice and more than offset the apparent loss in attendance.

The total number of men who received pay for service in camp is 4,405. There were in at least one-half of the companies men who did not remain in camp long enough to entitle them to pay, and adding these will make the number in camp at least 4,450. The bands, no longer enlisted and therefore not included in the reports, numbered 250 men, making the aggregate in camp this season 4,700 officers, musicians and enlisted men. The details are shown in the following table:

Reviewing the encampment since 1882, every one shows improvement over the preceding one, especially in the matters of military conduct, military courtesy, discipline and police. In these

particulars, such is the progress made that, with the exception of a very limited number of organizations, there is little left to criticise. Drill is improving, but there is much theoretical and practical instruction needed yet. Guard duty has improved, but there is room for further improvement, and there is evidently a lack of that careful theoretical instruction which is absolutely essential in this matter. The idea that the State puts troops in camp for the purpose of giving them a holiday after a winter's work in the armories, has almost disappeared, and no one more than the troops themselves are entitled to be congratulated that it is so.

The government of the camp as a military post, established the previous season, was continued this year. Several officers were detailed as inspectors and instructors, as is shown by the orders which are made a part of this report, and they performed their duties in the most satisfactory manner; nevertheless the same difficulty in obtaining desirable officers, who could give the required time for this service, was experienced that was mentioned in last year's report. As it appears to be the only way in which the difficulty can be met, and as it has also become apparent that there is a further demand for officers to make frequent inspections, and observe the work of the various organizations at their armories, the suggestion that a staff of thoroughly trained officers be placed permanently on duty, and allowed suitable compensation, is renewed. There can be no question that in order to secure thorough, systematic and uniform instruction, as well as uniformity in the practices and customs of the service, there should be as little change as possible in the officers having charge of affairs at the camp of instruction. At least there should be no change in the commanding officer or the staff, or the system of instruction, in the course of an encampment season.

Soon after the establishment of the camp at Peekskill there was developed a tendency to compress all the instruction of the year, including drilling of recruits, the school of the company, target practice and competitions for the marksman's and sharpshooter's decorations, as well as the annual inspection and muster, into the seven days of the encampment. To suffer this was to do violence to the theory upon which the camp of instruction was organized,

as well as the State system in the matter of armories. The camp of instruction is intended to supplement instruction of the armories. The schools of the soldier and the company can be as well, or even better taught in the armory, and more will be accomplished in rifle practice at the regular ranges than at the camp, with all its continuous and conflicting duties. Besides, the cost is to be taken into consideration; for to put troops in camp to do armory work would be an unjustifiable expenditure. All this has now become well understood, and so far as may be hereafter, having reference to their drill-room facilities, organizations will not be ordered to the camp that have not made reasonable progress in their armories.

Colonel E. F. Townsend, Twelfth infantry, U. S. A., and Major R. Lodor, Third artillery, U. S. A., under orders from the headquarters of the army, were present at the camp and inspected the troops. For further information in regard to the encampment this season, reference is respectfully made to their reports to the Adjutant-General, U. S. A., copies of which are forwarded herewith.

MOVEMENTS OF TROOPS.

The Fourteenth and Sixty-ninth regiments were detailed, in accordance with chapter 488, Laws of 1887, as an escort, under the command of Brigadier-General James McLeer, to the society of the Army of the Potomac, at its reunion at Saratoga, June twenty-second, this year. These regiments were selected for this duty on account of their connection with the Army of the Potomac, and they did credit to the selection. At the centennial celebration of the adoption of the Federal Constitution, held at Philadelphia, the State was represented by a brigade commanded by Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald, and composed of the Twelfth, Twenty-second and Twenty-third regiments, and a provisional regiment formed of the Second, Eighth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-second, Twenty-sixth, Thirtieth, Thirty-second, Thirty-fifth, Thirty-ninth and Forty-first separate companies, under the command of Colonel E. F. Gaylor, of the Forty-seventh regiment. These troops took part in the parade on the sixteenth of September ultimo, and by their military bearing and soldierly conduct reflected the highest credit on the State.

The experience gained on such tours of duty cannot fail to be of great value to the troops. It would be in the interests of all concerned if every summer a brigade should be ordered away for a day or two, when a short march might possibly be combined with transportation by rail. To successfully conduct an ordinary march or a march by rail, is a more difficult matter than it seems, and the knowledge necessary to its skillful accomplishment is only thoroughly acquired by actual experience.

BUREAU OF RECORDS OF THE WAR OF THE REBELLION.

It is satisfactory in this connection to recite the acts of the Legislature, relating to honorably discharged soldiers and sailors, which, with your approval, have become laws of the State, inasmuch as they unequivocally show the appreciation in which those who served in a field or on the sea, in the war for the Union, are held.

Chapter 8, Laws of 1885, prevents persons from unlawfully using or wearing the badge of the Grand Army of the Republic of this State.

Chapter 24, Laws of 1885, amends the act authorizing the burial of any honorably discharged soldier, sailor or marine, who shall hereafter die without leaving means sufficient to defray the funeral expenses, and makes it more liberal in its terms.

Chapter 240, Laws of 1885, provides that the orderlies and watchmen employed at the Capitol, shall be persons who served in the Union army or navy during the late war, and have been honorably discharged therefrom, and that they shall not be subject to civil service rules of examination.

Chapter 29, Laws of 1886, provides that persons who served in the army or navy of the United States in the late war, and have been honorably discharged therefrom, shall be preferred for appointment to positions in the civil service, and shall not be disqualified from holding any position in civil service on account of age or any physical disability, as long as such do not render them incompetent to perform the duties of the position applied for.

Chapter 173, Laws of 1886, empowers the boards of supervisors of the several counties of the State to vote moneys for the

erection, repairing or remodeling of monuments to the veterans of the rebellion.

Chapter 422, Laws of 1886, exempts honorably discharged soldiers and sailors who lost an arm or a leg in the service of the United States during the late war, or who are unable to perform manual labor by reason of injuries received or disabilities incurred in such service, from work on highways or assessments therefor.

Chapter 102, Laws of 1887, authorizes the county of Ulster to aid in erecting a memorial soldiers' monument.

Chapter 195, Laws of 1887, repeats the provisions of chapter 240, Laws of 1885, already quoted.

Chapter 214, Laws of 1887, amends the burial acts already in existence, making them still more liberal.

Chapter 269, Laws of 1887, provides for the erection of suitable monuments to the memory of the soldiers of the State of New York who were engaged in the battle of Gettysburg.

Chapter 291, Laws of 1887, gives preference to the children of those who have died in the military or naval service of the United States in free tuition at Cornell University.

Chapter 339, Laws of 1887, authorizes the erection of a soldiers' and sailors' monument in the city of Brooklyn, and provides for payment therefor.

Chapter 464, Laws of 1887, repeats and enlarges the provision of chapter 29, Laws of 1886, relating to the employment of honorably discharged Union soldiers or sailors in the public service of the State.

Chapter 706, Laws of 1887, provides for the relief of indigent soldiers, sailors and marines, and the families of those deceased, enabling the poor old soldier to spend the evening of his days with his family, and when the final night comes to go to sleep tended by loving hands, instead of dying in the poor-house, or far from family or friends in the Soldiers' Home.

There are other acts, but as they are more local than general they are not mentioned.

These acts show how well the interests of the soldier have been looked after under your administration, but there is one more to be recorded. The State has no complete record of those who served in the war, and a bill embodying the provisions of chapter

51, Laws of 1887, was prepared and introduced in the Legislature, where it passed, and receiving your approval, became a law. It provides for the completion of the records of New York volunteers of the war of the rebellion, on file in this office.

Later in the session you approved chapter 247, Laws of 1887, entitled "An act in relation to the collection and preservation of the battle flags, of records and relics of New York volunteers who served in the war of the rebellion."

Chapters 51 and 247, the two last mentioned, are the ones which affect this Department directly. In accordance with chapter 51, arrangements have been made with the Adjutant-General of the U. S. A., so that copies of the missing records of New York volunteers will be received from him; and if the arrangements prove satisfactory, it is estimated that in the course of the coming year copies of almost all the missing records will be placed on file in this office.

Under chapter 247, Laws of 1887, a bureau of military records has been established in this office, the former volunteer division of the office forming part of it. Colonel Frederick Phisterer has been detailed as chief of the bureau, and Mr. Gilbert C. Rice as his assistant, both having been for several years connected with the former volunteer division.

Application has been made to the trustees of the Capitol for suitable and convenient quarters for this bureau, and until such are provided its operations are necessarily confined to furnishing information from the records on file to those entitled thereto, and to perfecting those records as far as practicable.

To carry out the provisions of chapters 51 and 247, Laws of 1887, continued appropriations, proper and suitable quarters and some changes in chapter 247 will be necessary.

The labors heretofore performed by the volunteer division of this office, now performed by the Bureau of Records, have not decreased since my last report.

The annual reports of the Inspector-General, the Chief of Ordnance, acting Quartermaster-General and acting Commissary-General of Subsistence, the Surgeon-General, the General Inspector of Rifle Practice and the acting Paymaster-General, are submitted herewith.

The annual report of the commanding officer of the First Brigade, the report of the same officer as commanding officer of the provisional brigade at Philadelphia, and the report of Major General J. G. Farnsworth on the condition of the war claims of the State against the United States, are also submitted with this report.

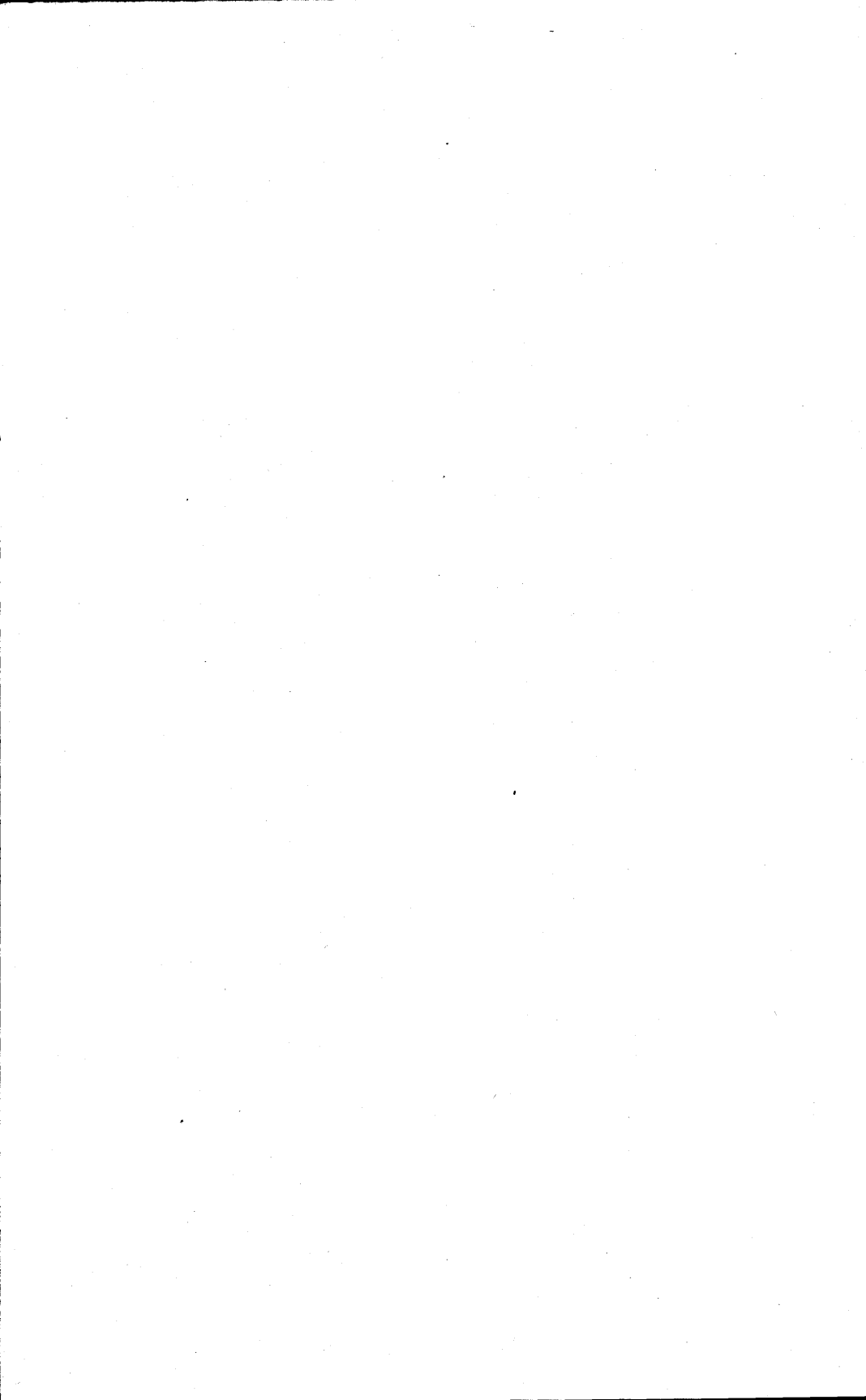

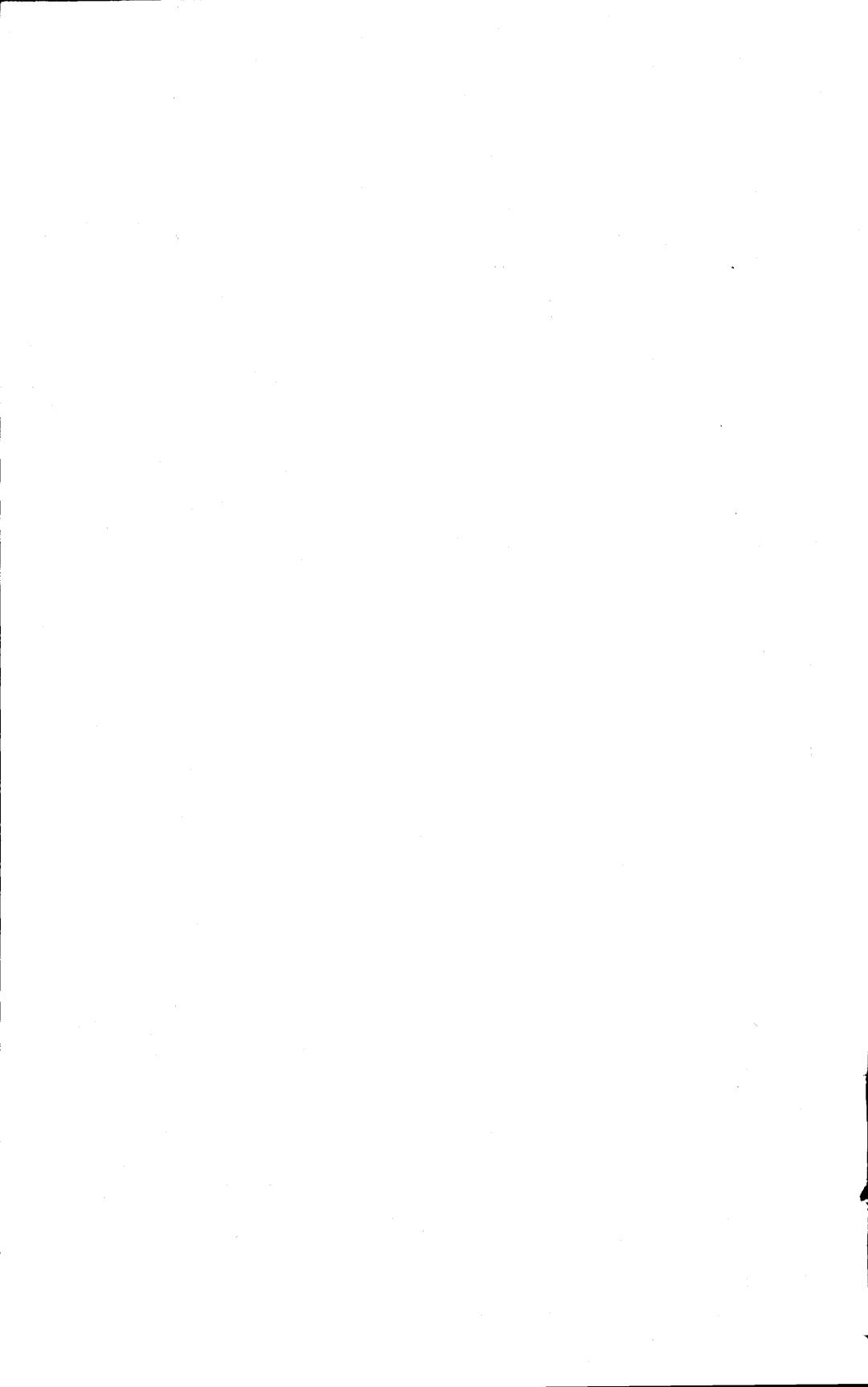

REPORT ON STATE CAMP.

By Col. E. F. TOWNSEND, Twelfth United States Infantry, and
Major R. LODOR, Third United States Artillery.

MADISON BARRACKS, N. Y., *July 8, 1887.*

Adjutant-General, U. S. Army, Washington, D. C.:

SIR.—In obedience to paragraph 15, Special Orders, No. 125, current series, headquarters of the army, Adjutant-General's office, and letter of instructions from Adjutant-General's office, dated June 2, 1887, I have the honor to report herein the result of my inspection and observation of so much of the National Guard, State of New York, as was on duty at the State Camp of Instruction near Peekskill during the period from June 18 to July 5, 1887.

I left Madison barracks June seventeenth, arriving at the camp the following morning. The camp of instruction at or near Peekskill is a military post, having been so constituted by General Orders, No. 20, General Headquarters, State of New York, Adjutant-General's office, Albany, May 16, 1887. The post commander is Major-General Josiah Porter, Adjutant-General of the State, and who is assisted by a very complete and efficient staff.

The garrison of the post consisted of the regiments and other organizations ordered into camp for one week's service, and then relieved by others for an equal length of time.

The camp is situated upon a high plateau, on the east bank of the Hudson river, commanding a beautiful view down the river, and is about four miles by road from the town of Peekskill. The property comprises about 137 acres, and belongs to the State, having been purchased for military purposes. Great improvements have been made from year to year; and others are contemplated for the future. Since last summer a thorough system of sewerage has been established, water-closets and bath-houses constructed, and the drainage of the camp generally made complete. Its sanitary condition has been made as perfect as skill and money can render it.

REPORT OF THE ADJUTANT-GENERAL.

SUBSISTENCE DEPARTMENT.

The troops were messed by contract. A large building, capable of seating nearly or quite 900 persons, has been built for a mess-hall, and includes a commodious kitchen with steam-cooking apparatus. A corps of skilled waiters was in attendance. Three times each day the troops were marched to the mess-hall, where were found awaiting them substantial meals, excellently cooked. I heard of no fault whatever being found, and the arrangements reflect great credit upon the officers who designed the system and the contractors who carried it into effect. Ration returns were made out daily for the number of men in camp, sent to the post-adjutant, and if found correct were approved, and orders issued for the number of meals required.

QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

The chief of ordnance, Brigadier-General Joshua Varian, also acted as quartermaster-general. Under his supervision all the improvements were made and the camp ground put in readiness for the reception of the troops. Tents were pitched, floored, furnished with cots, mattresses, blankets, and other necessary articles before the arrival of the troops. All articles of quartermaster property were regularly turned over by the acting quartermaster-general to the regimental quartermaster, receipted for by the latter, and then at the end of the week transferred again to the acting quartermaster-general to be reissued to the next regiment to arrive.

The tentage was in excellent order, made of heavy duck, wall-tents for the men and line officers, and a wall-tent and hospital-tent for each field officer. Transportation of the troops was by contract with railroad companies and steamboats, and all troops arrived and departed upon schedule time.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

The medical department was under the general supervision of Surgeon-General J. D. Bryant. He, however, visited the post at intervals, making careful inspections when he did come. In the meantime the senior surgeon of the regiment was post surgeon. He made frequent inspections, generally twice each day, and reported to the post commander all matters that needed attention.

There was but little sickness in camp, and that of a temporary nature.

ORDNANCE DEPARTMENT.

Ammunition was issued to the troops for skirmish and volley firing, and cannon cartridges for firing the morning and evening gun and for salutes. Beyond this there appeared to be little or nothing for the officer in charge of this department to do.

A detachment of First Battery New York State Artillery was detailed to take charge of and fire the field-pieces.

TARGET PRACTICE.

There was no target practice at this camp; all this work is done at Creedmoor, and at other times of the year.

THE TROOPS — THE SEVENTH REGIMENT, NEW YORK NATIONAL GUARD.

The first regiment to appear in camp was the Seventh, from the city of New York, which marched into camp about 3.30 p. m., June eighteenth, under command of Colonel Emmons Clark. The strength of this regiment, present and absent, is forty commissioned officers and 968 enlisted men — aggregate, 1,008. There were present in camp the morning of June nineteenth, thirty-six officers and 734 enlisted men — aggregate, 770. The average strength during the week was 683 enlisted men; the number of officers remaining about the same as at arriving.

The uniform of the Seventh is well known, assimilating as it does so closely to the uniform of the United States Corps of Cadets. The regiment wore, also, a gray blouse for undress uniform, and a gray shell-jacket and forage-cap. The helmet worn is white, with the usual ornaments, making it altogether too heavy for summer wear. This gray uniform is characteristic of this regiment, having been its distinctive dress for many years. It is no doubt very serviceable, but I think that when the regiment is called out by State orders it should be required to wear the State uniform. Upon other occasions the regiment could wear the gray uniform, should it desire so to do, with propriety.

ARMS AND EQUIPMENTS.

The arms of this regiment, as well as of all the other regiments of the New York National Guard, are Remington rifles, caliber fifty. The Remington seems to be preferred to the Springfield, but I think it important that the arms should be of the same caliber as the government arm, if not of the same pattern. The arms appeared to be in excellent order and serviceable.

The cartridge-box generally used on drill was the Frazier patent,

with black waist-belts. The one used on dress occasions was of a very old style, and slung upon the right hip by means of a white webbing shoulder-belt.

They also carried the old glazed knapsack, kept in shape by a wooden frame-work — a very poor affair and of but little use.

I saw no canteens or haversacks with this regiment.

DISCIPLINE.

Generally the discipline in this regiment was good. Military courtesy was scrupulously observed, and all orders were obeyed promptly and with apparent willingness.

INSTRUCTION.

After the first two days a marked improvement was manifest, particularly in the ceremonies. Guard mounting and dress parades became nearly perfect. The adjutant, however, habitually posted himself much too far to the front at guard mounting — in fact, nearly at the point he would take for dress parade.

In the drills numerous errors occurred from time to time, but they were carefully corrected by the instructor, and a decided improvement was shown toward the last.

Guard duty, in some respects, was well done; in others less so. There was too much conversation between contiguous sentries, and the posts were not walked with that spirit and alertness that is desirable.

The formation of the line of battle at parades was too hurried. The companies moved out from their company streets nearly or quite simultaneously, and appeared upon the line nearly at the same moment; several, in consequence, were obliged to mark time until an opportunity occurred to move to place. A little more time taken would have avoided this, and the appearance would have been considerably improved. The marching in battalion drill and parades was excellent, the manœuvres fairly well done; skirmish drill not so well, but considerable improvement in both drills was exhibited toward the last.

The manual of arms at guard mounting and dress parade toward the latter part of the week was as near perfection as soldiers are likely to get, and quite as good as is desirable; but at the company and battalion drills the same attention was by no means paid to this point.

The police of the camp ground was simply perfect. I have never before seen so clean a camp.

Take it all in all this regiment deserves great praise, and well sustained its fine reputation.

At about 4 P. M., June twenty-fifth, this regiment marched out of camp and took steamer for New York city, and the Twelfth regiment, which had arrived, occupied the ground.

THE TWELFTH REGIMENT, NEW YORK NATIONAL GUARD.

This regiment was fully equipped with knapsacks, haversacks, canteens, and presented a soldierly appearance as it marched into camp. It is commanded by Colonel James H. Jones, formerly an officer of the Fourth United States Cavalry. Its lieutenant-colonel is Heman Dowd, formerly of the Third United States Artillery, both graduates of the United States Military Academy.

The strength of the regiment, present and absent, is thirty-five officers and 654 enlisted men—aggregate, 689. The number present June twenty-sixth was twenty-nine officers and 528 enlisted men—aggregate, 557.

The average strength during the week was 526 enlisted men; officers, twenty-nine. In addition to the regiment were two separate companies, one the Seventeenth Separate Company from Flushing, Long Island, and the other the Thirty-fifth Separate Company from Ogdensburgh, New York. These companies were attached to the regiment for the purposes of this camp, and lettered L and M, respectively. The Seventeenth Separate Company (L) numbered two officers and thirty-two enlisted men; the Thirty-fifth Separate Company (M) two officers and sixty-five enlisted men.

It was soon seen that the number of raw men in this command was very large, and I learned upon inquiry that by far the largest portion had been enlisted since the last tour of the regiment in camp, two years ago. Indeed, the Ogdensburgh company has been organized little more than a year. Nevertheless, the troops went to work with great zeal and showed that all that was needed was time and good instruction.

UNIFORM.

The uniform of this regiment is the State uniform, and conforms very nearly to the uniform of the regular army, as worn before the adoption of the white trimmings, except that the coat is double-breasted and the privates wear the stripe on the trousers. The uniform is entirely serviceable, but the coat is too heavy. A single-breasted coat would be much better, and I think this is generally recognized. The helmet worn is the white one, such as is worn by regular soldiers in hot climates; no ornaments.

ARMS AND EQUIPMENTS.

The arms and equipments were as described for the Seventh regiment; the Frazier cartridge-box only being used. The condition of arms and equipments was substantially the same as in that regiment.

DISCIPLINE.

I should describe this regiment as being thoroughly amenable to discipline, and that any apparent lack of it was due to ignorance rather than intent. Military courtesy was very largely observed, yet there were many instances in which it was lacking. I noticed, however, that such matters were always corrected when observed by the officers, and in a few days it became exceptional to note a lapse in this respect. The men were willing to learn and obedient in executing orders. At night, after taps, the camp was uniformly quiet.

INSTRUCTION.

The instruction of the regiment cannot be said to be very good, though it is rapidly improving. It has most capable field officers and an excellent adjutant, who are doing efficient work, but many of the line officers are not yet up to the mark. Drills (company, battalion and skirmish) were constantly kept up, each drill showing a good advance over the preceding one.

Wednesday, June twenty-ninth, an experimental battalion skirmish-drill took place under the supervision of Lieutenant G. N. Whistler, Fifth artillery, United States Army, who came from New York harbor for the purpose. It was intended to demonstrate how our present infantry tactics can be adapted to the present conditions of modern warfare. The battalion was formed in column of divisions. Deployment was made from the head of the column, each division having a small reserve. Successive divisions were thrown forward and the advance made by rushes, the leading line being reënforced by those in rear. When about 150 yards from the objective point, the final reserve of the battalion in line-of-battle, with fixed bayonets, charged up to the enemy's works, carrying with it the heavily reënforced firing-line. Though, no doubt, there are grave defects in this method, yet they are due to the inherent defects of our present system of tactics, and in my opinion this is an excellent method of instructing a battalion in skirmishing so long as we are obliged to retain our present tactics. Although but one deployment was made, the men caught the idea quickly and the drill may be said to have been fairly successful. This drill was repeated over a broken and wooded country two days after, and was very satisfactory in its results.

Dress parades and guard mountings were very well executed, and after the first day or two with invariable correctness. The manual of arms, though by no means perfect, was very good at all ceremonies. At drills the same close attention to exactness did not obtain. Sentry duty was fairly well performed, generally, though on account of a large number of raw men numerous errors occurred from time to time. The police of the camp during the tour of this regiment could not have been improved.

Saturday, July second, at 5 o'clock p. m., the steamers from New York having arrived, this regiment marched out of camp. The magnificent appearance of the regiment as it moved off drew commendation from all on-lookers, and clearly demonstrated the value of the week's work. It showed what can be done in a comparatively short time with good material when handled by efficient officers.

THE NINTH REGIMENT, NEW YORK NATIONAL GUARD.

As the Twelfth regiment moved off the Ninth regiment moved into camp. This regiment is commanded by Colonel William Seward, and was equipped with haversacks, knapsacks, and canteens; wearing the State uniform with black helmets. Its strength, present and absent, is thirty-two officers and 553 enlisted men — aggregate, 585. July third its strength present in camp was thirty officers and 363 enlisted men — aggregate, 393. Shortly after the arrival of this regiment four separate companies marched into camp, and were organized into the First Provisional Battalion. This battalion was composed of: The Sixth Separate Company, numbering present and absent four officers and 100 enlisted men; in camp July third, three officers and eighty enlisted men. Eleventh Separate Company, present and absent four officers and fifty-two enlisted men; in camp three officers and thirty-five enlisted men. Thirty-eighth Separate Company, present and absent two officers and sixty-seven enlisted men; in camp two officers and forty-nine enlisted men. Forty-first Separate Company, present and absent four officers and sixty-eight enlisted men; in camp three officers and fifty-three enlisted men. Aggregate, present and absent, fourteen officers and 287 enlisted men; in camp eleven officers and 217 enlisted men.

