THE ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE

Albany, December 31, 1915

To the Governor:

SIR: The following report covering the operations of the military establishment during the past year is submitted in compliance with the provisions of section 16 of the Military Law.

GENERAL REMARKS

The National Guard of the State consists of an adjutant general's department; an inspector general's department; a judge advocate general's department; an ordnance department; a quartermaster corps; a corps of engineers; a coast artillery corps consisting of 32 companies which for the purposes of administration, drill and instruction are assigned to 3 coast defense commands; a medical department; a signal corps; and 13 regiments of infantry organized into 4 brigades, 1 regiment, 1 squadron and 1 machine gun troop of cavalry; 2 regiments of field artillery; 1 pioneer battalion and 1 ponton battalion of engineers which for the purpose of administration are united under the command of the senior officer, corps or engineers, and designated as the 22d Corps of Engineers, 1 battalion of signal corps troops to which is attached a telegraph and telephone detachment and an aviation detachment, 4 ambulance companies, and 2 field hospitals, the whole forming a division under the command of the major general.

The Naval Militia of the State consists of the Commodore Commanding, necessary staff officers, and 3 battalions, the 1st Battalion consisting of 6 line divisions, 2 engineer divisions, 1 signal division, and 1 aviation section; the 2d Battalion of 4 line divisions and 2 engineer divisions; and the 3d Battalion of 4 line divisions, 2 engineer divisions and 1 signal division.

According to the latest returns, the aggregate strength of the National Guard is 17,019 officers and men and the aggregate strength of the Naval Militia is 1,435 officers and enlisted men. Tables submitted with this report show that there were 10,655 gains and 11,113 losses in the National Guard during the year and 691 gains and 732 losses in the Naval Militia, making a net loss of 458 in the National Guard and a net loss of 41 in the Naval Militia. The great increase in gains and losses over those of previous years is due to a recent amendment to section 103 of the Military Law which requires that enlisted men be discharged at the expiration of their term of enlistment. Previous to this amendment an enlisted man could be retained in the service until such time as he desired his discharge when he was required to give fifteen days' notice in writing of application therefor. This resulted, in many organizations, in a large percentage of the enlisted personnel being entitled to their discharge upon giving the required notice and would have resulted, if all of the enlisted men entitled thereto had desired to take advantage of this right of discharge at one time, in the organizations being reduced to mere The enforcement of this section as amended has resulted in the discharge of a large number of men during the present year, a majority of whom have re-enlisted.

The introduction of Federal legislation requiring a substantial increase in the strength of the National Guard to be maintained by the State in order to profit by allotment of United States funds suggests the wisdom of making provision by State legislation to maintain the State forces at any standard prescribed by the Federal Government.

This is invoking no new principle but would necessitate a change of policy providing for the application of a draft within a prescribed city or town to maintain the organizations located therein at required strength. A bill has been prepared providing for compulsory service to the extent that may be found necessary to maintain organizations at strength prescribed by the laws of the United States in the event of voluntary enlistments failing to accomplish that object.

ORGANIZATION

National Guard.— The organization of the several arms, corps, and departments conforms in a large measure to the Tables of Organization prescribed for the Organized Militia by the War Department. Effort is being made in all cases where differences exist, to bring the organization in conformity to the requirements of the War Department.

The organization of the division at present is complete with the exception of 2 field hospitals and the provisional companies or troops (headquarters, machine gun, and supply) required for regiments of infantry and cavalry. One machine gun company and 1 machine gun troop have been organized while the Tables of Organization prescribe 1 machine gun company for each regiment of infantry and 1 machine gun troop for each regiment of cavalry—a total of 14 for the National Guard of this State.

The formation of these provisional units is now receiving attention and it is hoped that they will be organized in all of the regiments of infantry and cavalry during the coming year. The formation of machine gun units is of especial importance as the present European War has shown that such units are essential to proper fire effect in combat.

Naval Militia .-- The organization of the Naval Militia conforms practically to

that prescribed by the Navy Department.

New Organizations.— The following new organizations have been authorized during the year:

NATIONAL GUARD

4th Ambulance Company with station at Syracuse, October 27. Aero Company, Signal Corps, with station at New York, November 22d. 1st Armored Motor Battery, with station at New York, December 1st.

NAVAL MILITIA

7th Division, 2d Battalion, with station at Brooklyn, March 26th. Aviation Section, 1st Battalion, with station at New York, October 28.

The Aviation Detachment, Signal Corps which was organized under authority from this office dated August 24th and attached to the 1st Battalion Signal Corps will form the nucleus of the Aero Company.

Aeroplanes have been presented to the National Guard and Naval Militia and the members of the Aviation Detachment, Signal Corps and Aviation Section Naval Militia are now receiving instruction, 56 flights having been made by the members of the Aviation Detachment during the month of November.

Disbanded.—To meet the requirements of the War Department, the Medical Reserve with station at Syracuse was disbanded on October 27, 1915, the enlisted men serving with that organization being transferred to the newly organized 4th Ambulance Company.

Depot Units.— Section 120 of the Military Law provides for the organization of depot units to take the place of organizations called into the actual service of the United States. This section as amended by chapter 287 of the Laws of 1915 authorizes the formation of depot units in advance of the entry of an organization into the actual service of the United States.

The importance of organizing these units in advance of the entry of an organization into the actual service of the United States cannot be over estimated. They would at once take the place in the active militia of the organization called out and the members would be available to make up deficiencies in strength in the organization for which the unit was formed. They would form a recruiting base of great efficiency for organizations in the service of the United States.

The organization of a depot troop for Squadron A, Cavalry, has been authorized and several other depot units are in process of formation. There are a great many former members of the active militia who for business reasons cannot give the time to military service required of the active militia but who are available for duty with depot units and who would be willing to perform active service in time of need, and it is proposed to utilize the services of these trained men in such units as far as possible.

Reserve list for Officers.—Section 80 of the Military Law as amended by chapter 460 of the Laws of 1915 provides for a reserve list for commissioned officers who

have served in the active militia or in the army, navy, or marine corps of the United States. The interest taken in military affairs by former members of the active militia is evidenced by the great number of applications to be placed on this list which have been received. Bills will be introduced at the next session of the Legislature to amend the law so that effective use may be made of officers on this list.

Reserve List for Non-Commissioned Officers and Enlisted Men.—Section 80-a of the Military Law (chapter 330 of the Laws of 1915) provides for a reserve list for non-commissioned officers and enlisted men of the active militia. Regulations are being prepared with a view to making this list an effective reserve for the active militia.

APPROPRIATIONS

It is of utmost importance that ample appropriations be made at the next session of the Legislature for the military establishment. A comprehensive scheme of field exercises has been prepared for 1916 which cannot be carried out unless funds are made available. The armory instruction given to organizations during the winter months is largely wasted effort unless supplemented by actual experience in the field during the summer. In the interest of economy timely appropriations for current needs should be made as it is impracticable for this office to properly perform its functions unless the availability of funds is assured. The experience of several years has shown that less than five per cent of the cost of government is allotted to the military establishment.

MOBILIZATION CAMPS

The organizations of the active militia when called into the actual service of the United States are required to assemble at points designated by the Governor and known as Mobilization Camps. The duty of providing the sites for these camps and placing them in proper condition for the reception of troops rests on the State authorities. The preparation of these camps for the reception of troops would include suitable railroad facilities, erection of buildings, installing an adequate water system, and the construction of a well equipped range of large target capacity. The grounds should be sufficiently large to accommodate depots, corrals, hospitals, etc., and the encampment of troops without crowding, and with ample space for exercise and instruction. The State Camp of Instruction at Peekskill is at present the only location available for mobilization purposes in this State and not over a brigade could be accommodated at this camp.

A bill will be presented to the Legislature for an appropriation of \$50,000 for the purpose of procuring a tract that will meet military necessities in the event of the State being called upon to mobilize a force for the defence of the country.

SMALL ARMS PRACTICE

Troops cannot be considered efficient unless they are properly instructed in the use of the weapon with which they are armed and they can receive such instruction only through practice. As the rifle is the arm with which most of the troops of the National Guard are equipped, the training of the individual in the use of this weapon is of the utmost importance. The fundamental principles of aiming, holding, and trigger squeeze can be taught in the armory, but actual practice on outdoor ranges is essential for proper instruction. The figure of merit in small arms firing of troops outside the city of New York, and with local rifle ranges convenient for practice and available for instruction purposes throughout the summer months is in most instances much higher than that of troops located within the city who are required to practice at Peekskill where facilities are limited and the time consumed in travel tends to minimize results.

It is believed that organizations should have at least five days practice on outdoor ranges each year and that officers and men who qualify as marksmer or better should receive pay during the period of such practice.

PROPERTY

Storage and Safe Keeping.—The matter of the proper storage and safe-keeping of public property has received special consideration during the past year. A board has been appointed with full power and authority to inspect the armories

and property of all organizations and to act on all lost and unserviceable property. The board is required to report its findings to this office with recommendations as to needed changes with special reference to proper storage facilities and method of preserving and safe-keeping of property.

