INTERVIEW OF DUANE FRUDD

November 8, 2005

1 Duane Frudd - 11-8-2005

2 MR. CLARK: All right. This is
3 (indiscernible) interview (indiscernible) New York.
4 It is the 8th of November, 2005, approximately two
5 thirty p.m. The interviewers are Wayne Clark and
6 Mike Russert.

7 INTERVIEW

8 BY MR. CLARK:

9 Q. Could you give me your full name,
10 date of birth, and place of birth, please?

11 A. Duane E. Frudd. 3/24/47. Place of
12 birth was Rochester, New York.

13 Q. Okay. What was your educational
14 background prior to entering service?

15 A. High school.

16 Q. All right. Did you enlist or
17 were you drafted?

18 A. Drafted.

19 Q. And what was your -- you were
20 drafted in what branch of service?

21 A. The Army.

22 Q. What was your date entered --
23 that you entered?

24 A. I think it was July 10th, 1966.

2 Q. And your discharge date?

3 A. It would have been the same in
4 '72, six years.

5 Q. Okay. And where did you enter
6 service?

7 A. Rochester.

8 Q. When you entered service, where
9 did you go for your basic training?

10 A. Fort Dix.

11 Q. How long were you there?

12 A. It was eight weeks. And then we
13 were allowed to go home and then I spent eight more
14 weeks there for AI team.

15 Q. Were you given any additional
16 training or?

17 A. Truck driving. That was my MO.

18 Q. Where -- let's see, now where did
19 you -- when did you go to Vietnam?

20 A. We went there December of '66.

21 Q. How long were you there?

22 A. Eighteen months.

23 Q. How -- let's see. All right.

24 How did you get over to Vietnam?

2 A. C-141 from LaGuardia.

3 Q. Did you go with a unit or were
4 you assigned when you got there?

5 A. Just assigned, there was no unit.

6 Q. Okay. What unit were you
7 eventually assigned to?

8 A. 93rd 1st Battalion.

9 Q. Let's see, what were your general
10 duties?

11 A. Constructing building.

12 Q. All right. You told us earlier,
13 how did you end up doing construction?

14 A. My brother built Ridge homes.

15 Were -- they were a prefab house.

16 Q. And you told a little story about
17 how did you --?

18 Something about you -- you could use a hammer?

19 A. Oh, in Vietnam? Oh, like I said,
20 my first day there, I was put on guard duty and
21 this sergeant came up to me and he says, "Is your
22 name Frudd?" And I told myself I've only been in
23 this country one day and I'm in trouble. And he
24 said, "So you're a contractor?" And I said, "No,

2 sir, I'm not." And he said, "Well can you pound a
3 nail?" And I said, "Yes, I can." He says, "Good,
4 you're duty for ninety days." And I stayed there
5 the whole year.

6 Q. What were your duties -- I know
7 construction but -- basically what did you do while
8 you were there?

9 A. On the 93rd placement compound we
10 build officer's quarters. We remodeled the -- the
11 mess hall. We remodeled the interview area for the
12 employees we completely redid that. A bunch of
13 other stuff on the compound.

14 Q. Did you ever have Coast Guard
15 duty or anything?

16 A. No, because we were -- I don't
17 know if we could consider it elite, but we were --
18 we were not -- we were a part of the 93rd battalion
19 but we weren't -- we were just supposedly
20 temporary and so no, we had -- I mean we would have
21 if we were told to. During the Tet Offensive we
22 did. But that was after I came -- came back
23 home -- or came from home back to Vietnam. And
24 that was during the Tet Offensive and everybody had

2 to pull some kind of duty.

3 Q. So, when was the first time that
4 you were under fire?

5 A. Actually when during the Tet
6 Offensive it probably would have been February or
7 March.

8 Q. And --?

9 A. Myself. The actual the TET
10 offensive started January 28th of '68.

11 Q. Right. Were you actually under
12 any ground attack or --?

13 A. Oh, yeah. And I remember the one
14 time distinctly. Well, the -- the one time
15 distinctly that I remember is Pan American did the
16 R and R flights. And during TET offensive we did
17 not allow -- or they did not -- whoever the powers
18 to be, did not allow Vietnamese on base.

19 So, the Vietnamese were basically
20 the ones that cleaned the aircraft and did the
21 cleanup and whatever.

22 When they were allowed, then we
23 were -- after I came home -- after I went back in
24 '68 -- came back in '68 I was assigned to the

2 actual R and R part of it where I actually
3 processed guys going to Bangkok Thailand or
4 wherever they were going on R and R.

5 During the last four months, like
6 in, I think it was February or March, one of the
7 guys went home so I was detailed to go to Seven Air
8 terminal just to make sure a hundred and sixty-two
9 people got out and a hundred and sixty-two people
10 got off. And to take care of VIP's, colonel's and
11 generals and whatever.

12 When -- one day -- well there
13 were two incidents. One I didn't have actual
14 direct -- wasn't directly involved with me but a
15 flight came in about six thirty, seven o'clock
16 every morning from Guam.

