



REPORT.

GENERAL HEAD-QUARTERS, STATE OF NEW YORK, ADJUTANT-GENERAL'S OFFICE, ALBANY, December, 31, 1889.

Hon. DAVID B. HILL,

Governor and Commander-in-Chief.

Sir.—I have the honor to submit my report for the year 1889, as follows:

NATIONAL GUARD.

The National Guard now comprises fourteen regiments, one battalion and forty-five separate companies of infantry, five batteries of artillery, one troop of cavalry and two signal corps.

The Eleventh Regiment, station New York city, was mustered out January fourteenth. A troop of cavalry was mustered into the service, in New York city, April second, designated as Troop "A" and attached to the First Brigade.

The quarterly returns of the thirtieth September ultimo, show that on that date there were in service 744 officers and 13,478, enlisted men, making an aggregate of 14,222, officers and men.

At nearly every session of the Legislature propositions are made to add to the military forces of the State. The plans presented are frequently the production of theorists, and not infrequently of persons having some special purpose to accomplish. So far as they represent a popular interest in promoting military knowledge, they may well be considered, but whenever they discover a tendency to conflict with the discipline and efficiency of the established force, they should be resisted.

Better evidence of an increasing interest in military matters, and of a desire on the part of the young men of the State to enter its military service, is found in the large number of applications, coming from all parts of the State, for authority to raise companies, batteries or troops. The National Guard is limited by law to 15,000 enlisted men, a number believed to be sufficient for all practical purposes, at least for the present. This limit has been so nearly approached that it is hardly safe to go any farther, for a sufficient margin must always be maintained, in order that it may not become necessary to stop recruiting, and to avoid the danger of illegal enlistments. It is not probable, therefore, that any new organizations will be mustered in, until the strength of the force is reduced by disbandments or otherwise.

However, should the Legislature incline to increase the number of the State forces, there should be no doubt as to the direction in which it should be done. That it is of the first importance that in all the sea-coast States men should be trained in the use of heavy guns, and organized to man the harbor, river and lake defenses, will not be questioned. For this purpose an increase of twelve or fifteen hundred enlisted men would be sufficient for this State in time of peace, but it is believed that it would be advisable to

begin with a smaller number, say four heavy batthese batteries become proficient. teries. and as It is understood other batteries. organizing War Department is ready and willing furnish facilities for instruction, and for the encampment of troops at the forts in New York harbor and elsewhere, and it is therefore recommended, provided any increase is to be authorized, that provision be made for the organization of such number of heavy batteries, not to exceed twelve, as the commander-in-chief may deem necessary.

The principal difficulty in the way of increasing the force lies in the necessarily increased expense, for it is useless to organize troops with the purpose of relying on them for service, unless the State provides everything that is essential to enable them to make themselves proficient as soldiers. Troops that maintain themselves at considerable cost, as it inevitably must be, cannot be made to understand the necessity of submitting to the restraints of discipline, and will seldom contribute the time as well as money demanded for the various branches of the art of war with which the modern soldier must become familiar. Such soldiers are of little or no practical use, except it may be for parades. For these reasons, and as it is doubtful whether the Legislature will consent under present circumstances to larger appropriations for military purposes, it is worthy of consideration whether it would not be well to make one of the regiments in the city of New York a heavy artillery regiment.

There is a way, by which it has been suggested, room could be made for new organizations, and which would afford an opportunity to muster in some heavy batteries, viz., by reducing the maximum of enlisted men allowed to a company. It is to be said in favor of this proposition that by increasing the number of organizations, there would be a larger number of officers and non-commissioned officers in training at all times. More than this, there appears to be no valid reason why a company should be maintained at its war strength in time of peace.

ARMS, EQUIPMENTS, UNIFORMS.

Notice has been received from the general government that the new 3-2 inch field guns, for which, together with all the component parts of a battery, requisition was made upon the War Department nearly two years ago, will be delivered within a few weeks. The Chief of Ordnance, United States Army, reports that the caissons, battery wagons and forges, will be completed the coming year, but says there may be some delay in procuring the necessary harness. It is to be hoped that it may soon be possible to arm all the State batteries with this gun.

The need of new rifles to replace the Remington is urgent, but the time has not yet arrived when it can be determined what the rifle, or even what its calibre shall be. It is announced by the United States Ordnance Department that a thirty-calibre rifle, which is entirely satisfactory, has been made, and that a thirty-calibre magazine arm is in process of construction, but unfortunately the status of the powder question resulting from the advent of the so-called smokeless powder, leaves the question of what the new small arm should be, still unsettled.

The recommendations in regard to equipments, tents and blankets, heretofore made, that a larger supply should be kept constantly on hand, ready for use, but to be issued only in an emergency, are renewed.

The overcoats, and fatigue coats or blouses, recently issued, are serviceable and satisfactory. The dress-coat has never been entirely satisfactory, but any change that has been suggested necessitates such a large expenditure that it is questionable if a sufficient appropriation can be obtained at the present time.

Under the law as it now stands, the counties are required to provide armories for organizations within their limits, furnish heat and light, and pay for armorers, There seems to be no reason engineers and janitors. why these burdens should be imposed upon The National Guard is county treasuries. force, and its maintenance, it would appear, should and equally by the whole fairly Moreover, as a military consideration, it is submitted that the armories, which are in fact military posts, should be directly under the charge and control of the State. It has apparently been the unwritten policy of the Legislature, for several years past, to erect three or four armories

annually, anticipating the time when the title to all the armories will be vested in the State. It is hoped that this policy may be pursued; that new armories may be constructed where they are most needed; that from time to time the title to armories erected by counties may be acquired, and that provision for all military requirements may be made by the State. When this is accomplished, it will be found that the National Guard is established upon a firmer basis, and that the interests of the service will be subserved in many ways.

THE CAMP OF INSTRUCTION.

The Camp of Instruction was opened this year the twenty-second day of June and closed the seventeenth day of August. The troops on duty there were:

The Seventh Regiment, June twenty-second to June twenty-ninth.

The Seventy-first Regiment and a battalion composed of the Fifth, Sixth, Eleventh and Seventeenth Separate Companies, designated as the First Battalion, June twenty-ninth to July sixth.

The Ninth Regiment and the Tenth Battalion, July sixth to July thirteenth.

The Twenty-third Regiment, July thirteenth to July twentieth.

The Twenty-second Regiment, July twentieth to July twenty-seventh.

The Forty-seventh Regiment and a battalion composed of the Ninth, Thirty-sixth, Forty-fourth and Forty-sixth Separate Companies, designated as the Second Battalion, July twenty-seventh to August third.

The Twelfth Regiment and a battalion composed of the Thirty-fifth, Thirty-eighth, Forty-third and Forty-fifth Separate Com-

panies, designated as the Third Battalion, August third to August tenth.

The Seventy-fourth Regiment and a battalion composed of the Second, Third, Twenty-fourth, Twenty-fifth and Thirty-second Separate Companies, designated as the Fourth Battalion, August tenth to August seventeenth.

A detachment from the First, Second or Third Battery was also detailed to the camp each week.

The Adjutant-General was assigned to duty as Post Commander, the Chief of Ordnance as Post Quartermaster, Commissary of Subsistence and Ordnance Officer; Colonel Joseph G. Story, Ordnance Department, as Assistant Quartermaster, Commissary of Subsistence and Ordnance Officer; Colonel Frederick Phisterer, Acting Assistant Adjutant-General, as Post Adjutant and Paymaster; Captain John S. Shepherd as Assistant Post-Adjutant; Colonel Thomas McGrath, Assistant Inspector-General, as Inspector; Captain N. B. Thurston as Instructor in Guard Duty.

Officers were also detailed from the staff and line, as assistants to the post staff, for purposes of instruction and practice. See General Orders No. 26, which with copies of the General Orders of the year, is made a part of the report.

Lieutenant-Colonel Alexis Smith, Twenty-third Regiment, was assigned to the command of the First Battalion; Major Wallace A. Downs, Seventy-first Regiment, to the command of the Second Battalion; Major Henry Chauncey, Jr., Eight Regiment, to the command of the Third Battalion, and Colonel Alexander S. Bacon, to the command of the Fourth Battalion. With these, officers were detailed from various organizations as Battalion Staff Officers, as may be seen by reference to the order above cited. The following tables show the attendance of the organizations ordered to the camp.

The recommendations made in previous reports, looking to the proper maintenance of the camp as a permanent institution for military instruction, are renewed. Placed on an established foundation, systematized as a school with a staff of competent instructors, it will accomplish much more for the military forces of the State than has been or can be done in any other manner, or under any other system. But to attain the full measure of success, it is in the first place necessary that there should be an officer permanently in charge of it as a camp of instruction, or rather that there should not be frequent changes in such a position, together with several carefully chosen assistants who should receive such pay as would enable them to give all their time to the service. As suggested in a previous report, there would be plenty of work to be done by such officers during the season when the camp is closed, work which is now of necessity too much neglected.

It is urged in various quarters entitled to consideration. that camps should be held for not less than ten days, preferably two weeks. From a strictly military point of view, this is undoubtedly true. It is also true that four weeks would be better than two. Those who have had experience with State troops, however, have learned to make haste slowly, and understand that it is a fatal mistake to undertake plans which involve more time than men can afford to give. Our troops are sent to camp for a week's tour of duty, once in two years. While it must be admitted that greater progress could be made if they were sent every year, or for longer tours, it is well understood that there are not a few instances where it becomes a hardship to render even the simple duty required. Before there can be any material change accomplished in this respect, popular opinion must recognize, and especially must employers be taught to understand, the necessity, as well as the obligations, of military service by citizens to the State.

An error which involves a similar lack of consideration is made by those military authorities who favor encampments by brigade, rather than what they style the "New York method." A careful observer of the experiments that have been made with State troops can not fail to have noticed, that at brigade encampments the time of a large number of men is taken up, and a large expenditure of money and property incurred, with little profit or advantage for anybody, except, perhaps the benefit derived from actual practice by a few ranking officers. By, this it must not be understood that it is believed that there should be no further instruction, theoretical or practical, than that which is pursued at the State camp. On the contrary, the New York method contemplates practical field exercises or manœuvres, by bodies of troops, selected from those that have sufficiently profited by the opportunities afforded them in their armories and at the camp.

A large part of the National Guard is already qualified for this kind of service, and expeditions or movements might well be undertaken, from time to time, in various parts of the State, having a definite military object in view, which if carried out in accordance with military principles, and under the strictest military rule, would be of great advantage to the troops engaged.

The New York method embraces the armory, the camp and the field. In the armory men are set up, taught the manual of arms and the principles of firing, and practiced in squad, company, and so far as the space allows, battalion movements. They are also instructed theoretically and to a limited extent practically, in skirmishing and guard duties. In many armories there are also facilities for gallery target practice.

At camp, the troops are practiced chiefly in exercises that can not well be executed in a drill-room. They are also thoroughly instructed and practiced in guard duties, and should be made to understand theoretically and practically the principles of grand guards. They are also made familiar with military customs, which it is essential that every soldier should understand, as well as with the workings of the machinery of military government. In this second stage of instruction, is included the rifle-range,

although rifle practice, as clearly demonstrated by experience, should not be made a part of the duty at camp. Practice at the range is required every year of every infantry soldier, and men of the other arms are also permitted to take part in practice.

With field exercises, comprising instruction and practice of brigades or larger bodies in the duties of grand guards, advance guards and rear guards, marches by rail and otherwise, attack and defense of positions, matters of minor tactics, and whatever pertains to the conduct of troops in a campaign, the New York method is complete so far as contemplated at the present time.

MOVEMENTS OF TROOPS.

All the troops of the State were concentrated in the city of New York, April thirtieth last, under the immediate command of the Commander-in-Chief, to take part in the Centennial Celebration of the inauguration of the First President of the United States.

The discipline and soldierly appearance of the National Guard elicited universal commendation.

The "Old Guard," New York city, under the law a part of the military forces of the State, followed the National Guard column on the parade.

The pay, transportation, subsistence, etc., for this parade amounted to the sum of \$97,886.35.

Olmsted's Sixth Battery, under orders from general headquarters, made a march September fourth to tenth, last. The report of the commanding officer is appended hereto. This kind of work, when properly conducted, and especially when coupled with target practice, as it was in the case of the march of Auer's Battery last year, is of great value, and should be undertaken whenever possible.

Some excellent field work was done by the Thirteenth Regiment on Long Island, this season. The reports sent to this office are interesting, and indicate a knowledge of their duties on the part of the officers making them that deserves commendation. These reports, however, are too voluminous to be made a part of this report.

TARGET PRACTICE.

Surprising progress has been made in rifle practice. In some organizations, nearly every officer and man has qualified as a marksman. Great credit is due to the zealous and efficient General Inspector, and the Brigade and Regimental Inspectors of rifle practice. In their department, there is no demand for any extraneous assistance; but it is believed that some changes may be made, with advantage, in the system pursued.

It is quite as important for the light batteries that they should be afforded facilities and opportunities for target practice as it is to provide ranges for the infantry. With the new guns, long range practice with shot and shell becomes an absolutely essential part of an artilleryman's training. It is a matter of more immediate consequence than the question of procuring horses. Horses may be supplied and sufficiently trained in a comparatively short time, but skill in range finding and firing can only be attained by careful instruction and practice.

Bureau of Records of the War of the Rebellion.

In my last report it was stated that the Bureau of Records of the War of the Rebellion had sent out during the year preceding, over 6,000 communications in response to applications for certificates of service, records of officers and enlisted men, names and addresses of officers and volunteers, and other matters connected with the War of the Rebellion; this year the number of responses sent out is 8,310, not including replies to requests made in person.

In July, the Secretary of War created in his department a Division of Records and Pensions, uniting therein all the former divisions of records of volunteers existing in the Adjutant-General's and Surgeon-General's offices. This arrangement has worked for the benefit of all concerned, and the division is not only up to its daily work, but there are already a large number of clerks at work preparing the records of volunteers on the card-index system. It is understood that the records of volunteers of this State are the first to be arranged in this manner, they being in the poorest condition, and that when thus completed and Congress makes the necessary appropriation they will be printed, and the State secure thereby all the records of her volunteers that are to be found in the War It is respectfully recommended that the Department. Legislature pass a concurrent resolution requesting the members of Congress from this State to further this project by advocating the appropriation of the necessary means.

The copying of records of volunteers for this office by the clerks in the War Department has been discontinued by the order of the Secretary of War, but the records of thirteen regiments commenced are to be completed, which will give the State a nearly complete record of her volunteer organizations, excepting only about thirty volunteer and fifty militia regiments, which lack will be of but temporary disadvantage if the plans of the officer in charge of the Record and Pension Division of the War Department is carried out.

WAR CLAIMS.

The progress that has been made in the collection of these claims against the United States is shown in the report of General Farnsworth submitted herewith.

APPROPRIATIONS.

The following appropriations were made by the Legislature, with your approval, this year for military purposes.

For expenses of the National Guard, \$400,000.

For services and necessary traveling expenses in prosecuting the war claims of the State against the United States, \$5,000.

To procure missing records of New York volunteers, and to prepare the same for publication, \$10,000.

For painting repairs and betterments to the State Arsenal at Buffalo, \$3,000.

For painting and repairs of the State Armory at Oswego, and grading grounds adjacent thereto, \$6,000.

For painting and repairs of the State Armory at Syracuse, \$5,000, and for repairs and renewal of walks in the park of said armory, \$1,500.

For repairs and betterments of the armory at Hoosick Falls, \$5,630.

For deficiency in the appropriation for repairs to and alterations of the sewerage of the State Armory of Schenectady, for furnishing said armory with heating apparatus, and for other improvements and repairs, \$1,500.

For the payment of bills for work and materials for fitting up the rooms of the Sixty-fifth Regiment Armory, at Buffalo, \$702.

For the repairs of arsenals and armories belonging to the State, \$10.000.

For the erection of an armory at the city of Albany, reappropriation \$80,000, additional appropriation \$30,000.

For the erection of an armory at Saratoga Springs, reappropriation \$25,000, additional appropriation \$12,000, additional appropriation to improve the site \$5,000.

For repairs and improvements in and about the State armory at Walton, \$3,000.

For the erection of an armory in the city of Brooklyn, \$300,000. For the erection of a mess hall and kitchen, and for other improvements at the Camp of Instruction, Peekskill, \$25,000.

To provide a rifle range for the use of the National Guard at Creedmoor, and to acquire additional lands for such range,

\$25,000.

For the pay, transportation, subsistence, etc., of the National Guard taking part in the centennial celebration of the inauguration of the first President of the United States, \$125,000.



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REPORT ON STATE CAMP.

By LIEUTENANT-COLONEL RICHARD LODER, Fifth United States Artillery.

FORT WADSWORTH, N. Y. H., September 18, 1889.

To the Adjutant-General, U. S. A., Washington, D. C.:

GENERAL.—In accordance with Special Orders No. 123, dated Headquarters of the Army, Adjutant-General's office, Washington, D. C., May 28, 1889, and special instructions transmitted in letter of same date, I have the honor to submit the report of the inspection of the troops of the National Guard of the State of New York, at the Camp of Instruction at Peekskill, N. Y., and covering a period from June 22 to August 17, 1889.

I reported to the Post Adjutant on the twenty-second, about the time of the arrival of the Seventh Regiment, and was at once

placed in a position to perform my duties.

Previous to the arrival of the troops all necessary orders had been issued and, I believe, well considered by the officers concerned, as work was promptly commenced in accordance with the letter and spirit (so far as was understood), of said orders.

My first, and I may also say my last, act was a careful consideration and inspection of the camp and grounds. Of the arrangement of these I need hardly speak, as an examination of the reports of the previous inspectors convinces me that full justice has been done and detailed descriptions given. The few changes made are to the benefit of the camp, and two in particular can be mentioned here: First, the substitution of new tents for those previously in use; and, secondly, the adoption of incandescent electric lights for the camp grounds; the latter an innovation of camp life, but certainly a pleasing one and in the direction

of modern progress, though some military critics considered it destructive to their ideas of camp propriety.

In considering the sanitary condition, I cannot better bring out the pith than by quoting from the report of the Surgeon-General, Brigadier-General J. D. Bryant, National Guard, State of New York, as follows:

"The complete establishment of the State Camp and of its perfect sanitary condition, as exemplified by the continued absence from it of any illness that can be attributed to a want of sanitation has reduced the medical report in this special respect to merely a perfunctory act."

* * * * * * *

The orders of General Porter and the vigilance of his inspectors all tend to a perfect police, and to aid the head of the medical department in every way in the endeavor to destroy all germs and eliminate all danger from camp disorders.

STAFF DEPARTMENTS.

Adjutant-General's.

An examination of the report of the Adjutant-General, State of New York, Josiah Porter, for 1888, will show at once the efficiency of this department, its organization and work.

In addition to his duties as Adjutant-General, General Porter is now, and has been for several years, in command of the Camp of Instruction, and, assisted by Colonel Phisterer, the acting Assistant Adjutant-General of the State, has succeeded in carrying out the idea of instructing and fitting officers for the duties of this office.

Captain J. S. Shepherd, of the Twenty-third, was continuously on duty as assistant, having been prepared through previous details for this duty (acting assistant post-adjutant). Other officers were detailed as acting assistant post-adjutants to remain at headquarters, each one week in advance of their organizations, in order that their knowledge of the duties might be comprehensive, so that when actually on duty with their commands they would only have to put in practice the knowledge acquired. In consequence of this care in training the regimental adjutant's work was promptly and well performed at all times; no irregularities or

hitches were noticed; no instruction necessary when the time for a certain duty came.

At headquarters the routine work was finally machine-like in its regularity. The method of conducting the work has been noticed in other reports.

INSPECTOR-GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT.

The department was represented by Colonel T. H. McGrath, acting Inspector-General, with whom the work is a labor of love. His duties were confined more to camp inspection, but he reported on and corrected irregularities wherever noticed. * * * He was assisted by officers detailed as in the Adjutant-General's department.

SUPPLY DEPARTMENTS.

Were all consolidated under General Varian, Chief of Ordnance, who paid occasional visits. Colonel J. G. Story, his assistant, remained from the time he prepared camp for the troops until every matter had been disposed of for the season. All details of issuing and returning property; arrangements, care and preservation of material, and, in fact, everything outside the purely military element was left to him. * * *

The messing arrangement by contract has been fully explained in previous reports.

The present buildings, erected in 1882, in thirty-six hours, were only temporary structures, and could not be made permanent.

The transportation of troops to and from different parts of the State, so as to be on hand and to leave exactly at the proper time, without undue delay, is an example of mobilization on a small scale. Colonel Story has this systematized so thoroughly that these conditions are fulfilled, and in mobilization his experience would be invaluable.

The cost of transportation of troops (5,500) in 1888 was \$19,353.82; for camp equipage and stores, \$9,497.84.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

I have had occasion to refer already to this department while speaking of the sanitary condition of the camp, but it is worthy of further reference, and to one point in particular,

that is the system of special training preparatory to rendering prompt aid to the injured that Dr. Bryant has introduced into the National Guard of New York. The idea contemplates the extending of aid to the unfortunate citizen who may suffer from the effects of physical violence, received in the daily walks of life, as well as to the National Guardsman who may fall while on his special duty. Trained National Guardsmen may thus aid the citizen in other ways than as a "man under arms." Details are ordered from companies, and instruction given by the medical corps. Proficiency is ascertained by a board of medical examiners, and those found proficient are presented with a suitable badge testifying to their ability.

The surgeon and assistant surgeons, during their camp tours, as also the hospital stewards, are careful and attentive, and take pride, in the exercise of their profession. Their tents are models of cleanliness.

PAY DEPARTMENT.

Is represented by Colonel Phisterer, who performed this duty in addition to his other. Payments are made by check on Fridays.

THE ORGANIZATIONS.

* * * * * * *

Four things are noticeable: First. The full strength of the Seventh Regiment (which, by the way, has many waiting for membership); second, the gain in the Ninth, Twenty-second, Twenty-third and Forty-seventh Regiments; third, the full membership of many of the separate companies; and, fourth, the large percentage of the Twelfth present in camp.

ARMS AND EQUIPMENTS.

As General Porter states in his report of 1888, there is but little to be added to what has already been said in previous reports upon this subject, and the same may be said with reference to the uniform.

* * * * * * *

All the equipments and uniforms are in good serviceable condition, ready and useful.

Instruction.

Orders required that the military exercises to be executed and practiced in camp shall consist of such tactical movements as can not be carried out in armories, of skirmish drills, and of schools of theoretical instruction for officers and non-commissioned officers; but no reviews will be authorized except by orders from headquarters.

The nature of the drill was specified by the post commander from time to time. Schools of instruction every afternoon (Fridays and Sundays excepted) between 1.30 and dress parade; company drill from 5.45 to 7 a. m.; battalion drill from 9.25 to 11.30 a. m. Drills were surprisingly correct; most of the officers seemed to know and understand their duties well. I noticed a few inert officers and non-commissioned officers. Mistakes were generally rectified at once. The men manifested great interest in their work, and did not seem to weary. During the first two or three drills the step was slow and short. It improved greatly, until at the final drills they had obtained the correct step and time.

Most companies had the habit at first of taking a short step with the left foot in starting, showing that they were not properly balanced at the command "March!" All this difference is perhaps attributable to the change from floor to turf. As a rule, the commands were not repeated promptly enough.

I found a great improvement in the manner the guides performed their duties since my visit in 1885.

By the end of the week the tactical movements were sufficiently well executed for all practical purposes. The theoretical instruction was evidently of utility, as I found that generally the officers were well acquainted with their tactics.

Lieutenant Hamilton, Fifth Artillery, gave daily lectures, which seemed to interest all.

Nothing could be finer than the dress parade and appearance of the Seventh, nor the drill of the Twenty-third, or guard mount of the Twenty-second. The improvement of the Ninth was decidedly marked. The Forty-seventh made a good show, but was hampered by bad weather. The Twelfth was handled quickly and effectively, and is a regiment New York will be proud of. Their percentage in camp was greater than that of any other regiment?

