



SIR.—I have the honor to submit the following report of the operations of this office for the year 1911:

NATIONAL GUARD.

The strength of the National Guard on September 30, 1910, was 991 officers and 14,584 enlisted men, aggregate 15,575. On September 30, 1911, the strength was 991 officers and 14,710 enlisted men, aggregate 15,701, a net gain of 126.

Battery A, Field Artillery, stationed in Syracuse.

2nd Ambulance Company, stationed in Redector. 31: Aug. Nov. 2nd Ambulance Company, stationed in Rochester.

In addition the following changes in existing organizations have been made:

The 1st Battalion, Field Artillery, was reorganized on August 30, 1911, by detaching therefrom the 1st Battery and assigning thereto the 6th Battery, and the designations of the 2d, 3d and 6th Batteries comprising the 1st Battalion were changed to Batteries A, B and C.

On the same date the 1st Battery was expanded into three batteries by organizing two additional, and the three batteries designated Battery D, E and F, and organized as the 2d Battalion, Field Artillery.

The 3d Squadron Cavalry was organized on September 11, 1911, and composed of Troops B and D, and on December 27th the 1st Cavalry was organized, composed of Squadrons A and C and the 3d Squadron.

The 1st Ambulance Company, stationed in Albany, was reorganized on November 29, 1911, as a field hospital, and designated the 2d Field Hospital.

Of the newly-created organizations, Companies M, 7th Infantry, M, 12th Infantry, and L and M, 65th Infantry, were authorized last year, but the organizations not completed until the dates mentioned.

The creation of a new field hospital and an additional ambulance company provides the Division with two of each of these sanitary units, thus completing one-half of the number properly required for the Divisional Organization. Plans have been perfected whereby the two additional field hospitals and two additional ambulance companies may be created in an emergency by the detail of existing medical officers and enlisted men from the Hospital Corps.

The report of the Major-General commanding the Division is transmitted herewith as Appendix A.

NAVAL MILITIA.

On September 30, 1911, the strength of the Naval Militia was 61 officers and 785 men, an aggregate of 846.

As a measure of instruction, orders were issued on December 15th for the mobilization of the 1st Battalion, Naval Militia, on the evening of December 16th, armed and equipped as infantry for shore duty. Twenty-four hours' notice was given of the mobilization, and the battalion was required to assemble with all necessary tentage and camp equipage. The battalion assembled and marched to the armory of the 22d Engineers, and reported there at 9 o'clock P. M., December 16th, for inspection by the Adjutant-General. The attendance was 87 per cent., and the appearance and general fitness of the battalion for the duty for which equipped was very satisfactory. This was deemed of value, as being a demonstration of the preparedness of the Naval Militia for duty different from the ordinary routine of their work, but still duty to which they might at any time be called.

The report of Commodore R. P. Forshew, commanding the Naval Militia, is submitted herewith as Appendix B.

Note.—The sum of \$201,624.24 was apportioned to the State of New York under the Act of Congress approved May 27, 1908, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1912. Of this amount \$114,066.67 is for clothing, \$68,665.95 for ammunition and \$18,891.62 for other military stores. The sum of \$169,704.43 has been drawn against the above to December 31, 1911.

Circular No. 13, War Department, Division of Militia Affairs, dated July 1, 1911, sets forth the following instructions governing the funds allotted to the State of New York under section 1661, Revised Statutes, as amended, and under the Act of Congress,

approved May 27, 1908, as indicated in the preceding statements relative to these funds:

UNDER SECTION 1661, REVISED STATUTES.

- a. The law requires that the funds appropriated under section 1661, Revised Statutes, shall be apportioned among the several States, under the direction of the Secretary of War, according to the number of Senators and Representatives to which each State is entitled in the Congress of the United States and to the Territories and the District of Columbia such proportion and under such regulations as the President may prescribe, provided that no State shall be entitled to the benefit of the funds apportioned to it unless the number of its regularly enlisted, organized, and uniformed active militia shall be 100 men for each Senator and Representative to which such State is entitled in the Congress of the United States.
 - b. These funds are available for expenditure for the following purposes:
- (1) For any stores and supplies or publications which are supplied to the Army. In this connection it should be noted that the funds are available for the supply of articles of dress-uniform clothing, whereas issues of clothing made under the Act of May 27, 1908, can be only for field-service uniform.

(2) For the payment, subsistence, and transportation of such portions of the Organized Militia as shall engage in actual field or camp service for

instruction. (3) For the actual excess of expenses of travel incurred by officers of the Regular Army in connection with the inspections of the Organized Militia

prescribed in section 14 of the Militia Law, over the authorized mileage allowances of said officers in traveling under War Department orders.

(4) For the promotion of rifle practice, including the acquisition, construction, maintenance, and equipment of shooting galleries and suitable

target ranges.

(5) For the hire of horses and draft animals for the use of mounted troops, batteries, and wagons in connection with field exercises for instruc-

tional purposes. (6) For the hire of horses for officers below the grade of major who are required to be mounted; when horses are hired for such officers no extra

pay will be given to them.

(7) For forage for horses and draft animals in connection with field

- exercises and instructional purposes.
 (8) For such incidental expenses as may be deemed necessary by the Secretary of War, in connection with encampments, maneuvers, and field instruction provided for in section 14 of the Militia Law, and for the same in connection with joint maneuvers or exercises with regular troops under section 15 of this law.
- c. Under the requirements of paragraph 296, Regulations for the Organized Militia, 1910, the amounts in this column are set aside for the promotion of rifle practice as provided in said act, and must be entirely devoted to that purpose; any balances thereof on June 30, 1911, will be carried forward to the next fiscal year for application to the same object. These amounts constitute the minimum limits of expenditure for the promotion of rifle practice required by the Department, but it should be expressly understood that no maximum limitation of amount has been fixed, the governors of the States and Territories having discretionary authority to expend for this purpose in excess of such minimum requirement any amount out of the balance of the allotment to the State or Territory for other purposes as in their judgment may be deemed proper.

d. The attention of disbursing officers of the several States, Territories, and the District of Columbia Militia is invited to the provisions of paragraphs 146 to 220, of the Regulations for the Organized Militia, 1910, governing the acquisition, accountability, and expenditures of these funds.

Disbursing officers are particularly cautioned that they are not authorized to make purchases of supplies for the use of the Organized Militia in open market (paragraph 171, Regulations for the Organized Militia); supplies must in all cases be obtained by requisition, as provided in paragraphs 45 to 47, Regulations for the Organized Militia.

Under Act of Congress approved May 27, 1908.

(a) Twenty-five per centum of the annual allowance of ammunition for the Regular Army will be issued to the States, Territories, and the District of Columbia, according to the organized enlisted strength as shown by the last inspection reports of the United States Army officers, on requisitions duly made out and submitted by the States to the proper supply department of the War Department, through the Chief, Division of Militia Affairs.

An additional 25 per centum of ammunition will be issued on other requisitions, similarly submitted, provided the reports of small-arms firing of the troops in the State or Territory or the District of Columbia made on Form 15, D. M. A., copies of which should accompany the requisitions, give evidence satisfactory to the Secretary of War that the ammunition previously issued has been judiciously expended, the issues made hereunder being without charge to the State's allotment from the appropriation under section 1661, Revised Statutes.

