





"Rose of Washington" to Ritie (Maria) Van Wagonen by Charles Scriber (July 1861)⁶⁶





The Spent Victory.

Now that the whirl of the great excitament has passed, people can have time to look matters squaraly in the face, and consides what is next to be done. No nation that has existed was ever given over to such a day of rejoiding as was witnessed throughout the length and brandth of this land yesterday. And the great results osiebrated by these rejoiding justified all the extravagant demonstrations with which the people were chargable yesterday.

Once only has this nation experienced : similar occasion for gratification. the news of the surrender of Cornwallia on the 19th of October, 1781, was wafted over the land, it was met with such demonstrations of joy as the great population was calculated to call forth. The throca of a Nation, struggling for birth, had terminated. A new nation had been born into the world. The surrender of Lee's army guarantees that nation, brought into the world after such a night of trial-a perpetual existence. Thes, three millions of heman voices went up in gratitude and praise to Almighty God for the great deliverance. Now ten times three millious of FREE men-for they are all free now. make the Union resonant over the fact that the great fabric of human liberty, for which Washington fought, for which Jeffereon struggled-and for which our Revolutionary sires poured out their blood like a deluge, is to stand for ages yet an-

The people of this nation have not yet had time to fully realize the vast larges in the contest which we may now consider no happily terminated. It is the end of a long and devastating war, which has drawn heavily upon the resources of the nation, and which has slain thousands and tens of thousands of bruve people. That this wante is to end, is alone, cause for all the jay which has been expressed. But this is not a tithe of the great good which the success of the Union arms guarantees to the people of this country. The shackles from four millions of human beings have been severed at a blow. The thought makes one almost delirious gith its contemplation. A RACE is emaneipated! But this is not all. Many more millions of human beings hitherto only nominally free, are elevated in the scale of human being. The degradation placed upon labur by the system of unrequited toil is removed, and the road is open to intelligence and respectability to all the people of the South. Free Labor and Free Schools may now do their work. Of all men of this nation none have so great oceasion to rejoice over the triumph of the Government, as the people of the South, and the writte people most of all. The MASTERS themselves are no exception to the rule.

The pathway of this nation to future greatness is now anobarrooted. There is no contamplating the future prosperity of this republic, if our future policy shall prove ds as wise in peace as we have been powerful in war. We have shown to the world, and to our enemies, especially, how terribis we may be when in a state of hostility. It is settled that our national existence will not be again threatened by traitors, or any internal forces. All that is passed. With the exhibition of power that we have made, it is not likely that any foreign ustion, without the most fingrant proroustion, will seek to messure strength with us-The time has now arrived " when the recourses of statesmanship" should be brought into the fellost requisition to restore barmony, relieve the country from the embarrasments brought upon it by a long and exhandling war, to caltivate and encourage all the arts of peace, and to develope and Instor every element of great national strength and prosperity which we as a people so abundantly possess.


HARRISON'S LANDING .- " In former cars, and in the school books of our Harrisons Landing was known as Berkeley. It is the birth place of President Harrison, and was for years the residence of his fath-or, Benjamin Harrison a conspioned pairiot of the Revolution. The old house is still standing. It is an old-fashioned edifice, constructed of brick in the year 1720, and surrounded by a groupe of poplars lutermingled with other trees. It was used as a hospital upon McClellan's retreat, and was subjected to a severe shelling from the enemy's batteries nonwer annes River. The roof and front of the building show mark of rebel canon balls. Upwards of one thousand of our soldiers are believed to have died of wounds and disease in this house after our army arrived at the Land ing, and it is said to be almost impossible to dig down the usual depth of z grave anywhere within the space of soveral acre without finding the remains of some our departed horses. In looking at this colebrated house, so opulout in historica associations, we are reminded of an incident in the life of its founder, Becjamii Harrison, which is not without interest in showing the contrast between the tempe of the Southern statesmen of his and tha of our own day.

In the Continental Congress of 1775 is was the wish of all the Southern member that Mr. Harrison should be elected to the Presidency of the Congress; but as Joh Hansoock of Massachusetts, had been now tioned. Mr. Harrison, to avoid any sectional jealousy or unkindness of feelin between the Northern and Southern deligates at so momentions a crisis, with soble self denial and generosity, relinquished his own claims and inested on the election of Mr. Hansoock, who accordingly we chosen unanimously."



