To His Excellency, The Governor of the State of New York:

SIR: I have the honor to report as follows:

In my report last year, besides submitting the financial operations of this office and transmitting the reports of the Commanding General and the Commodore, I stated the general policy of the State in its relation to the United States, and recommended that a proper range be provided for small arms and field artillery practice for the State forces in the city of New York and vicinity.

#### RIFLE RANGES

On April 11, 1914, by chapter 273 of the Laws of 1914, the Legislature authorized the extension of the State Reservation at Peekskill. On July 27, 1914, the range was formally opened at a total cost of \$17,788, \$16,544.50 of which was obtained from United States funds in my hands as United States Disbursing Officer, exclusive of the value of the land acquired, which, according to the estimate of the Armory Commission, should not exceed \$842. The abandoned range at Blauvelt, which was turned over to the Palisades Park Commission last year, cost the State nearly \$475,000 and nearly four years' time was consumed from the passage of the enabling act to the date of its formal opening. Such is the convenience of arrangement of the new range, built by the Armory Commission under the advice of the Chief Ordnance Officer of the Division, that under present conditions it is practicable for a battalion in the city of New York to leave its armory, complete its record practice, and return, arriving at its home station at an earlier hour than was frequently the case in former years when the rifle range was at Creedmoor, within the city limits.

At Kenilworth in Eric county, adjacent to the city of Buffalo, is a rifle range used by the State forces in that vicinity. The leases of the land so used, with the options for their purchase held by The Adjutant General, expired last May. Due and timely steps have been taken, under advice of the Attorney General, to take title for the State. It is recommended that adequate provision be made by the Legislature to reimburse the contingent fund of this office for necessary expenditures in that behalf.

#### PROGRESS DURING THE PAST TWO YEARS

The comprehensive reports of Major General O'Ryan and Commodore Forshew show in detail the remarkable progress made by the forces under their command during the past year. Both the National Guard and the Naval Militia show a gain in numbers, in spite of the fact that the requirements of the State service are more exacting than ever before. Since the restoration of the Major General to his proper command, two years ago, the improvement in discipline and efficiency has been rapid and steady. He has been privileged, at your request, to pursue the course of instruction at the United States Army War College to an honorable completion, and has been duly graduated therefrom by authority of the War Department. The State has also been honored in the appointment, by the Secretary of War, of General O'Ryan to be a member of the National Militia Board, thus securing to this State, for the first time, a voice in that important body.

During the past year the National Naval Militia Board has been organized, and the State, upon your request, has been honored by the Secretary of the Navy in the appointment of Commodore Forshew, who is a graduate of the United States Naval Academy, to be one of the members of the Board.

During the past year also, the State has, for the first time, obtained an important place in the United States National Guard Association by the appointment of the writer to membership in the Executive Committee, which has sole charge of the affairs of the Association during its recess, and is authorized to express the wishes of the Association in matters relating to Federal legislation.

The harmonious relations of the State forces with the United States authorities have been continued on the basis of the announced policy of this State to maintain its National Guard and Naval Militia, ready primarily for the defense of the nation, and, as a necessary result, for the prompt repression of internal disorder. Frank assumption of the responsibility of this State as a member of the family of States has been met by the War and Navy Departments in a spirit of cordial cooperation. Selected officers and enlisted men to a greater number than before have been sent to us as instructors. Our officers have been permitted to take the courses in the Army Service Schools, and to participate, on an equal footing with the regular officers, in the sea duties of the Navy. Our paper forms have been remodeled to conform to Army and Navy patterns. Our Quartermaster's and Subsistence Departments, Medical, Engineer and Signal Corps, as well as the Coast Artillery, Field Artillery, Cavalry and Infantry of the line have been reorganized in obedience to the requirements of the War Department, published under the authority of Congress, which has power, under clause 16 of section 8 of article I of the Constitution, to say how the Militia shall be organized, armed and disciplined.

#### NEGRO REGIMENT

The plans of the War Department require us to organize a complete division, known as the sixth. A division comprises only nine infantry regiments. Notwithstanding this excess of four regiments, the Legislature directed (chapter 793, Laws of 1913) the formation of "A colored regiment of infantry in the City of New York." In the effort to comply with this piece of special legislation the first question to arise was that of the selection of officers. Enlisted men would not be so hard to get, as it is known that there are citizens of the State of Negro descent who are or have been soldiers. Under inexperienced or incompetent officers, however, the bravest and best soldiers would be of little value to the taxpayers, who have rights not to be ignored. Accordingly, I invited the Negro promoters of the law to select fifty-seven persons who were, in their opinion, best qualified by merit and fitness to serve as officers. The fifty-seven candidates were treated precisely as other citizens are treated when under appointment for commissions, except that a stenographer was employed to attend all sessions of the Examining Board, in order to settle, as to the examination, questions of fact or of fairness which might be raised. The result was so disappointing as to make it obviously improper to expend public funds any further in the attempt to comply with the act. Only two candidates passed the examination; one because he possessed the basic education necessary to a commissioned officer, and the other - the candidate for chaplain - because, under the law, he was required to show only that he was a duly ordained minister of some regularly The questions asked were precisely such as organized religious denomination. are put to other candidates without previous military experience.

#### STATE CONSTABULARY

During the past year some citizens of great distinction in our State have begun a movement for the passage of a law to create a State Constabulary, similar to that in Pennsylvania. It is proposed to maintain this force as a mounted organization on duty under pay the year around and to clothe its members with the powers of deputy sheriffs and other peace officers. It is frankly stated that one of the purposes is to relieve the active militia of all riot duty. No charge is made that our present force is disloyal, incompetent or ineffective. It is said that the principal argument for the constabulary is that it would save the public money. This economic conclusion may have been reached by a comparison of the relative number of the proposed force with that of the existing forces of the State. The proponents seem not to have considered that the constabulary would have to be paid, quartered and subsisted, not only during riot duty, but during three hundred and sixty-five days in each year. The Legislature this year declined to provide sufficient forage for the horses now legally authorized in our existing mounted organizations. It would seem that this duty, imposed

upon the Legislature by section 3 of article XI of the State Constitution, ought first to be performed before new mounted forces are required to be organized. It happens, however, that all the objects sought by the advocates of the new force can be obtained under existing law. The sheriff of each county has the power to summon to his aid any number of citizens whom he may select as he pleases. He may organize, arm, equip, uniform and drill them or cause them to be drilled as he deems best. He may retain them in service as long as he thinks proper. The only limit upon the state of efficiency to which he can bring them is measured by the amount of money the supervisors of his county may authorize him to expend. For the State to provide a special force to do the work of deputy sheriffs would be to violate the principle of home rule.

#### PURCHASES FROM THE UNITED STATES

In making purchases under the contract system it was found that in the case of some articles of clothing it was impossible to procure articles by purchase except at prices much higher than those at which the same articles were listed by the Quartermaster Corps of the United States Army. Under the State law, it was not possible to make these purchases directly from the United States for cash without advertising for bids and securing the United States as a bidder. This was found to be impracticable, and in order that the State might purchase any needed military supplies from the United States at the lower prices, the Legislature passed chapter 161 of the Laws of 1914, upon your recommendation, which authorizes the Governor to purchase such goods directly from the Government without advertising for bids and awarding a contract. By this means the State gets the benefit of the Army inspection as to quality and conformity to the Army standards; and since the United States sells to the Governor at cost price, the State gets the benefit of the low rate at which the large Army purchases are made. This has resulted in a difference of from 15 per cent. to 20 per cent. in price in favor of the new method as against the old.

#### CONSOLIDATION OF PROPERTY BOOKS

A few years ago the attempt was made to keep the property books of this department in Albany, while the property itself was received, stored and issued at the Arsenal in New York. The result proved after years of fruitless attempts to make the two sets of books correspond that the experiment was an unfortunate one. I therefore directed that the Property Division of my office take up its quarters in the Arsenal, where the property is stored. It is believed that any business house having a similar problem on its hands would fail in the attempt to keep duplicate sets of books 140 miles apart. This points to a thorough overhauling of the property books, in which many discrepancies running back in some instances twenty or thirty years have been continued in the present system. I have prepared a plan of a loose leaf system of books with a card index, which, if properly kept, will enable the State to conduct this department with ten fewer persons than are now employed. Many of the employees in this department have for a number of years past been appointed as a matter of favor instead of merit and fitness. In some cases they are incompetent and ought to be summarily discharged. It would be equally a mistake to extend the Civil Service Law to this department, every portion of the work of which is military work. It is emergency work. The proper method, in my opinion, of providing the clerical and physical labor necessary to conduct the operations of this department is to give the employment to members of the uniformed military and naval forces now in the State service instead of to civilians, who have this highly specialized technical business all to learn. Appointments to this department would thus reward faithful service to the State, and the State in turn would gain servants who know the details of their work.

#### PRESERVATION OF WAR FLAGS

The State has in the custody of The Adjutant General one of the largest collections of flags in the country. They are kept in wooden cases in the Bureau of War Records in the Capitol and are furled for compact storage. Most of them are Civil War flags of New York regiments. As the majority of them are nearly fifty years old, they are rapidly falling to decay. I have made a thorough investigation of the best means of preserving flags, and find that it would be useless to provide

air tight steel cases for flags, if the flags themselves are so decayed that they will drop to pieces in a few years more, irrespective of the kind of cases in which they are stored. After inspecting the means taken at Washington, at the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, at the Armory of the First Corps of Cadets in Boston, and at the Massachusetts State House, for the preservation of flags, I find that the system of superimposing an invisible network on each side of the fabric is the only known method of saving these priceless relics. Unless this is done, they will in a few years more have decayed so far as to become unrecognizable. Before providing containers for the flags, the latter should themselves be preserved. I caused an examination of our flags to be made by Mrs. Amelia Fowler of Boston, who successfully undertook to restore the original Star Spangled Banner for the United States Government and who also restored the naval trophies in the Naval Academy at Annapolis, and upon her report I hereby recommend that suitable appropriations be made from year to year by the Legislature for the adoption of this method of preserving these flags while it is yet possible to do so.

#### CAMPAIGN BADGES

Under chapter 165 of the Laws of 1913, the Legislature appropriated \$1,000 for the purpose of procuring campaign badges to be distributed among the soldiers and sailors of this State who served in the Spanish War, in the Philippine Insurrection and in the expedition to China, in 1898, 1899 and 1900, respectively. I invited the preparation and submission of designs for this badge with estimates of the cost, and submitted them to a committee of which the distinguished numismatist, Col. James H. Manning of Albany, and Col. Harry C. Cushman of Albany, were members. The designs were separately considered and were all rejected as not being suitable for the purpose or in harmony with the canons of the numismatic art. Other designs were submitted and were also rejected for similar reasons. Under the advice of the committee, I then retained Mr. James E. Fraser, the sculptor, to prepare several designs, one of which was selected, and the manufacture of the medals is now proceeding under the supervision of Mr. Fraser. As the initial appropriation was sufficient only to begin to issue these medals, it is recommended that suitable appropriation be made by the Legislature from year to year to continue the award of medals to all who are entitled to them under the original act, until each soldier and sailor of the State shall have received one.

#### SPANISH WAR REFUND

After the war with Spain, Congress made an appropriation to pay to each soldier and sailor the pay of his grade from the time when he first reported for duty to the time when he was mustered into the service of the United States. This amount was paid to the Governor of the State, and the distribution was managed by this office. During the administration of Governor Hughes, the Governor directed that the bank account should be made subject to the joint check of the Governor, Comptroller and Adjutant General. The distribution proceeded from year to year, all lawful claims being paid as presented. Up to the present month the funds were drawing 21/2 per cent. interest in the trust companies in which they were deposited. The accounts are now so nearly dormant, as claims are made less and less frequently, that it may be advantageous to deposit the bulk of the fund in savings banks, which will furnish at least as good security to the fund and will pay at present rates not less than 4 per cent. interest. By this reinvestment, not only will the fund be sufficiently productive to pay the expenses of its administration, but there is reason to believe that the accruing interest will meet all incoming claims from this time forth, leaving the principal of the fund intact.