In no event can the total allowance for ammunition be exceeded, but any portion or all of said allowance, if not utilized for ammunition, may be expended in the procurement from the Department of other military stores and supplies.

b. Requisitions may be submitted by governors of States for military stores of all kinds required for the Army of the United States, except articles of the dress uniform. Whenever it appears from reports of inspections made by officers of the Regular Army, under section 14 of the Militia Law, that the Organized Militia of a State, Territory, or the District of Columbia is uniformed for active duty in the field, the Secretary of War will allow to that State, Territory, or the District of Columbia an annual clothing allowance of \$8.33½ for each man of the organized enlisted strength of its militia. The States, Territories, and the District of Columbia will, when entitled to this clothing allowance, be notified by the War Department of that fact by letter, and issues of clothing thereafter to such States, Territories, or the District of Columbia can not exceed in value the amount of this allowance. The value of clothing issued under this allowance will become a charge against the amount apportioned in Table II, under the heading of "Supplies."

Prior to the time a clothing allowance is fixed by the Secretary of War no restrictions exist as to issues of clothing, except that the total amount set apart in the last column of Table II can not be exceeded.

The provisions of section 13 of the Militia Law, which permit the governors of States and Territories and the commanding general of the District of Columbia Militia to drop from their returns each year clothing corresponding in value to the clothing allowance, does not become operative until the governor of such State or Territory or the commanding general of the District of Columbia Militia has been notified by the War Department that such clothing allowance has been fixed for it by the Secretary of War. In all other cases obsolete and unserviceable clothing can be dropped from returns only after inspection and condemnation in accordance with the provisions of section 4 of the act approved June 22, 1906, amending section 1661, Revised Statutes. (See paragraph 15, Regulations for the Organized Militia.)

The issue of clothing by the War Department to the Organized Militia under the act of May 27, 1908, does not in any way preclude the use in obtaining clothing of the amount allotted for "Arms, equipments, and camp purposes," from the appropriation provided by section 1661, Revised Statutes, as amended.

The following property was issued to the State during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1911, as a charge against the unallotted portion of the appropriation under the Act of Congress of May 27, 1908, to equip five newly-organized companies of infantry and one newly-organized ambulance company.

PAY REFUND, SPANISH WAR, UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE ACT OF CONGRESS, APPROVED JULY 8, 1898, AS AMENDED BY ACT OF CONGRESS APPROVED 1899.

This allowance was for balance of State pay due officers and enlisted men of the New York State Volunteers from date of assembly at the rendezvous to date of muster into the service of the United States service, and paid over by the Auditor of the United States Treasury to the Governor of the State of New York for distribution on certificate No. 35,098 and filed as the seventh installment, Spanish War claims.

In distribution of this fund so many differences in record between State and government have arisen, the Adjutant-General through the Attorney-General filed a claim for further allowance. This claim has been allowed by the Treasury Department on certificate No. 12,428, known as the second allowance.

The War Department has authorized the issue, free of charge to any allotment of the State, of complete equipment for newly-organized Battery D, 2d Battalion, Field Artillery, and Battery A, Field Artillery. The value of this equipment is about \$190,000. This property is now being received.

Requisitions have also been made on the War Department for complete equipment to be issued free from newly organized Battery F, 2d Battalion, Field Artillery, but the same have not yet been approved.

Two thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight pairs of russet marching shoes have been received from the War Department during the year 1911 for issue to the National Guard. These shoes do not give entire satisfaction, being too wide for their length and not having box toes. It is understood that the War Department contemplates the adoption of a new pattern shoe to meet these objections. When adopted the new pattern shoes will be issued to the National Guard.

Aluminum identification tags have been drawn from the War Department, together with marking outfits for stamping them. These tags are to be worn by each officer and enlisted man of the National Guard and are to be stamped with the name, rank, company, regiment, corps or department of the wearer.

1,100 copies of Militia Regulations, 1910.

1,050 copies of Army Regulations, 1910.

Five thousand one hundred and eighty doses of anti-typhoid vaccine were obtained from the War Department during the year for the purpose of immunizing the National Guard of the State.

Signal flags and flag kits have been ordered from the War Department for issue to companies of infantry as required by paragraph 45, Infantry Drill Regulations, 1911.

In the past officers accountable for public property have experienced much difficulty in determining what articles issued were State and what were United States property. A General Order has been issued, giving a list of articles which are United States property and also containing information as to how these articles are marked.

The Ordnance Department, U. S. A., under date of September 1, 1911, designated a large number of articles as expendable in addition to those already so designated in price list of the Ordnance Department. A General Order has been issued, giving a list of these articles and authorizing accountable officers to drop the same from their returns when the articles have been actually expended for an authorized purpose in the public service.

Requisition has been made upon the War Department for seventy-five escort wagons. This is sufficient for four regiments of infantry. It is the intention to obtain these wagons for all organizations of the National Guard as soon as funds allotted to the State by the United States will permit.

Under date of September 21, 1911, the Chief, Division of Militia Affairs, War Department, Washington, D. C., informed this office that the reports of inspection of the troops of the Organized Militia of the State of New York, made by officers of the

United States Army, in accordance with the provisions of section 14 of the Militia Law, show that the National Guard is sufficiently armed, uniformed and equipped for active service in the field, except as to revolvers and trumpets, and that as to those articles, no steps should be taken at present to supply deficiencies for the reason that new model Colt's pistols and new pattern trumpets had been adopted by the War Department, but could not be ready for issue to the State until 1912.

The War Department has adopted a sweater to be worn in the field only, about camp, and on the march when the weather is too cold to admit of the use of the flannel shirt alone, and to supplement the blanket as a sleeping garment, the service coat no longer forming part of the uniform of troops in the field. It was the intention to obtain these sweaters for issue to the National Guard this year, but information has been received from the War Department that none will be available for issue for several months.

An annual issue of cleaning materials for each company of infantry and coast artillery has been ordered from the War Department. The following is a list of the articles drawn for each company:

- 1 box russet leather dressing.

 - 3 cans lavoline.

Contract has been entered with the White Company of Cleveland, Ohio, for the purchase of two gasoline motor trucks, one and one-half tons. These trucks are for the use of the National Guard while on field service and also for the use at the State Arsenal, hauling stores and supplies to and from railroad terminals, and to organizations located in New York city.

Two similar trucks were furnished by the White Company for use at Pine Camp, New York, during August, 1911, for the purpose of demonstrating their use in the field, and they gave entire satisfaction. It is believed that each truck did as much work at that time as five teams.

On November 23d there was submitted to the Commanding-General of the Division, National Guard, a problem in the nature of a hypothetical mobilization for service under a call of the President. The conditions of this problem required that the necessary orders should be issued by the Division Commander within ten days of its receipt and that the mobilization should be technically completed within ten days after the issue of such orders. The point of mobilization was assumed to be near Port Jefferson, Long Island, a locality very favorably adapted for the purposes of an actual mobilization. The intent of this problem was to familiarize all officers with the responsibilities which would devolve upon them in case such a mobilization should become actually necessary. Under the laws of Congress, Regulations for the Army, Regulations Governing the Organized Militia, and the Laws and Regulations of this State, there is provided the machinery whereby officers would be governed should the National Guard of this State actually be called into the service of the United States, and it was deemed wise to turn over the wheels of this machine and discover in advance the points where lubrication was needed or where greater familiarity with the mechanism was required.

On November 20th a problem similar in principle was mailed the Commodore commanding the Naval Militia, which fixed the point of mobilization of his command at Fort Pond Bay, Long Island. This problem was worked out with promptness and intelligence by the Naval Militia, and it is believed the exercise was of some considerable value to that organization.