Military courtesy was fairly well observed. When neglected, I found that it was from the want of proper instruction. I would like to call the attention of the officers to their careless way of returning salutes.

GUARD DUTY.

Was generally well performed; but in a few cases it was very slovenly done. I noticed a few perfect tours though. As a rule, I found that it depended entirely upon the knowledge and energy of the officers and non-commissioned officers of the guard; the men not only being willing but anxious to learn. I must say this, however, for the men in all cases.

Captain Thurston, instructor in guard duty, was on hand day and night, visiting and instructing the guard at all times and seasons, and did everything in his power to forward this important duty.

I have already called attention to the strength of many of the separate companies, and here I wish to speak in the highest terms of the efficiency of most of them, and noting the fact that the only chance they have for battalion drill is during the encampment, my wonder is that they become so proficient. It shows that the companies are well drilled and the battalion commanders know their duty.

The provisional battalions, under Lieutenant-Colonel Smith, Major Downs, Major Chauncey and Colonel Bacon, were well handled. The Fourth Battalion (Colonel Bacon) was particularly noticeable; more maneuvres being gone through in a shorter time than I had ever seen before.

I feel I must notice the detachments of artillery on duty during the encampment. I don't think I have ever seen men take so much pride in their work. Their tents and camp-grounds were simply perfect.

In conclusion I would say that, under the conditions of encampment every second year for each regiment, of the comparatively few drills each year, and that it is a voluntary service, requiring a pecuniary sacrifice as well as loss of time in business, we must look with admiration at the efficiency of the National Guard of the State of New York.

My thanks are due to General Porter and his staff for their very kind and courteous treatment.

Bloomer did state that the number of enlisted men of his command present at the said drill was three hundred and one (301), which statement was false and known to him to be false, the number actually in attendance being about two hundred and twenty-nine (229).

Specification 13.

In that William M. Bloomer, Colonel in the National Guard of the State of New York, in command of the Seventy-fourth Regiment of Infantry, did make to the Inspector-General of said National Guard at Albany, in said State, on or about the 22d day of December, 1886, a return in writing under date of December 18, 1886, of the attendance of his command at a battalion drill thereof, held in the city of Buffalo, in said State, on the 8th day of December, 1886, wherein said Colonel William M. Bloomer did state that the number of enlisted men of his command present at the said drill was three hundred and eleven (311), which statement was false and known to him to be false, the number actually in attendance being about two hundred and forty (240).

Specification 14.

In that William M. Bloomer, Colonel in the National Guard of the State of New York, in command of the Seventy-fourth Regiment of

Infantry, did make to the Inspector-General of said National Guard at Albany, in said State, on or about the 27th day of April, 1887, a return in writing under date of February 7, 1887, of the attendance of his command at a battalion drill thereof, held in the city of Buffalo, in said State, on the 28th day of January, 1887, wherein said Colonel William M. Bloomer did state that the number of enlisted men of his command present at said drill was two hundred and eighty-four (284), which statement was false and known to him to be false, the number actually in attendance being about two hundred and thirty-three (233).

Bloomer, Colonel of the National Guard of the State of New York, in command of the Seventy-fourth Regiment of Infantry, did make to the Inspector-General of said National Guard at Albany, in said State, on or about the 2d day of May, 1887, a return in writing under date of March 3, 1887, of the attendance of his command at a battalion drill thereof, held in the city of Buffalo, in said State, on the 22d day of February, 1887, wherein the said Colonel William M. Bloomer did state that the number of enlisted men of his command present at the said drill was three hundred and three (303), which statement was false and known to him to be false, the number actually in attendance being about two hundred and twenty-one (221).

Specification 16.

In that William M. Bloomer, Colonel in the National Guard of the State of New York, in command of the Seventy-fourth Regiment of Infantry, did make to the Inspector-General of said National Guard at Albany, in said State, on or about the 2d day of May, 1887, a return in writing under date of April 3, 1887, of the attendance of his command at a battalion drill thereof, held in the city of Buffalo, in said State, on the 24th day of March, 1887, wherein said Colonel William M. Bloomer did state that the number of enlisted men of his command present at the said drill was two hundred and sixty-seven (267), which statement was false and known to him to be false, the number actually in attendance being about two hundred and twenty-seven (227).

Specification 17.

In that William M. Bloomer, Colonel in the National Guard of the State of New York, in command of the Seventy-fourth Regiment of Infantry, did make to the Inspector-General of said National Guard at Albany, in said State, on or about the 18th day of May, 1887, a return in writing under date of May 2, 1887, of the attendance of his command, at a battalion drill thereof, held in the city of Buffalo, in said

State, on the 22d day of April, 1887, wherein said Colonel William M. Bloomer did state that the number of enlisted men of his command present at the said drill was two hundred and eighty (280), which statement was false and known to him to be false, the number actually in attendance being about two hundred and seventeen (217).

Specification 18.

In that William M. Bloomer, Colonel in the National Guard of the State of New York, in command of the Seventy-fourth Regiment of Infantry, did make to the Inspector-General of said National Guard at Albany, in said State, on or about the 27th day of July, 1887, a return in writing under date of May 28, 1887, of the attendance of his command at a battalion drill thereof, held in the city of Buffalo, in said State, on the 18th day of May, 1887, wherein said Colonel William M. Bloomer did state that the number of enlisted men of his command present at the said drill was two hundred and eighty-seven (287), which statement was false and known to him to be false, the number actually in attendance being about two hundred and twenty (220).

Specification 19.

In that William M. Bloomer, Colonel in the National Guard of the State of New York, in command of the Seventy fourth Regiment of Infantry, did, between the 1st day of February, 1887, and the 28th day of February, 1887, obtain from the treasury of the State of New York, for the benefit of and to the credit of the Military Fund of said regiment, as the allowance lawfully earned for said fund in the year 1886 by said regiment, the sum of \$2,404.80, whereas by law and of right said allowance should have been only about \$2,004.80, and this by means of a false report made for the purpose of obtaining such unlawful allowance, to wit: A "Consolidated Report of Attendance of the Seventy-fourth Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., for the Military Fund earned in 1886," made by the said Colonel William M. Bloomer to the Adjutant-General of the State of New York, at Albany, in said State, on or about the 5th day of January, 1887, which said report was certified upon honor to be correct by the said Colonel William M. Bloomer; nevertheless, the same was false and known to him to be in the following particulars, to wit: in stating that the number of enlisted men present at a battalion drill of said command on October 12, 1886, was three hundred and three (303), whereas the number of such men actually present at said drill was about one hundred and ninety-five (195); and in stating that the number of such enlisted men present at a similar drill on November 23, 1886, was three hundred

and one (301), whereas the number of men actually present at said drill was about two hundred and twenty-nine (229); and, further, in stating that the number of such enlisted men present at a review of his command on December 8, 1886, was three hundred and eleven (311), whereas the number of such men actually present at said review was about two hundred and forty (240).

*Charge II.— Making a False Parade Return.

Specification 1.

In that William M. Bloomer, Colonel in the National Guard of the State of New York, in command of the Seventy-fourth Regiment of Infantry, did make to the Inspector-General of said National Guard at Albany, in said State, on or about the 27th day of July, 1887, a return in writing under date of May 30, 1887, of the attendance of his command at a regimental parade thereof, held in the city of Buffalo, in said State, on the 30th day of May, 1887, wherein said Colonel William M. Bloomer did state that the number of enlisted men of his command present at the said parade was three hundred and four (304), which statement was false and known to him to be false, the number actually in attendance being about one hundred and ninety-four (194.)

Specification 2.

In that William M. Bloomer, Colonel in the National Guard of the State of New York, in command of the Seventy-fourth Regiment of Infantry, did make to the Inspector-General of said National Guard at Albany, in said State, on or about the 27th day of July, 1887, a return in writing under date of June 23, 1887, of the attendance of his command at a regimental parade thereof, held in the city of Buffalo, in said State, on the 23d day of June, 1887, wherein said Colonel William M. Bloomer did state that the number of enlisted men of his command present at the said parade was two hundred and ninety-eight (298), which statement was false and known to him to be false the number actually in attendance being about two hundred and nine (209).

Specification 3.

In that William M. Bloomer, Colonel in the National Guard of the State of New York, in command of the Seventy-fourth Regiment of Infantry, did make to the Inspector-General of said National Guard at Albany, in said State, on or about the 27th day of July, 1887, a return in writing under date of July 14, 1887, of the attendance of his command at a regimental parade thereof, held in the city of Buffalo,

in said State, on the 4th day of July, 1887, wherein said Colonel William M. Bloomer did state that the number of enlisted men of his command present at the said parade was two hundred and fifty-seven (257), which statement was false and known to him to be false, the number actually in attendance being about one hundred and ninety-three (193).

The court found Colonel Bloomer guilty of each of the charges and of each of the specifications, and sentenced him to be cashiered.

II. The accused has been tried by a competent tribunal, composed of distinguished officers, who have faithfully and impartially performed their duty as such, and their findings are clearly sustained by the law and the evidence, and the same are hereby approved.

But by reason of the long and faithful service rendered the State by the accused in his military capacity, as well as his honorable standing in the community where he resides, as appears by the representations of many of his fellow citizens who are prominent in social, business and professional life, and who have interested themselves in his behalf, and it being shown that he derived no personal benefit from the transactions set forth in the charges and specifications, the sentence is hereby remitted as an act of clemency, and the accused having tendered his resignation as colonel of the Seventy-fourth Regiment of Infantry, N. G. S. N. Y., he is hereby discharged from the military service of the State.

III. The court-martial before which this case was tried is hereby dissolved.

The following detailed instructions, relating to the parade of the National Guard on the thirtieth instant, in New York city, are published for the guidance and observance of all concerned:

First. Full dress uniforms will be worn, unless by reason of cold or inclement weather it is deemed desirable to wear overcoats, in which case orders to that effect will be sent to the brigade and regimental headquarters of the First and Second Brigades, and to the headquarters of the Third and Fourth Brigades, early on the morning of the thirtieth instant.

With overcoats, as well as with dress uniforms, black helmets will be worn.

All officers (except mounted officers) and all enlisted men will wear the white canvas leggings recently issued.

Second. Each regiment and battalion will be divided into companies, formed in double rank, of twenty files front, exclusive of the guides.

Third. Commanding officers will permit no one to parade with their commands except officers commissioned and men regularly enlisted therein, or who may be assigned or detailed thereto.

Recruits, and men not well instructed, will not be permitted to accompany their commands.

Fourth. The Seventeenth Separate Company will be attached, for parade, to the Forty-seventh Regiment.

Fifth. The separate companies of the Third Brigade will be formed into three provisional regiments of ten companies each, as follows:

The First Provisional Regiment will consist of the Fourth, Fifth,, Tenth, Eleventh, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Nineteenth, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Separate Companies.

The Second Provisional Regiment will consist of the Third, Sixth, Seventh, Ninth, Twelfth, Eighteenth, Twenty-first, Twenty-second, Twenty-seventh and Thirty-second Separate Companies.

The Third Provisional Regiment will consist of the Twentieth, Twenty-eighth, Thirty-first, Thirty-third, Thirty-fifth, Thirty-sixth Thirty-seventh, Thirty-ninth, Forty-fourth and Forty-sixth Separate Companies.

Sixth. The troops of the Fourth Brigade will be organized into three regiments, as follows:

To the Sixty-fifth Regiment will be attached the Thirteenth and Forty-third Separate Companies.

To the Seventy-fourth Regiment will be attached the First, Thirty-fourth and Forty-second Separate Companies.

A provisional regiment, the Fourth, will be formed of the Second, Eighth, Twenty-sixth, Twenty-ninth, Thirtieth, Thirty-eighth, Fortieth, Forty-first and Forty-fifth Separate Companies.

Seventh. The following officers are assigned to the command of the provisional regiments:

Lieutenant-Colonel William J. Harding, Thirteenth Regiment, to the command of the First.

Colonel Alexander S. Bacon, Provisional, to the command of the Second.

Lieutenant-Colonel James A. Dennison, Seventy-first Regiment, to the command of the Third.

Colonel Samuel M. Welch, Jr., Sixty-fifth Regiment, to the command of the Fourth.

The officers named will, without delay, report by mail to their respective brigade commanders; select to assist them such qualified officers as they may deem necessary, and submit their selections for the approval of the Commander-in-Chief.

Eighth. The Second Provisional Regiment will be concentrated at Albany the forenoon of the twenty-ninth instant, and will with the Tenth Battalion take the steamer "Grand Republic" for New York city. The quarters of this portion of the Third Brigade will be on the boat, which will be considered a military post, while thus occupied, commanded by Colonel Bacon, subject to the orders of the Brigade Commander. The steamer will be required to land at New York city, at the foot of Fifty-ninth street, North river.

Ninth. The First and Third Provisional Regiments, the Sixth Battery and the headquarters of the Third Brigade, will proceed to New York city by rail, so as to arrive there and at the armory of the Twelfth Regiment, Sixty-second street and Ninth avenue, about noon of the twenty-ninth instant. Brigadier-General Amasa J. Parker, Jr., will be in command, and will cause this portion of his brigade to march on the morning of the thirtieth instant, aboard the "Grand Republic," preparatory to starting with his entire command for the point of rendezvous for the parade.

Tenth. The Fourth Brigade will be transported to New York city by rail, so as to arrive there about noon of the twenty-ninth instant. Its quarters will be at "Madison Square Garden," which, while occupied by the troops, will be considered a military post, under the command of Brigadier-General Peter C. Doyle.

Eleventh. The commanding officers of regiments, battalions, separate companies and batteries of the Third and Fourth Brigades will at once report to their respective brigade commanders for instructions as regards their transportation to New York city, and the brigade commanders will take care that such commanding officers receive definite and full instructions as regards hours, days, trains and boats, to be taken by them for New York and the return to their respective stations.

Twelfth. The troops of the Third and Fourth Brigades will carry with them knapsacks, haversacks and canteens; and absolutely necessary changes of underclothing, the necessary toilet articles, and the full dress coat and fatigue cap, will be packed in the knapsack, overcoat on top. On the journey fatigue coats will be worn.

Thirteenth. Transportation and rations will be allowed for one servant for each company and battery, and for three servants for each battalion, regimental and brigade headquarters, but no other person or persons whatever shall be allowed, under any circumstances, to

travel with the troops on trains or boats, except the proper train and boat officers and employés.

Fourteenth. Befere leaving his proper station, also before the formation of the line on the thirtieth instant, and immediately after returning to his station, each company and battery commander will have the roll of his command called, and pay will be allowed only to those present at these roll-calls.

Pay will be allowed to the troops of the First and Second Brigades for one day; to those of the Third Brigade, except the Twenty-seventh, Thirty-fifth, Thirty-ninth Separate Companies, for two days; to those of the Fourth Brigade, and the Twenty-seventh, Thirty-fifth and Thirty-ninth Separate Companies, three days.

Fifteenth. The management of the transportation provided, and the whole charge of the subsistence of their troops, is left to the respective brigade commanders, who will see that the troops of their commands are promptly returned to their respective stations as soon after the close of the parade as possible.

Sixteenth. The Chief of Ordnance, as acting Quartermaster-General, will, on the arrival of the troops, cause to be turned over to their respective commanding officers, at Madison Square Garden, 2,000 mattresses and blankets; at the armory of the Twelfth Regiment 1,700 mattresses and blankets.

He will also turn over to the commanding officer on board the steamer "Grand Republic" 1,300 mattresses and blankets.

He will also turn over the necessary colors, guidons and markers' flags to the commanding officers of the Provisional Regiments as follows: To the commanding officer of the First and Third Provisional Regiments, at the armory of the Twelfth Regiment; to the commanding officer of the Second Provisional Regiment, on board the "Grand Republic;" to the commanding officer of the Fourth Provisional Regiment, at the "Madison Square Garden."

As soon as the necessity for the use of these articles ceases to exist, the commanding officers will cause them to be returned to the Chief of Ordnance, who will have officers of his department on hand to receive them; those on board the "Grand Republic" will be received on its return from Albany.

Seventeenth. Final instructions as to the hour when, and the place where, the brigades will report on the thirtieth instant, will be issued as soon as the programme for the day shall be received from the committee in charge of the celebration.

Eighteenth. Commanding officers of brigades will be held responsible for the proper execution of this order, and the maintenance of good

order and discipline, while their respective commands are en route to, and in, New York city, and returning to their proper stations.

All officers will be required to remain with their commands from the time of leaving until they are dismissed at their respective stations.

Nineteenth. Commanding officers of brigades, regiments, battalions, separate companies and batteries will render to these headquarters duplicate copies of orders and instructions issued by them in regard to movement, transportation and subsistence of their respective commands not later than the twenty-fifth instant.

I. This office, for all purposes connected with the parade on the thirtieth instant, is located from the twenty-fourth instant to the first day of May next, both days included, at the "Stewart Building," No. 280 Broadway, Rooms 262 and 263, New York city. All communications relating to the parade will be addressed accordingly.

Colonel Frederick Phisterer will proceed to New York city for duty in the office there, and the commanding officer of the Second Battery will detail two members of his command as orderlies for the office, to report in fatigue uniform, at 10 a. m., of the twenty-fourth instant.

II. To facilitate the rendering of correct accounts, ration returns are issued to the organizations of the Third and Fourth Brigades.

III. Pay-rolls must be forwarded to this office, signed and completed, affidavits properly executed before a civil officer authorized to administer oaths, as soon as possible after the parade, and the Paymaster-General of the State is directed to take the necessary steps to insure prompt payment of each officer and enlisted man by check.

IV. All accounts for transportation, rations, bands and other expenses, accruing owing to the parade, must be forwarded to this office, in duplicate, receipted, supported by vouchers, etc., before the fifteenth day of May next.

I. The following extracts from Orders No. 3, issued by the Grand Marshal of the Military Parade, taking place on the thirtieth instant, are herewith published for the guidance and observance of the military forces of this State:

First. The following directions are announced for the assembling, movement and disbandment of the forces of the Army, Navy and National Guard, the organizations of the Loyal Legion and of the Grand Army of the Republic participating in the military parade of the thirtieth instant, in honor of the centennial of the inauguration of George Washington as President of the United States.

Sixteenth. The New York troops. First Brigade. The regiments will take trains on the Sixth and Ninth Avenue Elevated Railroads to Cortland and Barclay streets, as follows: Seventh Regiment at Fifty-eighth street and Sixth avenue, at 9 a. m. to Cortlandt street, and the other regiments by Ninth avenue to Barclay street, as follows: Eighth Regiment at One Hundred and Sixteenth street at 8.45 a. m.; Ninth Regiment at Twenty-third street at 9.15 a. m.; Seventy-first Regiment at Forty-second street at 9.30 a. m.; Twenty-second Regiment at Fourteenth street at 9.50 a. m.; Twelfth Regiment at Fifty-ninth street at 9.45 a. m. The Sixty-ninth Regiment will move through Eighth street, Astor place, Lafayette place, Great Jones street, Broadway and

Murray street, to Church street, with right resting on Barclay street, reaching that position by 9.20 a. m. If the remainder of the brigade is also assembled entirely by marching the brigade commander will so direct the march of the different regiments that the portion of the city south and east of Twenty-ninth street, Eighth avenue, Hudson street, Canal street, West Broadway, Chambers street and Broadway shall not be encroached upon. The brigade will be in position on Church street, Trinity place and Rector street, with right on Broadway, by 10.20 a. m.

Second Brigade.—The Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Twenty-third Regiments and Third Battery, over the Brooklyn bridge, to the south on Park row and through Frankfort street to William street. The Thirty-second and Forty-second Regiments from Brooklyn by the Roosevelt Street Ferry and through South street, Dover street and Frankfort street to William street. Then the entire brigade moves through William street until right rests on Pine street, reaching that position by 10.30 A. M.

After the President and all the invited guests have left the subtreasury, upon the conclusion of the literary exercises, the Second brigade will move on Pine street until its right rests on Broadway.

Third Brigade.—By steamboat Grand Republic from Fifty-fifth street and Hudson river to pier foot of Murray street, then by Murray street and Greenwich street to Rector street, with right on Trinity place, reaching that position by 11 A. M.

As their front is uncovered by the First Brigade, New York, they will move on to Broadway until their right rests on Pine street.

Fourth Brigade.—From Twenty-third street and Fourth avenue to the Twenty-third street station, Third Avenue Elevated Railroad, taking trains at 9.30 A. M. to Chatham square. Then through Chatham street and Park row to Nassau street, with right on Pine street.

Or entirely by marching through Twenty-third street, Third avenue, the Bowery, Chatham street and Park row to Nassau street, right resting on Pine street, reaching that position at 11 a. m.

- 32. As the troops reach the points designated for assembling the different sub-divisions will be closed up as much as possible, the depth of column being made less than that required by a tactical closing in mass; on entering Broadway the companies will be formed with not more than twenty nor less than sixteen files front.
- 33. As soon as the President enters the sub-treasury after the religious exercises at St. Paul's church, which will be concluded about 9.45 a. M., the column will move, at full distance, up Broadway,

Waverly place, Fifth avenue, East Fourteenth street, Fourth avenue, East Seventeenth street, Broadway, East Fifteenth street, and Fifth avenue to Twentieth street, when it will be halted and line formed along the route enumerated against the east curb of Fifth avenue, the north curb of Fifteenth street, the west curb of Broadway, the north curb of Seventeenth street, the east curb of Fourth avenue, the south curb of Fourteenth street, the east curb of Fifth avenue, the north curb of Waverly place and the east curb of Broadway, until the left rests on Pine street; field officers and general officers with their staffs will not remain in front of the line, but form on the right of their troops against the street curb, so that the President and guests in carriages may pass along the front of the line from Pine street to Madison square.

As soon as the carriages have passed each regiment or battalion, the organizations in succession will wheel independently into column, close on their leading companies to half distance and advance promptly until they recover their proper distances from the troops in their front. That portion of the column massed on Broadway below Pine street, will at the same time move on Broadway at half distances, preserving such distances until after passing in review before the President.

After troops have passed in review they will not, in case of any check in the movement of the head of the column, mark time or halt to preserve the half distances, but will close in mass upon the troops in their front in order that no delay may occur in the passage in review.

34. The column will be reviewed by the President of the United States from the grand stand on the east side of Fifth avenue, opposite the Worth monument, Twenty-fifth street.

While passing in review all officers in uniform should carry drawn swords. Commanding officers of divisions, brigades, battalions and batteries salute with the sabre when passing the Commander-in-Chief. All other officers carry the sword at the shoulder as on inspection.

Chiefs of the Loyal Legion and of Grand Army divisions not in uniform, will salute by removing the hat. Governors of States are requested to salute by removing the hat. Their staffs will not salute. All colors dip to the Commander-in-Chief.

In order to secure uniformity of salutes, special attention is invited to these requirements.

Owing to the limited space in the vicinity of the reviewing stand, chief officers and their staffs will remain in column at the head of their troops after passing in review.

35. The column will be disbanded upon reaching Fifty-seventh street and Fifth avenue, in the following manner:

l. The First Brigade, New York, Seventh Regiment, north up Fifth avenue.

Sixty-ninth Regiment, east on Fifty-seventh street, Third avenue to Eighth street.

Eighth, Ninth, Seventy-first and Twenty-second Regiments, west on Fifty-seventh street, and by Seventh and Eighth avenues to their armories.

Twelfth Regiment, west on Fifty-seventh street, Ninth avenue to Sixty-second street.

The Second Brigade, New York, east on Fifty-seventh street to East river.

The Third Brigade, New York, west on Fifty-seventh street to Hudson river.

The Fourth Brigade, New York, east on Fifty-seventh street, Madison avenue to Twenty-seventh street.

Each division upon leaving Fifth avenue will march rapidly and far enough before making any halt to clear the way for succeeding divisions.

36. In the march of the several divisions toward their designated places, preparatory to entering the general column, the right of way must be conceded to that one of any two divisions which is to precede the other in the general column, and the latter will promptly give way whenever necessary, so that the former may pass. If this rule is carefully observed by all, there will be ample space and time for the formation and march of the column.