The report of the Major General, setting forth in detail the organization, strength and operations of the National Guard, is transmitted herewith as Appendix A.

The report of the Commodore, commanding the Naval Militia, is transmitted as Appendix B.

The summary of the financial operations of my office is transmitted as Appendix C.

#### PART I

The war at present being waged in Europe has visited such losses in men and property on the nations engaged in its prosecution and inflicted such calamities on the inhabitants of the territory utilized by the combatant armies, that the intelligent people in this country, and perhaps more particularly in this State, have become aroused to the necessity for adequate military preparedness, as one of the most effective means of preserving peace. Viewed in a broad way the annual report of the Commanding General of the National Guard of New York would be of small value if it did not possess some practical relation to this important

subject of the military preparedness of the nation.

For more than a decade the leading military authorities of our country nave pointed out the shortcomings of the national military policy as it existed at the time of the Spanish-American War. The war, however, was not a big war. It can hardly be designated a war in the sense in which that term is understood today. The military activities of the country at that time were limited to sending abroad three expeditionary forces, one to Cuba, one to the Philippines and one to Porto Rico. Each force, for reasons that are now history, accomplished its mission. In Porto Rico no battles were fought. In the Philippines our forces took the city of Manila without serious opposition. In Cuba but one battle, namely that of San Juan, was fought. Yet the latter engagement, the period of reconnaisance which preceded it, and the period of siege and occupation which followed it, were sufficient to cause the practical demoralization of the army which constituted that expeditionary force.

Fortunately for our Government that taking of Santiago and the destruction of the Spanish fleet in its effort to escape from the harbor of Santiago, and the taking of the city of Manila, were sufficient to terminate the war, although approximately 200,000 Spanish troops were on the Island of Cuba, and of these less than 3,000 had actually opposed the American expeditionary force. In view of the condition of our army after the fall of Santiago, it is unpleasant to speculate on what would have happened had the large Spanish army on the

Island of Cuba continued the war.

Since the Spanish-American War, military officers have continuously sought to profit by its lessons. During the decade following the war there appeared in the service journals and other military periodicals, many essays and professional papers calling attention to the military shortcomings of the country, and suggesting remedies. An examination of these papers will show, however, that among military men the greatest diversity of opinion prevailed as to the action and methods best adapted to safeguard the interests of the nation. During this period, and as a result of this great diversity of views, military thought was not crystalized on the subject of military preparedness and in consequence no established and progressive military policy resulted. Many of the remedies offered by these military writers indicate a lack of profound and comprehensive knowledge of the

subjects involved in a consideration of military policy. During this period, however, important progress of a fundamental nature was made. Through the efforts of the Hon. Elihu Root, as Secretary of War, legislation was enacted providing for a General Staff Corps for the Regular Army, and for the first time the proper machinery became available for serious study of military policy. period the Army War College was founded and opportunity was thus afforded for officers to receive higher education in the military profession and to study the big questions affecting the adoption of a sound military policy. The Division of Militia Affairs of the War Department was also established and the Organized Militia of the several States was brought into closer relationship with the Federal Government. As a consequence of this, uniformity in armament, clothing and equipment, and better and more detailed methods of instruction followed. Military thought, at least among those who have been so fortunate as to profit by the opportunities made available for higher military education, is therefore, at present, not so widely diversified as it was during the decade immediately following the Spanish-American War.

It is true, nevertheless, that at the present time there is still no broad comprehensive and approved national military policy to meet the requirements of a state of war. The Regular Army is utilized to garrison Colonial possessions, man the coast artillery fortifications and occupy the various army posts within the continental limits of the United States. The Organized Militia is expected to become a part of the first line of the military power of the nation at the outbreak of war. It is admitted by every student of military organization that the relation between the Organized Militia and the Federal Government rests on an illy defined and unsatisfactory legal foundation. So antiquated and contrary to all military principles is this relation believed to be, that existing plans do not contemplate the use of the Militia as Militia in the Federal service, but the organization at the outbreak of war of a volunteer army to be made up, it is hoped, largely of the Organized Militia. In other words all the preparation and training now going on in the Militia of the several States is being carried on with the knowledge that at the outbreak of war when these forces should be available for prompt use, they are to be discarded, and a new force to be created at the time, substituted in their place. It would be difficult for the most cunning mind to devise a scheme better calculated to create confusion, friction, indecision and disorganization at a time of national stress. Although it is known from the records of warfare that from the outbreak of war the wastage in men begins to take place, there exists no practical plan for the organization of reserves to replace such losses, either in the regular forces or in those of the Organized Militia.

Before discussing the activities of the National Guard of this State during the past year and of outlining future plans, it will be well to consider its obligations to the Federal Government under such Federal military policy as at present exists, and its ability to measure up to obligations which a more comprehensive national military policy will doubtless impose.

The present plans of the War Department provide for a first line of sixteen divisions, plus some additional auxiliary troops. As the division numbers 22,000 men at war strength, these sixteen divisions assuming that they existed, would provide for the first line a force of 352,000 men. Of these sixteen divisions four are to be furnished by the Regular Army and twelve by the Organized Militia. of the country. The United States has been divided into militia territorial districts numbered from five to twelve inclusive, and it is from these territorial districts that the twelve militia divisions are to be created. For example the Organized Militia of the New England States constitute the 5th Division; the Organized Militia of New York the 6th Division; that of Pennsylvania the 7th Division, and so on. The only division districts which are co-extensive with State lines are those of New York and Pennsylvania. Under the existing policy it is therefore the obligation of the State of New York to prepare for early use in war from its Organized Militia, an infantry division. An infantry division consists of three brigades of infantry, of three regiments each, or nine regiments of infantry; one regiment of cavalry; a brigade of two regiments of field artillery; a battalion of three pioneer companies of engineers; a battalion of two companies of signal troops; three field hospitals; four ambulance companies and the necessary trains. In addition to these troops, the State contributes for coast defense purposes, thirty-four companies of coast artillery organized into three coast defense commands. The Organized Militia of New York State consists of the organized and uniformed land forces, known as the National Guard, and of these there are in some arms of the service an excess over and above the organizations necessary to constitute the Division to be furnished in time of war. The Organized Militia of New York State bears an important relation to the security of the State against lawlessness, and its duty to the State is of the most profound importance. Its obligations to the State have made necessary a study of the military needs of the State and the adoption of a policy, so far as any State policy may be adopted by the Commanding General, which will harmonize with Federal obligations. It may be conceded, for example, that in numerical strength the Organized Militia of New York State is ample to suppress internal disorder and to safeguard the security of the institutions of the State against mob violence during time of peace. Its obligations to the State would, however, in time of war, be materially affected were the entire military forces of the State to enter the Federal service upon the outbreak of war. It would seem obvious, therefore, that in addition to the Division for service in war, there should be maintained sufficient force to provide for the security of the State by service within the State during the absence of the Division in the Federal service.

At the present time there are in excess of the organizations necessary to constitute the Division the following: four regiments of infantry, nine companies of engineers and one squadron of cavalry. The existing military law of the State provides that upon the outbreak of war, Depot Battalions will be organized to take the place of the organizations which enter the Federal service. The constitution of the State requires that the National Guard shall be maintained at all times at a strength of not less than 10,000 officers and men. These excess organizations and the depot battalions to be brought into being at the outbreak of war, will constitute this force during the absence of the Pivision in the Federal service. The excess organizations referred to should be more than sufficient to safeguard the interests of the State while the Depot Battalions are being organized and trained.

During each period of peace, civilian officials and the public generally regard war as a romantic institution, extremely remote in its possibilites. It is only in time of war that its horrors and losses are appreciated by the general public, and consideration is given by them to the means of avoiding its future visitation. The time would, therefore, seem to be ripe to ask for the support of the Legislature in the furtherance of a sound and progressive State military policy, calculated to fulfill the needs of the State in peace and in war, and the obligations of the State to the Federal Government, in both peace and war.

To prepare the National Guard to render efficient service, it was necessary to formulate a policy which would serve as a guide. The following principles were therefore laid down as the fundamental basis of our efforts to increase military

efficiency.

1. To prepare the troops and organizations of the National Guard in such manner that with the least possible delay they may furnish the Federal Government, on call, the tactical Division, efficiently trained, complete in armament, clothing and equipment, and at war strength.

2. To provide for a system of reserves for two purposes, i. e., to replace losses of men in the organizations in the Federal service, so as to maintain such organizations at all times with full ranks; to provide the home force to meet the constitutional requirement that the National Guard shall at all times be maintained at not less than 10,000 men.

3. To prepare all organizations to render prompt and efficient service to the State and to the subdivisions thereof, not only in connection with riots, but on occasions of calamity such as great fires, floods or earthquakes.

As to the first proposition, namely, to furnish to the Federal Government, on call, a tactical Division ready for prompt service in war, it may be said that four factors constitute the problem. These are

- (1) Numbers,
- (2) Armament,
- (3) Technical training,
- (4) Morale.

As to numbers, the existing State law limits the strength of the National Guard to 18,000 men, while the Division organization alone requires approximately 22,000 men. Of the organizations of the several arms of the service, which constitutes the tactical Division, and which have been already enumerated, New York State possesses them all except one field hospital and one ambulance company, which will shortly be organized. It is not believed to be necessary to maintain, in time of peace, the Division at war strength. From a strictly military point of view, war strength at all times might be deemed desirable, but it is believed that with a proper system of reserves, twelve per cent. may be added to the personnel of an efficient organization and be assimilated with reasonable promptness in time of This would mean that the tactical Division of 22,665 men, at war strength, would be maintained in time of peace at a strength of not less than 20,000 men. In addition to the organizations necessary for the tactical Division, we have at the present time, as already stated, four regiments of infantry, nine companies of engineers and a squadron of cavalry. Some of these organizations are necessary for reasons already pointed out, and while their number might be reduced with benefit to the State and to the military service, a considerable part of them are essential, and the numbers constituting their personnel should be in excess of the 20,000 constituting the peace strength of the tactical Division. Fixing their numbers at 4,000 and the number of departmental and service personnel at not exceeding an additional 1,000, we have a total desirable peace strength for the National Guard of New York of 25,000 men. This would mean repealing the present limitation of 18,000 and fixing the maximum at not exceeding 25,000, a total authorized increase of 7,000 officers and men.

A consideration of the question of numbers includes not only the legal aspect of the subject but the practicability of obtaining numbers that may be authorized. This latter consideration brings up the subject of recruiting, and this in turn squarely presents to the mind the fundamental difficulty of the National Guard as an institution with which to carry on war. In truth the efforts of the Federal Government, and the several States, to make available for war the services of the National Guard, have up to the present time constituted an effort to get something for nothing. It is not known that substantial and dependable results have ever been obtained consistently and continuously in any field of human effort calling for great sacrifice and ability where the plan for accomplishment was based on this theory. In the conscript armies abroad it does not prevail. While the soldier there is paid little or nothing for his services, his presence is an enforced one and he is not handicapped in the struggle for life with his fellow subjects, because all struggle under the same requirement to render military service. If National Guard service were relieved of its present exacting obligations as to discipline. training and professional education, and it resumed its formed status of an organization which provided opportunity for busy business men to indulge in mild exercise on stated occasions, and to make periodical visits under arms and in the guise of soldiers to distant cities and points of interest; in other words enjoying the acclaim and respect which a generous public see fit to give bodies of men whom they ignorantly believe to be soldiers, though they possess none of the essentials to be found in the composition of trained troops, then no difficulty need be looked for in obtaining mere numbers. When, however, those who comprehend the immeasureable gulf which exists between the well intentioned and enthusiastic citizen dressed in a uniform and armed with a rifle, and the trained fighting man, begin the process of bridging the gulf and of making of the former a close approximation to the latter, enthusiasm wanes, and numbers become difficult, if not impossible, to obtain and hold. It may be stated as a truth that we cannot wage war on ignorant enthusiasm and unalloyed patriotism. We have tried it in past wars, and on each occasion it was found that when the patriotic enthusiasm found what preparation for war meant, and what war itself involved, its fervor cooled to such an extent that resort was had to the system of purchasing service by the payment of large sums of money. The extent to which the bounty system prevailed in our past wars is little appreciated by the general public.