The battalion was placed under command of Major Jones, Eleventh regiment, who was supplied by detail with the necessary commissioned and non-commissioned staff. The troops arriving in camp so late, the usual dress parade was dispensed with.

Sunday morning, July third, the First Provisional Battalion was formed for battalion inspection. It was observed at once that it was

entirely new to all, and numerous errors were made. So far as I observed the Ninth regiment had no inspection.

Having received a copy of Special Orders, No. 149, paragraph I, current series, Headquarters of the Army, Adjutant-General's Office, by which Colonel Clermont L. Best, Fourth United States Artillery, was directed to relieve me from further duty at the State Camp of Instruction, and Colonel Best having arrived, ready for duty July fifth, I gave him such information as seemed requisite, and departed for my station. I, therefore, leave to him to make a report as to the condition and acquirements of the Ninth New York National Guard and the First Provisional Battalion.

Before closing this report I desire to express my warmest acknowledgements of the great courtesy and attention shown me by General Porter, General Varian, Colonel Phisterer, the post adjutant, and indeed by every officer connected with the post staff. They made my sojourn of two weeks most pleasant, and it was with great regret that the necessity of making preparations to move with my regiment to the west rendered it imperative that I should leave before the termination of the entire camp tour.

To the Adjutant-General United States Army, Washington, D. C.:

GENERAL.—In accordance with Special Orders, No. 153, dated Headquarters of the Army, Adjutant-General's Office, July 5, 1887, and in connection with special instructions contained in letter of July seventh, I have the honor to submit the following report of my inspection of that part of the troops of the National Guard, State of New York, in camp at Peekskill, based upon personal daily observation, and covering the period from July 10 to August 6, 1887:

On my arrival July tenth, I found that Colonel C. L. Best, Fourth United States Artillery, who preceded me in this duty, had left early in the morning, but on reporting to the commanding officer I was at once placed in a position to carry out my investigations to their fullest extent, every possible facility being given me.

Examining the reports of officers who have previously been on this duty in connection with the New York troops, I find that the duties of the different departments have been so fully and ably detailed, as

well as the position and character of the camp outlined, that in this respect it leaves but little for me to add. I may state, however, with reference to the camp that improvements are yearly being made, and judging of the work of the future by that of the past, it is my opinion that the time will come when this, as a regimental camp, will be surpassed by none.

The camp was under the command of Major-General Josiah Porter, Adjutant-General of the State.

TROOPS.

On my arrival I found the Forty-seventh Regiment, Colonel Gaylor commanding, comfortably located, as well as the Fifth, Nineteenth and Twentieth Separate Companies, constituting the Second Provisional Battalion.

The average strength was as follows:

Forty-seventh Regiment, July ninth to sixteenth: Present, twenty-four officers and 307 men; present and absent, twenty-six officers and 426 men; absent without leave, one officer and ninety-nine men.

Fifth Separate Company, July ninth to sixteenth: Present three officers and sixty-two men; present and absent, three officers and sixty-seven men; absent without leave, three men.

Nineteenth Separate Company, July ninth to sixteenth: Present, four officers and sixty-seven men; present and absent, three officers and seventy-eight men.

Twentieth Separate Company, July ninth to sixteenth: Present, three officers and fifty-four men; present and absent, four officers and eighty men; absent without leave, twenty men.

Twenty-third Regiment, July sixteenth to twenty-third: Present, thirty-five officers and 364 men; present and absent, thirty-eight officers and 654 men; absent without leave, one officer and 258 men.

Seventy-first Regiment, July twenty-third to thirtieth: Present, twenty-eight officers and 379 men; present and absent, thirty-two officers and 551 men; absent without leave, three officers and 165 men.

Tenth Battalion, July twenty-third to thirtieth: Present, fifteen officers and 177 men; present and absent, seventeen officers and 245 men; absent without leave, two officers and sixty men.

Twenty-second Regiment, July thirtieth to August sixth: Present, thirty-seven officers and 447 men; present and absent, forty officers and 546 men; absent without leave, one officer and seventy-four men.

Second Battery (Gatlings), July thirtieth to August sixth: Present, three officers and seventy-four men; present and absent, four officers and 101 men; absent without leave, twenty-four men.

STRENGTH.

The reports of the inspector-general for 1886 (printed in the Adjutant-General's report for 1887) show the aggregate strength of the National Guard of the State of New York to August 9, 1886, to be 12,425, sub-divided as follows: General and staff officers, forty-eight; artillery, 461; infantry, 11,916; total, 12,425.

EQUIPMENTS.

The arms and equipments are fully referred to in the report of Major R. H. Jackson, Fifth artillery, brevet brigadier-general, United States Army, for 1886, and no change has been made. The uniform is the same as mentioned by General Jackson. Neither General Schaefer, the inspector-general, nor General Jackson, approve the double-breasted coat for active service, but recommend a blouse. General Schaefer says that he thinks experience has fully proven to be requisite a neat-fitting, substantial, five-button cloth blouse, and I agree with him. The clothing was in excellent condition. I may say the same for the equipments.

INSTRUCTION.

General Orders, No. 4, Headquarters State of New York, Adjutant-General's Office, Albany, February 1, 1887, requires that the commanding officers of brigades, regiments and battalions establish schools of instruction for the officers of their respective commands; that the commanding officers of batteries and companies establish schools of instruction for the non-commissioned officers of their respective commands. Reports are required, but so far they have not been sent in accordance to the order. The next report of the Adjutant-General of the State will doubtless show whether the order has been obeyed. In camp, so far as I could find out, the instruction was carried out. In addition to the above, Colonel Phisterer, the acting assistant adjutant-general, not content with watching daily every detail, like a thorough soldier, would call in the first sergeants and the non-commissioned staff and thoroughly instruct them in the routine of their duties, explaining with great care the proper manner of conducting their office work. On one occasion this was omitted for cause, and I was much surprised to find how mixed the office work and, in fact, other work was in consequence.

The day previous to marching on guard the entire detail was called together and the duties and the manner of performing said duties were thoroughly explained and illustrated. The duties of sentinels, particularly, were rehearsed again and again with an untiring vigilance; and if they were not finally understood it was certainly not the

fault of the instructors. The inspector of drills watched with a critical eye for mistakes. A daily report of these was submitted to the commanding officer, and by him, with remarks, to the officers concerned, who, if they so desired, could correct them at the next drill.

DRILLS.

The military exercised, executed and practiced in camp consisted generally of such tactical movements as could not be carried out in armories; morning company drills from 5.45 to 7; battalion drill from 9.25 to 11.30 A. M.; guard mounting intermediate with the drills; dress parade daily at sunset; no competitive drills allowed. The marching and step were admirable; manœuvres well performed generally. The chief difficulty was with the guides, who did not know their duties. In many cases neither the field nor staff officers seemed capable of posting them; at all events they failed to do so. It was the same with reference to the sergeant majors. I can, however, refer with pleasure to one major and one adjutant who did understand and did post guides and rectify mistakes.

The men manifested much spirit in their drills, and although the battalion drills were hard, hot and long continued, I found no disposition to grumble, every one doing his share willingly. The drill of the Twenty-third, under Lieutenant-Colonel Bacon, was exceptionally hard and rapid. A few of the subdivision commanders and one battalion commander failed in a knowledge, more or less, of their duties. The errors became less from day to day, and, with one exception, the commands made rapid improvement. The last drills were nearly perfect technically, and, generally, the last parade and guard mount were quite so.

No target firing during encampment.

STAFF DEPARTMENTS.

The Adjutant-General's office, under charge of Colonel Fred. Phisterer, was a model. The routine of service, including passes and papers of all kinds, was quietly perfect.

The supply departments, under General Varian, and his hard-working assistant, Colonel Story, are in good shape. The details of these have been given, as well as those of the medical and pay departments, in Colonel Closson's (1885) and General Jackson's (1886) reports.

No regular inspection of the troops took place. Lieutenant-Colonel McLewee, assistant inspector-general, represented the department, and in the inspection of the camp and kindred work he was excellent. The inspector of guards, Captain Thurston, and the inspector of drills, Captain Stacpole, knew their business and attended to it thoroughly.

DISCIPLINE.

I find it stated by others that military courtesy was, as a rule, strictly observed, and I found it so. The men were respectful and obedient. No nonsense, intoxication, noise, or luxuries were found in camp, and after taps, even on the last night, the greatest quiet prevailed. The officers and men were required to wear their uniform at all times, and when outside the tent or company streets coats had to be buttoned, and this was general from the commandant down. Guard duty was well performed. Grand rounds every night. In my tours I found the men and officers well posted; all they required was a little more experience. The police of the camp was nearly perfect. On one occasion I considered it as perfect in the body of the camp. This careful policing extended throughout the entire grounds. The discipline reached even the band; their behavior was excellent, and tents and grounds in good order. The sanitary condition was superb

GENERAL REMARKS.

The commander-in-chief is to be congratulated on the excellence of the National Guard of the State of New York, if the commands I had the honor of visiting are to be taken as a true sample of the rest. General Porter, in his quietly energetic way, is pursuing the proper course to place the National Guard in a true soldierly condition. If his orders are carried out, or rather if he can have them enforced, I can't see what more can be desired in infantry movements. It was a matter of surprise to me to find how tactically everything went. The few faults I have mentioned are the only ones to be rectified, unless I add that the first sergeants exact more implicit obedience to their orders and the file-closers exercise more authority.

I have to thank General Porter and his staff for their exceedingly kind and courteous treatment, and I may add that I spent a profitable month at the Camp of Instruction of the National Guard of the State of New York.

GENERAL ORDERS, CIRCULARS AND OPINIONS OF THE

Major-General JOSIAH PORTER, *Adjutant-General State of New York:*

SIR.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication addressed, under date of February 12, 1887, by Lieutenant-Colonel George Moore Smith, of the Seventh regiment, National Guard State of New York, and president of the board of examination of the First brigade, to the assistant adjutant-general of such brigade, and duly forwarded to me for my opinion.

It is stated in this communication that it appears in the examination paper of Martin P. O'Dwyer, a private in Company H, Sixty-ninth regiment, and first-lieutenant-elect of that company, that he is not a citizen of the United States, and that the board of examination thought it proper, in view of this circumstance, to suspend and adjourn his examination in order to secure an opinion as to "whether, in the light of the provision of the Code upon the subject, it is within the province and power of the board of examination to disqualify the candidate as ineligible for the cause stated, and whether that question should be left for the action of the Commander-in-Chief."

The powers and duties of the board of examination are defined in M. C. 24, which provides that, with the exception of general officers and certain staff officers, no commission shall be issued until the officer elected or appointed shall have passed "a satisfactory examination before a board as to his moral character, his general knowledge of military affairs, proportioned to the office to be held, and his fitness for the service."

The examination to be had before the board is thus directed to three points: First, moral character; second, general knowledge of military

affairs; and third, fitness for the service. A more detailed statement of the subjects to be covered in this examination is to be found in R. 608-613 inclusive; R. 611-613 defining the subjects for examination to test the applicant's knowledge of military affairs, and R. 610 in a measure defining the expression "fitness for the service."

The power of the board to disqualify an officer under examination is, in my judgment, limited to the cases where he shall fail to pass a satisfactory examination upon one of the three general subjects mentioned in M. C. 24 and enumerated by me above. The question of citizenship is dealt with in the first sentence of M. C. 24, which provides that all commissions shall be issued by the Commander-in-Chief, and that no person shall be commissioned unless he is a citizen of the United States, eighteen years of age or upward. This provision as to citizenship, it will be observed, is immediately connected with the authority given to the Commander-in-Chief to issue commissions, and the eligibility of a candidate appointed or elected to office, in the matter of citizenship, is one to be determined by the officer who is to issue the commission.

It does not follow from what I have said that the board has no authority to inquire either orally or by answers to printed questions, such as are contained in the formal blank transmitted with the communication now before me, as to the place of birth and citizenship of a candidate. On the contrary, any and all facts bearing upon the past history and life of the candidate, his place of business, the nature of his business, his age, date and place of birth, and time of becoming a citizen, if not born here, are matters which may be properly inquired about in order to enable the board to satisfactorily dispose of those questions which by the express language of the M. C. 24, they are called upon to determine. They have the right to be fully informed as to the candidate's past history, and such information may not only be proper but absolutely necessary to enable them to pursue inquiries or summon witnesses before them as to his character and habits. If in reply to the question as to his citizenship there is any reasonable doubt as to the applicant's possessing this requirement, the board should, in my judgment, suspend the further examination of the applicant, as they have done in the present case, and refer the question to the Commander-in-Chief. In such a case it is not necessary, in my opinion, that the board should proceed with an examination when at the outset they are put into possession of facts which render it highly probable that the candidate cannot receive his commission for lack of qualifications other than those upon which the board is to examine. To pursue

such a course would result in a great waste of valuable time, and accomplish no good result.

I have the honor, therefore, to advise that the board of examination have not the power to disqualify a candidate for the reason that he is not a citizen of the United States. The board should, in such a case, suspend the candidate's examination, certify to the Commander-in-Chief the facts of which they have knowledge, and request a direction from him as to whether the examination shall be proceeded with.

SIR.—I have considered the question submitted to me as to whether a commission can lawfully issue to Martin P. Dwyer as first lieutenant in the Sixty-ninth regiment, National Guard.

The facts, as they appear before me, are that Martin P. Dwyer enlisted in the Sixty-ninth regiment in October, 1883; declared his intention to become a citizen in January, 1884, and after holding successively the offices of corporal and first sergeant in his regiment, was at his own request reduced to the ranks, and thereafter elected first lieutenant of Company H, in December, 1886. He is admittedly not a citizen, and that fact appearing upon the preliminary examination by the brigade examining board, the question of the eligibility of Private Dwyer for the office to which he has been elected has been certified to the Commander-in-Chief for his decision.

M. C. 24, directs that all commissions shall be issued by the Commander-in-Chief, and that no person shall be commissioned "unless he is a citizen of the United States, eighteen years of age or upward." This language is free from ambiguity and appears to be decisive of the question before me.

It is argued, however, on behalf of Private Dwyer that the provision just quoted is inconsistent with the last sentence of M. C. 40, and that this latter provision should govern.

The language in section 40, to which reference is thus made, provides that "every enlisted man shall continue to be held to duty and

shall retain rank and be eligible to promotion after the expiration of his term of enlistment or re-enlistment, until he is actually discharged." This is the concluding sentence of a section which deals with the term of enlistment and the qualifications of recruits. The object which the Legislature had in view in using this language seems entirely plain. It was to determine the legal status of soldiers who continued in service after the expiration of their term of enlistment or re-enlistment.

It is conceded that the language quoted from M. C. 40, does not in terms apply to the case before me, inasmuch as Private Dwyer has not yet served out his term of enlistment. It is argued, however, that the expression "eligible to promotion" means unlimited promotion; that it is not to be assumed that M. C. 40, intended to confer on soldiers serving after the expiration of their term of enlistment greater rights than they would possess before the ending of such term, and that, therefore, all persons who are enlisted become eligible to promotion without restriction.

Conceding so much of this argument as asserts there should be no difference in the right to promotion between soldiers serving before and after the expiration of their term of enlistment, the conclusion deduced therefrom does not necessarily follow. There is no direct assurance of unlimited promotion. A promise in general terms such as is found in the last sentence of M. C. 40, cannot be claimed to be inconsistent with the restrictions contained in M. C. 24. It is a primary rule of construction that effect shall be given to all parts of a statute where it is possible to do so. In the present case this result can be attained by holding that the promotion to which the soldier is entitled is limited, if he be an alien, to holding non-commissioned offices. This construction gives full effect to the clear and precise language of M. C. 24, debarring aliens from holding commissions, and at the same time gives effect to any rule of law existing by express provision or by statutory construction which assures to an enlisted man promotion.

In the consideration of the question submitted I have had the assistance of the brief filed by Captain Hugh Coleman, of the Sixty-ninth regiment, in which the case of Private Dwyer has been fully presented.

I have the honor, therefore, to advise that no commission can lawfully issue to Private Dwyer as first lieutenant, and that he was not eligible to that office at the time of his election, by reason of his lack of citizenship.

SIR. — I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from you under date of May 20, informing me that Theodore M. Barber, formerly captain of the Forty-second Separate Company, was rendered supernumerary by the disbandment of that organization February 15, 1883; that he has recently been elected to the command of another company, and now makes application to have granted him his original rank as captain (Oct. 16, 1877); that he had never reported to your office as a supernumerary officer, but on the 9th of May forwarded reports covering the years 1883, 1884, 1885 and 1886, and inquiring whether, under the circumstances, Captain Barber is entitled to his old rank.

The M. C. does not supply any complete definition of the word supernumerary. It leaves the status of officers who have been rendered supernumerary to be determined by a construction of its various provisions. In endeavoring to determine the intent of the Legislature in this behalf as expressed in the M. C., the position which such officers have been accorded by previous legislative and constitutional enactments will be of assistance.

By the Constitution of 1777, article 24, it was provided "that all military officer be appointed during pleasure," and "that all commissioned officers, civil and military, be commissioned by the Governor." The amendment of 1801 simply declared that the power of appointment was vested concurrently in the Governor and the members of the council of appointment. In the Constitution of 1824, article 4, after providing for the election of line officers and the appointment of staff officers and authorizing the Legislature to direct the time and manner of electing militia officers, the fourth section provided "that the commissioned officers of the militia shall be commissioned by the Governor and no commissioned officer shall be removed from office unless by the Senate on the recommendation of the Governor, stating the grounds on which such removal is recommended, or by the decision of a court-martial pursuant to law," and to regulate the tenure of such officers who had been previously appointed to hold during pleasure, it was further provided that the "present officers of the militia shall hold their commissions subject to removal as before provided." This

fourth section was reenacted in the Constitution of 1846 as section 5 of article 11, and is still in force in the language just quoted. The earlier statutes (chapter 33, Laws of 1778; chapter 8, Laws of 1779), recognize the method of appointment and tenure of office provided by the Constitution of 1777, and chapter 55, Laws of 1780, section 14, directed that all officers then holding office as "under the late government before the revision or under the convention before the present government," and who had since received a new commission for the same office, should take rank from the date of their former commission. Chapter 25 of the Laws of 1786 only provided that all commissions should be numbered and officers of the same grade should take rank according to the numbers marked on their respective commissions; a provision also to be found in the general act of organization, chapter 166, Laws of 1801.

By a general act to organize the militia, passed in 1809, being chapter 165 of the Laws of that year, provision was made for the disbandment of organizations having less than a certain number of members, and by the thirtieth section of the act it was provided that the officers of such disbanded organizations "shall return to the beats, of the several companies within which they severally reside, and be liable to do duty therein." The forty-first section authorized the division or annexation of regiments or companies in brigades, and provided that the officers of the regiments or companies so annexed "shall be exempt from military duty unless they shall be appointed to the command of another regiment or company with the same grade they bore in the regiment or company so attached to such other regiment or company, and shall be entitled to rank by virtue of their former commissions if again appointed."

Another act of organization was passed in 1818, and is known as chapter 222 of the Laws of that year. The first section authorized the Commander-in-Chief to rearrange the existing divisions of the militia and "dismiss supernumerary officers as circumstances may from time to time require." The third section provided that every officer rendered supernumerary by order of the Commander-in-Chief, and by virtue of this act, may either be discharged from militia duty or "at his election retain his rank in the line as a supernumerary officer till a vacancy shall give him a command," such election to be signified by the officer within thirty days after the reception of a notice that he is rendered supernumerary; otherwise he shall be reduced to the ranks.

The general act passed April 23, 1823, (chapter 244, Laws of 1823,) gave the same general authority to the Commander-in-Chief to rear-

range and disband military organizations, and its fourth section was the same as the third section, quoted from the Laws of 1818, with the additional provision that "supernumerary officers shall equip themselves, and those under the rank of colonel shall attend the parades and drill trainings of the officers and non-commissioned officers." This act being passed subsequent to the Constitution of 1821, contains provisions for filling vacancies in office by election.

Upon the revision of the statutes in 1827, the laws relating to the militia were consolidated and formed chapter 10 of part 1. By the ninth section of the second title of this chapter, the provision quoted from the Constitution of 1821, authorizing the commissioning of officers by the Commander-in-Chief and regulating the manner of their removal is reënacted; and it is immediately followed by a provision that sergeant-majors and quartermaster-sergeants and others shall be appointed by regimental commanders by warrant, and shall hold their office during pleasure. The sixth and seventh sections of the fourth title reënact the fourth section of the act of 1823 as to the status of supernumerary officers, and as to the equipment and drilling of those who retain their rank.

Chapter 270 of the Laws of 1846, after regulating the matter of elections and providing for the issuing of commissions and for the exercise of command by the officers highest in rank in divisions, brigades and regiments, adds in the eighth section "all other commissioned officers, except as herein provided, shall be exempt from doing any military duty except in war and insurrection, but entitled to all the privileges now provided by law."

By chapter 290 of the Laws of 1847, relating to the militia other than the first division, the Commander-in-Chief was authorized to nominate to the Senate major-generals to command districts to be created, and it was provided that officers who, at the time of their appointment, held the rank of major-general "shall take rank from the date of their first commission." The twenty-first section of this act gave to supernumerary officers "all the privileges conferred by any preceding law except command," and exempted them from the performance of any military duty except in cases of war or insurrection, provided that within one year they reported themselves to the Adjutant-General as supernumerary.

By chapter 494 of the Laws of 1847 the privileges thus conferred were curtailed by enacting that supernumerary officers shall not be entitled to vote at any election of officers.

By section 6 of chapter 254 of the Laws of 1849, substantially the same status was assigned to supernumerary officers in the first division

By the third section of chapter 307 of the Laws of the same year, the enrollment was directed of supernumerary officers not assigned to duty, but exempting them from service except in cases of war and invasion. Upon their exhibiting to the commanding officer of the district in which they resided a certificate of the Adjutant-General that they had reported themselves at his office "as wishing to retain their rank as supernumeraries," and to obtain such certificate they were directed to furnish a written statement "setting forth their rank and date of commission."

Substantially the same status was conferred on supernumerary officers by the general act of April 17, 1854, chapter 398 of the Laws of that year, the twenty-fourth section of the fourth title, conferring on such officers all the privileges given by any preceding law except command, exempting them from the performance of any military duty except in cases of war, provided only that within one year after being rendered supernumerary they reported to the Adjutant-General as such, and depriving them of the power to vote at elections. This provision was reenacted as section 46 in the general act of 1862, chapter 477 of the Laws of that year. By an amendment to this act contained in section 10, chapter 778 of the Laws of 1869, it is provided that in case of the election of a supernumerary officer to command "he may be commissioned with rank from the same date as that conferred by his previous commission for like office." This provision was reenacted in section 70 of the Military Code of 1870, chapter 80 of the Laws of that year. The twenty-fourth section of this act exempted supernumerary officers from duty with certain exceptions, provided that within one year from the date of their being rendered supernumerary they reported as such to the Adjutant-General, and further authorized the Commander-in-Chief to assign supernumerary officers who had so reported to the Adjutant-General for active duty, giving them when on such active duty all the privileges, emoluments and immunities to which commissioned officers on active duty were entitled. The seventh section of this act, after authorizing a rearrangement of the military organizations of the State, empowered the Commander-in-Chief "to retire any officer rendered supernumerary by any such alteration," and the ninth section, after authorizing the appointment of officers to complete any organization, provided that "all officers superseded by such appointment shall become supernumerary officers." Provision was also made by the 103d and 104th sections for the appointment of a board to examine into the capacity of officers who had become disabled or unfit and incapable of performing the duties of their offices, and it was enacted that upon the recommendation of the

board thereby created "any commissioned officer who shall have served in the same grade for the continuous period of ten years may be placed on the supernumerary list and withdrawn from active service and command by order of the Commander-in-Chief." Amendments were made to the Code of 1870, but they did not materially change those provisions pertinent to the inquiry now under consideration, and the law remained substantially the same until the enactment of the present Military Code of 1883.

Upon examining this statute, the provisions material to the point under discussion will be found very much the same as those contained in the Code of 1870. Thus the twenty-fourth section requires all officers to be commissioned by the Commander-in-Chief. The length of the commission is not prescribed in terms, but the manner in which an officer can be removed and deprived of his office is defined in section forty-five, and includes the action of the Senate on the recommendation of the Governor, and the decision of a court-martial or an examining board. The twenty-fifth section provides that the commissions of the staff of the Commander-in-Chief shall expire with the latter's term of office, and that assistants to the members of the staff shall hold office during the latter's pleasure. The forty-fourth section contains substantially the same provisions as to the exemption of supernumerary officers from military duty, and as to their assignment to active duty and their privileges when doing such duty as have been quoted from the act of 1870. The forty-seventh and forty-eighth sections are equivalent to the 102d and 103d sections of the act of 1870, authorizing the placing on the supernumerary list of disabled or unfit officers and speaking of them as "withdrawn from active service and command."

Turning to the regulations now in force, the ninth regulation provides that officers shall rank in each grade by date of rank stated in the commission, or failing that, by the date of commission itself. The twenty-fourth regulation relates to the rank of the supernumerary officers assigned to duty and provides that "in the organization to which they are assigned they shall take rank from the date of assignment." The 149th regulation provides that an officer reappointed immediately on the expiration of his term of service or transferred from one organization or staff department to another by election or appointment to an office of the same grade, shall retain his date of rank, excepting that in the case of captains commanding companies, officers of that grade in the regiment or battalion to which the officer was elected shall not be affected thereby without their consent. The 821st regulation provides that a supernumerary officer, when not on

duty, may on proper occasions wear the uniform of the organization in which he last served, omitting the departmental, corps, and numerical designations.

Upon a review of the statutes to which reference has been made, it will be observed that commissioned officers in the early history of the State were, by the terms of the Constitution, commissioned to hold office during pleasure. This provision was done away with in 1821, and the constitutional form then adopted and since followed for the appointment and commissioning of officers and defined in what manner and by what means only they could be deprived of the offices given. These constitutional provisions have been recognized and incorporated in the various statutes from time to time enacted and, as already indicated, are set forth in the present Military Code. Their effect is to secure an officer a commission of which he can only be deprived in certain specified ways, now particularly defined in the forty-fifth section of the present Code.

It does not appear that Captain Barber has ever been deprived of his commission by any of the methods of procedure prescribed by the statutes to which I have referred, or by the Code now in force. He must therefore be treated as an officer in commission. He has not been performing active duty, but the performance of such duty is not essential to the existence of an officer in the service. An officer is in service so long as he is subject to orders. The extent of the duties he performs and of the command he exercises are dependent upon entirely different considerations. There is a broad distinction recognized in the statutes of the United States between the retiring of an officer from active service and his being wholly retired. In the latter case he becomes a civilian (14 Opin. Att'y Gen., 506 ; Winthrop's Dig., 433); in the former case his name is carried on the army register, and it is expressly provided that he remains "subject to the rules and articles of war and to trial by general court martial for any breach thereof." U. S. Rev. Stat., sec. 1256; Tyler vs. U. S., 16 Ct. Cl., 234-5; S. C. 105, V. S. 244.

It will also be observed, upon a consideration of the statutes to which reference has been made, that where a reorganization of the militia has been contemplated more or less general provisions have been made as to the disposition of the officers, who might thereby be deprived of command and of the opportunity of rendering active service. The provisions of the statutes of 1809 and 1818 expressly secure to such officers the rank held by them at the time they were rendered supernumerary. Similar provisions have been quoted from the statutes of 1847 and 1849. So far as these statutes are concerned,

there is nothing to show that an officer by being rendered supernumerary has been deprived of the rank which he then held. On the contrary, he is recognized as subject to military duty under certain circumstances.

The general theory of legislation in this State in the past seems to recognize that an officer rendered supernumerary retains his commission, and when reappointed to command in the same grade should receive the same rank as was previously enjoyed by him. This theory accords with the provisions of the present Military Code, and especially with those which relate to the commissioning and removal from office of commissioned officers, and with those provisions of the regulations to which I have directed attention, and particularly with the 149th regulation, as to the rank of officers transferred from one organization to another, and the 821st regulation, authorizing them to wear a uniform.

The position of officers on the supernumerary list is, in my opinion, well expressed in the language used in the Military Code of 1870 and now found in M. C., 47, which speaks of them as "withdrawn from active service and command." As I have already stated, they are none the less in service; they still hold their commissions, and their rank has been fixed in and by the commissions of which they have never been deprived. This conclusion does not conflict with any of the regulations now in force, so far as I can observe. The 24th and 149th regulations assume only to regulate the rank of supernumeraries in the organization to which they are appointed or transferred, and that is not now in question.

I am of the opinion, therefore, that an officer of the line rendered supernumerary is simply withdrawn from active service and command, and without being deprived of his commission or the rank to which it entitled him, and that where he is by election chosen to an office of the same grade as that in which he is commissioned, he is entitled to retain his old rank in the new commission issued to him.

I have the honor, therefore, to advise that Captain Barber in the commission now to be issued to him is entitled to have his rank as of the 16th of October, 1877.

SIR.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a letter addressed to you under date of July 23, 1887, by Captain W. B. Randall, Forty-first Separate Company, N. G., protesting against the issuing of a commission to Captain Barber of the Fortieth Separate Company, with rank as of the 16th of October, 1877.

