Dear Father

Your letter of the 28th May came safely to hand on the 10th inst. & I was glad to hear of the continued good health of all at home. I have been quite well for some time & hope to continue so.

We had a grand review yesterday of the 19th Corps by Genl. Emory. It was quite a grand affair. When we started from camp at 4 P.M. the weather was beautiful though very warm. We arrived at the field when the review was to take place & had been there about fifteen minutes, when the sky clouded over & the rain pounded down in torrents, wetting every body through, Generals & all. The men took the thing very good naturedly & stood it without a grumble. The rain continued to fall while we were passing in review, but stopped while we were on our way back to camp.

I heard that Genl. Canby arrived in New Orleans from Natchez on the 11th. I understand he is to be up here next week & we will then probably have another review. I think it is Canby's intention to enter upon a campaign at once, but the troops can not stand it as the weather is oppressively warm, even while lying quiet.

I hear that the blockade of the river has been broken up by Genl. A.J. Smith. The rebs. inflicted a good deal of damage on our boats before Smith started them out.

We have the news that Lee is sick in Richmond which everybody hopes is true. I think it probable that Grant will arrive in Richmond on the 4th July. I hope so any way.

Our brigade has been strengthened by the 14th New Hampshire, one of the finest regts. in the Deptmt. numbering some 750 men.

Edward is still in New Orleans. I understand he is rather better than he was. Genl. Brige is still in New Orleans but is daily expected to arrive here & take command of his Brigade.

The weather still continues showerly, raining every day & night, by spells. It keeps our camp muddy all the time.

Give my love to all the folks & tell them to write soon.