17 And this one Pan American -- this
18 one came in and as it was taxing and going to stop
19 I noticed that there was something dripping from
20 the wing. And when we looked underneath it there
21 was a fifty caliber machine gun bullet that had
22 gone through the -- and I tell you, if you could
23 have seen -- if you could have seen the pilots,
24 they were white as a ghost.

2 And there was a Trans World cargo
3 plane that came in right after him and he ran over
4 to that guy and he says, "What is the matter with
5 you?" And he says, "I -- I tried to get you on my
6 radio. He says, "You were being shot at." And he
7 says, "I could see the tracer routes. I told you
8 get up, get up, get up, and there was no response."

9 That was the -- that -- even
10 though it wasn't involved with me but that was my
11 first signs that something was wrong. And then
12 there was oh, probably another -- maybe a month
13 after that, after we got used to be rocketed,
14 whatever.

15 I was walking from the plane --
16 the Pan American plane back to the Sevan Air
17 Terminal and I -- and I heard this zing going over
18 my head and I said, what the heck? Well, it didn't
19 take a rocket scientist again to figure out that
20 somebody was shooting at me.

21 So, by the time I got back to the
22 Sevan Air Terminal, there was about thirty rounds
23 that actually hit the -- the -- actually the Sevan
24 Air Terminal Restaurant. Busted the glass and

2 whatever.

3 We were allowed to carry rifles
4 but we were never -- never authorized to shoot.
5 That was I guess supposedly the air force AAP's
6 whatever that was supposed to take care of gun
7 battle or whatever the unit was that was supposed
8 to be watching over. But they, you know, somehow
9 they didn't do that.

10 That's a frightening experience.

11 The other thing that really --
12 really -- it was undoubtedly printed in my mind
13 was, I used to watch about four times a day the
14 flag draped coffins go from wherever the mortuary
15 was to the C-141's to take them home. And I'll
16 tell you, you don't ever forget that either. I
17 lost three of my high school classmates, and I
18 always wondered when my turn was going to happen,
19 but thank goodness it never did.

20 I tried when I was -- when I was
21 doing R and R flights, I'm crazy. But when I tried
22 to do the R and R flights, I felt guilty because I
23 really wasn't out there quote unquote action." So,
24 I tried when I did my R and R flights to make them

2 as -- as -- I tried to get them to laugh. I would
3 say, all those people going to Hawaii, your flight
4 has been cancelled. You could hear a pin drop.
5 Some of those guys on a special ops. But I would
6 just say, I just want to see if you're awake. If
7 somebody came along that I knew about -- we had a
8 manifest of people that were going on a flight and
9 you'd have to check them off and ask them how much
10 baggage they had and stuff like that. And if they
11 weren't, they'd stay over night and you had to go
12 get a blue card, fill it out and take it to the --
13 the place where they get their laundry and there
14 were stuff from there beds and stuff like that.

15 And when I saw somebody was
16 having some trouble understanding or whatever,
17 there was one guy his name was Lee Black and the
18 poor guy didn't know backwards from forwards. Why
19 he was ever able to kill a man, I'll never know if
20 he killed or not, but anyway, when I saw somebody
21 like that I would take it personally and make sure
22 that they got there -- knew where their -- where
23 their housing was and take them to the company club
24 and you know, try to do the best I could to cheer

2 them up before they went back.

3 In a way, I felt guilty about not
4 being in the combat zone, but on the other hand, I
5 tried my best to make it as nice and pleasurable if
6 that's the word, as I could.

7 BY MR. CLARK: (Cont'g.)

8 Q. Could you describe daily life,
9 your equipment --?

10 A. When I came home -- well actually
11 the eighteen months, with the exception of
12 February, March, and April it was just fatigues.
13 Normal -- never carried a weapon. Just do your --
14 you know, do your construction for the first twelve
15 months. And then after that just do five to six R
16 and R flights a day.

17 Usually the Hawaii flights
18 started at six thirty, seven o'clock. And then the
19 last one was three thirty or four, somewhere around
20 there and you were done. And you would find things
21 to do. And you could either go downtown to Saigon
22 or they had movies.

23 Tonk Sun Nook air base was -- air
24 force was the best air force always had the best of

2 everything. They had the best -- I play
3 basketball, and they had the best basketball courts
4 and they had the best food. So, we would go
5 over -- some of us guys when we did earlier on our
6 flights would get out at five or five thirty and
7 would go over to the air force mess hall because
8 they had really good food.

9 I never -- except for -- for
10 the -- I never had C- rations. Usually it was
11 cooked you know, whatever and that's one thing I
12 will say about the army. When they did R and R, we
13 tried to make things available to them that they
14 didn't have in the field. You know. I was proud
15 of that. I was -- I was proud of that.

16 MR. RUSSERT: When you were
17 there, were they allowing people to live off base?

18 MR. FRUDD: Oh, yeah. Oh yes.

19 MR. RUSSERT: So you could
20 actually live inside?

21 MR. FRUDD: Absolutely.

22 Absolutely. I'll tell you one story if I can. The
23 first day I was there -- well actually, I didn't --
24 I didn't get to several -- until about six or seven

2 days after I was supposed to be there. The C-141
3 that we went over on had air troubles so we stopped
4 in Tokyo, Japan, so we spent about -- there was
5 about I don't know, a hundred of us guys or
6 whatever spent at least three to five days in -- in
7 Japan. And so there was five of us that decided
8 we're going to be real macho people. We're never
9 going to be in Japan again.