II. The commanding officer of the First Brigade will direct his signal corps and the First and Second Batteries to march to their positions in line at such time as will enable them to join the brigade not later than 10.20 a. m., bearing in mind the portion of the city ordered by the Grand Marshal not to be encroached upon.

III. The "Old Guard" will take its position on the left of the Fourth Brigade at 11 A. M., proceeding by way of the route indicated in special directions issued to it.

On reaching Fifty-seventh street and Fifth avenue, the "Old Guard" will turn west and by Fifty-seventh street and Seventh avenue march to its armory.

IV. Commanding officers of brigades are held responsible that their respective commands are at the points at the time as directed by

the Grand Marshal, and that all other directions given by the latter, as republished above, are properly respected and carried out. They will report to the Adjutant-General at the corner of Rector street and Broadway, as soon as their commands are in proper position.

V. The staff of the Commander-in-Chief and Troop A will receive special directions as to movements on the thirtieth instant.

VI. If on the march a change of formation from column of companies to column of fours, or *vice versa*, take place, subdivision commanders will execute the change at the place where the first subdivision executes it, and regimental and battalion commanders should post a marker to indicate the point of change.

GENERAL ORDERS }

I. Rifle practice will be required of every officer and enlisted man, excepting those of organizations not armed with rifles, and musicians, of the First and Second Brigades, at Creedmoor, from May fifteenth to August thirty-first.

II. When a command has had one practice the brigade commander may, upon the application of its immediate commanding officer, secure

one or more additional practice days.

III. Transportation, at a cost not to exceed fifty cents per man, will be provided by the Chief of Ordnance, upon requisition made direct to him by commanding officers, for each officer and enlisted man attending the first practice; for each officer and enlisted man who failed to attend the first, but attends the second practice, and for those for a second practice who were present, but failed to qualify, at the first practice; provided that the distance to the nearest available range exceeds three miles.

IV. Ammunition will be furnished to the commanding officers of organizations of the First and Second Brigades, on practice days at Creedmoor, by the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, who is authorized to make requisition for the necessary supply direct on the

Chief of Ordnance.

V. Record books of field practice must be kept written up in ink. Alterations in score cards must be certified to by an Inspector of Rifle Practice. After each practice the score cards will be compared under the supervision of the senior Inspector of Rifle Practice present; the left half will be forwarded by such officer to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice within five days after the practice, the other half will be retained by the commanding officer of the organization practicing.

VI. The State prize will be competed for at Creedmoor as usual. The Brigade prize will be competed for under such conditions as shall be ordered by the commanding officers of Brigades. A prize of a value not to exceed fifty dollars will be awarded the company in each Brigade having the highest general figure of merit. Attention is called to R. 372, the last clause of which applies to the successful teams of 1886, 1887 and 1888.

VII. The first general practice should be completed before August first, but must be completed before September fifteenth next. Practice for the season will close November ninth next, and no scores made after that date will be recognized. Field practice books, fully written

up, must be sent to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, No. 18 Coenties Slip, New York city, on or before November 16, 1889.

VIII. The classification, order of duty, and general instructions prepared by the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, are herewith published for the guidance and observance of all concerned.

Classification.

The third class shall consist of all who do not appear on a range for practice.

The second class consists of all present for practice, without reference to qualifications in previous years, and the practice in this class will be at 100 yards standing, on a third class or No. 3 target, and at 200 yards kneeling, or sitting, on a third class or No. 3 target.

The first class consists of those who score twenty five and upward in the second class, and the practice in this class will be at 200 yards standing, No. 3 target, and at 500 yards, lying prone, No. 2 target.

A score of twenty-five and upward in the first class constitutes a marksman, and entitles the maker to receive the State decoration.

A score of forty-two and upward in the first class constitutes a sharpshooter, and entitles the maker to receive a silver bar.

All officers and enlisted men who practice must shoot through the regular classes, except as otherwise hereinafter provided, and are prohibited from shooting for a second or higher score in a class in which they have already qualified. The record must stand upon the first qualifying score made. But should any marksman, without expense to the State, on other than a practice day, and under proper supervision, make a score qualifying as a sharpshooter, he will be credited with such score.

No score by officer or enlisted man will be recognized unless made at a target to which he has been regularly assigned, and where his name has been previously entered on a score blank.

First General Practice.

(a.) The practice will commence with class firing in squads, under a competent non-commissioned officer, or other duly designated instructor, at each firing point, and the whole under the supervision of an Inspector of Rifle Practice, subject to the orders of the commanding officer present.

Five consecutive shots will be fired at each distance.

This practice will be continued to the end by all present without reference to the scores recorded, except that those who fail to qualify in the second class may be restricted to two shots for practice at each of the higher ranges, and any officer or enlisted man who has won the marksman's decoration for the five years last past need not practice at the lower (i. e., 100 yards and 200 yards, standing and kneeling) ranges.

The practice at 500 yards may be postponed until after the course of firing in ranks.

In regular class practice no officer or enlisted man will be permitted to fire more than five consecutive shots at any one distance on the same day, except the necessary sighting shots to ascertain elevation, windage and the condition of pieces, which may be fired by officers or well instructed men, under the inspection or approval of an Inspector of Rifle Practice. Trial practice between classes will not be permitted.

At the first distance of either class (i. e., at 100 or 200 yards), a score of twelve or upwards is considered as qualifying, and second practice may be allowed to such men as fail to qualify at either distance (as above), provided time will permit; but third practice shall not be allowed in any case. If, however, the entire tour of duty, including volley and skirmish firing, has been performed, and time still permits, such practice may be had as the Inspector of Rifle Practice deems proper.

Those who may have qualified at 200 and 500 yards, but not at 100 and 200, may make their scores valid by practicing through the second class without shooting in the first again.

In regular practice each enlisted man will shoot with the piece issued by the State, and brought by him on the ground, unless the same is declared imperfect by an Inspector of Rifle Practice. In that case the man may shoot with the nearest approved piece in the ranks.

(b.) Volley Firing, Five Rounds.—Firing in ranks at 100 yards shall then be taken up in the following order, the squad or company being formed in single rank:

Fire by squad [or company], three rounds.

Fire by squad [or company], kneeling, two rounds.

(c.) Firing as Skirmishers.—The troops shall be exercised as skirmishers from 325 to 100 yards and return; firing, on the advance, one round at 300 yards, one at 200 yards, and one at 100 yards; and, on the retreat, one round at 150 yards, and one at 250 yards; great care being taken by each commanding officer that the men are deliberate and cautious, that no accident may happen. Officers should use discretion and tact, varying the drill according to their ground and targets, deploying men and taking such distances as targets and range will allow; each body of troops to be so divided that no more may be exercised at one time than can be readily handled on the range, a second-class target being used.

As soon as the last (fifth) shot is fired, assemble on the right (or left), thus leaving the front uncovered, so that the second squad or company may deploy; during this time the marking can be done.

Second or Third Day's Practice.

Those present will practice in the classes to which they respectively belong. In other respects the tour of duty will be identical with that prescribed for First General Practice, including volley firing and firing as skirmishers.

General Instructions.

Officers.—A sufficient number of commissioned officers must accompany all parties for rifle practice, to command and instruct the men. At least one company officer will be present with any part of his company on duty, and a field officer will take command of all the detachments of two or more companies.

In practice, officers shall shoot first, then non-commissioned officers, then privates, on such targets as may be assigned to their companies.

The responsibility of officers on the range is great. Officers should be proficient in the use of the rifle, and able to apply armory instruction in the field. The men will be instructed as much as possible while waiting their turns to shoot, and especially in aiming and position drill, for which a competent instructor should be detailed in each company. They should be taught how to blacken their sights and how to fix the correct elevation and windage before going to the firing points.

Surgeons.—Commanding officers shall, in all cases, detail a surgeon to accompany any party ordered out for rifle practice, and the duty should not proceed without the presence of a competent medical officer, provided the organization has one attached to it.

Inspection of Practice.—Brigade Inspectors of Rifle Practice will inspect the practice for the marksman's decoration (except the practice under paragraph IX of this order), and Brigade or Regimental Inspectors the class shooting in their respective organizations, and certify to the score cards.

Organizations having no Inspector of Rifle Practice will be inspected by the Brigade Inspector, or an officer detailed for that purpose.

An inspector who is not able to be personally present on any occasion of duty will so report to his commanding officer, who will then detail a competent officer to act in his stead.

Brigade Commanders will, on issuing any order relating to rifle practice, cause a copy to be sent to the General Inspector of rifle practice.

Wooden Targets for volley, and (where needed) for skirmish firing, should be erected without expense to the State on each range. A simple fence painted to represent the necessary lines or divisions, or a frame covered with paper or muslin painted, if backed by a mound sufficient for safety, will suffice. Iron targets, second class, may be used for skirmish drill, but must not be used for volley firing.

Front sight covers of such pattern as may be easily detached, will be allowed in practice for the marksman's decoration, but they must not be permanently attached to the rifle.

Particular attention is called to the fact that the 300 yard range has been eliminated from class practice, and that five shots kneeling or sitting at 200 yards were substituted for it; also that the volley firing will be performed in single rank.

IX. Members of the National Guard in uniform (coat or blouse, cap and belt) may practice under such supervision and with such competent instructors as the General Inspector of Rifle Practice may direct.

AT CREEDMOOR.

May fifteenth, sixteenth and seventeenth; June twelfth and twenty-sixth; July tenth and twentieth; August fourteenth; September eleventh; October ninth and nineteenth.

The scores made upon these days at 200 and 500 yards, of twenty-five and over, may qualify for the marksman's decoration; and scores made in any class at a regular Rifle Association match, in which the full military conditions, including uniforms, are observed, will be recognized as official; provided they are, in the opinion of the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, deserving of it. These practices will not, however, excuse absence from the first general practice.

The General Inspector of Rifle Practice will arrange the necessary details for this practice.

I. The following organization are detailed for tours of service at the Camp of Instruction:

From June 22 to June 29, 1889, the Seventh Regiment.

From June 29 to July 6, 1889, the Seventy-first Regiment, and the Fifth, Sixth, Eleventh and Seventeenth Separate Companies.

From July 6 to July 13, 1889, the Ninth Regiment, and the Tenth Battalion.

From July 13 to July 20, 1889, the Twenty-third Regiment.

From July 20 to July 27, 1889, the Twenty-second Regiment.

From July 27 to August3, 1889, the Forty-seventh Regiment, and the Ninth, Thirty-sixth, Forty-fourth and Forty-sixth Separate Companies.

From August 3 to August 10, 1889, the Twelfth Regiment, and the Thirty-fifth, Thirty-eighth, Forty-third and Forty-fifth Separate Companies.

From August 10 to August 17, 1889, the Seventy-fourth Regiment, and the Second, Third, Twenty-fourth, Twenty-sixth and Thirty-second Separate Companies.

II. The usual allowance, together with rations and transportation will be made for bands coming to camp with their regiments prior to July twenty-seventh. A post band will be furnished by the State from July twenty-seventh to August seventeenth.

The commanding officers of regiments, who preferred to bring their own bands, will instruct the same that they become, for the time, the post band, and are subject to the rules and regulations of the camp and the orders of the Post Commander.

III. The detail of officers for service at the camp as post commander and his staff officers, as commanding and medical officers of the provisional battalions, will be announced later, but only such assistant surgeons of the separate companies as will be specially detailed, will accompany their respective companies to the camp.

- IV. The general regulations, established for the government of the Camp of Instruction when occupied by troops, promulgated in *General Orders Nos.* 4 and 20, *Series* 1887, from this office, having been revised, are republished for the information and guidance of all concerned, and the attention of all officers is specially called to them:
- 1. The camp is constituted a military post, and will be conducted in accordance with the rules provided for the government of military posts, and these regulations.

The post commander will prescribe in orders the hours and calls of service and the duties to be performed; and the military exercises to be executed and practiced in camp shall consist of such tactical movements as can not be carried out in armories, of the skirmish drill, and of schools of theoretical instruction for officers and non-commissioned officers; but no reviews will be authorized except by orders from this office.

He will prescribe the amount of camp and garrison equipage and blank ammunition to be issued to the troops in camp.

- `2. No men shall be taken to camp who are not already sufficiently well drilled to take part in the prescribed exercises, nor any men (those reënlisted or taken up from dropped, excepted) who have been enlisted within sixty days of the beginning of the camp tour of their respective companies.
- 3. Theoretical instruction in guard duty should be imparted to non-commissioned officers and privates by their respective company commanders before entering the camp. Instruction as to the general routine and duties of soldiers in camp should also be imparted in the same manner.
- 4. The Chief of Ordnance, as such, and as Acting Quartermaster-General and Acting Commissary-General of Subsistence, will cause the

Camp of Instruction to be prepared in time for its occupancy by troops. He will provide and keep at hand at the camp the necessary quartermaster and ordnance stores, and, after consultation with the Surgeon-General, the necessary medical stores and supplies; he will provide, by contract, for the furnishing of cooked meals to the troops in camp, and will see that the meals are properly and promptly furnished, well cooked, of wholesome quality and sufficient quantity; he will furnish the necessary transportation to officers and enlisted men, ordered there, to and from the camp; and he will exercise, in camp, a general supervision of all public property not by law and regulations in the care of others, the mess arrangements and the public buildings and grounds.

Transportation for troops to the camp will be furnished, as far as practicable, in such manner that they will arrive at the camp not later than 3 o'clock, P. M., of the day ordered.

- 5. The Surgeon-General is charged with the general supervision and direction of the medical service at the camp, and is authorized to select one competent person, who shall have charge, under his direction, of the medical stores at the camp, and who shall receive for his services transportation, rations and the pay allowed by law to hospital stewards.
- 6. The Paymaster-General is charged with the payment of the troops, and will take the necessary measures to pay each person entitled thereto on the last day of the tour of his organization in camp

The pay-rolls, in triplicate, will be prepared before going into camp by entering on them the name of each officer and enlisted man of the organization, with date of rank of officers and date of enlistment of the enlisted men. In camp credit will be given for the day, after retreat of such day, excepting the last two days, and the rolls fully completed, signed and amounts carried out, will be handed to the Paymaster-General as early before the close of the tour as possible, to enable him to pay the troops before their departure from camp. If practicable, the pay-rolls should be signed by the officers and enlisted men before coming into camp, but they must be signed on the first Sunday in camp. Special attention must be paid to the signatures, so that they correspond letter for letter with the names as entered on the pay-rolls. Initials standing for names are not sufficient.

Pay will be allowed to officers and enlisted men present for the days on which the regiment or company arrives at, and departs from, the camp; and for such other days of the tour during which they are present, at least from guard mounting in the morning until after retreat or dress parade in the evening, provided their whole stay in

camp does not consist simply in coming to camp on Saturday and spending Sunday there, or staying but one day, and returning on Friday to depart again on Saturday.

7. Commanding officers of regiments, battalions, batteries and separate companies, and officers specially detailed, if not traveling with troops, will at once, upon notice of detail for camp service, make requisition for proper transportation of men and baggage from their station to the Camp of Instruction, direct, on the acting Quartermaster-General, the Chief of Ordnance, State Arsenal, Thirty-fifth street and and Seventh avenue, New York city. Commanding officers will specify the exact number of men, as nearly as possible, for whom transportation is required, and transportation will not be allowed for men, who, under section 2 of paragraph 11 of this order, will not be entitled to pay. On arrival in camp, or as soon thereafter as practicable, commanding officers of troops arriving by railway transportation will settle their transportion account with the Acting Quartermaster-General, the Chief of Ordnance. Transporation will be allowed for one servant for the officers of each company and the field and staff of a battalion, and for three servants for the field and staff of a regiment.

Horses for field officers will be furnished by the Post-Quartermaster, and transportation or forage will not be allowed for any other horses.

On the journey to and from, and the march into camp, the senior officer will command the troops present, and before leaving their stations commanding officers will telegraph to the Post Commander ("The Post Adjutant, Camp of Instruction, Peekskill, N. Y.") the strength of their command, servants separately.

8. Surgeons of regiments and assistant surgeons of separate companies detailed for camp service, if traveling with troops, will each make timely requisition through their immediate commanding officers, for a hospital knapsack, with medical stores and instruments, upon the acting Quartermaster-General, the chief of ordnance, to whom they will return such knapsack immediately upon the arrival of their regiment or companies at their regular stations.

Upon arrival in camp, commanding officers of regiments, battalions and detachments, and officers specially detailed, will at once report for instructions to the post commander, and regimental and battalion commanders will at the same time submit requisitions for the necessary quartermaster stores for the approval of the Post Commander.

10. Commanding officers of regiments and battalions will direct their respective senior medical officer to report, on arrival in camp, for orders and instructions to the Surgeon-General. The senior medical officer in camp will perform the duties of Post Surgeon, and within ten days after his return from camp, will, on Form 72, prepare and forward a report of his tour of service, through his regimental commander, to the Surgeon-General.

The hospital steward of the regiment in camp, or, if there be none, a suitable person selected by the Surgeon-General, will act as post hospital steward. Such person, or hospital steward, must have passed an examination before the State Board of Pharmacy, and be licensed as a druggist, according to the laws of the State; and regimental and battalion hospital stewards not so examined and licensed will not be recognized by the State, or permitted to act as hospital stewards. Regimental and battalion commanders ordered to camp duty, whose hospital stewards do not meet these requirements, will at once report the fact to these headquarters.

11. Regimental and battalion commanders, on arrival in camp, will direct their Commissaries of Subsistence to report for duty while in camp, to the acting Commissary-General of Subsistence, the Chief of Ordnance, without being, however, relieved from duty with their regiments or battalions.

A ration will consist of early bread and coffee, breakfast, dinner and supper. Ration returns will be prepared by the company commanders each day, immediately after retreat or dress parade, covering all the rations received by their respective commands during the day; as a basis for the return of the day will be taken the number of officers and men present at breakfast, allowing one day's ration for each; to this will be added the number of meals received by men joined subsequent to breakfast. Adjutants will perform the duties of a company commander for the field, staff, non-commissioned staff and band.

Company returns will be consolidated the same evening by regimental and battalion commanders, who will deliver the consolidation to the post commander; at the close of the tour, these officers will deliver to the Post Commander a consolidated return, in duplicate, of all the rations received, which will be the voucher upon which the Chief of Ordnance will pay the contractors.

Commanding officers of troops coming from distant stations should see that their commands are properly provisioned for the journey.

Rations will be allowed for the authorized number of servants.

11. Commanding officers of regiments, battalions and companies are, and will be held responsible for the correctness of returns and reports rendered by them.

There should be a well-instructed clerk to relieve the first sergeants of, or to assist them in, the clerical duty. In each company the first sergeant or the clerk should keep a list for each day, on which to

place the name of every man arriving or leaving, and the hours of his arrival or departure during the day; this list will be found of great value to them in making the ration return, crediting the pay after retreat, and preparing the report book next morning.

The report book must show the condition of the company at the time the report is made, and the remarks are to explain all the alterations which may have occurred since making the last report.

Within ten days after the close of the camp tour, commanding officers of regiments and battalions will make reports to the Adjutant-General, of the general management of their command and the results obtained.

- 12. The State service uniform and equipments will be worn as issued; on drill, fatigue and when not on actual duty, the fatigue coat, R. 835, may be worn. White helmets may be worn by regiments and battalions fully supplied with them.
- 13. The officers detailed as commanding officers of battalions are authorized, each, to select two competent officers of suitable rank, and and five non-commissioned officers, to serve with them at the Camp of Instruction, respectively, as adjutant, quartermaster and commissary of subsistence, sergeant-major, quartermaster-sergeant, color bearer, provost sergeant and clerk.

The names of officers and non-commissioned officers thus selected will, as soon as possible, be reported to the Adjutant-General.

14. The following books and blanks, furnished by the State, are required in camp:

By regimental and battalion commanders, forms 8, 12, 56, 69, 70.

By surgeons, forms 13,71, 72.

By company commanders, forms 9, 56, 69.

And the attention of all officers is especially called to R. 134, 135, 170, 179, 180, 376, 387, 412, 473, 475, 477, 478, 479, 773.

V. Persons not connected with the administration of the post, or not being members of an organization in camp, will not be permitted in the camp after tattoo.

The sale of all spirituous liquors, wine, ale, or beer, and all huckster and auction sales within one mile of camp are prohibited.

No ale, beer, wines or spiritious liquors shall be used in camp, except upon the prescription of a medical officer of the post.

Fire-works, illuminations and other out-of-place performances will not be permitted.

If, from lack of target accommodation, or other good reasons, any organization should need another day to complete its practice, the commanding officer will make application accordingly to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, who is authorized to select an additional day, or days, if, in his opinion, it be necessary.

II. Previous to the dates specified above in paragraph I, each Separate Company and the Sixth Battery will have such practice, on the usual ranges, as its commanding officer may order, particularly in the second class, qualifications in which only will be allowed; and the range at

BAY VIEW

Will be open on June 10, 11 and 12, for use by the Seventy-fourth Regiment; on June 17, 18 and 19, for use by the Sixty-fifth Regiment; the range at

RENSSELAERWYCK

On June 3, 4, 5 and 6, for use by the Tenth Battalion.

These practices to be under charge of the commanding officer, or an officer designated by him. The scores must be kept in duplicate, one copy to be retained by the commanding officer, and the other to be forwarded within five days after the practice, to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, and the officer present at the practice to certify, on honor, on the score cards, to the correctness of the scores made.

III. Commanding officers of organizations of the brigades mentioned will make requisition for the necessary supply of ammunition direct

on the Chief of Ordnance, State Arsenal, corner of Seventh avenue and Thirty-fifth street, New York city, at the rate of fifty rounds per officer and enlisted man, members of their respective commands on the thirty-first day of March, past.

IV. Record books of field practice must be kept written up in ink. Alterations in score cards must be certified to by the Inspector in charge. After each practice he will cause the score cards to be compared, and will forward the LEFT half to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice within five days after the practice; the right half to be handed the commanding officer of the organization practicing.

V. The State prize will be competed for at Creedmoor as usual. The brigade prizes will be competed for under such conditions as shall be ordered by the commanding officers of brigades. A prize of a value not to exceed fifty dollars will be awarded the company in each brigade having the highest general figure of merit. Attention is called to R 372, the last clause of which applies to the successful teams of 1886, 1887 and 1888.

VI. Practice for the season will close November ninth, next, and no scores made after that date will be recognized. Field practice books, fully written up, must be sent to the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, No. 18 Coenties Slip, New York city, on or before November 16, 1889.

VII. The classification, order of duty and general instructions, prepared by the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, are herewith published for the guidance and observance of all concerned.

${\it Classification.}$

The third class shall consist of all who do not appear on a range for practice.

The second class consists of all present for practice, without reference to qualifications in previous years, and the practice in this class will be at 100 yards standing, on a third class or No. 3 target, and at 200 yards kneeling or sitting, on a third class or No. 3 target

The first class consists of those who score twenty-five and upward in the second class, and the practice in this class will be at 200 yards standing, No. 3 target, and at 500 yards lying prone, No. 2 target.

A score of twenty-five and upward in the first class constitutes a marksman, and entitles the maker to receive the State decoration.

A score of forty-two and upward in the first class constitutes a sharpshooter, and entitles the maker to receive a silver bar.

All officers and enlisted men who practice, must shoot through the regular classes (except as otherwise hereinafter provided), and are prohibited from shooting for a second or higher score in a class in which they have already qualified. The record must stand upon the first qualifying score made. But should any marksman, without expense to the State, on other than a practice day, and under proper supervision, make a score qualifying as a sharpshooter, he will be credited with such score.

No score by officer or enlisted man will be recognized, unless made at a target to which he has been regularly assigned, and where his name has been previously entered on a score blank.

First General Practice.

(a.) The practice will commence with class firing in squads, under a competent non-commissioned officer, or other duly designated instructor, at each firing point, and the whole under the supervision of an Inspector of Rifle Practice, subject to the orders of the commanding officer present.

Five consecutive shots will be fired at each distance.

This practice will be continued to the end by all present without reference to the scores recorded, except that those who fail to qualify in the second class may be restricted to two shots for practice at each of the higher ranges; and any officer or enlisted man who has won the marksman's decoration for five years need, not practice at the lower (i. e., 100 yards and 200 yards, standing and kneeling) ranges.