This protest is presented by Captain Randall under three heads:

First, he details the previous connection of Captain Barber with the National Guard, and his action since he ceased to be in active service upon the disbandment of the Forty-second Separate Company, commanded by him. He charges that Captain Barber showed a lack of interest in and acted contrary to the welfare of the National Guard, and upon these criticisms is based the conclusion that in his opinion Captain Barber should not be commissioned anew with his original rank, to the detriment of officers who have been faithful to the service and have kept their commands in a condition to be of avail in case the State should have need of their services.

If Captain Barber's claim to rank was based on considerations of expediency or was dependent upon the exercise of a discretionary power by the Commander-in-Chief, the statements advanced by Captain Randall might be considered, but Captain Barber's case was disposed of upon the ground that according to military law and the statutes of this State, he had a *right* to his former rank if he chose to assert it.

The second point advanced is, that there is no existing law allowing the issuing of a new commission with date of rank prior to the election of the officer receiving it. Without passing on the soundness of this statement, I do not see its pertinency. The question presented was not as to the issuing of a commission with a date of rank prior to the election of the officer receiving it, but it was whether there was any law which authorized the Commander-in-Chief to deprive an officer holding a commission of the rank which it secured to him. Captain Barber was in the service at the time of his last election, and held a commission in the National Guard. I had the honor to point out, that so long as he held that commission which secured him a fixed rank, he could only be deprived of it by certain recognized legal procedure.

Captain Randall refers to M. C. 44, but I do not understand that he makes any point upon it as it is entirely plain that Captain Barber was not in the present instance "assigned" to duty. He, however, in this connection makes a very important assertion in saying that "the power of the State over him had ceased by his own volition. The State had no further claim upon him. He had elected to divest the State of any claim upon him by neglecting to report, and it is absurd to suppose that he did not at the same time surrender to the State all claims he had upon it by virtue of his commission." In this statement is, in my opinion, contained the fundamental error which underlies Captain Randall's protest. The power of the State over Captain Barber did not cease when he was rendered supernumerary. He still retained his commission and was simply deprived of command. I pointed out in my previous opinion the analogy existing between his situation and that of officers in the regular army who are retired, but not wholly retired from the service, and I directed attention to the provisions of the M. C. and R., which recognize in various ways the facts that he was in commission.

I must further dissent from the proposition advanced by Captain Randall that an officer holding a commission can withdraw from the service of the State and free himself from liability to military law simply by an "election" on his part to divest himself of the obligations imposed by his commission. Such a doctrine is at variance with settled principles of military law (A. W. 49) and would be destructive of discipline.

On the third point Captain Randall repeats his previous statement that Captain Barber was applying for a new commission under a new election, and, he adds, "he starts the same as if he had never been in the service at all." This, Captain Randall says, is a fair construction of the M. C., but the difficulty is that it is not founded on fact. It is not an entering into the service by Captain Barber, for he already holds a commission in the National Guard. His election being to the same rank as that previously held by him, its effect is simply to give him a command. As for rank, that he had by virtue of his former commission in the grade in which he is to exercise command.

The arguments advanced by Captain Randall were considered by me before sending you my opinion on Captain Barber's case. I made no allusion to them at that time, because, as I have already stated, the question was one of law and not of discretion.

There are arguments opposed to Captain Randall's position which are entitled to some weight, but I do not feel called upon to discuss the matter upon the general plan of expediency, inasmuch as it is the duty of those to whom the management of the National Guard is

committed to follow the intent of the Legislature as expressed on the statutes and not to substitute for it some plan which, in their judgment, might be more expedient or more acceptable to the members of the guard.

Captain Randall's protest is mainly based on two erroneous assumptions of fact: First, that Captain Barber, at the time of receiving his last commission, was not an officer of the National Guard; and, second, that the issuing of the new commission conferred upon him a higher rank than he was entitled to at his last election.

I have the honor, therefore, to advise that the protest be overruled, the action objected to having been, in my opinion, upon careful consideration, strictly legal.

SIR.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication addressed to you under date of July 23, 1887, by Captain William B. Randall, Forty-first Separate Company, and a communication addressed to you under date of August 31, 1887, by the same officer, and of a letter from the Inspector-General's office addressed to Captain Randall under date of July twentieth.

It appears from the communication dated August thirty-first that Captain Randall, after the termination of his tour of duty at the State camp during the present year, presented separate reports of the number of men in attendance on each separate day of camp duty, which have been returned to him by the Inspector-General's office, calling his attention to R. 373. He states that he so made his returns to the end that he might use four of the camp parades in computing the five compulsory parades called for by M. C. 68, 98. The language of the material portion of M. C. 68 is that "officers other than general and staff officers and enlisted men shall be obliged to perform during the year not less than five compulsory drills and parades, including inspection and muster and camp duty."

The question which, therefore, fairly arises is whether in computing

the five compulsory parades here specified each separate parade during a tour of encampment is to be counted, or whether the expression "camp duty," as here used, includes in it all the parades which may take place during an encampment, and is most accurately represented by the average of attendance at all such parades. This last view is the one which has been adopted in R. 773, which expressly provides that a tour of camp duty shall become only as one parade for the purposes of M. C. 68, 98. I see no reason to doubt the soundness of the construction put by this regulation upon the language quoted from M. C. 68. It seems entirely in accord with the plain and natural meaning of the sentence quoted from M. C. 68. The object which the draughtsman of this sentence seems to have had in view was, first, to require that there should be not less than five compulsory parades by the officers and enlisted men in each year, and, having so expressed himself, he proceeds to designate certain military duty which shall be counted as parades in making up the required number. To this end reference is made to the military service performed at "inspection and muster," and the military service performed at "camp duty."

By reference to M. C. 70 it will be observed that camp duty when performed is to consist of, at least, five consecutive day's service, and, in accordance with military usage and the provisions of M. C. 361, there is required to be a dress parade on each day of such duty. It seems to me that the language of M. C. 68 does not refer to these several parades performed daily, but speaks of them collectively, by the use of the expression "camp duty," words which clearly imply a continuous and varied service, which, under M. C. 70, already referred to, must extend over, at least, five consecutive days. As the expression "camp duty" represents a continuous service extending over several days, it seems eminently proper that the average attendance upon such days should be taken as representing the attendance upon camp duty. It is certainly the most equitable method in view of the construction which, in my opinion, should be placed upon the words quoted.

I have the honor, therefore, to advise that the services rendered during a tour of camp duty, although varied in character and extending over a number of days, can only be counted as one of the five compulsory drills and parades required by M. C. 68.

SIR. — I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication under date of ninth instant, in which you inform me that Col. David E. Austen was elected colonel of the Thirteenth Regiment November 5, 1887, and that the Brigade Commander has forwarded the proceedings of the election with the following remarks, viz.: David E. Austen was formerly colonel of the Thirteenth Regiment and is now on the supernumerary list; that he was commissioned as colonel of the Thirteenth Regiment July 13, 1877; was placed on the supernumerary list December 3, 1883, and has reported as required by law since that time.

From these facts you request my opinion upon the following questions :

First. Should Colonel Austen be assigned to duty as commanding officer of the Thirteenth Regiment, or should a new commission be granted.

Second. Should I decide that a new commission is necessary, should it be with rank as of the date of the recent election or as in the commission which Col. Austen now holds.

Third. Should Col. Austen be required to appear before and examining board.

I will consider these questions in the order in which they are asked.

There is no specific provision in the present M. C. regulating the disposition of cases like the present, and therefore that method of procedure should be adopted which will be in harmony with the general system of practice and government contemplated by this statute. The fifth article of the M. C. is entitled the "election and appointment of commissioned and non-commissioned officers," and contains the various provisions of law to be followed in the choice of such officers. Provision is made for giving notice of the time and place of holding the election, defining who shall vote, the length of time the polls should be kept open, and the manner in which the vote shall be canvassed. (M. C. 32, 33, 34.) It is then required that the person elected, within ten days after notice of his election, signify his acceptance of the office to which he has been elected. Provision is next made for his examination before an examining board, and then comes the thirty-seventh section, which requires that every commissioned officer shall, within ten days after his commission shall be

tendered to him or after notice has been given him that the same is held in readiness for him, take an oath of office, and unless he do so "he shall be deemed to have resigned said office and a new election shall be forthwith ordered to fill his place."

There is no doubt about the method of procedure to be adopted upon the first election of the officer, or where he is elected to a higher rank than that previously held by him. The plain contemplation of the Code is that in all such cases his authority to exercise the command conferred upon him by his election shall be evidenced by a commission. In the army of the United States the commission fixes the rank of its holder in the general service and the particular command over which he is placed is regulated by the order of his superior officer. The plan contemplated by the M. C., is that the members of the guard shall choose those who are to exercise command over them; that this choice shall be made by an election, and the evidence of authority to be issued to the person chosen by an election shall be a commission, this commission carrying with it a certain rank in the general service of the State, and at the same time a right to exercise command over some particular organization in that service. It fulfils the double function of a commission and order in the United States Army. In the present case the applicant holds a certain rank in the service of the State by virtue of his commission, although he is on the supernumerary list. His legal status, as I had the honor to heretofore advise, is that of an officer in commission, but "withdrawn from active service and command." (M. C. 47.) There is a provision in M. C. 44 for the assignment by the Commander-in-Chief of officers on the supernumerary list to active duty, but it is to be observed such assigned officers are not entitled to all the privileges otherwise attached to their rank; notably they are deprived of the right of voting at elections. In the present case the applicant claims the right to command by virtue of an election, not by virtue of an assignment to duty, and I see no reason why the general method of procedure should not be followed in his case by authenticating his right of command by a new commission. This construction is also in accord with the general method of procedure heretofore followed in like cases, and is supported by legislative declarations contained in the Laws of 1869 and 1870, which in terms provide for the issuing of commissions in cases like the present. L. 1869, ch. 778, sec. 10; L. 1870, ch. 80, sec. 70.

The second question was fully investigated and considered by me in my opinion upon the application of Captain Theodore M. Barber, transmitted to you under date of June 20, 1887. I had the honor then to advise that an officer upon the supernumerary list is still in

commission, and, upon an election to command of the same grade as that previously held by him, is entitled to his old date of rank as a matter of right. He has never been out of the service of the State, and has been continuously in commission and in possession of the rank in the military service thereby assured to him. The new commission simply regulates the organization which he is to command.

Referring to the third question, I am of the opinion that the same practice should be pursued in this case as obtains in any other instance of election to military office. It may be argued that the provisions of M. C. 24, requiring officers to be examined as to their moral character and knowledge of military affairs before the issuing of a commission, are directory and not mandatory. Be that as it may, it is very desirable that there should be some fixed and settled rule in all such cases rather than that each case should be disposed of separately. If it is understood that all officers before assuming command are required to pass the statutory examination, there can be no occasion for complaint. On the other hand, if one officer is ordered before such board and another is not, an opportunity is afforded for the claim that such action is derogatory of the dignity of the officer who is compelled to submit to the examination, and that an invidious distinction is made in his case. Such an examination is of very valuable assistance to the Commander-in-Chief and enables him to determine the propriety of issuing a commission and of entrusting any important command to the officer who applies for it. It may be that an officer who has been for a considerable time on the supernumerary list has, by change of habit, or from some other cause, lost those requisites which previously entitled him to the exercise of command. Such a state of affairs can only be satisfactorily brought to light by the action of an examining board. It is therefore, in my opinion, better that the rule should be uniformly followed of having such examinations in cases like the present before entrusting officers with commands at the risk of compelling officers of acknowledged standing to submit to such examinations, than to establish the rule that such examinations are to be wholly omitted, or only had in special instances.

I have the honor, therefore, to advise you

1. That a new commission should be issued to Colonel Austen.
2. That such commission should be with rank as of the date in the commission which Colonel Austen now holds.
3. That before the commission issued he should be required to appear before the statutory examining board.

I. The reports of the Inspector-General, and the observations made by the Adjutant-General, show that as a whole the National Guard of this State has improved during the past year.

No improvement can be permanent, however, unless followed up with continued study and constant practice.

In furtherance of the project to make the guard, in fact as well as in name, a compact, well instructed and reliable body of soldiers, for the preservation of law and order and the protection of the State, it is ordered:

1. That commanding officers of brigades, regiments and battalions, establish schools of instruction for the officers of their respective commands.

2. That commanding officers of batteries and companies establish schools of instruction for the non-commissioned officers of their respective commands.

3. That the subjects of study be tactics commensurate to the grade of the officers and non-commissioned officers and regulations.

4. That these schools be continued during the drill season; at the close of which, but not later than June fifteenth next, each commanding officer will make a full report to the Adjutant-General, through the channel, of the manner in which this order has been complied with, reporting delinquent or incompetent officers and non-commissioned officers. Intermediate commanding officers will not only examine these reports carefully and express their opinion freely, but will see that the schools are held and that proper instruction is imparted.

5. The Inspector-General will make special report of every officer found at the next annual inspection incompetent to perform, or ignorant of his duties.

II. In order that the troops to be ordered to the State camp this season may derive the fullest benefit of their tour of duty, officers and enlisted men are reminded that, as has been frequently stated before, the camp has been established for instruction only; that anything calculated to interfere with this object cannot be tolerated, and that discipline and decorum must at all times be observed; and it is ordered:

1. That the military exercises to be executed and practiced in camp, shall consist of such tactical movements as cannot be carried out in

armories, of the skirmish drill, and of schools of theoretical instruction for officers and non-commissioned officers.

2. That no men shall be taken to camp who are not already sufficiently well drilled to take part in those exercises, nor any men (those re-enlisted or taken up from dropped, excepted,) who have been enlisted within sixty days of the beginning of the camp tour of their respective companies.

3. Theoretical instruction in guard duty should be imparted to non-commissioned officers and privates by their respective company commanders, before entering the camp. Instruction as to the general routine and duties of soldiers in camp should also be imparted in the same manner.

4. The Paymaster-General is directed not to pay any officer or enlisted man for services, if such cover only the day of arrival, the Sunday following, the day of leaving, or only one day, in camp.

III. There being no rifle practice in camp, and it being of the utmost importance, in view of the perfection of fire arms, that the personal improvement of the soldier in marksmanship should be developed as much as time and circumstance will permit; it is ordered:

1. That organizations which do not go into camp, shall, during the season devote as much time as possible to out-door rifle practice.

2. That during the season when out-door rifle practice is undesirable, sufficient time shall be devoted to theoretical instruction, sighting and aiming, and, where possible, to gallery practice.

I. The following instructions, prepared by the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, are published for the guidance of the National Guard:

To obtain uniformity, insure steadiness, and accustom the men to the aiming position, the following is prescribed as an exercise for that purpose:

SIGHTING DRILL.

1. A sandbag for each squad (one twelve pound or two six pound bags), will be placed on a rest, which may be a table, a tripod, or a stack of arms, placed so that the bag will be about four and one-half feet from the ground.

The men will be formed in single rank, and in squads not to exceed ten men in each.

The instructor will then flatten the sandbag with the back of his hand, and lay a rifle on it, aim at some small object at as great a distance from it as the drill-room will permit (a wafer on the wall, for instance), and explain to the men the following simple rules:

The sights shall not incline to the right or left.

The line of sight should be taken along the centre of the notch of the back sight and the top of the fore sight, which should cover the middle of the mark aimed at.

The eye should be *fixed on the mark*, and not on the fore sight. Particular attention should be paid to this rule, as beginners are apt to fix the eye on the fore sight, and not the mark, which prevents the latter from being distinctly seen, and greatly increases the difficulty in aiming.

2. The instructor will also explain the different kinds of sights, viz.:

Fine sight. When the point of the forward sight is just seen through the notch of the breech sight, the effect of which is to shoot low.



Full sight. When the whole of the wedge-shaped portion of the front sight is displayed through the notch on the breech sight, the effect of which is to shoot high.



Half sight. When but half the fore sight is seen.



As soon as these rules and explanations are thoroughly understood, the instructor will proceed to the

AIMING DRILL.

Which will invariably be drilled by the numbers, as follows:

(One.) Execute the first motion of load.

(Two.) Raise the rifle smartly in front of the right shoulder to the full extent of the left arm, without moving the body, head, or eye; the arms to move close to the body, the breech sight to be upright, barrel nearly horizontal and pointing a few inches below the mark; the eyes are fixed upon the forefinger inside the trigger-guard, both elbows inclined downward.

(Three.) Press the piece smartly with both hands against the hollow of the shoulder, which must neither be allowed to give way nor pressed forward or raised to meet it; the left elbow at the same time being brought as far under the rifle as is possible without assuming an unnatural position, the right elbow slightly raised, being nearly square with the right shoulder. The center (or rather the upper than lower) part of the butt to be pressed firmly against the shoulder with the

left hand without touching the collar-bone, the top of the butt being as nearly as possible with the top of the shoulder. The forefinger will be placed around the trigger like a hook, but without pressing it. The head and body will be kept perfectly perpendicular the whole time, no attempt being made to look through the sights.

(Four.) Close the *left* eye, incline the head to the right over the small of the stock so that the right eye may quickly perceive the coincidence of the rear and front sights, and the object aimed at.

(Five.) Raise the head, look squarely to the front and bring the piece smartly to the first position.

The drill is continued by the commands two; three; four; five; and when the instructor wishes to suspend the exercise, he will command: 1. Carry; 2. Arms.

The aiming drill will be continued until the men aim quickly and correctly from the shoulder.

II. Brigade commanders will issue the necessary orders to insure the thorough instruction of the infantry portion of their respective commands, before the commencement of the field practice, in the sighting and aiming drills, and also, where such be practicable, in gallery practice.

Not less than four drills, each of at least thirty minutes duration, should be had in these exercises in each company before May first, next.

Regimental and Battalion Inspectors of Rifle Practice should attend at least one of these drills; the Inspectors of Rifle Practice of Brigades at least two of the drills in each regiment and battalion of their respective brigades; and the Inspector of Rifle Practice of the Third Brigade should also attend at least one of such drills in the Sixth, Seventh, Twelfth, Sixteenth, Twenty-third, Thirty-second, Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh, and such other separate companies of the brigade as may be found practicable.

Inspectors of Rifle Practice, and the commanding officers of separate companies not visited by the former, will also be instructed to make a report of these drills to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice on or before the tenth of May, next.

Private Theodore Woods, Fourteenth Regiment, N. G., S. N. Y., was tried on February 8, 1887, before a court-martial convened by S. O. No. 82, series of 1886, from these headquarters, and of which Colonel Harry W. Michell of the Fourteenth Regiment, N. G., was president, on two charges: Drunkenness on duty, and disrespect to his superiors.

The first charge was based on a specification which alleged that while under orders on the 19th day of June, 1886, he was so under the influence of alcoholic spirits as to be unable to perform his duties, and such disability and intoxication was shown on Myrtle avenue and Fulton street, in the city of Brooklyn, and on board the steamship "Henry E. Bishop," while said Regiment was proceeding from its armory to the Camp of Instruction at Peekskill, N. Y.

The specification under the second charge alleged that in a loud and boisterous manner he called the captain and lieutenant of his company vulgar names, and in a boisterous manner threatened to do such officers bodily harm, all of which took place while he was on duty

and proceeding with his regiment from its armory to the State Camp of Instruction, on June 19, 1886.

The accused appeared before the court in person and by counsel, and pleaded guilty to the charges and specifications, and the court found him guilty on such charges and specifications, and sentenced him to be dishonorably discharged with loss of time served.

The proceedings, findings and sentence of the court-martial in the foregoing case have been approved by the Commander-in-Chief, and the sentence will be duly executed.

I. Rifle practice will be required the current season of every officer and enlisted man (excepting officers and men of batteries not armed with rifles, and musicians), at times and places to be designated in orders by Brigade Commanders.

II. When a command has had an opportunity for a first general practice, the Brigade Commander may, upon the application of its immediate commanding officer appoint a subsequent day, or days, for voluntary practice. Commanding officers may excuse members of their respective commands from the first general practice, provided they attend a regularly ordered voluntary practice.

III. The actual cost of transportation, but in no case to exceed fifty cents, will be allowed for every officer and enlisted man attending the first general practice of his organization, provided that the distance to its nearest available range is more than three miles. Additional practice must be free of expense to the State.

IV. The present allowance of ammunition for practice is limited to forty rounds for each officer, non-commissioned officer and private, carried on the returns for the quarter ending March 31, 1887.

V. Requisitions for transportation and ammunition will be made direct on the Chief of Ordnance, State Arsenal, corner Seventh Avenue and Thirty-fifth street, New York city.

VI. Scores made, in any class, at a regular rifle association match, in which the full military conditions, including uniform, are observed, and which is approved by the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, will be recognized as official. Such practice, will not, however, excuse absence from first general practice as ordered.

VII. Record books of field practice must be kept written up in ink. Alterations in score cards must be certified to by an Inspector of Rifle Practice. After each practice the score cards will be compared under the supervision of the senior Inspector of Rifle Practice present; the left half will be forwarded by such officer to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice within five days after the practice, the other half will be retained by the commanding officer of the organization practicing.

VIII. The State prize will be competed for at Creedmoor as usual. The brigade prizes will be competed for under such conditions as shall be ordered by the commanding officers of brigades. A prize of a value not to exceed \$50 will be awarded the company in each brigade having the highest general figure of merit. Attention is called to R. 372, the last clause of which applies to the successful teams of 1885 and 1886.

IX. The first general practice should be completed before August 1, but *must* be completed before September fifteenth next. Practice for the season will close November twelfth next, and no scores made after that date will be recognized. Field practice books, fully written up, must be sent to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, No. 8 Coenties Slip, New York city, on or before November 20, 1887.

X. The classification, order of duty and general instructions, prepared by the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, are herewith published for the guidance and observance of all concerned.

CLASSIFICATION.

The third class shall consist of all who do not appear on a range for practice.

The second class consists of all present for practice, without reference to qualifications in previous years, and the practice in this class will be at
 100 yards standing, on a third class or No. 3 target,
 and at
 200 yards kneeling, or sitting, on a third class or No. 3 target.

The first class consists of those who score twenty-five and upward in the second class, and the practice in this class will be at
 200 yards standing, No. 3 target, and at 500 yards lying prone, No. 2 target.

A score of twenty-five and upward in the first class constitutes a marksman, and entitles the maker to receive the State decoration.

A score of forty-two and upward in the first class constitutes a sharp-shooter, and entitles the maker to receive a silver bar.

All officers and enlisted men who practice, must shoot through the regular classes, and are prohibited from shooting for a second or higher score in a class in which they have already qualified. The record must stand upon the first qualifying score made. But should any marksman without expense to the State, on other than a practice day, and under proper supervision make a score qualifying as a sharp-shooter, he will be credited with such score.

No score by officer or enlisted man will be recognized, unless made at a target to which he has been regularly assigned, and where his name has been previously entered on a score blank.

FIRST GENERAL PRACTICE.

(a.) The practice will commence with class firing in squads, under a competent non-commissioned officer, or other duly designated instructor, at each firing point, and the whole under the supervision of an Inspector of Rifle Practice, subject to the orders of the commanding officer present.

Five consecutive shots will be fired at each distance.

This practice will be continued to the end by all present without reference to the scores recorded, except that those who fail to qualify in the second class may be restricted to two shots for practice at each of the higher ranges.

The practice at 500 yards may be postponed until after the course of firing in ranks.

In regular class practice no officer or enlisted man will be permitted to fire more than five consecutive shots at any one distance on the same day, except the necessary sighting shots to ascertain elevation, windage and the condition of pieces, which may be fired by officers or well-instructed men, under the inspection or approval of an Inspector of Rifle Practice. Trial practice between classes will not be permitted.

At the first distance of either class (*i. e.* at 100 or 200 yards) a score of *twelve* or upward is considered as qualifying, and *second* practice may be allowed to such men as fail to qualify at either distance (as above), provided time will permit; but *third* practice shall not be allowed in any case. If, however, the entire tour of duty, including volley and skirmish firing, has been performed, and time still permits, such practice may be had as the Inspector of Rifle Practice deems proper.

Those who may be qualified at 200 and 500 yards, but not at 100 and 200, may make their scores valid by practicing through the second class without shooting in the first again.

In regular practice each enlisted man will shoot with the piece issued by the State, and brought by him on the grounds, unless the same is declared imperfect by an Inspector of Rifle Practice. In that case the man may shoot with the nearest approved piece in the ranks.

(b.) *Volley Firing, Five Rounds.*—Firing in ranks at 100 yards shall then be taken up in the following order, the squad or company being formed in a single rank:

Fire by squad (or company), three rounds.

Fire by squad (or company), kneeling, two rounds.

(c.) *Firing as Skirmishers.*—The troops shall be exercised as skirmishers from 325 to 100 yards and return; firing, on the advance, one round at 300 yards, one at 200 yards, and one at 100 yards; and on the retreat, one round at 150 yards, and one at 250 yards; great care being taken by each commanding officer that the men are deliberate and cautious, that no accident may happen. Officers should use discretion and tact, varying the drill according to their ground and targets, deploying men and taking such distances as targets and range will allow; each body of troops to be so divided that no more may be exercised at one time than can be readily be handled on the range, a second class target being used.

As soon as the last (fifth) shot is fired, assemble on the right (or left), thus leaving the front uncovered, so that the second squad or company may deploy; during this time the marking can be done.

Commanding officers are particularly cautioned to use great care in handling their men, having the element of safety in view at all times.

SECOND OR VOLUNTARY GENERAL PRACTICE.

Those present will practice in the classes to which they respectively belong. In other respects the tour of duty will be identical with that prescribed for first general practice, including volley firing and firing as skirmishers.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.

Officers.—A sufficient number of commissioned officers must accompany all parties for rifle practice to command and instruct the men. At least one company officer will be present with any part of his company on duty, and a field officer will take command of all the detachments of two or more companies.

In practice officers shall shoot first, then non-commissioned officers, then privates, on such targets as may be assigned to their companies.

The responsibility of officers on the range is great. Good officers will be theoretically proficient in the use of the rifle and able to apply armory instruction in the field. The men will be instructed as much as possible while waiting their turns to shoot, and especially in aiming and position drill, for which a competent instructor should be detailed in each company. They should be taught how to blacken their sights and how to fix the correct elevation and windage before going to the firing points.

Surgeons.—Commanding officers shall in all cases detail a surgeon to accompany any party ordered out for rifle practice, and the duty should not proceed without the presence of a competent medical officer, provided the organization has one attached to it.

Inspection of Practice.—Brigade Inspectors of Rifle Practice will inspect the practice for the marksman's decoration (except in authorized matches), and Brigade or Regimental Inspectors the class shooting in their respective organizations and certify to the score cards.

Organizations having no Inspector of Rifle Practice will be inspected by the Brigade Inspector, or an officer detailed for that purpose.

An inspector who is not able to be personally present on any occasion of duty will so report to his commanding officer, who will then detail a competent officer to act in his stead.

Brigade Commanders will on issuing any order relating to rifle practice, cause a copy to be sent to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice.

Wooden Targets for volleys, and (where needed) for skirmish firing, should be erected without expense to the State on each range. A simple fence painted to represent the necessary lines or divisions, or a frame covered with paper or muslin printed, if backed by a mound sufficient for safety, will suffice. Iron targets, second class, may be used for skirmish drill, but must not be used for volley firing.

Front Sight Covers of such pattern as may be easily detached will be allowed in practice for the marksman's badge—but they must not be permanently attached to the rifle.

Particular Attention is called to the fact that the 300 yard range was eliminated from class practice in 1886, and that five shots kneeling or sitting at 200 yards was substituted for it; also that the volley firing will be performed in single rank.

XI. To encourage practice with the rifle and to enable members of the National Guard to become proficient in its use, members in uniform, coat or blouse, cap and belt, of the First and Second Brigades, may practice (under such supervision and with such competent instruction as the General Inspector of Rifle Practice may direct), on

the second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, ninth, tenth, eleventh, twelfth, thirteenth and fourteenth of May next, on which dates the range at Creedmoor will be open and scorers and markers furnished. Cards for the certification of membership will be furnished each organization, and upon presentation of these at the depots of the L. I. R. R. Co. to a person who will be stationed there previous to the trains leaving for Queens (about 8.30 A. M. and 2 P. M.), transportation will be furnished, and on arrival at Creedmoor ammunition will be provided. All scores will be kept, and to any member who in the judgment of the General Inspector of Rifle Practice shows sufficient proficiency a certificate will be given, which will relieve him from practice in the second class with his organization.

I. To accomplish the full purpose and intent for which boards of examination are appointed, and to secure uniformity in the action of such boards, the following is ordered and promulgated for the information and observance of all concerned :

1. Commanding officers of brigades are authorized to appoint, for their respective commands, the board of examination prescribed in M. C. 24, and they shall announce in general orders the appointment and composition of such board.

2. Upon receipt of the return of election, or appointment of an officer, the respective brigade commander shall order the officer elected or appointed to appear before the examining board of the brigade, furnish him at the same time with blank form No. 37 *b*, and direct him to fill out this form and to present it to the board on his appearance before it. The return of election, or appointment, shall then be referred to the board of examination, with information, added on form 37, of the date set for the appearance of the candidate.