10 So we went to downtown Tokyo. We
11 went into this restaurant and ordered spaghetti.
12 And I kid you not there was -- there was a
13 wiggly -- what do you it -- cockroach that were
14 climbing up the walls and that was normal for them.
15 It wasn't for us. I think we paid for our food and
16 left.

17 But anyway, we got to sing
18 Christmas -- Christmas carols with all the
19 Japanese -- Salvation Army and I thought that was
20 cool. So I never got to -- I never go to Tonk San
21 Nuit I guess it was after Christmas of -- of '66.

22 But the first day that I was
23 there, I think it was a Sunday afternoon. This guy
24 goes, come on, I want to take you downtown Saigon.

2 So he took me down there and there was this -- I
3 guess it was a palace. Anyway there was like a
4 flower wake or something.

5 Anyway, he said watch this, about
6 twelve o'clock or whatever it was, there was
7 thirteen Buddhist monks I guess they were and they
8 marched around thing about five, six, seven, eight,
9 nine, ten times. And then the twelfth time I think
10 it was, I can't remember, they all took out a vile
11 and one went in the middle, put a vile of something
12 on this poor guys head. And I said what the heck
13 is going on?

14 And the next time they all threw
15 a match on him and burned him. Right there. I
16 said don't you ever do that to me again. Don't
17 ever do that to me again. That was terrible. It
18 was actually -- but you see, one thing that we have
19 to -- I hope to -- when you don't have a value of
20 life, it's meaningless. Absolutely meaningless.
21 And we're finding it out in Iraq and we did find
22 out in Vietnam.

23 Quite honestly, I think
24 fifty-eight thousand guys lost their lives for

2 nothing. For absolutely nothing. We could have
3 ended that war in one day. All we would have had
4 to say is listen guys, you have twenty-four hours.
5 If you don't cut it out I'm going to nuke you. And
6 we didn't do it. We didn't do it. We spent heaven
7 knows how many years over there. And fifty-eight
8 thousand guys, for nothing. For absolutely
9 nothing. Would I do it again? Absolutely.

10 I would die for my country. I
11 feel sorry for those people who gave draft dodgers
12 and whatever because they -- someday they're going
13 to be accountable for that. You don't do that.
14 You defend your country because freedom is worth
15 everything. And that's not just me talking,
16 it's -- I believe it. I really believe it.

17 Q. Were you aware of any war
18 protests while you were there?

19 A. Absolutely. Absolutely.

20 Q. And how did you feel about?

21 A. Well, it was terrible. I thought
22 it was unbelievable. And you know, I love my
23 country, I really do. But I'll tell you I wouldn't
24 be a politician for all the tea in China because

2 number one, I don't know how Johnson could have
3 lived with himself. I don't know how Westmoreland
4 could have lived with himself. Maybe I'm not
5 supposed to say that.

6 But -- but -- but if we had
7 killed as many guys as we said that we had, there
8 would have been nobody left. There would be nobody
9 left. But when -- but when -- when you've got
10 congressmen who are protesting and saying we can't
11 do this, we can't do that and yet they own the
12 stock in Winchester orf McDonald Douglas, Northrop
13 that are making these weapons. That's kind of two
14 faced. And then to top that all off, you've got
15 people who -- who basically didn't want to die.
16 They didn't want to be inconvenienced with two
17 years of service with their life for their country.

18 Hey, if you can't do that, get
19 the heck out. That's the way I look at it. If
20 somebody were to come up to me and say would you be
21 willing to go to Iraq? In a minute. Because at
22 least we're fighting for something over there. If
23 we don't stop that war over there, they're coming
24 over here, and heaven help us if they do.

2 We're -- we're going to be in for
3 some things that I'm afraid that we're never going
4 to be able to get out of. We really are. And
5 that's the same way with -- what they're doing --
6 if we would have gone with the -- with the skills
7 and the knowledge we had we could have had busted
8 their tunnel system which was unbelievable. Why
9 didn't we anticipate that? And if we did, why
10 didn't we do something about it?

11 I mean while I am on that, they
12 had intricate tunnel systems. I don't know we had
13 corridors. Where were we? Where were we? You
14 know, and it created jobs and that's all I can say
15 for being in Vietnam. It created jobs and made
16 somebody rich. And to me it's wrong. It's
17 definitely wrong.

18 If -- if you're going over to win
19 or to free some depressed people or oppressed
20 people, that's another thing. To go over to a
21 country which could care less whether were there or
22 not.

23 I mean, here we are, fighting for
24 freedom for these people and they're killing us.

2 There's something wrong with the picture.

3 Something wrong. But again, and I think it all

4 boils down to the fact that to die for your country

5 I don't think so. You know, we don't live like

6 that.

7 I value life more now than I ever

8 have before because I realize how fragile it is.

