New York in the World War One

The place to start is with the New York State Archives' <u>New York State Adjutant</u> <u>General's Office Abstracts of World War I Military Service</u>. This will allow you to search by name. Another collection of note is the <u>New York State Education Department</u> <u>Division of Archives and History World War I Veterans' Service Data and Photographs</u>. These are available on Ancestry.com. Please note that New York State residents have <u>free access to parts of Ancestry.com</u>

Ancestry.com also has another database, U.S., Army Transport Service Arriving and Departing Passenger Lists, 1910-1939.

In addition to Ancestry.com is a related site, <u>Fold3</u>. Fold3 is a genealogy website that specializes in military records. If you have an All Access membership to ancestry you also get membership to Fold3.

Please note that, if you cannot readily find information as to a particular soldier, the best advice is for you to look for information related to the specific unit the soldier served in. Another possibility is searching for the unit's commanders, who may have written memoirs or books about the war.

In addition to the above places a good place to search is <u>WorldCat</u>. WorldCat is a database of thousands of library catalogs. This is more of a discovery database since you will not be able to borrow these directly.

You might also be able to find unit histories at The Internet Archive.

Other possible resources are the local (to the solider/unit) historical societies and public libraries.