3. Boards of examination shall meet immediately after appointment and arrange their method of procedure, subject to the provisions of this order. Not less than three members shall be present at the examination of a candidate. Not more than six persons should be

examined at any one session of the board, and on the application of a candidate, the board may postpone his examination once, for not more than one month, if the reasons adduced appear satisfactory.

4. The candidate shall be required to present form 37 *b*, properly executed by himself, and to sign it in the presence of the board; he shall then be examined as to his place of birth and age (M. C. 24); date and place and manner of admission to citizenship, if not a native citizen of the United States (M. C. 24); whether or not he has been adversely reported upon by any military examining board (M. C. 24), dishonorably discharged, dismissed or cashiered from any military service whatsoever, or convicted of felony (R. 157). This shall be succeeded by examination as to qualification in the cases of chaplains (M. C. 10); of medical officers (M. C. 23); of judge-advocate (R. 154); of inspectors of rifle practice (R. 155); of engineers (R. 156); and of colonels of the line (M. C. 27). Then follows examination into his moral character (M. C. 24); honesty and sobriety (R. 608, 609), and physical qualifications for service (R. 610); if there be no medical officer on the board, the latter may require the candidate to be examined by a medical officer of the National Guard, if it be deemed advisable. The board may call for evidence (M. C. 24, R. 609), on any one or all of these points. Should the result of the inquiry be unsatisfactory on any one of these points, the examination shall at once be discontinued and the ascertained fact, or facts be reported, on form 37 *b*, to the brigade commander.

5. The examination of a candidate as to his knowledge of English grammar, reading and writing, geography, arithmetic, history, military code and regulations, sedentary duties and tactics of his arm of service (M. C. 24, R. 611-613) may be divided among the members of the board to expedite matters. The examination is to be oral, except where the nature of the subject requires it to be in writing. The questions asked should not become stereotyped, and must never be put in print. On each of the subjects named there shall be placed a possible maximum of one hundred, and no candidate shall be reported favorably who does not obtain in this examination an average of seventy-five per cent at least; unless he be appointed or elected from civil life, in which case the board may report him favorably even if below that average, if his intelligence, knowledge and interest in military matters make it appear that he will make a good officer. On form 37 the board will state "reports favorably 75 per cent" (or more), or "unfavorably 74 per cent" (or less), or "favorably, from civil life, it is believed he will make a good officer," or something to this effect.

6. The examination concluded, the board will at once report on the return of election, or appointment, (form 37), to the brigade com-

mander. Any candidate inquiring for its finding, or his standing, will be referred by the board or its members to that officer.

7. The board having reported favorably, the brigade commander will forward the return of election, or appointment, (form 37), and the completed statement (form 37 *b*), to the Adjutant-General. If the candidate shall have been adjudged unqualified, the brigade commander will give notice of such adverse decision and issue the necessary directions to have another person elected or appointed (M. C. 24), except where the candidate has been found not to be a citizen of the United States, or not to be of the legal age, in which cases the papers shall be referred to this office for the action of the Commander-in-Chief.

II. The examination of non-commissioned officers (M. C. 28) shall be conducted as nearly as practicable on the system outlined for examination of officers, except that form 37 *b* will not be used, the candidate shall be ordered to appear before the board by the commanding officer of the regiment, battalion, battery or separate company, and the officers authorized to appoint these boards (M. C. 28) shall announce the appointment in orders.

III. A military body cannot reach the proficiency it owes to itself, or the efficiency it owes to the State, without competent officers, commissioned and non-commissioned; that the boards of examination should perform their duties solely with the interests of the service before them, is therefore so apparent and necessary, that further directions on this subject seem not to be required.

I. Major J. Frederick Ackerman, Thirteenth Regiment, N. G., S. N. Y., was tried before a court-martial convened pursuant to S. O. No. 92, Series of 1886, from these headquarters, and of which Lieutenant-Colonel Heman Dowd, Twelfth Regiment, was president, upon a charge of conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline, founded on six specifications. The first and second specifications charged the use of certain improper language concerning the colonel of his regiment. The third specification charged that he "did

say to and advise First Lieutenant Henry C. Clark, Thirteenth Regiment, then Acting Adjutant, that he, the said First Lieutenant Henry C. Clark should not accept any office or position upon the staff of said regiment, if the same should be tendered to him by Colonel Edward Fackner, Thirteenth Regiment, because it was a question of a short time only whether Colonel Fackner would be forced out of the regiment or the regiment disbanded. This at the armory of said Thirteenth Regiment, in the city of Brooklyn aforesaid, on or about the 14th day of October, 1886."

The fourth specification charged that he had endeavored to persuade junior officers of the regiment to join him in the opposition to his regimental commander, and falsely represented that his opposition and conduct had the approval of certain general officers.

The fifth specification charged that he did combine with other officers of his regiment to oppose the authority of the colonel, and in furtherance of such combination, took part in a meeting of such officers at which plans and means to compel the retirement of the colonel were discussed.

The sixth specification charged him with knowledge of certain insubordinate demonstrations of enlisted men, and with encouraging and failing to quell the same.

The court found Major Ackerman, on the first, second, fourth, fifth and sixth specifications, not guilty; on the third specification, guilty in that he "did say to and advise First Lieutenant Henry C. Clark, Thirteenth Regiment, then Acting Adjutant, that he, the said First Lieutenant Henry C. Clark, should not accept any office or position upon the staff of said regiment if the same should be tendered to him by Colonel Edward Fackner, Thirteenth Regiment," and not guilty as to the remainder of such specification, and not guilty of the charge, and acquitted him of the same.

II. The Commander-in-Chief has approved the findings of the court on the first, second, fourth, fifth and sixth specifications. The finding on the third specification is approved so far as it finds Major Ackerman guilty, and disapproved so far as it finds him not guilty; and the finding of not guilty on the charge is disproved, for the reason that the entire third specification is proved by the evidence, the testimony of the witness for the prosecution not being met, but being supported by the testimony of Major Ackerman.

III. It is shown by the record that an election was held in September, 1886, to fill the office of Colonel of the Thirteenth Regiment. From the testimony of Major Ackerman, it appears that this contest gave rise to some warmth of feeling, and that considerable discontent and dissatisfaction continued amongst the members of the regiment

after the election was completed. In the contest between the candidates for this position, Major Ackerman, according to his own statement, took "an earnest and leading part" in opposition to the successful officer.

Every officer has a right to interest himself in any such election, and to vote for that candidate whom he deems best qualified to discharge the duties of the position to be filled. But when the election is ended and the result of the ballot is made known in form of law, it becomes his duty to lay aside any feeling of opposition he may previously have entertained against a candidate, and yield to his superior officer most loyal assistance in carrying into execution his plans for the welfare of the regiment, and for the maintenance of order and discipline. It becomes his duty also to promptly repress and discourage any feeling of discontent or dissatisfaction which may have arisen from the warmth of the contest or from any other cause. In the present case, the action of Major Ackerman, as charged in the third specification, tended directly to keep alive any existing feeling of dissatisfaction against his superior officer, and was to the prejudice of good order and discipline.

It is so important that any feeling of opposition against a candidate for office in the guard should promptly cease with the announcement of his choice by election, and the existence of such feeling is so sure to evidence itself by overt acts and lead to laxity of discipline, and, ultimately, to destroy the usefulness of the organization in which the same is permitted, that the Commander-in-Chief in the present case has felt himself called upon to formally disapprove of the action of the court in this case, in order that it may not be taken as a precedent in the future.

The Commander-in-Chief is sensible of the respect which is due to the judgment of a court-martial, and of the consideration to which Major Ackerman is entitled in view of his military record and previous service to the State. He is, however, impressed with the consideration that the responsibility of maintaining the discipline and order of the National Guard rests, not upon the officers composing any court, but upon those to whom the command of the guard is by law committed. To the proper discharge of this duty, every consideration of delicacy towards individual officers and public tribunals must be subordinated.

IV. The court-martial before which this case was tried is dissolved, and Major Ackerman will be released from arrest.

I. Second Lieutenant William K. Smith, Thirteenth Regiment, N. G., S. N. Y., was tried before a general court-martial, convened by S. O. No. 82, series of 1886, from these headquarters, and of which Colonel Harry W. Michell, Fourteenth Regiment, N. G., was president, upon the following charges and specifications:

Charge 1. Conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman.

Specification one alleged that when duly ordered to report to his Regimental Commander, and, on or about September 10, 1886, he did, in the presence and hearing of several enlisted men, use certain vulgar and disrespectful language.

Specification two alleged that when ordered to report to his Regimental Commander as aforesaid, he did, in the presence and hearing of several enlisted men, inquire of one or more of them whether he should obey such order.

Specification three alleged the use, on or about September 10, 1886, of certain vulgar and disrespectful language concerning First Lieutenant Henry C. Clark, of the Thirteenth Regiment.

Specification four set forth that on or about September 14, 1886, he countenanced, approved and incited the enlisted men of his company to insubordination, and especially by affixing his signature to a paper requesting the resignation of his company commander.

The second charge was conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline.

Specification one alleged that on or about September 10, 1886, upon being remonstrated with by his Regimental Commander against inciting the enlisted men of the Thirteenth Regiment, or a portion thereof, to acts of insubordination, he did state to such commanding officer that he was inciting men to acts of insubordination, and would not endeavor to discourage such acts, and was doing all he could to incite the enlisted men of his company against their captain.

Specification two charged that upon being ordered by his Regimental Commander, on or about September 10, 1886, to refrain from inciting the enlisted men of Company H against their captain, he replied that he would continue to incite such men to insubordination until they got rid of their captain.

There were two supplemental charges: The first, disobedience of orders, with a specification that on October 11, 1886, upon being ordered by his colonel to go to the quarters of his company he failed and refused to obey such order.

The second charge was unmilitary and unofficer-like conduct, with two specifications.

Specification one alleged that, having been placed in arrest and assigned limits by his colonel, he broke his arrest and went beyond such limits, and this on October 11, 1886.

Specification two alleged that on October 6, 1886, having been placed in arrest, he did, in the presence and hearing of several enlisted men, request his company commander to resign his office.

The Commander-in-Chief has approved the proceedings, findings and sentence of the court, except the finding of guilty on the second and fourth specifications of the first charge, which have been disapproved for the reason that neither the specifications nor the evidence given thereunder sustain in law the charge; and with the further exception of the finding of guilty upon supplemental charge one and the specification thereunder, and upon specification two of supplemental charge two, which findings are disapproved for the reason that the evidence adduced does not sustain such charge and findings as a matter of law.

The court found Lieutenant Smith guilty on all the charges and specifications, and its sentence, as approved and modified, by remitting a part of the punishment, is that he be cashiered.

II. By the evidence in this case it appears that the commanding officer of the Thirteenth Regiment, having been informed that Lieutenant Smith was inciting insubordinate conduct, sent for him and asked whether the report was correct. According to the finding of the court, Lieutenant Smith admitted he was inciting opposition to the captain of his company, and against the remonstrance and strict orders of the colonel commanding he avowed his intention to continue his conduct till his company commander was forced from his position. Instead of heeding this timely admonition, it is found by the court that Lieutenant Smith, at a subsequent date, and when under arrest awaiting trial on the serious charges above set forth, took part with other members of his company in a secret caucus plainly called for the purpose of determining what action, looking towards the captain's removal from command, could be taken with safety to those concerned. He approved of the action of that caucus and was present and acquiesced in the public presentation to his company commander of the request for his resignation.

The argument that Lieutenant Smith's conduct was dictated by considerations of what the best interest of his company required cannot avail. It is not left to every member of the guard to pass on the propriety of his superior officer's conduct, to determine his

unworthiness to continue in the service, and to force him from command if he deems that result desirable. There are legal and orderly methods provided for the determination of such matters, and when a soldier departs from them he does so on his own responsibility. The conduct of Lieutenant Smith in this matter appears to have been partly, if not wholly, due to the action of his superior officer in voting at the then recent election for colonel of the regiment. The present case is another instance of the grave results to which such feelings, if not promptly put aside, may lead, and to which the Commander-in-Chief has recently directed attention in general orders.

The language which Lieutenant Smith used when ordered to attend his colonel and when speaking of a brother officer was most unbecoming, unjustifiable and inexcusable.

In reviewing the proceedings of the court, the Commander-in-Chief has been called upon to disapprove of the finding of guilty on one charge and on several specifications, and he has seen fit, in the exercise of his clemency, to remit a part of the punishment called for by the sentence. The penalty of a dishonorable dismissal from the service is itself a most severe one, and will mark the full disapprobation of the Commander-in-Chief of the conduct of which Lieutenant Smith has been found guilty.

III. The sentence of the court, so far as it directs that Lieutenant Smith be cashiered, will be carried into execution.

I. First Lieutenant Russell Benedict, Thirteenth Regiment, N. G., was tried before the general court-martial convened pursuant to S. O. No. 82, series of 1886, from these headquarters, and of which Colonel Harry W. Michell, Fourteenth Regiment, was president, upon

two charges. The first charge being unmilitary and unofficerlike conduct accompanied by four specifications. The first specification charged that he "did write and send and cause to be delivered to his superior officer, Lieutenant-Colonel Edward Fackner, Thirteenth Regiment Infantry, N. G., S. N. Y., who had previously put in arrest Second Lieutenant William K. Smith, Thirteenth Regiment, N. G., S. N. Y., pending his trial upon charges, a writing in the following words: 'Unless Smith instantly released, you will force me to retaliate. Such contemptible tactics to smother opposition can't succeed.'"

The second specification alleges that having been placed in arrest and assigned limits by his colonel, he did break said arrest and go beyond said limits.

The third specification charged that he did "in the presence and hearing of several enlisted men of said Thirteenth Regiment, request his superior officer and company commander, Captain Charles P. Kretschmar, to resign his said office."

The fourth specification set forth that he did incite, countenance and assist several of the enlisted men of this company to acts of insubordination and breaches of discipline against their commander, and especially to request him to resign his office.

The second charge was disobedience of orders accompanied by three specifications.

The first charged that having been ordered to meet his colonel at the armory he did fail and refuse to obey said order. The second specification alleged that upon being ordered by his colonel to state whether or not he had written or sent to him a certain telegram, he refused to obey such order.

The third specification set forth that upon being ordered by his colonel to go to the quarters of the company he did fail and refuse to obey said order.

The court found the accused guilty of the first charge and of all the specifications thereunder, and guilty on the second charge and on the first and third specifications thereunder, and not guilty on the second specification, and imposed a sentence which, as approved and modified, directs that the accused be cashiered.

II. The Commander-in-Chief has approved the finding of guilty on the first and third specifications of the first charge and on the first charge. He has disapproved the finding of guilty on the second specification of the first charge and on the third specification of the second charge for the reason that such specifications and the evidence thereunder do not in law sustain such respective charges. The finding of guilty on the fourth specification of the first charge is disap-

proved for the reason that the same is not supported by evidence. The finding of guilty on the first specification of the second charge is disapproved for the reason that the specification is not sufficiently proved. The finding of not guilty on the second specification of the second charge is disapproved as the specification is bad in law. The finding of guilty on the second charge is disapproved, being unsupported by any approved finding.

III. In reviewing the sentence imposed by the court, and modifying it only to the extent stated, the Commander-in-Chief has considered not only the fact that the original sentence is only sustained by two approved findings of guilty on the first charge "unmilitary and unofficerlike conduct" — but he has also considered the position taken by Lieutenant Benedict at the trial that, although his discharge was, according to his testimony, withheld over a year prior to his trial to enable him to perform military service, which he did thereafter from time to time perform until his arrest, yet when called on to justify his military acts during this time, he claims not to have been bound by any commission, and to have been free from all responsibility therefor.

Upon an examination of the records at these headquarters it is found that the facts are not accurately presented in this record. Lieutenant Benedict's resignation was received at these headquarters on May 27, 1885, and a full discharge issued to him under date of May 29, 1885. In the succeeding month the commanding officer of the Thirteenth Regiment was, at his urgent request, granted permission to withhold service of the discharge. Subsequently, and under date of September 18, 1885, Lieutenant Benedict applied for leave to withdraw his resignation, writing that "the discharge required by law was not furnished to me, and I have not ceased to be a member of the National Guard." Upon this the acceptance of the resignation was formally revoked by S. O. No. 91, series of 1885, and the certificate of discharge is on file so endorsed.

The Commander-in-Chief makes no further comment on these facts than to point out that they dispose of the objection raised to the court's jurisdiction, and that Lieutenant Benedict's status in view of the granting of his application in September, 1885, and his subsequent service ought not to have been a matter of any doubt to him at the time of his trial.

The action of the Commander-in-Chief, in disapproving of the finding of guilty on the first specification of the second charge, is solely due to the failure to legally prove the offense charged, and must not

be taken as an approval of the conduct of Lieutenant Benedict, whose attitude toward his superior officer in this matter is strongly condemned.

IV. The court-martial before which this case was tried is hereby dissolved, and the sentence of cashiering will be executed.

I. For the government of the Camp of Instruction, when occupied by troops, the following general regulations are ordered and promulgated for the guidance of all concerned:

1. The camp is constituted a military post, and will be conducted in accordance with the rules provided for the government of military posts and these regulations.

The post commander will prescribe in orders the hours and calls of service and the duties to be performed, subject to section 1 of paragraph II of General Orders No. 4, c. s., but no reviews will be authorized except by orders from this office.

He will prescribe the amount of camp and garrison equipage and blank ammunition to be issued to the troops in camp.

2. The chief of ordnance, as such, and as acting quartermaster-general and acting commissary-general of subsistence, will cause the Camp of Instruction to be prepared in time for its occupancy by troops. He will provide and keep on hand at the camp the necessary quartermaster and ordnance stores, and after consultation with the surgeon-general, the necessary medical stores and supplies; he will provide, by contract, for the furnishing of cooked meals to the troops in camp, and will see that the meals are properly and promptly furnished, well cooked, of wholesome quality and sufficient quantity; he will furnish the necessary transportation to officers and enlisted men ordered there to and from the camp; and he will exercise in camp a general supervision of all public property not by law and regulations in the care of others, the mess arrangements and the public buildings and grounds.

Transportation for troops to the camp will be furnished, as far as practicable, in such manner that they will arrive at the camp not later than 3 o'clock, P. M., of the day ordered.

3. The surgeon-general is charged with the general supervision and direction of the medical service at the camp, and is authorized to select one competent person, who shall have charge, under his direction, of the medical stores at the camp, and who shall receive for his services transportation, rations and the pay allowed by law to hospital stewards.

4. The paymaster-general is charged with the payment of the troops on the last day of their tour in camp, and will take the necessary measures to pay each person entitled thereto, in accordance with

sections 2 and 4 of paragraph II of General Orders No. 4, c. s., from these headquarters, by a check drawn to his, the person's, order.

5. Commanding officers of regiments, battalions, batteries and separate companies, and officers specially detailed, if not traveling with troops, will at once, upon notice of detail for camp service, make requisition for proper transportation of men and baggage from their station to the Camp of Instruction, direct, on the acting quartermaster-general, the chief of ordnance, State arsenal, Thirty-fifth street and Seventh avenue, New York city. Commanding officers will specify the exact number of men, as nearly as possible, for whom transportation is required, and transportation will not be allowed for men who, under sections 2 and 4 of paragraph II of General Orders No. 4, c. s., from these headquarters, will not be entitled to pay. On arrival in camp, or as soon thereafter as practicable, commanding officers of troops arriving by railway transportation will settle their transportation accounts with the acting quartermaster-general, the chief of ordnance. Transportation will be allowed for one servant for the officers of each company and the field and staff of a battalion, and for three servants for the field and staff of a regiment.

Horses for field officers will be furnished by the post quartermaster, and transportation or forage will not be allowed for any other horses.

On the journey to and from, and the march into camp, the senior officer will command the troops present, and before leaving their stations commanding officers will telegraph to the post commander the strength of their command, servants separately.

6. Surgeons of regiments and assistant surgeons of separate companies detailed for camp service, if traveling with troops, will each make timely requisition through their immediate commanding officers for a hospital knapsack, with medical stores and instruments, upon the acting quartermaster-general, the chief of ordnance, to whom they will return such knapsack immediately upon the arrival of their regiments or companies at their regular stations.

7. Upon arrival in camp, commanding officers of regiments, battalions and detachments, and officers specially detailed, will at once report for instructions to the post commander, and regimental and battalion commanders will at the same time submit requisitions for the necessary quartermaster stores for the approval of the post commander.

8. Commanding officers of regiments and battalions will direct their respective senior medical officer to report, on arrival in camp, for orders and instructions to the surgeon-general. The senior medi-

cal officer in camp will perform the duties of post surgeon, and within ten days after his return from camp will, on form 72, prepare and forward a report of his tour of service, through his regimental commander, to the surgeon-general.

The hospital steward of the regiment in camp, or if there be none, a suitable person selected by the surgeon-general, will act as post hospital steward, under the orders of the post surgeon, and the instructions of the surgeon-general. Such person, or hospital steward, must have passed an examination before the State Board of Pharmacy, and be licensed as a druggist, according to the laws of the State; and regimental and battalion hospital stewards not so examined and licensed, will not be recognized by the State, or permitted to act as hospital stewards. Regimental and battalion commanders ordered to camp duty, whose hospital stewards do not meet these requirements, will at once report the fact to these headquarters.

9. Regimental and battalion commanders, on arrival in camp will direct their commissaries of subsistence to report for duty while in camp, to the acting commissary-general of subsistence, the chief of ordnance, without being, however, relieved from duty with their regiments or battalions.

A ration will consist of early bread and coffee, breakfast, dinner and supper. Ration returns will be prepared by the company commanders each day immediately after retreat or dress parade, covering all the rations received by their respective commands during the day; as a basis for the return of the day will be taken the number of officers and men present at breakfast, allowing one day's ration for each; to this will be added the number of meals received by men joining subsequent to breakfast. Adjutants will perform the duties of a company commander for the field, staff, non-commissioned staff and band.

Company returns will be consolidated the same evening by regimental and battalion commanders, who will deliver the consolidation to the post commander; at the close of the tour these officers will deliver to the post commander, a consolidated return, in duplicate, of all the rations received, which will be the voucher upon which the chief of ordnance will pay the contractors.

Commanding officers of troops coming from distant stations, should see that their commands are properly provisioned for the journey.

Rations will be allowed for the authorized number of servants.

10. The pay rolls, in triplicate, will be prepared *before* going into camp by entering on them the name of each officer and enlisted man of the organization, *with the date, of rank of officers and date of enlistment of the enlisted men.* In camp credit will be given for the day, after

retreat of such day, excepting the last two days, and the rolls fully completed, signed and amounts carried out, will be handed to the paymaster-general as early before the close of the tour as possible, to enable him to pay the troops before their departure from camp. If practicable, the pay rolls should be signed, by the officers and enlisted men, before coming in camp, but they must be signed on the first Sunday in camp.

Pay will be allowed to officers and enlisted men present for the days on which the regiment or company arrives at, and departs from, the camp; and for such other days of the tour during which they are present, at least for guard mounting in the morning until after retreat or dress parade in the evening; provided their whole stay in camp does not consist simply in coming to camp on Saturday and spending Sunday there, or staying but one day, and returning on Friday to depart again on Saturday. (See, also, sections 2 and 4 of par. II, General Orders No. 4, c. s.)

11. Commanding officers of regiments, battalions and companies are, and will be held, responsible for the correctness of returns and reports rendered by them.

There should be a well-instructed clerk to relieve the first sergeants of, or to assist them in, the clerical duty. In each company, the first sergeant, or the clerk, should keep a list for each day on which to place the name of every man arriving or leaving, and the hours of his arrival or departure, during the day; this list will be found of great value to them in making the ration return, crediting the pay after retreat, and preparing the report book next morning.

The report book must show the condition of the company *at the time the report is made*, and the remarks are to explain all the alterations which may have occurred since making the last report.

Within ten days after the close of the camp tour, commanding officers of regiments and battalions will make reports to the Adjutant-General of the general management of their command and the results obtained.

12. The State service uniform will be worn as prescribed in the regulations; on drill, fatigue, and when not on actual duty, the fatigue coat, R. 835, may be worn. White helmets may be worn by regiments and battalions fully supplied with them.

13. The officers detailed as commanding officers of battalions are authorized, each, to select two competent officers of suitable rank, and five non-commissioned officers, to serve with them at the camp of instruction respectively as adjutant, quartermaster and commissary of subsistence, sergeant major, quartermaster sergeant, color bearer provost sergeant and clerk.

The names of officers and non-commissioned officers thus selected will as soon as possible be reported to the Adjutant-General.

14. The following books and blanks furnished by the State are required in camp:

By regimental and battalion commanders, forms 8, 12, 56, 69, 70.

By surgeons, forms 13, 71, 71.

By company commanders, forms 9, 56, 69.

And the attention of all officers is especially called to R. 134, 135, 170, 179, 180, 376, 387, 412, 473, 475, 477, 478, 479, 773.

15. Persons not connected with the administration of the post, or not being members of the organizations in camp, will not be permitted in the camp after tattoo.

16. The sale of all spirituous liquors, wine, ale, or beer, and all huckster and auction sales within one mile of the camp are prohibited.

No ale, beer, wine or spirituous liquors shall be used in camp, except upon the prescription of the post surgeon.

Fire works, illuminations, and other out-of-place performances will not be permitted.

The commanding officer of the Sixth Battery, and those of the separate companies, ordered in camp, will report at once, by mail, to the officers assigned to the command of the battalion, or the commanding officer of the regiment, of which they are to form part, furnishing the names and dates of rank of their officers and non-commissioned officers, and such other information as may be desired by those officers.

Assistant Surgeons of separate companies not detailed by name for duty at the Camp of Instruction, are excused from such duty.

I. Privates Marlbro Walker, George A. Wilson and James F. Knudson, of Company H, Thirteenth Regiment, N. G., were separately tried before the general court-martial convened pursuant to S. O. No. 15, c. s. from these headquarters, and of which Captain William Haubennestel, Nineteenth Separate Company, was president, upon two charges. The first charge was disrespect to his superiors, accompanied by two specifications. The first specification charged that the accused did sign a writing requesting his superior and company commander to resign his said office. The second specification alleged that the accused did demand and ask of his company commander that he should resign his office. The second charge was, conduct prejudicial to good order and military discipline, with a specification alleging that the accused with other persons unknown did surreptitiously and wrongfully take and carry away the lock of the door of the room assigned for the use of Company H, in the regimental armory.

The court found Private Walker guilty on the first specification of the first charge, not guilty on the second specification of said charge; guilty on the first charge; guilty on the first specification of the second charge, and on the second charge.

The Commander-in-Chief approved the findings of guilty on the first specification of the first charge, and of not guilty on the second specification of said charge, and disapproved the finding of guilty on the first charge, and of guilty on the second charge and the specification thereunder.

The court found Private Knudson guilty on both specifications under the first charge, and not guilty on the second charge and the specification thereunder.

The Commander-in-Chief approved the findings of guilty on the two specifications under the first charge; disapproved the finding of guilty on the first charge, and approved the finding of not guilty on the second charge and the specification thereunder.

The court found Private Wilson guilty on the first specification of the first charge; not guilty on the second specification under such charge; guilty on the first charge, and guilty on the second charge and the specification thereunder.

The Commander-in-Chief approved the finding of guilty on the first specification of the first charge, and the finding of not guilty on the

second specification of said charge. He disapproved the finding of guilty on the first charge, and approved the finding of guilty on the second charge and the specification thereunder.

The sentences of the court in the cases of Privates Walker and Knudson, not being supported by an approved finding of guilty on any charge, were disapproved by the Commander-in-Chief. The sentence of the court in the case of Private Wilson was approved, and the punishment mitigated to a reprimand.

II. The evidence taken under the first charge was substantially the same in all three cases. The action of the accused in requesting the resignation of their company commander consisted in voting at a meeting of the civil organization in favor of a resolution reciting that the captain had offered to resign at the request of the company, and asking for his resignation. The captain was presiding at this meeting and received the resolution and put it to a vote without objection, calling for the "ayes" and "noes," and for a rising vote. Some time previous to this occurrence, the captain, finding a resignation blank upon his desk, called his command together and in substance told them, the accused being present, that if his resignation was required, resort need not be had to such indirect means, but it would be given by him at the request of the company when deemed for its best interests. It does not appear that the accused were concerned in the preparation or presentation of this resolution, or were actuated in voting as they did by any improper motive, or did anything other than express their opinion upon the question as put by the captain who, after the lapse of several months, charges them with a breach of military duty involving a disrespect to himself in the doing of this very act. There is no evidence to show any intentional disrespect on the part of the accused. Upon the facts of these cases, differing as they do materially from those previously presented, the Commander-in-Chief has felt called upon to withhold his approval of the finding of guilty on the first charge.

The evidence taken under the second charge shows that the captain of the company changed the lock of the company room, thereby rendering useless the keys held by the members of his command. This fact being brought to his attention when presiding at a meeting of the civil organization, he stated in substance that he had so acted for the protection of public property, that he had no desire to keep anyone out of the room, and if the company had any objection to having it locked it could not come up at that meeting because it was a special one, but they would have to call another meeting to deal with the matter. Immediately after the adjournment of the special meeting,

the form of calling another was gone through with, and the three accused were appointed a committee to restore the lock to its former condition. The lock was then removed by a member of the company, apparently with the intention of changing its working and then restoring it, but before this was done the captain took action resulting in the present charges.