Inspection and Survey .- The annual State and Federal inspection of troops are held at the same time. For reasons of convenience and economy the preliminary orders directing the inspection of troops have, in the past, contained a provision authorizing State inspecting officers, at the time of the annual inspections, to act as surveying officers upon unserviceable property in the hands of organizations. Under these orders it has been the custom for accountable officers to hold all unserviceable property for action of surveying officers until the time of the annual inspection, the result being that while the accounts showed that the organization was fully equipped at the time of the inspection, the facts were that a part of the equipment was unserviceable and the organization not properly equipped at a time when the best possible showing should have been made — that is at the time of the annual inspection by the United States and State officers. Accountable officers would make requisitions in advance of the inspection for property to replace articles known by them to be unserviceable which would be returned disapproved with the remark that articles could not be considered unserviceable until surveyed and condemned and that new issues could not be made until such action had been taken which information would be in strict accordance with the Regulations.

To overcome this system orders have been issued directing that hereafter as losses may appear or property be rendered or become unserviceable or unsuitable that application will at once be made direct to The Adjutant General at the State Arsenal for relief therefrom in order that such losses or unserviceable property may not be permitted to accumulate. Upon receipt of such an application accountable officers have been directed to turn in the unserviceable property to the State Arsenal where survey proceedings would be conducted, thus keeping the accounts clear of all unserviceable articles at all times.

Returns.—Heretofore property returns were required to be made at the time of the annual inspection, each organization in the State thus rendering a return on a date different from that of every other organization which caused considerable confusion in checking accounts. All officers were fully occupied in giving instruction and arranging the necessary details for inspection at that time and proper attention could not be given to the preparation of returns.

The Regulations have been amended so as to require all organizations to render returns on the 31st day of December in each year. Upon receipt of these returns at the State Arsenal they will be checked, examined and audited and if found correct, so certified and returned to the accountable officers. All differences which may exist between the account as kept and as shown by the records of this office, will be adjusted and when adjustment has been made the account will be certified as correct.

Property Account .- A new system of property accounting has been adopted to take effect at the close of this calendar year which will exhibit at all times the state of accountability of each article of public property and will, it is believed, do much toward correcting those neglects and abuses which have led to property shortages in organizations in the past. The account is loose leaf in form, a separate page being used for each article of issue on the reverse side of which appropriate columns are provided in which to enter the summary statements required to be submitted in the annual or final return of public property and in the inventory. All accountable officers are required to take an inventory by actual count of all public property in their possession or with which they are charged within ten days of the close of each calendar year and to submit their property accounts properly prepared by inserting on each accounting page the amount charged, actually on hand per inventory, and excess or shortage, if any, on the 31st day of December in each year as an annual return. By this method the making of two or more copies of the return and inventory is obviated and the account may be continued on the same pages from year to year or until all of the lines available for entries are exhausted. It is believed that this system, besides showing the state of accountability at all times will reduce the clerical work in keeping these accounts at least one-half.

New forms for the keeping of property accounts between accountable officers and unit commanders and between unit commanders and enlisted men based upon the account described above have also been adopted.

BOARDS OF EXAMINATION

In order that as many officers as possible might have the splendid educational experience of service on these boards and also that the expense of conducting examinations might be reduced all boards of Examination have been reorganized. The new boards consist of not more than three officers while the old boards consisted of five or more. The number of boards has been increased, the places of examination being designated as far as practicable at the home stations of the officers serving on these boards, thereby doing away with the expense of transportation and subsistence which is allowed officers for services at points other than their home stations.

PAY AND CARE CLAIMS UNDER M. L. 223

The Military Law makes liberal provision for compensation for temporary incapacity resulting from wounds or sickness incurred while in service. The law provides that all claims shall be referred to a medical examiner or Board and is mandatory in this respect, although liberal provisions are made for the review of proceedings by the Adjutant General and payment is only made to the extent approved by him. The result of these mandatory provisions is that although this office might be in a position to adjust a claim satisfactorily, the facts of the case being of general knowledge, or even if the claim is insignificant in amount and might be adjusted by a small payment, still under the law these claims must be referred to a medical examiner or Board. In most cases the cost of the proceedings before the medical examiner far exceeded the claim of the injured member of the National Guard.

In order to revise the method and provide a system which would meet the requirements of the Military Law without involving the whole situation by an attempted amendment, a form has been adopted upon which such claims must be submitted. The form comprehends a statement by the claimant supported by his affidavit; affidavit of his employer; witnesses; officers; physicians; and a complete statement of every fact in relation to the disability, medical treatment, expenses, etc., supported by vouchers and other documentary evidence. The claim thus prepared is referred to a medical examiner who, in his own office, upon the prima facte case made out, upon the affidavits and other evidence submitted, may determine the validity of the claim without the expense incident to a hearing, examination of witnesses, employment of a stenographer, travel fees, etc. Upon the report of the medical examiner and his recommendations based upon the evidence as presented on the form, the Adjutant General may, in strict compliance with the law, adjust the claim in a fair and equable manner.

REPRINT OF THE MILITARY LAW AND REGULATIONS

Heretofore the great number of amendments each year to the Military Law and Regulations have made it necessary to entirely reprint these publications every few years at a considerable expense. In order to obviate this it has been decided to reprint these publications in loose leaf form so that when amendments are made it will only be necessary to reprint the particular page or pages containing the subject matter affected by the amendment. This work is well under way and will be completed during 1916.

DECORATIONS AND PRIZES

The usual decorations and prizes for long and faithful service, for individual efficiency in small arms firing, for competitive firing with the rifle, and for secondary battery practice have been awarded this year.

At present no prizes are awarded for competitive firing of machine gun units, for service practice in the coast artillery and for field firing by batteries of the field artillery. In view of the great importance of properly training these organizations in the use of their respective arms which has been especially emphasized in the recent European campaigns, it is recommended that suitable prizes be offered as an incentive to instruction.

Medals for valor and certificates of honorable mention were awarded to those officers and enlisted men who especially distinguished themselves in the rescue of soldiers from drowning during the field exercises at Fishkill Plains, Dutchess county, N. Y., on July 28, 1915, as follows:

Medals for Valor

Captain William R. Jackson, 14th Infantry. First Sergeant William G. Keegan, Company K, 14th Infantry. Sergeant John Cuthbert, Company K, 14th Infantry.

Certificates of Honorable Mention

First Lieutenant John C. Hardy, 14th Infantry. Sergeant Peter M. Depp, Company K, 14th Infantry.

CAMPAIGN BADGES

The design for the campaign badge authorized by chapter 165 of the Laws of 1913 for issue to officers and enlisted men who served honorably in the army or navy of the United States during the Spanish, Philippine or China Campaign and who enlisted from the State of New York, has been adopted. Five thousand of these badges have been purchased under contract and issues are now being made. Over three thousand applications have been received to date and it is believed that at least 10,000 additional applications will be received during 1916. It is recommended that suitable appropriation be made by the Legislature in order that the award of these badges may be continued.

THE ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE

Albany Office

On September 1, 1915, the office was moved from 176 State street to the Telephone Bullding, 158 State street. The entire eleventh floor of that building is in use for military purposes being occupied by this office, Headquarters Division and the Armory Commission. The quarters are light, commodious, and admirably arranged for the transaction of public business.

. The methods of transacting the business of the office have been revised during the year. The improvements inaugurated are along the lines of the most modern business practice.

Finance Division.—The work of this division has been systematized with a view of facilitating the payment of accounts. New forms have been adopted which will simplify and reduce the work and at the same time make available at all times adequate information as to the condition of accounts.

Personnel Division.— The records of this division both as to officers and enlisted men have been modified so as to afford a more complete history of the personnel of the active militia. The daily consecutive record of changes affecting commissioned officers and the card files provide means of easy reference. The State forms for issue to organization have been revised to meet changes in conditions and additional forms have been adopted to meet requirements and to facilitate the transaction of business.

Record and Filing Division.—The system of record and filing has been entirely revised. All records except accounts and the personal records of officers and men, are now filed in this division. By means of a card index all records are made immediately available for reference.

Naval Militia Division.—This division which deals solely with Naval Militia affairs and has charge of the property and financial naval accounts of the State with the United States is in a satisfactory condition.

Bureau of War Records.— The records of the soldiers from this State in the War of 1812, the War of the Rebellion, and the Spanish-American War are kept in this division. The records of the soldiers in the War of the Rebellion and the Spanish American War have been copied on slips, alphabetically arranged by regiments and bound. Alphabetical lists have also been prepared of all the soldiers who enlisted

in these wars. The records of the soldiers of the War of 1812 are now being compiled, the card system being used in this work. Additional information obtained from official sources is also being entered on the bound slips containing the records of the soldiers of the War of the Rebellion and the Spanish American War.