9 You're here one day and gone the next.

10 MR. CLARK: One -- one other

11 question how did you think about what Jane Fonda

12 did, how did you deal with that?

13 MR. FRUDD: Jane Fonda. I think

14 she's a good Russian. I think she should live in

15 Russia. But I think that she should -- and let me

16 tell you something else, again, maybe I'm not

17 supposed to say this. But it really irritates me.

18 My wife and I went shopping -- I can't remember

19 it's TFC or Penny's or wherever it was. That we

20 were looking at flannel shirts and it said, "Made

21 in Vietnam." I said, women don't you ever -- don't

22 you ever bring anything into this house that has

23 that name on it. I can't believe that our country

24 would back people that killed us. Just like Japan.

2 What is wrong with us?

3 You know, I'm over for a -- for
4 entrepreneurship and -- and making as much money as
5 you want to. But mother of Mary when you kill
6 fifty-eight thousand of us guys and -- it's like
7 again slapping us in the face and saying well, it
8 wasn't worth it. Well you know what? Yeah it was.

9 Like I said, three of my
10 classmates never made it home. And -- and watching
11 those stupid -- well not stupid -- those coffins
12 every single day for seven or eight months, again,
13 it does something to you. Maybe you're not killing
14 somebody but let me tell you, you might as well be
15 because you watch it every single day.

16 The first year I was there, it
17 was nothing. The -- the first day I was back --.
18 It was funny, we had double bunking in our housing.
19 And the guy above me, I can still see him, his name
20 was Robert Cochran. And I -- I never even heard of
21 a Hubbell. And it was so close, you could hear it
22 leave the tubes and by the time I got on the floor
23 with the mattress over my face, the guy on the top
24 was already down there.

2 But let me tell you something,
3 those six foot giant Russian rockets were worse
4 than any thunder and lightening you ever heard of.
5 And when you got up -- and they were always trying
6 to get Westmoreland we used to call it the wag
7 mail, it was made -- did you ever see them?

8 MR. CLARK: No.

9 MR. FRUDD: Well, it was made
10 specifically for him, by the whole nine yards. And
11 they -- they used -- they had -- they tried to get
12 it him but you were -- they were throwing six or
13 seven or eight or nine rounds or whatever. And you
14 go out and you see fire or they would hit something
15 or whatever. And you -- again hear the Wosh sky
16 hawks or whatever they use, they screen them out --
17 and whatever never stopped. Never stopped.

18 That was something my -- that
19 was -- it was something I would hope my kids never
20 have to do but I would hope that they would be
21 patriotic enough to do what the government told
22 them to do.

23 Because again, if you -- if you
24 enjoy living in this country, somebody died for

1 Duane Frudd - 11-8-2005

2 you, why shouldn't you return the favor. Nobody
3 wants to die. But sooner or later we're all going
4 to. But it is all relative.

5 MR. CLARK: How did you feel
6 about your immediate officers?

7 MR. FRUDD: Fine. We had a riot.
8 Like I said, there were some really, really good
9 times. The officer's -- the only one bad
10 officer -- and he really wasn't bad, he just didn't
11 know any better. We had one major that came in --
12 the Captain that was in charge of the one 780 to
13 replace the R and R, went back home. So they sent
14 this R.O.T.C. Major over.

15 On the second or third night he
16 was there we got rocketed. And he made us fill
17 sandbags for three nights because we didn't go
18 screaming out running to get out rifles. Well,
19 anybody in their right mind, I think, will know
20 enough to know that if you're being rocketed, you
21 don't try and go find your weapon. If you don't
22 got your weapon with you, you stay still until the
23 thing is over then you go get it.

24 But I think they sent him -- they

2 complained to the adjutant General. And he didn't
3 make us do that again.

4 But that's any -- after that he
5 was really nice. No, I can't say that the officers
6 that I had were nothing but gentlemen. And they
7 took their job very serious.

8 It was more casual over there. I
9 mean, every single officer that you see, you didn't
10 have to salute him fifteen times a day. They were
11 part of you. They would have a -- they would go to
12 the club with you. They would share anything that
13 they had. Like, I can't say that any of the
14 people -- there were some bad people there were
15 some good people, but you hung around the good
16 people or you hung around the bad people.

17 But so those guys I still see
18 their faces. Carl Paul he was the craziest person
19 I have ever met in my life and if I can ever find
20 him again -- he was crazy. But he was so much fun.
21 So much fun.

22 We had a more relaxed -- and
23 again, that's probably why I feel a little bit
24 guilty. We had it more relaxed where we were

2 because we were supposed to be the security, but.

3 They had a -- they had a eighteen
4 hole golf course I think it was and by the time the
5 offense was done you can put and get a hole. They
6 had a horse track and I believe there was nothing
7 left of that after -- after they got through
8 bombing it.

9 There was -- we would have
10 company parties, enough to make the people -- the
11 people stayed overnight, relaxing. A lot of times
12 we would have movies that we would show. A couple
13 of months I ran the projector.