In the case of Private Knudson, there was no evidence to show that he was connected with the removal of the lock, and the finding of not guilty was proper and has been approved.

In the cases of Privates Walker and Wilson, the testimony shows that the accused, though they did not actually remove the lock, were present and approved and authorized the doing of the act.

In the case of Private Walker, the disapproval of the finding of guilty on the second charge is due solely to an irregularity in the taking of testimony in the absence of and without notice to the accused, and not to any doubt on the part of the Commander-in-Chief of the justice and propriety of the finding of the court upon the evidence.

In Private Wilson's case, the finding of guilty on the second charge is supported by the evidence and has been approved. It was the duty of Private Wilson in assuming the grave responsibility of interfering in a matter plainly under the control of his superiors, to act deliberately and only upon the fullest assurance of the latter's approval. The statement of his captain, to which reference has been made, was not the unqualified and deliberate direction necessary for the complete justification of Private Wilson's act. The words used were, however, unfortunately chosen, and had a tendency to mislead those who heard them. In consideration of this fact, and of the disapproval of the finding of guilty on the first charge, the Commander-in-Chief has mitigated the punishment imposed by the court to a reprimand. He stongly condemns the action of Private Wilson as presented upon the face of the proceedings. Giving due weight to all extenuating circumstances, his conduct shows a forgetfulness of his subordinate position, and evinces a spirit which, unless promptly repressed, will lead to more serious offenses, and subject him to severe punishment. This censure is equally applicable to those who took part with him in the action condemned by the finding of the court.

The Commander-in-Chief refrains from commenting on the conduct of the captain who commanded Company H, Thirteenth Regiment, at the time of these occurrences, in view of his death resulting from the serious illness which prevented his appearing and testifying on the trial of these cases.

He, however, calls the attention of the members of the National Guard to the unfortunate results which may follow the failure of those in command, to promptly and firmly repress all attempts of their subordinates to improperly interfere with or usurp their authority.

The Commander-in-Chief has been recently called on, in reviewing the records of courts-martial upon members of the Thirteenth Regiment, to repeatedly declare his disapproval of the conduct of members of that command. In disposing of the last of the pending cases, he expresses the hope that the examples of these trials will have the effect of subduing that spirit of insubordination and disregard of military duty, which has for the moment displayed itself, and he calls the attention of the members of the regiment, both officers and enlisted men, to the fact that on their orderly and exemplary conduct in the future will depend their usefulness as a military organization, and the place they are to hold in the estimation of their associates of the National Guard.

III. The court-martial before which these cases were tried is hereby dissolved, and Privates Walker, Wilson and Knudson are released from arrest.

I. The amendments to the Military Code passed by the Legislature of the State of New York, and contained in chapter 649 of the Laws of 1887, are hereby promulgated for the information and government of all concerned.

II. Sections 40, 93, 97 and 132, have been amended so as to read as follows :

§ 40. Able-bodied men of good character, of eighteen years of age and upwards, who can read and write, may be enlisted in the National Guard in the first instance for a term not less than five nor more than seven years, and, on the expiration of that term, they may be re-enlisted, either immediately or at any time thereafter, for terms of one or more years, at their option ; but no person above the age of

forty-five years shall be enlisted or re-enlisted except by permission of the commandant of the brigade or division to which the organization is attached; nor any person under the age of twenty-one years, without the consent of his parent or guardian; provided, however, that enlistments as musicians between the ages of sixteen and twenty-one years may be made with the consent of parents or guardians. Every enlisted man shall continue to be held to duty, and shall retain rank and be eligible to promotion after the expiration of his term of enlistment or re-enlistment, until he is actually discharged.

§ 93. The staff of the Commander-in-Chief (except the Adjutant-General, who shall be paid at an annual salary of four thousand dollars and his necessary expenses), and assistants in the several departments, in lieu of all compensation and allowances heretofore provided by law in time of peace, when upon actual duty under the provisions of this act either at drills, parades, encampments, lake or seacoast defense duty, or otherwise, shall be paid such reasonable and just compensation, not exceeding the full pay and allowances of officers of the same rank in the army of the United States, as the Commander-in-Chief shall deem proper, and in no event to exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars per annum, together with their necessary expenses and those of their departments, to be paid by the State upon the certificate of the Commander-in-Chief, showing a detailed statement of such services and expenses.

§ 97. On the certificate of the Adjutant-General the Comptroller shall annually draw his warrant upon the Treasurer for the following sums, namely: Twelve hundred dollars for each division and for each brigade headquarters; two hundred and fifty dollars for each regimental headquarters; and one hundred dollars for each battalion headquarters; and two hundred and fifty dollars for each headquarters of provisional regiments or battalions. The funds thus allowed shall only be expended by the respective commanding officers, on the approval of the Adjutant-General.

§ 132. All fines and penalties imposed by any military court upon officers or enlisted men shall be paid by the officer collecting the same into the treasury of the county within which the regiment, battalion, troop, battery or company is located, within thirty days after the collection thereof, and shall form a portion of and be credited to the military fund of the regiment, battalion, troop, battery or company of which the persons paying the fines and penalties are members, and the treasurer of such county shall thereupon report the amount thereof, designating the organization to which it belongs, to the Adjutant-General of the State. And the amount of fines or penalties

so collected from any other commissioned officers or enlisted men shall be paid by the officer collecting the same to the Treasurer of the State. The commanding officer of each regiment, battalion, troop, battery and company shall be responsible for all county property in his hands or under his control, provided under the provisions of this act, and shall, between the first and fifteenth days of July in each year, file with the treasurer of the county in which his command is located an inventory of such county property in his hands or used in his command. Each county treasurer shall, when any county property furnished for military purposes under this act is abandoned or is unfit for service, collect and store the same, and with the approval in writing of the officer commanding the brigade district of which his county forms a part, sell the same at public sale, and turn the net avails of said sale into the treasury of his county.

I. During the current drill season the following rules will be observed and enforced by commanding officers:

Schools of instruction for officers will be established by the commanding officers of regiments, battalions, batteries and separate companies, for the officers of their respective commands; these schools will be held at least once in each month.

Commanding officers of regiments, battalions, batteries and separate companies, will also establish, or cause to be established, schools of instruction for the non-commissioned officers of their respective commands, which shall be held at least once in each month.

Recruits will be instructed in sighting and aiming, and in the duties of sentinels, and will not be permitted to drill with their companies until they are thoroughly conversant with the school of the soldier.

When practicable, instruction in the trumpet signals will be given, so that officers and men shall recognize them when sounded.

Commanding officers of organizations which were not in camp this season, will pay special attention to the theoretical and, if possible, practical instruction of their commands in skirmishing, guard mounting and guard duties.

Brigade commanders, in person or through staff officers, will see that these directions are strictly complied with.

II. To prepare for the next season's rifle practice, and recognizing the necessity of more thorough preliminary instruction, theoretical instruction is prescribed as follows:

Commanders of companies and batteries armed with rifles will at least once in each month during the current drill season instruct their commands in rifle practice. Inspectors of rifle practice will assist the commanding officers of the companies of their respective regiments and battalions, those of brigades the commanding officers of the separate companies and batteries of their respective brigades, as instructors.

The instruction will be according to paragraphs 165 and 167, Upton's Infantry Tactics, and as follows:

SIGHTING.

1. A sand bag for each squad (one twelve-pound or two six-pound bags) will be placed on a rest, which may be a table, a tripod, or a stack of arms, and so arranged that the bag will be about four and one-half feet from the ground.

The men will be formed in single rank, and in squads not to exceed ten men in each.

The instructor will then flatten the sand bag with the back of his hand, lay a full cocked rifle on it, aim at some small object at as great a distance from it as the drill-room will permit (a wafer on the wall for instance), and explain to the men the following simple rules:

The sights should not incline to the right or left.

The line of sight should be taken along the centre of the notch of the rear-sight and the top of the front-sight, which should cover the middle of the mark aimed at.

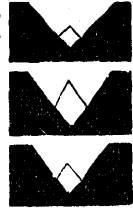
The eye should be fixed on the mark, and not on the front-sight. Particular attention should be paid to this rule, as beginners are apt to fix the eye on the front-sight and not on the mark, which prevents the latter from being distinctly seen, and greatly increases the difficulty in aiming.

2. The instructor will also explain the different kinds of sights, viz.:

Fine Sight.—When the point of the front-sight is just seen through the notch of the rear-sight, the effect of which is to shoot low.

Full Sight.—When the whole of the wedge-shaped portion of the front-sight is displayed through the notch on the rear-sight, the effect of which is to shoot high.

Half Sight.—When but half the front-sight is seen.



3. At times during this drill the leaf of the rear sight should be required to be raised.

AIMING.

(One.) Come to the position of ready, and raise the leaf of the rear-sight.

(Two.) Raise the rifle smartly in front of the right shoulder to the full extent of the left arm, without moving the body, head, or eye; the arms to move close to the body; barrel nearly horizontal and pointing a few inches below the mark; the eyes fixed upon the forefinger inside the trigger-guard; both elbows inclined downward.

(Three.) Press the piece smartly with both hands against the hollow of the shoulder, which must neither be allowed to give way nor pressed forward or raised to meet it; the left elbow at the same time being brought as far under the rifle as is possible without assuming an unnatural position; the right elbow slightly raised, being nearly square with the right shoulder; the center (or rather the upper than lower) part of the butt to be pressed firmly against the shoulder with the left hand without touching the collar-bone, the top of the butt being as nearly as possible even with the top of the shoulder; the forefinger will be placed around the trigger like a hook, but without pressing it; the head and body will be kept perfectly perpendicular the whole time, no attempt being made to look through the sights.

(Four.) Close the left eye and incline the head to the right over the small of the stock so that the right eye may quickly perceive the coincidence of the rear and front sights and the object aimed at.

(Five.) Raise the head, look squarely to the front and bring the piece smartly to the first position.

Practice in aiming will be continued until the men aim quickly and correctly from the shoulder.

The instructor will also give such further instruction as his experience may suggest.

Wherever gallery practice is practicable it should be encouraged.

Brigade, as well as regimental and battalion commanders, are charged with the proper execution of the foregoing.

The General Inspector of Rifle Practice will arrange for the instruction of officers in rifle practice, when deemed necessary by him, through the respective brigade commanders.

The following decisions of the War Department are published for the information and guidance of all concerned.

The numbers of each section indicate its appropriate place in the book of decisions published February 5, 1887.

4a. *Hoisting a flag to and lowering it from half-staff.*—The flag should be hoisted to the top of the staff and then lowered to half-staff at the instant of the firing of the reveille gun; it should be hoisted to the top and immediately lowered at the firing of the retreat gun; or in case of a funeral salute at retreat it should be hoisted and then lowered immediately after the last gun of the salute. (*General decision, letter February 19, 1887—597 A. G. O., 1887.*)

4b. *Position of flag at half-staff.*—A flag at half-staff should be displayed at a point midway between the truck and the cross-trees. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., letter April 9, 1887—1431 A. G. O., 1887.*)

4c. *Manceuvring in restricted drill-rooms and other contracted places may sometimes necessitate some simple movements not laid down in the tactics in order to change the position or formation of troops. Expedients for such purposes could well be left to the discretion of the commanding officer, and it would be unwise to prescribe how and by what commands they should be executed.* (1163 *A. G. O., 1887.*)

5a. The adjutant does not return his sword when reading orders at dress parade. During the publication of the orders he drops the sword; which is held suspended by the sword-knot attached to the

wrist. After he has folded up and put away the orders, he resumes the "carry," then faces about and salutes his colonel with his sword, and reports, "Sir, the orders are published." (1332 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

6a. Paragraph 758, Infantry Tactics, referring to the manner of carrying the sword, applies to dismounted officers only. (1196 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

8a. A battalion of infantry being at parade rest, the mounted officers remain at a "carry." (1196 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

8b. Battalion being in line, at the command "Backward, guide center, march," the captains retain their positions and step backward at the command "March." (*Letter, April 30, 1887* — 2201 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

17a. At the above command ("Backward, guide center, march") the color-bearer and general guides retain their positions in front of the battalion, and step backward at the command "March." In regard to the above two questions (8b and 17a) it may be remarked that the back step is only used to gain a few steps to the rear (see paragraph 49), and to march the battalion a few paces to the rear the officers, color-bearer, general guides, guides, and file-closers remain in their positions (see paragraph 401). (*Letter, April 30, 1887* — 2201 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

18a. Battalion marching to the front in line, at a right shoulder, the general guides carry their pieces at a right shoulder. (*Letter, April 30, 1887* — 2201 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

20a. The first sergeant should salute the captain on receiving orders to dismiss the company. (1332 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

28a. The first sergeant does not come to "arms port" in dismissing company. (1332 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

28b. Battalion in line: At the command "Rear open order, march," the left sergeant and the left file-closer face to the front. (*Letter, April 2, 1887* — 1614 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

31a. Paragraph 212. In wheeling by fours, the guides should wheel as directed in paragraph 228. (*Letter, August 12, 1887* — 4296 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

32a. Battalion marching in column of companies, guide left, arms at right shoulder, the right and left guides of companies do not change the position of their pieces at the command "Right oblique, march," or at the command "Column left, march," during the wheel of each company. (*Letter, April 30, 1887* — 2201 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

33a. Companies, left into line wheel, from a halt: The movement is executed toward the guides, who would be at a "carry" before its commencement. (*Letter, April 13, 1887* — 1738 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

33b. Company marching in line, quick time, guide left, arms at right shoulder : At the command "Left wheel, march," the guides on the marching flank should not bring his piece to a "carry." The left guide will be already at a "carry." When the guide is temporarily changed during a wheel or an oblique, the temporary guide, if at a right shoulder, etc., does not come to a "carry." (2645 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

33c. Ordinarily the wheel into line from a column at full distance is made toward the guides, who would be at a "carry" before the commencement of the wheel. If all the arms are at a "right shoulder" in a column at full distance and at a halt, and a wheel into line is ordered before indicating the guide or ordering the guides to cover, then both guides of each company would be at a "right shoulder," and would both come to a "carry" at the command "Company halt." (*Letter, April 30, 1887 — 2201 A. G. O.*, 1887.)

33d. To form column of platoons to the right or left (paragraph 255) : The guides on the marching flanks of platoons do not come to a "carry" at the first command. (2699 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

49a. Paragraph 54. Although the *about* by company is recognized in paragraph 54, Infantry Tactics, yet as it is not mentioned in the school of the company, and as there are no commands prescribed for it, it is not a proper movement in that school. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., letter, August 12, 1887 — 4452 A. G. O.*, 1887.)

61a. Company in line at halt, arms at "carry," command "right (or left) oblique, double time." The half face is executed at the command "right (or left) oblique;" the arms are brought to a "right shoulder" at the command "double time." (2699 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

65a. "Fix bayonets" should not be executed on the march as a means of instruction in the manual. (*Letter, April 23, 1887 — 2039 A. G. O.*, 1887.)

66a. Paragraph 72. It being difficult to get a firm hold on the piece fitted with the new sight leaf, by clasping it "immediately below the lower band" in *charge bayonet* and *arms port*, the hand should grasp it just above the rear sight. (*Letter, August 12, 1887 — 4296 A. G. O.*, 1887.)

66b. Paragraph 81. The men are not permitted to look down at the scabbard to sheathe their bayonets. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., September 24, 1887.*)

67a. *Secure arms.*—In executing secure arms, the toe of the piece in the first part of the first motion, should be toward the body, *i. e.*, the left. (*Circular No. 2, U. S. Infantry and Cavalry School, 1884, and Mem. of decision of November 9, 1885.*)

68a. At "trail arms" the little finger should be in rear of the barrel. (*Letter, April 9, 1887—1908 A. G. O., 1887.*)

68b. Paragraph 90. In *left reverse arms* it is more convenient to change hands in front of the center of the body. (*Letter, August 12, 1887—4296 A. G. O., 1887.*)

86a. Paragraph 92. The cartridge-box is not moved to the front in the execution of the "load." (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., September 24, 1887.*) Preparatory to loading, the box may be moved to the front; see first clause section 77, book of decisions.

88a. In executing the "load," etc., by the numbers, the subdivision of the motions relative to the cartridge should not be authorized. It is plainly to be inferred from the third paragraph, page 31, *Infantry Tactics*, that the same regularity is not expected in the execution of the motions relative to the cartridge and bayonet as in the execution of the other parts of the manual. Clock-like regularity in these motions can only be obtained by an expenditure of time that could be better employed in more useful instruction to the soldier. (1325 A. G. O., 1887.)

88b. In executing the load it is customary simply to carry the hand to the cartridge-box without opening it, when cartridges are not used. (1579 A. G. O., 1887.)

103a. At the command "cease firing," the piece is brought to the safety-notch before closing the cartridge-box. (1325 A. G. O., 1887.)

107a. Paragraphs 124 and 125. In executing "front open files," Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, move straight to the front. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., circular No. 9, 1887.*)

115a. Paragraph 195. In dressing to the right or left the men turn the head and eyes, but keep the shoulders square to the front. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., September 24, 1887.*)

117a. In facing to the rear the fours halt at command after executing the "about." (*Letter, April 13, 1887—1738 A. G. O., 1887.*)

120a. Paragraph 237. Column of fours cannot be formed from column of twos-at a halt. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., September 24, 1887.*)

122a. Paragraphs 238 and 239, *Infantry Tactics*, prescribe that in forming column of twos from column of files, in double-rank formation, the leading file advances three yards and halts, the movement being necessarily a successive one. While it is practicable to execute this movement simultaneously in single-rank formation, it is believed to be the general practice in the service to execute it successively in accordance with the directions in paragraphs 238 and 239, taken in connection with paragraph 247. (1325 A. G. O., 1887.)

122*b*. Paragraph 238. In forming fours (or twos) "left oblique" from column of files, double rank formation, the "successive formation" applies to the beginning of the oblique as well as to the halting. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., September 24, 1887.*)

124*a*. Paragraph 253. In "left front into line" from a halt the fours do not make a half face to the left at the preparatory command. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., September 24, 1887.*)

127*a*. Paragraphs 245 and 246. Relative to the distance and step in forming single rank from double, in either column of fours or company front, the preservation of the proper distance between sets of fours is of much more importance than the preservation of the step. In moving forward from a halt the march is always begun with the left foot. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., September 27, 1887.*)

132*a*. Paragraph 300. A line of skirmishers marching by the flank, no guide marches by the side of either the right or left skirmisher. The file-closers preserve the distance of ten yards to the right or left of the line. It is only while deploying by the flanks that the leading skirmisher is accompanied by a guide. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., circular No. 9, 1887.*)

133*a*. Paragraph 326. At the command "rally by fours" file-closers should fix-bayonets. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., circular No. 9, 1887.*)

136*a*. Paragraph 338. In deploying a battalion in column of fours as skirmishers front into line, the column of fours is not changed into column of companies, but each company executes right or left front into line, when it arrives opposite its interval and then deploys. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen., September 26, 1887.*)

146*a*. A battalion in line without color-guard and color-bearer should march as provided for a battalion advancing to an attack (paragraph 410); the guide of the battalion would be the non-commissioned officer between the right and left center companies, the basis of alignment would be the captains of the right and left center companies, and the front rank of the left set of fours of the right center company. (*Letter, April 2, 1887—1614 A. G. O., 1887.*)

146*b*. With a battalion marching in line, when broken to pass an obstacle, it should be left to the discretion of the colonel to provide for the proper direction of march of his battalion and for the preservation of the interval for the rear companies during the temporary absence of the color-guard from the line. (*Letter, April 2, 1887—1614 A. G. O., 1887.*)

148*a*. In successive battalion formations the designation of a company changes after the command "Guides posts," which ends the movement. (*Letter, April 27, 1887—2170 A. G. O., 1887.*)

153a. To reform the line after advance by right of wings: At the command "Left front into line," markers should be established for both wings and the guides should come out. The markers established by the field officer of the directing wing give the line of direction for the markers of the other wing. (2596 A. G. O., 1887.)

155a. Paragraph 757. *Cavalry Tactics*.—The captains remain on the flanks of their companies till the command "Guides posts" is given. When dressing their companies, the captains face to the front, as prescribed by paragraph 716, *Cavalry Tactics*. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen.*, September 27, 1887.)

160a. In brigade line, battalions are posted from right to left according to the rank of the colonels, the senior colonel on the right, the junior on the left. (1196 A. G. O., 1887.)

167a. *Saluting a Regimental Adjutant*.—The office of adjutant gives no right of precedence. All first and second lieutenants rank according to date of commission in their respective grades. (*General decision*, letter April 13, 1887—1738 A. G. O., 1887.)

170a. A company marching meets the colonel commanding, or other person entitled to a salute, the captain should bring the company to a "carry," and himself salute the commanding officer and all general officers. The guides and file-closers do not salute. (1332 A. G. O., 1887.)

182a. *Daily dress parades and roll-calls*.—Unless for some urgent reason, paragraph 513 of the Regulations should be always strictly complied with. The discretion accorded to post commanders by paragraph 344 of the Regulations, in dispensing with dress parades, only authorizes their omission where the weather is too inclement or the conditions of service such that the parade is impracticable. It gives no authority for their systematic omission on particular days of the week. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen.*, letter June 9, 1887—3163 A. G. O., 1887.)

186a. In forming line at dress parade of two companies, the formation is central, and the captain of the first company should dress it to the left. (963 A. G. O., 1887.)

190a. On the parade for review of a brigade or battalion, or other body of troops less than a brigade, the commanding officer, when presenting his command to the reviewing officer, will have his sword drawn, and all officers of the command on parade will likewise have their swords drawn. The swords will remain drawn throughout the review, and will not be sheathed until the parade is dismissed. The commanding officer of the troops to remain at attention in front of his command, facing to the front while the reviewing party passes around the lines. For the review of a body of troops greater than a

single brigade, it should be left to the general commanding to arrange all details so as to conform to the existing situation. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen.* — 6780 *A. G. O.*, 1886.) (*Circular No. 5*, 1887.)

190b. Paragraphs 815 and 826. It was distinctly the intention of so much of circular No. 5, Adjutant-General's Office, June 10, 1887, as refers to parade for review of a brigade or battalion, to revoke and alter so much of paragraphs 815 and 826 as are in conflict with that circular, and to return to the forms and methods which prevailed previous to the adoption of the tactics now in force. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen.*, letter August 17, 1887 — 3882 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

192a. At the review of a brigade each battalion is brought to a "carry" when the head of the battalion is fifty yards from the "post of review." The point where the battalions of a brigade are brought to a "carry" is indicated by a camp color. At the review of a single battalion the arms are at a "carry" all the time during the march past. (2594 *A. G. O.*, 1887.)

226a. *Uniform of Chaplains.*—Existing regulations do not permit the wearing of swords or regimental badges by chaplains. (*Decision Lieut.-Gen.*, September 24, 1887.)

I. Commanding officers of regiments and battalions, and of batteries and separate companies having a medical officer, will organize ambulance corps in their respective commands as follows :

For a regiment or battalion, the corps shall consist of the medical officers of the command, the hospital steward, and three enlisted men from each company of seventy-five men, and two enlisted men from each company of less than that number.

For a battery or separate company, the corps shall consist of the medical officer and four enlisted men.

The enlisted men shall be detailed by the commanding officers upon the recommendation of their senior medical officers, and there may be included in the detail for a regiment or battalion two corporals, and for a battery or separate company one corporal but no other non-commissioned officers.

When the exigencies of the occasion require, commanding officers will detail such enlisted men as have already been found proficient, and may also detail musicians for duty with the corps.

Men detailed for ambulance service shall be relieved from such duty on the application of the medical officer having charge of the corps to which they are attached.

II. The corps shall be under the immediate orders, control and instruction of the senior medical officer of the command to which it belongs, but no assignment or detail for duty with the corps shall relieve an officer or enlisted man from his regular duties, except when on duty with the corps in active service.

III. To prepare the members of the corps for their duties, the medical officer in charge will provide a course of instruction. This course shall commence in the first week in January of each year and continue during the drill seasons of the year, and shall be open also to such other members of the command of which the corps is a part, as may be approved by its senior medical officer.

The dates, hours and places when and where the instruction will be given, shall be published in orders to the whole command by its commanding officer.

IV. The course of instruction given by the medical officers of the command shall include for the present:

Rudimentary instruction in anatomy and physiology.

Rudimentary instruction in the diagnosis of the common accidents and diseased conditions to which national guardsmen are exposed, and the common means for the prevention of the same.

Instruction as to the common means employed for the urgent relief of the sick and the injured, including stretcher-drill and matters pertaining to transportation of the sick and injured.

Instruction in individual and camp hygiene.

V. At the close of the course of instruction, the detailed men of the corps shall be examined as to their proficiency, by a board to be appointed for that purpose as hereinafter provided.

The senior medical officer of each regiment, battalion, battery and separate company shall keep a record of the name, proficiency and general standing of each member of the ambulance corps under his charge, from the time of the first attendance of the member to the termination of his course of instruction, and also the result of his examination.

VI. Commanding officers of brigades will, with the approval of the Surgeon-General, appoint for their respective commands, boards of examination which shall consist of not less than three medical officers, whose duty it shall be to examine and report to the brigade commander as to the proficiency of the detailed men who have attended the prescribed course of instruction. These men will be ordered before the

examining board on the application of the commanding officers of the regiment, battalion, battery or separate company to which they belong.

VII. Enlisted men of ambulance corps, when actually on duty as such, are authorized to wear, in addition to insignia of military grade, around the left arm above the elbow, an arm badge (brassard) "of white cloth, sixteen inches long and three wide, with a cross of red cloth two inches high and two inches wide in center."

VIII. An enlisted man who has passed the prescribed examination satisfactorily, and has the approval of the commanding officer of the brigade to which he belongs, will be permitted to wear at all times a badge of a pattern to be prescribed in further orders, distinctive of the ambulance corps of this State, as an indication of a special fitness to aid the sick and injured under urgent circumstances.

IX. Details for instruction in the duties of an ambulance corps will be made annually, at such time as will permit the course of instruction of each succeeding class to begin promptly in the first week in January.

X. There shall be allowed and issued by the Chief of Ordnance, as Acting Quartermaster-General, State arsenal, corner Thirty-fifth street and Seventh avenue, New York city, upon requisition made direct to him by the respective commanding officers, stretchers of a pattern approved by the Surgeon-General, at the rate of two for each regiment and battalion, and one for each battery or separate company having a medical officer.

The following opinion of the Judge Advocate-General is published for the information of the National Guard :

SIR.--I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication addressed to you under date of October 4, 1886, by Captain Welcome B. Randall, commanding the Forty-first Separate Company, stating the case of a company having by-laws that require applicants for enlistment to be voted upon and elected to membership prior to their enlistment by the commanding officer of the company; and inquiring whether the commanding officer has the legal power to enlist such applicants without such action by the company.

The provisions of the M. C. which directly refer to the enlistment of men into the National Guard are sections 40 and 42. Section 40 defines the persons who may be enlisted as "able-bodied men of good character who can read and write," regulates the term of enlistment and requires the consent of parents or guardians where the recruit is a minor.

Section 42 relates to the manner of the enlistment and the formalities attending it. It requires the signing of an enlistment paper, the taking of the oath of allegiance, and the approval of the paper by the commanding officer of the organization to which the troop, battery or company is attached. The form of the enlistment paper is to be prescribed by the Commander-in-Chief.

There is nothing in either of these sections which contemplates or requires an election of the would-be soldier to membership by the civil organization, as a prerequisite to his enlistment, and as these are two sections dealing with the formalities of enlistment, such a provision would naturally be found in them.

The civil organization is regulated by M. C. 139 and 140. There is no provision in either of these sections which in any way assumes to

regulate enlistments. The adoption of by-laws, rules and regulations is authorized, and it is provided that they shall conform to the system prescribed in the General Regulations, but it is also required that they must not be "inconsistent with this act." The question then fairly arises whether R. 147, which in terms requires the election of recruits by the civil organization before they can be enlisted, is a valid regulation.

The authority to issue regulations is found in M. C., 138, which authorizes the Commander-in-Chief to appoint a commission "to prepare such rules and regulations as may be deemed proper for the use, government and instruction of the military forces of the State, and to carry into full effect the provisions of this act." This grant of power is subject, however, to certain limitations implied in like cases, and growing out of the constitutional relation existing between the executive power vested in the Governor and the law-making power conferred on the Senate and Assembly. It is well settled that the Legislature cannot delegate the power to make laws to any other body or authority. (Cooley, Const. Law, 139.) Both branches of the government are vested with many subordinate and auxiliary powers, but neither can intrude upon or usurp the proper authority of the other. (Ex parte Mulligan, 4 Wall, U. S., 139.)

From these considerations result two rules, resort to which must be had in cases like the present. The first is, that regulations must not be contrary to the Constitution, nor to the statute under which they are made. (Winthrop's Dig., 116.) This rule is recognized by the Legislature in M. C., 147, which authorizes the making of regulations and expressly provides that they "shall conform to this act." The other is that regulations must be executive and not legislative in character. (2 Opin. Att'y-Gen'l, 220; 6 id., 10; 10 id., 31; McCall's Case, 5 Phila., 259; 1 Winthrop's M. L., 31.)

