> Head Quarters 3rd Brig 2nd Div 2A.C. November 2nd 1864

Dear Farley¹

For a few days back, I have been indefatigable in letter writing and you must therefore excuse me if I confine the few words with which I intend to favor you entirely to business. My valise has come to hand, but with my accustomed carelessness I managed to lose the key and was obliged to resort to a cold chisel. Please get me a duplicate key and send by mail. We now seem in a fair way to have a few days rest and if you will send me by mail a couple of baseballs I will be obliged to you, and try to keep my hand in so as to help you boys beat the Atlantics² once more. The piece of carpet sent me from home is spread on our floor and makes a tolerable appearance although if I remember it is not entirely new.