For the convenience of the public, in whose interest this bureau was established, it has been thought advisable to give a synopsis of the records on file for the guidance of those who may desire to avail themselves of the records of soldiers or other data pertaining to the wars of this country in so far as the State of New York was concerned.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR

There are no records of that war on file, such records being in the custody of the State Library, this city, and the Adjutant General of the Army, War Department, Washington, D. C.

WAR OF 1812

A card index of the officers and men of the New York Militia and the U. S. Vols. from this State in the War of 1812 is about to be completed. The total number of enlistments from this State in that war was about 77,000.

WAR WITH MEXICO, 1846-48

The records of the War with Mexico are very meager, no muster out rolls of any of the organizations being on file. It is the intention to have a card index made of the enlistments in the New York State Vols, and the U. S. Vols, from the State.

WAR OF THE REBELLION

The individual records of the New York State men in New York State organizations in the volunteer and militia service of the War of the Rebellion are on file. There is also an alphabetical list of these soldiers. Besides the New York State organizations there are on file the records of the 1st U. S. Sharpshooters, two regiments of U. S. colored troops, U. S. Vols. from this State, and the individual records, alphabetically arranged, of over 48,000 officers and enlisted men of the U. S. Navy and Marine Corps credited to the State.

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR

The records of the New York State men who served in the volunteer organizations from this State and the members of the Naval Militia in the U. S. Navy from this State in the Spanish-American War are on file.

New York Office

Property Division, State Arsenal.— Prior to November 15, 1914, the property accounts of organizations were kept in the Albany office while the property itself was received, stored, and issued from the State Arsenal. On the above mentioned date the books and records of the Property Division were transferred to the State Arsenal in order to facilitate the transaction of business and avoid duplication of work.

During the past year the office force at the Arsenal has been reorganized to meet the conditions caused by this transfer, new offices furnished in the Arsenal to accommodate the increased clerical force made necessary by this change, and new methods of procedure for the issue of and accounting for property adopted.

The Arsenal building has been renovated, new offices added and new office furniture, filing cabinets and other necessary materials installed where necessary.

A new system of recording and filing correspondence has been adopted which has proved entirely satisfactory. Changes in the system of handling requisitions for all articles of issue to troops were made so that the work of shipping has been greatly improved and the method of recording same much simplified. This system has been working successfully since its installation and no further changes seem necessary.

For the first time in many years the property accounts of all organizations have been checked up and all organizations notified as to the adjustment of their property accounts.

Some changes have been made in the personnel of the Property Division and the number of employees increased by transfer from other departments, in order to properly care for the constantly growing volume of business and the handling of property, which during the year 1915, from Government and State sources reached a total of about \$500,000.

During the year a large amount of unserviceable and condemned property has been surveyed and withdrawn from organizations in whose possession it had been accumulating for many years, due in a large measure to the conditions set forth in this report under heading "Inspection and Survey of Property."

Owing to certain conditions existing at the time and which made necessary the subsequent action, the customary clothing allowance to all organizations was stopped (G. O. 6, A. G. O., 1915) and only such clothing as was actually and absolutely required was issued to organizations. This clothing allowance has not been restored, but issues have been made as required and all organizations have been well taken care of and provided with all necessary clothing and equipment. All articles of dress clothing have been procured from the United States Government, instead of from various contractors, as heretofore, with the result of complete uniformity in all equipment.

During the year many new articles of equipment have been issued. All old pattern canteens and cups, some of which had been in use since 1898, were withdrawn from service and the new model (1910) of canteen, cover and cup have been issued to all troops. These articles are part of the new infantry equipment, model 1910, and it is expected that the balance of the full equipment will be issued during the year 1916, if received from the United States Government. New field ranges have been issued to all organizations, replacing the old and obsolete pattern of range in the hands of troops. In addition, company cooking utensils, or "march kits" have been issued.

Musical instruments have been issued to all organizations having enlisted bands.

The State has now on hand a full supply of escort wagons and harness for same, for the entire strength of the Division.

During the year there have been three (3) sales of accumulated condemned and unserviceable property belonging to the State, the proceeds of which amounted to \$16,355, which has been turned in to the Comptroller of the State.

During the year cash sales of property for the use of the Organized Militia of the State, as authorized under Section 17 of the Act of Congress, approved January 21, 1903, amounted to \$13,831.89.

Subject: Annual Report for 1915.

PART I

During the past year the war in Europe has resulted in a stimulation of public interest throughout the country in the subject of military preparedness. In Part I of the Annual Report of a year ago, several aspects of this subject in its relation to the National Guard were discussed at some length, and specific recommendations made therein. Nothing has resulted during the past year to cause a modification of the views and recommendations expressed in that report, and the recommendations are renewed.

It is believed that the National Guard, not only of this State, but of the country, will be materially affected by legislation during the coming session of the Federal Congress. The Secretary of War has recommended in his annual report that the Regular Army be increased, and that a Federal force of 400,000 men, to be known as the Continental Army, be authorized. The details of the proposed composition and method of recruiting this Continental Army are set forth in the Secretary's report. In the same report it is recommended that additional financial encouragement be given the National Guard. Within the past week there was made public a report of the War College section of the General Staff of the Army, containing recommendations regarding the National defense. This report recommended a large standing army, but made no recommendation concerning the utilization of the National Guard of the country for Federal purposes.

Since these reports were made public there has been much public discussion of the subject of preparedness and of the role of the National Guard of the country in the national defense.

It is generally conceded by those who have an accurate knowledge of the demands of modern warfare and the conditions to be met in this country in any attempt to repel an invasion, that we should have available at the outbreak of war a force of at least 500,000 men, organized, clothed, armed, equipped and trained in their duties. Some there are who advocate a substantial increase of the regular army in an attempt to approximate these figures. It is obvious, however, that owing to the great cost involved in carrying out such plan it is improbable that Congress will consent to provide for a first line composed wholly of regular professional troops.

The plan for a Continental Army is the expression of an attempt to supply the difference between the numbers to be provided by the Regular Army and the numbers deemed essential for a first line. The concensus of opinion in the Regular Army and the National Guard seems to be that the plan for a Continental Army is an impractical plan, mainly, for the reason that the training provided for is to be given during a period of two months in each year, and that for the remainder of the year no service will be required of the personnel. It is claimed by those who have given the subject consideration, and who have had extended experience in recruiting National Guard organizations, that the only class available for service in the Continental Army under such a plan would be the idle rich and the vagrants. Objection is also made to the plan for a Continental Army on the ground that it would vest in the President of the United States the appointment of thousands of Federal officers without the checks and safeguards thought to be desirable for peace time organization. This part of the plan would constitute a power greater than that possessed by the Emperor of Germany in respect to the German Army, for under the laws of the German Empire most of the officers of the Army are appointed by the several States, but required to qualify according to standards prescribed by the Imperial Government. Further objections urged against the Continental Army

plan are that it would be an additional and unnecessary category of troops, assuming that the National Guard of the country can be made available for such service. Also that the expense of maintaining the Continental Army would be vastly greater than that of developing the National Guard as a national force, for the reason that the Continental Army at the outset would have no store houses, training camps, rifle ranges and other facilities essential for the use of any army, and much of which is already possessed by the National Guard. The value of the military plant of the National Guard, represented by such facilities, is believed to be well over one hundred millions of dollars. Many officers of the Army and of the National Guard believe that the first line of our force should be made up of the Regular Army and the National Guard, the latter organized and disciplined as was contemplated by the Federal Constitution, that is to say, according to Federal laws prescribing uniformity throughout the States in every detail, or the complete "Federalization" of the National Guard. By reorganizing it under that clause of the Federal Constitution, which gives to Congress the right to raise and support armies, reading into the Federal law a provision that the States may call upon that portion of the National Guard stationed within their limits for the suppression of civil disorders. It is believed that the safest, most practical and economical plan would . be to supplement the regular forces by the development and utilization of the National Guard.

There is much to be said in favor of both methods of developing the National Guard. The first method would continue the National Guard as a force organized under the Militia provisions of the Constitution, but would provide by Congressional laws for a uniform period of enlistment, and common standards of qualifications for officers in each grade. This plan would bring about complete conformity by the National Guard with the organization of the Army, and would render the power reserved to the States to appoint the officers, a power which would be in effect merely a power to nominate. It seems to be conceded by competent legal authorities, that the right of Congress under its powers to provide for organization, to prescribe the standards to be attained by officers in each grade before being commissioned, is an unquestioned right, and is not such a curtailment of the right of appointment reserved to the States as would constitute a violation of that right. This principle has been established by civil service litigation. If the National Guard is to be limited in its functions to employment for purposes of national defense, then it would seem that the purposes for which the National Guard or Militia may be used by the Federal Government, and which are enumerated in the Constitution, cover every conceivable occasion of a defensive character. These purposes are to repel invasion, to suppress insurrection and to execute the laws. It is difficult to conceive of any purpose, defensive in its character, which does not fall within this classification. If it is to be the policy of the country to make available the National Guard for any and every purpose for which a Regular Army might be used, then the National Guard should be reorganized under the provisions of Section 8 of Article I of the Federal Constitution. The sentiment of a large part of the National Guard is probably in favor of this latter plan, provided a subordinate State status is given the troops in time of peace, so that organizations might continue to have legal authority to maintain their present facilities and derive the annual appropriations now provided by the States, a consideration of no little value. Irrespective of which of these two plans for the so-called Federalization of the National Guard is adopted, it is most desirable that the so-called Pay Bill pending in Congress should be enacted into law.