14 But you can do little things to
15 make their lives a little bit more comfortable. If
16 you were serious all the time, which I'm not, but
17 if I were, I don't think I would have made it. I
18 think you've got to have some sense of humor to
19 keep your wits about you.

20 If you took everything that you
21 saw, personable, or personal you're made a nut.
22 You may be in a nut house.

23 I remember, I came home July
24 10th, I think it was. And the week before, July

2 4th, they -- all around the perimeter they shot off
3 blue -- blue, yellow, and red flares. I'm thinking
4 you guys, what are you doing? We've only got six
5 days in the country, why are you doing that?

6 Luckily, we weren't rocketed but
7 there was -- you had to have fun. I mean you had
8 to. I really -- I hand it to those guys in the
9 field. I really do. You never make friends out
10 there because they're here today, gone tomorrow.
11 Where we -- I made friends, that even though I
12 don't have contact with them, I'll never forget.
13 Never forget. Because you built that bond you know
14 exactly what you're supposed to do and how you're
15 supposed to do it, and you react because the other
16 guy know exactly when he or she is supposed to do.

17 If -- if -- if I didn't learn
18 anything else from the army, I think -- well, I did
19 learn a lot of things from the army but one, I came
20 from like I said a rural community where nothing
21 ever happened. And to be thrown into a
22 situation -- especially at Fort Dix New Jersey,
23 where you never heard the words that were used on
24 us. You were never called a scum bag. You were

2 never in the face with somebody telling you that
3 you're a jerk, or you're worthless, or whatever.

4 But you know, the discipline that
5 you learn from that is what keeps you going when
6 the bad times come. If you get -- you be scared
7 and you wouldn't know what to do, you'd be the
8 first one. I always told my company commander that
9 the only way that Charlie was ever going to get me
10 was in the back running. I think I filled sandbag
11 for three nights after that. No, I'm kidding.
12 I -- no, I'm kidding. Yeah, I had fun. Yeah, I
13 did.

14 Would I do it again? Yeah.
15 Yeah, I would do it again in a minute.

16 BY MR. RUSSERT:

17 Q. What were race relationships
18 within your unit?

19 A. Race?

20 Q. Yes.

21 A. No.

22 Q. Any problems?

23 A. No. No. Again, you had good
24 people, you had your bad people. I'd say a lot --

2 a lot of the guys that were in our unit, they had a
3 choice, Vietnam or jail. But, I know two guys
4 specifically that had that choice. And I'll tell
5 you what, they were some of the nicest people I had
6 ever met in my life. Would I do that? No. But
7 hey, I am not a bit better than anybody else. They
8 did their job and one of them got shot in the head
9 when -- a direct hit. It must have been their turn
10 to get it.

11 The one thing that was bad about
12 that was is Vietnamese worked right during the day
13 fought at night. So, they had exact -- I mean this
14 General, got a direct hit. How did they get that?
15 You know? And that's not -- I'll never understand
16 why you would hire or have somebody work for you
17 that's going to kill you. It doesn't make any
18 sense. But that's the way it was.

19 Q. What about Vietnamese people in
20 general?

21 A. The Vietnamese people, I would
22 say there's probably good Vietnamese. But I
23 wouldn't trust them past my nose. I think they're
24 very lazy. I think they're very -- they're users.

2 They were our friends during the day and they
3 killed us at night. I don't they valued at all
4 what we were there for. I guess we were there for
5 free elections but the only one on the ballot was
6 Woodcock Aid so I question that too.

7 But anyway, there was -- we had some good
8 relationships with the Vietnamese that would help
9 us on the -- in the -- in the (indiscernible). And
10 I'm sure that there are good Vietnamese people.
11 But I think they're -- being afraid of Vietcong.
12 They're having any loyalty to us.

13 Would I -- would I cross the
14 street if some Vietnamese were coming down the
15 other side? No. Would I be friendly to them if
16 they -- if they wanted a handshake or a hug or
17 wanted a cup of coffee or take them out for a meal
18 or whatever? Absolutely. I would do it. Do I
19 respect them? Absolutely not.

20 MR. CLARK: Do you have any
21 desire to go back?

22 MR. FRUDD: Absolutely.
23 Absolutely. I mean this time for the right
24 reasons. Yes. Because communism, I don't care who

2 you are, communism -- let me give an illustration

3 I spent a little bit of time at
4 Phon Bien. And one of the duties I had to was
5 (indiscernible) go in the middle of the field of
6 the (indiscernible) where there was a -- where a
7 refugee -- where soldiers that were killed from the
8 Vietnamese families lived that were up north. And
9 there was about three or four hundred people.

10 And there was a little girl, her
11 name was Kim Shi. I can still see her. She haunts
12 me. Not every night, but she haunts me. Me and my
13 wife talk about it. Her name was Kim Shi, she was
14 two years old. And she was one of the most loving,
15 lovable little girls that you ever met. And her
16 mother -- her husband was a lieutenant in the army
17 and he was killed up north.

18 And she begged me, she begged me,
19 please take her home with you. Please take her
20 home with you. When that came -- when I left to
21 spend thirty days home here in '67, Christmas of
22 '67, I came back Tet. And they had -- the Vietcong
23 had come in and they had killed all three hundred
24 of those people, including that little girl. You

2 know, thinking to myself, you know, what is wrong
3 with people?