It was very gratifying to note the earnest attention to necessary details which all concerned gave to the proper working out of these problems, and the data collected in connection therewith, which is now being arranged in this office, will be of great value as affording means of comparison of different methods and of the workings of the several administrative units in addition

to the great value to the organizations of having actually gone over all the ground covered by such a proposition, and it is intended to publish to the service such comments by competent authority as will be of interest and value.

The adoption by the War Department of signal flags for use by companies of infantry again draws attention to the fact that in almost all instances the organization of our regiments of infantry does not correspond to the Army organization, in that our battalions are not fixed units, being composed of the companies in alphabetical order. This is a condition liable to produce confusion and embarrassment in many ways, and it is believed that it would result in betterment to the infantry arm if our organization in that additional respect were to conform to that of the Army, and it is suggested that Regulations 332 should be amended accordingly.

In my last report I reported the completion of new regulations for the State forces. Since then boards have been appointed to prepare new forms for use under those regulations, and such forms have been completed and issued to the National Guard and Naval Militia. So far as practicable such forms have been made to conform to War Department forms used for similar purposes.

Owing to a fire at the Capitol on March 29th last, this office was forced to move out of that building, and is now occupying temporary quarters in a private building rented for the purpose. While the quarters now occupied are extremely satisfactory, they can in the nature of things be considered only as temporary, and the necessity for future provision is apparent. The work of this Department has greatly increased, and any future arrangement must take into consideration not only that fact, but also the necessity of providing for the very large increase in the clerical force of the office should hostilities at any time occur, with the resultant call upon this State for large numbers of The office of the Adjutant-General, the headquarters of the Major-General commanding the Division, the office of the Armory Commission, and allied requirements would seem to make it advisable to provide a building for the military administration of the State. I have some guarantee which would warrant me in saying that an imposing and dignified building may be assigned to us for this purpose.

On invitation of the War Department, and at the expense of the Federal government, 113 officers were detailed to participate in the work of the Maneuvre Division of the Army near San Antonio, Texas. These officers were divided into four details of approximately the same size, and reports of each of these officers covering their observations have been filed in this office, and copies thereof furnished the War Department. It is unquestioned that the opportunities thus given for close observation of the Army and becoming familiar with its methods will result in considerable practical good to the National Guard.

Steps have been taken to prepare in advance for the action contemplated by section 120 of the Military Law, authorizing depot battalions and other units, and such battalions have during the past year been tentatively organized so far as relates to their commissioned personnel, on the recommendation of the commanding officers of the several organizations. Under the law as it now stands such organizations cannot be actually completed, but with the present arrangement the Governor can at once create the several depot or reserve units by commissioning or detailing the necessary forces. It is believed to be feasible to expand these tentative organizations by arranging therefor a reserve list of enlisted men, at least in numbers sufficient to provide the necessary non-commissioned officers. This being done, the completion of the organizations by enlistment is comparatively simple, especially as from these organizations would be supplied the men necessary to replace lost in the units of the field.

In line with this work there is being compiled in this office a roster of instructed soldiers who have seen service in the Army, and the card roster of enlisted men in the National Guard is also being enlarged to comprise those who have formerly served.

This office has during the past year begun to publish a series of bulletins on subjects of especial interest to the active militia and prepared by officers wholly qualified to treat the subjects whereon they write. There have been so far eight of these bulletins published, and there is abundant evidence of the fact that they are recognized as of great value.

There was authorized a practical problem in field firing under approach to combat conditions, which was worked out at the State Camp near Peekskill, under the supervision of a board appointed by the Adjutant-General. The object of this problem was to test a new method of firing instruction. The results were very satisfactory, and a report thereof was published in one of the bulletins before mentioned.

I am pleased to report that several of the members of the Military Committees of the Senate and Assembly were at State headquarters during the field service at Pine Camp. Their observation of the methods followed and the character of the work performed should be of great assistance in aiding them to judge of the needs of the Guard.

An Officer's Camp of Instruction was held during the past season at the State Camp near Peekskill, which was largely attended, and for which the Army furnished a number of very competent instructors. The work at this Camp was practical and beneficial, and in my judgment such Camps should be continued. Officers of the Coast Artillery Corps were sent to the Artillery District of Portland, where they received instruction in their arm.

In this connection I am pleased to report that arrangements have been made whereby officers and men of the Coast Artillery Corps can go to Fort Wadsworth, New York Harbor, for week ends, and join in the work and instruction at that post.

The system of record keeping in this office has been amplified by establishing a general index by means of which record is kept of all official papers, in addition to the record kept by the several divisions where handled.

I desire here to extend my thanks to Lieutenant-Colonel W. W. Ladd, Judge-Advocate-General Department, for a very complete index covering his valuable opinions as the senior officer of that Department.

This office has also had compiled and indexed the decisions of the Attorney-General of the State, covering the military service for the past ten years.

It was considered to be desirable that the annual convention of the National Guard Association of the United States for the year 1911 should be held in this State, and every assistance was rendered by this office to that end. These efforts were successful, and the convention, an eminently successful one, was held in the Armory of the 65th Regiment at Buffalo in October.

In a communication from the War Department, dated September 11, 1911, the State Range at Blauvelt and the State Camp of Instruction at Peekskill were designated for mobilization camps for the State troops, in case of their being called by the President in the service of the United States, and such designation was published to the Guard in General Order 40 from this office dated October 20, 1911. This designation, however, is tentative only, these locations being very poorly adapted for the purposes for which designated, and the attention of the War Department has been called to this fact in the expectation that a suitable site will be selected for the State mobilization camp, and which will have sufficient space and other desirable features which the spots named now lack. It is the opinion of this office that the neighborhood selected for the Theoretical Mobilization Problem, elsewhere mentioned, possesses all of the desirable features.

In another communication from the War Department, dated September 11, 1911, a suggested system for war recruiting is submitted, and this plan, with such slight changes and modifications as tended to make it more desirable for this State, has been adopted and embodied in General Orders 40 from this office October 20, 1911. It is believed that this plan, together with the plan for depot or reserve units, promulgated in General Order 38 from this office October 19, 1911, has provided the State with an admirable system of recruiting for organizations of the National Guard called into the service of the United States under the provisions of the National Militia; and in this connection, the question which has previously presented itself, that is as to the exact status of the National Guard troops called by the President for such service, again became of importance, and with a view to securing confirmation of the views held by this office the Chief, Division of Militia Affairs, was addressed under date of October 19th, in part as follows:

"It is my understanding that organizations of the National Guard called into the service of the United States under this enactment, do not thereby lose their identity as National Guard organizations, and that recruits enlisted therefor would be enlisted in accordance with existing State laws and on State forms; also that non-commissioned officers appointed during such time would be warranted in accordance with State laws and regulations, and would bear warrants issued by the State; further, that officers commissioned during such period to fill vacancies existing or occurring, would be commissioned by the Governor in the manner at the time prescribed by the laws of the State.

"If this assumption is correct, the forms to be supplied the recruiting officer for war would be the enlistment forms from time to time issued under State regulations, and such as would be in current use by the organization before being called into the service of the United States."

To this answer was received that the views expressed were believed to be entirely correct, and were in full accord with the Federal law and Regulations on the subject. This is thought to be of importance, as defining for the future the authority of the Governor under the State laws and Regulations of State troops called into the service of the United States.

I would respectfully recommend that military legislation be reduced to the minimum during the coming year and that only the most necessary amendments be made to the Military Law. Also I would recommend that only the most important changes be made to the Regulations.