For a number of years the National Guard have petitioned Congress for the passage of an act to provide a nominal compensation for the officers and enlisted men in the militia for attendance at drills, a compensation about sufficient to cover the experses of their service which they now have to meet from personal funds.

When this subject was first discussed there was a substantial minority of officers who opposed the Federal pay bill. It was soon found, however, that most of these were men who knew that with Federal pay would come more rigid Federal supervision and accountability, and they feared the result, so far as they themselves were concerned. With the continued increase in efficiency of the militia there resulted the gradual elimination of the less efficient among the officers, and with this change there came a decrease in the strength of the minority which opposed Federal compensation, until now there is practically a unanimity of opinion that Federal

compensation is a just, economical and sound measure, necessary for the further increase of numbers and efficiency.

It is proper to record here a review of the grounds in support of this measure. In the first place, the successful conduct of every military institution has been based on a system of rewards and punishments. At the present time, in the absence of Federal compensation, the National Guard of the country has no adequate system of this character. Its rewards consist of the consciousness of duty properly performed, and of self-sacrifice, amply exemplified. A system of punishments for delinquencies exists on paper, but far too frequently, though perhaps naturally, does a disinclination exist on the part of superiors to impose punishments on those who are rendering substantial service without compensation and at personal inconvenience. The mind of a superior, who is charged with the duty of inflicting puninshment, cannot disengage itself from the thought that before punishing the individual who has rendered substantial service but who has been delinquent, he should first mete out punishment as a matter of simple justice to the citizen who is rendering no service at all and who has maintained himself free from any military obligations that could furnish the basis for a delinquency. And so the military superior in passing upon the delinquency of the subordinate who has rendered substantial service, without compensation, frequently concludes that he cannot look a gift horse in the mouth. The most important result therefore of the adoption of the Pay Bill will be its effect on discipline, and discipline goes right to the heart of military efficiency.

enother ground in support of Federal compensation relates to the matter of property accountability. The War Department makes criticisms from time to time concerning the loss, and absence of proper care, of military property in the possession of militia troops. Accountability for military property, as we know, is decentralized from superior to subordinate, until we find accountability for regimental property finally vested in regimental supply officers, who, in turn, through the Company commanders, impose responsibility for clothing, arms and equipments on the individual men who compose the companies. Where property is lost, damaged or destroyed through the negligence of those charged with responsibility for its care, a proper military system dictates that the delinquent should be summarily charged the value of the property, plus a fine for neglect. But again the superior frequently undergoes the mental processes I have already referred to. There is no pay or compensation for services flowing from the government to the subordinate, which can be withheld or charged with the amount of the fine, and so again, in many cases, punishment consists of a reprimand, and the postponement of the day of reckoning by the accountable officer who is charged with the property.

With the adoption of Federal pay this problem of property accountability, now so costly and so detrimental to discipline, would cease to be a problem so far as the Federal government is concerned. The war department would have the same hold on accountable officers of the militia, that it has on accountable officers of the regular army, and in turn the accountable officers of the militia would have a similar hold upon those under them charged with responsibility for military property. Hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of property now lost to the Federal Government would cease to be a loss and should in fact be credited in reduction of the amount estimated as the cost for paying the militia.

There is another ground in support of Federal pay that is perhaps the most important. It is an axiom of military efficiency that the men are what the officers make them. It is also admitted that the ideal class of material for the development of officers is represented by the young man just out of college. That type possesses in full measure the requisites of physical fitness, mental application, habits of study and the breadth of view which ordinarily goes with education. Now it is a known fact that the vast majority of our young college men are maintained at college only at great sacrifice on the part of their families, and that when they complete their college work, they are considered by their families as having been properly launched into the sea of life's struggle. All the natural tendencies of such young men dictate their entry into the National Guard service, and at a time when their business responsibilities are limited. Ordinarily they desire to continue physical exercise; they have the available time, and they seek new fields of acquaintanceship. On the other hand the National Guard needs and seeks their service. But in spite of this apparent meeting of the minds, this

desirable class is for the most part unavailable. Why is this? Solely for the reason that when the young man learns that the acceptance of a commission involves the expenditure of from \$300.00 to \$400.00 for uniforms and equipment, he is compelled to decline. The enactment into law of a Federal pay bill will make available as officers this most desirable if not necessary class of young men.

Many other considerations supporting the principle of Federal pay might be mentioned. Among them is the effect to be expected in the matter of increased numbers. The National Guard numbers approximately 125,000 officers and men. Its numbers are insufficient for the National defense. The twelve militia divisions call for a strength of 22,000 men each, or a total of 264,000 exclusive of Coast artillery. This means doubling the present strength. Without further inducement, it is not believed to be practicable to obtain any substantial increase of existing numbers. With the provisions of the Pay Bill in force, conservative officers believe that we can double the existing strength. Those who question that the relatively small compensation offered by the Pay Bill will constitute a sufficient consideration to produce this result, overlook the fact that the \$50.00 per year to be received by the enlisted man, will in a vast majority of cases keep him supplied with civilian clothing for a year—a very attractive offer to the average young man.

PART II

ORGANIZATION

REORGANIZED

On November 1, 1914, the Quartermaster's, Subsistence and Paymaster's Departments were consolidated and constituted the Quartermaster Corps. (G. O. 17, A. G. O., 1914.)

On Lecember 23, 1914, the 22d Regiment, Corps of Engineers, excepting the band, was disbanded (mustered out February 19, 1915) and reorganized as the 22d Corps of Engineers composed of headquarters and two battalions of four companies each (G. O. 27, A. G. O., 1914): the headquarters, 1st battalion headquarters, Companies E, F, G and H were mustered in on February 4, 1915, and the 2d battalion headquarters and Companies A, B, C and D, were mustered in on February 5, 1915. (S. O. 44, D. 1915.)

STRENGTH OF THE NATIONAL GUARD

The following is a summary of the strength of the National Guard for all corps, departments and arms of the service, showing the number of officers and enlisted men at the date of the last semi-annual return, September 30, 1915.

The total strength on September 30, 1914, was 17,477. The difference between these figures and the total for September 30, 1915, shows a net loss of 458.

COURTS MARTIAL

A General Court Martial was convened pursuant to S. O. 351, D., 1914, for the trial of enlisted men of the 47th Infantry, and the findings and sentence of this court have been published in General Orders Nos. 7 and 16, Headquarters Division, National Guard, 1915.

A General Court Martial was convened pursuant to S. O. 374, D., 1914, for the trial of enlisted men of the 1st Field Artillery, and the findings and sentence of this court have been published in General Orders No. 7, Headquarters, Division, National Guard, 1915.

SERVICE IN AID OF CIVIL AUTHORITY

On March 23, 1915, Co. L, 3d Infantry (30th Separate Company), was called by the Sheriff of Chemung County in aid of civil authority at Elmira and remained on duty until March 28th before being relieved. On July 31, 1915, the Governor, upon the request of the Sheriff of St. Lawrence County ordered Companies C (Watertown), D (Ogdensburg) and K (Malone) of the 1st Infantry on duty at Massena in aid of the civil authority on account of a strike by the employees of the Aluminum Company of America whose factory is located in that town. Order was maintained and Company D was relieved from duty on August 6th, Company K on August 7th and Company C on August 8, 1915. Company C, 1st Infantry, was again, on September 3, 1915, ordered by the Governor to report for duty in aid of civil authority at Deferiet, Jefferson County, on account of disturbances connected with a strike of the employees of the St. Regis Paper Company's Mills. Company C remained on duty there until September 13th, when all but one officer and 21 enlisted men were relieved. On Octobr 9th, quiet having been restored, this detachment was also relieved and returned to its home station.

The service of all troops in aid of civil authority was performed in a most efficient manner.

THEORETICAL INSTRUCTION OF OFFICERS

The New York School of the Line established in the fall of 1914, graduated 21 officers. The following are the names of the graduates:

The work was most thoroughly carried out under the direction of Major James M. Hutchinson, 71st Infantry, and Captain Joseph L. Gilbreth, U. S. A. Graduation exercises of the class were held at Van Cortlandt Park, on the afternoon of May 30, 1915.

In the fall of 1915, a branch of this School of the Line was established in Buffalo, Captain Joseph L. Gilbreth, U. S. A., being assigned as Commandant of the New York Branch, and Captain William E. Welsh, U. S. A., being assigned as Commandant of the Buffalo Branch.

The work at both of these schools during the present year is proceeding in a satisfactory manner.