In the Civil War, in this very State, a draft was necessarily resorted to at a critical period of the war. If, therefore, the officers and enlisted men of the National Guard are to have imposed upon them obligations, responsibilities and sacrifices in respect to professional training, discipline and property accountability,

which distinguish them from the other class of citizens who are not rendering military service, and who are not handicapped in civil life by such obligations, it would seem to be part of wisdom to compensate them to some extent, at least, for the financial losses which these responsibilities entail. Obligations of the nature referred to are imposed upon our officers and enlisted men at the present time. The standards of efficiency which have to be prescribed are necessary to meet the demands of war, and hence the subject of compensation for attendance at drills, rifle practice and schools, is an obligation, primarily, of the Federal Government.

There is pending in Congress at the present time a bill, known as the Chamberlain Bill, which provides a limited form of compensation for the National Guard soldiers. With the passage of this act the Government and State will be enabled to enforce stricter discipline, better attendance at drills and schools and more rigid property accountability. The National Guard troops will become in a measure quasi-professional. In my opinion the enactment into law of a measure of the character of the Chamberlain Bill will within a few years do more to increase the preparedness of the Government for war than any single law which has ever been enacted by Congress. As this subject vitally affects the strength and efficiency of the National Guard as a dependable force in war, I recommend its consideration by the Legislature, and an expression of views and a recom-

mendation to the Congress thereon in the form of a resolution.

The second factor in the problem of preparing New York's troops for war is the factor of armament. By armament is meant generally the material things necessary for war. This includes weapons, clothing, equipment, ammunition, transportation, subsistence and supplies. The United States has undertaken to supply most of these material things, and it may be said in general that it has been the policy of the State of New York generally to meet its obligations in respect to such property as is not furnished by the United States. There is no criticism to be made of the character and quality of military property furnished by the United States to the troops of New York. At the present time regular troops and militia troops are armed, clothed and equipped alike. It is the existing plan to equip at the outbreak of war the men necessary to bring organizations to war strength, which is believed to possess defects. On the continent of Europe property of this character is decentralized in local store rooms where it may be placed in the hands of the individuals who are to use it immediately upon their arrival in answer to the mobilization call. Under such a system the property does not have to be shifted to the men, and the errors and delays of transportation are avoided. The men go to the property and this is so fully localized that it may be said to be immediately available. Under the existing plan of the War Department, war strength property is stored in several territorial supply depots in the country, and upon the outbreak of war from one or more of these supply depots it is planned to ship to New York State the property necessary to bring our organizations to war strength. It must be obvious that our war strength recruits cannot be equipped until the arrival of this property. Its shipment, simultaneous with the shipment of similar property to all the other States in the Union, will involve an immediate enlargement of the forces of the Federal Supply Departments and a consequent and inevitable decrease in the efficient performance of their functions. Hence errors in the make up of consignments and in shipments will be inevitable. To these must be added the errors and damage incident to railroad transportation. If the property to be shipped to New York State is to be divided at the Supply Depot and invoiced to the forty odd posts throughout the State, where the recruits are waiting to receive it, additional difficulties will be involved and in many cases before the arrival of such property, the organization will have left for the mobilization camp, leaving its war strength recruits behind. If on the other hand war strength property is to be shipped from the Federal Supply Depot direct to the mobilization camp, the spectacle will be presented of a vast number of boxes of property of all character, weights and sizes, arriving at the mobilization camp, where in the nature of things there will be no adequate facilities for receiving, checking, housing, recording and issuing the same. The Federal Supply Department will probably consider its mission completed with the shipment of the property from the territorial supply depot. This, however, will be but the beginning of the problem, which is to put the property in the possession of the individual men who are to use it, and to do this under the regulations prescribed for its accountability and proper issue. During the period of this property movement to the State mobilization camp, many of the conditions of the Spanish War camps in respect to discipline will necessarily be repeated. Under the proposed plan, five or more thousand war strength recruits will be in the camp awaiting their military clothing and equipment. They will not be distinguishable from civilians. Most of them will be undisciplined and their very number at one place will invite all forms of disorder, from ordinary mischief to criminal acts, at the very time when the soldier should be receiving the most favorable impression of the order and discipline which are inseparable from efficiency. At a time when they should be impressed with the ability of the Government to effectively care for and develop the morale of its troops, they will be receiving object lessons to the contrary. In any event such a plan would have no application to New York State in the event of winter mobilization.

This State has, therefore, recommended to the War Department that the European system of storing war strength property be adopted for the National Guard organizations of New York State, and that at each regimental armory there be constructed a Federal war strength store room where all the arms, clothing, equipment and supplies necessary for the men, who are to raise the regiment from peace to war strength, be stored in time of peace, so that they may be immediately issued to the individuals who are to use them at the outbreak of war. method will avoid the errors and delays incident to shipping and railroad transportation at a time of stress. It will relieve the Federal Supply Departments on the outbreak of war of the vast amount of work connected with the shipment of stores when their officers will be hard pressed by other demands. It will permit the war strength recruits of each organization to be properly clothed and equipped at the several armories immediately after they are physically examined and sworn in, thus avoiding the spectacle of thousands of recruits wandering about the mobilization camp with a mixed assortment of civilian clothing and odds and ends of military dress. The property so stored will be kept up to date in style and model by filling current requisitions from such stores and replacing them from the supply depots. During the Spanish War this delay in furnishing clothing and equipment to recruits created an atmosphere of disorder and placed a premium on disorderly conduct in the camps. We are now awaiting the acceptance of our plan by the War Department.

In the matter of technical training considerable progress has been made. The test of efficiency, however, is readiness to meet the demands of war, and measured by this test there is still much to be done in the matter of improving the technical training of our troops. It may be said, as a general proposition, that the men are what the officers make them. Given officers highly trained in the performance of their functions, and within two or three years the efficiency of the men will almost automatically follow. An exemplification of this principle may be noted by an inspection of the organizations of the Division. Where an organization possesses an educated officer with technical training and the qualities of leadership, it is always found that good discipline exists, that property is well cared for and that the enlisted personnel are well trained and dependable. Where technical training and qualities of leadership do not exist in the commander, the organization is usually found to be inefficient. Right here it should be recognized that up to the last year or two efficient officers in the National Guard have usually become efficient as a result of their own natural qualities of leadership, initiative and Their development was not the result of any State system of military education. Hence the standard of efficiency among our officers varied in the widest degree, that is to say, from those who were natural leaders, well educated and with technical knowledge, down to those who, no matter how commendable their self sacrifice and willingness might be, were in their several positions, worthless from the military point of view.

The tactical Division is a military team, and to be efficient, reliance cannot be placed upon the miraculous appearance here and there of self educated leaders. There must necessarily be a system of education and training which will require all to attain prescribed standards. Such a system will not handicap the exceptional men but on the other hand it will eliminate the unfit, and permit others to

be substituted in their places, from among whom will be developed a percentage of the first class.

Two years ago by Division order there was established a State wide school, known as the School of the Line and Staff. A basic course was provided to be followed by a four years course of theoretical instruction. A military curriculum was prescribed. An Academic Board was provided for, composed of all the Inspector-Instructors of the United States Army on duty with the New York Division and certain specially qualified National Guard officers. This Academic Board worked through a local instruction board at each post in the State. Semi-annual written examinations have been held during the past two years, and as a result of such examinations officers have been rated in their theoretical work. This has placed a premium on study, and has stimulated the professional improvement of our commissioned officers. This school, however, is in a measure an intangible institution in that except for occasional visits of members of the faculty, the one thousand commissioned officers of the State do not come in constant personal touch with the members of the faculty. This educational work begins in October and ends in May. During the past two years it has been followed by a practical School of Application in each arm of the service, where the student officers in camp worked with a model command in their own arm of the service. The duration of the period of this practical instruction is necessarily limited to one week on account of the expense. The time is insufficient. A large percentage of the officers are willing to devote two and even three weeks' time to this practical training. This fall there was established by Division order another school known as the School of the Line, for the purpose of providing intense training to selected officers who could afford a greater amount of time for their professional development than is available to the average officer. This course began in October and will end in May. The School is located in the armory of the 71st Regiment, where facilities were provided for it through the cooperation of the regimental commander, Colonel William G. Bates. Twenty-five officers were detached from service with their commands and ordered to take the course at the School of the Line. were selected from among officers who volunteered. They are required to attend three pights a week. The faculty of the School is made up of both Regular and National Guard officers. The regular sessions are to be supplemented by field training in the form of tactical rides and walks on Saturady afternoons and Sunday mornings, and in two maneuver exercises to be held at Peekskill over a period of two days each, one in February and one in May. In connection with the School, a School Company of infantry has been organized. This also was made possible through the cooperation of Colonel William G. Bates. All of the officers and enlisted men of Company "F", 71st Infantry, were transferred to other companies of that command. 1st Lieutenant Albert T. Rich, 3rd U. S. Infantry, detailed by the War Department for service at the School, was detailed to command the company. He was authorized to advertise for recruits, offering one day's pay for three evening drills per week. The promptness with which the company was recruited surprised the expectations of all concerned with its organization. More than two hundred and fifty applicants promptly applied for enlistment, and of these about sixty were accepted within the first two or three weeks. The physical examination prescribed was that fixed for enlistment in the regular army, plus additional requirements as to height and muscular development. The facts in connection with the organization of this company have direct relation to the previous part of this report, wherein was discussed the effect of pay for drills on the recruiting of National Guard organizations. It is believed that this company of infantry will within the next six months develop into an efficient and dependable fighting unit, prepared to meet the demands of war.

In addition to the educational efforts above mentioned, it is now the policy of the Division Commander to stimulate the attendance of the commissioned officers of the Division at the Army Service Schools. A substantial number of our field artillery officers have not only attended the elementary schools of the army for field artillery officers, but a number of them have taken the course at the Field Artillery School of Fire, at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and have been graduated. Last spring, Major James M. Hutchinson, 71st Infantry, and Major Francis G. Landon, 7th Infantry, completed the Field Officers' Course at the Army Service Schools at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. This month, upon our application, the War Depart-

ment detailed to take the Field Officers' Course at the Army Service Schools at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, Major George F. Chandler. 10th Infantry and Major William A. Taylor, 2nd Infantry. As a result of this policy we will not only professionally improve the officers who successfully complete such courses, but they will become valuable agents in assisting in carrying out the educational program of Division Headquarters.

It has been stated that the technical training of the organizations composing the National Guard, varies widely, and that this variance can be traced to the different standards of education and professional training which obtain among the officers of the several organizations. While it is true that deficiencies in technical training and education, where they exist, are not entirely to be charged to the officers themselves, it is nevertheless true that by reason of the necessity for a proper standard of general education some of our officers in certain grades cannot be made efficient under any system because of fundamental educational short-

comings. Much improvement has resulted, generally, in the ranks of the commissioned personnel during the past few years, by the gradual self elimination of officers of this class; but there are some who still remain apparently lacking in the necessary discernment to realize their organic shortcomings, and for the good of the service pressure may have to be brought to bear to effect their elimination.