4 What is wrong with people? Why
5 can't you live in peace? Just like (indiscernible)
6 you know, in California? Why did you have to do
7 that? To prove a point? Why did you have to do
8 that?

9 I -- the only -- your thing --
10 did you bring anything home from Vietnam? I don't
11 want to have to remember that country when I was
12 over there, anyway, except I did bring a picture of
13 the home of that little girl. I don't know where
14 it is now but she haunts me. She -- she haunts me.

15 If I could have, I would have in
16 a minute. In a minute I would have taken her.

17 MR. CLARK: What do you think are
18 some of the experiences that perhaps, you
19 mentioning her, besides her, that made the greatest
20 impression on you?

21 MR. FRUDD: The country was
22 beautiful. It had beautiful birds. It had big
23 snakes. One of the times that we had an armful
24 like this but this one guy came into the compound

2 and I kid you not, this is -- the gospel truth. He
3 had about a thirty foot boa constrictor and the
4 head of that snake was about as big as a softball.

5 And I said, what in the world are
6 you going to do with that snake? He said, I'm
7 taking it to Hawaii, my wife is going to take it
8 home. I said you've got to be kidding me? He said
9 no, I'm going to do it.

10 When the Pam Am stewardess's
11 found out that there was going to be a thirty foot
12 boa constrictor on the air plane they said that
13 this plane is not leaving. You are not putting
14 that -- we babysat a thirty foot boa constrictor.
15 The Vietnamese had made a cage for that thing. And
16 when you talk about rats, in Vietnam they're big as
17 cats and they caught one. And I'll never forget
18 the thing tormented that boa constrictor and just
19 tormented the daylights out of it and then all of a
20 sudden, one move, and the thing was gone.

21 But the -- the look on the Pan
22 American stewardess's face when they said we're
23 going to have a thirty foot boa constrictor. Oh
24 it's going to be all crated up. No, it's not.

2 It's not going to be on the plane.

3 That -- that I will never forget.

4 I don't know, you get -- there's a lot of things
5 that you remember, a lot of good things that you
6 remember. There's a lot of bad things that you
7 remember. But the good things are -- where in the
8 world would you ever in your lifetime get a chance
9 to go to Vietnam? I didn't even know what the
10 country -- the name of the country. That's my --
11 and on my way there I got to visit Tokyo. I'll
12 never go there in my life.

13 The country was beautiful,
14 beautiful. Unbelievable birds, they were like --
15 like game hens, roosters, and then they had bright
16 orange and bright red, bright greens, and they
17 could fly.

18 Those are the things that you
19 remember. Saigon, I don't want to remember.
20 Saigon was dirty, filthy. There was no sanitation.
21 You could -- we were three miles I think from the
22 fish market. You could smell those carp they
23 caught up in the Mekong River they hung for about
24 thirty days and they would be so bloated they'd

2 explode. You'd stay away from that place.

3 The only places that I was ever
4 in, in the Vietnam was Ton Son Nuit. I never went
5 on R and R because I never felt that I was -- I
6 didn't want to because I felt guilty. I didn't --
7 you know, I wasn't killing anybody. I didn't think
8 I deserved to go.

9 The other thing is, the
10 stewardess's out of Pam American flights, a lot
11 would make repetitious flights.

12 There used to be a race to the --
13 to the ones that came up from Hawaii because they
14 had -- and we were used to drinking vegetable milk.
15 And anyway, and ice cream.

16 The other thing that I remember
17 is just before I left, they had started Australian
18 flights Quanta I think it was.

19 This is the truth. I kid you
20 not. They had a cutting -- a ribbon cutting
21 ceremony and all this kind of God off the wall
22 stuff and we put the first a hundred and sixty-two
23 people on and -- maybe I shouldn't say this but
24 anyhow, a hundred and sixty-two people on and one

2 stewardess and I love to hear Australians talk.

3 Oh, I love to hear them talk.

4 But anyway, he came up to me and
5 says, would do us a favor? Would you make a
6 hundred and sixty-two names and put them -- put
7 them in a hat. And I'm need a piece of this paper
8 and I said, yeah, but what are you going to use it
9 for? Never mind, I'll tell you.

10 So, I made a hundred and
11 sixty-two, after I got permission from my company
12 commander by the way. And she said okay, now I
13 want you to seven -- just draw seven numbers.

14 So, I drew. And those seven
15 people got to be escorted by the stewardess's for
16 the night in Australia, and I thought that was kind
17 of interesting. Not that I condone that kind of
18 stuff but hey, those guys deserve anything that
19 they could get. And again, if you tried to make
20 their lives a little bit more comfortable, that was
21 my job.

22 And when I -- when I was over
23 there, that's exactly what I tried to do. I
24 would -- I can still remember the locale that I

2 used to say when -- when you would come on our
3 flight or transportation to some place or whatever
4 and there was a PA system and I would pretend
5 sometimes that I was from Texas. And I would
6 change my voice and -- and -- and whatever.

