New York in the World War Two

Please note that on 12 July 1973 a <u>fire destroyed most of the World War Two</u> <u>records</u>. Although many records were burned most were damaged by water. Efforts to salvage these records are ongoing. This means that there is a very good chance that you will not be able to find personnel records for the soldier you are looking for. It is always a good idea to check by submitting <u>Standard Form 180</u>. As the efforts to restore these records continue it may be worthwhile to re-submit SF 180 again after a few years.

Please note that, if you cannot readily find information as to a particular soldier, the best advice is for you to look for information related to the specific unit the soldier served in. Another possibility is searching for the unit's commanders, who may have written memoirs or books about the war.

In addition to the above places a good place to search is <u>WorldCat</u>. WorldCat is a database of thousands of library catalogs. This is more of a discovery database since you will not be able to borrow these directly.

Other possible resources are the local (to the solider/unit) historical societies and public libraries. Local newspapers also had many "local interest" stories about men and women when they enlisted, were promoted, died, etc.