The Guard is to be congratulated that it is soon to have copies of the Military Law and Regulations, completely indexed and bound, of which they have been deprived for the last ten or twelve years. It is incumbent upon us to give the fullest test in trying out these Laws and Regulations, as codified to date. permitting the Guard to thoroughly assimilate and apply them to its betterment.

Much uncertainty and irregularity must be traceable to the effect of ignorance of the Law and Regulations and for the lack of printed compendiums. The frequent amendments and changes

tended to increase this uncertainty which necessarily worked to the injury of discipline and efficiency.

A more thorough knowledge of our Laws and Regulations will tend to abate the unmilitary tradition of short circuiting the channel. I respectfully advise that all communications improperly sent direct to your Excellency or to this office should be returned for transmission through the channel.

It is believed that many of the complaints of the onerousness of service in the Guard will be obviated by greater familiarity with Law and Regulations which will now be made possible.

This office has attempted to relieve pressure of work and study required of officers by the frequent issue of simpler text-books and explanatory bulletins. Study and work has been materially lightened by the detail to this State of five Army officers who have, by outlining simplified methods of study supplemented by lectures, made service in the Guard more interesting. I take this occasion to recommend these officers to you as deserving of thanks.

I also feel that the Commanding Officer of the Division and his staff and all brigade commanders and their staffs, indeed all commanding officers, deserve your grateful thanks for the vast amount of time, energy and interest they have bestowed on the newer and more efficient Guard.

I would be remiss in my duty were I to omit the splendid work done by the regimental boards of instruction.

Frequent advances in methods of military training and improvements in the Military Law and Regulations have tended to enthuse the energetic and virile officer of the new generation. The changes we have made, though manifestly for the better, have had a tendency to discourage the ultra-conservative type of soldier, of which the Guard must always have its share, who openly express a desire to return to laws and regulations of yesterday, claiming that new methods are driving officers out of the Guard on account of the alleged greater demands on their time.

But it is true and a matter of history that all good changes have been resisted in their incipiency. It is remembered that some conservative officers objected to the exchange of the modern Springfield for the old rifle. There was also strenuous objection to the adoption of the olive drab uniform when it replaced the blue blouse, and every step in the changes of our drill regulations from the time of Upton's Tactics to the present Drill Regulations was the cause of bitter complaint.

It gives me pleasure to report that a personal investigation of present conditions in the Guard shows that the greater portion of officers and enlisted men in the Guard have optimistically adapted themselves to modern efficiency, and that newspaper protests of difficulty in recruiting and the decimating of our officers through harder work and study than they can bear is not especially true of this day or this decade. Conditions are so different in the various regiments that the pessimistic and highly unmilitary interviews published purporting to describe general conditions in the Guard, should not be given very deep consideration.

In this connection I recommend that the freedom with which officers resort to the public press be drastically dealt with. The honor of the Guard and loyalty to the service should prevent this frequent resort to the interview. All communications and papers intended for publication should be first presented to this office for approval.

The weakness of discipline in some few regiments has been evidenced this past year through the facility with which their lack of cohesion and unity has appeared in the public press, thus publishing broad-cast regimental politics and unmilitary altercations, to the disgrace of the service. The public thus gains an altogether false impression of discipline in the Guard.

I am happy to report that including the auxiliary troops there are the equivalent of fifteen or sixteen regiments of all arms of the service in the Guard of this State whose interior discipline is splendid, who never resort to the public press, who never criticize the Commander-in-Chief, the Adjutant-General's office, nor, as far as I know, any other headquarters. Their fine military spirit gives cause for belief that, were the whole Guard of this fine temper and discipline, they would be equal in this respect to the best traditions in the Army.

On the other hand, I beg to report that there are a few regiments whose discipline is weak and who do not come up to the

standard of strength and unity of the regiments above referred to, which form the backbone of the National Guard of New York State.

Some of these regiments are well drilled, shoot well, and are completely equipped for war, and therefore have the outer shell or semblance of what a standard New York regiment should be. Without the spirit of subordination, obedience and military silence, these units are empty of any benefit to the State or Nation, and it is on account of such regiments that Congress is reluctant to pass the Pay Bill or confer further benefits upon us. In justice to some of these regiments, I may say that the rank and file and majority of officers are loyal to the service, but their usefulness is impaired by a comparatively few, the elimination of whom would promptly bring these units to standard.

As the Constitution confers large powers of discipline upon you as Commander-in-Chief, I believe in many cases troublesome regiments can be brought up to the standard of the best regiments without necessarily resorting to courts-martial or of inquiry, which often tend to bring the public into confidence in matters over which they have no concern, and are, moreover, very costly.

In order to encourage interest in the service this office hopes to interest the Guard in general military contests and exercises somewhat in the nature of a tournament. Official sanction should be given to such competitions in order to insure fair play and sportsmanlike spirit and stimulate the largest competition. Details will be suggested later in order to secure the concensus of opinion of officers who may be interested.

Serious criticisms were made of the maneuvers in Massachusetts in 1909 because the endurance and limitations of the National Guard were not considered or understood by the War Department. Troops were fatigued and discouraged without any corresponding benefits in instruction or gain in efficiency. This is now conceded and all joint maneuvers in the future will be based upon the needs and desires of the National Guard, after careful study and measurement of the endurance and experience of the troops.

The maneuvers last summer by the National Guard of Massachusetts in Essex and Middlesex counties were eminently successful and pleased all members of the Guard participating. In con-

nection with these maneuvers, General Pew, in his report, sums up the value of these maneuvers as follows:

"Maneuvers are the only means by which instruction in field service can be given. There is only one practical way to learn the duties of a soldier, and that is to get into the field and do whatever an officer or a soldier would be required to do under service conditions. Maneuvers such as we had this summer are the only way so far developed for giving the militia the necessary instruction.

"I am very much impressed by the fact that the average taxpayer looks upon the maneuvers as something practical, and speaks of them as if the militia was just beginning to do business, and trying to prepare itself to be of real value. The merits of maneuvers as a training system appeal to every one as the right and proper thing for the militia to-day. Any objection comes probably from the fact that it is an innovation to which the inborn conversatism of the average man is always opposed."

This summer it is probable that the Division of this State will be mobilized somewhere in Westchester county bordering on Connecticut. The troops of New York State assisted by New Jersey will repel an invasion upon this State by troops from Massachusetts, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and Connecticut. The theater of the maneuver war will probably be in Connecticut. It was largely to interest the Guard in this proposition that the recent mobilization on paper was presented for solution.

It was not at all for experiment nor alone for instruction that this necessary problem was exacted. There seemed an absolute and immediate necessity of having in this office a complete scheme of mobilization.

I feel doubly grateful for the enormous sacrifice of time and labor in the collocating of the information necessary for this office. I deeply regret that such a busy time of the year was selected for the carrying out of this problem, but indulgence will be given if it is understood that it is my plan to arrange for the summer mobilization and joint maneuvers at as early a date as possible, as

I realize that too frequently the mistake has been made of presenting the dates for such field service at too late a day for the convenience of the Guard. I hope to be able to have the early decision of the Division of Militia Affairs as to the field service. I trust the early publication of these dates will partially compensate many organizations for the onerousness of their work in completing this, the first step to the prospective summer's work.

Much of the enormous time, labor and anxiety of a commanding officer does not alone come from the new study or the new regulations, but also from the time devoted to the control of armories and the energy given to very large housekeeping problems, not to speak of the tactful management and use of armories for the healthful increase of their military funds.