7 And you'd be surprised at the
8 number of people that would come and say they
9 appreciated it. Put a little humor in. I mean,
10 even if you just said may I have your attention
11 please? What was this -- the -- ya' all personnel
12 manifest on today on flight to Texas. All senior
13 officers and CO's are -- go to the front of the
14 line. And have your boarding pass out and please
15 show it to the man at the gate.

16 Well, you know, duh. But if you
17 put a little humor in it and -- and made it kind of
18 like, you know, you go through enough stress you
19 try to stay alive. Make it a little bit easier,
20 and that's what I tried to do. And really honest
21 with you.

22 MR. RUSSERT: Did you get to see
23 any U.S.O shows while you were over there?

24 MR. FRUDD: Oh, yeah. One of

2 them I did was -- was -- who was it -- Nancy
3 Sinatra. Can you imagine? Can you imagine,
4 there's ten thousand GI's. They probably haven't
5 seen a woman like that in probably over a year and
6 she comes out in this white mini skirt and orange
7 boots. And I'm thinking, this gal has either got
8 to be crazy or she has no feeling whatsoever.

9 And I tell you, those guys were
10 wild. I mean they went wild. They saw her -- I
11 saw Martha Ray. My God, I can't remember, there
12 must have been someone else but we used to have
13 some local bands in the club. Some of the bands
14 were pretty good that were singing rock and roll
15 songs.

16 And again, like I said we had
17 company parties, we would invite anybody on the
18 compound to come in and a lot of them were
19 grateful. And you know, we didn't have a compound
20 big enough to have a baseball field. Next door
21 again, the air force had a -- had a basketball
22 court so I spent a lot of my time playing
23 basketball.

24 There was this one guy in the

1 Duane Frudd - 11-8-2005

2 kitchen he had a contract signed with the Harlem
3 Globe Trotters. That guy could shoot from anywhere
4 in the court. Anywhere in the court and he would
5 make it without even looking at it. And I don't
6 know if he ever made it but what a waste of talent.

7 And you talk about nice guys --
8 oh, I did meet Clint Walker. Yes. He came over on
9 some flight and I didn't even know who he was. But
10 here's this big monstrous guy. I know that guy. I
11 saw him on TV. And you know, he was Jackson --
12 what's his -- I can't remember. Colored guy.

13 MR. RUSSERT: Reggie Jackson?

14 MR. FRUDD: No, not Reggie -- no
15 a singer. But anyway, he was there was it Michael
16 Jackson.

17 MR. RUSSERT: Did --.

18 MR. FRUDD: It will come to me.
19 But anyway, I didn't go see him. But if you wanted
20 to keep yourself busy there were certainly plenty
21 of things to do.

22 I spent a lot of my time like I
23 said -- there'd be some people that I would know
24 from this area that would come back through. And I

2 would spend a lot of time with them. And again, if
3 somebody I could see was having trouble either
4 writing their name or filling out a card or
5 whatever, after, I would just say to the guy, you
6 know, stay after. And I would help him fill out
7 paperwork. Get it so they could do whatever they
8 had to do.

9 MR. CLARK: When did you leave
10 Vietnam?

11 MR. FRUDD: July -- I think July
12 10th of '68.

13 BY MR. RUSSERT:

14 Q. Okay. Now, you were in the
15 service until '72. What did you do between '68 and
16 '72?

17 A. Okay. '68 -- well, '68 to '70 we
18 were supposed to be on active -- active reserve.
19 But one year after Vietnam I was waived. The other
20 two I was active because you have to spend six
21 years.

22 Q. Did you ever -- did you make use
23 of any GI bills (indiscernible) at all?

24 A. No. The only thing I'm getting

2 right now is a hundred and twelve dollars I think
3 it is for diabetes which they say I got when I was
4 in the service. No, I never did.

5 Q. Okay.

6 A. Agent orange. That's another
7 story. We were at a basketball court one night and
8 all of a sudden this cloud of something came over
9 us and I kid you not, it literally burned the hair
10 out of your nose. It watered your eyes and you
11 could tell it was something coming of a chemical.
12 It was awful.

13 My -- I had a daughter who was
14 born with a tumor on the liver the size of an
15 orange, which didn't have anything -- not
16 necessarily, an orange takes up, as I understand it
17 agent orange has dioxin in it. Dioxin attacks the
18 lymph node, the blood system.

19 The tumor on the liver was the
20 size of an orange and it would have been the size
21 of a basketball. She had teeth that had no roots.
22 She had no pigment in her eyes, the retinas of her
23 eyes. I went to Erie VA hospital to have an agent
24 orange test and I had a rash on my feet which they

2 said was not -- not -- didn't have anything to do
3 with it.

4 But I was concerned about my
5 daughter. She went to Children's Hospital in
6 Buffalo. She was not expected to live. And they
7 operated on her and she did -- twenty-two days she
8 was there and we literally had to force feed her
9 and whatever. But I think she's definitely going
10 to have some problems.