As to the subject of morale, it may be said that the spirit which actuates our officers and men is most commendable. In the case of the officers the spirit of self sacrifice and loyalty to the service, when the many adverse conditions are considered, is truly remarkable. Among our commissioned officers, generally, a very high standard of discipline obtains. Military morale, however, implies more than spirit and enthusiasm. It includes discipline and the developed and trained power to suffer, endure and effectively render service under the conditions of campaign. It includes not only these attributes but the power to infuse and maintain discipline among the enlisted personnel and to properly instruct and train them in the performance of their functions. The development of a proper morale is, therefore, closely allied to the subject of technical training. The morale of a military organization is seriously impaired when the delinquencies and defects of some of its units are overlooked. Some of the units making up our National Guard have serious shortcomings. Some few of our officers possess serious shortcomings, and the persistence and continuance of these shortcomings cannot be permitted without impairment to the morale of the whole. It has always been a difficult matter in National Guard service to secure the necessary, more or less drastic action to eliminate such evils, because it is commonly urged that the individuals affected are rendering voluntary and gratuitous service, and that the donee should not, as it were, look a gift horse in the face. This policy, however. not only has operated in retarding the increase of efficiency, but it is not fair to the officers in organizations who measure up to the standards prescribed. It may, therefore, be necessary in the early future to take action to correct some of these evils, which though harsh according to the standards of a former time, will. it is believed, be considered as just, reasonable and necessary for the good of the entire service.

The efficiency of the Division is greatly affected by the existing method of controlling the expenditure of military funds. The Commanding General of the National Guard is the only State officer who is charged with the discipline, training and efficiency of his department, who has no control over the manner in which the funds of that department shall be utilized. Until this is changed there can be no persistent, progressive and certain policy of training. Each Adjutant General in the past has assumed the control of military funds. Where he has been a man who subordinated political demands to the military recommendations of the Commanding General, the latter has been enabled to more or less influence the way in which funds appropriated for the efficiency of the troops are expended. Where this has not been the case the efficiency of the military department of the State has been seriously impaired. It is recommended that legislation be enacted which, while continuing The Adjutant General of the State as the auditor of military expenditures, shall vest in the Commanding General or in the Militia Council, of which both the Commanding General and The Adjutant General of the State are members, the authority to determine how and for what purpose military funds shall be used. How to most profitably use the funds appropriated for

military purposes is essentially a military problem, and its determination should be vested either in the officer who is responsible for the efficiency of the military service, and whose training and military qualifications provide the necessary discretion for a proper determination, or in the Militia Council, which is composed of officers specially selected for their fitness from among the organizations com-

posing the Division.

By recent Federal legislation the Quartermaster Department, Subsistence Department and Pay Department, were consolidated into the Quartermaster Corps, which is now charged with the performance of the duties theretofore performed by these several departments. Under the Federal law the National Guard is required to conform in its organization to that of the Regular Army. Recently an order was issued by the Governor consolidating the Quartermaster Department and Subsistence Department of the National Guard into a Quartermaster Corps, but the functions of the Pay Department were continued in The Adjutant General of the State. It is not believed that this order is a compliance with the Federal requirement as to conformity with army organization, nor is it believed that the functions of a Pay Department can be as efficiently or economically performed by the employees of The Adjutant General's Office as they can be performed by the officers and enlisted men of the Quartermaster Corps. This does not constitute a criticism in favor of or against any of the officers of The Adjutant General's Office or of the Quartermaster Corps. It is based upon the organic difference between an office where the employees are subject to removal every two years for political reasons, and a military organization unaffected by political changes and continuous in its existence. It is recommended that legislation be enacted to consolidate the departments named, so as to bring about exact compliance with the spirit of the Federal law and the policy of the War Department.

Before terminating the general discussion of the condition of the National Guard during the past year, which is set forth in this part of the annual report, I desire to make reference to the relations which have existed between the present Adjutant General of the State and the Commanding General, Division, and the officers of the Division Staff. The present Adjutant General, when he assumed the duties of his office, made it known that his activities would be confined to the functions designated in the law to be performed by The Adjutant General of the State, and that the command, training, discipline and other functions which by law are vested in the Commanding General, would not be encroached upon. I believe it should be recorded here that Brigadier General Henry D. Hamilton during the two years of his tenure of office, which will shortly terminate, carefully conformed to this rule of action so far as the present Military Law would permit. Throughout his service as Adjutant General there has been no friction between his office and the several departmental heads at Division Headquarters, and he spared no effort to facilitate in every way the efforts of the Commanding General to increase the efficiency of the organizations of the Division and of the officers on duty with them.

#### REORGANIZED

On November 5, 1913, Troops B, D, H and I, 1st Cavalry, were transferred to the 2nd Cavalry (G. O. 27, A. G. O., 1913), the letter designation of Troops B and D being changed to K and L respectively; on the same date Troops A, E, F and G, 1st Cavalry, were detached from the 1st Cavalry and organized as the "1st Squadron, N. Y. Cavalry," and Troop C, 1st Cavalry was re-organized and designated as "Machine Gun Troop, N. Y. Cavalry." The Colonel commanding the 1st Cavalry was relieved of the command of that regiment November 5, 1913, and assigned to command the Cavalry Post and troops quartered at Madison avenue and 94th street, New York City (G. O. 27, A. G. O., 1913). On December 10, 1913, the 1st Cavalry was disbanded and the designation of the 2nd Cavalry changed to 1st Cavalry, also the letter designations of Troops E, F and G, 1st Squadron, Cavalry, were changed to B, C and D respectively. On February 17, 1914, the Signal Corps was re-organized into a battalion designated the 1st Battalion, Signal Corps, composed of the 1st and 2nd Companies, which were at the same time re-organized as field companies, type A, and designated Companies A and B respectively (G. O. 2, A. G. O., 1914). On March 5, 1914 (G. O. 3, A. G. O., 1914), the designation of the 1st Squadron, Cavalry, was changed to Squadron A, Cavalry, and the Adjutant General's, Inspector General's, Judge Advocate General's and Ordnance Departments were reorganized. On June 29, 1914 (G. O. 11, A. G. O., 1914), the Cavalry Post was discontinued. The Coast Artillery Corps was re-organized August 10, 1914 (G. O. 14, A. G. O., 1914); the designation of the Artillery Districts being respectively changed to 8th, 9th and 13th Coast Defense Commands, the Commanding General, Division, being charged with the duties theretofore required of the Chief of Coast Artillery and a Lieutenant Colonel, Coast Artillery Corps, authorized for duty as coast defense officer at Division Headquarters.

#### STRENGTH OF THE NATIONAL GUARD

The following is a summary of the strength of the National Guard for all corps, departments and arms of the service, showing the number of officers and enlisted men at the date of the last semi-annual return, September 30, 1914.

The total strength on September 30, 1913, was 16.482. The difference between the totals of the two years shows a net gain of 995.

#### COURTS MARTIAL

General Courts Martial have been convened for the trial of certain enlisted men of the 1st Field Artillery and 47th Infantry, and the findings and sentences of these courts have been published in General Orders.

#### SERVICE IN AID OF CIVIL AUTHORITY

On March 23, 1914, the sheriff of Eric county called on Brigadier General Samuel M. Welch, commanding the 4th Brigade, N. G., N. Y., for troops to aid the civil authority at Depew, N. Y., where a strike was in progress at the manufactory of the Gould Coupler Company. Brigadier General Welch ordered the 74th Infantry to perform this duty and the regiment proceeded to Depew early on March 24th, remaining on duty there until April 5, 1914, when it was relieved by Troop "I", 1st Cavalry. This troop remained on duty at Depew until April 15th, when the presence of troops was considered no longer necessary, and it was relieved.

It is recommended that the law relating to the manner of calling out troops in aid of the civil authorities be amended. At present too many civil officials may order out National Guard troops, and they do not always exercise their prerogatives in such manner that the best interests of the State and of the counties are conserved. In connection with the service at Depew, N. Y., the sheriff of Erie county ordered out the 74th Infantry, and their service resulted in a charge to the county of \$28,308.41, based upon the service of twelve days. Pursuant to the recommendations of the Commanding General, Division, this regiment was relieved from duty on April 5, 1914, and Troop "I", 1st Cavalry substituted in its place. Troop "I" remained on duty for ten days or until April 15th, when it was relieved. The service of the cavalry troop involved an expense of but \$4,736.24. For practically the same number of days the regiment of infantry therefore cost the taxpayers of Erie county six times as much as the troop of cavalry. Law and order were maintained as effectively by the troop as they had been maintained by the regiment of infantry. There are occasions when the infantry would under particular conditions be better adapted for effective service than would cavalry troops. The decision as to this is necessarily a tactical determination, and it is believed that better results would be obtained with less cost to the taxpayers if civilian officials who are authorized by law to demand military assistance could be limited in their authority to call on the brigade or division commander for a force necessary, in the judgment of the military officer, to be sufficient and best adapted for the particular service.

#### THEORETICAL INSTRUCTION OF OFFICERS

This was carried on in the School of the Line and Staff during the academic year and in the several Schools of Application at Peekskill during the summer. The qualifications of officers in the theoretical work have been published from time to time in Division orders. The general comments regarding the subject of military education have been referred to in Part I of this report.

#### SCHOOL OF EQUITATION

A School of Equitation for officers of infantry was successfully carried on during the last indoor drill and instruction season, and pursuant to a Division order has been continued during the present indoor season. The school, owing to the difficulty of obtaining horses in smaller cities, has thus far been limited to the City of New York. It is most desirable, however, that in addition to the twelve horses now owned by the State and maintained for military purposes, sufficient mounts be provided to furnish animals for a School of Equitation at Buffalo, and one at Rochester or Albany. The animals at present maintained for military purposes are used for a variety of purposes, and have actually paid for themselves several times over in money saved in the hire of horses. The importance of horsemanship among the field officers of infantry cannot be over estimated. They are required to be mounted not only in time of war but at maneuvers, and in State service generally. Unless they have some practical acquaintance with horsemanship, the most efficient field officer will be greatly handicapped in the performance of his duties when he is required to be mounted The officers in charge of the School of Equitation are the following:

#### FIELD TRAINING

Owing to the failure of the State to provide necessary funds for the field training of the troops during the summer of 1914, no organizations received field training. This was the first summer in a long period of years when this unfortunate condition existed. It has resulted in a distinct set back in the progress of the Division. It is earnestly recommended that ample provision be made by the next Legislature for the field training of organizations during the summer of 1915.

If the organizations of our mobile forces are to be properly trained, their tour of field service should be an annual one, and should cover a period of at least ten days. In the Coast Artillery, where the work is less diversified and less difficult, we have maintained a policy of annual service of two weeks in the coast fortifications.

#### INFANTRY

The infantry of the State consists of thirteen regiments, being four more than are required by the tactical organization of a Division. The necessity for some of these excess regiments is discussed in Part I of this report. The infantry is the most important arm of an army. It is, in fact, the army. The other arms are merely auxiliary to the infantry. No matter how efficient or successful in their operations the auxiliary arms may be, when the infantry is defeated the army is defeated. When the infantry wins the army wins, whether the auxiliary arms suffer defeat or not. While our auxiliary arms, generally speaking, conform to a common standard of efficiency, the widest variance exists in the infantry arm. The infantry seem to be handicapped somewhat by old methods and customs, based upon conservatism. As the professional education of the infantry officers is increased, the tendency to abandon old methods and to substitute progressive methods becomes more and more noticeable. In some infantry organizations the armory is still regarded as the club house, and the officers and enlisted men the "members" of the club. The armory should be regarded as a manufacturing plant, the output of which is soldiers. The proprietor of the plant is the State of New York, and its investment, represented by any particular armory, is a paying investment or not, depending upon the quality and amount of the output. Viewed in this light some of our most expensive plants at present constitute bad business investments. There are many conditions and causes which operate to effect these results. It is not desirable to suspend the operation of such plants until measures are perfected to substitute better conditions. It is believed that a material change for the better will take place in the less efficient infantry organizations during the coming year.