I desire to report that during the year steps will be taken to alleviate these conditions and responsibilities, and to this end it is probable that a board of officers, in consultation with brigade commanders, will discuss and suggest simpler regulations for armory custody and standardize and grade armory rentals and compensations according to size, location, etc. This for the further lightening of the burdens of responsible officers.

Many of the exactions complained of on the part of the young officers are the result of improper standards of examinations by brigades. Frequently nonessentials and unimportant details are given too great importance. Steps should be taken to standardize and economize examinations.

I believe that some relief must be extended to the medical and ordnance departments for heavy exactions on their time and energy at rifle practice, and accordingly will ask for an increased appropriation looking to this alleviation.

If there has been progress made during the past year, it is because of a "New York spirit," a State patriotism for the Guard that has lightened work and given impetus to all that has been done. Large credit for this progress must also be given to the Militia Council and all boards and counselors who have advised me.

My report would be incomplete if I did not commend in very high terms the faithful service of almost every member of the Adjutant-General's office. The divisions are very completely organized and each has vied with the other to perform for the Governor the best work possible. The esprit de corps created in the household of the Adjutant-General has tended greatly to the expedition of work and the correctness and neatness of correspondence. I shall ask your personal thanks to them for their loyal service.



Sir.—I have the honor to submit for the information of the Governor my annual report for the year 1911 as the Commanding General of the Division, National Guard, New York.

Organization.

Aggregate 15,700. The aggregate September 30, 1910, was 15,575, the difference between the aggregate of the two years shows a net gain of 125 for the year 1911.

COURTS MARTIAL.

A court martial was convened in December, 1910, for the trial of Captain Bernard F. Cummins, Sixty-ninth Infantry, and the sentence imposed was published in general orders.

SERVICE IN AID OF CIVIL AUTHORITY.

There has been no call during the past year by the civil authorities of the State for the service of the National Guard in strike or riot duty, but during the fire in the State Capitol at Albany on March 29, 1911, the Governor called on the State troops to guard the building and Troop B, Cavalry, the Second Battalion, Tenth Infantry, Companies A, B, C and D, Major Staats commanding, and the First Ambulance Company were placed on duty therein at about 7 a. m. Troop B remained on duty until 6 p. m. March 30th. After the fire was extinguished the building required a guard and Major T. W. Hislop and Companies B and D, Second Infantry, were placed on duty at the Capitol at 8 a. m. March 31, 1911, and served until April 7, 1911, at 8 a.m., when they were relieved. Company A, Tenth Infantry, was relieved at 8 a. m. April 6th. Company B, Tenth Infantry, was relieved at 6 p. m. April 5th and the First Ambulance Company was relieved at 6 p. m. April 5th. Company D, Tenth Infantry, was relieved at 8 a, m. April 7th, on which date a provisional company was formed from volunteers from Companies A, B and D, Tenth Infantry, which with Company C, Tenth Infantry, were relieved from duty on April 8th. Major Staats and his battalion headquarters were relieved from duty at the Capitol April 10th, they being the last troops required for such service.

Company G, Second Infantry (Nineteenth Separate Co.) stationed at Gloversville, N. Y., was called upon by the sheriff of Fulton county on October 25th to aid the civil authorities in the apprehension of a man charged with committing murder, who had resisted arrest, shot a deputy sheriff and policeman and had escaped. The company was ordered out for this duty on October 25th and was relieved by the sheriff on October 26th. A report of the captain of the company on this duty will be found in Appendix 6.

FIELD SERVICE.

The following organizations were designated by the Governor for camp or field service and this duty was performed as hereinafter stated.

The Chief of Coast Artillery, his assistants and not to exceed fifty officers and enlisted men of each of the three Artillery Districts took part in coast defense exercises at Forts Levett and Williams in the Artillery District of Portland, Me., those of the Ninth Artillery District from July 3rd to July 16th; of the Eighth Artillery District from July 24th to August 6th, and of the Thirteenth Artillery District from August 7th to August 20th. This work was practical and beneficial and the instruction given by the United States Army officers, detailed for the purpose, of a high order. The report of the Chief of Coast Artillery with reports of the officers attending has been already forwarded to you for transmission to the War Department.

Camp and field service was performed under my command at the Camp of Instruction, Peekskill, N. Y., by the Twenty-second Engineers, June 10th to June 17th; Seventh Infantry, June 17th to June 24th; Fourteenth Infantry, June 24th to July 1st; Sixty-fifth Infantry, July 1st to July 8th, and by the First Battalion, Field Artillery, July 7th to July 18th.

The various organizations at Peekskill were required to perform more detail work than has been the custom for some years, and it fully demonstrated the fact that such work is required by the Guard as frequently as possible. Much has been made of maneuvers in recent years, but it is a well known fact that such maneuvers have a letting down influence and should be followed by the minutia of drill and discipline.

A school of instruction for the officers (except medical officers) of the First and Second Brigades was held at the Camp of Instruction, Peekskill, from July 2nd to 8th inclusive. The instructors were officers of the United States army detailed for that purpose by the War Department, and the program, which is attached hereto as Appendix 8, was successfully carried out in spite of the excessive heat of the weather and an alarming epidemic of

tonsilitis which did not become serious on account of the prompt and efficient preventive measures taken by the post surgeon.

The Third and Fourth Brigades (except the Sixty-fifth Infantry), the First Field Hospital, the First Ambulance Company and a detachment from the First and Second Companies, Signal Corps, performed a tour of field service under my command at Pine Camp, Jefferson County, N. Y., August 4th to 13th inclusive. A school of instruction for officers of the medical corps from August 5th to 13th was also held there in charge of the commanding officer, First Field Hospital, and was instructed by officers of the Medical Corps, U. S. A., detailed by the War Department for that duty. Line officers detailed by the War Department as instructors were also on duty at each brigade and regimental headquarters during the whole tour at Pine Camp. The instruction imparted by them was helpful and they were ever ready and willing to assist in every possible way. The general opinion among the troops on duty at Pine Camp seemed to be that this tour of field service was the most instructive and beneficial of any yet performed by them. The schedule of exercises, which was closely adhered to during this tour of duty may be found in Par. VII, G. O., 20, D, 1911.

During April, May and June, 1911, various officers detailed by the Governor attended the joint encampment, maneuvers and field instruction of the regular army established in the vicinity of San Antonia, Texas. The reports, in compliance with your orders, of officers on this duty have already been forwarded to you.

VOLUNTEER FIELD SERVICE.

A detachment of Troop D, Cavalry, consisting of a lieutenant and thirty-one men, recently joined, marched on May 27, 1911, in heavy marching order, from Syracuse to Manlius, N. Y., and camped in shelter tents. On May 28th drills in extended order both mounted and dismounted were held besides small arms firing for four hours on the Manlius range. The detachment marched on May 28th to Syracuse, its home station, arriving at 9.30 p. m.

Company E, Tenth Infantry (Sixteenth Separate Company), left Catskill, its home station, on July 14th for a tour of volun-

tary field service, marching to Leeds, N. Y., encamped there until July 24th, on which date this company returned to its armory in Catskill. This tour of field service was performed preparatory to ordered duty at Pine Camp in August.

Company M, First Infantry (Thirty-first Separate Company), encamped at Little Falls, N. Y., from September 2 to 4, 1911, during the centennial celebration of the founding of that city, traveling by electric railway from and to its home station at Mohawk, whence it departed on September 2nd at 4 p. m., and whither it returned on September 4th, arriving at 8.15 p. m.

SMALL ARMS PRACTICE.