The practice at 500 yards may be postponed until after the course of firing in ranks.

In regular class practice no officer or enlisted man will be permitted to fire more than five consecutive shots at any one distance on the same day, except the necessary sighting shots to ascertain elevation, windage and the condition of pieces, which may be fired by officers or well-instructed men, under the inspection or approval of the Inspector in charge. Trial practice between classes will not be permitted.

At the first distance of either class (i. e., at 100 or 200 yards) a score of twelve or upwards is considered as qualifying, and second practice may be allowed to such men as fail to qualify at either distance (as above), provided time will permit; but third practice shall not be allowed in any case. If, however, the entire tour of duty, including volley and skirmish firing, has been performed and time still permits, such practice may be had as the inspector in charge deems proper.

Those who may have qualified at 200 and 500 yards, but not at 100 and 200, may make their scores valid by practicing through the second class without shooting in the first again.

In regular practice each enlisted man will shoot with the piece issued by the State, and brought by him on the ground, unless the same is declared imperfect by the inspector in charge. In that case the man may shoot with the nearest approved piece in the ranks.

(b.) Volley Firing, Five Rounds.—Firing in ranks at 100 yards shall then be taken up in the following order, the squad or company being formed in single rank.

Fire by squad (or company), three rounds.

Fire by squad (or company), kneeling, two rounds.

(c.) Firing as Skirmishers.— The troops shall be exercised as skirmishers from 325 to 100 yards and return; firing, on the advance, one round at 300 yards, one at 200 yards and one at 100 yards; and on the retreat, one round at 150 yards, and one at 250 yards; great care being taken by each commanding officer that the men are deliberate and cautious that no accident may happen. Officers should use discretion and tact, varying the drill according to their ground and targets, deploying men and taking such distances as targets and range will allow; each body of troops to be so divided that no more may be exercised at one time than can be readily handled on the range, a second class target being used.

As soon as the last (fifth) shot is fired, assemble on the right (or left), thus leaving the front uncovered, so that the second squad or company may deploy; during this time the marking can be done.

Second or Third Day's Practice.

Those present will practice in the classes to which they respectively belong. In other respects the tour of duty will be identical with that prescribed for first general practice, including volley firing and firing as skirmishers.

General Instructions.

Officers.—A sufficient number of commissioned officers must accompany all parties for rifle practice to command and instruct the men. At least one company officer will be present with any part of his company on duty, and a field officer will take command of all the detachments of two or more companies.

In practice officers shall shoot first, then non-commissioned officers, then privates, on such targets as may be assigned to their companies.

The responsibility of officers on the range is great. Good officers should be proficient in the use of the rifle and able to apply armory instruction in the field. The men will be instructed as much as possible while waiting their turns to shoot, and especially in aiming

and position drill, for which a competent instructor should be detailed in each company. They should be taught how to blacken their sights and how to fix the correct elevation and windage before going to the firing points.

Surgeons.—Commanding officers shall, in all cases, detail a surgeon to accompany any party ordered out for rifle practice, and the duty should not proceed without the presence of a competent medical officer, provided the organization has one attached to it.

Inspection of practice will be provided by the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, who will, if needed, apply to this office for the detail of an officer or officers for that purpose.

Wooden targets for volley, and (where needed) for skirmish firing, should be erected without expense to the State on each range. A simple fence painted to represent the necessary lines or divisions, or a frame covered with paper or muslin painted, if backed by a mound sufficient for safety, will suffice. Iron targets, second class, may be used for skirmish drill, but must not be used for volley firing.

Front sight covers of such pattern as may be easily detached will be allowed in practice for the markman's decoration—but they must not be permanently attached to the rifle.

Particular attention is called to the fact that the 300 yard range has been eliminated from class practice, and that five shots kneeling or sitting at 200 yards were substituted for it; also that the volley firing will be performed in single rank.

VIII. Members of the National Guard in uniform (coat or blouse, cap and belt) may practice under such supervision and with such competent instructors as the General Inspector of Rifle Practice may direct.

AT RENSSELAERWYCK.

June first, seventh, eighth; July sixth; August third; September seventh; October fifth and twenty-sixth.

AT BAY VIEW.

June thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth; July sixth; August third; September seventh; October fifth and twenty-six.

And the scores made upon these days, at 200 and 500 yards, of twenty-five and over, may qualify for the marksmen's decoration; and scores made in any class at a regularly authorized rifle association match in which the full military conditions, including uniform, are observed, will be recognized as official; provided they are, in the opinion of the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, deserving of it.

These practices will not, however, excuse absence from the first general practice.

The General Inspector of Rifle Practice will arrange the necessary details; and ammunition for this practice may be drawn, if needed, in the manner already prescribed (see par. 3), but not to exceed thirty rounds per man.

- I. Paragraphs 403, 407, 408, 412, 421 and 422 of the Regulations are amended to read as follows:
- 493. In case of disorder, a sentinel will cry, "The Guard." If a fire take place he will cry, "Fire," adding in either case the number of his post. If the danger be great, he will discharge his piece before calling.
- 407. The sentinel at the guard-house or guard-tents will challenge all persons who approach the post of the guard at night. After challenging and receiving a reply, he will command, "Halt," and will call, "Corporal of the Guard," repeating the reply of the person challenged. The corporal of the guard will then order the person to advance, receiving the countersign if he has it. If the person challenged be an officer entitled to inspect the guard, the corporal, after receiving the countersign, will say, "The countersign is right" and call, "Turn out the Guard," announcing the title of the officer challenged. The guard being paraded, the officer of the guard will say, "Advance, officer of the day," etc., adding, "With the parole," if he deem it necessary.
- 408. A general officer, or the commander of a regiment or post, may visit the guards of his command, and make such inspections as he may consider essential. He will be received in the manner prescribed for receiving the officer of the day. At night, or in the field, he will take from the main body of the guard such escort as he may deem necessary.
- 412. In camps of instruction the officer of the day making his round or rounds at night after 12 o'clock, may be accompanied by other officers, with the consent of the commanding officer, for purposes of instruction or inspection, but no person shall interrogate sentinels except the officer of the day.
- 421. Between reveille and retreat, sentinels will salute all officers by presenting arms.

422. Mounted sentinels, armed with the saber and with sabers drawn, will salute all officers by presenting saber; if armed with the carbine only, they will, on the approach of an officer, take the position of advance carbine. In challenging and holding communications, they will take the position of advance carbine, raise pistol, or guard, according as they are armed with the carbine, pistol or saber.

II. The heading "Grand Rounds," preceding paragraph 408, and the paragraphs 409, 410 and 423 of the Regulations are revoked, and in lieu of the latter paragraph the following is substituted:

423. A sentinel in a sentry-box, upon the approach of an officer, will stand at a carry, and, if armed with the rifle or carbine, will present arms as the officer passes.

III. The attention of commanding officers of companies is specially directed to M. C. 67:

§ 67. An annual inspection and muster of all organizations of the National Guard shall be made by the Inspector-General or his assistants, at such time and place as the Commander-in-Chief shall order and direct. No person shall be mustered at the annual muster and inspection, or be permitted in the ranks on any parade or drill required by this act who does not appear uniformed, armed and equipped, according to the provisions of this act; and all members of the National Guard, who shall appear without such uniform, arms and equipments, at any parade or drill required by this act, shall be returned as absent and fined accordingly. Any officer who, knowingly and willfully shall place or cause to be placed on such muster-roll the name of any person not regularly or lawfully enlisted, or the name of any enlisted man who is dead or has been discharged, transferred, dropped or expelled, or has lost his membership from any cause whatsoever, or is known to such officer to be permanently incapacitated for military duty, or to have been convicted of a felony, or one who has refused to do military duty for the six months immediately preceding the annual inspection, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than fifty nor more than \$100, or may be cashiered.

I. Commanding officers of regiments, battalions, batteries and separate companies, will establish schools of instruction for the officers, also schools for the non-commissioned officers of their respective commands, which shall be held at least once in each month until May first proximo.

The subjects of study at these schools shall be the drill regulations, guard duty, the Military Code and the State regulations.

Commanding officers of brigades will also order such schools of instruction for the officers of their brigades as they may deem necessary.

II. During the current drill season, commanding officers of regiments, battalions and separate companies, will give special attention to the theoretical, and if possible, practical instruction of their commands in skirmishing, guard-mounting and guard duties.

Recruits will not be permitted to drill or parade with their companies until they are thoroughly conversant with the school of the soldier, and well instructed in the duties of sentinels and in sighting and aiming.

Instruction in drum and trumpet signals will be given, so that officers and enlisted men may recognize them when sounded.

III. Commanding officers of companies will see that the enlisted men of their respective commands receive the necessary preliminary instruction in rifle practice, and, where possible, that they have gallery practice, before they are sent to the ranges.

The following instructions prepared by the General Inspector of Rifle Practice are prescribed:

SIGHTING.

1. A sand-bag for each squad will be placed on a rest, which may be a table, a tripod, or a stack of arms, and so arranged that the bag will be about four and one-half feet from the ground.

The men will be formed in single rank, and in squads not to exceed ten men in each.

The instructor will then flatten the sand-bag with the back of his hand, lay a full-cocked rifle on it, aim at some small object at as great a distance from it as the drill-room will permit (a wafer on the wall, for instance), and explain to the men the following simple rules:

The sights should not incline to the right or left.

The line of sight should be taken along the center of the notch of the rear-sight and the top of the front-sight, which should cover the middle of the mark aimed at. The eye should be fixed on the mark, and not on the front-sight. Particular attention should be paid to this rule, as beginners are apt to fix the eye on the front-sight and not on the mark, which prevents the latter from being distincly seen, and greatly increases the difficulty in aiming.

2. The instructor will also explain the different kinds of sights, viz.:

Fine sight.—When the point of the front-sight is just seen through the notch of the rear-sight, the effect of which is to shoot low.

Full sight.— When the whole of the wedged-shaped portion of the front-sight is displayed through the noteh on the rear-sight, the effect of which is to shoot high.



Half sight.— When but half the front-sight is seen.

3. At times during this drill, the leaf of the rear-sight should be required to be raised.

AIMING.

- 1. Come to the position of ready, and raise the leaf of the rear-sight.
- 2. Raise the rifle smartly in front of the right shoulder to the full extent of the left arm, without moving the body, head or eye; the arms to move close to the body; barrel nearly horizontal and pointing a few inches below the mark; the eyes fixed upon the forefinger inside the trigger-guard; both elbows inclined downward.
- 3. Press the piece smartly with both hands against the hollow of the shoulder, which must neither be allowed to give way nor pressed forward or raised to meet it; the left elbow at the same time being brought as far under the rifle as is possible without assuming an unnatural position; the right elbow slightly raised, being nearly square with the right shoulder; the center (or rather the upper than lower) part of the butt to be pressed firmly against the shoulder with the left hand without touching the collar-bone, the top of the butt being as nearly as possible even with the top of the shoulder; the forefinger will be placed around the trigger like a hook, but without pressing it; the head and body will be kept perfectly perpendicular the whole time, no attempt being made to look through the sights.
- 4. Close the left eye and incline the head to the right over the small of the stock so that the right eye may quickly perceive the coincidence of the rear and front sights, and the object aimed at.
- 5. Raise the head, look squarely to the front and bring the piece smartly to the first position.

Practice in aiming will be continued until the men aim quickly and correctly from the shoulder, after which they should be taught how to discharge the arm by pressing or squeezing the trigger, and especially to avoid a pull or jerk in so doing.

The instructor will also give such further instructions as his experience may suggest.

The General Inspector of Rifle Practice will arrange for the instruction of Inspectors of Rifle Practice, or of company officers in rifle practice, when deemed necessary by him, through the respective brigade commanders.

IV. Brigade commanders in person, or through staff officers, will see that the above directions are strictly complied with, and commanding officers of regiments, battalions, troops, batteries and separate companies will, on the first day of May next, report to these headquarters the manner of execution, and result of the foregoing instructions.

V. The attention of commanding officers of brigades, regiments and battalions, and of the members of boards of examinations, is called to General Orders No. 14, April 16, 1887, from these headquarters, which must be observed.

The attention of officers is specially directed to the following matters, in which the troops of the National Guard have shown themselves deficient or neglectful, and open to criticism:

1. Many incorrect commands are used on drill and parade, and too frequently commands are badly delivered. A command should never be given otherwise than exactly in the words prescribed. The tone of command should be animated, distinct and of a loudness proportioned to the number of men under instruction. Each preparatory command is pronounced in an ascending tone of voice, but always in such a manner that the command of execution may be more energetic and elevated. For foot movements the command of execution is pronounced

in a tone firm and brief. In mounted movements the preparatory commands are more or less prolonged to insure their being heard; the command of execution is always prolonged. A well defined pause separates the preparatory command and the command of execution; also the preparatory commands, where there are two or more. Commands should be correctly pronounced; custom has, however, sanctioned a deviation from the usual pronunciation of the word oblique, where the letter i may be pronounced as in oblige; and the word route, where ou may be pronounced as in out.

The preparatory command company, division or battalion, is frequently used when not prescribed, and omitted when it should be used; the same is true of the numerical designations of companies and divisions. The notice of change in the numerical designation is more often omitted than given.

- 2. One of the things most neglected, is the setting up drill, and the consequences of such neglect are conspicuous. As the importance of setting up can not be overestimated, soldiers should be frequently practiced in the drill, and the proper carriage of the body should be insisted on on all occasions when in uniform.
- 3. The first step forward in quick time, at the command march, should, as well as the subsequent steps, be thirty inches. It has been noticed that this first step is almost invariably short. It is the duty of officers and non-commissioned officers to cause this to be corrected. It is necessary also to remind officers and non-commissioned officers that, in quick time the cadence step should always be 120 to the minute.
- 4. In view of a probable change in the drill regulations, it is believed to be desirable that drills should be devoted to the practical movements, which must remain substantially the same in principle, whatever change may be made. The essentials of the manual, such as the carry, present, right shoulder, arms port, charge bayonets, loadings and firings, should be practiced rather than those which are non-essential, and which it is to be hoped may be discarded altogether. It is not only in contravention of present instructions to divide loading and firing and thing and unfixing bayonets into superfluous motions, but it involves a waste of time which may be better devoted to other matters.
- 5. More attention should be given to guard duties. There are too many instances of non-commissioned officers who are totally lost as to their duties when on guard. Many officers are also found at fault. A thorough knowledge of guard duties can only be imparted to officers and men of the National Guard, who are in camp for only a brief period, by careful theoretical instruction which should precede practical instruction.

- 6. Overcoats and parts of uniforms, particularly fatigue uniforms, which are not in accordance with the provisions of the regulations, are not infrequently worn by officers and enlisted men. Commanding officers of regiments and companies are responsible, and should not permit such violations of the law.
- 7. Reports and returns are frequently not received when due, and often, when received, are found to be incorrect. A little thought in the preparation of these papers will make them correct, and save the maker more time than he gains, apparently, by hasty, ill-considered work.

The following reports, etc., are required of officers:

Of commanding officers of regiments and battalions:

Copies of orders, in which drills and parades are ordered, on date of issue to the Brigade Commander, and also direct to the Inspector-General.

Report of attendance, when not in camp or on other continuous duty, within ten days after the drill or parade, to the Brigade Commander, and also direct to the Inspector-General.

Quarterly returns of regiments or battalions, with sub-returns, on or before the tenth day of April, July, October and January, with enlistment papers, if no State service uniform was required during the quarter, to the Brigade Commander.

Annual muster-roll of field and staff, twenty days before the annual inspection and muster, direct to the Inspector-General.

Annual return of State property, with vouchers, within five days after the last day of September, direct to the Chief of Ordnance.

Annual consolidated return of attendance at five compulsory parades or drills, including camp tour and annual inspection, each as one parade or drill, within ten days after the expiration of each calendar year, to the Adjutant-General of the State direct.

Of commanding officers of companies of regiments and battalions: Report of attendance, when not in camp or on other continuous duty, within five days after each regimental or battalion drill or parade, to the Regimental or Battalion Commander; and

Delinquency return of the same of enlisted men is to accompany it.

Quarterly returns of the company, on or before the fifth day of April, July, October and January, with the enlistment papers, if requisition for State service uniforms has not been made, to the Regimental or Battalion Commander.

Annual muster-roll of the company, twenty days before the annual inspection and muster, direct to the Inspector-General.

'Annual return of State property, with vouchers, on the last day of September, to the Regimental or Battalion Commander.

Of commanding officers of troops, batteries, separate companies, and signal and telegraph corps:

Copies of orders, ordering the drills and parades, mentioned in R. 365, subdivisions 1 and 2, on the day of issue to the Brigade Commander, and also direct to the Inspector-General.

Report of attendance, when not in camp or on other continuous duty, within five days after each brigade drill or parade, and after each of the drills and parades mentioned in R. 365, subdivisions 1 and 2; and

Delinquency returns of the same of enlisted men, to the Brigade Commander.

Report of attendance, as described above, to Brigade Commander, also direct to the Inspector-General.

Quarterly return of organization on or before the fifth day of April, July, October and January, with the enlistment papers, if requisition for State service uniform has not been made, to the Brigade Commander.

Annual muster-roll of organization, twenty days before the annual muster and inspection, direct to the Inspector-General.

Annual return of State property, with vouchers, on the last day of September, direct to the Chief of Ordnance.

Annual consolidated return of attendance at five compulsory parades or drills, including camp tour and annual inspection each as one parade or drill, within ten days after the expiration of each calendar year, direct to the Adjutant-General.

- 8. Requisition for State service uniform is made, if needed, at the end of each month and accompanied by the enlistment papers of the men for whom uniforms are required, and forwarded to the Adjutant-General through the intermediate headquarters.
- 9. The attention of commanding officers of brigades, regiments, battalions, signal and telegraph corps, troops, batteries and separate companies, is called to the semi-annual return of delinquent officers, which is to be rendered on or before the fifteenth day of May and of November, each year.
- 10. Officers are requested to examine the last register of the officers of the National Guard, and report corrections at once; a number of personal histories of officers have not been received.

Whenever an officer dies, it is the duty of his immediate commander to report the fact at once, with date, place and cause, to the Adjutant-General. (R. 102.) In many instances this has not been observed.

OPINIONS OF THE JUDGE ADVOCATE GENERAL.

NEW YORK, January 15, 1889.

The Adjutant-General, S. N. Y.:

Sir.— I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from Lieutenant Colonel John B. Frothingham, Assistant-Adjutant General Second Brigade N. G. S. N. Y., asking that where an enlisted man has been dishonorably discharged under section 129 of the Military Code, if paragraph 166 of General Regulations does not provide a means for his reenlistment.

I am of the opinion that it does not. I am also of the opinion that so far as the General Regulations attempt to alter the language of section 129 of the Military Code, they are void and of no effect. That provision is in the nature of a severe penalty and the disqualification of an officer or enlisted man to serve in National Guard for the period of five years is peremptory and unqualified.

After the expiration of that period, however, I see no reason why he can not again enter the service, without, of course, any allowance for the time he had previously served.

To His Excellency, Governor David B. Hill, Commander-in-Chief, National Guard State of New York:

Sin.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication requesting my opinion on the words "gallant and meritorious services," as contained in the following section of the Military Code:

§ 146. Brevet commissions of a grade next higher than the ordinary or brevet commissions held by officers of the National Guard, may be conferred for gallant and meritorious services therein by the Commander-in-Chief upon the recommendation of their superior officers. Such brevets to carry with them only such privileges or rights of any kind as are allowed in like cases in the military service of the United States.

By section 146 of the Military Code of 1883 (chapter 299) the Legislature provided that "brevet commissions of a grade next highest to that of the ordinary or brevet commission held by officers of the National Guard may be issued for gallant, meritorious, efficient or long service, by the commander-in-chief, etc." Under

this provision an officer whose services brought him within any one of the qualifications named could be breveted. This provision, however, was a broad departure from the rule prevailing, and which for over half a century has prevailed in the Regular Army regarding the conferring of brevet commissions. The tendency in this State has been to assimilate the National Guard system with that of the Regular Army, and to-day the two systems are, in their main features, alike. In 1885, the Legislature amended section 146 of the Military Code of 1883, as follows:

"Brevet commissions of a grade next higher than the ordinary or brevet commissions held by officers of the National Guard may be conferred for gallant and meritorious services therein by the Commanderin-Chief, etc."

This radical change of the law was simply in accordance with the law of the United States and with the custom which has prevailed in the United States army. The precise language inserted in the amendment, "gallant and meritorious services," is the settled and usual phrase used in conferring brevet commissions in the Regular Army and the enumerable instances in which such rank has been conferred illustrate how fixed and comprehensive, among military officers, the

phrase has become.

Of the 2,000 and more illustrious names of graduates of the National Military Academy at West Point over ninety per cent of those who received brevet commissions from the President of the United States received such commissions for gallant and meritorious services or conduct in the field. Among the prominent names that one can recall is that of General Grant who was breveted First Lieutenant for gallant and mextorious conduct in the battle of Molino Del Rev. General Horace Porter who was breveted Captain for gallant and meritorious services at the seige of Pulaski; Major for gallant and meritorious services at the battle of the Wilderness; Lieutenant Colonel for gallant and meritorious services in the action at Newmarket Heights; and Brigadier-General for gallant and meritorious services in the field during the rebellion; General O. O. Howard, who was breveted Major-General for gallant and meritorious services at the battle of Ezra Church, and during the campaign against Atlanta; General Hancock who was breveted First Lieutenant for gallant and meritorious services in the battles of Contreras and Churubusco, and breveted Major-General for gallant and meritorious services at the battle of Spottsylvania; General Judson Killpatrick, who was five times breveted for gallant and meritorious services in the field. General McClellan, who had three brevet commissions conferred upon

him for services in the Mexican War; he was breveted First Lieutenant for gallant and meritorious services in the battles of Contreras and Churubusco; Captain for gallant and meritorious services in the battle of Molino Del Rey (which commission he declined), and was again breveted Captain for gallant and meritorious services in the battle of Chapultepec. General Schofield, who was breveted Major-General for gallant and meritorious services in the battle of Franklin. General Hooker, who was breveted Major-General for gallant and meritorious services at the battle of Chattanooga. And General Pope, who was breveted Major-General for gallant and meritorious services in the capture of Island No. 10 in the Mississippi river.

These are a few instances of hundreds which fill the honorary roll of illustrious officers who have served their country in the field and I find no instance where a brevet commission has been issued to an officer in the service of the United States for gallant and meritorious service elsewhere than in the field, or in the presence of danger.

The power of the president to confer brevet commissions is limited to "time of war" and then only "for distinguished conduct and public service in presence of the enemy." (U. S. R. S., § 1209.)

"The word gallant is often compared with the words brave and courageous. Courageous is said to be generic, denoting an outward spirit which rises above fear; brave is more outward making a spirit which braves or defies danger; gallant rises still higher, denoting bravery on extraordinary occasions in a spirit of adventure. A courageous man is ready for battle; a brave man courts it; a gallant man dashes into the midst of the conflict." (Webster's Dictionary.)

"Valiant," says Smith, in his work on "Synonyms Discriminated," is mostly restricted to the courage of a soldier in war or combat, and is not so well applicable to persons collectively, now that soldiers act commonly under strict orders, except on extraordinary occasions, when they may act singly. The terms brave and gallant have almost supplanted the term valiant, which rather reminds us of the knights of old. Yet we still speak of him as valiant who performed some striking deed of bravery, or met any kind of danger in a spirited way. Valor is active courage. It strikes and strives against repeated perils, and bears great shocks without yielding, and struggles against heavy odds. Courage is impatient to attack. Valor refuses to yield or fly. Bravery exposes life and courts danger, and prefers death to dishonor. As valor refuses to retreat, so intrepidity refuses to be alarmed."

In the British army there is a regular promotion by brevet, and also the conferring of brevets on individuals, officers for special and meritorious services. The former are bestowed usually on occasions of the birth of an heir to the throne, the determination of a great war, the coronation or marriage of one of the royal family. Such promotions carry an increase of pay and rank, although in many cases the officers have never been in any actual service in the field, and this system has been the subject of much arbitrary abuse.