#### COAST ARTILLERY CORPS

The Coast Artillery Corps has been reorganized in compliance with Circular 8, D. M. A., August 1, 1913. The office of Chief of Coast Artillery has been abolished and pursuant to G. O. 14, A. G. O., 1914, the Major General is now charged with the performance of the duties heretofore lodged in the Chief of Coast Artillery.

The Coast Artillery Corps performed a tour of fortification service at Fort H. G. Wright, N. Y., from June 26 to August 9, 1914. The amount of assistance rendered officers of the Coast Artillery Corps by officers of the regular establishment has been systematically diminished for several years during the tours of fortification service. During the recent tour of duty no assistance was given during the target practice period, unless it was requested or was necessary for safety. The plan was to put all the responsibility for target practice upon the Coast Artillery reserves in order to test the degree of proficiency attained.

The results were not entirely satisfactory. The Corps had no fortification service during 1913, and the lack of this training was apparent in the work during the recent tour. The constant changes in the personnel of the Corps are such as to require an annual tour of fortification service.

As the result of observations made during this tour of fortification service, some important changes have been made in the methods of armory instruction.

There are now three officers and nine sergeants of the Coast Artillery Corps, U. S. A. on duty with the State of New York, and it is intended to utilize

their service to a greater degree than was heretofore possible in instructing the fire control sections and gun sections.

Although the number of officers who have passed the prescribed War Department examinations, is in the main satisfactory, there are still some officers of the Corps who have failed to qualify. It has been determined that any officer hereafter failing on three occasions to take and pass the War Department examination required of him, will be recommended to the Governor for examination into his capacity and general fitness for service in the Coast Artillery Corps pursuant to M. L. 83.

The number of qualified gunners is satisfactory.

The same cannot be said as to rated men. A large number of candidates, who are well instructed in their duties, find it difficult to pass the written examinations prescribed by the War Department. The instruction of these men is being given especial consideration.

It has been found increasingly difficult to qualify enlisted specialists under the War Department requirements. These men require technical and manual train-

ing which cannot be attained by the mere study of text books.

If funds for the purpose can be obtained, it is proposed to establish and equip in one of the coast defense armories a manual training school, analogous to the school at Fort Monroe, where candidates for enlisted specialists may be given the necessary practical technical training. It is expected that the War Department will detail the necessary instructors when the plant is installed.

General Order 12, W. D., February 25, 1914, prescribes the Coast Artillery War Game as a means of Coast Artillery training. During the current year a Coast Artillery War Game embracing the terrain of the eastern entrance to Long Island Sound, has been under construction, and is nearly completed. This is an elaborate and ambitious piece of work, and has been constructed without expense to the State. It is expected that this war game will be of utmost value in the training of the officers of the Coast Artillery Corps.

Each of the Coast Defense Armories is now equipped with the Standard 1909 Fire Control installation. The armories of the 9th and 13th Coast Defense Commands are also each equipped with a dummy 10" B. L. R., 12" B. L. M. and 3" R. F. A 3" R. F. gun has been installed in the Armory of the 8th Coast Defense Command and the guns and carriages for the 10" B. L. R. and 12" B. L. M. have been delivered but will not be installed until the completion of the new armory building of this command.

#### FIELD ARTILLERY

Furing the past summer the personnel of the field artillery regiments were sent to the United States Field Artillery School at Tobyhanna, Pennsylvania, by battalions, where they received practical instruction in the work of batteries and battalions of field artillery. The plant at Tobyhanna is an excellent one, and the school was under the very able supervision of Major Charles P. Summerall, U. S. Field Artillery, as commandant. Problems in field artillery fire were practically solved by the officers of our field artillery regiments.

The field artillery is in a satisfactory condition and is making steady progress

in increasing its efficiency.

#### CAVALRY

The cavalry organizations are generally efficient. They had no field training last summer as a result of the lack of State funds for the purpose, and they should have field training this coming summer.

#### CORPS OF ENGINEERS

Gauged by the standard referred to in Part I of this report the Corps of Engineers is not in satisfactory condition. This condition is not due to lack of zeal on the part of officers and men, but to many causes and conditions, which it is believed will be shortly remedied.

#### SIGNAL CORPS

The Signal Corps had no field training last summer, due to lack of State funds, and their efficiency has in consequence been impaired. The companies composing the Signal Corps are dependable and efficient.

#### MEDICAL CORPS

The officers of the Medical Corps have in the past been handicapped in many cases by unreasonable demands of line officers in respect to the physical examination of recruits and the work of immunizing them against typhoid. It was apparently not realized that the officers of the Medical Corps should have opportunity for their own professional development in military art. Indeed the idea that the doctor should engage in the study of military art was by many line officers regarded as presumptious. During the past year, however, we have instilled into the minds of our line officers the fact that it is as important for the medical officers to have a knowledge of the Military Law and Regulations, military administration, discipline, military topography and map reading, of hippology, riding and driving, as it is for the average line officer. A surgeon who is in command of a field hospital or ambulance company, for example, resembles a battery commander in that he is responsible for the discipline and training, horsemanship, driving, care of animals, harness and equipment of the component parts of his unit. He must know how to maneuver it, discipline, train and command it. He must know how to read a military map in order to take it to its assigned place, in maneuvers and in combat. Recommendations will shortly be made amending the existing Regulations governing the physical examination and typhoid prophylaxis of recruits in order to facilitate the professional training of medical officers.

#### HOUSING AND QUARTERS

The armories of the State are under the jurisdiction of two boards. For armories in New York City the board consists of the two Brigadier Generals, the Commodore commanding the Naval Militia and certain civilian officials of the City of New York. For the State, outside of the City of New York the Armory Commission, as it is called, consists of the Major General, The Adjutant General of the State, the Commodore, commanding the Naval Militia and the several Brigade Commanders. The report of the Secretary of the Armory Commission is the subject of a separate paper, and his report covers the operations of the Armory Commission during the past year.

Under the system as it exists in reference to armories in the City of New York, it is possible for an organization stationed in the City of New York to make application direct to the Armory Board for what is believed to be necessary or desirable for the organization in the way of quarters, facilities and equipment. Under this system appropriations are recommended by the Armory Board, and subsequently approved and allowed by the authorities of the City of New York, without any reference to the opinion of the constituted military authorities of the National Guard as to the relative necessity for such quarters or property. It may thus happen, and has happened, that the City of New York may expend large sums of money under the belief that they are necessarily made in fulfillment of the city's obligation to the National Guard organizations stationed therein, when in fact such expenditures are not always necessary or even desirable. Plans of armories in the City of New York are approved by the Armory Board of the City of New York without reference to the Commanding General of the National Guard, who is the officer charged with the training and efficiency of the organizations to be quartered therein. In consequence it may happen, and it has happened, that armories as constructed, are unfitted for the proper training of the organizations for which they were built. It is believed that the Chief of the Quartermaster Corps is the proper military officer to be a member of the Armory Board of the City of New York, to represent the views and policy of the Commanding General of the National Guard in respect to the requirements and relative needs of organizations stationed in the City of New York.

#### TRANSPORTATION

Owing to insufficient funds no additions were made during the past year to the number of military animals owned by the State, nor to the number of motor vehicles owned by the State. The State maintains but twelve horses for military purposes. There is imperative need and constant use for fifty military animals and a dozen mules in the training of infantry field officers, regimental mounted

detachments, machine gun companies, hospital corps detachments, regimental noncommissioned staff, as well as in connection with work of construction and repair at Peekskill.

A standard ton and a half military type auto truck should be available for service in each Brigade, with two additional trucks of the same type available for constant use by the Quartermaster Corps.

#### SMALL ARMS PRACTICE AND TRAINING

The Small Arms Firing during the past year has been held by every organization in the National Guard under Part V, U. S. Small Arms Firing Manual, 1913, for all those armed with a rifle except the Coast Artillery. The Coast Artillery have practiced with the rifle under Special Course "A" prescribed in chapter VII, paragraphs 120 and 121, U. S. Small Arms Firing Manual. Those armed with the pistol, practiced with that weapon under the dismounted course prescribed in chapter XI, paragraphs 167 to 175, both inclusive.

In addition to the record courses described above, it is proposed during the coming year to instruct a certain proportion of the troops of each organization in collective field firing. This practice will first be started by selecting a number of individuals from each company, assigning them to targets with an unlimited amount of ammunition at their disposal, and permitting each squad to fire at the targets of their opponents in a certain time interval, and at various ranges up to 600 yards. Hits on the silhouette figure will cause the withdrawal of the starget, and the squad which succeeds in disposing of their opponents in the shortest time to be mentioned in orders, this practice to be gradually increased if time permits until an entire company practices in the same manner and each group receive credit for the result accomplished. The details of this course of instruction will be in charge of the Chief Ordnance Officer, who will carry out the idea during the next target season.

I have the honor to submit the following report concerning the operations and condition of the Naval Militia, N. Y., for the year ending September 30, 1914:

1. In compliance with General Orders No. 12, c. s., A. G. O., tours of duty were performed as follows:

First Battalion, U. S. S. Wasp, July 11-July 22; July 25-August 2; August 8-August 16; August 22-August 30.

Second Battalion, U. S. S. Gloucester, July 11-July 22; July 25-August 2; August 8-August 16; August 22-August 30.

Third Battalion, U. S. S. Hawk, July 3-July 12; July 17-July 26; August 8-August 19; August 28-September 6.

Third Battalion, U. S. S. Sandoval, August 8-August 16.

Owing to the Mexican situation and to the doubtful appropriation of cruise moneys, cruises on reserve battleships could not be held, as no definite date could be established in sufficient time to allow the members of the Naval Militia, N. Y., to arrange their vacations accordingly. Although good results were obtained from cruising on the vessels assigned to this command, it is felt that greater efficiency and more interest could be derived from cruising on a reserve battleship acting singly.

There is enclosed herewith recommendation marked Appendix I,\* of the commanding officer, Naval Militia, N. Y., in regard to the cruise duty for 1915.

Reports of the cruise on the U. S. S. Wasp, U. S. S. Gloucester, U. S. S. Hawk and U. S. S. Sandoval are attached herewith, marked respectively, appendices II,\* III,\* IV \* and V.\*

2. On May 11, 1914, Headquarters, First and Second Battalions, performed escort duty as follows in connection with the funeral ceremonies of the sailors and marines killed in action at Vera Cruz, Mexico:

3. The usual small arms practice returns are attached, marked Appendix VI.\* The figure of merit prizes for the Naval Militia were won by the Second Division, First Battalion; Third Division, First Battalion and Fifth Division, Second Battalion.

The Inter-Battalion Secondary Battery Match was won by the First Battalion with a final merit of 17.756.

The Inter-Divisional Secondary Battery Match of the First Battalion was won by the Second Division with a final merit of 68.10, a remarkably high score.

The Inter-Divisional Secondary Battery Match of the Second Battalion was won by the Fifth Division with a final merit of 29.25.

The Inter-Divisional Secondary Battery Match of the Third Battalion was won by the Third Division with a final merit of 25.90.

The Brigade Match was won by the Second Battalion with a score of 1334.

6. The regular annual inspections of the organizations of the Naval Militia, N. Y., by the State and Navy Department were held as follows:

First Battalion, June 8, 11 and 12, 1914.

Second Battalion, June 9, 1914.

Third Battalion, June 22, 23, 24 and 25, 1914.