The raising, equipping and supplying of a military force, including naturally therein the power to determine who shall be enlisted, calls for the exercise of legislative powers. (Matter of Riley, 1 Benedict, 408; 6 Opin. Att'y Gen'l, U. S., 10.) These powers having been exercised by the Legislature in the form of statutory enactment, the duty of carrying them into effect is cast on the Governor, and that duty is strictly executive in character. To hold valid a regulation issued by him, which is contrary to the statute under which it is made, is to invest him with a legislative power superior to that possessed by the Senate and Assembly. A similar objectionable result is obtained by giving effect to a regulation which assumes to deal with a subject that can properly be controlled only by the exercise of legislative powers.

These questions were considered by the Hon. Caleb Cushing, when Attorney-General of the United States, in passing on a "system of Orders and Instructions for the Navy," which had been promulgated by the President. These he held of no effect in that they were not properly executive, but were legislative in character; and, as he pointedly expressed it, if the executive "may by a general order legislate on a military or a naval question, so may be on any other, and there is an end of all the barriers of the Constitution." (6 Opin. Att'y-Gen., 10.)

It has been pointed out that the intervention of the civil organization in the enlistment of recruits is not in terms authorized by any section of the Military Code. The Legislature has exercised its power and defined who may be recruited and also prescribed a system to be pursued in making enlistments.

Any regulation on the subject must conform to the provisions of the Military Code. Regulations, 147, prescribes a system for enlistment, differing in a material matter from that laid down by the Legislature. It calls for the approval of the enlistment by a body whose approval is not required by the act in question. The regulation does not conform to the statute in this behalf, but is contrary to its provisions. It is not executive, but if upheld would be legislative, and is inimical to the rules of construction to which attention has been directed.

A few words may well be said upon the operation of Regulation 147. By the terms of the preceding regulation each organization is permitted to adopt, subject to the approval of the Judge-Advocate, a system of by-laws for its government. These by-laws differ in many important requirements, and especially in so far as they pretend to regulate the enlistment of members. In some instances they are entirely silent upon this particular subject; in others they are flagrantly illegal. Naturally if each company has the right to make its own by-laws, with regard to matters so essentially important as that of enlistment, great irregularity and lack of uniformity in the system is to be expected, and while this is the case, I doubt if the worst anticipation would be as bad in these regards as the system which has actually grown up. For the purpose of discovering, if possible, what this system is, I have examined with care the by-laws of every company in the National Guard in this State, of which I have been able to get copies. Not only is it possible under the theory which has hitherto prevailed, for the system which applies in one regiment to be entirely unlike that which applies in another, but for the system applicable to two companies in the same regiment to be entirely

unlike. I am certain neither the law nor the law-makers ever contemplated such a possibility. The National Guard is something more and more serious than an aggregation of military clubs, over the control of which the club members themselves have absolute and final authority concerning admissions and expulsions. It is a well planned and thoroughly organized military body, designed for strictly military purposes, and intended to be the final police power of the State. It was the object of the law to breathe into this body as deep a spirit of military uniformity and duty as is compatible with the fundamental character of the citizen soldiery. If it is possible for each company to make its own requirements in these regards, then the State may be deprived of the very men whose service as soldiers would be of the utmost value. If the by-laws now prevailing in a majority of the companies are correct, the authority of the sworn officers of this service is nullified by the right of the civil organization to exclude from membership any person whomsoever on the score of his age, on the score of his looks, of his habits, manners, the company he keeps, and even on the score of his race. One company has already been mustered out of the service because of a race quarrel. The scarred but experienced veteran may be excluded on the ground that he is a German or a Hebrew, inasmuch as he associates habitually with Germans and Hebrews, which may not be satisfactory to the members of those companies which require that the associations of persons seeking admission to the service shall be satisfactory to the majority of the members. A person seeking to be recruited, who could be admitted into one company, would not be admitted into another by virtue of the difference in the number of black-balls required for exclusion, and so on *ad infinitum*. In order that these matters may be clearly shown, I will summarize the results of my examination of the by-laws in my possession.

Taking the regiments in the numerical order, I begin with the Seventh. I have examined the by-laws of Companies A, B, C, D, F, G, H and K of this regiment. All of these by-laws require a written application by the person seeking admission; some of them require in addition the name of the national guardsman who proposes him. His name is then required to be posted in three of the companies for one week, and in the rest of the companies for two weeks. Seven of the companies provide that such a person may be excluded from membership by five black balls, and one by three black balls. One of the companies also provides that a unanimous rejection by the committee is final; that the matter of the admission of the applicant so rejected by the committee, shall not even be presented to the company. The

majority of these companies require that the applicant must be five feet six inches in height. Company A requires in addition that he shall be of good moral character, good physical constitution and habits, and be examined by the regimental surgeon, and then assumes to repeal the statute by using the phrase providing for these qualifications, that they are "in addition to the qualifications required by law for enlistment in the National Guard." Company B requires not only that he shall be of good character, but be of gentlemanly manner and appearance. Company F requires that a person rejected can only be balloted for again after a month, and not more than twice, as do also Companies G and H. Company C requires that a person expelled shall be reëlected *de novo*, while company A requires that a person expelled is not eligible to reëlection. Company K requires that when the legal quota of membership is full, applicants may be balloted for and admitted to the civil organization as "members elect," who may be punished for violation of the by-laws and deprived of membership by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

The Eighth Regiment : Companies B, C, D, E, F, I and G, all provide that no person shall be eligible to election who has not been favorably reported upon by the committee. No qualifications for membership are prescribed by any of these companies. In Company D five black balls are required for rejection ; in all the other companies three black balls. All of these companies but Company C provide for a system of court-martial, Company C having no such by-law, but requiring a two-third vote to expel.

The Ninth Regiment : Company B requires that the applicant for membership shall be proposed to the recruiting committee at least one week before election, and shall be balloted for by the company only on the favorable report of that committee. Company A requires that he shall be vouched for by the member proposing him as of good moral character, which is also the rule in companies B, G, H, I and K. Five negative votes are required to reject in all of these companies. The qualifications for membership, so far as prescribed by the by-laws in this regiment, are generally uniform. It is uniformly prescribed that a person shall not be eligible to reëlection if expelled. In Company B a person may be expelled from membership by a two-thirds vote of the members present. In the other companies a majority vote of all the members of the company is required in accordance with the M. C.

The Eleventh Regiment : Company A requires that the recruit shall be proposed by a member, may be enlisted by any commissioned officer, on satisfactory proof of good character and reputation ; may

be rejected at the next meeting of the company by a two-thirds vote, or on the surgeon's report showing physical inability. It requires that he shall be an able-bodied man of good reputation, and five feet four inches in height.

Companies C, D, F, G, I and K have the same general requirements as Company A. Company B requires the recruit to be proposed in writing, to be vouched for by a member of the company, and to be elected not earlier than one week after the name has been referred to the committee; five black balls will reject. Company H requires the candidate to have been posted for two weeks, and he is rejected if he receives less than a majority vote of those present at the company meeting. He is not required to be a citizen, but it is sufficient that he has declared his intention to become such. He is required to be of good moral character, manners and appearance, and must not be less than five feet five inches in height, although shorter men are acceptable to other companies. In Company H an expulsion is possible by a two-thirds vote of the members present, which is a flagrant violation of the statute which requires a majority vote of all the members of the company.

The Twelfth Regiment: I have been able only to examine the by-laws of Companies E and G. Company E prescribes that a candidate shall be proposed by a member, and that if he is favorably reported on he may be balloted for. Five black balls in either of these companies are sufficient to reject. Company E requires the candidate to be of good character and physical ability, while Company G requires that his qualifications shall be such as prescribed by the association of the board of officers.

The Thirteenth Regiment: Companies B, D, E, F, G, H, I and K require that the candidate must sign an application which must be indorsed by a member and posted one week. Companies B, G, I and K require five black balls to reject, while Companies D, E, F and H require but three. Company B requires that the candidate shall be in good health and physical condition; of good character and habits, and with good associations and occupation, and able to speak, read and write English. Company D requires in addition to good character that the candidate shall have good manners, appearance and health, which is also required by Company E, which in addition requires correct habits and reputable associations and occupation, and that the candidate be five feet five inches in height. Company F is satisfied with the standard as prescribed by Companies D and E, in all regards, except the physical one, and a man who is five feet three inches is satisfactory to this company. Company G modestly only

requires good character and sound physical constitution. Company H requires a man of five feet five inches, who shall enjoy good health, be of good character, correct habits and "reputable associations and occupation." As to what may be regarded a reputable occupation by the members of a company one can only speculate, but such a by-law makes it possible to organize the company on the most thoroughly undemocratic basis. Company I requires that the candidate shall have a good constitution, and be "of good moral character and gentlemanly in behavior and appearance." I find no provision among the officers of the civil organization of this company for any officer to regulate the standard of gentlemanliness. In Company K the candidate must be a person liable to do military duty, must be in good health or physical condition, must be a resident or engaged in business in the State, not under five feet five inches, able to speak, read, write and comprehend the English language, be of good character and correct habits, and reputable associations and occupation.

The Fourteenth Regiment: I have only been able to examine the by-laws of Companies C, D, E and I. All require the posting of the name. Companies C and I require the favorable report of the committee and permit an exclusion by three black balls. Company E requires five black balls, and Company D none. Company C requires that he shall be able-bodied and a white male citizen, not under five feet four inches. Company I requires good character, sound physical condition, and eighteen years of age. Company E declares that those expelled from other organizations, or whose character is unsatisfactory, or who are not over five feet six inches, shall not be eligible. Company D prescribes no rules of eligibility in addition to those prescribed by the law. In Company I the rejected applicant may be proposed only on one month's notice, and not more than twice.

The Twenty-second Regiment: I have examined the by-laws of Companies B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and K. Company B requires the recruiting committee to follow the rules of the board of officers; three black balls are sufficient to reject. Company C requires the candidate to be posted a week, and five black balls are enough to reject. The candidate must be a citizen of good character and constitution, and not less than five feet three inches in height. Companies E, F, G, H, I and K, make no specific provisions with regard to the manner of application, posting, etc., but in each of these companies three black balls will reject. In Company I an expelled member cannot be reëlected. Company D has copied its rule as regards requirements from Company K of the Thirteenth Regiment, except that the candidate is required to be only five feet four inches in height. In Company H a member may be expelled by a majority vote of those present.

The Twenty-third Regiment: Company A requires the candidate to sign the blank used by the company, which shall be indorsed by a member, and which shall be posted one week. On a favorable report of the committee the applicant may be balloted for and be black-balled by two votes. He is required to be a citizen, to reside in the State, to be of good character and sound physical condition, not under eighteen years old, five feet six inches in height, and possesses such other qualifications as the board of officers may prescribe. Company B is practically the same as Company A, except three black balls are required. Company C only requires two black balls; Company F three. Here, good character, gentlemanly manners and appearance, good health, and five feet six inches in height are required. Company I requires three black balls to reject. In Company H two black balls are sufficient. The candidate must not be less than eighteen years of age, five feet five inches in height, of good moral character and good health. This company is incorporated regularly under the Club act of 1875. Company D, where two black balls may reject, requires good appearance, health, manners and character, and five feet six inches.

The Forty-seventh Regiment: Company A requires a favorable report of the committee, posting for two weeks, three black balls; and while it prescribes no particular qualifications, has a clearly illegal provision in that of expulsion by vote of a majority of the members present. Company B has but few provisions with regard to membership, simply requiring that the committee shall report to the commissioned officer, which is also true of Company E, where the candidate is required to have a good character for morality and gentlemanly conduct. Company G requires written application indorsed by a member, and to be posted two weeks. A vote of two-thirds of the members present is required to elect. This company also recognizes the illegality of its own act in the following terms, by requiring that "in addition to the qualifications required by law," the candidate must be five feet six inches in height, of good moral character and sound physical constitution. A member may be expelled by a two-thirds vote of those present. Company I requires five black balls; Company K requires three. Company I requires the candidate to be of good health, character, manners and appearance, and five feet five inches. Nothing is said about citizenship. Company K requires him to be a citizen, five feet six inches in height, of good character, sound health, and of ability to perform the duties.

The Sixty-ninth Regiment: This regiment leaves the whole matter with the committee. Company C requires the candidate to be posted a week, and exacts the same requirements as Company F. Company

D prescribes practically the same things as Company C, except that three votes are sufficient to reject. Company K also rejects by three votes; requires the applicant to be of good moral character, at least eighteen years of age and a citizen, and permits an expulsion by a majority vote, three-fifths of the members being present. Company F seems to have borrowed one of its by-laws from the Thirteenth and Fourteenth Regiments, or to have loaned its by-laws to two companies in this regiment, for in practically the same terms it requires a candidate to be of good health and physical condition, resident or engaged in business in this State, not under five feet five inches in height, speaking, reading, writing and comprehending the English language, of good character, good habits, and of reputable associations and occupations. Company E requires a majority vote to reject the candidate.

The Seventy-first Regiment: Company H requires two black balls. Companies A, C and K require three black balls. Companies D and G require five. Company C requires a favorably report of the committee before the candidate can be presented to the company. Provisions vary as to posting, etc. Company A seeks only able-bodied men of good character. It provides that an expelled member is not eligible to reelection. Company C requires good character, good health, citizenship, and a height of five feet four inches. Company D excludes all but able-bodied white male citizens, or those who have declared their intention to become citizens. Not satisfied with this exclusiveness, this company requires that even the white shall be of good personal appearance. Company H, in addition to good appearance, requires gentlemanly manners and good health. Company I has observed the law by imposing no conditions other than that the applicant shall be an able-bodied man of good character who can read and write. This company, however, requires the action of two-thirds of the whole company to authorize an expulsion. Company K requires good character, manners and appearance, and five feet six inches in height, and permits expulsion by two-thirds of the members present at the meeting. A rejected candidate is not eligible for election until after the expiration of a year.

Company C of the Seventy-fourth Regiment requires three black balls to exclude, and permits the expulsion of a member by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

In the Artillery, the First and Third Batteries require three black balls to reject; in the Fifth, a majority of the members present are required to elect; in the Fourth, the application of a candidate is to go to a committee and lie over one week; in the Fifth and Sixth, the battery can only vote on a candidate after favorable report by the committee, but in the Sixth, five black balls reject the candidate, and

if the nominee appears to be "maliciously" rejected, the captain may call for the reasons of the persons voting against him, and if they are insufficient, in his opinion, a second ballot may be had, upon which a majority vote determines the question. In the Second Battery, the candidate is required to be of gentlemanly manners and appearance. In the Third Battery the applicant must be a citizen of good moral character and sound constitution, and five feet four inches in height; a member may be expelled by a two-thirds vote of those present. In the artillery branch of the service the qualifications for membership are generally the same and generally legal.

Company A, Tenth Battalion, has prescribed that the applicant shall apply in writing, that his nomination shall only be acted upon after recommendation by the committee; that then five black balls shall be sufficient to reject him, and that a member may be expelled by a majority vote of those present.

I have examined carefully the by-laws of Separate Companies 1st, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, 11th, 12th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th, 20th, 22d, 25th, 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, 30th, 31st, 32d, 34th, 35th, 36th, 37th, 38th, 40th and 41st.

The same lack of uniformity and system prevails here as elsewhere. Of these companies the majority require written application, posting for various lengths of time, favorable report of the committee on membership, etc. One of them, the 8th, requires but two black balls to reject. Three, the 15th, 40th and 41st, require three black balls to reject; one requires four black balls to reject; nineteen require five black balls to reject; one requires six black balls to reject, being the Fenton Guards, and one requires eight black balls to reject. The 34th requires ten black balls to reject. The requirements with regard to height vary from five feet four inches, to five feet six inches as a minimum. Some of the companies, as the 7th, require good character, manners and appearance. The 8th refines somewhat with regard to the question of manners, and requires that the manners be not only good but gentlemanly. The 20th also requires good manners and residence in Binghamton. The 25th calls for gentlemanly appearance, likewise the 29th and 30th. The 31st repeats the qualification of good manners and appearance, while the 32d requires correct habits and deportment, as does also the 35th. In a number of these companies the law is flagrantly violated with regard to the matter of expulsion. In the 3d and 31st, a member may be expelled by a majority vote of those present; in the 29th by a three-fifths vote of two-thirds of the company. One of these companies requires a rejected applicant to wait three months before application the second time; two of them require him to wait sixty days.

This presents a state of affairs which could never have been foreseen by the Legislature, and which certainly was never designed, and is not permissible by the law. The entire system has grown out of the fact that the service has been led to believe it to be legal and allowable, in view of the provisions of the general regulations upon the subject of company by-laws. The evil lies in the fact that this general regulation is itself patently illegal, as being in conflict with the provisions of the statute. I have thus gone into the matter in detail for the purpose of illustrating the outgrowth of the regulation, the legality of which I have discussed earlier in this opinion.

I have examined all of the by-laws presented to me under Special Order 97, series of 1886, and have not found a single instance in which the qualifications for membership and the system of enlistment by the civil organization in any regiment, is exactly the same in all of its companies; and but one instance in which the qualifications and procedure are substantially the same. This statement will serve to emphasize my remark made earlier in this opinion, that there is not only a diversity in procedure between the various regiments, but the utmost difference among the companies composing each regiment. This condition of things is the outcome of the present system by which the civil organization assumes, in my opinion quite unlawfully, to regulate the enlistments into the National Guard. It is not to be expected that these differences will decrease, but rather that they will increase with the lapse of time. Nothing could present a stronger contrast to this general lack of system than the simplicity and uniformity in the manner of enlistment called for by section 42 of the Military Code. The Military Code recognizes the existence of the civil organizations, but, as I have already said in my former opinion, there is nothing in the present law which makes such civil associations the foundation and centre of the entire service, by giving them an unlimited and final control in the matter of enlistment. This question of recruiting and enlistment lies at the very foundation of the service, and, if the present system could be upheld, the State might be deprived of the service of its best and most available men, because of the predominance of the spirit of exclusiveness, or for any other reason which might prevail to lead companies to enact into their by-laws requirements which are out of place in any democratic system of government and in any true military service.

It is also to be observed that the conclusion which I have reached in reference to the legality of R. 147, does not leave the system of enlistment devoid of a proper and competent authority to determine the suitability of the recruits. In addition to the general obliga-

tion cast on all officers who are directly connected with the matter of enlistment, it is expressly provided by the last sentence of M. C. 42, that "no person shall be considered as enlisted in the National Guard until his enlistment paper has been approved by the commanding officer of the organization to which the troop, battery or company is attached." The approval cast upon such officer is plainly not of a perfunctory character. With him resides the power to determine whether the recruit shall be enlisted, and with his assent all previous proceedings become final. In the discharge of the duty of examining and approving applications for enlistment, such commanding officer is plainly required to satisfy himself that the recruits are "able-bodied men of good character, who can read and write." He may well require their physical condition to be certified to him by a regimental surgeon, and their good character to be vouched for by persons of known standing, and their capacity to read and write to be made manifest by examination or proper certification. In a word, he may require any legal and proper evidence that the recruit possesses the qualifications required by M. C. 40. Indeed, the action contemplated by the words just quoted from M. C. 42 cannot be advisedly taken without the possession of some evidence that the recruit is up to the requirements of section 40.

In conclusion, I would invite attention to the fact that the present condition of the by-laws of the various military organizations is such that action is needed to do away with illegal provisions, to some of which I have called attention, and to conform such by-laws to the plain provisions of the Code.

I have the honor to advise that upon the case submitted, as stated by me at the commencement of this opinion, the commanding officer of a separate company has the legal power to enlist would-be recruits, subject to the approval of his commanding officer, under M. C. 42, and this, although such company has a civil organization and by-laws requiring applicants for enlistment to be voted for and elected to its membership prior to their enlistment by the commanding officer. This conclusion necessarily involves the illegality of R. 147, in so far as it seeks to make election to membership in the civil organization a prerequisite to membership in the National Guard.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR-GENERAL, 1887.

The Adjutant-General, S. N. Y., Albany:

SIR.—In compliance with the requirements of M. C. 20 and R. 589, I have the honor to submit my annual report.

Accompanying this I transmit reports of Col. Thomas H. McGrath, Assistant Inspector-General, which officer, assisted by Lieut.-Col. F. C. McLewee, Assistant Inspector-General, has inspected and mustered the entire force of the State, pursuant to General Orders Nos. 12, 19, 24 and 29, current series, General Headquarters, S. N. Y., and dated respectively April 15, May 12, July 28 and September 13, 1887.

The result of the muster shows the aggregate strength of the National Guard to be 12,496, subdivided as follows:

The reports of my assistants on the condition of the Guard, written and verbal, are highly gratifying, and I do not hesitate to say that the general improvement in the National Guard has been greater during the past year than in any year of its history.

It seems as if all had grown to realize the fact that they are not independent organizations, but part of a force dependent on and amenable to the laws of the State and subordinate to its regulation and discipline.

I consider this a most happy condition of affairs and an enormous stride toward thorough efficiency.

The muster of 1887 shows the total number present to be 10,444. I do not consider this a fair indication of the effective or reliable strength of many of the organizations.

I think too much stress is given to the fact that it is important to parade larger percentages at inspection than on any other occasion during the year, and the time consumed in visiting men and employers is so often overdone that more important details are neglected.

An enlisted man who has not pride enough in himself or his company to parade on every occasion of duty when possible is of very little value to the State or the organizations.

This visiting and coaxing process just before inspection should cease as subversive of discipline.

Another evil to be noticed in this connection (not that it is practiced to any large extent, but sufficient to note and deprecate) is that names of men who are absent from the locality, or of whom it is positively known that they will not be present, are dropped just preceding and taken up at a convenient time after inspection.

This shows a better percentage of attendance, but is not in conformity with the spirit of the Code, and should be discontinued.

The inspecting officers have been very particular this year to call special attention to any deficiency in cleanliness or neatness of dress and want of propriety in adjustment of accoutrements, for although there may possibly be excuses for other deficiencies in a military organization, there is certainly no excuse whatever for a lack of cleanliness, neatness or proper wearing of accoutrements.

That this condition exists to any extent, is only the fault of company commanders.

A man should not be allowed to remain in the ranks, for company drill, who does not present himself neatly and properly dressed, and if on every occasion such an one were directed to leave the ranks and prepare himself properly, the result would be of immense benefit.

Non-commissioned officers particularly should be models in this respect; clean belts, spotless brasses, polished shoes, uniforms neat and well fitted, hair properly cut, and dignified bearing, should mark him as an example.

It is intended during the coming year to report severely on any organization lacking these requirements.

DISCIPLINE.

That discipline, as compared with last year, shows marked improvement, is a fact. It is, nevertheless, apparent that it has not obtained that high standard which it should and can.

Military courtesy and discipline are allied, for where the former is ignored the latter is seldom found.

Show me a company where the enlisted men are respectful and courteous to its commissioned officers, and invariably that company will appear for duty giving evidence of excellent discipline. The contrary is quite as noticeable. The freedom of intercourse which exists too often between officers and enlisted men should cease.

The officer who does not, or cannot command respect, should resign, for if he fails in this important feature, his sphere of usefulness is so limited as to render him of little value to the service. The fault in this, as in all other cases, is entirely with the officer.

SEPARATE COMPANIES.

In my report for 1886, I suggested that an officer be detailed to make at least semi-annual visits to all separate companies, to point out existing errors and be prepared to answer all questions appertaining to military training, drill and discipline. I now earnestly reiterate this recommendation. The necessity which then existed applies quite as forcibly now, and the suggestion has been hailed by a large majority of commanding officers, and any officer detailed will, I am sure, receive from them a hearty welcome.

INSPECTION OF COMPANIES OF REGIMENTS.

An inspection of companies of regiments particularly as regards drill and ability of officers has been inaugurated for the information of this department, and under your orders drills of the companies of the Sixty-fifth and Seventy-fourth regiments have been held, and Lieut.-Col. F. C. McLewee is now attending those which have been ordered for the Ninth and Eleventh regiments.

If the inspecting officers are received with that courtesy and enthusiasm which marked their attendance at Buffalo by all the officers except one, this new feature of inspections will prove a great success and work vast benefit.

UNIFORMS.

In regard to uniforms there is nothing that, in my opinion, can be added to or taken from the comments and suggestions made in my last annual report.

The blouse is unquestionably the garment, and sooner or later it will be the service coat for the National Guard. Why not commence its issue at once?

BOOKS AND RECORDS.

The keeping of books and records is decidedly not uniform. In some organizations neatness and proper methods prevail; in others they are so wretchedly incorrect as to be of no value to the State.

In some cases the books have been so destroyed by improper entries as to make it impossible for them to be set right. In these cases, the only remedy will be to issue new books.

RETAINED RANK.

There are instances where officers who have been long out of active service and carried as supernumeraries, have been elected to positions entitling them to commissions of the same grade as those under which they were rendered supernumerary. When newly commissioned, they have been given rank from date of original commission. I do not think this just to an officer who has worked faithfully, and to whom priority of rank, which confers certain honors and privileges, is esteemed not only for its prerogatives, but as the evidence of length of active service.

I respectfully and firmly recommend that the matter be brought to the attention of the Legislature, and that an amendment to the Code be secured if possible, so that this impropriety may be done away with.

Your attention is particularly invited to the reports of the Assistant Inspector-Generals on the condition of the various organizations of the guard.

Confirming their reports, I would respectfully recommend that for the good of the service the following organizations be disbanded:

* * * * *

I deem it a duty to again call attention to the fact that I consider the great obstacle to more rapid advance and proficiency, is the positive incompetency and inefficiency of company officers. Very much more care should be taken by examining boards, and all questions of friendship or accommodation should be positively eliminated in considering the qualifications of an officer. Examinations should cover a broader ground than tactics, and an officer should be questioned on his ideas of discipline, knowledge of keeping official records, and his views on what he considers personal neatness and propriety of a soldier. Finally, he should be judged as much by his demeanor and personal bearing at the examination, as by his perfection of knowledge in tactics.

We must have competent and intelligent officers or the system fails.

REPORT OF THE SURGEON-GENERAL FOR 1887.

The Adjutant-General, State of New York, Albany, New York :

SIR.—I have the honor to submit to your consideration my sixth consecutive annual report relating to the State Camp of Instruction at Peekskill N. Y., and the National Guard at large.

MEDICAL SUPPLIES.

On previous occasions the medical supplies for the use of the State camp have been selected by the Surgeon-General with or without suggestions from the medical officers of the commands for which they were intended. Heretofore a well-equipped drug store has been at the command of the medical officers of the National Guard while in camp. If perchance the fancy remedies of the latest times were asked for by the medical officers, they too, if not at hand, were procured for them at once. This course is well enough as a means of instruction as to the demands of the men while on duty, but as a practical measure it has become inconsistent with the inculcations of self-reliance in the medical officers at times when they must depend each on his own knowledge of the requirements of the occasion. I, therefore, suggest that in future encampment the commandants of military organizations be allowed a certain sum with which the medical officers of the organization can provide the medical and surgical supplies that in their judgment may be necessary for the occasion. The medical officers of the guard are now sufficiently familiar with their duties while in camp, and with the demands that may be made upon them at this time, to act intelligently in the selection of these supplies, if they are ever to be able to do so. If any prove themselves incompetent for duty, in time of peace, then, indeed, should it be known, that men competent to act in times of war may be selected. Since there are data in my possession already, which show definitely the amounts expended by the State for drugs for individual organizations during past encampments, it will be an easy matter to allot sufficient funds to succeeding organizations to enable their medical officers to provide all that will be consistent with both general and special requirements.

HOSPITAL STEWARDS.

The issuing of medical funds to the organizations in this manner, will require at once that the hospital stewards of organizations be qualified by law to dispense remedies. The order of the last encampment making this requirement, had a salutary effect, yet, even this order was sought to be practically annulled in occasional instances, by an ingenious though transparent sophistry unworthy of its advocates. The frequent inability to properly discriminate between duty on one hand and policy on the other is too often seen in the medical officers of the National Guard to constitute soldiers of the exponents of those principles, except in a social sense.

READY RELIEF TO THE INJURED.

In my last report your attention was called to the importance of organizing a corps for the instruction of a certain number of the members of the National Guard in the ways and means of rendering prompt and efficient aid to the injured while in active service. I am happy to be able to state that this matter is rapidly approaching a point that bids fair to cause its adoption in the military organizations in the State. A most active and efficient committee is now engaged in putting the finishing touches on the report of the system to be employed in the course of instruction. And, in this connection, I desire to commend your attention to the names of Majors Duncan, Stimson and Henry, each of whom has labored with untiring zeal on this committee to organize and perfect a system which bids fair to become the first one of this kind that has been introduced into the National Guard of this country. The proper performance of the duties necessary to prepare men for this service will require an outlay of time, thought and money on the part of the medical officers of organizations, and also a small amount of money on the part of the State. The State authorities will not shrink from their duty in the matter, since to do so is to place a light estimate on the importance of instruction that can but benefit the members of the guard, and the general public in times of need. The success of this system will be largely dependent on the ability and correctness of those medical men under whose charge it will be placed. It is deemed advisable by those who can foresee the liability of the occurrence of inefficient instruction, on account of incompetency or indifference of medical officers, that hereafter all medical officers to be appointed in the National Guard be examined by a competent board of medical examiners, to determine their ability, before they be commissioned. I think this course to be an entirely proper one. Competent men can find no fault with it; incompetent men are not wanted

It will add to the dignity of the position of a medical officer, by causing each to feel that he has been found worthy by his superiors in experience and in rank. It is true that this course may interfere often with the rewards paid by commanding officers of military organizations in appointing indifferent men to responsible positions on the basis of good fellowship alone. However, all worthy commanding officers can but concur with the plan that will afford the best security to those under their charge.