The practice in small arms firing was under the supervision of Lieutenant-Colonel N. B. Thurston, Chief Ordnance Officer, and Major William Kirby, Ordnance Officer, Division, and was finished on October 31, 1911. The discipline of the troops was generally good and the firing was conducted without accident, except:

- (a) An injury to Corporal Nicholas A. Poggi, Sixteenth Company, Ninth Artillery District, who was struck by a small piece of nickel jacket from a richochet bullet, while on duty in the 200-yard pit at Blauvelt, and was slightly wounded in the ankle. By direction of Major Macumber, Medical Corps, attached to the Fourteenth Infantry, he was removed to St. Vincent's Hospital in New York city, and has since entirely recovered.
- (b) An injury to William Greene, fifty-five years old, of Blauvelt, New York, a civilian employee working for Superintendent Lamb on the Blauvelt Range, who was struck by a piece of steel jacket from a bullet while at work in the rear of the targets, and behind the same in violation of orders, and sustained a scalp wound on his head. The wound was dressed by Captain Charles A. Brown, Medical Officer, attached to Squadron C, Cavalry, on October 28th. The wound was dressed again by Captain John J. Cotter, First Field Hospital on October 31st, and Mr. Greene continued at work and did not lose any employment by reason of the accident.

Qualifications for Decorations.

Eight thousand one hundred and sixty-nine officers and men qualified as marksmen; 785 as sharpshooters; 1,087 as experts; 331 as distinguished experts, making the total number of qualifications 10,372.

In 1910 there were 8,050 officers and men qualified as marksmen; 728 as sharpshooters; 1,092 as experts; 403 as distinguished experts; total number of qualifications of all classes 11,101.

General Figure of Merit of Organizations.

The figures of merit of the various companies, etc., show a continued improvement in small arms firing and indicate that good work has been done in securing large attendance, in making better scores and in qualifying more men than in previous years.

The highest figure of merit made this season by any subdivision was 95.61; during the season of 1910 the highest figure of merit was 92.26.

FIGURE OF MERIT PRIZES.

The following subdivisions of organizations attached to the headquarters of the Division obtained the highest figures of merit and received the figure of merit prizes.

Troop "D," Cavalry; prize \$100; general figure of merit 90. Troop 2, Squadron A, Cavalry; prize \$75; general figure of merit 61.90.

Troop 3, Squadron A, Cavalry; prize \$50; general figure of merit 59.23.

In the Brigades, the following companies received figure of merit prizes:

First Brigade.

Company F, Seventy Infantry; prize \$100; general figure of merit 63.69.

Company C, Seventh Infantry; prize \$75; general figure of merit 57.97.

Company B, Seventy-first Infantry; Prize \$50; general figure or merit 55.22.

Company K, Forty-seventh Infantry; prize \$100; general figure of merit 37.96.

Company A, Twenty-third Infantry; prize \$75; general figure of merit 30.64.

Company K, Twenty-third Infantry; prize \$50; general figure of merit 29.82.

Third Brigade.

Company F, Second Infantry; prize \$100; general figure of merit 82.91.

Company G, Second Infantry; prize \$75; general figure of merit 70.31.

Company H, First Infantry; prize \$50; general figure of merit 66.02.

Fourth Brigade.

Company M, Third Infantry; prize \$100; general figure of merit 95.61.

Company C, Third Infantry; prize \$75; general figure of merit 77.78.

Company E, Sixty-Fifth Infantry; prize \$50; general figure of merit 76.22.

State and Brigade Prizes.

The competitive firing for these prizes was held at the Blauvelt Range.

The team of the Seventy-fourth Infantry won the \$300 State

prize by a score of 1751.

The Headquarters' prize of \$100 was won by the team of Squadron A, Cavalry, by a score of 1505.

The Seventy-first Infantry team won the First Brigade prize of \$100 by a score of 1534.

The Twenty-third Infantry won the Second Brigade prize of \$100 by a score of 1479.

The Second Infantry team won the Third Brigade prize of \$100 by a score of 1538.

The Seventy-fourth Infantry team won the Fourth Brigade prize of \$100 by a score of 1531.

The Governor's, Major-General's and Adjutant-General's Matches.

These matches were shot at the Blauvelt range and resulted as follows:

The Governor's cup was won by Major Arthur Kemp, Seventy-fourth Infantry, by a score of 90. (100 possible.)

The Major General's Trophy was won by the Seventy-fourth Infantry team by a score of 870.

The Adjutant-General's Trophy was won by the Seventy-fourth Infantry team with a score of 272, there being twenty other competing teams.

McAlpin and Dryden Trophies.

By authority of the Governor a team to represent this State was entered in the matches for these trophies. The McAlpin Trophy match was shot at Blauvelt, N. Y., on September 22, 1911, the New York State team winning the trophy and a cash prize of \$24 by seven points with a score of 1054, the teams of the District of Columbia and New Jersey competing.

The Dryden Trophy match was shot at Sea Girt, N. J., on September 8, 1911, and the team from this State finished second of eight competitors, being defeated by one point by the Ohio team, and winning a cash prize of \$100. Reports of the Chief Ordnance Officer on these teams will be found in Appendix 9.

National Trophy Match.

By authority of the Governor a team was organized to represent the State in this match which was shot at Camp Perry, Ohio, August 28 and 29, 1911. The team finished ninth in a field of forty-two competitors, the four regular service teams and the teams of Massachusetts, Ohio, Kansas and District of Columbia finishing ahead of the New York State team. The detailed report of the team captain will be found in Appendix 9.

Rifle Ranges.

The new rifle range at Blauvelt has been so far completed as to permit of general small arms firing at all ranges during this season's practice. While the range is not yet entirely completed owing to the delay of contractors it was used since the first week in July to the end of the season by the troops stationed in Greater New York for all classes of firing. Complaints have been made by residents in the vicinity of the range of bullets falling about their homes and of being thereby in great danger of life and limb. Complaints have been made of falling bullets when there had been no firing whatever on the range for the seven months previous and it has been ascertained that rifles in the possession of civilians have been fired from behind the targets and toward the nearest village apparently to create a sentiment of hostility. Additional back stops are under construction at the range to afford greater safety and the future acquisition of property may be desirable.

The Kenilworth range near Buffalo has been so far completed as to permit of its use this season by organizations stationed in Buffalo and adjacent thereto.

The new range at Peekskill has been found satisfactory but cannot be sufficiently enlarged to accommodate more than a battalion per day.

Instruction.

The theoretical instruction in all branches of the military service has been carried out as outlined in my report for last year, the work of the indoor season being had with a view to the field work to be done during the summer. The beneficial results have been most apparent, and the officers and enlisted men are more thoroughly instructed than has been the case at any time heretofore.

The plan for the present season will be carried along on the same lines, the theoretical instruction being had with a view to a steady progress along lines which can be worked up with the practical exercises in the summer field work.

There are now on duty with the State two United States Army officers, detailed to the instruction work of the infantry, one for the First and Second Brigades and the other for the Third and Fourth. Another officer has charge of the instruction of cavalry, another of field artillery, and another coast artillery. I hope and am convinced that this will result in even greater progress. The limitations of time that can be taken from their business pursuits by officers and men will be always considered and effort will be made to limit the burden of this work as far as possible.

The scheme of instruction has been prescribed in general orders from my headquarters, and is for a four years' course, each course lasting for a drill season, written examinations being held at the end and those graduating from the lower course go into the next higher. The plan also provides for an officer taking his examinations at any time and upon passing he will be relieved from the course of study to which he is eligible, for the rest of the year.