7. The annual reports of the commanding officers of the First, Second and Third Battalions are attached hereto, marked appendices VII,\* VIII,\* and IX.\*

8. A bill known as the Naval Militia Act, defining and establishing the relations between the federal government and the Naval Militia of the several States became a law on February 16, 1914. Tours of duty affoat were performed in accordance with the provisions of this act, and part of the expenses of same were paid by the federal government.

A National Board of Naval Militia Officers appointed by the Secretary of the Navy met with a Board of Naval Officers in Washington in October to consider plans and scope of examination for officers and men of the Naval Militia of the several States, and other topics. If the recommendation put forward by the National Naval Militia Board, verbally assented to by the Secretary's Board of Regular Officers, be approved and adopted by the Secretary of the Navy, it will entail some slight reorganization of the Naval Militia of this State and an increase in the number of divisions, but until the Secretary's approval is promulgated it is not deemed wise to take more than preliminary steps in this direction. It may be interesting for you to know that the requirements of the Naval Board for the enlisted men of the Naval Militia are almost identically the same as the requirements issued by these Headquarters under date of February 10, 1914.

9. Under the Naval Militia Bill, two inspector-instructors have been assigned to

the Naval Militia, N. Y. Two more have been asked for.

10. The Division of Naval Militia Affairs, Navy Department, has recommended the assignment of reserve battleships to this State as asked for by these Headquarters for the past two years.



On March 11, 1912, the 2d Regiment of Cavalry was organized by General Orders No. 11, A. G. O., by detaching Troops C, H, I, K, and M from the 1st Cavalry, which were thereupon designated Troops A, B, C, D and E, respectively. Troop F, located at West Brighton, was added April 23, 1912, and Troop G, located at Utica. on June 21, 1912.

On November 5, 1913, General Orders No. 27, A. G. O., transferred Troops B, D, H and I of 1st Cavalry to the 2d Cavalry as Troops B, D, H and I. Troops B and D, 2d Cavalry, were changed to Troops K and L by G. O. 28, A. G. O., December 10, 1913. Troop M was authorized to be organized by G. O. 27, A. G. O., November 5, 1913, and the designation of 2d Cavalry was changed to 1st Cavalry by the same order. Troop M was mustered in March 21, 1914. Troop D of this regiment performed duty at riots, Syracuse, May, 1913, and Troop I performed riot duty at Depew, N. Y., in April, 1914.

The regiment has received authority to place silver rings on the lances of its colors, engraved as follows:

On the National Color.— Spanish-American War, 1898; Porto Bico, 1898; Coamo, August 9, 1898; Asomanta, August 9 to 12, 1898.

On the State Color.— Croton Dam, April, 1900; Coeymans, May, 1906.

Squadron A was organized as Troop A on April 3, 1889, and performed duty at Buffalo during the switchmen's riot in August, 1892, and at Brooklyn during the motormen's riot in January, 1895. It was divided into two troops, to be known as Troops 1 and 2, and these organized into one squadron, designated Squadron A, February 9, 1895. November 27, 1896, Squadron A was divided into three troops, to be known as Troops 1, 2 and 3. Troop 4 was added May 2, 1907. The squadron was on duty at the riot at Croton Dam, April, 1900. One troop (Troop A), made up of members of the three troops of the squadron, was in United States service from May 20, 1898, to November 28, 1898.

This squadron was assigned to 1st Cavalry December 28, 1911 (G. O. 60) and the numerical designation of troops was changed January 18, 1912 (G. O. 2) to letter designation, viz.: Troops A, E, F and G.

Troops A, E, F and G, 1st Cavalry, were detached and organized as a separate squadron by General Orders No. 27, A. G. O., November 5, 1913. On December 10, 1913, the designation of Troops E, F and G, 1st Squadron, Cavalry, was changed to Troops B, C and D, respectively, by General Orders No. 28, A. G. O.

The designation of Tst Squadron, Cavalry, was changed to Squadron A, Cavalry, by General Orders 3, A. G. O., March 5, 1914. The band attached to Squadron A was mustered out December 7, 1914.

The squadron has received authority to place silver rings on the lances of its colors, engraved as follows:

On August 30, 1911, the 2d Battalion, Field Artillery, composed of Batteries D, E and F, was organized by General Orders No. 31, A. G. O., from the 1st Battery, previously detached from the 1st Battalion, Field Artillery.

The late 1st Battery was organized April 3, 1867, as Battery K, 1st Regiment of Artillery. The regiment was disbanded December 10, 1869, but the battery retained

as Separate Battery K, which designation was changed December 17, 1809, but the battery retained as Separate Battery K, which designation was changed December 17, 1881, to 1st Battery. The battery was on duty during the railroad riots in July, 1877, and at Brooklyn during the motormen's strike in January, 1895. The armament of the battery consists of four 3-inch field guns, model 1902.

The First Regiment, Field Artillery, was organized from the 2d Battalion, composed of Batteries D. E and F and Separate Battery A, May 28, 1912, by G. O. 33, A. G. O. October 26, 1912, Battery A was detached and carried as a separate battery by G. O. 64, A. G. O. On the same date the headquarters 1st Battalion and Batteries A, B and C of the late 2d Field Artillery were transferred to the 1st Field Artillery to be known as the 1st Battalion and Batteries A, B and C of that regiment. Battery C was detached and designated a separate battery, November 26, 1912, by G. O. 70, A. G. O. The new Battery A was detached and designated Separate Battery B by G. O 74, December 16, 1912. General Orders No. 74, authorized the organization of two additional batteries from Battery B, 1st Field Artillery,

to replace Batteries A and C, detached.
On May 19, 1913, Battery E, 2d Field Artillery, was detached and transferred to
1st Field Artillery as Battery A, 1st Field Artillery, by G. O. 16, A. G. O. A new battery, known and designated as Battery B, was organized May 19, 1913.

General Orders No. 16, A. G. O., May 19, 1913, transferred to 1st Field Artillery Battery E, and authorized the organization of Batteries E and F.

O., October 26, 1912; detached from that regiment and designated Separate Battery B, Field Artillery, by G. O. 74, A. G. O., December 16, 1912. Attached to the 2d Battalion as Battery B, December 16, 1912.

The organization rendered service to the State and City of New York at the abolition riot, July 14, 1834; stevedore riot, February 24, 1836; Croton water riots, April 22 and 23, 1840; great fire, July 19, 1845; Astor Place riot, May 10, 1849; quarantine riots, September, 1858; draft riots, July, 1863; Orange riots, July 12, 1871; railroad riots, July, 1877; motorman's riot, Brooklyn, January, 1895. It was in the United States service for three months, from April 18 to July 20, 1861, and for thirty days, from June 29 to July 23, 1863; and was in action near Annapolis, Md., and Fairfax Court House in 1861; at Carlisle, Shippensburg, Scotland, Chambersburg, Oyster Point and Kingston in 1863. ## EIGHTH COAST DEFENSE COMMAND

(Ten Companies)

Armory, 75 East Ninety-fourth Street, New York City

On the 4th of April, 1786,\* the 1st Brigade, 1st Division, was formed in New York city into a brigade of artillery, and was to consist of the 1st and 2d Regiments and a battalion. In April, 1807, the 3d Regiment of New York Artillery was organized by including this battalion and other troops. July 27, 1847, the designation of the regiment was changed to the 8th Regiment. In December, 1893, it was reduced to a battalion of four companies. It was reorganized, as a regiment, February 14, 1896. New companies were organized for the battalion as follows: On July 8, 1895, Co. A: on October 30, 1895, Co. E: on January 27, 1896, Co. H, and on February 14, 1896, Co. G, when it was reorganized as a regiment. April 28, 1898, it was authorized to be organized as a twelve-company regiment to enter the service of the United States. It was in the service of the United States from September 15 to December 15, 1812; from April 23 to August 2, 1861; from May 29 to September 9, 1862; and from June 17 to July 23, 1863. It was mustered into the United States service as the 8th Regiment Infantry, New York Volunteers, May 14, 17 and 19, 1898, and mustered out of such service November 3, 1898. Companies L and M were disbanded December 22, 1898. December 10, 1908, Companies A, C and E were disbanded and the regiment reduced to a battalion of seven companies and designated the 8th Battalion. January 18, 1908, Co. A was reorganized and on January 21, 1908, the battalion was again constituted a regiment under its original designation. January 23, 1908, a coast artillery corps was organized, the 8th Regiment being constituted coast artillery and the companies respectively designated as the 25th, 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, 30th, 31st and 32d Companies, Coast Artillery Corps, constituting the 8th Artillery District. November 10, 1908, an additional company was directed to be organized and attached to the 8th Artillery Corps. The 34th Company was mustered in May 29, 1914, and attached to the 8th Coast Defense Command.

By virtue of an order from Governor John Jay to Brigadier-General James Miles Hughes, New York, N. Y., dated Albany, June 24, 1799, the preliminary organization of the 6th Regiment, New York State Infantry, of which this regiment is the successor, took place, by transfer of four companies from the 1st Regiment, three companies from 2d Regiment, five companies from 3d Regiment, two companies from 4th Regiment, all organized March 4, 1786; three companies from the 5th Regiment, organized May 11, 1789, and the Independent Rifle Co., organized August 28, 1789.

The 6th Regiment, New York State Infantry, was permanently organized with 16 companies, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Commandant Jacob Morton, on March 8, 1800. This regiment was changed by General Orders, Adjutant General's Office, Albany, to the 2d New York State Artillery, March 27, 1805, and to the 9th Regiment, New York State Artillery, June 13, 1812; it was reduced to a battalion, December 13, 1813, and became a regiment again, by orders of Council of Appointment, June 6, 1816. By orders from Adjutant General's Office, the state was divided in division, brigade, regiment and company districts, May 13, 1847. Three of the regiment's companies were transferred to the 8th Regiment, New York State Militia, May 27, 1850; some of the officers and men elsewhere, but Colonel B. Clinton Ferris retained command of the 9th Regiment, as reorganized May 29, 1850. It was again partly disbanded May 31, 1858, but the district of the 9th Regiment, New York State Militia, was kept intact, under Colonel Lucius Pitkin, and once more the regiment made — anew, June 25, 1859.\*

Under this title it entered the service of the United States, May 27, 1861, and was mustered in at Washington, D. C., June 8, 1861. A further change was made in numerical designation; it became known as the 83d New York Volunteers, December 7, 1861, by which title it was mustered out of the United States service, June 23, 1864.

Under orders from the authorities of the State, the 9th District was retained for the regiment during its three years of war service, and formally retook position in the National Guard of the State as the 9th Regiment, National Guard, State of New York, June 13, 1864, which was continued until 1898, when the title was changed to the 9th Regiment Infantry, New York Volunteers, May 2, 1898. It was redesignated the 9th Regiment, National Guard, New York, January 12, 1899.

April 28, 1898, it was authorized to be organized into a twelve-company regiment, preparatory to entry into the United States service, into which it was mustered as the Ninth Regiment Infantry, New York Volunteers, May 17, 19 and 20, 1898, and mustered out November 15, 1898. Companies L and M were disbanded December 22, 1898.