Major James M. Hutchinson has been assigned to take charge of the new course known as the Field Officers Course to cover the instruction of field officers of all arms stationed in the City of New York.

GARRISON SCHOOLS

On recommendation of the Academic Board the School known as the School of the Line and Staff was continued under the name of the Garrison School, the courses being those carried on under the former name. The change of name was made desirable in order to avoid confusion due to the similarity of the name New York School of the Line.

SCHOOL OF EQUITATION

The School of Equitation for officers of infantry was continued throughout the year under the direction of:

INFANTRY SCHOOL OF APPLICATION

The Infantry School of Application was held at Peekskill in June, for officers of the 3d and 4th Brigades. A Provisional Company of Infantry, commanded by Captain Albert T. Rich, 71st Infantry, was on duty throughout the period and aided in the practical training of the student officers.

The results obtained by this school were most satisfactory. The unanimous opinion of the officers seems to be that this school is one of the best agencies yet devised for the thorough training of company officers.

FIELD TRAINING

Field training during the past season consisted of field exercises involving the use of combined arms. The following organizations participated in this training, at Fishkill Plains, Dutchess County, New York:

We were greatly aided in the instruction and training by the presence and assistance of one squadron of the 2d U. S. Cavalry under the command of Colonel Joseph T. Dickman, and one battalion of the 30th Infatry, U. S. A., under the command of Major Harry H. Bandholtz.

The work of all organizations was most satisfactory.

In one exercise, involving the crossing of a stream under assumed fire, a number of men in Company K of the 14th Infantry got into a hole about 15 feet deep. All were rescued except one, Private O'Donnell, Co. K, who was unfortunately drowned. The following officers and enlisted men were awarded recognition for valor, involving in the case of those awarded medals, the risk of their own lives in connection with this incident:

COAST ARTILLERY

The Coast Artillery performed a tour of fortification service at Fort H. G. Wright, New York, as follows:

9th Coast Defense Command, August 1-15, 1915.

Target practice was interfered with considerably by the presence of fog. Otherwise the tours of service of the several commands were satisfactory.

FIELD ARTILLERY

The entire 1st Regiment of the field artillery, and the 2d Field Artillery, less one battalion, attended at the Field Artillery School at Tobyhanna, Pennsylvania, by battalions, where they received practical instruction in target practice. Their work also involved problems in field artillery fire.

Officers and Noncommissioned Officers of the field artillery also attended a school for Officers and Noncommissioned Officers at the same place, in advance of the arrival of their organizations.

The following officers took the course of training for field artillery officers at the School of Fire, Fort Sill, satisfactorily completing the course:

CORPS OF ENGINEERS

The engineers, consisting of one battalion of pioneers and one battalion of pontoneers, were sent to the Engineer School at Belvoir, Virginia, where each had ten days of practical training. The results were satisfactory. This organization is greatly handicapped by lack of adequate facilities in its armory. The armory should be modified so as to provide stable accommodations for horses and mules, and proper provision for instructing the personnel in the construction of intrenchments, barbed wire entanglements and other work of engineer troops.

TRANSPORTATION

Absence of a reasonable number of motor cars and motor trucks continues to handicap not only the work in the field of organizations, but the routine work at Division Headquarters throughout the year. There is an almost daily demand for the legitimate use of motor vehicles in connection with various military activities. The National Guard should be enabled to maintain at least six passenger cars and one motor truck company of 27 cars, all under the charge of the Chief of the Quartermaster Corps of the Division, to be utilized under his direction where their use might be required in the military service.

I have the honor to submit the following report concerning the operations and condition of the Naval Militia, N. Y. for the year ending September 30, 1915:

1. In compliance with General Orders No. 14, c. s., A. G. O., tours of duty were performed as follows:

First Battalion, N. M., N. Y.: U. S. S. "Kearsage," July 24th to August 7th, both dates inclusive.

Second Battalion, N. M., N. Y.: U. S. S. "Kentucky," July 24th to August 7th, both dates inclusive.

Third Battalion, N. M., N. Y.: U. S. S. "Kearsage," August 13th to August 27th, both dates inclusive.

Your attention is called to the highly commendatory reports of the U. S. Naval officers commanding the above vessels, which are on file in your office.

2. The usual Small Arms Practice returns are attached, marked Appendix I.* The Figure of Merit prizes for the Naval Militia were won by the Fourth Division, Third Battalion; Third Division, First Battalion, and Fourth Division, First Battalion.

The Inter-Battalion Secondary Battery Match was won by the First Battalion with a final merit of 37.81.

The Inter-Divisional Secondary Battery Match of the First Battalion was won by the Fourth Division with a final merit of 46.80.

The Inter-Divisional Secondary Battery Match of the Second Battalion was won by the Fifth Division with a final merit of 31.25.

The Brigade Match was won by the Second Battalion with a score of 1429.

- 3. A line division was mustered in the Second Battalion on March 9, 1915.
- 4. The aggregate strength of this command on June 30, 1914, was 1,425, and on June 30, 1915, it was 1,437, an increase of 12.
- 5. The regular annual inspections of the organizations of the Naval Militia, N. Y., by the State were held as follows:

- 7. By authority of the act known as the Naval Militia Bill, the Secretary of the Navy has issued General Orders No. 153 standardizing the organization of the Naval Militia in the various States. Besides the question of changes of rating of noncommissioned officers, and the question of required examinations, this order will necessitate but few changes in the Naval Militia of this State. A suggested order for the necessary changes is in course of preparation and will be submitted to the Governor for approval at an early date. The changes in rating, however, and the necessary examinations will entail a large amount of work on the part of the commissioned officers of the State. Fortunately these changes are not required to be completed until February 16, 1917.

LEGISLATION

Maintenance Funds

The statutory requirements of chapter 558, Laws of 1913, under which all the counties of the State outside of the City of New York are divided into two brigade districts and the cost of constructing, renting, altering, repairing, enlarging, equipping, furnishing and maintaining armories outside the City of New York, is apportioned by the Armory Commission among such counties according to the aggregate amount of assessment for each county within the brigade district as fixed by the State Board of Equalization, resulted in the payment by these counties into the State Treasury the sum of \$683,793.88 for the above purposes.

This sum represents charges to cover a period beginning July 1, 1915, and ending June 30, 1916.

APPROPRIATIONS

The Legislature made the following appropriations:

Repairs to Camp Grounds, Rifle Ranges, Etc.

For repairs, improvements and betterments of the State arsenal, camp grounds, armories and rifle ranges throughout the State, and for necessary office and traveling expenses of the Commission (chapter 727, Laws 1915), \$75,000.

Armory and Stable for Troop I, 1st Cavalry

For the construction of an armory and stable in the city of Buffalo, for the use of Troop I, 1st Cavalry, being the third and final appropriation pursuant to chapter 312, Laws of 1913, making \$150,000 against a total cost of not to exceed \$150,000 contemplated by said chapter (chapter 727, Laws of 1915), \$85,000.

Armory for Company G, 10th Infantry

For the construction of an armory in the city of Yonkers, for the use of Company G, 10th Infantry, being the second appropriation pursuant to chapter 373, Laws of 1914, making \$55,000 appropriated against a total cost of not to exceed \$100,000 contemplated by said chapter (chapter 727, Laws of 1915), \$30,000.

Armory and Stable for Troop H, 1st Cavalry, Etc.

For the construction of an armory and stable in the city of Rochester, for the use for Troop H, 1st Cavalry, 2nd Ambulance Company and Mounted Scout Detachment, 3d Infantry, pursuant to chapter 780, Laws of 1913, which appropriated \$25,00 (of which the sum of \$24,927.20 lapsed), against a total cost of not to exceed \$100,000 contemplated by said chapter (chapter 727, Laws of 1915), \$40,000.

Reappropriations

Unexpended appropriation under chapter 312, Laws of 1913, for the erection of an armory and stable in the city of Buffalo, for the use of Troop I, 1st Cavalry (chapter 728, Laws of 1915), \$25,000.

Financial Statement

In addition to repairs, improvements and betterments to the State Arsenal, camp grounds and rifle ranges, and emergency repairs, improvements and betterments of the armories throughout the State, made necessary by the action of the elements, the age of the buildings and equipment, or the increase in size of organizations, it has been the policy of the Commission to make repairs or betterments which aim to improve the property with reference to increasing not only the facilities for the training of troops but also for the proper employment of military and naval munitions, as well as their care and preservation.