KITCHEN, COOK-HOUSE, ETC.

In my last report the necessity of improving the surroundings of those structures was most emphatically stated. During the last encampment the odors associated with those buildings were inconsistent with the comfort of the soldiers who were obliged to eat their rations in the mess-hall, and dangerous to the health of the help that was of necessity constantly surrounded by them. The earth's surface beneath the kitchen and cook-house is foul from the decomposition of the fluids that have saturated it for years. But one course remains, to make these present structures safe for those laboring in them, which is to remove all the offensive earth, grade the surface and cover it with cement, so as to convey at once into the sewer all polluting discharges that fall into it.

BATHING.

The most popular improvement of the camp, during the last season, was the system of bathing that had been introduced. I respectfully recommend that the capacity of the bathing-house be increased at least one half, to allow a fuller and more comfortable compliance with the demands of the men and of nature.

SCHOOL SINKS.

The system of school sinks that is introduced is the best system for the purposes of a camp known to sanitary engineering. The defects of the methods of adjustment of the sinks, and of the pipes connected with them, which have since been discovered, account fully for the annoyance caused by them during the last season. A trivial expense will, without doubt, cause them to render the efficient service that had been so confidently anticipated of them. I am of the opinion that the wooden conduit forming the termination of the main sewer will require to be extended into the current that flows beneath the railroad bridge, and possibly much beyond this point, in order to convey to the requisite distance the polluting discharges necessarily associated with the demands of nature, in connection with large bodies of men. It was noticed by myself and by others on several occasions, and also it is the subject of report by many of the individual officers, that the

inequality of the grade of the camp and parade-ground in many places caused large surface collections of water to remain for a considerable time after severe showers of rain. The remedy for this condition is a self-evident one, and measures should be taken to obviate its recurrence before another encampment is ordered.

PRECAUTIONARY MEASURES BY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

I would fall short of doing my duty if I were to allow this opportunity to pass without calling your attention to the wisdom that is displayed by many of the medical officers in the manner in which they call the attention of the members of organizations to the proper means of preventing disease and avoiding discomforts while on duty.

It will be noticed throughout the several reports of these officers that they fully appreciate the importance of "precaution" in their attention to the wants of the men. The evidences of these precautions are multiplying from year to year as these officers improve by observation and experience, and as the commanding officers themselves profit by encouraging and heeding salutary advice of this kind. It is to be hoped that in the future, more than in the past, the officers newly elected to the command of organizations will, so far as possible, retain the able and efficient medical members of the staff. Their experience can but strengthen the commandants under circumstances that might otherwise be attended by distrust, and be followed by physical disorder to the members of the command.

I desire also to return my thanks for the kindness of Mr. W. E. Ford, of the firm of Hazard, Hazard & Co. of this city, for the repetition of the courtesies of loaning to the State a complete outfit of surgical instruments. By this consideration they have saved the State great expense, while at the same time its citizen soldiery have been protected from possible disorder more thoroughly than in the ordinary walks of citizenship. The Post hospital steward, Frank Warner, has, as usual, attended to his part of the duties of the medical department with the self-same courtesy and fidelity that has heretofore characterized his actions at all times. I am thankful to be able to acknowledge the unvarying courtesies and expressions of confidence that have at all times been shown to me by my associate officers, and by the officers of the entire National Guard. These manifestations of themselves alone are more than a recompense to me for the time and thought employed for the performance of the duties of the position with which I am honored.

As the within report shows, nothing calling for close medical care occurred during the encampment of the Seventh regiment, N. G., S. N. Y. The only unusual case was a luxation of the shoulder joint sustained while diving into the Hudson river.

Much time was given to the inspection of the new sinks, bath-house, drains and sewers. The result of this inspection may be briefly given. The new school sinks are a great improvement over the old ones—first, because they are within the sentry lines ; second, because they are built in the manner recognized by sanitarians as the best.

The experience of the season will show whether the troughs in the sinks are large enough. They ought to be emptied hourly during the day, and half-hourly for an hour and a half after breakfast and dinner. The holes in the seats are too far back to ensure cleanliness in the troughs, but unless the latter are wider the holes can not be placed further forward without the person coming in contact with the front of the troughs.

The servants' sink is too small to accommodate the 100 or more persons who use it. The sink at the point near the camp of the battery should be moved. Too much of the caretaker's time is taken in emptying it properly. The servants who use it should use the general servants' sink, or a new school sink, connected with the sewer, should be built.

In all the sinks, the water used in flushing them siphons out when the troughs are filled above a certain point, seemingly because the valves at the exits become clogged.

The bath-house is a success beyond anticipation. From 130 to 250 men bathed daily during the week. It was open from 6 A. M. to 6 P. M., except during breakfast and dinner, and during one and one-half hours after each of those meals. Enlisted men can bathe only on permits from one of the surgeons ; officers and non-commissioned officers needed no permits. The benefits and comforts of the bath-house can hardly be over estimated.*

The sewers worked well. A stoppage on Friday was due to the fact that there was no grating at the sewer openings to prevent them from being used as waste boxes ; another stoppage was due to the mud and sand which covered the cobble stones at the sewer openings being washed into the sewers by the heavy rains, and filling the traps. These cobblestones should be left uncovered by any sand or earth.

* The temperature of the water was kept at from 70° to 72° Fahr.

As a whole, the new sanitary arrangement are a complete success. The only points to be criticised are minor and of detail, in no way relating to the general plan.

The policing of the camp was good; that of the battery quarters deserves especial mention.

GENERAL.—I have the honor to submit to your consideration the following report of the medical department of this regiment during its encampment at the State Camp of Instruction at Peekskill, from June twenty-fifth to July second inclusive.

The regiment assembled at the armory Saturday morning and presented a body of men 556 strong. With the assistance of the company commanders I endeavored during the month previous to our tour of duty to ascertain the physical status of the command; and in all cases men who, upon examination, were found wanting in physical vigor were relieved from duty upon my recommendation. On the steamer awaiting our arrival I found Captain Miller with the Seventh Separate Company, numbering thirty-four officers and men in excellent condition.

The trip to Peekskill was without any special medical incident. We arrived at Roa Hook about 3.30 P. M. With the exception of two men all were in good condition, and marched to the camp. These two men were willing and anxious to join the command, but as they had been slightly indisposed the previous night, I thought it more advisable they should ride in the ambulance.

Immediately upon my arrival I reported to the post surgeon, Major D. M. Stimson, for instructions, and accompanying him, made a thorough sanitary inspection of the entire camp ground and its environs, which were in excellent condition. I take this opportunity of thanking Major D. M. Stimson for the many valuable suggestions and information he bequeathed to me on this occasion, the result of his experience with his command, from which I reaped many benefits during my tour of duty.

Shortly after our arrival in camp the Thirty-fifth Separate Company, Captain Holland, reported for duty, sixty-seven officers and men.

I consider that the health of the regiment during the week was excellent. When one will consider the condition of the weather and the character of the daily routine of work, which was not deviated from in the slightest, he must decide this command to possess a class of men above the average in physical endurance.

Very few men were relieved from the performance of duty except on account of sickness; a reference to the record shows only a variation of ten between the maximum (658) and the minimum (648) daily present in the command.

While this course placed especial responsibility upon the medical department, and in a measure increased the number prescribed for daily, it certainly is a plan destined to increase discipline.

The great proportion of prescribing was done at sick call, doubtful cases being instructed to report to me again at 5 o'clock; there was no attempt at malingering, every man seemed to be filled with the spirit to do his full duty, and anxious to avoid the confession of weakness, if possible.

Many were placed upon the sick report for very slight ailments simply that they might be relieved from prolonged duty, which would expose them to the sun's rays; this course undoubtedly went far toward preventing serious case of heat prostration.

Every case of illness where the recumbent posture or rest in bed was required, or thought advisable, was transferred to the hospital; this I believe is the most judicious plan to pursue, as the surgeon can better in this way care for his patients and at the same time protect the interests of the regiment. During the entire week there were five men in the hospital, one case of chronic malaria, two of diarrhoea, one of sunburn with a tendency to facial erysipelas, and one of heat prostration which occurred after sunset upon the first of July, rendering the man unconscious for a short time and accompanied by slight heart failure.

The thirteen cases reported as heat exhaustion, included men who complained of slight premonitory symptoms, such as nausea and headache, and were therefore relieved from certain portions of the day's work; and one or two cases of syncope, which occurred at dress parade.

The four cases of heat prostration occurred on Friday, one during the skirmish drill at the moment of the final charge; this was the only man to leave the ranks during this test of physical

endurance and proficiency, made under the most unfavorable circumstances, with no wind and the temperature at ninety-seven degrees. Two others reported to me at the close of the exercises after return to camp. The fourth I have already referred to as occurring after sunset. The highest temperature in these cases was 101 degrees.

Finding myself alone with the command, my assistant, Dr. Charles L. Lindley, having been detained in the city by illness, I determined to resort to the members of the volunteer ambulance corps of the Twelfth Regiment for assistance. This application was readily granted by the commanding officer, and the service, faithfully performed by these men, I believe, convinced all of the utility and benefit to be derived from such an organization.

Having as yet only a limited number of men instructed in this work, I selected nine from the corps whom I considered best fitted and whose services would be least required for duty. From this number I made my daily detail, the number varying according to the amount of service anticipated; the maximum detail was five, the minimum three. One accompanied each battalion at drill; when the hospital was occupied one was constantly in charge.

These men carried with them such necessary simple remedies as might be required, and by prompt attention in a number of cases rendered relief and promoted the comfort of the men.

The stretcher was only carried upon the occasion of the last skirmish drill, when the command was marched about one mile from camp; it was then taken more as a precaution and followed the rear of the reserve; its services I am happy to say were not required, but its presence, if known to the men, had not the slightest demoralizing or depressing effect, as the result must prove.

About a month previous to our tour of duty, I recommended the adoption of a summer helmet; the best article I could find in the market was the regular army summer helmet; this weighs only half the black or the ordinary white helmet generally worn by the State troops, minus the trimmings. This helmet was adopted and was fully appreciated by the command, and certainly contributed to the general health.

The commanding officer very kindly consulted me on all questions appertaining to the sanitary condition of the regiment, and on the two or three occasions where I recommended a change of dress, he acted promptly upon my suggestion.

The commissary department receives my thanks for their kind services; I received no complaint during the week.

The policing of the grounds was perfect and during the last few days of our duty the streets were a model of cleanliness.

The sanitary arrangements, sinks, drain and water supply, cleaning and disinfecting systems seem very good, and are adequate to meet the demand of the number of men in camp; a few small defects in the sinks and drainage can be remedied at small expense. I fully indorse the suggestion to asphalt an area of ground beneath the mess hall, connecting this surface with a drain in order that the floors may be flushed regularly and the water carried immediately away from the vicinity of the grounds.

I wish on the part of the command to thank you for the great improvement in the bathing facilities; the shower baths I consider the greatest acquisition to the camp possible, and one which will surely conduce to make the course of instruction a success.

During my tour of duty, the bath-house was open, to all holding permits, according to the regulations adopted for the previous command, which seemed to fulfill all requirements. I would recommend that a ticket be prepared which will allow the holder the daily privilege of the bath-house; the date could readily be cancelled by the superintendent of the baths upon presentation.

Upon my arrival in camp, I discovered the hospital steward's quarters and hospital tents to be located outside of the line of sentinels; this was changed upon my recommendation.

The members of the ambulance corps, while upon duty in this department, carried the red cross on the left arm of the fatigue blouse; this insignia allowed the wearer to pass certain posts at night while in the discharge of duty.

I would recommend that a Ducker field hospital be purchased for better care of those requiring medical attention at the State Camp of Instruction.

The superiority of this over a tent will readily be seen, as it is perfectly weather and water-proof. The many advantages of having those seriously ill upon the sick list, under the immediate eye of the surgeon, must be recognized; again, having such a barrack, will allow the medical officers of the camp to utilize every opportunity to instruct the detailed members of the ambulance corps in regard to hospital service.

The quartermaster's supplies, blankets, cots, etc., were clean and in good condition; but some system should be inaugurated for the more thorough daily ventilation of blankets previous to morning inspection.

At about 11.30 A. M. July second, the Thirty-fifth Separate Company left the camp for its respective station, all well and in marching con-

dition. At 5.30 p. m. we were relieved by the Ninth Regiment; turned the camp over formally to that command, and marched to Roa Hook. Major Stephen W. Roof reported to me upon arrival; after a short conference with him upon the sanitary condition of the camp, I rejoined my command.

Five men who had been upon the sick list the previous day, were directed to ride in the ambulance to Roa Hook.

The return to our armory, was accomplished by steamboat, and was uneventful. Every man was ready to cover the short march from the landing at Fifty-fifth street to our armory.

The Seventeenth Separate Company resumed the trip by steamer to its destination; this command is to be complimented for performing its week of duty without a man on the sick report.

I take this opportunity of thanking Hospital Steward Benedict of the Twenty-second Regiment, who kindly performed duty in this department during our week in camp.

In closing my report, I wish to accord to all the State officers my most sincere thanks for the many courtesies extended to me.

GENERAL.—I have the honor to report the tour of duty of the Forty-Seventh Regiment at the State Camp of Instruction near Peekskill, N. Y., from July ninth to July sixteenth inclusive.

The command left Brooklyn on the ninth of July at 11 A. M. on the steamer "Long Branch," arriving at Roa Hook about 3 P. M. and marching to the camp relieved the Ninth Regiment N. G. S. N. Y. The health of the men was perfect during the week, very few calls were made on the surgeons and several of those could have been avoided.

On the sixteenth of July about 3 P. M. the command was relieved by the Twenty-third Regiment N. G. S. N. Y., and started for Brooklyn marching to Roa Hook and thence by the steamer "Long Branch" arriving in Brooklyn at 8 P. M. without a single accident or case of sickness.

In the course of my duty as surgeon of the post, I made two regular inspections daily of the camp, one at 10 A. M. and again at 5 P. M., and it affords me great pleasure to be able to bear testimony to the painstaking and conscientious manner in which the various employés performed their functions.

I am satisfied that to the excellent and satisfactory shower-baths was due, much of the exemption from sickness enjoyed by the command; in this connection I am informed that not far from two hundred men daily availed themselves of the advantages of the baths.

The food was of good quality, in great abundance, and well prepared.

I recommended that tea be substituted for coffee at supper, which was complied with.

The water was good and plentiful and the drainage so far as I could discover was eminently satisfactory.

An improvement could be made by covering the ground under the mess hall with asphalt or some such material, the surface then being hard and not porous could be washed when necessary by the use of a hose and the water drained off.

Appended you will find the reports of the Forty-seventh Regiment which I trust will prove satisfactory. I also inclose the report of the medical officer of the Second Provisional Battalion.

SIR.—I have the honor to submit the following report of the Twenty-third Regiment during its tour of duty from July sixteenth to twenty-third inclusive, and also inclose consolidated report. During the week we had a total of four men in hospital, two reporting sick Sunday A. M., both suffering from old troubles; they were sent home Monday. The other two were sick from digestive troubles brought about by dietary indiscretions, and were returned to duty at the expiration of twenty-four hours. There was also a case of epilepsy, which was discovered by the patient having a fit, the case was promptly sent home. The above cases were the only ones relieved from duty. We had also one case of exhaustion occurring at the close of a severe battalion drill, which was attended to by the ambulance corps. The medical attendance required during the week was for minor ailments, for the most part brought about by change of habits incumbent on camp life, or for chronic troubles aggravated by exposure. The weather, as a glance at the meteorological record will show, was not particularly favorable, and the regiment was on two or three occasions thoroughly wet, but as the men promptly changed and dried their clothing no serious results followed. The surgeons found the men very willing to be guided by their advice in the matter of taking care of themselves.

The regiment left the camp for home during a very severe rain storm, caught another in Brooklyn and arrived at the armory in a very damp condition, but so far as can be learned no one is suffering from their week at the State Camp of Instruction. The sanitary condition of the camp was perfect, the mess hall and kitchen, ice-houses, etc., were remarkable for their cleanliness and freedom from all odors—the main camp well policed and always clean—the new sinks gave every satisfaction and were at all times perfectly sanitary. The drainage of the camps during heavy rains is in my opinion inadequate; the staff-band and servants tents were wet a large portion of the time while the main camp dried rather slowly, the last may be due to the peculiarity of the soil, which absorbs moisture more freely some times than at others. The shower-baths were at once recognized as a luxury as well as a necessity and were probably more appreciated and enjoyed by the regiment than any other adjunct of the camp; they were freely used. There is one suggestion that I wanted to

make and that is that the number of showers be at least doubled for many did not use them on account of having to wait so long for their turn. The food was plentiful, of good quality and well cooked; the water supply first class, both in quantity and quality. There was but three ounces of alcohol prescribed by the surgeons during the entire tour. I do not feel justified in having the ambulance corps detailed as a whole (on account of the small percentage of the regiment present in camp) for drill and instruction, so adopted the following method; a detail of three or four members of the corps was made daily from the several companies. Each detail reporting to the surgeons at 5.30 A. M., when they were instructed as to their positions, duties, etc. To my mind the method of having an ambulance detail parade out in full sight of a regiment, supplied with stretchers, ice, medicine case, flag, etc., has rather a demoralizing influence on those taking part in the drill. Our details took their place, usually at the ends of one of the company streets after the regimental line had been formed, supplied with all necessary articles, except the flag, and the first sergeants were told where they were to be found at adjutant's call, so that if any necessity arose for their use they could be called upon at once without any delay or confusion. We fortunately had but one call for service, and then the rapidity with which the detail arrived, the method in which they rendered aid, and the avoidance of all confusion, was favorably commented on. The regiment having afterward the utmost confidence in the corps; the corps was designated by a red cross pinned to the left sleeve of the blouse. All bathing parties were accompanied by a member of the corps, not in his charge but simply one of the party, but fortunately no serious occasion for their services arose. All members of the corps were willing to act as nurses, and three or four of them did for those in the hospital irrespective of company. The medical supplies allowed by the State and the sway allowed regimental surgeons are liberal and appreciated. The manner in which Acting Assistant Surgeon Cochran and our detailed Hospital Steward Welch attended to their several duties left nothing to be desired, and in conclusion permit me to congratulate you on the great service done the State by your able management of the medical department.

REPORT OF THE POST SURGEON.

ALBANY, N. Y., August 13, 1887.

To the Surgeon-General S. N. Y.:

SIR.—I have the honor to submit the following report of the tour of duty at the Camp of Instruction for the week ending July thirtieth.

Pursuant to G. O. No. 20, c. s. A. G. O., I proceeded to Peekskill, and reported myself to you for duty Saturday morning, July twenty-third. Having had to go to New York city a few days before the twenty-third I asked and received permission from the commanding officer of the Tenth Battalion to precede the command to camp, allowing the hospital steward to have care of any sick that might present themselves during the journey from Albany to camp. There was no need for his services.

Saturday, the twenty-third, with the ambulance, I met the Tenth Battalion at Roa Hook, at 2.10 P. M., and as soon as it had started for camp, the Seventy-first Regiment of New York, Colonel Kopper commanding, reached the dock in the steamboat "Long Branch." Major Marsh, surgeon of the regiment, and Captain Gwyer, assistant surgeon were both with the command. I stated that the ambulance was at their disposal, but there were no sick requiring its use. The weather was rainy and both commands reached camp wet.

Drs. Marsh and Gwyer, having reported to you, were directed to me for assignment to duty. For a detailed statement of the medical duty of the post I respectfully request attention to the inclosed report of Dr. Marsh.

Thursday, the twenty-eighth, leaving camp by the order of the post commander, I turned over to Dr. Marsh the orders received from you, relieving him again on Saturday morning.

Throughout the entire week the weather was most unfavorable, high temperature with great humidity and constant rains being experienced. Considering the amount of work done by the men, and the character of the weather, it is congratulatory to note that out of an average of 631 men daily in camp, but twenty-two had to be excused from duty on account of sickness.

The suggestion made by Dr. Marsh relative to enlarging the bath-house is fully indorsed by me. The baths were found to be a great comfort to the men, and were rarely empty, many waiting a chance to get in. If the number could be supplemented by either extending the present building or erecting another alongside, it would be advantageous to the post.

Owing to the extra drains laid last year, the camp cleared itself much more readily after a rainfall than heretofore. It is respectfully suggested that the camp ground be graded so that the gutters can carry all flow of surface-water to the receiving basins. It is further suggested that the gutters be flagged, the flags to be placed in a flat trough shape, rendering the passage of wheeled vehicles easy. Cobbled gutters would be apt to cause trouble, by reason of the grass that is likely to grow in them.

Dr. Marsh states in his report the sinks to be unsatisfactory. They were found to be so by myself. As you informed me the subject was under advisement as to remedial plans, I have no suggestions to offer, further than that the Legislature be asked for a special appropriation for the sanitary purposes of the camp.

The mess hall and kitchens were well kept, and due care was taken to preserve provisions. The cooking was good, and no fault can be found with the commissariat.

In conclusion, sir, I have but to thank the post commander and the members of the post staff for many kind courtesies. To Doctors Marsh and Gwyer, of the Seventy-first Regiment, my thanks are specially due for valuable aid. Both of these officers proved themselves of a high order of standing in their profession. They had the physical welfare of the two commands always before them, and neglected in no way to care for the health of the camp. Without parade or ostentation, the duty of these officers was so well arranged that at any time, night or day, medical aid could be immediately rendered. I consider it a pleasure to have been associated with them, and respectfully ask your favorable notice of their services.

Major LEWIS BALCH, *Medical Officer of the Post, State Camp, Peekskill, N. Y.:*

SIR.— I have the honor to inclose, herewith, the consolidated report of the Seventy-first Regiment and Tenth Battalion; also separate consolidated reports, and submit the following report of the tour of duty with the above named commands at the State camp, Peekskill, from July twenty-third to thirtieth, inclusive.

Before leaving for camp, I submitted a number of recommendations to Colonel Kopper, for the benefit of the regiment while at camp, and gave some advice to the members of the command, by means of a circular distributed to all. They are herewith inclosed, marked "Appendix A" and "Appendix B," respectfully.

The regiment left its armory, Broadway and Forty-fifth street, at 11.20 A. M., July twenty-third, in heavy marching order, and proceeded to the foot of Forty-fourth street, North river, where the steamer "Long Branch" was in waiting to convey it to Roa Hook. The regiment speedily embarked, and, at 11.45 A. M., the "Long Branch" headed for the camp. The weather, at the time of "assembly" and during the stay of the regiment in the armory, was close and muggy, and one man was prostrated by the heat, but rallied sufficiently to accompany the regiment. The march to the "Long Branch" was severe, owing to the heat, but no one fell out. Roa Hook was reached at 2.30 P. M., and in a drenching rain the march to the camp was quickly made. The usual ceremonies were observed, and the Seventy-first Regiment entered and took possession of about as wet a camp as any body of men ever entered. The Tenth Battalion of Albany, 196 strong, had arrived earlier in the day.

I reported to you, and routine duties were arranged substantially as follows, viz.: You exercising general supervision as post-surgeon; the medical care of the Seventy-first Regiment and Tenth Battalion devolving on the medical officers of the Seventy-first Regiment, who were also to attend "sick call" at 5.15 A. M.

Owing to the storm dress parade was not held Saturday night. The men turned in on Saturday night in anything but a comfortable condition; the tents and clothing being saturated by the heavy rains of the day and night. Drenching rains continued throughout the night. At "sick call" 5.15 A. M., Sunday, no one reported — a most remarkable occurrence, considering what the men had experienced the previous twenty-four hours. Rain continued during Sunday, day and night; but on Monday morning the weather was clear and warm. A number reported ill; and four, two from the Seventy-first Regiment, and two from the Tenth Battalion were excused from duty, and returned "sick in quarters." These cases were unimportant, and call for no special mention. The men's clothing being still wet, I recommended to Colonel Kopper that the battalion drill, set down for the morning, be omitted, and the morning be devoted to drying the clothing, and getting the camp in order. The recommendation was adopted, and the day was devoted to promoting the comfort of the men. A battalion drill was held in the afternoon.

Quite a number of complaints, such as diarrhœa, colic and constipation now occurred. Colonel Kopper went to see if blouses could not be provided for the men. Through the courtesy of Major-General Porter, the blouses then in store were issued, and were very acceptable, and the men's comfort was greatly increased.

Tuesday was clear and warm, but a south-east breeze made it comfortable. A number reported ill, and two from the Tenth Battalion were excused from duty, and returned one "sick in hospital," and one "sick in quarters. These cases were unimportant. The next morning was cloudy and warm. At "sick call" only one man was excused from duty, and returned as "sick in quarters." The day was very close and hot, the temperature being 98°. Battalion drill was held, and continued the required time. A few from both commands retired, being slightly overcome by the heat; but they required no medications; rest and cool air being all that was necessary.

During battalion and company drills, a medical officer was always present, and could be found, if not on the ground, at a point on the bluff, where he could view both commands. A part of the ambulance corps was also present, but no one knew of their being there, so unostentatiously was the service arranged.

On Wednesday afternoon I was informed that I was to act as post surgeon for the following three days. Agreeable to your instructions, I reported the next morning to the post adjutant for orders.

Battalion drill was held at the usual time, and continued until "recall." Although the morning was warm and close, no one suffered from the effects of the heat. As there had been a number of cases of colic, diarrhœa and indigestion, the result of over-feeding, I deemed it advisable to recommend that meat be omitted from the diet list for supper (July twenty-eighth), and boiled rice substituted, and accordingly so recommended on my 10 A. M. report. The diet list was changed in accordance with the recommendation. The wisdom of the measure was apparent, from the fact that no cases due to gastrointestinal irritation were reported during the night, or at "sick call" the next morning.

At "sick call" Friday morning, a corporal of Company D, Tenth Battalion, severely strained the deep muscles of his back and was excused from duty. At the time of the leaving of his command he had improved very much, but was carried to the station at Roa Hook on a stretcher.

The sanitary inspections were rigidly made. Noticing on the occasions of my visits to the men's sinks that the troughs were very full of fecal matter and very offensive, I advised Mr. Travers to flush

them oftener than the customary number of times (about seven or eight). He did so, but they still continued full and offensive. On two occasions, I noticed that one particular trough in the men's sinks was entirely dry and contained a large quantity of offensive fecal matter. This was remedied at once by Mr. Travers, who informed me that he had noticed the same thing on several occasions; and that but slight cause was required, on account of "some defect in the plumbing, to siphon off the water and leave the trough dry."

A drenching rain-storm broke over the camp at 3:45 P. M., lasting nearly three hours. No inconvenience, beyond wetting a few of the men and temporarily flooding the camp, resulted. The drainage being excellent, the streets were soon dried, and the camp was free from remaining water, except on the parade-ground, where large collections of water, almost knee-deep existed, and which caused the wetting of the feet of the band, drum corps and the officers and men of the companies, who had to march through them during the execution of the various movements incidental to the ceremony of dress parade. A proper filling-in, grading and draining of the parade-ground would remedy a condition which always exists after every heavy rain storm.

Five men were in the ambulance that followed the commands on leaving camp; three being members of the Seventy-first Regiment, and two of the Tenth Battalion.

Before being dismissed, two of the men were prostrated on account of the intense heat in the drill room, resulting from the lighted gas.

I desire, in this report, to particularly mention the manner in which the commissary department of the State was managed, and to say that no cause for complaint existed during the week. The food was well cooked, of excellent quality, and more than sufficient in quantity.

The baths now in camp have been of great service to the men, and I do not remember of a single case of skin eruption or chafing that required treatment by the surgeons. On an average about 250 bathed every day, the number could be easily doubled to the advantage of the men.

The most careful supervision was exercised over the men, and everything was done to promote their comfort. The tents after "taps" were examined to see if any of the men had turned in with their clothing on. Any so found were directed to remove their outside clothing. On hot days, after the men had gone to dinner, the tents were examined to see if they contained any sick stowaways. On several occasions men were found who were suffering slightly from the effects of the heat, and who preferred to remain quiet instead of

going to the mess hall. These were directed to go to the bluff, where the cool air speedily improved their condition, and nothing further, in the way of treatment, was required.

