

## FOUND! 1899 Photograph of the Battle Flags of the 169<sup>th</sup> N.Y.



"Battle flags of the 169<sup>th</sup> Reg't., N. Y. S. Vols. Said regiment is classified as one of the three hundred fighting regiments of the late rebellion. The top of one of the flag-staffs was shot away during the battle of Cold Harbor, Va., June 1, 1864."

Dear All,

An exciting discovery of an illustrated historical sketch of the 169<sup>th</sup> N.Y. was recently made by Bill Connelly of Gansevoort, N.Y. Bill, the great-great-grandson of Sergeant Patrick Conoly, Co. D, was researching the fate of the 169<sup>th</sup>'s memorial stained glass window when he found a genealogy book containing the historical sketch, published by Major William M. Swartwout in 1899.

Several interesting photographs are included in the book, including a portrait of Major Swartwout, whose left arm was carried off by a huge Confederate artillery shell at Dutch Gap, Va., in 1864, and who served as adjutant of the 10<sup>th</sup> Brigade, 3<sup>d</sup> Division of the N.Y. State National Guard after the war. Other photographs include the memorial window at St. Margaret's Church; an example of the bronze 169<sup>th</sup> N.Y. veteran's reunion badge; a flagpole flying the national flag over the soldiers' graves at Oakwood Cemetery in Troy, erected at the personal expense of the Major; and the battle flags of the 169<sup>th</sup>.

The battle flags, photographed at the state capitol in Albany, include the original national banner and regimental standard of the regiment, each having been perforated by 100 holes, alongside their replacements. **LIEUT. WM. H. MERRIAM'S NEW WORK.** – We see by the following from the N. Y. *Herald*, of the 26<sup>th</sup> inst., that Lieut. Merriam has turned author:

Lieutenant Merriam, of the United States Volunteers, is engaged upon, and has nearly completed, a work for the press, to be entitled "Experiences in the United States Volunteer Service in the War of 1861." It will be made up chiefly of personal, biographical and anecdotal matters, for the faithful and entertaining presentation of which the author has peculiar qualifications. A feature of Lieut. Merriam's work will be sketches of military personages whom he met in Washington during the past winter, from the President, as commander-in-chief, all the way along down, including major- and brigadier-generals, colonels and officers of every grade. A majority of the "Experiences" have been of the most humorous character, and will be faithfully depicted. The work will be published in this city, and will be looked for with eager interest by the reading public, especially in the army.