It is said that on one festival occasion some 200 colonels were at once made major-generals; and the brevets of 1846 occasioned an annual increase in the expenses of the nation of over \$100,000. The other class of brevets—that is such as are bestowed for distinguished services in the field, and which are similar to those bestowed in this country, have been conferred upon many of the generals, lieutenant-generals and major-generals in the English army; but in every instance they have been conferred for actual meritorious service rendered in battle or in military operations against any enemy.

I am of the opinion, therefore, that the words "gallant and meritorious services," as used in the Military Code, refer to active services rendered in the field or in the presence of danger.

SIR.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from Colonel Samuel M. Welch, Jr., Sixty-fifth Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., desiring to know whether he shall grant the request of the civil service commission of Buffalo for permission to use the Sixty-fifth Regiment arsenal for the purpose of examining the physical qualifications of applicants for the police force.

The civil service commission was appointed and organized under the provisions of chapter 354 of the Laws of 1883, as amended by chapter 357 of the Laws of 1884. By section 3 it is made the duty of officers of the State of New York, or any political division thereof at any place outside of the city of Albany where examinations are directed by the rules of the board to be held, "to allow the reasonable use of public buildings and to light and heat the same for holding such examinations and in all proper ways to facilitate the same." It is also provided that all the examinations shall be public. (Section 8, chap. 354, L. 1883.)

I am of the opinion that it was not the intention of the Legislature in framing this statute to include "military officers" in the enumeration of "officer" or that the public buildings referred to should include arsenals or armories which are set apart and designated for the exclusive use of the National Guard of the State.

If the civil service commission can exact the use of the arsenal of the Sixty-fifth regiment for the purpose of holding its examinations there, it can do so at any time as long as such use is a "reasonable use," and it will subject the building to a public use which was not contemplated by the Legislature, for, under the provision of the statute to which I have already referred, all examinations shall be public. (Section 9.) In other words, the public at large would have the right to attend and be present during the examinations held by the civil service commission and overrun a building where State property is deposited, at a time when the officer responsible for its custody and safety would not be in command. I do not think the Legislature intended such a use of military property paid for and maintained exclusively for the use of the National Guard. The Chief of Ordnance is a bonded officer to the State in a large amount for the faithful discharge of the duties of his office, among which is to keep in good order and repair, arsenals, magazines and armories belonging to the State. (Section 21, M. C.) But the Legislature has empowered the Commander-in-Chief to make such orders, rules and regulations as he may deem proper for the observance of all officers and persons having charge of any arsenal or armory. (Section 65, M. C.)

Under this legislative power, the Commander in-Chief, by General Orders No. 23, 1888, amended paragraph 818 of General Regulations, as follows:

"Armories and arsenals shall be used only by troops of the National Guard (except that they may be used by posts of the Grand Army of the Republic, or other veteran organizations of honorably discharged Union soldiers or sailors of the late war, in cases where such use is authorized by statute), and for such other purely military purposes as may be approved by the Adjutant-General."

This order of the Commander-in-Chief is, to my mind, conclusive on this question and must be observed by all commissioned officers of the National Guard.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that the request of the civil service commission should be denied.

Sir.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from Captain Richard M. Bruno, late of the First Battalion N. G. S. N. Y., inquiring if he is still a member of the National Guard.

It appears that on the disbandment of the First Battalion in July, 1875, Captain Bruno was rendered supernumerary, but only reported to general headquarters once. The fact that he has not reported does not effect, in my opinion, his commission in the National Guard. By that commission he is an officer in the service, and he can only be deprived thereof through a discharge by the Commander-in-Chief; a sentence of a court martial or by removal by the Senate. (Military Code, sections 43 and 45; regulations 205 to 214, inclusive.)

By the Military Code as it existed at the time of the disbandment of the First Battalion (see section 24, chapter 80, Laws of 1870), officers rendered supernumerary by disbandment of Battalions were directed to report to the Adjutant-General, within one year from the date of being rendered supernumerary. They were not required to report at any other time or in any other manner. Captain Bruno having so reported, he is still not only a supernumerary officer of the National Guard, but a supernumerary officer whom the Commander-in-Chief may assign to active duty.

SIR.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from Brigadier-General James McLeer, Second Brigade, N. G. S. N. Y., requesting information regarding his power to dismiss a commissioned officer under Military Code, section 129.

Section 129 of the Military Code enables the officer ordering a delinquency court, where the delinquent neglects or refuses to pay the fine within forty days after the same is imposed, to publish him in orders; and in addition to this the delinquent may be dishonorably dismissed from the service. These are separate provisions and either or both are available. The discharge, however, can only be by order of the Commander-in-Chief.

Sir.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from Colonel Finklemeier, Thirty-second Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., recommending the discharge of First Lieutenant John J. Elzenbeck, pursuant to section 129 of the Military Code and which was referred to me for my opinion.

The section referred to has reference to dismissals from the service and not to discharges. It is in the nature of a punishment and the word "dismissed" has been used by the Legislature as a term of dishonor or ignominy. It is to be found frequently in the articles of war, but always in connection with the sentence of a court-martial or some article reflecting upon the honor or reputation of the officer. (See Articles of War, 100, 106, 107.) I see no reason why the officer, having neglected to pay the fine imposed within forty days, can not be dishonorably dismissed from the service and such dismissal published in orders by the officer ordering the court.

Sig.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from Nathan Bijur, Esq., requesting further information regarding the rights of members of the National Guard with respect to free ferriage. The right to pass over ferries is secured only to persons belonging to the military forces of this State. Those claiming this right should be enabled to satisfy the ferry-masters that they are going to or returning from the performance of military duty required by law. This obligation is imposed upon those claiming the privilege, and unless they can show that they are within the law, they are not, in my opinion, entitled to the benefit of the statute. The ferry companies are not supposed to know that a person presenting himself at a ferry and claiming to pass free by reason of belonging to the military forces of the State is entitled to the privilege without some evidence.

First. That he belongs to the military forces of the State.

Second. That he is going to or returning from the performance of some military duty which he may be required by law to perform.

As I said in my previous opinion, members of the National Guard in uniform can ordinarily be assumed to be on duty; but this is only a presumption and by no means conclusive, and where a member of the military forces in uniform presents himself at a ferry, demanding to pass free, his right so to do can be challenged by the ferry-master and evidence required showing that he comes within the exemption of the statute.

The right of members of the military forces of the State to free ferriage when going or returning from Creedmoor depends wholly on whether such attendance is pursuant to orders or voluntary. Such attendance on days and at times ordered by competent authority, entitles members of the military forces to pass over ferries free.

Sin.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from Nathan Bijur, Esq., as counsel for a number of ferry companies, requesting my opinion regarding the right of members of the National Guard to pass over ferries, free.

Section 143 of the Military Code provides that any person belonging to the military forces of this State, going to or returning from any parade, encampment, drill or meeting, which he may be required by law to attend, shall, together with his conveyance and the military property of the State, be allowed to pass free through all toll-gates and over all toll-bridges and ferries.

Under this statutory provision, I am of the opinion that in order to entitle a person to pass over a ferry free, he must: First, belong to the military forces of this State; and, second, he must be going to or returning from a parade, encampment, drill or meeting which he has been required by law to attend. As the statute has imposed these conditions on the right of free passage, the person demanding the benefit of the privilege should be able to satisfy the ferry company that he is within the law. Members of the National Guard in uniform can ordinarily be assumed to be on duty, and passed over the ferry without hesitation. On the other hand, where members of the National Guard are in civilians dress, they should be able to satisfy the ferry-master, not only that they are such, but also that they are going to or returning from some place which they have been required

by law to attend. This can be done without annoyance or difficulty by the production of a certificate of membership and a copy of the order or notice requiring the soldier's attendance.

To the Adjutant-General, S. N. Y.:

SIR.—I have the honor to call your attention to the following extract taken from my opinion disapproving a section of the by-laws of Company C, Twenty-second Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y.:

"I disapprove of the word 'honorary' and all reference to honorary members as used in Article II. After mature consideration I have come to the conclusion that the Military Code does not permit of any membership in the National Guard known as honorary, and that the civil associations provided for by section 139 are intended to be identical with and composed of precisely the same individuals as constitute the military body. The military body only includes commissioned officers and enlisted men. In other words, it includes only active members, those liable to do military duty and who are amenable to law. A careful reading of the section referred to makes this evident. It is the members of the company that may 'organize themselves into an association.' The members of the company are the commissioned officers and enlisted men, and as they can only organize 'themselves' into a civil association, they can not include in the organization those who are not members of the military body. honorary members are not liable to military duty they have no place in the civil association. An honorary member is just as much a member of an association as an active member. His privileges are usually curtailed in some minor way, such as the right to vote, but, in other respects, especially as regards the free use of the quarters and property of the organization, he stands on equal footing with the The Legislature did not intend to permit the active members. armories and arsenals of the State to be used by a class who are independent of its laws, and who can not be called upon to perform

It does intend, however, that those who enter duty for the State. the State service and devote their time and energy in its behalf, may form themselves into a civil association, and thus, while still remaining a strictly military body, may, at the same time, engage in friendly and companionable intercourse. It may be said that honorary members are an advantage to the organization and enable it to derive financial support and influence without in any way interfering with its efficiency as a military body. But the question to be determined is not one of policy, but of purely statutory construction. Legislature that has made the law, and, as the law is promulgated, so it must be obeyed. I am, therefore, of opinion that all provisions in these by-laws, and in the by-laws of all other civil associations, providing for honorary members are unlawful and contrary to section 139 of the Military Code."

The question is one of so much importance that I think the substance of my opinion might with propriety be promulgated by General Order.

Sir.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from Captain Henry Smith, Thirteenth Separate Company, N. G. S. N. Y., inquiring if after ordering twelve compulsory drills this year he has the power to order weekly drills when they are not prescribed by the by-laws or by resolution.

Section 68 of the Military Code prescribes three things:

First.—For not less than five compulsory regimental drills and parades.

Second.—In addition thereto for not less than twelve compulsory drills in the evening, to be specified by the commanding officers of organizations.

Third.—For such drills and parades in the evening as the members of the organization shall prescribe in their by-laws or by resolution.

It will be noticed that this section does not limit the number of drills to be specified by the commanding officers of organizations. It does provide that there shall not be less than twelve, but it does not provide that the number that the commanding officer may specify may not be twenty or twenty-five or even thirty. This discretion has been vested in the commanding officers of organizations and is to be exercised by them and by them alone.

In the present case I am of the opinion that the commanding officer, after having specified twelve drills to be held in the evening, could specify as many more as he considered would be to the advantage of his organization, irrespective of any by-law or resolution of his organization.

The Adjutant-General, S. N. Y .:

Sin.—I am aware, that for years, it has been customary for the by-laws of organizations to provide for fines for non-attendance at drills, and that to-day in nearly every one of the by-laws of organizations of the National Guard, fines for absence from drill are specified.

The presence of any such provision in the by-laws is unauthorized and unlawful. The Legislature has provided by section 123 of the Military Code, that "every enlisted man who shall, without proper excuse, be absent from, or in any other respect delinquent at any drill, parade or encampment, meeting for instruction, or other duty ordered by competent authority, shall be fined by a delinquency court for enlisted men, not more than five nor less than one dollar for each absence or other delinquency." There is a plain direction that if an enlisted man is to be fined for absence from duty, he can not be fined less than one dollar for each delinquency. What right, then, have organizations to insert provisions in their by-laws, providing that enlisted men in case of absence from drill, parade or other military duty, shall be fined differently than the Legislature has enacted by statute? While organizations may adopt by-laws, and enlisted men offending against them may not only be tried by a delinquency court, but may be expelled from the organization (M. C., § 140), still there is no power given them to legislate on the subject of the fines to be imposed for absence from any military duty ordered by competent authority. (M. C., § 123.) This construction of the statute necessarily eliminates all such provisions from the by-laws of military organizations and limits the discretion of delinquency courts in the imposition of fines. It may be contended that the section of the Military Code quoted has always been construed as applying only to battalion drills and regimental parades and that it has no reference to company drills. But the statute will not bear such a narrow construction. Its language is broad enough to include all duty ordered by competent authority and there is nothing from which the inference can be drawn that the Legislature intended to give it the limited application suggested. I am, therefore, of the opinion that the only fines that can be enforced for absence from drills or other military duty ordered by competent authority are provided by section 123 of the Military Code, and that all provisions on the subject contained in the by-laws of any organization of the National Guard are unlawful.

I am of opinion that under the law as it stood in September, 1878, there was no authority for dropping Private Dwight from the rolls of his company for temporary physical disability. He has, therefore, continued to be a member of his company and an enlisted man in the National Guard, and upon his performing the necessary percentage of military duty, he would be entitled to his discharge.

RÉPORT OF THE INSPECTOR-GENERAL.

The Adjutant-General, S. N. Y., Albany:

SIR.—Complying with the provisions of M. C. 20 and R. 589, I have the honor to transmit my report for the current year.

Accompanying this I beg to submit reports of inspection and muster of the several organizations of the National Guard made by the Assistant Inspector-General, pursuant to General Orders Nos. 7, 13 and 31, General Headquarters, S. N. Y., and dated respectively February 21, April 5 and September 13, 1889.

The result of the muster shows the aggregate strength of the National Guard at that time to be 13,917, subdivided as follows:

Since the war the National Guard of the State of New York has made great progress, and the fact that it has been capable of reaching so high a degree of proficiency gives the hope that it may become in the near future a thoroughly homogeneous, well disciplined and reliable military force.

Some of the organizations have attained a state of great efficiency, others leave much to be desired.

Under present conditions almost the entire responsibility for the success of a command rests on its commander; a good colonel has a good regiment, and a good captain a good company; if either organization is retrograding, or is bad, the commanding officer must look to himself for the remedy.

Great care should be exercised in recruiting. The antecedents and employment of all applicants should be ascertained, and their surroundings known.

The number of men on the roll of a company is no criterion of its prosperity; the percentage of men present for duty at drill constitutes its strength.

The social element in the National Guard is a potent factor and no self-respecting man will enlist in a company in which the officers are bad, or in which there is a bad element in the ranks.

To raise the standard and make it more difficult to enlist will increase the applications.

There are two prominent causes for the absentee list being large in some commands, and necessitating the discharge of many men before the expiration of their enlistment: First, want of care in enlistment, and, second, an erroneous idea of discipline. Military orders should always be enforced with courtesy and firmness, without discussion. An order given should be followed up, and it should never be allowed to remain unexecuted. Violence of speech and manner have no place in the military establishment of this country.

I have the honor to recommend that a record, certified to by the company commander and first sergeant, be kept at each brigade headquarters, of the yearly attendance at drill of every command in the brigade, and at the expiration of the drill season cases which demand investigation should be looked into and reported upon to the Adjutant-General by the brigade commander.

Too much care can not be exercised by the brigade commanders in the selection of officers for the boards of examination, for upon them the fitness of the officers of the National Guard depends. The same care should be exercised in the appointment of the boards for the examination of non-commissioned officers.

In the First and Second brigades, where the troops are within easy reach of the brigade commander, they should be constantly under his supervision, and frequently feel his authority in their armories. Many of the organizations, instead of realizing their

intimate and important official relationship to their immediate superior, regard his headquarters only as the channel of their official correspondence.

The proper dependence of one grade upon a higher leads to prompt obedience and to homogeneity.

More care should be taken in drilling recruits before they take their place in the ranks of their companies. This is one of the great elements of success in those organizations which have reached the highest standard in the National Guard.

In order that there may be no misunderstanding in future in regard to the "Annual Inspection and Muster," the following requirements are given on which the military appearance of the companies will be judged:

Carefully prepared and correct muster-rolls. Percentage of attendance. Arms clean and in good order. Clean shoes. Where practicable wide-toed and wide-soled substantial shoes should be worn. Trousers well fitting, in good repair, clean and, when practicable, pressed. Coats clean, made to fit, in good repair, neat about the neck. Canteen and haversack worn well to the rear and in good order. Knapsack in good order, straps serviceable. Overcoats carefully rolled and strapped thereon. Blouses, caps and leggings (clean) in knapsack. The blouse folded and in good order, the cap clean and brasses bright. Brasses clean on helmet. Belt plate clean. Helmet worn square on the head, tipped neither to one side or the other. Belt in good order and above lower row of buttons, belt plate midway between the two rows of buttons. Cartridge boxes capable of being opened with ease, free from cartridge shells or cartridges, block in place. When beard is not worn, face cleanly shaven, hair not unnecessarily long. Gloves clean.

At attention the men in ranks should stand as prescribed in tactics, heels together, head and eyes to the front, no gazing about, no talking, no unsteadiness.

Captains should see that no tobacco is used when in ranks.

Great carelessness exists throughout the National Guard in saluting, by both officers and men. This recognition of superior authority should be strictly observed.

In the manual of arms constant attention should be given to the firings. In cases where the companies are well instructed marksmen, there should be more volley firing at Creedmoor. Every man should be thoroughly familiar with his weapon and accustomed to its use at the armory range.

A sufficient quantity of ammunition should always be kept in the armories for emergency.

There is a great want of promptness in many cases in the formations. Officers and non-commissioned officers are slow in getting to their places. Movements are too automatic. Celerity and precision are compatible.

The time spent in camp should be increased. A week once in two years, beneficial as it proves, is insufficient.

Time spent on the various systems of riot drill is wasted. The United States tactics, supplemented by common sense, are ample for all emergencies. Excellent essays on street fighting have been written by National Guard officers and should be carefully read.

The State troops will never present a thoroughly soldierly and neat appearance until captains are more careful about the clothing furnished fitting properly.

Officers of certain organizations are in the habit of addressing one another familiarly by the abbreviation of titles. This is highly unmilitary and should be discontinued.

Inspections should be held, as far as practicable, in the spring and out of doors. Regimental inspections in an armory give an imperfect idea of the proficiency of a command. They cover only the general military bearing and neatness, affording no thorough means of judging of instruction.

Some slight variations are observed in the manner of conducting reviews and inspections, even in the same brigade. These differences should be eliminated by order from general head-quarters.

The present knapsacks are poor, but for the present I recommend no change.

I respectfully recommend that the new armory in course of construction for the Twenty-second Regiment be utilized for the First and Second Batteries, the Signal Corps and the Troop, temporarily for the latter. It is a mistake to place one infantry armory in such close proximity to another as the new Twenty-second Regiment armory, as at present intended, will be to the armory of the Twelfth Regiment. If the artillery were quartered as suggested they would be in easy supporting distance of the Twelfth Regiment.

A reduction of the grade of many staff officers should be made. Officers who do the work should have the rank. A multiplication of military titles, without commensurate occupation, lowers the dignity of the service, and detracts from the value of rank in the National Guard.

A habit obtains in certain organizations, at the commencement of a movement, of stamping the feet. This should be discontinued.

At the next annual inspection it will be unnecessary to call attention to so many minor details as have been mentioned in this report.

The celebration incident to the 400th anniversary of the discovery of this country will probably necessitate the turning out of the National Guard on many occasions of ceremony. It is within its power to be equal to the occasion, and to prove itself worthy of the liberality and confidence reposed in it by the people of the State.

Major Montant, Assistant Inspector-General, First Brigade, accompanied me at most of the inspections of the First Brigade, and Major Sanger at all of those of the Second Brigade.

Colonel Thomas H. McGrath was present at all inspections and gave me the benefit of his long and valuable experience.

The details of the inspection of each company will be found on its muster-roll.

Strength of the National Guard, State of New York, of the regiments and companies will be found at the end of this report.

Also the report of Colonel Thomas H. McGrath, Assistant Inspector-General.

FIRST BRIGADE SIGNAL CORPS.

The First Brigade Signal Corps, was inspected on Thursday, October 10, at 8 p. m., in the armory of the Seventy-first Regiment, corner of Forty-fifth street and Broadway.

There were present seventeen (17) men out of an aggregate strength of twenty-four.

The signal apparatus was in good order, with the exception of a few of the sockets of the torches, which were bent and liable to break.

Uniforms were in serviceable condition; belts and sabres serviceable,

No blouses, knapsacks, haversacks, canteens, oil, wicks for torches or horse equipments had been issued.

One telegrapher and one stenographer belonged to the corps.

There is no proper place in the quarters assigned to this organization for the safe-keeping of the State property.

The command was steady and military in appearance.

Points in the city have been selected from which signals can be sent in all directions, but practical test has never been made.

Proficiency in signaling was as advanced as could be expected as only very few drills had been given in the new Code.

I have the honor to recommend that the Signal Corps be provided with proper quarters, either with one of the batteries or preferably with Troop "A," when suitable accommodations are furnished for it. That it be placed upon a mounted basis, in consideration of the weight the men have to carry in addition to the ordinary foot equipments, the distance they have at times to travel and the celerity necessary.

Each man should be provided with a signal kit, as by detail of an equal number of men for duty with the Signal Corps, the available force would be doubled.

The equipments should be as follows: Reinforced cavalry trousers, dress-coat, blouse, helmet, cap, haversack, canteen, bag, in lieu of knapsack, signal kit, carbine and cartridge belt or box.

Day and night signaling should be frequently practiced in the open air. The armory towers should be so arranged as to make this not only feasible but thoroughly convenient. Messages should be exchanged between New York and Brooklyn.

The work incident to the Signal Corps is easy, interesting and susceptible of infinite variation. An effort should be made to secure as recruits telegraphers and stenographers or those anxious to become familiar with these branches.

The Captain of the First Brigade Signal Corps is competent and zealous, and with proper aid from the State will undoubtedly add greatly to the efficiency of this most valuable branch of the military service. He purposes instructing other commands desiring it, during the ensuing winter.

SECOND BRIGADE SIGNAL CORPS.

The Second Brigade Signal Corps was inspected in the armory of the Third Battery on Friday, October eleventh, at 8 P. M.

Present at inspection, sixteen (16) men; absent, two (2); aggregate, eighteen (18), including three (3) telegraphers.

Uniforms in good order, with the exception of fatigue caps, which are unserviceable; sabres and pistols serviceable; no horse equipments or knapsacks; kits in good order, with the exception of the sockets of torches, which in a few cases were bent and would soon break in service.

Only three drills had taken place in new Code. The proficiency was as good as could be expected under the circumstances.

During the past year many night drills had taken place with the torch, in the open air, and several day drills with the flag.

Communication from all the armories to Second Brigade headquarters had been established, but none had yet been attempted with New York.

The command presented a military appearance.

The same recommendations as made for the First Brigade Signal Corps apply to this organization.

The commanding officer has ability and enthusiasm for his work. Great improvement is looked for in the Signal Corps of both Brigades during the ensuing year.

FIRST BATTERY.

The First Battery, New York city, was inspected at its armory, at the Wendel assembly rooms, on Forty-fourth street near Eighth avenue.

There were present one hundred and four (104) out of an aggre-

gate of one hundred and five (105) men.

The command presented a good appearance, a few slight errors were made in the ceremonies of review and inspection. With that exception the battery was well handled.

The drill was good, which, owing to the limited space was only

participated in by a portion of the command.

Uniforms were in good order with the exception of a few caps.

Equipments in good order. Brasses and shoes not as clean as necessary.

A few men were short of uniforms.

The prolonges were not serviceable and not proper prolonges for the three-ineh gun.

Harness very old and many parts unserviceable. It was well kept. It should be wholly condemned as unfit to repair. Gun carriages were rotten.

Four wooden horses should be supplied this battery for harness drill. Under present conditions the battery has to hire horses at its own expense for this purpose.

A small amount of ammunition was on hand but not properly stored, there being no suitable place in the building.

No target practice or no practical use of the guns had taken place for many years.

The battery was mounted three times during the past year.

This command should be moved at the earliest practical moment from its present quarters and given a suitable armory. The present accommodations are utterly unfit for the purpose.

The men were steady and silent in ranks, and kept their heads and eyes to the front while at attention.

THIRD BATTERY (GATLING).

On Tuesday, October fifteenth, the Third Battery of Brooklyn was inspected. Present sixty-nine (69) men; absent, ten (10); aggregate, seventy-nine (79).

