SETH HILL DEAD;

SERVED 3 YEARS DURING CIVIL WAR

Seth Hill, well-known veteran of the Civil War, died at his home in Greenfield Center yesterday afternoon after a lingering illness. He was a lifelong and highly respected resident of Saratoga county, having been born at Porter Corners, August 16, 1842, making him 87 years of age. On August 30, 1862, he enlisted in Co. H, 153rd New York State Volunteers, and remained with that regiment until his discharge at Savannah, Ga., on October 2, 1865. He held the grade of sergeant and took part in most of the battles in which his regiment was engaged, including some of the most important in the war.

He was a member of Luther M. Wheeler Post, G. A. R., a member of Greenfield Center Lodge, 308, I. O. O. F., for more than 50 years; Greenfield Grange, 807; the Past Grands' Association, I. O. O. F., District No. 1; and Desdemona Lodge, 56, Rebekahs, of Greenfield Center, in all of which he was active.

After the Civil War Mr. Hill located at Porter Corners and engaged in farming until nine years ago, since which time he has resided in Greenfield Center.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Jennie Hill; one son, Edward Hill, Greenfield Center; one grandson, Clifford Hill, Luzerne; one great grandson, Seth M. Hill, Luzerne, and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon at the residence in Greenfield Center. The Rev. T. Snowden Thomas will officiate and burial will be in Greenfield Center. Members of the Greenfield Lodge of Odd Fellows will conduct ritualistic services at the grave. Burial will be in Greenridge cemetery.