This regiment was organized in April, 1861; it entered the United States service May 28, 1862, for three months, and was mustered out September 5, 1862, having been stationed at Washington, D. C., and later forming part of the garrison at Harper's Ferry, Va.; June 18, 1863, it was again mustered in the service of the United States for thirty days, and was mustered out July 24, 1863. In 1867 the regiment took up rifle practice as part of its drill, and in 1871 it established for itself a rifle range and system of practice which was in 1873 adopted by the National Rifle Association. Co. G was disbanded March 22, 1878, and new Co. G organized April 30, 1879. Co. F was disbanded October 10, 1890, and new Co. F organized January 8, 1891. Co. I was disbanded October 10, 1890, and new Co. I organized October 6, 1892. May 7, 1898, it was authorized to be temporarily consolidated into eight companies, and four companies of the 13th Regiment were attached to it, preparatory to entry into the United States service, into which it was mustered on May 24, 1898, as the 22d Regiment, Infantry, N. Y. Vols., and it was mustered out November 23, 1898. February 20, 1902, the regiment was constituted a regiment of engineers and designated 22d Regiment, Engineers.

By the law of May 7, 1908, the 22d Regiment became a part of the Corps of Engineers, and on Nov. 10, 1908, Companies L and M were authorized, completing the three battalion organization. The regimental organization of the Corps of Engineers, known as 22d Regiment, Corps of Engineers, and all battalions and companies, except band, were disbanded by General Orders No. 27, A. G. O., December 23, 1914.

The Engineer troops were organized into two battalions, known and designated as the 1st Battalion, Corps of Engineers, consisting of four pioneer companies (Companies A, B, C, and D), and the 2d Battalion, Corps of Engineers, to consist of four ponton companies (Companies E, F, G and H). General Orders No. 27, A. G. O., December 23, 1914.

On March 11, 1912, the 2d Regiment of Cavalry was organized by General Orders No. 11, A. G. O., by detaching Troops C, H, I, K, and M from the 1st Cavalry, which were thereupon designated Troops A, B, C, D and E, respectively. Troop F, located at West Brighton, was added April 23, 1912, and Troop G, located at Utica, on June 21, 1912.

On November 5, 1913, General Orders No. 27, A. G. O., transferred Troops B, D, H and I of 1st Cavalry to the 2d Cavalry as Troops B, D, H and I. Troops B and D, 2d Cavalry, were changed to Troops K and L by G. O. 28, A. G. O., December 10, 1913. Troop M was authorized to be organized by G. O. 27, A. G. O., November 5, 1913, and the designation of 2d Cavalry was changed to 1st Cavalry by the same order. Troop M was mustered in March 21, 1914. Troop D of this regiment performed duty at riots, Syracuse, May, 1913, and Troop I performed riot duty at Depew, N. Y., in April, 1914.

Squadron A was organized as Troop A on April 3, 1889, and performed duty at Buffalo during the switchmen's riot in August, 1892, and at Brooklyn during the motormen's riot in January, 1895. It was divided into two troops, to be known as Troops 1 and 2, and these organized into one squadron, designated Squadron A, February 9, 1895. November 27, 1896, Squadron A was divided into three troops, to be known as Troops 1, 2 and 3. Troop 4 was added May 2, 1907. The squadron was on duty at the riot at Croton Dam, April, 1900. One troop (Troop A), made up of members of the three troops of the squadron, was in United States service from May 20, 1898, to November 28, 1898.

This squadron was assigned to 1st Cavalry December 28, 1911 (G. O. 60) and the numerical designation of troops was changed January 18, 1912 (G. O. 2) to letter designation, viz.: Troops A, E, F and G.

Troops A, E, F and G, 1st Cavalry, were detached and organized as a separate squadron by General Orders No. 27, A. G. O., November 5, 1913. On December 10, 1913, the designation of Troops E, F and G, 1st Squadron, Cavalry, was changed to Troops B, C and D, respectively, by General Orders No. 28, A. G. O.

The designation of 1st Squadron, Cavalry, was changed to Squadron A, Cavalry, was mustered out December 7, 1914.

The squadron has received authority to place silver rings on the lances of its colors, engraved as follows:

On the National Color .- Spanish-American War, 1898; Porto Rico, 1898; Coamo, 1898; Asomanta, 1898.

On the State Color .- Buffalo, August, 1892; Brooklyn, January, 1895; Croton Dam, April, 1900; Coeymans, May, 1906.

Battery C was detached and designated a separate battery. Nown 1st Field Artillery to be known as the 1st Battailon and Batteries A, B and C of that regiment. Battery C was detached and designated a separate battery, November 26, 1912, by G. O. 70, A. G. O. The new Battery A was detached and designated Separate Battery B by G. O 74, December 16, 1912. General Orders No. 74, authorized the organization of two additional batteries from Battery B, 1st Field Artillery, to replace Batteries A and C, detached.
On May 19, 1913, Battery E, 2d Field Artillery, was detached and transferred to 1st Field Artillery as Battery A, 1st Field Artillery, by G. O. 16, A. G. O.

General Orders No. 16, A. G. O., May 19, 1913, transferred to 1st Field Artillery Battery E, and authorized the organization of Batteries E and F.

O., October 26, 1912; detached from that regiment and designated Separate Battery B. Field Artillery, by G. O. 74, A. G. O., December 16, 1912. Attached to the 2d Battalion as Battery B, December 16, 1912.

The organization rendered service to the State and City of New York at the abolition riot, July 14, 1834; stevedore riot, February 24, 1836; Croton water riots.

On the 4th of April, 1786,* the 1st Brigade, 1st Division, was formed in New York city into a brigade of artillery, and was to consist of the 1st and 2d Regiments and a battalion. In April, 1807, the 3d Regiment of New York Artillery was organized by including this battalion and other troops. July 27, 1847, the designation of the regiment was changed to the 8th Regiment. In December, 1893, it was reduced to a battalion of four companies. It was reorganized, as a regiment, February 14, 1896. New companies were organized for the battalion as follows: On July 8, 1895, Co. A; on October 30, 1895, Co. E; on January 27, 1896, Co. H, and on February 14, 1896, Co. G, when it was reorganized as a regiment. April 28, 1898, It was authorized to be organized as a twelve-company regiment to enter the service of the United States. It was in the service of the United States from September 15 to December 15, 1812; from April 23 to August 2, 1861; from May 29 to September 9, 1862; and from June 17 to July 23, 1863. It was mustered into the United States service as the 8th Regiment Infantry, New York Volunteers, May 14, 17 and 19, 1898, and mustered out of such service November 3, 1898. Companies A, C and E were disbanded December 22, 1898. December 10, 1906, Companies A, C and E were disbanded and the regiment reduced to a battalion of seven companies and designated the 8th Battalion. January 18, 1908, Co. A was reorganized and on January 21, 1908, the battalion was again constituted a regiment under its original designation. January 23, 1908, a coast artillery corps was organized, the 8th Regiment being constituted coast artillery and the companies respectively designated as the 25th, 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, 30th, 31st and 32d Companies, Coast Artillery Corps, constituting the 8th Artillery District. November 10, 1908, an additional company was directed to be organized and attached to the 8th Artillery Corps. The 34th Company was mustered in May 29, 1914, and attached to the 8th Coast Defense Command.

By virtue of an order from Governor John Jay to Brigadier-General James Miles Hughes, New York, N. Y., dated Albany, June 24, 1799, the preliminary organization of the 6th Regiment, New York State Infantry, of which this regiment is the successor, took place, by transfer of four companies from the 1st Regiment, three companies from 2d Regiment, five companies from 3d Regiment, two companies from 4th Regiment, all organized March 4, 1786; three companies from the 5th Regiment, organized May 11, 1789, and the Independent Rifle Co., organized August 28, 1798

rrom 4th Regiment, all organized March 4, 1786; three companies from the 5th Regiment, organized May 11, 1789, and the Independent Rifle Co., organized August 28, 1798.

The 6th Regiment, New York State Infantry, was permanently organized with 16 companies, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Commandant Jacob Morton, on March 8, 1800. This regiment was changed by General Orders, Adjutant General's Office, Albany, to the 2d New York State Artillery, March 27, 1805, and to the 9th Regiment, New York State Artillery, June 13, 1812; it was reduced to a battalion, December 13, 1813, and became a regiment again, by orders of Council of Appointment, June 6, 1816. By orders from Adjutant General's Office, the state was divided in division, brigade, regiment and company districts. May 13, 1847. Three of the regiment's companies were transferred to the 8th Regiment, New York State Militia, May 27, 1850; some of the officers and men elsewhere, but Colonel B. Clinton Ferris retained command of the 9th Regiment. as reorganized May 29, 1850. It was again partly disbanded May 31, 1858, but the district of the 9th Regiment. New York State Militia, was kept intact, under Colonel Lucius Pitkin, and once more the regiment made — anew, June 25, 1859.*

Under this title it entered the service of the United States, May 27, 1861, and was mustered in at Washington, D. C., June 8, 1861. A further change was made in numerical designation; it became known as the 83d New York Volunteers, December 7, 1861, by which title it was mustered out of the United States service, June 23, 1884.

Under orders from the authorities of the State, the 9th District was retained for the regiment during its three years of war service and for the Pulited States service, June 20, 1864.

Under orders from the authorities of the State, the 9th District was retained for the regiment during its three years of war service, and formally retook position in the National Guard of the State as the 9th Regiment, National Guard, State of New York, June 13, 1864, which was continued until 1898, when the title was changed to the 9th Regiment Infantry, New York Volunteers, May 2, 1898. It was redesignated the 9th Regiment, National Guard, New York, January 12, 1899.

