place the <sup>farm</sup> consists of a 100 and 40 acres  
and about 12 acres of wood land when I  
heard of the death of your sister it  
struck me like a flash of lightning  
she has paid her debt of nature to her  
maker and whom she loved and in  
whom she trusted for her life for he

~~and~~ the maker of all things, I have  
got to be fourth sergeant in the <sup>ment</sup> regt  
in company, the Milton Company was  
met on the second day of September for  
regimental drill and review and the  
General and his staff was there and  
we had a fine time I can tell you  
now seth you must excuse me this time  
and ~~for~~ this short letter for mother  
wants to write a few lines and when  
you are at home so that I can come and  
see you I will come and make a long visit  
I have cherished you as a near and dear  
friend and cousin to me and you will  
see by this that I have not forgotten you

most insignificant long legged wide  
shouldered long fingered cousin

Henry received  
your letter last night and we are  
sorry that we could not have had it  
the moment it came to the office  
but we are 2 miles and a half from  
that place and did not expect any news  
from that office and of course did not  
ask for any but he and his father were at  
the store and Mr Spier handed him the  
letter. We are very glad to hear from  
you and have thought of coming to  
your place almost every week since  
the fair but my girl left me to get more  
wages and I had to do alone 4 or 5 weeks  
before I could get another, they have not  
made cheese at the factory since the  
17<sup>th</sup> of October and we have had lots to  
do with so much milk, churn every

day and have sometimes twice a day.  
But the cows do not give so much  
now and I think as soon as your  
Mother returns from Johns and gets  
rested if you will let us know we  
will come and visit you, do not  
wait for us but come the moment  
you can we love to think of the happy  
hours we have spent with you at our  
home and <sup>with</sup> your Mother. We did  
not hear of Mariettes Death in 2 weeks  
after the funeral. if we had known  
of it we should have been there, it was  
shocking to us and know of nothing  
in regard to her sickness, write soon  
and let us know how your lameness  
gets along and when you are coming  
and all — we have much to say which  
we will defer until we see you excuse  
this and remember me as your friend  
and Aunt Sarah L. Carr