To conform to the Military Law (1908), General Orders No. 7, Adjutant General's Office, dated Albany, January 23, 1908, reorganized the 9th Regiment Infantry, as Coast Artillery and made it a part of the Coast Artillery Corps, National Guard, New York, as the 9th Artillery District, and the designation of companies from letters A to K, to be the 13th to 22d Companies, Coast Artillery Corps, respectively. The regiment was authorized to place silver rings on the lances of its colors, engraved as follows:

## THIRTEENTH COAST DEFENSE COMMAND

This regiment was organized July 5, 1847; there were changes in the organization a few years later, again in April, 1859, and in 1860. It was disbanded May 7, 1898, except one battalion of four companies which had volunteered to enter the United States service, and authority was given to reorganize it May 15, 1898, November 28, 1898, such portion of the regiment as had been organized was disbanded, and authority was given to re-establish the regiment, the battalion which was in the United States service forming the nucleus of the new organization. Companies L and M were organized March 11, 1899; February 8, 1900, it was constituted a regiment of heavy artillery and designated 13th Regiment of Heavy Artillery of the National Guard, New York. This designation was changed to Coast Artillery, September 1, 1906. The regiment was in the service of the United States for three months from April 23, 1861, and was mustered out August 6, 1861; again from May 28 to September 12, 1862, and for the third time from June 20 to July 20, 1863, for thirty days; it was in the State service during the draft riots in July and August, 1863; the Orange riots, July 12, 1871; the railroad riots, July, 1877; the switchmen's strike at Buffalo, August, 1892; the quarantine disturbances at Fire Island, September, 1892, and the motormen's strike at Brooklyn, January, 1895. The battalion which volunteered to enter the United States service as part of the 22d battalion which volunteered to enter the United States service as part of the 22d Regiment, New York Volunteer Infantry, in the war with Spain, was mustered into such service May 24, 1898, and was mustered out November 23, 1898. In the United States service as Co. A, 2d Regiment, N. Y. Infantry, from May 17, 1898, to October 25, 1898.

Companies A, B, C and D were organized during the excitement created by the firing of British at American vessels off Sandy Hook in April, 1806, as the first. second, third and fourth companies, and June 25th they were officially recognized by the State as part of the uniformed militia of the State, and attached to the battalion of artillery commanded by Major Andrew Sitcher. April 5, 1807, the battalion, in the organization of the 3d Regt. of New York Artillery, became its 2d Battalion. When war with England became imminent in 1807, these four companies, with other volunteers, were temporarily organized as a regiment, commanded by Colonel Peter Curtenius, and remained thus detached until April 20, 1809. In 1812 the 3d became the 11th Regiment of Artillery, the commander of National Guards" (its distinctive name until, in 1862, the Legislature appropriated it for the uniformed militia), and in December, 1824, the fifth company was organized and Captain Stevens' company of the 11th New York Artillery transferred to it as the sixth company. In January, 1825, the battalion was transferred to the 2d New York Artillery, October 1, 1825, the battalion was detached and organized as a separate and independent battalion, and during the month the seventh company was organized. May 4, 1826, the organization of the eighth company was completed, and May 6th the battalion was organized into a regiment, the 27th Artillery. April 17, 1838, a troop of cavalry was admitted to the regiment which, in 1861, became the ninth company. In 1843 the State furnished the regiment with arms, it having heretofore provided them itself; July 27th the designation of the regiment was changed to 7th Regiment. In April, 1849, an engineer corps was organized which, in 1861, became the tenth company. May 11, 1009, the regiment received authority to organize a new company to be known as Company L. December 2, 1910, a new company, to be designated Company M, was authorized to be mustered in. The regiment was fr

The 10th Regiment was organized on December 29, 1860, by General Orders No.
50, A. G. O., of that year, Captain Ira W. Ainsworth's company of the 25th
Regiment being detached from that regiment and assigned to the 10th as the
nucleus of the new regiment; Captain Ainsworth subsequently becoming the first
colonel of the 10th Regiment with rank from May 27, 1862.

On May 17, 1881, the 10th Regiment, with the exception of Companies A, B, D
and K, was disbanded and these companies retained in the service as the 10th
Separate Battalion. On October 1, 1884, the designation of Company K was
changed to C.

April 28, 1898, the 1st Regiment was organized preparatory to entry in United
States service and Companies A, B, C and D of the 10th Battalion became Companies A, B, C and D of the 1st Regiment. On the disbandment of this regiment
on March 15, 1899, these companies resumed their former designations in the 10th
Battalion.

On the same date the 10th Regiment, composed of separate companies, was reorganized and its head-quarters established at Albany, and the 26th, 35th, 38th and 45th Separate Companies attached to it as Companies A, B, C and D, respectively. In addition the 16th, 23d, 4th, 11th, 17th, 15th and 14th Separate Companies were assigned to the regiment and designated respectively as E, F, G, H, I, K and M. May 28, 1907, the 49th Separate Company was mustered in at White Plains, and assigned to the 10th Regiment as Company as Mustered in at White Plains, and assigned as Company A, 10th Infantry (26th Separate Company).

The 10th Regiment was mustered into the service of the United States as the 177th New York Volunteers, November 21, 1862, and was mustered out September 10, 1863. Companies A, B, C, D, K and M, 1st New York Infantry, May 20, 1898, and were mustered out February 20, 1899. The 10th Regiment was on duty in aid of the civil authorities in the Helderbergs in 1865, during the anti-rent war; during the railroad riots at West Albany in 1877; the 10th Battalion at Buffalo during the riots in 1892; at Albany during street railway riot in 1901; and a portion of the 10th Regiment at Coeymans during a riot in May, 1906. The regiment was authorized to organize a detachment of mounted scouts by Special Orders No. 66, A. G. O., March 15, 1912.

The regiment has received authority to place silver rings on the lances of its colors, engraved as follows:

#### COMPANY A, TENTH INFANTRY (Twenty-sixth Separate Company.)

(Third Brigade.)

#### State Armory, 195 Washington Avenue, Albany

Organized July 23, 1860, as an independent company, the "Albany Zouave Cadets;" joined the National Guard, and was attached to the 10th Regiment as Co. A. December 29, 1860; became Co. A. 10th Battalion, February 17, 1881; established as a separate company, designated the 26th Separate Company, and attached to the 10th Regiment as Co. A. May 1, 1905. On December 1, 1910, this company was mustered out, and a new company mustered in the same date, designated the 26th Separate Company, and attached to the 10th Infantry as Company.

The company was mustered into the United States service as Co A, 177th N. Y. Volunteers, November 21, 1862, for nine months, and was mustered out September 10, 1863; during the War of the Rebellion the company furnished for the armies of the United States nearly 75 commissioned officers. Was again mustered into the United States service as Co. A, 1st N. Y. Infantry, May 20, 1898, and mustered out February 20, 1899.

#### COMPANY B, TENTH INFANTRY (Thirty-fifth Separate Company.)

(Third Brigade.)

State Armory, 195 Washington Avenue, Albany

Organized July 4, 1854, as an independent company, the "Washington Continentals;" joined the militia as a company of light artillery, August 28, 1856, and was attached to the 76th Regiment; was assigned to the 29th Regiment, December 26, 1860; to the 10th Regiment, as Company B, December 29, 1860; became Company, B, 10th Battalion, February 17, 1881; was constituted a separate company, designated the 35th Separate Company, and assigned to the 10th Regiment as Company B, May 1, 1905.

The company was mustered into the service of the United States as Co. B, 177th N. Y. Vols., November 21, 1862, and mustered out September 10, 1863; was again mustered into the United States service May 20, 1898, as Co. B, 1st N. Y. Infantry, and was mustered out February 20, 1899. During the War of the Rebellion the company furnished sixty officers to the volunteer armies of the United States.

COMPANY C, TENTH INFANTRY (Thirty-eighth Separate Company.) (Third Brigade.)

State Armory, 195 Washington Avenue, Albany

Organized April 5, 1877, as Co. K. 10th Regiment. Assigned to 10th Battalion, February 17, 1881; designation changed to C, October 1, 1884; constituted a separate company, designated the 38th Separate Company, and assigned to the 10th Regiment as Co. C, May 1, 1905.

The company was mustered into the United States service as Co. C, 1st N. Y. Infantry, May 20, 1898, and was mustered out February 20, 1899.

COMPANY D, TENTH INFANTRY (Forty-fifth Separate Company.)

(Third Brigade.)

State Armory, 195 Washington Avenue, Albany

Organized July 2, 1861, as Company D, 10th Regiment. Became Company D, 10th Battalion, February 17, 1881; constituted a separate company, designated the 45th Separate Company, and attached to the 10th Regiment as Company D, May 1, 1905.

The company was mustered into the United States service as Company D, 177th N. Y. Vols., November 21, 1862; and was mustered out September 10, 1863; was again mustered into the United States service as Company D, 1st N. Y. Infantry, May 20, 1898, and was mustered out February 20, 1899.

COMPANY E, TENTH INFANTRY (Sixteenth Separate Company.) (Third Brigade.)

State Armory, 78 Water Street, Catskill

Organized October 8, 1879. Attached to 1st Regiment as Co. C, March 15, 1899; to 10th Regiment, as Co. E, May 1, 1905. June 23, 1882, it was placed on duty to assist the civil authorities in suppressing a riot among Italian laborers on the line of the New York, West Shore and Buffalo Railroad at Corsackie, and at Buffalo in August, 1892, during riots at that place.

COMPANY F, TENTH INFANTRY (Twenty-third Separate Company.)

(Third Brigade.)

Armory, Fifth and State Streets, Hudson

Organized May 24, 1878. Attached to 1st Regiment, as Co. D, March 15, 1899; to 10th Regiment as Co. F, May 1, 1905. On duty at Buffalo riots in August, 1892, and near Stockport to enforce quarantine against smallpox in June, 1901.

COMPANY G, TENTH INFANTRY (Fourth Separate Company.) (Third Brigade.)

Armory, Waverly Street, Yonkers

Organized July 18, 1870, as Co. H, 3d Regiment, which regiment was disbanded and the companies formed into another organization designated the 27th Regiment, November 22, 1873, Co. H retaining its letter designation. It was transferred to the 16th Battalion, May 12, 1874, as Co. D, and on the disbandment of the battalion, December 17, 1881, was retained in service as the 4th Separate Company; attached to 1st Regiment, as Co. A, March 15, 1899; to 10th Regiment, as Co. G, May 1, 1905. It served during the riots at Buffalo in August, 1892, and riots at Croton Dam, April, 1900.

#### COMPANY H, TENTH INFANTRY (Eleventh Separate Company.) (Third Brigade.)

State Armory, North Fifth Avenue and North Street, Mt. Vernon

Organized April 12, 1876, as 1st Separate Troop of Cavalry, 7th Brigade, 5th Division. Designation changed December 8, 1877, to Separate Troop E, and October 5, 1881, reorganized as the 11th Separate Co. Attached to 1st Regiment as Co. B, March 15, 1899; to 10th Regiment, as Co. H, May 1, 1905. On duty during the riots at Croton Dam, April, 1900.

COMPANY I, TENTH INFANTRY (Seventeenth Separate Company.)

(Third Brigade.)

State Armory, 147 Broadway, Flushing

Organized as the 1st Separate Company, 2d Division, in July, 1876; its designation changed to 17th Separate Company, December 8, 1877. Transferred to the 3d Brigade and assigned to the 10th Regiment as Company I, May 1, 1905.

COMPANY K, TENTH INFANTRY (Fifteenth Separate Company.)

(Third Brigade.)

State Armory, Market and Church Streets, Poughkeepsie

Organized immediately after the bombardment of Fort Sumter, S. C., as the Poughkeepsie Drill Guards; May 14, 1861, the name was changed to "Elisworth Grays," and on October 27, 1862, the company joined the militia and became Co. A of the 21st Regiment and on disbandment of that regiment its designation was changed, December 17, 1881, to 15th Separate Company. Attached to 1st Regiment, as Co. K, March 15, 1899; to 10th Regiment, as Co. K, May 1, 1905. In the service of the United States from June 27 to August 6, 1863, and as Co. K, 1st Regiment, N. Y. Infantry, from May 20, 1898, to February 26, 1899. In the service of the State at Buffalo during the riots in August, 1892.

COMPANY L, TENTH INFANTRY (Forty-ninth Separate Company.)