11 But it was two days -- two weeks
12 before she had hers, there was another one and the
13 guy's name was Doctor Chewy. He said that's the
14 only second one he'd ever seen. And I would have
15 loved to know if that guy was ever in the military.
16 I really honestly don't know.

17 Was I looking for anything?
18 Absolutely not, except giving some information to
19 the people that do whatever they did.

20 I've got one -- I'm not one --
21 even though I shouldn't say this, but I'm not one
22 to look for free handouts. If you did something
23 wrong and you don't live up to it, that's your
24 problem, don't worry about it.

2 These stuff on us, the thing that
3 irritates me the most is number one, we were there
4 for no reason, as far as I can see. But number
5 two, why not using something if you use it? I
6 don't like that. I'm not going to say that I'm a
7 saint but if you do something -- if I do something
8 wrong, I can't stand there until I make it right.
9 That's my God given thing that my Christian parents
10 taught me.

11 Now, you know everybody has, this
12 is a subject of our country. Duh. I mean if you
13 were there, you'd know. Why are they all of a
14 sudden saying it is now? Of course, I think they
15 got some kind -- but by the time the lawyers and
16 whatever got their hands on it, I guess there was
17 not a whole lot left.

18 But, as far as I'm concerned what
19 the military does with your life for two years is
20 their business. You are owe it to this country to
21 be patriotic enough to do whatever you have to do.
22 If I do that however, then they should respect me
23 enough to be honest and tell me say, yeah, we did
24 use it.

1 Duane Frudd - 11-8-2005

2 What -- what can I do about it
3 now? Except keep after them I guess. You know,
4 hey that's life. Nobody has guarantees.

5 MR. CLARK: Did you join any
6 Veterans Organizations after?

7 MR. FRUDD: No. No. I got a
8 honorary membership to the American Legion in
9 Rockland, New York when I was in Vietnam. No,
10 because -- again, I was brought up in a very
11 religious home. Those places don't do anything.
12 Now, I learn better. I know better.

13 The VA -- or the VFW keeps on
14 bugging me to join them but I don't really have
15 time number one. I don't have the money. I'm on
16 disability and I wouldn't feel right you know, just
17 blowing money that I don't have. Which I don't
18 have anyway, but -- and no I never -- never did.

19 MR. CLARK: Did you stay in
20 contact with anyone that you served with at all?

21 MR. FRUDD: No. No. Well, see,
22 I went to high school up near Rochester. So the
23 guys that I knew up there, live too far away. I've
24 got guys around here that in fact I have a

1 Duane Frudd - 11-8-2005
2 brother-in-law that spent a little -- a little time
3 over there. But I've got a lot of friends that
4 were over there. But I -- and probably was the
5 same time but I went through Rochester, they went
6 through Fredonia.

7 MR. CLARK: How do you think your
8 time in the service changed or had any factor in
9 your life?

10 MR. FRUDD: Drastically. Again,
11 you're coming from a very rural Christian home
12 where you don't do anything wrong and you don't --
13 you know, you don't step out of line.

14 It's a -- it's a eye opener to
15 find out what the world is like and you better grow
16 up in a hurry because if you don't, soon you're
17 going to be among the missing.

18 The basic training really makes
19 you feel like you're absolutely worthless piece of
20 candy. But again, they have the reasons for doing
21 that. If you're not disciplined enough to follow
22 orders and do what you're taught to do, then when
23 you get to places like Vietnam you're going to be
24 in deep trouble. Very deep trouble.

1 Duane Frudd - 11-8-2005

2 It has -- it has opened my eyes
3 to realize how fragile life is. And it also has
4 made me believe that the creator takes care of you
5 no matter where you are. I -- I am totally
6 convinced that had it not been for that sergeant
7 that came up to me and asked me if I could build --
8 or pound a nail, I probably would be dead and not
9 talking to you.

10 I -- I absolutely strongly
11 believe that it was -- that was somebody else's
12 intentions, not mine. For whatever reason, I don't
13 know but you -- you -- you value life a lot more.
14 And -- and you also realize that a country that you
15 live in, even though we got problems, is a heck of
16 a lot better than living anywhere else. A heck of
17 a lot better.

18 You can -- you can talk -- you
19 can complain, you can -- for something like today.
20 You don't see garbage all over like you did over
21 there. Basically the people that you work with are
22 the people that you're in contact with you choose
23 to be their friends or whatever.

24 Although you didn't -- you can

1 Duane Frudd - 11-8-2005

2 make some good friends that are long lasting. You
3 can't remember names all the time but you can
4 remember faces and something will come out to
5 remind you of some of that -- that -- that you did
6 over there.

7 I think there was a couple --
8 like I said, there are some positive things and
9 then negative things and that anti-protesters
10 certainly didn't help the situation.

11 When you're over there giving
12 your life for whatever reason, you certainly don't
13 want to hear about somebody complaining about their
14 rights or whatever. You know, when it comes right
15 down to it, you really don't have any rights.

16 It's -- it's something that's
17 given to you. It's not something that you earn.
18 And you better be appreciative and -- and keep a
19 hold of it for as long as you can.

20 MR. RUSSERT: Okay. Thank you
21 very much for the interview.