Rapid City, Dahota, and all very busy. My case seemed trifling when compared to many others, and so I did the best I could for myself. This hurt, however, has caused me much pain and Trouble, and is growing worse, with age. In the spring of 1863, we marched from Belle Plan ba on an Expedition, which has always been called Bunnsidis Stick in the mud where I had my first sevene attack of Rheumatism. I contracted a very bad cold, which settled all over my body and Especially in my head and Lunge, having been exposed to a continuous rain storm, for three days and nights, with very lettle rest and no change of clothing. The 2nd severe allack of Rheumatism was caused by Exposure to a storm while on the Picket Line near Harrison's Landing ba, I was in Command of the Post, and was re-locating the line, This was about the 30th of Dept. 1864. On or about the 15th day of Jane 1865, while discharging my duty as Field Officer of the day, I was Exposed to a terrible Rain & Sleet Storm, which resulted in Congestion

New hospitals are daily established, and some of them we shall not flud.

The 24th regiment is now about twelve miles North of Washington.



ADDITIONAL PARTICULARS OF THE FIRE ON JAMES STREET.-The fire is supposed to have originated in the Carpenters' shops in the eastern portion of the building in which the Bukery of Messes, Hull & Co. was located, and that it was the work of an incendiary .-Soon after the flames had reached the Gun shop of Mr. S. J. Scriber, who occupied the eastern part of the building several explosions of gunpowder, in small quantities, were heard, and of force sufficient to send the fiames and cinders upward. We give the following account of losses, &c., glonned by the Journal since yesterday morning :-

The building in which the fire was first discovered, stands partially in the rear of the American Hotel and relaining the store of Messrs. Hall & Co., and was occupied on the ousdorn ground floor us a stuble, while the westers portion commined the boiler and en-gine rooms of Messrs. II. & Co. The major portion of the second atory was occupied by Peter Brown, as a carpenter shop,

Another corporter, named P. Z. Jackson, occupied the room directly above that of Mr. Brown, the two connected by a trap door.

Webster Smith also occupied a room in the third story, as a store room for amchinery.
'The balance of this building was occupied

by Hall & Co.

Building No. 17 James street, was occupied entirely by Hall & Co., with the exception of portions of the second story, which were occupled by S. J. Scriber, gunsmith, and Messes, Arnold, Carr & Vickery, tobsecomists.

Building No. 15 James street, was occupied by Messrs. Nicholas Downes & Co., dealers in sloves and house furnishing articles.

Building No. 13 James street, was occupied by Messrs. Waggonor, Johnson & Cu., and was nearly filled with groceries, a portion of which were saved.

The American Hotel building was occupied by Mr. J. C. Everts as a hotel. The building bette property of Mr. Paschal Thurber.

The buildings No. 15 and 18 James street, and the building in the rear, were the proper-ty of Mr. Francis Hall. Building No. 13 James street belonged to the estate of O. II. &

P. Waggoner.
The following is a first of the losses as near

as we have been able to ascermin :---

Mr. F. Hall on buildings and stock, fully \$20,000; Insured for \$11,000.

Waggoner, Julinson & Co., and the estate of G. H. & P. Waggoner, on building and stock have an insurance sufficiently large to cover the loss. The value of the goods stored in this building was upwards of \$10,000, a por-

tion of which may yet be saved. Nicholas Downes & Co., on stock, lose he-tween \$8,900 and \$10,000, they having just received a large stock of goods; insured for

about \$5,000.

Mr. S. J. Scriber, gausmith, loses about \$6,000 on stock and tools, Mr. S. having made an application for an insurance, but the papers had not been drawn. The loss of Messrs. Arnold, & Nickery we have not yet ascertain-

ed, but learn they have no insurance.
The damage to the American Hotel and stables cannot fall short of \$5,000, and we have not been able to learn whether Mr.

Thurber is insured or not.

Mr. J. O. Evarts loses about \$3,000, and has no insurance; P. Z. Jackson loses about \$200, no insurance; Mr. Brown about \$200, no in-

surance; Mr. Smilli shout \$200; no insur-

Several of the occupants of the stores on Salina street, suffered slight losses from water,

but they are fully insured.

Mr. Hall informs us that the revolving oven built at great expense, is uninjured, and that his engine and boiler are unburt, and that he intends to continence the erection of another block as soon as possible, and expects to have it ready for occupancy by January next, meanwhile his office may be found in the store of Messrs. Pinkerton & Co., opposite of the