It is the intention by this means to have a progressive course of instruction so that an officer starting at the bottom will have the opportunity to rise with the various subjects that he should know and progress to the culmination of his compulsory training, leaving behind him the study of the subjects that he knows and taking up the study of higher ones for which the knowledge of the lower ones has fitted him. With a full appreciation of the limit of time which a National Guard officer can give to the service, I believe that this system will greatly increase the knowledge of our officers and that in a few years the result will become clearly apparent.

The Corps of Engineers showed a marked improvement in its practical engineering work in the field since the last tour of duty at Peekskill. The way both officers and men assimilated the instruction and took hold of the work showed that material progress had been made in their engineering studies and practice in the armory. If continued progress can be shown by the Corps and as much improvement evidenced during its next tour of duty, the State can feel well satisfied with the condition of its engineering troops. The instruction at Peekskill with the help and co-operation of the engineers from the U. S. Military Academy at West Point will be in my opinion more valuable to our corps of engineers for some time to come than field maneuvers such as have been heretofore held.

The Signal Corps has been called upon but twice to perform duty outside of the routine drills during the past year. They furnished a substantial telephone service at Pine Camp last August, and engaged in theoretical and practical control of troops through field lines laid and recovered at the time with considerable success. They installed telephone lines to control the targets at the demonstration of combat firing at Peekskill in November, which service was accomplished to the satisfaction of those in control of the demonstration.

The recent change made in the Regulations for the organized militia, will call for additional equipment and for certain legislation in order that the Signal Corps may conform to the changes. The recommendations regarding this will be made in a separate communication.

The Cavalry is in a most satisfactory state, and the organization of all the Cavalry into a Regiment which I have heretofore recommended will, I hope, be shortly accomplished, and will make for greater efficiency.

While the Field Artillery is progressing, the very technical nature of its work makes general progress necessarily slow, and the increase in the number of batteries makes it possible in the near future that all the Field Artillery may be united into a Regiment having the control and instruction under one responsible head.

The Medical Corps shows improvement in personnel and instruction. A greater number of units are required and the reorganization of the First Ambulance Company into a Field Hospital and the formation of an Ambulance Company at Binghamton with the transfer of the Regimental Hospital Corps Quarters to Middletown, which is now being accomplished, will be a desirable step in this direction.

The work of the Coast Artillery Corps is limited by the lack of equipment. The installation of stations has been helpful, but more equipment and material are imperatively needed.

The Infantry, which represents the bulk of the National Guard has shown satisfactory progress. It is now occupied in the study of its new drill regulations and in working out the problems arising thereunder. Its field of work following progressively along the lines which I have adhered to since I first took command has resulted in a gradual broadening and development until the work being done is greater in volume and more successful in result than could have been anticipated at the inception of the instruction.

Condition of Property.

The care of military property in the possession of troops can be reported as eminently satisfactory. As a rule it is intelligently used as designed, without change or alteration and thereby securing uniformity in appearance, which is highly desirable and

it is also indicative of good discipline. The methods of protection against loss and the accounting for losses have been improved but are not yet entirely satisfactory. I am trying to obtain a complete and accurate adjustment of property accounts each year, which is only possible of accomplishment where all accountable officers adjust accounts with the Adjutant-General of the State annually, and all lost property is replaced. With the exception of overcoats and shoes, the equipment and uniform for Field or active service for the present numerical strength, can be reported as practically complete; the surplus, required by the Federal authority to make the provisions correspond with the organization prescribed by "Field Service Regulations," can be added as funds permit. The special training of the individual in the use, care and protection of Military property, is recognized as essential and fully appreciated by officers charged with the instruction of troops; it is receiving the attention necessary for its inculcation, generally and in detail, which promises increased economy and greater efficiency.

Appointment of Officers.

The appointive system of selecting officers has been adopted by the Third Infantry during the year, in addition to the eight organizations mentioned in my report for 1910 with which the system is working in a satisfactory manner. It is hoped that this system may be generally adopted by the National Guard.

Armories.

Designs for the armory of the Eighth Artillery District, drawn by Pilcher and Tichau have been approved by the New York Municipal Art Commission and the Armory Board. The building will stand on the south end of the Jerome Park Reservoir and it will be a most complete armory. When it is finished, the building now occupied by the Eighth Artillery District will be reconstructed in connection with the present armory of Squadron A, giving adequate housing for both of these commands.

The new armory for the Twenty-second Engineers is nearing completion and should shortly be turned over to that command.

The improvements in the armory of the Seventh Regiment originally contemplated have added greatly to the comfort and facilities of arrangement and still further betterments are contemplated.

The expansion of the First Battery Field Artillery into a Battalion of three batteries, has made the present armory occupied by it entirely inadequate and plans are on foot for a new armory for this organization. This will leave the present armory to the sole occupation of the First Field Hospital for which it should be entirely adequate.

Plans and specifications for rooms in the Syracuse armory for use by Battery A, Field Artillery, are being prepared, and only additional construction required in this armory for this command will be suitable stable accommodations.

New armories are required for Troop B., Cavalry, at Albany, and for the companies at Newburgh, Olean, Auburn, Malone, Mt. Vernon and Jamestown. The new administration building for the armory of the Forty-seventh Infantry is greatly required.

Division Headquarters.

The fire in the Capitol building, whereof reference has already been made, necessitated the immediate removal of the office of the Headquarters of the Division from the Capitol. Through the courtesy of the commanding officer Tenth Infantry the use of the office of the regimental headquarters in the State Armory at Albany was offered and Division Headquarters was temporarily established there until May 1st, 1911. The room in the Capitol heretofore occupied being allotted in the meantime to the Attorney-General, suitable rooms were rented at 174 State Street, Albany, and the permanent office for Division Headquarters was established therein May 1st, 1911, and has remained there since.

Sir.—I have the honor to make the following annual report of the condition of this Brigade for the year ending November 30, 1911.

During the year each organization made the required number of drills and parades, and the Brigade, with the other organizations in the Borough, paraded on Memorial Day, May 30.

The Fourteenth Infantry performed a tour of duty at the State Camp, Peekskill, from June 24 to July 1, with a percentage present of .7585. A report of this duty was forwarded by the Commanding Officer of the Regiment. (See Appendix 10.)

A large number of the officers of each organization also attended the Officer's School at the State Camp, Peekskill, from July 1 to 8 and received some much needed instruction.

In order to obtain uniform instruction throughout the Brigade, I caused the instruction boards of each regiment to report at Brigade Headquarters early in October, 1910. A general plan was then adopted whereby each Regiment received the same amount of instruction.

Personal sanitation and camp hygiene being considered very important subjects, it was considered wise to assemble the Medical Departments and the Hospital Corps of each regiment to listen to a lecture on these subjects, and the services of Colonel John V. R. Hoff, Medical Department, U. S. A., were secured. He gave a very interesting and instructive lecture on November 4,

1910, on the subject "Personal sanitation of the soldier man and the relation of the line officer thereto."

Lieutenant-Colonel William C. LeBoutillier also addressed the Medical Officers on January 20, 1911, on the subject "Changes in the new Regulations affecting Medical Officers."

The services of Captain M. E. Hanna, U. S. A., were also secured and he addressed all the officers of the Brigade on February 24, 1911. His subject was "Attack." The lecture was very well attended and the officers were much interested in his subject.

The strength of the Brigade shows a loss of 54, as follows:



Sir.— I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report on the condition of the Third Brigade.

The strength of the Brigade September 30, 1911, was 2,900; showing a net gain of 69.