Uniforms in good order; equipment and sabres in good order; brasses and shoes, in many cases, not properly cleaned.

There was a sufficient amount of ammunition on hand. The magazine was damp and not in a proper condition to store cartridges.

It should be repaired at once. Harness well kept, but very old This battery has had no field target practice. It has been mounted three times during the past year. Carbines are furnished but not used. Target practice should be had with them and a sufficient amount of ammunition kept on hand for emergencies.

Two wooden horses should be furnished this battery for harness drill.

The mechanism of the guns (Gatlings) was reported as worn and they are liable to clog in firing. This should be remedied at once, either with new parts, if practicable, or by furnishing new guns.

The appearance of this organization was good. The men stood well in ranks, marched well and at attention were silent and steady. The drill was good.

The battery gave evidence of careful instruction on the part of the officers and good discipline maintained by the battery commander.

SECOND BATTERY (GATLING).

The Second Battery, New York city, was inspected on Weinesday, October 16, 1889.

Present, ninety-seven (97) men; absent, three (3); aggregate, one hundred (100).

Clothing, equipments and arms in very good order. Sufficient ammunition for guns and pistols was on hand. There is no magazine in this armory, an omission which should be at once remedied.

During the past year the battery had two mounted parades and three mounted drills. There had been no target practice for three years.

The harness was well kept. The team harness for the Gatling

guns is in excellent and serviceable condition.

The team harness for the Napoleons is also in a fairly good condition, with the exception of the breechings, girths, belly-bands, stirrup, trussing, hames and saddle straps; the rims should also be replaced.

The horse equipments are all in fair condition with the exception of the reins, a few martingales, stirrup straps and stirrup boots.

The wheels of the Napoleons carriages are in a very bad state from dry-rot.

This command should be furnished with entirely new harness at the earliest practicable moment.

The appearance of the men and the drill were very good.

This organization should be placed at once on the best practicable footing in regard to guns, harness and equipments. It is ably commanded by a competent, prompt and energetic officer.

THE ARTILLERY.

The artillery in the organization of the National Guard is a difficult arm to handle.

No horses are allowed by the State and no target practice can be had in-doors.

An appropriation for horses is not to be expected, and the problem will have to be met under present conditions. There is a fair amount of proficiency attained in those details of the service that can be practiced in the limits of an armory. To reach further either of two methods are now practicable: to obtain permission from the general government to have the artillery of the State encamped on the reservation of an artillery post where a mounted battery is stationed, or to have a mounted battery of the regular service detailed for duty at the State camp during the presence there of the National Guard batteries.

If the funds are available, the artillery should go to camp every year, as there is so much that can not be accomplished in an armory, and an interval of two years is too long to retain accurately all the details of the artillery service acquired in camp.

Experienced men are constantly being discharged and replaced

by uninstructed recruits.

The essential points to which attention should be directed in camp is a matter of detail which would be prescribed in orders from the Adjutant-General's office.

Artillery armories should be built in close proximity to the armories of the infantry regiments.

TROOP "A."

On Thursday, October seventeenth, Troop "A," New York city, was inspected.

Present, seventy-three (73) men; absent, eight (8); aggregate, eighty-one (81).

The uniforms and arms were in good condition. The military appearance of the command was very good.

The bridles and saddles were in totally unserviceable condition and should be replaced at once. The Whitman pattern of saddle is desired.

This organization has no suitable accommodation furnished by the State. A building should be constructed with ample facilities for drilling.

This command is an excellent school for the training of officers for the cavalry, in case their services should be required in time of war. It also will afford instruction in tactics, military custom and routine which will be valuable to many of its members who may desire to continue their association with the National Guard in its various grades and duties after leaving the troop.

The commanding officer has had long and varied experience, and is a man of mature judgment and a most competent instructor.

THIRTY-SECOND REGIMENT (BROOKLYN).

The Thirty-second Regiment was inspected on Monday, October 21, 1889.

Present, three hundred and thirty-five (335) men; absent, one hundred and twenty-five (125): aggregate, four hundred and sixty (460).

The rifles and colors were in good condition. The clothing, in many cases, was not as neat as it should be. Equipments in fair order. Brasses generally very dirty.

The military appearance of the command was poor; there was much talking, unsteadiness and gazing about in the ranks; several men were under the influence of liquor.

The floor of the armory was soiled to a great extent by the use of tobacco. A few of the officers showed a want of instruction in the details of the ceremonies of review and inspection.

The large percentage of absentees made it evident that there were many on the rolls of the command who should be dropped.

This organization has labored under the disadvantage, for some time past, of poor accommodations. The present armory is ample for all its present needs and is liberally supplied with suitable appliances for the comfort of the command and for its instruction.

The commanding officer has much work before him to raise this regiment to the standard required by the State. He has it in his power to make marked improvements within the coming year.

FOURTEENTH REGIMENT (BROOKLYN).

The Fourteenth Regiment was inspected on Tuesday, October 22, 1889.

Present, four hundred ninety-eight (498) men; absent, seventy-one (71); aggregate, five hundred sixty-nine (569).

The rifies, colors, clothing and equipments were in very good condition. The brasses require a little more care. There were a few cases of men talking, unsteady and gazing about in ranks.

With the exceptions noted the command presented a very military appearance.

The field officers have had long and honorable service and are fully competent to maintain the good record of this excellent regiment.

THIRTEENTH REGIMENT (BROOKLYN).

The Thirteenth Regiment was inspected on Tuesday, October 24, 1889.

Present, six hundred seventy-four (674) men; absent, sixty-eight (68); aggregate, seven hundred forty-two (742) men.

Clothing, arms, equipments and colors in very good order. Men were steady and attentive in ranks.

This regiment is in an excellent condition, some of the companies were remarkably good, others suffered only by comparison. Under the present administration of the command it will undoubtedly reach a very high standard.

SIXTY-NINTH REGIMENT (NEW YORK).

The Sixty-ninth Regiment was inspected Tuesday, October 29, 1889.

Present, seven hundred seventy-five (775) men; absent, one hundred fifty (150); aggregate, nine hundred twenty-five (925).

Rifles were in very good order. Clothing, equipments and colors in good order.

This regiment is composed of a fine body of men, commanded

by a gallant old soldier.

The armory is utterly unfit for occupancy and is too small for so

large and prosperous an organization.

There were great differences in the percentage present and in the military appearance of the companies. Some had reached a high standard; others were far behind them in numbers, discipline and neatness. This organization should be second to none; the delinquent captains should be stimulated to increased efforts in the improvement of their companies.

TENTH BATTALION (ALBANY).

The Tenth Battalion was inspected on Wednesday, October 30, 1889.

Present, two hundred sixty-three (263) men; absent, twenty-nine

(29); aggregate, two hundred ninety-two (292).

Arms, clothing, equipments and brasses generally in very good order. Men were steady, silent and kept their eyes to the front while at attention.

The command presented a soldierly appearance.

When this battalion is quartered in its new armory with ample facilities for drilling, it should at once take its rank among the best organizations in the State.

FORTY-SEVENTH REGIMENT (BROOKLYN).

The Forty-seventh Regiment was inspected on Monday, November 11, 1889.

Present, four hundred and eighty-four (484) men; absent, fifty-one (51); aggregate, five hundred and thirty-five (535).

Rifles, clothing, colors and equipments in good order.

The general appearance of this command was good.

In some of the companies sufficient care had not been given to have the brasses clean, and there was an occasional want of steadiness in the ranks during inspection.

The floors of the armory were soiled in the vicinity of several companies by the use of tobacco.

TWENTY-THIRD REGIMENT (BROOKLYN).

The Twenty-third Regiment was inspected on Tuesday, November 12, 1889.

Present, eight hundred and forty-four (844) men. Absent, thirteen (13). Aggregate, eight hundred and fifty-seven (857).

Rifles, clothing, equipments and colors in very good order.

The regiment made a very good appearance. The commanding officer and company commanders are alive to their responsibilities, and no comment is necessary to call their attention to the requirements of the service.

TWELFTH REGIMENT (NEW YORK).

The Twelfth Regiment, New York, was inspected on Wednesday, November 13, 1889.

Present, five hundred and eighty-five (585) men. Absent, eighty-, three (83). Aggregate, six hundred and sixty-eight (668).

This is a prosperous and progressive regiment, with a complete and thoroughly equipped armory.

I am informed by the Assistant Inspector-General that each year finds the regiment in a better condition than at the previous inspection.

The rifles, clothing, equipments and colors were invery good order. The cases in which brasses were not clean, and in which men were unsteady and inattentive in ranks, were exceptional. A few men stained the floor by the use of tobacco.

At present the regiment is under the disadvantage of having but one field officer. He is, however, a man of ability and energy and is fully equal to the emergency.

The officers of this command are, as a rule, thoroughly posted in their duties, and very zealous in their performance.

TWENTY-SECOND REGIMENT (NEW YORK).

The Twenty-second Regiment, New York, was inspected on Thursday, November 14, 1889.

Present, six hundred and thirty-nine (639) men; absent, thirty (30); aggregate, six hundred and sixty-nine (669) men.

Rifles, clothing, equipments and colors were in very good order.

This command made a very fine appearance. No adverse criticism is necessary.

SEVENTH REGIMENT (NEW YORK).

The Seventh Regiment, New York, was inspected on Friday, November 15, 1889.

Present, one thousand and thirty-four (1,034) men; absent, six (6); aggregate, one thousand and forty (1,040).

As usual this command made a remarkably fine appearance and developed a phenominal strength.

I saw no deviation worthy of note from the most rigid requirements of the service by any member of the command.

Salutes out of ranks were not neglected, but were rendered on all occasions with great care. This is exceptional in the National Guard.

NINTH REGIMENT, NEW YORK.

The Ninth Regiment, New York, was inspected on Monday, November 18, 1889.

Present, five hundred and seven-four (574); absent, one hundred and ten (110); aggregate, six hundred and eighty-four (684).

Rifles in good order.

This regiment was in a most unsatisfactory condition, in spite of an evidently strong effort having been made to present a creditable appearance and a goo'd percentage of attendance.

It would not be just to hold this command to the same degree of responsibility as the other organizations of the First and Second Brigades. The unsafe and unfit condition of its armory renders battalion drills impossible, and the strong fumes of ammonia from the stables below tarnish the brasses within a very short time and render the clothing offensive.

Other quarters should be secured at once, and if it be not possible to hire a room sufficiently large for the whole regiment, it should be divided into two battalions and two rooms secured. The battalions to be under the command of the Colonel and Lieutenant-Colonel. The regimental organization not to be disturbed.

The regiment should be given an opportunity to reach the military standard required by the State. There are a large number of fine soldierly-looking men in the ranks.

Recognizing the adverse surroundings of the regiment I do not consider that the best possible results were obtained at the annual inspection.

SEVENTY-FIRST REGIMENT (NEW YORK).

The Seventy-first Regiment, New York, was inspected on Tuesday, November 19, 1889.

Present, five hundred and thirty-three (533) men; absent, fifty-six (56); aggregate, five hundred and eighty-nine (589) men.

There were several minor errors in the ceremonies of review and inspection.

At review the men were steady and silent in ranks.

Rifles, clothing, colors and equipments were in very good condition. Brasses in a few cases were in bad order.

Men at attention during inspection occasionally gazed about, talked in ranks and used tobacco.

It is only necessary to call attention in this regiment to its short-comings to insure immediate correction.

The organization gave evidence of being in a very prosperous condition.

EIGHTH REGIMENT (NEW YORK).

The Eighth Regiment was inspected on the 5th of December, 1889.

Present, three hundred and seventy-eight (378); absent, eighty-seven (87); aggregate, four hundred and sixty-five (465.) This regiment has been for many months without quarters and has thereby suffered in some respects.

The uniforms, arms and colors were in good order.

Brasses were not always clean. There were instances of inattention and the use of tobacco in the ranks during inspection.

The new armory, occupied for the first time, gave every inward indication of being most suitable for its purpose.

Another year will, without doubt, find this command among the first in the State. It has in it the elements of success and rapid progress.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT INSPECTOR-GENERAL.

INSPECTOR-GENERAL'S OFFICE, ALBANY, December 1, 1889.

The Inspector-General, New York city:

Sir.—I have the honor to report that, in compliance with General Orders Nos. 7, 13 and 31, General Headquarters S. N. Y., and dated respectively February 21, April 5 and September 13, 1889, I have inspected and mustered the several commands and respectfully submit the following report as to their condition:

FIRST SEPARATE COMPANY (PENN YAN).

Inspected May 8, 1889.—Present, fifty-four, from an aggregate of sixty.

The condition of this company is generally bad. A lack of thrift and discipline prevails and unless a radical improvement soon takes place it would be economy to disband it.

SECOND SEPARATE COMPANY (AUBURN).

Inspected May twenty-eighth.—Present, ninety-one, from an aggregate of 100.

This company is composed of a superior class of men, is ably commanded, and lacks nothing that appertains to a well-drilled, well-disciplined and thoroughly reliable organization.

THIRD SEPARATE COMPANY (ONEONTA).

Inspected May thirteenth.—Present, 103, from an aggregate of 104.

A gratifying improvement in the general appearance of this company is noted. Brasses, and shoes clean, uniforms and equipment neat and well fitted.

This is a good, substantial and reliable organization.

FOURTH SEPARATE COMPANY (YONKERS).

Inspected May seventeenth.—Present, seventy-six, from an aggregate of ninety-two.

This company is in very good condition and made a very creditable appearance at inspection. It is composed of a good class of men, and is efficient and reliable.

FIFTH SEPARATE COMPANY (NEWBURGH).

Inspected April fifteenth.—Present, ninety-two from an aggregate of 102.

A marked improvement is noted in this company as compared with last inspection, but there is still room for betterment. In drill it may be rated fair, and in discipline, poor.

SIXTH SEPARATE COMPANY (TROY).

Inspected March twenty-sixth.—Present, 104, being the aggregate strength of the company.

This organization, which has a long record of excellent inspections, surpassed itself on this occasion. The positive advance to a condition approximating perfection, is gratifying in the extreme, for which officers and men are to be congratulated.

SEVENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (COHOES).

Inspected May fourteenth.—Present, seventy-six, from an aggregate of eighty-eight.

This company is very poorly quartered; the drill-room is inadequate, and accommodations poor. Considering this, the condition of the company is creditable.

The State has made an appropriation for the erection of a new armory for the company, which, when completed, will give them ample opportunity to perfect their condition.

EIGHTH SEPARATE COMPANY (ROCHESTER).

Inspected May twentieth.—Present, eighty-three, from an aggregate of eighty-seven.

The company shows a gain of nineteen in the aggregate, and twenty-two in present, as compared with last muster. The past record of this company for drill and discipline has been excellent. It appears to be in a thriving condition.

NINTH SEPARATE COMPANY (WHITEHALL).

Inspected April ninth.—Present, seventy-five, from an aggregate of seventy-eight.

The condition of this company two years ago was so bad that it

was recommended for disbandment.

Since that time new life has been instilled, and it has steadily improved.

Its appearance and drill at this inspection gave evidence of conscientious work on the part of all concerned.

TENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (NEWBURGH).

Inspected April 16.—Present, sixty, from an aggregate of sixty-two.

Is composed of a fine class of men, in neat appearance, and is

proficient in drill and discipline.

ELEVENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (MOUNT VERNON).

Inspected May 30.—Present, seventy-four, from an aggregate of

eighty.

In appearance and drill this organization does not compare favorably with other separate companies. It is lacking in neatness, drill, discipline and military courtesy. A radical change must be effected to make the organization of value to the State.

TWELFTH SEPARATE COMPANY (TROY).

Inspected March 25.—Present, ninety-seven, from an aggregate of 102.

A large company composed of a class of men who have no inherent idea of discipline or courtesy.

The officers are poor instructors, and under their guidance, will

never make the company of any military value.

I believe the disbandment of this company would be a wise measure, and in the interest of discipline and economy.

THIRTEENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (JAMESTOWN).

Inspected May twenty-second.—Present, seventy-eight, from an aggregate of eighty-seven.

Composed of a fine body of young men, neat and soldierly in appearance, good in drill and discipline, but lacking in military courtesy.

Its condition is prosperous and may be rated with the best separate companies.

FOURTEENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (KINGSTON).

Inspected April eighteenth.—Present, sixty-four, from an aggregate of seventy-five.

This company, which was the subject of an unfavorable report last year, has materially improved.

In drill, steadiness, and military appearance, it may be rated good.

Much hard work is still required that it may attain a standing compatible with its make up.

FIFTEENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (POUGHKEEPSIE).

Inspected April 4, 1889.—Present fifty-seven from an aggregate of sixty-two.

This company has progressed during the past three years, from very bad to fair, and although still far from perfection should be commended for their good work. There is a pronounced want of discipline and courtesy. Military appearance fair.

SIXTEENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (CATSKILL).

Inspected April seventeenth.—Present forty-seven from an aggregate of fifty-four.

Considering the very poor quarters which this company had furnished them, its condition is probably as good as might be expected. It is very neat in appearance, and fairly drilled and disciplined. The State is now erecting a new armory, the prospect of occuping which should be an incentive to more active and thorough work.

SEVENTEENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (FLUSHING).

Inspected October twenty-third.—Present fifty-four from an aggregate of sixty.

Composed of a fine class of young men. Discipline, steadiness and military appearance very good. Has always had a good reputation which it still maintains.

EIGHTEENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (GLENS FALLS).

Inspected April tenth.—Present, seventy-four from an aggregate of eighty.

The company is composed of a good, reliable class of men. An improvement has been noted for the past few years, and this inspection may be pronounced the best in four years. Drill, good; discipline, fair; military appearance, very good.

NINETEENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (POUGHKEEPSIE).

Inspected May sixteenth.—Present, ninety-two from an aggregate of 104.

This is a thoroughly reliable and valuable organization, excellent in drill and discipline and ably commanded.

TWENTIETH SEPARATE COMPANY (BINGHAMTON).

Inspected May ninth.—Present, eighty-one, from an aggregate of ninety-nine.

Is in a thrifty condition, but lacked that excellence of appearance shown at last inspection.

It is a good company, well drilled and disciplined and well officered.

TWENTY-FIRST SEPARATE COMPANY (TROY).

Inspected March twenty-seventh.—Present, 103, being the aggregate strength.

This company has made rapid and remarkable progress during the past year, and may now be classed with the best in drill and discipline.

TWENTY-SECOND SEPARATE COMPANY (SARATOGA).

Inspected May fourteenth.—Present, seventy-nine from an aggregate of eighty-three.

Is composed of a superior class of men, interested and enthusiastic in their work, which is made evident by the high condition of efficiency and discipline existing.

TWENTY-THIRD SEPARATE COMPANY (HUDSON).

Inspected March twenty-eighth.—Present, seventy-seven from an aggregate of eighty.

This company has made steady progress during the past three years. It is required that finish and precision shall be added to manual and drill. The theoretical instruction appears to be generally correct. The composition of the company is excellent and at the present rate of progress will soon rank high.

TWENTY-FOURTH SEPARATE COMPANY (MIDDLETOWN).

Inspected March fourteenth.—Present, sixty-six from an aggregate of seventy.

Mustered into service about two years ago. It is to-day in fair condition. The Captain is not progressive and not a good instructor.

In many instances his commands are radically wrong.

The First and Second Lieutenants are both good officers. Earnest, theoretical and practical instruction is required to render the company valuable.

TWENTY-SIXTH SEPARATE COMPANY (ELMIRA).

Inspected May seventh.—Present, seventy-five from an aggregate of ninety-two.

A good company in every respect. Military appearance and discipline very good, and a general condition of thrift prevails. This is in such strong contrast with the condition of affairs at last inspection, as to be worthy of special mention.

TWENTY-SEVENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (MALONE).

Inspected June thirteenth.—Present fifty-three from an aggregate of sixty.

Appearance of the company very neat. Men steady and attentive.

This is a good company and has made marked improvement during the past two years. The armory is a small, dilapidated building, entirely inadequate, and they should, at once, be provided with suitable quarters.

TWENTY-EIGHTH SEPARATE COMPANY (UTICA).

Inspected March eighteenth.—Present, ninety-five from an aggregate of 100.

This company has, within the past two years, advanced from a condition which threatened disbandment, to a flourishing organization. The marked improvement is gratifying, and demonstrates what can be done by will and work.

TWENTY-NINTH SEPARATE COMPANY (OSWEGO).

Inspected March twelfth.—Present, sixty-five, from an aggregate of seventy.

In cleanliness of dress this company shows some improvement, but in drill, discipline and other important features, little or no improvement is shown.

The instruction is evidently not thorough or correct, and unless the present officers can show that they are qualified, it would be better that they gave way to competent men.

THIRTIETH SEPARATE COMPANY (ELMIRA).

Inspected May eighth.—Present, seventy-one from an aggregate of seventy-seven.

This is one of the best companies in the State. In drill, discipline and military appearance, excellence prevails. An efficient and reliable organization.

THIRTY-FIRST SEPARATE COMPANY (MOHAWK).

Inspected April second.—Present, seventy-five from an aggregate of seventy-seven.

This company was threatened with disbandment three years ago. Since that time it has somewhat improved and is to-day in fair condition. Discipline and courtesy are poor and drill only fair.

THIRTY-SECOND SEPARATE COMPANY (HOOSICK FALLS).

Inspected May 15.— Present eighty-seven from an aggregate of eighty-eight.

Everything that relates to a first-class organization is to be found in this company. Neat in dress, in drill; excelled by no company in the State, and in military courtesy superior to any company in the National Guard. They are always ready to be called upon and respond with a large percentage of the company.

THIRTY-THIRD SEPARATE COMPANY (WALTON).

Inspected May 6.—Present, eighty-eight from an aggregate of ninety-six.

This company is composed of intelligent, solid men, who are interested in their work. Neat and soldierly in appearance, good in discipline, and well instructed. A thoroughly reliable organization.

THIRTY-FOURTH SEPARATE COMPANY (GENEVA).

Inspected May twenty-eighth.—Present, seventy-one from an aggregate of seventy-eight.

The composition of this company is excellent. Men attentive and neat; steadiness during inspection marked; discipline good; drill very fair, even better than might be expected, when the very limited size of the drill-room is considered. The quarters provided are decidedly inadequate and unfit for the purposes of an armory.

THIRTY-FIFTH SEPARATE COMPANY (OGDENSBURGH).

Inspected June twelfth.— Present, eighty-five from an aggregate of 104.

The general condition of this company is good, and there is no

reason why it should not equal any in the State.

It is composed of a fine class of young men, who need only to be properly instructed to make them good and valuable soldiers. All nonsense and any departure from tactical drill should be eliminated. A company to keep pace with the progress of the day, has sufficient to do, in attending strictly to tactics. Discipline and courtesy fair.

THIRTY-SIXTH SEPARATE COMPANY (SCHENECTADY).

Inspected May twentieth.—Present, eighty-five, the aggregate

of the company.

This company has made decided improvement during the past year and is in a thrifty condition. Composed of substantial men, neat in appearance and well instructed.

THIRTY-SEVENTH SEPARATE COMPANY (SCHENECTADY.)

Inspected March twenty-first.—Present, eighty-eight from an

aggregate of ninety.

Have been for a long time without a captain, which has seriously impeded their progress. The company is composed of the best young men in Schenectady, and qualified to make good soldiers. Appearance neat, drill and discipline very fair.

THIRTY-EIGHTH SEPARATE COMPANY (OSWEGO).

Inspected March twelfth.—Present, sixty-four from an aggregate of sixty-eight.

This is an excellent organization in drill, discipline and

efficiency.

It is composed of a good class of young men, and ably commanded.

More attention is required to be given to military courtesy.

THIRTY-NINTH SEPARATE COMPANY (WATERTOWN).

Inspected June eleventh.—Present, eighty-six from an aggregate of eighty-nine.

This may be classed with the best of separate companies. It is in a prosperous condition, well officered and in every way a valuable organization.

FORTIETH SEPARATE COMPANY (SYRACUSE).

Inspected March eleventh.—Present, sixty-one from an aggregate of sixty-five.