(Third Brigade.)

Armory, South Broadway and Mitchell Place, White Plains Mustered in May 28, 1907.

#### COMPANY M, TENTH INFANTRY

(Fourteenth Separate Company.) (Third Brigade.)

State Armory, Broadway and Hoffman Street, Kingston

Organized September 21, 1874, as Co. H, 20th Battalion. Designation changed to Co. B, November 13, 1874, and to 14th Separate Company, December 17, 1881. Attached to 1st Regiment as Co. M, March 15, 1899; and to the 10th Regiment, as Co. M, May 1, 1905. May 21 and 22, 1875, the company was on duty suppressing a riot at Rosendale; April 20 and 21, 1876, on similar duty at Rondout; in July and August, 1877, again at Rondout, and March 4, 1879, at Kingston. In United States service as Co. M, 1st Regiment, N. Y. Infantry, from May 20, 1898, to February 26, 1899.

The regiment was organized in 1848. Cos. K and I were disbanded, the latter in \$\to\$. A new Co. I was organized in 1879, and Co. E was consolidated with Co. H the same year. In 1880 Co. B was consolidated with Co. A, and Troop D, Cavalry, Eighth Division, was reorganized as a company of infantry and attached to the regiment as Co. E. In 1881 Cos. D and E were disbanded. A new Co. B and a new Co. D were organized in 1885. It entered the service of the United States June 19, 1863, and was mustered out July 30, 1863. In October, 1864, practically the whole of this regiment, as part of the 187th Regiment, N. Y. Volunteers, was again mustered into the United States service for one year and mustered out July 1, 1865. April 28, 1898, the regiment received authority to organize as a twelve-company regiment, preparatory to entry into the United States service, the 13th Separate Company becoming for the time one of the additional companies. It was mustered into the United States service May 17, 1898, as the 65th Regiment, N. Y. Infantry, and mustered dut of such service November 19, 1898. Cos. K, L and M were ordered disbanded May 31, 1899. June 10, 1907, the 13th Separate Company was attached to the 65th Regiment as Co. E. July 9, 1909, the regiment received authority to organize a new company to be known as Company K. Companies L and M were authorized to be organized December 2, 1910. This Co. E of this regiment, the 13th Separate Company, is quartered in the State Armory, South Main street, Jamestown. It was organized August 22, 1875, as the 1st Separate Company, 31st Brigade. Designation changed to 4th Separate Company, December 5, 1877, and to the 13th Separate Company, September 4, 1882. Became Co. G, 3d Regiment, March 30, 1907, and Co. E, 65th Regiment, June 10, 1907. It was in the State service in Buffalo, April, 1913. In United States service, as Co E, 65th Regiment, N. Y. Infantry, from May 17, 1898, to November 17, 1898.

Armory, 68 Lexington Avenue, New York City

On October 12, 1851, a number of independent, uniformed military companies in the City of New York were organized into a regiment under the command of Colonel Charles S. Roe, and designated in General Orders No. 489, A. G. O., dated November 1, 1851, as the 69th Regiment, New York State Militia. In 1858 the regiment was reorganized as a regiment of artillery doing duty as infantry.

The regiment was mustered into the United States service on May 9, 1861, at Washington. D. C., for three months, during which service it participated in the battles of Blackburn's Ford and Bull Run, and was mustered out on August 3, 1861. Immediately after its muster out and return practically the whole regiment, including the officers and enlisted men who had served in the three months' campaign, volunteered for three years, or the war, and the offer was accepted by the War Department in a letter to the commanding officer of the regiment under date of August 30, 1861, the regiment being mustered into the United States service on November 8, 1861, as the 69th Regiment, New York Volunteers. Its appellation of "militia" was changed to "volunteers" for the reason that the term for which the regiment volunteered exceeded the period of time established by the State of New York for which its militia regiments, to be recognized as such, could serve without the State. But its numerical designation, however, was, by authority of the State, retained in order to preserve and maintain the regiment sidentity with the militia organization. During this service the regiment was attached to the Army of the Potomac, forming part of the Irish Brigade (2d Brigade—1st Division—2d Corps). It was recruited in 1863 and again in 1864 and finally mustered out of the United States service at New York on June 30, 1865.

The militia organization, having in the fall of 1861 been again reorganized and recruited, re-entered the United States service for three months on May 26, 1862, and mustered out of thee United States service under that designation was, to avoi

Potomac.

brigade of New York regiments known as the "Irish Legion," officially designated as the 4th Brigade (afterwards 2d Brigade), 2d Division, 2d Corps, Army of the Potomac.

The militia regiment having been again reorganized, was mustered into the service of the United States on June 25, 1863, for thirty days, and was mustered out on July 25, 1863. Again for the fourth time, the militia organization was, on July 6, 1864.

The regiment has rendered service to the State during the quarantine riots in 1858: the draft riots, 1863, and the quarantine disturbances in 1892. It was reduced December 6, 1893, to a battalion of five companies, A, C, D, I and K. The battalion was on duty at Brooklyn during the riots in January, 1895. New companies were organized for the battalion as follows: Ce. B, June 5, 1894; Co. G, June 10, 1895; Co. E, June 11, 1895, and Co. F, September 7, 1900. The battalion was reconstituted a regiment September 4, 1895. April 28, 1898, the regiment received authority to organize as a twelve-company regiment, preparatory to its entry into the United States service, into which service it was mustered May 19, 1898, as the 69th Regiment, N. Y. Infantry, and mustered out January 31, 1899. The regiment formally re-entered the service of the State on March 15, 1899. Companies L and M were disbanded April 12, 1899; Co. F, February 8, 1900. New Co. B was organized January 4, 1906. New Co. L was mustered in July 14, 1911. Co. M was mustered in December 29, 1913.

The regiment has received authority to place silver rings on the lances of its colors, engraved as follows:

September 21, 1870, the 37th Regiment was consolidated with the 71st Regiment, Cos. E. D. H. A. G. K. and B of the 37th Regiment being consolidated with Cos. A. C. D. E. F. G. and K. of the 71st Regiment, respectively. In 1861 it entered the United States service for three months, from April 19 to July 30; in 1862 it re-entered the same service, May 29, for three months, at the expiration of which it volunteered to remain, and remained until September 1; in 1863 it was mustered into the United States service for thirty days, and served from June 17 to July 22. Y. Infantry, and mustered out November 15, 1898. December 8, 1898, it was reorganized as a National Guard regiment, composed of ten companies, Cos. L and M being disbanded. Co. M was mustered in January 8, 1907. On November 10, 1908, an additional company was directed to be organized and attached to the 71st Infantry, as Co. L. The regiment was authorized to organize a detachment of mounted scouts by Special Orders No. 66, March 15, 1912.

In June 1854, the organization of the regiment commenced, Co. D of the 65th Regiment forming the nucleus. Co. B was organized in August, and Companies C and E in September, 1854; Co. A was formed in May, 1855; and these five companies constituted the regiment until February, 1858, when two companies, one of cavalry (R) and one of rifles (L) were organized and attached to it. In 1860 Companies F, G, H and I were organized, and the designation of Co. L was in 1865 changed to Co. K. Co. R was disbanded in 1865, Co. H in 1868; Co. I was consolidated with Co. B in 1870, and in 1882 Companies E and K were disbanded. Co. E was reorganized in 1886, and Co. H in 1891. New Co. I was organized January 4, 1906. In May, 1861, nearly the whole of Companies B. C. D and F joined and formed four companies of the 21st N. Y. Volunteers. June 19, 1863, the regiment was mustered into the service of the United States for thirty days, and mustered out August 3, 1863; it was remustered into the United States service November 16, 1863. for thirty days, and mustered out December 16, 1863. During the War of the Rebellion the regiment furnished to the country nearly 300 officers and over 1.000 men, who received their military instruction while members of it. Companies L and M were authorized by G. O. 64, A. G. O. November 10, 1908, to be mustered in. The regiment was authorized to organize a detachment of mounted scouts by Special Orders No. 89, April 11, 1912. The regiment performed duty at the street car riots, Buffalo, April, 1913, and riots at Depew, March, 1914.

Co. K of this regiment, the 25th Separate Company, is quartered in the State Armory at Tonawanda. It was organized May 29, 1891. Was assigned to 1st Battalion as Co. G, December 22, 1898; and to the 74th Regiment, as Co. K, March 30, 1907. On duty at Tonawanda to suppress a riot in June, 1892; at Buffalo during the riots in August, 1892, at Tonawanda again in June, 1893, during a riot at that place and at the street car riots, Buffalo, April, 1913. In United States service,

The regiment has received authority to place silver rings on the lances of its colors, engraved as follows:

On the National Color.—Gettysburg campaign, 1863; Buffalo, November and December, 1863.

On the State Color.— Draft riots, 1863; negro riot, 1864; Fenian invasion of Canada, 1866; Hornellsville, 1877; Buffalo, 1892.

This battalion was organized on June 23, 1891, as the First Battalion, Naval Reserve Artillery, which designation was changed on June 25, 1892, to First Naval Battalion. This designation was again changed on Oct. 16, 1900, to First Battalion, Naval Militia. The Seventh Division, First Battalion, Naval Militia, was mustered in on January 23, 1912, at New Rochelle. The Eighth Division was mustered in May 29, 1912, with station at Ossining. A Division known as 9th Division was mustered into the service August 18, 1914.

The Battalion performed duty for the State during the quarantine troubles in September, 1892, and during the Spanish-American War on coast signal service, guarding mine fields at Willet's Point and on patrol duty for the United States during the Spanish-American War in the U. S. Navy aboard the "Yankee," "Nahant," and other vessels, and in the U. S. Auxiliary Naval Force, aboard various vessels.

The battalion has received authority to place silver rings on the lance of its National Color engraved as follows: "Spanish-American War, 1898," "Santiago de Cuba, June 6, 1898," "Cienfuegos, June 13, 1898," "Ciensilda Harbor, June 20, 1898," "Guantanamo, June 7, 1898." September 29, 1891, the Second Separate Battery, Naval Reserve Artillery, was mustered in the service of the State in the City of Rochester. Its designation was changed on June 25, 1892, to Second Separate Naval Division, which designation was again changed on October 16, 1900, to Second Separate Division, Naval Militia.

This Division performed duty for the United States during the Spanish-American War in the U.S. Navy, and in the U.S. Auxilliary Naval Force aboard the "Franklin" and other vessels. July 27, 1907, the Third Separate Division, Naval Militia, was mustered in the service of the State in the City of Buffalo.

January 25, 1910, a separate signal division was organized in the city of Rochester, and on February 14, 1910, the Third Battalion, Naval Militia, was formed of the Second and Third Separate Divisions, and the separate Signal Division, above mentioned, with headquarters in the State armory in the city of Rochester. On June 1, 1912, the First Division was mustered in at Dunkirk, N.Y. The Fourth Division was mustered in at Watertown, N.Y., June 18, 1913. A, separate engineer division, designated the Seventh Division, was mustered in May 12, 1914.

The strength of the Naval Militia in time of peace is not to exceed 2,000 men. but in time of war, invasion, insurrection, or imminent danger thereof, the Governor has power to increase it beyond 2,000 enlisted men and organize it as the exigencies of the service may require

Note.— The staff of the Governor consists of: The Adjutant General, of the grade of Brigadier General; one Military Secretary, of the rank of Major or Lieutenant Commander, and sixteen Aides-de-Camp, detailed from the commissioned officers of the National Guard and the Naval Militia in active service and who shall not thereby receive higher rank. The officers thus detailed shall not be relieved from duty with their respective organizations except when actually on duty with the Governor. The Military Law provides that The Adjutant General of the State shall have such assistants as may be necessary, and any officer, who is such an assistant, may be rendered supernumerary by the Governor at any time.
