In the Field [Oct 6-13? 1863]

Dear Farley

You must excuse my writing so briefly but dinner is ready and I can say but a few words. The Pay Master has recently made us a visit and I find that after sending home \$200 I still have more money than I can well manage. I therefore send you \$10 which I know you will be able to dispose of to better advantage than would I. Don't have any foolish scruples but believe me when I say that I could not dispose of it in any pleasanter manner.

Your Bro Sam

[On the reverse side)

I have but one stamp & therefore enclose a letter that I had already written to Mary

Love to all $\Delta \Psi$'s [Delta Psi] Saml Porter Lt. cmmdg Co F.¹

Farley and Mary are his younger brother and elder sister respectively. The Delta Psi was Porter's fraternity.