There has been no progress made in this organization during the past year or two. Drill lacks finish and precision. Discipline is poor, and military courtesy ignored.

The company is in command of the First Lieutenant, whose competency I doubt.

In their present condition they are of very doubtful value to the State.

FORTY-FIRST SEPARATE COMPANY (SYRACUSE).

Inspected March eleventh.—Present, sixty-nine from an aggregate of eighty-one.

A very good company, under good discipline. Appearance very neat, and men remarkably steady.

FORTY-SECOND SEPARATE COMPANY (NIAGARA FALLS.)

Inspected May twenty-first.— Present, ninety-five from an aggregate of 101.

Composed of a most excellent body of men, and although one of the younger companies, has already attained a very high standard. The discipline is excellent, and the drill very good.

Neatness of dress and perfect adjustment of equipments are worth special note.

FORTY-THIRD SEPARATE COMPANY (OLEAN).

Inspected May twenty-third.—Present, sixty-nine from an aggregate of seventy-nine.

This is a very enthusiastic organization; progressive in all departments of drill, very neat in appearance, and has established itself among the best of separate companies.

FORTY-FOURTH SEPARATE COMPANY (UTICA).

Inspected March nineteenth.—Present, ninety-four from an aggregate of 102.

The inspection of this company was in every way creditable and this young organization may now be rated with the best companies.

Military appearance, discipline and courtesy of a high order.

FORTY-FIFTH SEPARATE COMPANY (CORTLAND.)

Inspected March thirteenth.—Present, fifty-seven from an aggregate of sixty-eight.

The general appearance of the company, very good; discipline, very fair; drill, poor. No instruction has been given in the loading and firing. The material of which this company is composed is as good as any in the State; and only proper care is required to raise it to a high standard.

FORTY-SIXTH SEPARATE COMPANY (AMSTERDAM).

Inspected April third.—Present, ninety-six from an aggregate of 102.

The uniforms and equipments of this company were only received by them about a week prior to the inspection. Considering the very short time they had for preparation, the inspection was a surprisingly excellent one.

There is a noticeable lack of military courtesy which should at once be looked to.

SIXTY-FIFTH REGIMENT (BUFFALO).

Inspected May twenty-fourth.—Present, 432 from an aggregate of 532.

The regiment shows a gain of sixty in the aggregate and sixtysix in present as compared with last muster, and has made marked progress in drill and discipline.

Companies B and G are the only ones which show no improvement, both being deficient in drill and discipline. It is recommended that the commanding officer look closely into the condition of these companies and direct such methods as will assure their improvement.

SEVENTY-FOURTH REGIMENT (BUFFALO).

Inspected May twenty-first.—Present, 426 from an aggregate of 448.

A gain is shown of sixty-three in aggregate and seventy-seven present, as compared with last muster. The regiment has been for some time without a colonel, which has undoubtedly been a drawback to the prosperity of the organization; so that under these circumstances the inspection may be considered creditable. Military courtesy is very poor.

FIFTH BATTERY (SYRACUSE).

Inspected October eighth.—Present, seventy from an aggregate of seventy-nine.

The battery is in as good condition as regards drill as can be expected from a National Guard organization.

Mounted drills are so few as to be of little practical value.

The dismounted drill is marked with life and snap, and highly creditable. Harness is in fair condition, being the best in the State and at present needs no repairs.

SIXTH BATTERY (BINGHAMTON).

Inspected October seventh.—Present seventy-four from an aggregate of eighty-three.

Instruction in dismounted drill is thorough. All movements executed with spirit and precision. Appearance and discipline very good. The organization is also provided with rifles, and infantry drill makes a very creditable showing. Harness is in bad condition. Belly bands, stirrup straps and all small straps are rotten, and in many places have been mended with wire.

Most of the collars are old and worn out, and all are too small to fit a horse of proper weight and build for a light battery.

Headstalls, bits, lines, traces, back straps and breechings are good, cruppers poor.

The Adjutant-General, State of New York:

SIR.—I have the honor to report, regarding this department, of its gradually increasing strength, and showing, by results, that the efforts made to properly instruct the National Guard in the use of their arm are being slowly appreciated.

There are yet too many — officers, especially — who, having no practical knowledge of the rifle or its use, still seem to think that knowledge of the manual of arms is all sufficient.

However, the increase in number practicing, especially in the First and Second Brigades, is very gratifying, and the increase in marksmen is large, viz.:

A change made, under your directions, in method of practice of the Third and Fourth Brigades, though not, perhaps, thoroughly understood by all, resulted, as a whole, beneficially, and the same general plan may, with some change of detail, be adapted to the whole State advantageously.

I could wish that more attention be paid to armory position and armory drill, believing it to be to rifle practice the same as proper "setting up" is to a soldier—the only firm foundation for perfection in the end.

The position of the two leading regiments shows what can be done where intelligent, active coöperation of all concerned is had and where individuals show the pride in their organizations which is so promotive of good results.

The passage of the law which will eventually make Creedmoor range State property, will undoubtedly prove of great benefit to the whole National Guard.

SIR.—The various ranges of the State have been visited as required by law. (Sec. 83, M. C.)

CREEDMOOR.

Used by the First and Second Brigades and the Fourth and Eleventh Separate Companies of the Third Brigade.

Nearly 900 men used this range in free practice, and about 5,800 under orders, out of 8,209.

The law passed in 1889, which will make this range State property, has not yet been fully effected.

The range generally is in fair condition. Repairs will be needed, however, as soon as the State gets control.

First Separate Company.

Penn Yan.—As far as possible, this range is in good shape; fairly well looked after.

Second Separate Company.

Auburn.—Range new in 1888; in good shape.

Third Separate Company.

Oneonta.—New targets in new pit; new location this year; a substantial, carefully built and good range.

Fourth Separate Company.

Yonkers.—Practices at Creedmoor.

Fifth Separate Company.

Newburgh.—Range and pit in good order; 500-yard firing point has been improved.

Sixth Separate Company.

Troy.—Practices at Rensselaerwyck. (See Tenth Battalion.)

Seventh Separate Company.

Cohoes.—Practices at Rensselaerwyck. (See Tenth Battalion.)

Eighth Separate Company.

Rochester.—In better shape than in 1888; not as well looked after as should be.

Ninth Separate Company.

Whitehall.—Butt good; need one more second and one more third-class target; company deserves recognition.

Tenth Separate Company.

Newburgh.—See Fifth Separate Company.

Eleventh Separate Company.

Mount Vernon.—Practices at Creedmoor.

Twelfth Separate Company.

Troy.—Practices at Rensselaerwyck. (See Tenth Battalion.)

Thirteenth Separate Company.

Jamestown.—Range exceedingly well cared for; new in 1888.

Fourteenth Separate Company.

Kingston.—Good butt; needs some little repairs before shooting again.

Fifteenth Separate Company.

Poughkeepsie.—Firing points have been changed; are good now; targets and pit in first-rate shape; all well cared for by the commanding officer Nineteenth Separate Company.

Sixteenth Separate Company.

Catskill.—New range in 1888; well cared for but should be carefully overhauled in the spring owing to the character of the soil.

Seventeenth Separate Company.

Flushing.—Practices at Creedmoor.

Eighteenth Separate Company.

Glens Falls.—Generally in good shape.

Nineteenth Separate Company.

Poughkeepsie.—See remarks Fifteenth Separate Company.

Binghamton.—Range a good one, but as building is increasing in the immediate vicinity a new location should be chosen, when new targets should be granted.

Twenty-first Separate Company.

Troy.—Practices at Rensselaerwyck. (See Tenth Battalion.)

Twenty-second Separate Company.

Saratoga.— New butts and pit in 1887; are in good shape.

Twenty-third Separate Company.

Hudson.—A good range throughout; exceedingly good care shown.

Twenty-fourth Separate Company.

Middletown.—Location not yet selected, though range was ordered in 1887; slow work.

Twenty-sixth Separate Company.

Elmira.—Uses range of the Southern Tier Rifle Association; an allowance of \$100 this year to put butt in good shape ought to last for several years now.

Twenty-seventh Separate Company.

Malone.—Old range condemned; are about locating anew.

Twenty-eighth Separate Company.

Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh Separate Companies.

Schenectady.—Butt and targets fair; firing points should be rebuilt; small expense to each company.

Thirty-eighth Separate Company.

Oswego.—See notes Twenty-ninth Separate Company.

Thirty-ninth Separate Company.

Watertown.— Range and butts rebuilt this year. In first-rate shape now.

Fortieth and Forty-first Separate Companies.

Syracuse.—Location for new range selected, but not safe, and rejected. Another now under consideration.

Forty-second Separate Company.

Niagara.—Good range; butt in fair shape only; more care exercised than in 1888.

Forty-third Separate Company.

Olean. — Everything in good shape except firing points at 100 and 200 yards.

Forty-fourth Separate Company.

Utica. — See remarks, Twenty-eighth Separate Company.

Forty-fifth Separate Company.

Cortland.—Location of range condemned; new one selected; if secured will build in spring,

Forty-sixth Separate Company.

Amsterdam.— New company; have selected new range; not yet passed inspection.

Tenth Battalion.

Albany.— Use range at Rensselaerwyck; can add nothing to my report of 1888, except to emphasize same.

Sixty-fifth and Seventy-fourth Regiments.

Buffalo.— Use range at Bay View; repaired to extent of \$250 this year; is now in fair shape; old butt and pits are continually in need of care. Nearly 9,000 men practiced under orders, and in matches and free practice about 4,000, showing continued and increasing interest.

REPORT OF THE SURGEON-GENERAL.

NEW YORK, December 14, 1889.

The Adjutant-General, State of New York, Albany, N. Y.:

SIR.—In again submitting the annual contribution of the Surgeon-General to you, as a factor of your yearly report, I am constrained to digress from the previous methods employed — the reporting of figure-facts - to a broader plan, that of present and perspective contemplation of the relation of the Medical Department to the National Guard of the State. The figures cited in the past show a good comparative physical status of the respective organizations, as well as a not infrequent fondness for the medical and surgical supplies provided by the State. However, notwithstanding the direct outlay made yearly for such supplies for the benefit of the guard while in camp, en route to camp, and at Creedmoor, I am pleased to be able to report that as yet not a death has occurred in the camp, or elsewhere stated, that can be justly attributed to the presence or absence of medical and surgical sup-The State Camp has not been visited by serious diseases, yet it is true that on several occasions severe and even dangerous attacks of illness have happened there, still as yet no one has died there from natural or unnatural causes, nor has any one been removed from the camp to avoid the possibility of such a result. No form of disease peculiar to aggregated bodies of troops, either of a simple or specific nature, has yet caused a well-founded apprehension even, on the part of the medical officers. It is not prudent, however, to rely alone on past records in sanitary matters. The recognized advances in these things that are made at other places, with vastly different associations, should be employed here, in so far as they can be found serviceable in a sanitary

sense. Often military commandants in times of peace think less of sanitary perfection than of military pomp, forgetful of the fact that the hidden and insidious influences of existing and perspective disease are more persistent, powerful and fatal foes, than their own kind, even when armed with the most destructive of human agencies. The skirmish lines of military mimickry in times of peace are given more consideration by many commandants than is given to skirmish lines of disease, which are ever present and alert, in times of peace and war. The sanitary appointments of the State Camp are excellent indeed, except perhaps in a few isolated instances. The prolonged and profound soil-saturation beneath and contiguous to the present kitchen is the most important instance of the kind. On many occasions it has been the duty of the chief medical officer of the State to urge the importance of the recognition of this fact in conjunction with the early employment of steps to effect a radical change in the matter. The medical officers, too, of the respective commands, while in camp, have recognized this danger and suggested the abatement of its possibility. Now that the indulgent authorities have allowed moneys with which to built suitable accommodations for the purpose of a mess-hall, the fact should not be lost sight of that the method of its construction and the environments are matters requiring most careful consideration by men inexperienced in such matters.

In my report of 1888, your attention was called to a pernicious practice of long standing in the guard, of issuing uniforms to recruits that have been worn previously by men then connected with the service. This practice often uniforms men who enter the service actuated with noble impulses, in the dirty and defective clothing of those who have been discharged for dereliction of duty. This clothing, if it must be used at all for others, should be first thoroughly cleaned and repaired by the proper officers before being reissued, in order that commendable individual fastidiousness and personal dignity of the recruit be respected, or cultivated, if it do not exist already. There is no one requisite so essential to the healthfulness and usefulness of men in active service as the one that inculcates self-respect and personal dignity. The use of second-hand uniforms at all is not ennobling; but when these uniforms are soiled and out of repair, then, indeed,

they can but lessen the esprit de corps and patriotic constancy of intelligent soldiers, who can but feel that their personality and calling are belittled by the authorities that accept their services.

Not long since you caused to be addressed to me for an opinion the question of the advisibility of requiring a physical examination to be made of all recruits of the guard. The wisdom of such a requirement appears to me to be self-evident. have been so strongly impressed in the past of the utility of such a step that I have recommended its adoption on several occasions. I know of no sadder spectacle than that often witnessed in the State Camp, of men who, by reason of permanent physical incapacities, though with transient periodical manifestations of the same, are forced to a personal exhibition of these infirmities that . is distressing to themselves and friends, and demoralizing to their associates. The admission or retention in the guard of such as these is not kind to them; is not just to the State, nor is it creditable to the service. In this connection it is wise to recall the fact that an unscrutinized admission to the guard will complicate the making of the proper and just discrimination so necessary to the appropriate pensioning of members, under the present law relating to it. Men who suffer from physical defects that are increased by their service, will be poorly paid indeed, even though they secure a pension; and, on the other hand, the State will have received but little or nothing for the moneyed expenditure entailed. I am happy to be able to state, however, that in many organizations a physical examination is required before admission; still, it is to be regretted that the wisdom of individual commandants in this respect caused them to forestall any similar action on the part of the State authorities.

The unabated enthusiasm of the medical officers of the guard in fitting men to render "prompt aid to the injured," is a matter of official and general congratulation. The special use has saved many a man while on duty at the camp from physical danger and disorder. The general public application of this knowledge by the instructed men has often been of great service to unfortunate citizens in time of physical distress. The amount of time which many of the medical officers give to the perfection of this work is highly creditable to them and to the guard itself. The unselfish

assiduity displayed by these medical officers in their work, and of their pupils themselves, renders the objections to it on the part of self-sufficient, inappreciative and captious officers so puerile and miscroscopic, as not to entitle their cause to the dignity of a just characterization. It will not be long, I think, before all military officers in the State, who have discouraged or obstructed this step, will raise themselves to the higher level that contemplates the principle that brings the greatest good to the greatest number, rather than the one that fosters pedantic ostentation or childish obstruction. I am of the opinion that during the next encampment it will be wise to detail one or two competent members of the medical corps of the State, whose duty it shall be to cause systematic instruction to be given to the "details" in all matters relating to the proper methods of conveying the sick and injured. The physical relations of the camp are such to the surrounding country, that all the humane problems in connection with carrying the unfortunate soldier can be well inculcated.

I know of no better test of the interest which medical men take in the scrupulous performance of their duties than the promptness shown by them in camp, and by the care and thought displayed in all respects as evidenced by the various annual reports of duty. While it is not unfair to assume that busy medical officers would do better in making final reports if less busy when off duty, or if they really thought it were necessary; still, neither is it unfair to assume that the ones most interested, irrespective of other occupations, will find time to make full and complete reports. I do not desire to make an invidious deduction by omitting all other reports than the following. Each of the medical officers who have made as complete a report as this one will see that it is unnecessary to publish all of this class; and, too, they will be gratified with the example selected. While those who have not given the time and thought that this implies, should be thankful for the opportunity of scrutinizing it. It is not intended to convey the idea that the Surgeon-General approves of each of the items as set forth in this report, for such is not the case. It is intended, however, that this report should serve as an exhibit of prompt, faithful, persistent and conscientious work and forethought on the part of the officer making it, such as many of the medical officers of the guard would do well to emulate.

HEADQUARTERS, SEVENTY-FIRST INFANTRY, NEW YORK CITY, July 22, 1889.

The Surgeon-General, State of New York:

SIR.—I have the honor to inclose herewith the consolidated report of the Seventy-first Regiment and First Provisional Battalion, also separate medical reports, and to submit the following report as surgeon of Seventy-first Regiment and medical officer of the post from June twenty-ninth to July sixth, both dates inclusive.

The regiment left its armory, Broadway and Forty-fifth street, at 10.45 A. M., June twenty-ninth, in heavy marching order, and proceeded to the foot of Forty-sixth street, North river, where the steamer Long Branch was in waiting to convey it to Roa Hook. The weather was close and muggy, and the departure of the regiment from the armory was made at an early hour, owing to the stifling heat of the building. One man was prostrated by heat as we reached the dock; he rallied by the time we reached Roa Hook, and I directed him to ride to camp in the ambulance.

The Seventeenth Separate Company of Flushing was on board the Long Branch when we reached the boat. We left at 12 o'clock, and a stop was made at Yonkers to take on board the Eleventh Separate Company of Mt. Vernon. Roa Hook was reached at 3 p. m., and shortly afterwards we relieved the Seventh Regiment and took possession of the camp. The Fifth Separate Company of Newburgh, and the Sixth Separate Company of Troy, were already in camp when we arrived. I reported to you for orders and was directed to assume the duties of Post Surgeon. Assistant Surgeon A. C. Combs, Seventeenth Separate Company, reported to me for orders (having been directed to do so by you), and I directed him to act as medical officer of the First Provisional Batwas directed to assume medical charge of the Seventy-first talion. Assistant Surgeon C. C. Osborn, Seventy-first Infantry, Regiment.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE REGIMENTAL COMMANDANT.

The following letter was sent to commanding officer of Seventy-first Regiment, viz.:

HEADQUARTERS SEVENTY-FIRST INFANTRY, NEW YORK CITY, June 29, 1889.

The Commanding Officer of the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y.:

SIR.—The following recommendations are made for the benefit of this command, while at the State Camp of Instruction, Peekskill, N. Y., from June twenty-ninth to July sixth, inclusive.

Respectfully.

E. T. T. MARSH, M. D.,

Major and Surgeon, Seventy-first Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y.

First. That no hard work should be commenced until an hour after meals.

Second. That at least three hours elapse between the last meal and tattoo.

Third. That if the heat should be excessive, battalion drill should commence an hour after breakfast, instead of at a later hour, and continued until noon; by so doing there would be less danger of the men being prostrated by the heat, and the drill could be brought to a finish without cutting it short. The company drills could be held at the time set down for the battalion drill, and the number of men being smaller, advantage could be taken of the shade afforded by the trees around the parade ground.

Fourth. That drill officers should give their men frequent rests during the excessively hot weather, at which times they should be allowed to remove their helmets or caps and open their coats.

Fifth. That drill officers should carefully notice the condition of the men while drilling, and if any be noticed with pale countenances, he should be ordered to "fall out" at once and be taken to a shady place and placed in a recumbent position, with the head a little lower than the body, the clothing being opened and all bands loosened; the members of the ambulance corps will render "first aid" until the surgeons have been communicated with.

Sixth. That the company servants should be directed to mix oatmeal or ginger with the water supplied to the men for drinking purposes. They should not be allowed to carry iced lemonade in their pails, as has been done on parades.

Seventh. That bathing should be permitted and encouraged. On account of the inconvenience, distance and liability to accident, swimming in the river should not be permitted. The men can bathe all that is necessary in the bath-houses now existing at the camp.

Eighth. That a detail from the ambulance corps should accompany the "grand guard" so that "first aid" can be rendered to any one requiring it during the absence of the guard from camp.

ADVICE TO THE MEN.

Advice to the men was given by means of the following circular:

The commanding officer of the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y.:

SIR.—I deem it eminently proper at this time (the regiment having been ordered to the Camp of Instruction, near Peekskill, N. Y.) to offer some advice to the members of the Seventy-first Regiment, and I do so by means of the accompanying suggestions.

The members of the regiment should bear in mind that they are going to a camp noted for its great healthfulness, where they will be well fed and well taken care of, and they should coöperate with the surgeon in keeping the sickness down to a minimum; this they can do if they will only pay attention to common-sense facts.

Respectfully.

First. That all members of this command wearing trusses should, before going to camp, see that they are in good repair and properly adjusted.

Second. That all members of this command who suffer from frequent attacks of looseness of the bowels, should wear a light flannel band around the waist during their stay in camp.

Third. That the men should provide themselves with the proper kind of boots or shoes, low heels, soles as broad as the foot when the weight of the body is resting upon it, and long enough to allow of the full play of the foot in walking; pointed shoes should not be worn.

Fourth. That the men should not wear collars or anything tight about the neck, and the rest of the clothing should be free and loose.

Fifth. That the men should wear a folded wet cloth in the crown of the fatigue cap or helmet when exposed to the intense heat of the sun.

Sixth. That the men should avoid the immoderate use of icewater, especially when overheated and at rest, or when the body is commencing to cool; violent cramps, purging and vomiting are apt to follow in consequence, and immediate death has been known to occur.

Seventh. That the men should remember that moderately cold water is the most grateful to the stomach and allays thirst better than any other fluid; ale, beer and the spirituous liquors are the worst of all, and their use during the tour of duty in camp should be rigidly avoided.

Eighth. That the men should avoid eating unripe fruit of all kinds. Ninth. That the men should bathe daily; by so doing skin eruptions and chafing are prevented or rendered less frequent. The feet should be carefully looked after and bathed; blistered feet will be less frequent if this is done. Sufficient time should be allowed for the feet to dry before putting on the stockings after bathing, as they are liable to be quickly blistered if active exercise is taken while the skin is still soft from the recent use of water and the stockings are damp. Cold baths should not be taken either immediately before or after a meal.

Tenth. That the men should remember that exposure to a draught, when overheated, which cools the body too suddenly, is exceedingly dangerous.

Eleventh. That the men should wear their suits of underclothing on alternate days, thereby allowing each suit to become thoroughly dried and aired before being worn again. Twelfth. All who are unaccustomed to strong coffee are advised to dilute that served in camp largely with milk, otherwise they are liable to suffer from diarrheea.

MEDICAL OFFICERS IN CAMP.

Major and Surgeon E. T. T. Marsh, Seventy-first Infantry—post surgeon.

Captain and Assistant Surgeon C. C. Osborn, Seventy-first Infantry, medical officer in charge of Seventy-first Infantry.

First Lieutenant and Assistant Surgeon A. C. Combes, Seventeenth Separate Company, medical officer in charge of First Provisional Battalion.

The latter officers were to attend sick call at 5.15 A. M.

A medical officer was always to be in camp, and his whereabouts was to be known at the adjutant's office.

AMBULANCE CORPS.

A number of the Ambulance Corps were detailed each day for duty. They were provided with such remedies as they might need in rendering "first aid." I was very much pleased with the manner in which they performed their duties, and consider that I have a thoroughly competent corps.

WEATHER.

With the exception of the last two days of our tour of duty the weather was most unfavorable for the performance of the routine work. The first two days were close and muggy, then followed four days of almost continuous rain. The last two days were fine and much hard work was done by the men.

HEALTH OF THE MEN.

A consideration of the sick report for both commands will show that the disorders for which medicines were dispensed were trivial in character and call for no special mention; but one man was excused from duty during the encampment, viz., a private of Fifth Separate Company, First Battalion. He suffered from cholera morbus and was excused from duty for three days. He was sick when he reached camp.

Company G, Seventy-first Regiment, and the Sixth Separate Company of Troy, were without any cases of sickness during the encampment. In this connection, I wish to mention the valuable

support afforded me by my assistant surgeon, Captain Osborn, and to cheerfully accord to him the praise due him for his untiring attention to those under his medical charge.

ROUTINE WORK.

In spite of the bad weather during the encampment but one drill was omitted, namely, the battalion drill on Tuesday. The men more than made up for the loss of this drill, by the amount of work they did during the remainder of the tour. On the morning of July fourth it rained heavily, yet battalion and skirmish drills were held until 11.45, when the men were drawn up in readiness for the parade and salute, which was to be fired at noon in honor of the day. A violent rain-storm broke over the camp at 11.50, and the parade was dispensed with and the men ordered under cover. A few were chilled by the rain. To these, as well as to the detail from First battery which fired the salute, a ration of whisky was administered as a precautionary measure.