A consideration of the consolidated report will show a very light percentage of sickness (2.04 for Seventy-first Regiment, 6.66 for Tenth Battalion, 8.70 for both commands). The disorders prescribed for were few in number, and trivial (with one exception), in character. A glance at the meteorological record will show that the week just passed has been a dangerous one for a body of men to be in camp, on account of the high hygrometric condition of the atmosphere, high temperature and but little wind; for it is with these conditions that sun strokes, prostrations and severe gastro-intestinal disorders are most frequent and dangerous. The fact that 631 men could spend eight days in camp, the daily average temperature being 83 deg. F., and the weather conditions unfavorable, working from early morning until late at night, all their surroundings being entirely different from those to which they have been accustomed, with such a small percentage of sickness, speaks well for the general healthfulness of the location of the camp, the excellence of the sanitary arrangements, the good physique of the men, and the excellent care taken of them by those whose duty it was to look after their welfare. In this connection I wish to mention the valuable support afforded me by my assistant surgeon, Captain Gwyer, and to cheerfully accord to him the praise due him for his untiring attention to those under his medical charge.

It only remains for me to express to you my sincere thanks for the many courtesies extended to me during our official relations, and to acknowledge the courtesy which has been extended to me from all the State officers in camp.

APPENDIX "A."

The Commanding Officer of the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y.:

SIR.—The following recommendations are made for the benefit of this command, while at the State Camp of Instruction, Peekskill, N. Y., from July twenty-third to the thirtieth, inclusive.

Respectfully.

E. T. T. MARSH, M. D.,

Major and Surgeon.

First. That no hard work should be commenced until an hour after meals.

Second. That at least three hours elapse between the last meal and "retreat."

Third. That if the heat should be excessive, battalion drill should commence an hour after breakfast, instead of at a later hour, and continuing until noon; by so doing there would be less danger of the men being prostrated by the heat, and the drill could be brought to a finish without cutting it short. The company drills could be held at the time set down for the battalion drill, and the number of the men being smaller, advantage could be taken of the shade afforded by the trees around the parade-ground.

Fourth. That drill officers should give their men frequent rests during the excessively hot weather, at which time they should be allowed to remove their helmets or caps, and open their coats.

Fifth. That drill officers should carefully notice the condition of the men while drilling, and if any be noticed with pale countenances, he should be ordered to "fall out" at once, and be taken to a shady place and placed in a recumbent position, with head a little lower than the body, the clothing being opened and all bands loosened; word should be sent at once to the surgeons.

Sixth. That company servants should be directed to mix oatmeal or ginger with the water supplied to the men for drinking purposes. They should not be allowed to carry iced lemonade in their pails, as has been done on parades.

Seventh. That bathing should be permitted and encouraged. On account of the inconvenience, distance and liability to accident, swimming in the river should not be permitted. The men can bathe all that is necessary in the bath-houses now existing at the camp.

The Commanding Officer of the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y.:

SIR.—I deem it eminently proper at this time (the regiment having been ordered to the State camp at Peekskill, N. Y.,) to offer some advice to the members of the Seventy-first Regiment, and I do so by means of the accompanying suggestions.

The members of this command should bear in mind that they are going to a camp noted for its great healthfulness, where they will be well fed and well taken care of, and they should coöperate with the surgeon in keeping the sickness down to a minimum; this they can do if they will only pay attention to common-sense facts.

That all members of this command wearing trusses, should before going to camp, see that they are in good repair and properly adjusted.

That all members of this command who suffer from frequent attacks of looseness of the bowels should wear a light flannel band around the waist during their stay in camp.

That the men should provide themselves with the proper kind of boots or shoes, low heels, sole as broad as the foot when the weight of the body is resting upon it, and long enough to allow of the full play of the foot in walking; pointed shoes should not be worn.

That the men should not wear collars, or anything tight about the neck, and the rest of the clothing should be free and loose.

That the men should wear a folded wet cloth in the crown of the fatigue cap or helmet when exposed to the intense heat of the sun.

That the men should avoid the immoderate use of ice water, especially when overheated and at rest, or when the body is commencing to cool; violent cramps, purging and vomiting are apt to follow in consequence and immediate death has been known to occur.

That the men should remember that moderately cold water is the most grateful to the stomach and allays thirst better than any other fluid; ale, beer and the spirituous liquors are the worst of all, and their use during the tour of duty in camp should be rigidly avoided.

That the men should avoid eating unripe fruit of all kinds. That the men should bathe daily; by so doing skin eruptions and chafing

are prevented, or rendered less frequent. The feet should be carefully looked after and bathed; blistered feet will be less frequent if this is done. Sufficient time should be allowed for the feet to dry before putting on the stockings after bathing, as they are liable to be quickly blistered if active exercise is taken while the skin is still soft from the recent use of water, and the stockings are damp. Cold baths should not be taken immediately before or after a meal.

That the men should remember that exposure to a draught when overheated, which cools the body too suddenly, is exceedingly dangerous.

That the men should wear their suits of underclothing on alternate days, thereby allowing each suit to become thoroughly dried and aired before being worn again.

All who are unaccustomed to strong coffee are advised to dilute that served in camp largely with milk, otherwise they are liable to suffer from diarrhoea.

REPORT OF THE SURGEON OF THE TWENTY- SECOND REGIMENT.

NEW YORK, August 16, 1887.

The Surgeon-General State of New York:

SIR.—I have the honor to submit the following report:

On arrival of my regiment at camp, July thirtieth, obedient to General Orders No. 20, I reported for duty as post surgeon, relieving Major Lewis Balch. There were two organizations present, the Twenty-second Regiment and Second Battery, numbering 628 men.

Major Balch, who had been assigned, accompanying the regiment on its march, kindly volunteered to serve with it during the encampment, and Captain Sims, the assistant surgeon, being absent on leave, Assistant Surgeon J. A. Brucklow reported for duty with the battery.

The camp ground had been well policed by the out-going organizations, and was free from litter. This condition was maintained by both organizations. The water supply was abundant, and good in quality. School sinks and a water closet system, and shower baths, were the noticeable improvements. The former were badly constructed and very defective, but when altered to meet the design originally intended, will answer the wants of the place. Bad workmanship should not be allowed to condemn a system which works perfectly elsewhere. Sufficient money should be appropriated to correct this glaring evil, before another summer. The shower baths proved very useful and grateful to the men, and assisted greatly in keeping down heat eruptions and similar skin disorders, so common in former summers. The commissary department maintained its usual efficient condition, and no fault could be found with it in any particular. The accompanying tabulated report is worthy of notice, in connection with the marching of the Twenty-second to the camp. It shows the smallest number of sick in the history of the regiment in its camp tours—seventeen. Of this number, three only can trace their diseases to the march, and of this three only two were relieved from duty. Again, in two of them the fault was due to a violation of instructions

given before the march, in a failure to select the right kind of a shoe, so that blistering and ulceration resulted. The health of the battery was excellent, and were it not for the accident occurring the last night in camp, its sick report would have been blank.

SIR.—I have the honor to submit the following report, relating to the medical department of the regiment from July 28 to August 6, 1887.

This must naturally be divided into two parts, one descriptive of the medical work on the march and the other in camp.

It is not my intention to give a minute history of the march and I shall content myself, and hope to fulfill my duty, in restricting myself to generalizations. The preparations for the undertaking was simple enough, consisting of a small one-horse express wagon, for ambulance purposes and carrying of supplies and a hospital haversack. Two members of the regimental ambulance corps were detailed, under supervision of Hospital Steward Benedict, to accompany the wagon. Thursday evening the men marched about twelve miles and on arrival at the place of bivouac were in good condition.

A halt of ten or twelve minutes in each hour was made and one of a longer period at 6 p. m., for feeding purposes. The night was clear and atmosphere dry. The camp site was well selected, being on high, dry ground and covered with light sward. Little sleep was obtained, owing to the noise and careless chatter of a few thoughtless members, and all at reveille were unrefreshed.

The march was resumed about 5 a. m., under unfavorable circumstances; the air being very humid and the temperature high. Loss of sleep and lack of food began to effect the command by 11 o'clock; then a prolonged halt was made and beef juice and red wine were served to all. The effect of rest and food was magical, the men picked up in spirits and strength and took up the march with renewed zeal.

A long halt of five hours was made at Croton river in which the men were allowed, after judicious interval, to bathe and swim. Up to this time the ambulance had been used merely as a supply wagon and not a sick soldier was on the list; occasionally a man would drop out for half an hour, showing slight effects of the heat, and would patronize the ambulance. A word of encouragement and the use of a little stimulants served to make a good soldier of him again.

At the noon halt milk and bread were supplied in abundance and a fortunate thing it was for a severe test of endurance was about to come. A succession of severe thunder, wind and rain showers set in at 4 o'clock and continued without cessation till 8. Every man became wet through in spite of the rubber ponchos, and on arrival at the point selected for the second bivouac a choice had to be made between camping in wet clothing in a field whose grass and soil were saturated with water or to continue the march several miles further to Peekskill where we were promised the shelter of a house by Captain Finch. The latter alternative was chosen and the march continued. Even now the wagon did not fill with sick men, but it was wisely utilized by Dr. Balch, who brought up the rear, in giving well-timed aid to those to whom the strain was becoming too severe. On my arrival at the Finch mansion, 2.40 p. m., I arranged a sick bay, and four or five men found the needed rest and quiet there that was necessary.

Coffee and bread, and meat, were served at 9 p. m., and at tattoo a ration of whisky and quinine was given to all. Saturday morning before reveille all were up and about, the hospital room was emptied of the so-called sick, of the night before, and soon after getting a ration of bread and milk, the command was under way, sound in body and limb, and contented in mind.

Four hundred and thirty-seven men left Yonkers with the regiment and all but eight (8) marched into camp. The eight were stragglers or skulkers and deserve the contempt of the command. My claim that the march did not injure the men in any particular is substantiated by a reference to the accompanying tabulated sick report of the week in camp which shows not one person ill enough to go into the hospital for the first six days.

Again, and this will be the only reference I shall make to the week in camp, the sick report contains a smaller number of names for the same number of days than in any previous encampment. The advantages of the march, to my particular department were very great, furnishing a kind of instruction to be obtained in no other way. It set into practical operation a theoretical machine in which weak

points were detected, to be thrown out in future, and good ones seen, which will be preserved for use in time to come.

The ambulance corps which had been organized and instructed a few days before the march, did efficient service when called on, and will in time be a credit to the organization.

I wish to express my thanks to Major Balch, detailed to associate with me the ten days of our tour, and to state that he commands my respect as a gentleman and an efficient soldier.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL INSPECTOR OF RIFLE PRACTICE FOR 1887.

STATE OF NEW YORK :

DEPARTMENT OF RIFLE PRACTICE,
OFFICE NO. 8 COENTIES SLIP, NEW YORK CITY. }

The Adjutant-General State of New York :

SIR.—In making report for the year 1887 I have but little change to note, except a general feeling of increased interest, as exemplified in the tables accompanying. Following out your instructions, I early in the year visited and addressed upon the subject of rifle practice the officers of each organization in the State, and I think the result was beneficial, though the growth of such thoughts as I was enabled to impart is necessarily slow. I still hold to the idea that a more extended knowledge on the part of officers is what is most needed, and hope to see more effort to gain such knowledge. Perhaps it may best be gained by teaching those who are to be our future officers, and thus lay the foundation so deeply that it may grow from small to great degree by same process as we now educate the men for positions, in tactics and other matters of a soldier's duty.

The preliminary or so called free practice instituted under your directions early in May, and continued during the season, has had very beneficial effect, especially in First and Second Brigades, where most attention was paid to it. By a generous issue of ammunition, the principle of the practice may be had by all the troops, and I trust this may be allowed, and a further impetus be given the coming season.

At Creedmoor there were nearly twelve hundred (1,200) separate individuals practiced, many of them several times. At Buffalo about two hundred (200), and at Rensselaerwyck but few. The great gain

in marksmen in First and Second Brigades can, I think, be largely attributed to this practice. For instance:

And the gain is proportionately about the same in those who practiced, less than 100 men, during the free practice.

This year I would recommend about twelve (12) days free practice in the early part of the season, and not to continue after or during the later months. This, from the experience of last season, would be the best.

In the State at large the marksmen have increased 1,082. Third class (those who do not practice) have decreased 152; in other words, we practiced about 250 more men than in 1886.

In volley and skirmish, the increase in proficiency has been very marked, the percentage being 53.70, as against 50.09 in 1886.

RANGES.

Are generally in good condition, new ones having been provided principally at State expense at, Auburn, Niagara, Walton, Olean, and repairs at Bay View (Buffalo) and Schenectady. For specific information regarding all I would respectfully refer you to letter accompanying this and marked "A."

RECOMMENDATIONS.

An allowance of some specified amount for armory practice as mentioned last year would be a great help to deserving organizations ample allowance of field ammunition and where practicable transportation is a great incentive. Many men can spare time which would be taken up in practice if transportation and ammunition be furnished—but can not spare the means needed to provide same.

As you know efforts were made during the year to improve our arm, but it was not deemed wise to carry out the plans — I can only repeat my words of last year in regard to it.

The gradual, and this year greater increase in interest is very gratifying and a careful review will, I think, satisfy all that we are advancing — not standing still.

The Adjutant-General, State of New York:

SIR.— Below please find data relating to various ranges used by the State troops in rifle practice, of which the largest,

CREEDMOOR,

has been used by 5,000 individual members of the National Guard, under orders; and if those practicing during the so-called free practice be added, over 6,500 men have practiced here, at an expense to the State of about seventy cents per man, or, if transportation be added, one dollar and twenty cents per man. All infantry of the First and Second Brigades and the Fourth and Eleventh Separate Companies use this for their rifle practice—about 7,900 men in aggregate.

The range is in good condition, and the east pit having been renewed this year is in good shape; the line fences and fence on top of east butt, as also all the west butt, are in bad shape. During the past year complaints have been made of bullets dropping on contiguous grounds, and under an arbitration the National Rifle Association were obliged to pay \$500 to one party as damage arising from non-ability to use or till the land, besides leasing other portions at an expense of \$350. Some arrangement will have to be made to acquire the rights to this land, or the practice will be greatly hindered.

First Separate Company

Practices on new range built in 1886, at Penn Yan. In good condition.

Second Separate Company

Have abandoned their range on the fair grounds at Auburn and secured a new one on the line of the railroad; quite accessible. It was furnished by the State with new targets late in the fall of this year.

Third Separate Company.

Range at Oneonta in fair condition.

Fourth Separate Company,

Yonkers, practices at Creedmoor.

Fifth Separate Company.

Range at Newburgh in good shape; was new in 1886, and is well looked after.

Sixth Separate Company,

Of Troy, practices at Rensselaerwyck. (See Tenth Battalion.)

Seventh Separate Company,

Of Cohoes, practices at Rensselaerwyck. (See Tenth Battalion.)

Eighth Separate Company

Of Jamestown; lately reorganized. Nothing been done in way of practice.

Fourteenth Separate Company

Have range about three miles from Kingston, in good shape.

Fifteenth Separate Company.

Range near Poughkeepsie, was put in order—rebuilt in 1886, and is kept in first class order by the commandant of the Nineteenth Separate Company in whose charge it is.

Sixteenth Separate Company,

Of Catskill, has no range, but uses that at Kingston. As in my last report of 1886, I would say a little more energy on part of C. O., Sixteenth Separate Company could procure a suitable location for range near by.

Seventeenth Separate Company,

Of Flushing, practices at Creedmoor.

Eighteenth Separate Company,

Range near Glens Falls; in general good condition.

Nineteenth Separate Company,

Of Poughkeepsie. (See Fifteenth Separate Company.)

Twentieth Separate Company

Has range near Binghamton. Is well located, but ought to be rebuilt and have two sets targets.

Twenty-first Separate Company,

Of Troy, practices at Rensselaerwyck. (See Tenth Battalion.)

Twenty-second Separate Company,

Of Saratoga, should have new range and new targets. Range badly located; pit decayed; targets obsolete and worn out.

At Oswego, have used with the Thirty-eighth separate Company the grounds of the United States. In fair order considering location, nearness to armory. Should be more used for the benefit of these companies.

Thirtieth Separate Company,

Of Elmira. (See Twenty-sixth Separate Company.)

Thirty-first Separate Company,

Of Mohawk—range merely a temporary one and poor—if effort is made to get a good location should have help.

Thirty-second Separate Company,

Of Hoosick Falls, practice at Rensselaerwyck (See Tenth Battalion); effort should be made to get range nearer home.

Thirty-third Separate Company,

Of Walton, have good range and new targets in good shape.

Thirty-fourth Separate Company,

Of Geneva, nothing new of this range, is not as good as should be.

Thirty-fifth Separate Company,

Of Ogdensburgh, uses a range built by a rifle club; the present arrangement of targets (sliding) is bad; should, if possible, change location, and have some State help.

Thirty-sixth Separate Company,

has good range near Schenectady; had new targets this year, are in good shape.

Thirty-seventh Separate Company,

Of Schenectady. (See Thirty-sixth Separate Company.)

Thirty-eighth Separate Company,

Of Oswego. (See Twenty-ninth Separate Company.)

Thirty-ninth Separate Company,

Of Watertown; can only repeat what I said last year.

Fortieth Separate Company,

At Syracuse, are dead in rifle practice; no range, no effort to obtain any; might be armed with swords, do not know how to use a rifle.

Forty-first Separate Company,

Of Syracuse. (See Fortieth Separate Company, above.)

Forty-second Separate Company,

Of Niagara Falls have located new range and a good one, and have been supplied by the State with targets.

Forty-third Separate Company,

Of Olean, new company, have located good range, State supplied new targets.

REPORT OF BRIG.-GEN. LOUIS FITZGERALD ON FIRST BRIGADE AND PROVISIONAL BRIGADE.

The Adjutant-General State of New York:

SIR.—In accordance with p. 591 M. C., I have the honor to submit the following report of the First Brigade, N. G. S. N. Y.:

MOVEMENT OF TROOPS.

On Memorial Day, the First Brigade, consisting of the Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Eleventh, Twelfth, Twenty-second, Sixty-ninth and Seventy-first Regiments, and the First and Second Batteries, paraded under my command as participants in the commemoration ceremonies, and as escort to the Grand Army of the Republic.

On the sixteenth of September the Twelfth and Twenty-second Regiments proceeded to Philadelphia, Penn., under my command, to take part in the centennial celebration of the adoption of the Federal Constitution, returning the same day. They formed part of the Provisional Brigade detailed for that duty by S. O. No. 77, General Headquarters.

The following regiments of this brigade were present at the State camp in accordance with G. O. No. 20, General Headquarters: The Seventh, Ninth, Twelfth, Twenty-second and Seventy-first, part of the First Battery and all of the Second Battery.

The Twenty-second Regiment marched from its headquarters in New York to the camp.

On the 22d of April, 1887, the following transfers were made: Eighth Regiment to the armory corner of Thirty-fifth street and Broadway, previously occupied by the Seventy-first Regiment; Twelfth Regiment to the new armory corner of Sixty-second street and Ninth avenue, and the Seventy-first Regiment to the corner of Forty-fifth street and Broadway, previously occupied by the Twelfth Regiment.

STRENGTH OF THE BRIGADE.

The aggregate strength of the brigade by the quarterly return dated September 30, 1886, was 5,384; the strength for the corresponding quarter this year is 5,514, a gain of 130.

BOARD OF EXAMINATION.

The excellent system of examination which has existed for the last year before a competent and careful board of officers, has secured during that period officers fully informed as to the duties of their grade.

ENLISTMENT.

The bad condition and inadequacy of some armories has deterred enlistment, in a measure; but this is a temporary evil which the building of new armories will dispel. Anxiety to enlist should not be so great as to prevent the most searching inquiry into the character and mode of life of the applicant. A bad man in a command is a potent element of evil, a good one is an element of strength. The State funds should only be expended on her best citizens.

INSTRUCTION.

The instruction, theoretical and practical, of the officers of the brigade during the past year, from personal observation, and from the returns received from the several commands of the brigade and forwarded to general headquarters previous to June fifteenth, has been well performed.

A more uniform system, however, is essential, and the instruction of officers should be restricted to such practical matters as are likely to be of use in the State service. The distinction between regular soldiers and citizen soldiers is not invidious to the latter; each have peculiar duties to perform under widely differing circumstances, and it is not at all necessary for the one to be able to perform all the duties of the other. Thus, the citizen soldier will never and can never be called upon to perform long and arduous marches nor to take part in any warfare on such a scale as to require pitched battles, strategic movements or the higher order of tactics; and while such studies are interesting, the time occupied in their pursuit might be better employed in the preparation of the citizen for the simple and more practical duties of the soldier, the company and the battalion.

I recommend that a board of officers be convened either by the Adjutant-General or by the brigade commander, to prepare a course of instruction for officers; in the former case subject to the approval of the Adjutant-General, in the latter to the approval of the brigade commander.

ARTILLERY.

The artillery should be provided with proper armories, and no effort should be spared in placing in their hands the most approved breech-loading and magazine guns. The armories should be built adjoining or as near as practicable to the armories of the infantry, for mutual protection, so that they could be moved together to the scene of any disorder. A support is always necessary to artillery and vital in street fighting. In addition to the mounted drills, which should be as numerous as possible, the batteries should have practice in actual firing. Instead of going into the State camp, they should be put under canvas on the reservation of a United States fort in the harbor, where there is ample space and where the sanitary conditions are good. The contact with officers and men of the regular army would give them an opportunity for acquiring information that they could not obtain under other circumstances. Permission from the federal authorities is always cheerfully given for that purpose.

RIFLE PRACTICE.

Renewed efforts on the part of the officers and men have produced improved results in rifle practice, and although the access to the range is as inconvenient as ever, a large number of the brigade have availed themselves of the opportunity for practice. Some slight friction has arisen in relation to the arrangement of dates for general practice, which might be obviated by the assignment to the brigade of a certain number of dates from which the brigade commander could make the assignments to the several organizations in his command.

INSPECTION.

The inspections of last year and this year have demonstrated the desirability of holding the annual inspections at the close of the drill season in the spring, instead of at the commencement of the season in the autumn. In the former case the troops are well in hand and perform the required evolutions with precision, while in the autumn they show the inevitable effects of a long vacation. It is my earnest desire to instruct my command in the field, and for obvious reasons the autumn is the only time suitable for such exercises, but on account of the preparation for and performance of the ceremony of inspection, it has been impossible to arrange any autumnal manœuvres without too great inconvenience to the commands.

To the Adjutant-General State of New York, Albany, N Y.:

SIR.—I have the honor to report that in pursuance of Special Orders No. 77 General Headquarters. I assumed command of the Provisional Brigade therein designated, comprising the Twelfth, Twenty-second and Twenty-third Regiments and the Second, Eighth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-second, Twenty-sixth, Thirtieth, Thirty-second, Thirty-fifth, Thirty-ninth, and Forty-first separate companies, on the morning of Friday, September sixteenth and proceeded to Philadelphia *via* the Pennsylvania Railroad, transportation having been arranged by the Commissary-General of the State.

The troops were embarked with as little delay as possible, considering the large number of men to be accommodated. The last section of the train left Jersey City about half an hour after the time agreed upon, *viz.*: 8 A. M. The train consisted of five sections of about ten cars each. On reaching Philadelphia it was apparent that considerable delay would occur in getting into the P. W. & B. depot, our destination, owing to a blockade. I ordered the troops at once to disembark, being within about six blocks of the place of rendezvous, with directions where and how to form. A staff officer of the National Guard of Pennsylvania reported to me, as previously requested, on my arrival and furnished such information as I desired.

After the parade, under the command of Lieutenant-General Phil. H. Sheridan, U. S. A., was finished, I ordered the Provisional Regiment and the Twelfth Regiment to Germantown Junction, each under the escort of a staff officer, the same sections which brought them to Philadelphia having been ordered to meet them there at 3 P. M., with their knapsacks and haversacks, all of which were left by my direction in the cars.

They arrived in New York the same evening about 8 o'clock. The Twenty-second and Twenty-third Regiments having accepted the hospitality of the Pennsylvania National Guard proceeded at once to the armory of the First Regiment, National Guard of Pennsylvania. I then relinquished the command. These regiments returned safely during the night to New York. By my sanction they made their own arrangements for the hour of departure from Philadelphia with the P. R. R. Co. The concentration of the separate companies, has not only shown the facility of mobilization of the State troops but also their thorough military instruction acquired through the efforts of the present able administration.

The promptness and efficiency of the commanding officers of the Twelfth, Twenty-second and Twenty-third regiments is worthy of especial mention. The discipline of the men in every command as far as came within my observation left nothing to be desired.

I take pleasure in inviting the attention of the department to the energy and ability displayed by my quartermaster, Major Wendell Goodwin, in all the details of his varied and important duties. I wish also to invite attention to the excellent work done by my aides, Captains W. Emlin Roosevelt and Francis R. Appleton.

The citizens of the State of New York can well be proud of the appearance and soldierly bearing of its National Guard at the Centennial Celebration of the adoption of the Federal Constitution.

REPORT OF GEN. J. G. FARNSWORTH

ON THE

CONDITION OF THE WAR CLAIMS OF THE STATE AGAINST THE
UNITED STATES, DECEMBER 31, 1887.

ALBANY, *December 31, 1887.*

To the Adjutant-General, State of New York:

SIR.—I have the honor to report that during the past year the work of prosecuting the claims of the State for expenses incurred for raising troops for the United States service during the war of the rebellion has been steadily progressing; that I have obtained further allowances and that there now stands to the credit of the State on the books of the Treasury department \$60,638.94, as will appear by reference to the letters of the second comptroller and the third auditor hereunto annexed. This amount will be included by the Secretary of the Treasury in the schedule that he transmits to Congress of funds to be provided for in the appropriation bills of the present session.

These allowances have been made by the accounting officers of the treasury upon vouchers that have previously been examined and rejected because they did not conform to the requirements of the auditing officers, for lack of proper proofs that the expenditures were made in compliance with the act of Congress that provides for their payment when presented in proper form, and for other informalities and irregularities.

The lapse of over twenty years since the expenditures were incurred, the deaths and removals from the States to parts unknown of many persons from whom valuable evidence might have been procured, the imperfect manner in which the records were kept in some departments of the State during the war, the loss or mislaying of vouchers and of papers containing corroborative evidence regarding expenditures, render the work of supplying new proofs, of completing imperfect vouchers and of making explanations to the accounting officers that will secure satisfactory results, difficult to perform and often tedious and perplexing.

Before I was placed in charge of this work, the plan pursued was that of selecting from the claims originally rejected, those that seemed most likely to be admitted and that could most readily be put in condition to meet the requirements of the accounting officers, to whom they were again submitted and on a portion of them allowances were obtained. This process had been carried on until it was reported that nearly all that could be admitted, under existing rules, had been passed upon and allowed; the remainder consisting of the vouchers that were most difficult, and in many cases impossible, to put in such shape as to meet with favorable action.

The work commenced last year, of taking up all the disallowed and suspended vouchers in regular order and in each case putting them in condition so far as possible, is being carried on and as rapidly as they are prepared they are laid before the third auditor and second comptroller for their action and upon them I confidently expect further allowances.

The annexed statement of the condition of the claims, giving the original installments and the allowances that have been made, shows a balance of \$1,017,936.41 due to the State. Of this amount the interest in Comptroller's bonds issued in 1861, the expenditures for sanitary supplies, for defense of New York harbor, for transporting and paying, etc., troops employed to protect our northern frontier from raids from southern refugees in Canada in 1863-4, for duties paid on arms imported in 1863, for care of the sick and wounded and for the expenses of the agents of the State employed in caring for the wants and providing for the common comforts of our troops in the field, all included in the original installments, have been totally disallowed, and will not be paid to the State without further action of Congress.

Efforts will be made during the present session to obtain such action of Congress as will lead to the modification of the laws and rules governing the accounting officer of the treasury and thus authorizing the admission of a large number of the claims for war expenditures, in many instances acknowledged by the general government to be just and equitable, but rejected for informalities and technical reasons, as not coming under the provisions of the act of Congress approved July 27, 1861.

I have prepared and placed in the hands of Hon. Frank Hiscock and Hon. Charles Tracey bills for refunding the duties paid by the State on arms imported in 1863 and issued to troops raised for the United States service, amounting to \$42,796.87; if not already introduced they will be on the first day set apart for introduction of bills, both in the Senate and the House of Representatives.

A bill has also been prepared, and will be introduced at the earliest opportunity, for the payment of certificates issued by the State to the soldiers of 1812.

A bill has been introduced in the United States Senate for refunding to the several States the direct tax levied by the general government in 1861, and it is probable that the efforts that will be made to secure its passage will be successful. During the last Congress a similar bill passed the Senate with but one dissenting vote, and would probably have passed the House of Representatives if it could have been reached before final adjournment. Should this bill become a law, under its provision the State would receive somewhat over \$2,000,000.

A bill also has been introduced in the Senate for readjustment of interest due this and other States on account of the war of 1812 on the same basis that settlements were made under the provisions of acts of Congress with Maryland, Massachusetts and other States. Under the provisions of this bill New York would receive over \$100,000.

Other bills will be introduced as early as practicable or when it is thought they can be presented without embarrassing bills involving the interests of the State, already pending, for refunding the interest on Comptroller's bonds and the expenditures for defense of the Canadian frontier in 1864, unless general legislation so modifies the laws and rules governing the accounting officers of the treasury that these claims can be taken up and allowed.