April 28, 1898, it was authorized to be organized into a twelve-company regiment, preparatory to entry into the United States service, into which it was mustered as the Ninth Regiment Infantry, New York Volunteers, May 17, 19 and 20, 1898, and mustered out November 15, 1898. This regiment was organized July 5, 1847; there were changes in the organiza-tion a few years later, again in April, 1859, and in 1860. It was disbanded May 7, 1898, except one battalion of four companies which had volunteered to enter the 1898, except one battalion of four companies which had volunteered to enter the United States service, and authority was given to reorganize it May 15, 1898, November 28, 1898, such portion of the regiment as had been organized was disbanded, and authority was given to re-establish the regiment, the battalion which was in the United States service forming the nucleus of the new organization. Companies L and M were organized March 11, 1899; February 8, 1900, it was constituted a regiment of heavy artillery and designated 13th Regiment of Heavy Artillery of the National Guard, New York. This designation was changed to Coast Artillery, September 1, 1906. The regiment was in the service of the United States for three months from April 23, 1861, and was mustered out August 6, 1861; again from May 28 to September 12, 1862, and for the third time from June 20 to July 20, 1863, for thirty days: it was in the State service during the draft riots in July and August, 1863; the Orange riots, July 12, 1871; the railroad riots, July, 1877; the switchmen's strike at Buffalo, August, 1892; the quarantine disturbances at Fire Island, September, 1892, and the motormen's strike at Brooklyn, January, 1895. battalion which volunteered to enter the United States service as part of the 22d Regiment, New York Volunteer Infantry, in the war with Spain, was mustered into such service May 24, 1898, and was mustered out November 23, 1898. January 23, 1908, the Coast Artillery Corps was organized; the companies of the 13th Regiment. Coast Artillery, becoming Companies 1 to 12 inclusive, Coast Artillery Corps, and constituting the 13th Artillery District.

in the volunteer service as stated above. The 31st Separate Company was detached
from this regiment on November 9, 1900, and assigned to the 4th Battalion. The

It was on duty at Buffalo during riots in August, 1892; at Albany during the street railway riots, May 16–18, 1901; during Hudson Valley riots, 1902, at Corinth in April, 1910, and at Troy, March, 1913, Hudson River flood. In the United States service as Co. A, 2d Regiment, N. Y. Infantry, from May 17, 1898, to October 25, 1898.

COMPANY B, SECOND INFANTRY (Seventh Separate Company,) (Third Brigade.)

Companies A. B., C and D were organized during the excitement created by the firing of British at American vessels off Sandy Hook in April, 1806, as the first, second, third and fourth companies, and June 25th they were officially recognized by the State as part of the uniformed militia of the State, and attached to the battalion of artillery commanded by Major Andrew Sitcher. April 5, 1807, the battalion, in the organization of the 3d Regt. of New York Artillery, became its 2d Battalion. When war with England became imminent in 1807, these four companies, with other volunteers, were temporarily organized as a regiment, commanded by Colonel Peter Curtenius, and remained thus detached until April 20, 1809. In 1812 the 3d became the 11th Regiment of Artillery, the four companies remaining the 2d Battalion. August 25, 1824, the battalion was named "Battalion of National Guards" (its distinctive name until, in 1862, the Legislature appropriated it for the uniformed militia), and in December, 1824, the fifth company was organized and Captain Stevens' company of the 11th New York Artillery transferred to it as the sixth company. In January, 1825, the battalion was transferred to the 2d New York Artillery. October 1, 1825, the battalion was detached and organized as a separate and independent battalion, and during the month the seventh company was organized. May 4, 1826, the organization of the eighth company was completed, and May 6th the battalion was organized into a regiment, the 27th Artillery. The 10th Regiment was organized on December 29, 1860, by General Orders No. 50, A. G. O., of that year, Captain Ira W. Ainsworth's company of the 25th Regiment being detached from that regiment and assigned to the 10th as the nucleus of the new regiment; Captain Ainsworth subsequently becoming the first colonel of the 10th Regiment with rank from May 27, 1862.

On May 17, 1881, the 10th Regiment, with the exception of Companies A, B, D and K, was disbanded and these companies retained in the service as the 10th Separate Battalion. On October 1, 1884, the designation of Company K was

changed to C.

April 28, 1898, the 1st Regiment was organized preparatory to entry in United States service and Companies A, B, C and D of the 10th Battalion became Companies A, B, C and D of the 1st Regiment. On the disbandent of this regiment on March 15, 1899, these companies resumed their former designations in the 10th

Battalion.

on March 15, 1899, these companies resumed their former designations in the 10th Battalion.

The battalion organization of the 10th Battalion was disbanded on May 1, 1905, and Companies A, B, C and D constituted separate companies, designated respectively, as the 26th, 35th, 38th and 45th Separate Companies. On the same date the 10th Regiment, composed of separate companies, was reorganized and its head-quarters established at Albany, and the 26th, 35th, 38th and 45th Separate Companies attached to it as Companies A, B, C and D, respectively. In addition the 16th, 23d, 4th, 11th, 17th, 15th and 14th Separate Companies were assigned to the regiment and designated respectively as E, F, G, H, I, K and M. May 28, 1907, the 49th Separate Company was mustered in at White Plains, and assigned to the 10th Regiment as Company L. On December 1, 1910, Company A was mustered out, and a new company mustered in, on the same date, and designated as Company A, 10th Infantry (26th Separate Company).

The 10th Regiment was mustered into the service of the United States as the 177th New York Volunteers, November 21, 1862, and was mustered out September 10, 1863. Companies A, B, C, D, K and M were mustered into the United States service as Companies A, B, C, D, K and M, 1st New York Infantry, May 20, 1898, and were mustered out February 20, 1899. The 10th Regiment was on duty in aid of the civil authorities in the Helderbergs in 1865, during the anti-rent war; during the railroad riots at West Albany during street railway riot in 1901; and a portion of the 10th Regiment at Coeymans during a riot in May, 1906. The regiment was authorized to organize a detachment of mounted scouts by Special Orders No. 66, A. G. O., March 15, 1912.

The regiment has received authority to place silver rings on the lances of its colors, engraved as follows:

April 28, 1898, it was authorized to be organized as a twelve-company regiment, preparatory to entering the service of the United States, into which service it was mustered May 13, 1898; it was mustered out of such service October 27, 1898. December 6th, the regiment was continued as a regiment of the National Guard composed of twelve companies. The regiment was authorized to organize a detachment of mounted orderlies by Special Orders No. 167, July 2, 1912.

The regiment was organized in 1848. Cos. K and I were disbanded, the latter in 20.5. A new Co. I was organized in 1879, and Co. E was consolidated with Co. H the same year. In 1880 Co. B was consolidated with Co. A, and Troop D. Cavalry, Eighth Division, was reorganized as a company of infantry and attached to the regiment as Co. E. In 1881 Cos. D and E were disbanded. A new Co. B and a new Co. D were organized in 1885. It cutered the service of the United States June 19, 1863, and was mustered out July 30, 1863. June 10, 1907, the 13th Separate Company was attached to the 65th Regiment as Co. E. July 9, 1909, the regiment received authority to organize a new company to be known as Company K. Companies L and M were authorized to be organized December 2, 1910. This regiment performed duty at the riots in Buffalo, April, 1913.

Co. E of this regiment, the 13th Separate Company, is quartered in the State Armory, South Main street, Jamestown. It was organized August 22, 1875, as the 1st Separate Company, 31st Brigade. Designation changed to 4th Separate Company, December 5, 1877, and to the 13th Separate Company, September 4, 1882. Became Co. G, 3d Regiment, March 30, 1907, and Co. E, 65th Regiment, June 10, 1907. It was in the State service in Buffalo, April, 1913. In United States service, as Co E, 65th Regiment, N. Y. Infantry, from May 17, 1898, to November 17, 1898.

On October 12, 1851, a number of independent, uniformed military companies in the City of New York were organized into a regiment under the command of Colonel Charles S. Roe, and designated in General Orders No. 489, A. G. O., dated November 1, 1851, as the 69th Regiment, New York State Militia. In 1858 the regiment was reorganized as a regiment of artillery doing duty as infantry.

The regiment was mustered into the United States service on May 9, 1861, at Washington, D. C., for three months, during which service it participated in the battles of Blackburn's Ford and Bull Run, and was mustered out on August 3, 1861. Immediately after its muster out and return practically the whole regiment, including the officers and enlisted men who had served in the three months' campaign, volunteered for three years, or the war, and the offer was accepted by the War Department in a letter to the commanding officer of the regiment under date of August 30, 1861, the regiment being mustered into the United States service on November 8, 1861, as the 69th Regiment, New York Volunteers. Its appellation of "militia" was changed to "volunteers" for the reason that the term for which the regiment volunteered exceeded the period of time established by the State of

of "militia" was changed to "volunteers" for the reason that the term for which the regiment volunteered exceeded the period of time established by the State of New York for which its militia regiments, to be recognized as such, could serve without the State. But its numerical designation, however, was, by authority of the State, retained in order to preserve and maintain the regiment's identity with the militia organization. During this service the regiment was attached to the Army of the Potomac, forming part of the Irish Brigade (2d Brigade—1st Division—2d Corps). It was recruited in 1863 and again in 1864 and finally mustered out of the United States service at New York on June 30, 1865.