Since the last annual report on the condition of the Brigade, Brigadier-General James Horace Lloyd, who commanded since November 23, 1903, has died. His death occurred at his home in the city of Troy, N. Y., on the 21st day of May, 1911. His funeral was held on May 23, 1911, which was conducted with full military honors. The military escort was composed of Troop B, a platoon of the First Battalion, Field Artillery and the Second Infantry, National Guard, N. Y.

By his death the National Guard of the State of New York has lost an able, efficient and conscientious officer who through a service of more than twenty-five years has risen from the ranks to the command of this Brigade.

Duty in aid of the civil authority has been performed during the past year by portions of the Second and Tenth Infantry. Companies A, B, C and D, Tenth Infantry and Companies B and D, Second Infantry, were on duty on account of the fire at the State Capitol in Albany between March 29 and April 8, 1911.

Company "G," Second Infantry, performed service in aid of the civil authority at Gloversville, N. Y., on October 25 and 26.

The armory small arms firing match was held at Troy, N. Y.,

on April 21, 1911, and was contested by teams from the First, Second and Tenth Infantry.

The match for the Third Brigade trophy for small arms firing was held on the Blauvelt range September 26, 1911, and was contested by teams from the three regiments.

Permission was granted U. S. Army troops to use the Rensselaerwyck Target Range from June 12 to July 21, inclusive.

The entire Brigade performed field service at Pine Camp, Jefferson Co., from August 5 to 13, inclusive. The average strength present was 88 per cent.

Voluntary tours of field service were performed for periods varying from one to ten days by the following organizations:

In conclusion I would say that this Brigade is in splendid condition.



Sir.—Pursuant to the provisions of R. 916, the following report is submitted:

Progress has been greatly advanced in all Districts in instruction at guns and stations in the armories.

The detail of officers for instruction purposes at Portland, Maine, has resulted in imparting knowledge to them which will greatly aid in the information required to enable them to personally supervise and direct the drills of their companies.

The following is the status of present armory equipment:

The work of installing the original fire control apparatus has been practically completed in each District.

In the 13th Artillery District, fire control apparatus has been received for the new base end stations required for the new armament. This is now partially installed.

The apparatus still required for a complete installation (for which requisition has been made) consists principally of azimuth instruments, telescopic sights, emplacement out-let boxes, base line and switch boxes.

Pressure plug outfits and primer reloading outfits have been requisitioned for but have not as yet been received.

The United States Government has alloted the necessary funds for engineering work in constructing foundations for the armory type of armament and ammunition hoists to be installed in each District, but as yet no construction work has been begun.

It is understood that the guns, mortars and special carriages for armory use are now being manufactured, and as soon as installed all instruction can be given in armories to perfect the commands in handling guns and stations as at the forts.




At 9 A. M. the company was released by the sheriff and returned to the armory.





Authority to organize this team was granted the Commanding Officer, Division, National Guard, by the Governor of the State in Par. VI, G. O. 20, s. 1911, A. G. O.

26, and as a result of this practice I selected from the fifteen men composing the team and alternates, twelve officers and enlisted men whose scores are appended hereto, to represent the State of New York in the competition.

The scores aggregate 3,029 and the team finished ninth.

Forty-two teams competed, consisting of four service teams and representatives from thirty-eight States and Territories, embracing the entire Country.





NEW YORK, January 1, 1912.

From Commodore, Commanding Naval Militia, N. Y., to The Adjutant-General, State of New York:

Sir.—I have the honor to submit the following report concerning the condition and operations of the Naval Militia for the year ending September 30, 1911.

1. On June 24, 1911, Commodore Jacob W. Miller, Commanding Naval Militia, having completed twenty years service was retired at his own request. Under Special Orders No. 131, A. G. O., dated June 16, 1911, I was designated to take command upon the retirement of Commodore Jacob W. Miller and I was commissioned as Commodore from that date.

2. The vacancy caused by the promotion of the Commanding Officer, Second Battalion, to Commodore, Commanding Naval Militia, N. Y., was filled by the promotion of Kingsley L. Martin from Lieutenant-Commander and Executive Officer, Second Battalion, Naval Militia, N. Y., to Commander, Second Battalion.

3. A provisional battalion consisting of details from both the First and Second Battalions was organized to participate in the inauguration of Governor John A. Dix at Albany, N. Y., on January 2, 1911. The excellent showing made by the provisional battalion on this occasion is praiseworthy and credit is due to its Commanding Officer, Lieutenant-Commander Charles O. Brinckerhoff, Second Battalion, Naval Militia, N. Y.

4. In accordance with Special Orders No. 158, A. G. O., dated

July 19, 1910, Special Orders No. 33, Headquarters, Naval Militia, dated October 5, 1910, were issued authorizing and directing the muster-in of an engineer division in the Third Battalion, Naval Militia, N. Y., which was reported accomplished under date of December 6, 1910.

Tour of Duty.

5. Upon receipt of instructions from your office ordering the Naval Militia to participate in the exercises outlined by Naval Militia Circular Letter No. 15, dated June 30, 1911, General Orders No. 2, dated July 6, 1911, Headquarters Naval Militia, were issued and the following officers and men embarked on July 15, 1911, on board the U. S. S. Missouri, U. S. S. Washington, U. S. S. Mississippi, U. S. S. Maine and U. S. S. Ohio, in New York City:

In connection with this "Tour of Duty," the Commanding Officer, Naval Militia, N. Y., thoroughly appreciates the large interest taken in the Naval Militia of this State by Rear Admiral Aaron Ward, U. S. Navy and Commander A. H. Davis, U. S. Navy, and would suggest that, if proper, a letter of thanks be sent to the officers concerned by the Commander-in-Chief or The Adjutant-General, State of New York.

6. In addition to the "Tour of Duty," there were a number of cruises made by the U. S. S. "Sandoval" and U. S. S. "Hawk" on the Great Lakes under Naval Militia Circular Letter No. 15, dated June 30, 1911, as well as volunteer cruises made by the detachments of the First and Second Battalions on the U. S. S. "Wasp" and U. S. S. "Gloucester." The total distance covered by these vessels is as follows:

7. Amendments were made to the Military Law partly reorganizing the Naval Militia of the State to meet the desires of the Navy Department particularly as to the strength of its engineer divisions, and at the same time the ratings in the Naval Militia were changed to conform to present navy uses.

9. The regular annual inspections of the organizations of the Naval Milita were held as follows:



- 10. The usual Small Arms Practice returns and records of the Brigade, Inter-battalion Secondary Battery, and Inter-divisional Secondary Battery matches are attached, marked Appendix 1.
- 12. The aggregate strength of this command on September 30, 1910 was 798, and September 30, 1911 it was 846, an increase of 48.

- 13. A letter was addressed to the Adjutant-General, State of New York, referring to the enlistment of an additional line division in Buffalo and an engineer division in Rochester, both to become parts of the Third Battalion, and a statement of the additional appropriation required. It is earnestly recommended that authority be granted to enlist these additional divisions. In view of the proposed muster-in of an additional division of the First Battalion, Naval Militia, at New Rochelle, there is urgent need of the increased appropriation for the Naval Militia as requested in my letter of October 14, 1911.
- 14. A bill was passed at the last session of the Legislature appropriating money for a boathouse for that portion of the Third Battalion stationed in Buffalo. It is requested that this bill or a similar bill be introduced and its passage urged at the present session of the Legislature, and the necessity for same be urged upon the Commander-in-Chief.