SHAM-BATTLE — CASUALTIES.

On the morning of July fifth there was a sham-battle between the two wings of the Seventy-first Regiment. At one time it seemed as if there would be a number of serious cases as a result, judging from the earnestness manifested by the men, but fortunately the casualties were few and but slight in character. All told, they amounted to twelve: nine powder wounds, one concussion of brain, and two slight wounds, one of face and one of hand. They required but little care, and in a short time the men were up and around and volunteered for the grand guard which left at 3 P. M., and the attacking party, which left camp at midnight.

GRAND GUARD.

The grand guard of about 100 men left camp at 3 P. M., Captain Osborn, Assistant-Surgeon, and four of the Ambulance Corps were detailed to accompany the grand guard. There were a number of slight casualties which required the attention of the medical officer in charge. One of the officers, Lieutenant Rogers, Second Battery (detailed to Seventy-first Regiment), fell down a ravine at midnight, sustaining a lacerating wound of hand, but he continued on duty after he had been attended to by Captain Osborn. The manner in which the members of the Ambulance

Corps performed their duties was favorably reported to me by Captain Osborn when he returned to camp.

ATTACKING PARTY.

At about midnight an attacking party of about 150 men left camp under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Dennison and passed through the lines of the grand guard by orders of Colonel Kopper. A detail of four of the Ambulance Corps accompanied the command to render such aid as might be necessary. About 2.45 a. m., July sixth, having made a detour and evaded the grand guard, the attacking party made an attack on and captured the camp. There were a few casualties such as powder burns and one slight lacerated wound of forehead, but they were of slight importance and were not heard of afterwards. Favorable mention was made by Lieutenant-Colonel Dennison of the manner in which the members of the Ambulance corps rendered "first aid" to several of the members of the attacking party who needed their services.

SANITARY INSPECTIONS.

As Post Surgeon, I made two sanitary inspections daily, one at 10 A. M. and the other at 5 P. m. Every portion of the camp was gone over carefully in order to prevent the existence of anything that might be detrimental to health. I consider the sanitary condition of the camp during our tour of duty was almost perfect.

SERVANTS' QUARTERS.

The quarters of the servants, back of the mess-hall, were rigidly examined at each inspection. At my first inspection I found the grounds and tents in anything but a good sanitary condition. I had no occasion to complain after my first visit.

MESS-HALL, KITCHEN, ETC.

The mess-hall and other buildings adjacent were very clean and free from any bad odors.

SINKS.

The sinks required constant watching, as many times during the day the troughs were without water, it having siphoned off, owing possibly to the interference of the valves at the exits by paper, etc. The troughs at these times would be filled with offensive faecal matters. Whenever this condition of affairs

existed, I notified Mr. Travis and it was attended to at once. This occurred to all the sinks—officers', men's and servants'.

DUMP.

The dump, owing to muggy and wet weather, became very offensive and required to be disinfected on two occasions.

BATHS.

The baths were well patronized by the men all day. Many were unable to bathe. The officers complained very much of being unable, owing to the crowded condition, to bathe even once during their stay in camp. The baths were of great service to the men, and no doubt prevented many from suffering from some variety of skin eruption.

FOOD.

The food was of good quality, well cooked and well served; the supply was more than abundant. The arrangements for preserving the food are excellent. The food, both cooked and uncooked, was inspected twice daily and no cause for complaint existed during our stay in camp.

WATER.

The water was excellent in quality and the quantity was more than sufficient for all purposes.

DRAINAGE.

The drainage of the camp during the heavy rains was excellent; all water was carried off quickly, leaving camp free from puddles, except in some portions of the main street where shallow holes had been made by the brooms of the police. The water was easily swept away by brooms. One day Company D street was flooded owing to the drains at each end of the street being stopped up by grass and weeds. When these were removed the water was quickly carried off.

Policing.

Policing was thoroughly done by both commands. After the first day the policing of the entire camp was perfect.

Shortly after 2 o'clock P. M., July sixth, the Tenth Battalion of Albany arrived in camp, and Major Balch having relieved me, I assumed medical charge of the Seventy-first Regiment. The

Fifth and Sixth Separate Companies left about 2 o'clock for their respective stations by train. About 3.30 p. m., the Ninth Regiment arrived in camp and relieved me. We marched to Roa Hook and took the steamer to New York, arriving at our armory at 7.45 p. m., without incident or accident.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

Sick calls.

That an afternoon sick-call be established and set down for 5 P. M.

BATHS.

That the number of baths be at least doubled.

STREETS.

That the main street be concreted or laid with brick, in order to prevent the hollows due to constant sweeping of dirt from the streets by the police.

Underbrush, Etc.

That the high underbrush and lower limbs of the trees on the edge of the bluff and borders of the camp be cut away so as to allow of freer circulation of air in and about the camp.

AMBULANCE CORPS.

That the members of the ambulance corps be permitted to wear the "brassard" at all times, or at least when on duty in camp, especially when detailed for duty with the grand guard or in the field during sham battles. A number of the corps were fired at during the sham battle of the fifth of July, and one had his face burned by powder.

In concluding this report I wish to acknowledge the many courtesies which have been extended to me by the State officers in camp, during my tour of duty.

There seems to be no doubt of the fact that the bathing accommodations of the State Camp should be increased, also, that the apparatus directed to controlling the aflow of water in the

respective apartments be simplified and made more practical and easy of use by the bathers.

In my previous reports I have not infrequently called the attention of the authorities to the necessity of the cultivation of trees on the top and incline of the bluff, and again commend this measure to your earnest consideration. These trees will serve two important aims: 1. To actively combat the malarial influences that may emanate from the contiguous low, marshy surroundings. 2. Afford good shade during the heat of the day. It may be claimed that all trees ought to be cut away to afford freer access to grateful breezes on hot days. However, if the breezes are around on those days, their influence will be easily felt, irrespective of the trees; if, however, they be absent on a hot day, then, indeed, will the shade be grateful and necessary, to say nothing of the influence on miasm. There should be more trees, larger and higher trees.

I can not close this brief report without speaking in terms of high commendation of the services of Mr. Frank Wanier, post hospital steward; also of Mr. Ford, of the firm of Hazard, Hazard & Co., of this city, who, with his usual courtesy contributed to the camp the use of a complete practical outfit of surgical apparatus without any expense to the State. The commissary department of the camp has been for so long a time, and still continues to be so efficient and satisfactory in all respects, that to speak of it even in well-merited terms of laudation seems somewhat of a supererogation. With such enterprising and conscientious men as Messrs. Yale and Weinholz, the demands for the comforts of the men are studied and met: the interest and dignity of the State made secure, and harmony and good fellowship are caused to prevail at all times. Finally, permit me again to renew my expression of personal gratification for the courteous treatment extended to me thus far at all times by the officers and men of the National Guard of the State.

SIR.—In accordance with P. 591, R., I have the honor to submit the following report of the First Brigade N. G. S. N. Y.:

MOVEMENT OF TROOPS.

On April thirtieth, in accordance with G. O. Nos. 9 to 14 and 17, c. s. G. H. Q., the brigade paraded to take part in the centennial celebration of the inauguration of the first President of the United States.

On May thirtieth, the brigade made the usual Memorial Day parade as escort to the Grand Army of the Republic.

On October thirtieth, the brigade paraded in Brooklyn, N. Y., uniting with the Second Brigade N. G. S. N. Y., Brigadier-General James McLeer commanding, in the ceremonies incident to the the laying of the corner-stone of the Brooklyn Soldiers and Sailors' monument at Prospect Park, in that city.

The following regiments of the brigade were present at the State camp, in accordance with G. O. No. 22, G. H. Q.: The Seventh, Ninth, Twelfth, Twenty-second and Seventy-first Regiments, and details from the First and Second Batteries of Artillery.

STRENGTH OF THE BRIGADE.

The aggregate strength of the brigade by the quarterly return, dated September 30, 1888, was 5,717. The strength for the corresponding quarter this year is 5,552, a loss of 165.

ELEVENTH REGIMENT.

By S. O. No. 128, G. H. Q., dated Albany, December 24, 1888, this regiment was mustered out of the service of the State, causing a reduction of 581 in the numbers of the brigade.

CAVALRY TROOP.

A company of cavalry, known as "Troop A," was organized and mustered into the service of the State on April second, and now numbers 101 enlisted men and four officers.

This troop promises to be a desirable acquisition to the National Guard, and due credit should be given to its commander Captain Charles F, Roe, for his patience and devotion in bringing the troop to its present state of discipline and efficiency.

SIR.—Pursuant to section 591 R., I beg to herewith render report for the past year.

The strength of this brigade, as per last quarterly return rendered September thirtieth, is as follows:

Per S. O. 123 series 1888, G. H., the Twenty-fifth Separate Company was disbanded and mustered out of service.

The only service required of this brigade in support of law was performed by the Forty-third Separate Company on the morning of the 25th of November, 1888, upon the call of the Sheriff of Allegany county to disperse or capture a large party of tramps. The summons for duty was promptly responded to and

this disagreeable duty well performed, although unsuccessful in the capture. The bearing of this command on that occasion was highly creditable to all concerned.

Pursuant to G. O. 9, 14 and 17 G. H. c. s. this brigade assembled at Buffalo and Syracuse on April 28, 1889, and proceeded to New York by West Shore railroad in seven sections, the first section leaving Syracuse at 7.20 P. M. and the last at 9 P. M., and arriving at Madison Square Garden about 10.40 A. M., April twenty-ninth, where a camp was formed. The transfer from Weehawken to New York was made with dispatch, for within an hour and one-half of the arrival of the last section at Weehawken, the command was in camp. At 5.30 P. M. a brigade dress parade was held on the plazza, Union Square, from which the battery was excused. This being the first brigade dress parade ever held in New York city, distances could not be judged or maintained, hence the ceremony lost much of its beauty.

On April thirtieth this brigade left camp at 9 A. M., marched to Nassau and Pine streets at 10.40, and after waiting until 2.40 P. M., took up position in line, passing in review before the President and reached camp at 5.40 P. M.

Return to station was made on May first by West Shore railroad, leaving camp at 9 A. M. and arriving at the several stations between 9 P. M., May first, and 2 A. M., May second.

The entire movement was made with dispatch and time-table of train movement was very well maintained. Discipline during the entire tour was admirable, and I have no individual instance of any serious breach of discipline to report. The contractor for meals in camp at New York failed in large part to perform his duty, thereby causing widespread discontent among the men, for which \$2.300 was deducted from the contract price of the contractor, but no case of sickness has been reported in consequence. I consider the tour as most remarkable in the matter of sanitation. But one man was reported on sick list, although the men were all more or less wet before entering cars and some food was offered unfit for use. During the parade of the thirtieth of April there was no straggling until on the return to camp three enlisted men fell out for faintness and were cared for by the Ambulance Corps. I wish, in this connection, to acknowledge the special services rendered to me by the general superintendent of the West Shore railroad, for his persistent care and attention, whereby the transportation of this brigade was rendered highly successful. Also, to the officers and men under my command, all of whom did well the several duties required.

This brigade made the usual parade on Decoration day, as escort to the Grand Army of the Republic.

The troops stationed in Buffalo paraded as escort to the Commander-in-Chief, on the evening of April 22, 1889, from the Niagara Hotel to the Music Hall, Buffalo.

The Sixty-fifth Regiment made a voluntary night march and tour of grand guard duty on October fifth and sixth, and despite the bad weather much good work was accomplished.

I desire to again recommend that during the coming year some practical marching work be attempted at least by that part of this brigade not ordered to camp. I beg to suggest a brigade movement during at least five days, the details of which I be permitted to arrange.

During the present year overcoats of blue, and white leggins have been issued to this brigade, both of which I heartily indorse.

The general condition of this brigade I would report as highly satisfactory in the main points. Enlistment has been healthy and increase gradual.

I desire to especially request that breech-loading guns be supplied to the Fifth Battery as early as practicable.

Rifle practice has been very well attended in view of the many days of service required of a large portion of this command, and I am especially gratified at the work accomplished in this department. It is especially desirable that a range be established at Syracuse.

I also desire to again recommend an allowance to officers for renewal of uniform. With the additional work required of all active officers, uniforms can not be maintained with exemplary neatness, without a considerable outlay which in many cases is a positive hardship. I hence feel that the service will be improved and a superior class of officers secured by an allowance annually, graded according to the expense involved in original outfit.

REPORT ON MARCH OF SIXTH BATTERY BY COM-MANDING OFFICER.

SIXTH BATTERY, THIRD BRIGADE, N. G. S. N. Y., BINGHAMTON, N. Y., September 15, 1889.

The Adjutant-General, State of New York:

SIR.—I have the honor to report that in order to comply with Special Order No. 85, c. s., General Headquarters, State of New York, I issued Battery Order No. 10, a copy of which is hereto annexed.

At 9 o'clock, September fourth, the Battery was reported "in order," and the march taken up. The command consisted of three commissioned officers of the Battery, Captain David Wilson, Second Battery, N. G. S. N. Y, attached, Acting Chief of Caissons, four staff sergeants, three duty sergeants, four corporals, and forty-six privates, Private C. D. Rogers, M. D., surgeon. The outfit comprised four three-inch rifled guns, four caissons, two baggage wagons, one ambulance, and fifty-five horses. Five hundred cartridges, 100 case shot, fifty shells, and 1,000 friction primers were carried in the chests, and on caissons one day's forage. The baggage wagons and ambulance contained 200 blankets, six hospital tents, two camp stoves, cooking utensils, surgeon's and veterinary surgeon's stores, commissary and minor battery stores.

At the end of the first mile a halt was made to adjust harness. A thorough inspection of carriages was made, and everything being found in order, the march was resumed for one hour, and a distance of three miles was covered through the worst cloud of dust I ever experienced. Here a halt was made to ascertain if any of the horses were afraid of the steam cars, as most of the route was to be by the side of the railroad. Finding that no inconvenience would be experienced on this account, we proceeded

until two o'clock in the afternoon, having marched ten miles, when the battery was parked, horses unhitched, unharnessed, watered and fed at the picket rope, and dinner cooked and served for the company. After resting an hour and a half, I ordered "Boots and saddles" blown; and the march was again resumed for seven miles. We arrived at the village of Windsor at 6 o'clock, where we located our camp and parked on a fair ground. A careful examination of everything was made with the following result: Two horses with lost shoes, one lock chain broken, four horses with sore necks, the veterinary surgeon reporting three of them sore when we started, and one sore back. The horses were unhitched, unharnessed, blanketed, watered, fed, tents pitched and filled with straw, and supper cooked, in about two hours. A guard was established with three posts near the picket line, and one on the park whose attention was taken up constantly during the night by the horses, who realized the change from their usual work and quarters as much as ourselves, so that morning found all of us with but very little rest.

September 5.—"Reveille" was blown at 5 o'clock, with "stable" following, as was the custom during the remainder of the march. The duties were well performed for men with no previous experience in the field with horses. After breakfast camp was struck and the march resumed at 8.30 o'clock, with little or no trouble. The horses were quite inured to their harness and work, and the drivers comprehended their duties. After proceeding twelve miles over a very hilly road, we reached Harpursville, where we parked, unhitched, watered and fed; the company taking dinner at a hotel to economize time. After resting two hours, we proceeded to the village of Afton, distance six miles, where we were obliged to camp owing to the sore necks, backs and galling of several of the horses. A careful inspection showed that the saddle blankets were too old and worn for active service; that many of the collars were not of a proper size or construction for the business; and five new ones were purchased to remedy the difficulty. Here the services of our veterinary were appreciated, who, by his constant care and attention, rendered most valuable assistance. In strong contrast with the time required by the men on the previous evening for performing their duties, I will state that the battery was parked, horses unhitched, unharnessed, watered, fed with hay and oats, tents pitched and filled with straw, one for each section and one for officers, and supper ready in thirty minutes. The discipline was perfect, and all details performed their duties to my entire satisfaction. Tattoo roll call found all present; taps were blown at 10 o'clock, with guards as usual.

September 6.—Battery reported in order at 9.30 A. M., and drilled until noon, firing 100 blank cartridges during the various movements, when a terrific wind and rain-storm suddenly arose, drenching all, and came very near wrecking the camp; the drivers with difficulty controlled their horses, while it required the efforts of all the cannoneers to prevent the tents and camp equipage from being blown away. When the storm had passed the horses were fed and dinner served, and the march was resumed at 2.30 o'clock for Coventryville, distance seven miles. This was by far the hardest day's march of the trip, it being over the mountains. The lock chains were in use much of the time, and the cannoneers were obliged to march the entire distance through a hard rain, over a country road hardly wide enough for the carriages to pass. We arrived at 5.30 P. M., and parked on a small green in front of a church, using the church sheds for stables. The usual duties were performed in a less time than on the previous even-The men being drenched with rain, a large camp fire was built and supper served, and by tattoo all were again dry and warm. Notwithstanding the extremely hard march and inclement weather, I never observed more willingness and attention to duty than on this occasion, both by officers and men.

September 7.—The weather was cold, with wind and rain. The battery commenced the march at 9 A. M. for Greene, distance twelve miles. A halt of forty minutes was made at Coventry, distance two miles, to repair harness and have six horses shod. We arrived at Greene at 2.20 p. M., during a heavy rain-storm. We parked and located our camp in a large meadow delightfully located, and with every convenience for the mounted inspection on the following day. After a drill of three hours, I decided on account of the rain to place the horses in the two hotel stables, with a guard in each for safety against fire. In the evening a school was conducted in the hotel parlor, and was attended by all the officers, non-commissioned officers off duty and drivers. The various field movements and ceremonies were explained and demonstrated, and very beneficial results were obtained.

September 8.— On Sunday "Reveille" sounded as usual and the battery marched to the stables for duty, after which breakfast was served at the hotel, it being over a mile to camp and raining hard. Invitations were received by the commanding officer from the several churches for the command to attend services, and was taken advantage of by nearly all. At noon the rain ceased, and fine weather continued during the remainder of the march. The horses were taken to camp and fed at the picket line, and dinner served in camp.

Learning that Colonel McGrath, Assistant Inspector-General, would be unable to inspect us as anticipated, I determined to improve the remainder of the day by drill, and ordered "boots and saddles" sounded at 1.30 p. M.; at 2 o'clock the battery was reported in order, and three hours of active drill was had, ending with a thorough inspection and review, which was witnessed by hundreds of spectators. Vast improvements were noticed in drivers, cannoneers and horses. After supper all but the guard were excused until tattoo roll call to attend church.

September 9.— The battery was joined by Lieutenant W. R. Hamilton, Fifth Artillery, U. S. A., who had been detailed by the Adjutant-General to accompany us. We broke camp at 9 A. M., and marched ten miles to Chenango Forks; horses were unhitched, watered and fed, the command taking dinner at the hotel. A delightful spot for camp was secured on a flat close by the Chenango river, where we proceeded at 2 P. M., and occupied the remainder of the afternoon in drill for the observation of Lieutenant Hamilton, whose valuable suggestions were appreciated by all, the horses and men showing continued improvement.

September 10.—We left Chenango Forks at 10 a. m. for Binghamton, distance, twelve miles, where we arrived at 2 p. m., making a parade through the principal streets of the city, with teams docile and willing, arriving at the armory at 3 p. m., where the battery was housed and the horses delivered to their owners with every indication that they left their new work as reluctantly as they commenced it. On the first mile of the march most of the team horses were unmanageable by the drivers; and cannoneers were therefore detailed and stationed near their heads to prevent accident, after which they partially became accustomed to the situation and commenced to learn the duties required of them. During the remainder of the march they were perfectly

tractable, evincing a fondness for the business and a disposition to learn equal to that of their drivers. I firmly believe that many of the horses, on their return, understood and obeyed of their own accord several of the oral commands, as well as commands with the trumpet.

The attachment between horses and drivers, who had so well and carefully fed, groomed and cared for them during the week, was daily increasing, and at times it seemed difficult to determine who exhibited the best disposition to improve and properly perform the duties required of them, horse or man.

The route of march was mostly over strange roads, and we were unexpected by the inhabitants, who on all occasions gave us a hearty and hospitable welcome, manifesting a great interest in our project and a desire to assist us in every manner. Public receptions were tendered us on two occasions, which, in compliance with orders, were respectfully declined.

During the march rations were mostly cooked in the field, and camp grounds selected daily by the quartermaster sergeant who preceded the battery a few hours, contracting for forage, straw for the tents, wood and such other necessaries as were required, so that on our arrival everything was ready and waiting at the camp ground to be delivered.

During the entire march not a man was excused from duty on account of sickness, and but one for accident which was not serious. The discipline was excellent, with not an occasion for a reprimand; officers and enlisted men seemed to have anticipated the hardships and inconveniences to be experienced, and to vie with each other as to who could be the best soldier.

I consider the march an unqualified success, inasmuch as all, from the commanding officer to the youngest recruit were constantly receiving, night and day, that practical instruction necessary to constitute an artilleryman, and which experience can not be obtained in any other manner. It demonstrates the proper manner of making a light battery the most useful and effective adjunct of the National Guard. Could this experience be repeated each year, I am sanguine that the artillery branch of the Guard would improve to such an unprecedented extent that it would be ready at a moment's notice to take the field, manned, horsed and equipped, marching either by land or rail, and fulfill all the duties that could be desired or expected. This can only be

accomplished by an increased allowance of funds, which at present is hardly enough to meet the ordinary incidental expenses, and keep in repair the uniforms and equipments, the wear and tear of which is many times greater than in other branches of the service.

The principal inconvenience experienced was from defective equipment; the harness was old and rotten, constantly breaking and causing delay; most of the collars are unsuitable both in size and style, causing bad galls and sore necks; the saddle blankets are old and thin. The battery should be supplied with watering bridles and canvas suits for stable duties, in order to save uniforms.

I regret that a target ground could not be obtained owing to the proximity of roads and buildings, rendering it unsafe to fire shot or shell.

I desire to thank Lieut. W. R. Hamilton, U. S. A., for valuable assistance and information, regretting that he was unable to join us at the commencement of the march; also Captain David Wilson, Second Battery, N. G. S. N. Y., whose efforts went far to accomplish the success achieved.

Sincerely hoping that our efforts so well begun will meet with such an approval as to cause the repetition of a mounted march for a longer duration.

REPORT OF GENERAL J. G. FARNSWORTH

ON THE

Condition of the War Claims of the State against the United States, December 31, 1889.

Albany, N. Y., December 31, 1889.

To the Adjutant-General, State of New York:

SIR.—I have the honor to report that the claims of this State against the United States for expenses incurred in organizing, enrolling, subsisting, clothing, arming, etc., troops employed in the service of the United States during the late civil war, has been steadily prosecuted throughout the past year.

New evidences have been obtained, and explanations prepared and filed with the accounting officers of the United States Treasury and are now under their consideration, with confident expectation that allowances for the State will be made at an early date and in time to secure an appropriation for payment during the present session of Congress. Meanwhile further proofs are being procured to perfect suspended vouchers, and explanations are in preparation to remove misunderstandings that may exist as to their character.

The claim for interest paid by the State on Comptroller's bonds issued in 1861 for expenses incurred in raising troops for the United States service, amounting to \$131,188.02, is pending in the United States Court of Claims, and it is believed that it will soon receive favorable consideration.

A bill to refund duties on arms imported by the State in 1863, amounting to \$42,796.87, has already been introduced by the Hon. Charles Tracy in the House of Representatives, and a bill for the payment of certificates issued by State to the soldiers of 1812 has also been placed in his hands for introduction.

A bill for refunding the direct tax levied in 1861 has been introduced and is pending in Congress. The amount due to this State under its provisions is \$2,213,330.86.

A bill is also pending for the readjustment of interest due on account of the war of 1812 to this and other States. Under its provisions New York is entitled to over \$100,000.

Every effort will be made to secure the passage of these and other bills in which the State is interested.

The annexed statement shows the present condition of the claims filed with the accounting officers of the United States Treasury.