The militia organization, having in the fall of 1861 been again reorganized and recruited, re-entered the United States service for three months on May 26, 1862, and on its return from this service the major part thereof entered the service of the United States for three years, being mustered in on November 17, 1862, as the 69th Regiment, New York National Guard Artillery, which designation was, to avoid confusion, changed on March 19, 1864, to the 182d New York Volunteers and mustered out of the United States service under that designation on July 15, 1865. During its term of service this organization was one of the units in the brigade of New York regiments known as the "Irish Legion," officially designated as the 4th Brigade (afterwards 2d Brigade), 2d Division, 2d Corps, Army of the Potomac.

The militia regiment having been again reorganized, was mustered into the service of the United States on June 25, 1863, for thirty days, and was mustered out on July 25, 1863. Again for the fourth time, the militia organization was, on July 6, 1864, mustered into the United States service for three months and was mustered out on October 6, 1864.

out on October 6, 1864.

The regiment has rendered service to the State during the quarantine riots in 1858: the draft riots, 1863, and the quarantine disturbances in 1892. It was reduced December 6, 1893, to a battalion of five companies, A, C, D, I and K. The battalion was on duty at Brooklyn during the riots in January, 1895. New companies were organized for the battalion as follows: Co. B, June 5, 1894; Co. G, June 10, 1895; Co. E, June 11, 1895, and Co. F, September 7, 1900. The battalion was reconstituted a regiment September 4, 1895. April 28, 1898, the regiment received authority to organize as a twelve-company regiment, preparatory to its entry into the United States service, into which service it was mustered May 19, 1898. as the 69th Regiment, N, Y, Infantry, and mustered out January 31, 1899. The regiment formally re-entered the service of the State on March 15, 1899. The regiment band M were disbanded April 12, 1899; Co. F, February 8, 1900, and Co. B, March 5, 1900. Co. F was reorganized and mustered in May 31, 1900. New Co. B was organized January 4, 1906. New Co. L was mustered in July 14, 1911. Co. M was mustered in December 29, 1913.

The regiment was organized in August. 1852. The American Rifles, a battalion of four companies, formed the nucleus of the regiment. September 21, 1870, the 37th Regiment was consolidated with the 71st Regiment, Cos. E. D. H. A. G. K and B of the 37th Regiment being consolidated with Cos. A. C. D. E. F. G and K of the 71st Regiment, respectively. In 1861 it entered the United States service for three months, from April 19 to July 30; in 1862 it re-entered the same service. May 29, for three months, at the expiration of which it volunteered to remain, and remained until September 1; in 1863 it was mustered into the United States service for thirty days, and served from June 17 to July 22. April 28, 1898, it received authority to organize as a twelve-company regiment, preparatory to its entry into the United States service, into which it was mustered May 10, 1898, as the 71st Regiment, N. Y. Infantry, and mustered out November 15, 1898. December 8, 1898, it was reorganized as a National Guard regiment, composed of ten companies, Cos. L and M being disbanded. Co. M was mustered in January 8, 1907. On November 10, 1908, an additional company was directed to be organized and attached to the 71st Infantry, as Co. L. The regiment was authorized to organize a detachment of mounted scouts by Special Orders No. 66, March 15, 1912.

The regiment has received authority to place silver rings on the lances of its colors, engraved as follows:

In June 1854, the organization of the regiment commenced, Co. D of the 65th Regiment forming the nucleus. Co. B was organized in August, and Companies C and E in September, 1854; Co. A was formed in May, 1855; and these five companies constituted the regiment until February, 1854, when two companies, one of cavalry (R) and one of rifies (L) were organized and attached to it. In 1860 Companies F, G, H and I were organized, and the designation of Co. L was in 1865 changed to Co. K. Co. R was disbanded in 1865, Co. H in 1863; Co. I was consolidated with Co. B in 1870, and in 1882 Companies E and K were disbanded. Co. E was reorganized in 1886, and Co. H in 1891. New Co. I was organized January 4, 1906. In May, 1861, nearly the whole of Companies B, C, D and F joined and formed four companies of the 21st N. Y. Volunteers. June 19, 1863, the regiment was mustered into the service of the United States for thirty days, and mustered out August 3, 1863; it was remustered into the United States service November 16, 1863, for thirty days, and mustered out December 16, 1863. During the War of the Rebellion the regiment furnished to the country nearly 300 officers and over 1.000 men, who received their military instruction while members of it. Companies L and M were authorized by G. O. 64, A. G. O. November 10, 1908, to be mustered in. The regiment was authorized to organize a detachment of mounted scouts by Special Orders No. 89, Aprill 11, 1912. The regiment performed duty at the street car riots, Buffalo, April, 1913, and riots at Depew, March, 1914.

Co. K of this regiment, the 25th Separate Company, is quartered in the State Armory at Tonawanda. It was organized May 29, 1891. Was assigned to 1st Battalion as Co. G, December 22, 1898; and to the 74th Regiment, as Co. K, March 30, 1907. On duty at Tonawanda to suppress a riot in June, 1892; at Buffalo during the riots in August, 1892, at Tonawanda again in June, 1893, during a riot at that place and at the street car riots, Buffal

1898.

The regiment has received authority to place silver rings on the lances of its colors, engraved as follows:

On the National Color.—Gettysburg campaign, 1863; Buffalo, November and December, 1863.

On the State Color .-- Draft riots, 1863; negro riot, 1864; Fenian invasion of Canada, 1866; Hornellsville, 1877; Buffalo, 1892.

This designation was again changed on Oct. 16, 1900, to First Battalion, Naval Militia. The Seventh Division, First Battalion, Naval Militia, was mustered in on January 23, 1912, at New Rochelle. The Eighth Division was mustered in May 29, 1912, with station at Ossining. Engineer Division known as 9th Division was mustered into the service August 18, 1914. An aeronautic section in the 1st Battalion, is authorized by S. O. 191, A. G. O., October 28, 1915.

The Battalion performed duty for the State during the quarantine troubles in September, 1892, and during the Spanish-American War on coast signal service, guarding mine fields at Willet's Point and on patrol duty in New York harbor.

It performed duty for the United States during the Spanish-American War in the U. S. Navy aboard the "Yankee," "Nahant," and other vessels, and in the U. S. Auxiliary Naval Force, aboard various vessels.

The battalion has received authority to place silver rings on the lance of its National Color engraved as follows: "Spanish-American War, 1898," "Santiago de Cuba, June 6, 1898," "Cienfuegos, June 13, 1898," "Giasilda Harbor, June 20, 1898," "Guantanamo, June 7, 1898." July 27, 1907, the Third Separate Division, Naval Militia, was mustered in the service of the State in the City of Buffalo.

January 25, 1916, a separate signal division was organized in the city of Rochester, and on February 14, 1910, the Third Battalion, Naval Militia, was formed of the Second and Third Separate Divisions, and the separate Signal Division, above mentioned, with headquarters in the State armory in the city of Rochester. On June 1, 1912, the First Division was mustered in at Dunkirk, N. Y. The Fourth Division was mustered in at Watertown, N. Y., June 18, 1913. A, separate engineer division, designated the Seventh Division, was mustered in May 12, 1914. The Signal Division is changed to a Line Division by S. O. 138, July 22, 1915.

Note.—The National Guard shall not be less than 10.000 nor more than 18.000 enlisted men in time of peace; in case of war, insurrection, invasion, or imminent danger thereof the Governor has the power to increase the force beyond 18,000 and organize it as the exigencies of the service may require.

The strength of the Naval Militia in time of peace is not to exceed 2,000 men. but in time of war, invasion, insurrection, or imminent danger thereof, the Governor has power to increase it beyond 2,000 enlisted men and organize it as the exigencies of the service may require.

Note.—The staff of the Governor consists of: The Adjutant General, of the grade of Brigadier General; one Military Secretary, of the rank of Major or Lieutenant Commander, and not more than eighteen aides, of whom sixteen shall be appointed by the Governor from the commissioned officers of the active militia m active service, and two may be appointed by the Governor from officers on the reserve list, and their appointment shall operate as a commission as aide-de-camp, but shall not add to the actual grade of the officers so appointed. The officers thus detailed shall not be relieved from duty with their respective organizations except when actually on duty with the Governor. The Military Law provides that The Adjutant General of the State shall have such assistants as may be necessary, and any officer, who is such an assistant, may be rendered supernumerary by the Governor at any time.
